The school board is anxious that several thousand parents, both mothers and fathers, attend and view the work of the children for the year, as contained in the exhibits.



To the Canners of the United States: Gentlemen: -Our study of the tin plate situation indicates that it will not be possible to manufacture all of the tin plate and tin containers that will be necessary to fill the demands of every kind which will arise within the next tew months.
