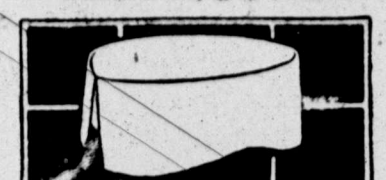

Chicago Grain Futures. Chicago, May 15.—Sharply lower prices resulted in the wheat market today as the result of the summary prohibition of new buying except to close up outstanding deals. Opening prices ranged from 2 to 6 cents lower with July at 2.55 to 2.57, September at 2.25 to 2.27. The close was unsettled 7 to 7 1/2 points net lower, with July at 2.42 and September from 2.20 to 2.21. Corn closed nervous at 2 1/8 cents to 2 3/4 net decline.

New York Cotton Futures. New York, May 15.—Favorable weather reports and uneasiness over the situation in Russia seemed responsible for increased offerings in the cotton market early today. July eased off from 19.85 to 19.75, and October from 19.25 to 19.15 before the end of the first half hour, or about 15 to 17 points net lower.

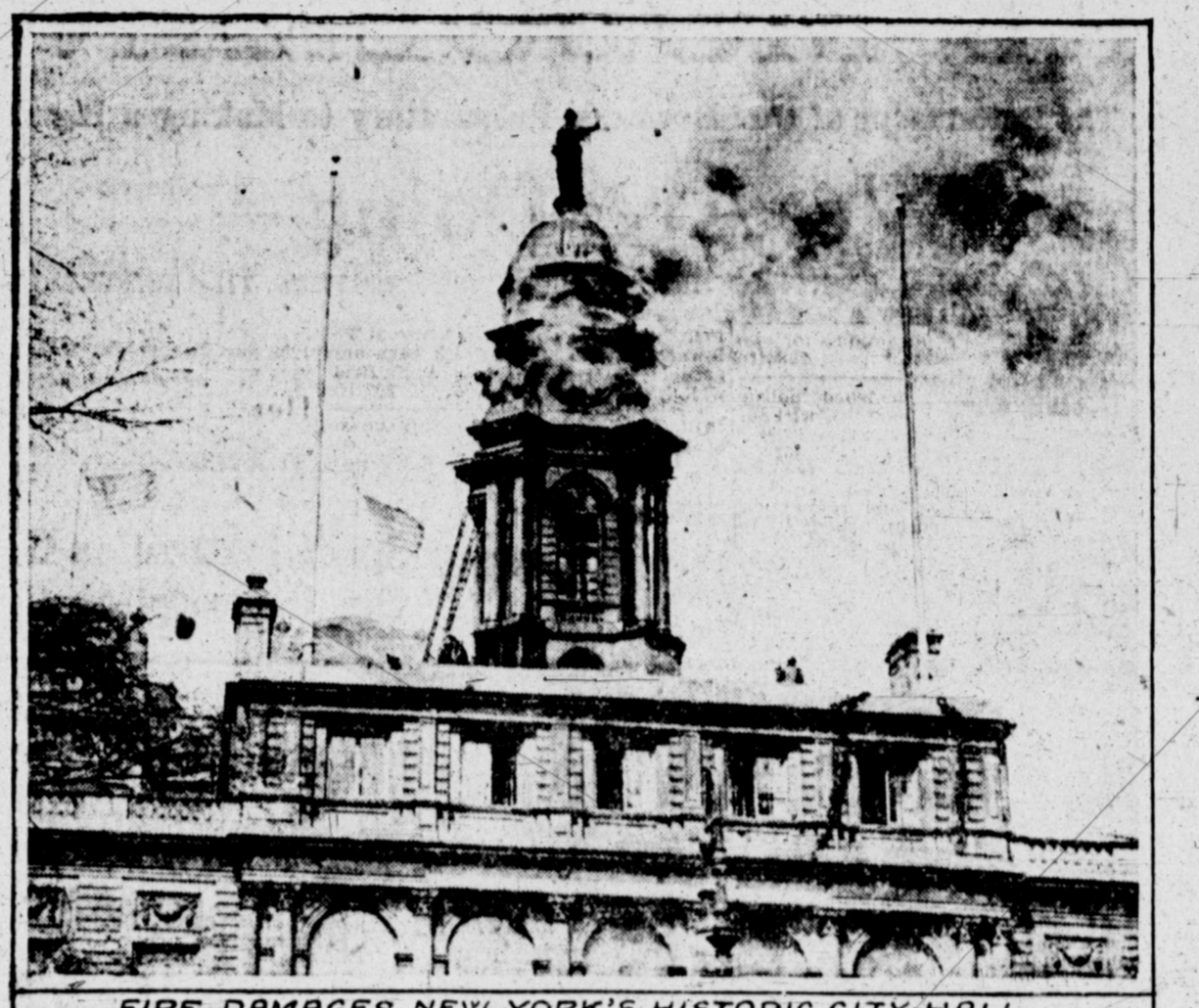
