WEEK STARTS OFF WITH A BIG WELL

KEMP, KELL ET AL, BRING IN 400 TO FIVE HUNDRED BARREL WELL ON RUYLE FARM.

NEW SAND IS FOUND

Old Hole Being Drilled Deeper. When Gusher Discovered—Land Owned in Fee.

Keeping up the record of the past few weeks, in big oil developments this week was started off Sunday by bringing in a big well in the Burk Burnett district. The new well is on the Ruyle farm owned in fee by Messrs. Kemp, Kell, Harvey, Snider and Perkins of this city. The well is estimated as being good for from 400 to 500 barrels daily. It was put down from 18 to 22 barrels an hour in the tank this morning.

The owners purchased the Ruyle farm of 422 acres on which this well is located a short time ago from T. T. Reese and associates. There were a number of shallow producing wells on the tract and a well producing about four barrels a day from a sand at 1544 feet. The new owners started to drill this hole deeper. The drill had gone down about thirty feet yesterday afternoon when the hole began to fill rapidly with oil. In a short time it blew itself in shooting a five inch stream of the oleaginous short feet higher than the derrick. This stunt came off about the time the owners arrived at the well after being summoned by telephone. Of course they kept into the sand. This is the deepest hole in that vicinity and it is believed that this is a new one.

It is the intention of the owners to begin drilling other wells to the new sand. The lands at the new well are connected with the Permian Refinery company's pipeline and it was necessary to call a pipe line out of bed last night so that the lands could be pumped. The week is likely to see the completion of new wells in the Burk Burnett district. One of these is the Roy Jones et al. on Burnett and Lloyd section 1. This well is being bailed today.

BRITISH MACHINE-GUN FACTORY IN THREE MONTHS

Associated Press Mail Correspondence. London.—The erection of a British machine-gun factory in three months has attracted a great deal of attention among the nation's building fraternity. Two months after the building was up a steady supply of guns was being turned out. The steelwork, 1,320 tons, for the main building, was delivered and erected in just 40 days. There are 9,500 window panes. The floor space is 2 1/2 acres, accommodating more than 1,000 machines, electrically driven and worked by women.

THIS CITY SECOND NAVY ENLISTMENTS

Only Dallas, Among Cities of North Texas Received More Applicants than Wichita Falls.

Wichita Falls stands second on the list of navy enlistments for North Texas, Dallas being first. Last week twenty-four were accepted out of forty-two applications. Application blanks for the airplane corps were received last week at the local navy recruiting station, but following close on their heels came orders to cease enlisting men for this service as the corps were all full. This is doubtless on account of the comparatively small equipment of this branch of service.

The army recruiting station accepted six out of twelve applications. The local recruiting officer received the following chances in the conditions governing enlistments for the army: Increase of pay—(Amount not specified). Ability to speak English the only educational qualification. No enlistments under eighteen. The oath of enlistment changed to read, "for period of emergency, unless sooner discharged." KELL SPEAKER AT LUNCHEON TUESDAY

TYPICAL LETTERS FAVORING BONDS

J. W. Stringer, one of Largest Tax Payers, Sends Hopeful Endorsement Bond Issue.

Letters from J. W. Stringer and Judge S. H. Hodges, telling why they favor the bond issue for good roads have been received by C. W. Reid, chairman of the campaign committee. Mr. Stringer is one of the largest taxpayers in the county and Judge Hodges is a conservative citizen. His opinion has much weight. Mr. Stringer's letter follows: "Dear Sir:—I believe that we are all agreed that we need the roads, and are in favor of building them; but, can we afford to do it now? I believe that we can, because from the sale of the bonds we would have the money now to be distributed here in our midst, thereby helping to keep the wheels of business rolling; and, as we would have forty years in which to pay this money back, it is likely the above-mentioned benefits would balance any hardships brought on by the obligation. Therefore, I am in favor of the bonds. Yours very truly, J. W. Stringer."

The letter from Judge Hodges, which was written from Frederick, Okla., is as follows: "Dear Sir:—I hope I will be able to get home by the 24th, so I can vote for the good road issue. "I think the money spent in building good roads money well spent, and I hope the bond issue will carry. Those who own automobiles will save enough in gas and car repairs to more than pay the additional tax. The farmer will save a great deal more than the tax will amount to in time saved and expense in marketing his crop. Where he now hauls with two horses three thousand pounds on good roads, such as should be built, he can easily haul six thousand pounds with the same team, thereby saving the expense of one team and man. "I hope the bond issue will carry."

One United States Senator has suggested that we hang the food speculators. That will never do; the rope supply would give out long before the job was completed.

By proclamation of the President, June 5 has been set as the day for all male citizens of the United States between the ages of 21 and 30 to register. The penalty for not doing so is one year in Federal prison.

We must frankly confess that, with present lights before us, we are not greatly pleased at the attitude of our government loaning to Russia that \$100,000,000. To our way of thinking, those Russians have gotten into the habit of switching from one side to the other, and it might be that the \$100,000,000 we are going to loan them might be used against us.

The selective draft scheme, it appears, is very unpopular with politicians. During the Spanish-American war the fellows with political pulls got the best jobs. Now it is different. The selective draft gives Uncle Sam the right to select officers best fitted to command and lead fighting men on the merit plan.

In arranging for the issue of the war bonds, Congress arranged to pay all expenses except for advertising them for sale. That, the members felt, would be donated by the patriotic newspapers.

The newspapers can always be depended upon to do their full part. Without the aid of the newspapers throughout the United States, the government might find it rather a difficult matter to place the "Liberty

Loan." The banks, of course, will render aid, but in return for the service the banks render they will be permitted to hold a considerable amount of the money that goes to buy these "Liberty Bonds" by paying the government only two per cent annually, or at that rate of interest for such length of time the money remains with them as government depositories.

Marks in a statement said that if the measure is enacted into law it will mean a saving of at least 1,000,000 tons of coal in this country this summer, and "will materially aid in many ways in conserving resources."
