BANKS WILL ADVANCE MONEY AND TAKE ONLY INTEREST ACCRUING ON BONDS.

PLEDGES ARE GIVEN

Burkburnett and Electra Pledge \$50,000 and \$75,000, Respectively, on Bond Purchases.

Wichita Falls banks are anxious that they should be exactly understood as to what and under what conditions they are willing to give on the matter of purchasing Liberty Loan Bonds. There is now no reason whatever why practically everyone should not buy a bond, since the banks will advance the money to do so, absolutely free of interest, merely collecting the interest of the bond, until such time as it is paid for. Wichita County is vying up to its reputation of doing what is required of it. Burkburnett has given immediate and definite pledge for \$50,000 as her share of the \$500,000 to be raised in the county, and the committee there stated that they believed they could raise \$75,000. Electra has guaranteed to raise \$75,000, and has pledged herself for that amount. Wichita Falls has already pledged \$200,000, according to Frank Kell; though he says that another \$100,000 must be raised here. He stated further that he had no doubt whatever that it would be raised.

DO IT NOW URGED ON WICHITA CITIZENS

Many Talk About Subscribing For "Liberty Loan" But Few Are Signing Application Blanks.

While in some quarters the sale of the Liberty Loan Bonds has shown a fairly brisk movement, the opinion of the bankers generally is that the bonds are not going nearly as rapidly as they should. There seems to be too much promising, and too few signatures. C. W. Reid, said today that it seemed to be very difficult for people to make up their minds about it; that they would give out vague statements about taking up three or four hundred dollars worth of bonds some time soon, but that for the most part, time merely added to the vagueness of the statements.

"I want," he said "is their signature for one hundred dollars now. The important thing, which becomes more important each day, is to do it now."

W. M. McGregor said that the subscriptions at the First National Bank had been good since last night, the smaller men buying much more heavily in proportion than the wealthier ones. The time for the purchase of the bonds is becoming very short, however, and there must be a very marked increase in the sale of the bonds if the total is to be reached.

After all that has been written and said about the Liberty Loan, there is an extraordinary amount of hazy opinion on the subject, it appears. The conditions of the bond, its length of time, and their value as security has been published many times, and discussed at practically every public meeting since the subscriptions were first invited. The bonds mature in 30 years, but are redeemable after 15 years. In the event of an issue of bonds bearing a higher rate of interest, the present bonds can be exchanged for them and the new bonds will bear the higher rate only from the time of their issue. The bonds are free of all tax, except estate and inheritance tax, and on that account will be worth at least five per cent, although the rate of interest is only three and a half.

It is hoped that the campaign to be launched next for the final rally of the bonds will have the desired effect, though there is nothing whatever to be gained by waiting for that. The time is now very short, and there is no time like the present.
