## 25,000 VACANCIES MORE INDICTMENTS

Washington, June 12.—The war department today called for 70,000 additional recruits in order to fill the regular army to war strength before June 30.

"The cavalry, engineers, coast artilizers, signal corps and quartermaster corps of the regular army have already been brought to war strength, says an official statement.

"Forty five thousand recruits are needed at once to complete the new regiments of infantry and field artilizery. Twenty-five thousand additional recruits are desired at the earliest practical date to fill vacancies in order that the war strength or 300,000 men may be maintained.

The earthquake and volcanic disaster to the Republic of San Salvador is the sixth time that the city of San Salvador, capital of the republic, has been wholly or in large part wrecked by volcanic eruption or earthquakes, the previous disasters having occurred in 1594, 1658, 1854 and 1873. The loss of life in 1873 was only about fifty, and in none of the cases was it large.

The city, which has a population of about 64,000, lies some thirty miles from the Pacific and about three miles southeast of the volcano of San Salvador. It was founded in 1525, and, despite the frequent disturbances of nature, is one of the most attractive and model farms near the capital.

From this plateau rise a group of volcanoes, geologically of more recent origin than the main chain of the Cordillera, which falls linto five groups running from Izalco on the west to San Miguel on the east. The unashamed nakedness with which the memorandum calls for the dethronement of the Belgian royal house, the exploitation of Belgian re-sources and preparation for a new war to follow the present struggle shows that the document was not in-

tended for public view Von Bissing realized that Germany can have little hope of making friends with Belgium after this war, and warns against "illusions of reconcillation" and calmly talks of the value of booty from Pelguim, and the advantages of pocketing the country from a military, naval and economic standpoint. He points out that the offensive prosecution of the present war was possible only through the invasion of Belgium, and speaks regretfully of the fact, that the German fully of the fact that the German right wing had to sweep laboriously past the Dutch province of Limburg.

The memorandum says the aim of the present war is to gain room for the concentration and advance of German arms in a new war against England and France, and that with-out the possession of Belgium, it is doubtful if the new war could be prosecuted on an offensive basis.

The law would punish espionage by death or long imprisonment: penalizes interference with foreign commerce, provides for enforcement of neutrality, authorizes return of shipments of arms designed. seizure of shipments of arms designed for unlawful purposes, fixes penalties for injuring vessels in foreign commerce of disturbance of foreign relations and imposes new restrictions upon passports.







Miss Willie Mae Kell appeared be-fore the Chamber of Commerce this morning to report on her trip to Wich-ita, Kan., where she attended a Red ita, Kan., where she attended a Red Cross conference. Miss Kell opened her report by saying that Wichita Falis and Beaumont were the only two towns of any size in Texas that were represented by women, the other towns sending the biggest and busiest men they had. "When I saw this," she said, "I began to feel that Wichita Falis was a slacker. But upon reflection, I remembered that she had never yet fallen down on what was required of her, and decided that she simply did not know of the importance of the did not know of the importance of the

Many of the most prominent men in American business were at the confer-ence, Miss Kell said, and they were bending all their efforts to raising \$100,000,000 for Red Cross equipment. furthermore, it must be done immediately. The week of the 18th had been set aside as Red Cross week, in which to raise the money, and the portion allotted to Wichita Falls as

portion allotted to Wichita Falis as her share was \$25,000.

Miss Kell said that the statistics on mortality at the front showed that six hundred men out of every thousand were put out of action; but that the activity of the Red Cross redeemed five hundred and thirty-eight of these, thus bringing down the casualty list. thus bringing down the casualty list to the extraordinary low figure of sixty-two per thousand.
