# 125,000 MEN WILL BE IN TRAINING IN TEXAS SHORTLY

Dallas, Texas, June 28.—Upwards of 125,000 men will be in training in Texas within the next few months preparatory to taking their places in the line of battle. This number is in addition to approximately 20,000 already in San Antonio and several regiments in El Paso and along the border.

Five camps will be located in Texas. One of these, at San Antonio, has been designated as a national army cantonment. Three others, at Fort Worth, Houston and Waco, will be National Guard training camps. The fifth at Leon Springs, will be for candidates for commissions in the officers' reserve.

The San Antonio camp will care for about 40,000 men selected from those registering June 5. Each of the National Guard camps will care for 25,000 or more men. About 1,500 will be assigned to Leon Springs.

The Leon Springs school will open August 27 and it is expected that the San Antonio camp will open about September 15, possibly two weeks later. The National Guard camps start work between July 15 and August 15.

The National Guard camp will embrace a total of 11,500 acres. The Waco camp site covers 3,000 acres; Houston, 2,000 and Fort Worth 1,500.

The Fort Worth site is on the outskirts of that city a vast rolling prairie touching the shores of Lake Como. One street car line already extends to camp and another will be built. A rifle range will be established on the shores of Lake Worth.

Recently the city banished its vice district and the mayor is said to have

advised the war department that it will not be permitted to return.

The site near Houston is touched by three railroads, the Missouri, Kansas & Texas; The Galveston, Houston and San Antonio, and The Houston and Texas Central. Like other sites, an ample excellent water supply is assured, natural drainage is afforded, and assurance has been given that moral conditions will be all that can be desired.

The Waco site is just north of that city and is comprised of farm land extending from the Brazos river to the South Bosque river, the majority of the acreage being on high ground which abounds in cedar and other timber. The Cotton Belt, and Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroads will build spurs to the camp sites.

## OLD LAND OFFICE TO BE HISTORICAL REPOSITORY

Austin, Texas, June 28.—Plans are under way by the Daughters of the Republic of Texas and the Daughters of the Confederacy for the converting of the historic old general land office on Capitol hill into a state museum in accordance with an act passed at the recent session of the legislature. The law provided an appropriation of \$100,000 for improving the building.

These two patriotic organizations now have quarters in the state house and when the old building is turned over to them many priceless relics and archives of the days of the Republic and of the Civil War will be placed on exhibition.

The land office is to be moved into the new four-story building now under construction.

# 10 PHYSICIANS ACCEPTED HERE RESERVE CORPS

Ten doctors from Wichita Falls and the surrounding territory have already been accepted for the Army Medical Reserve Corps, and the recruiting officers for this branch of the service expect to have at least half as many again before they leave tonight. All of the physicians who have been accepted will not immediately go into service—indeed, some of them may not go at all. Of those who are accepted for definite duty, however, some may have to wait for two or three months before actually going into service.

The recruiting officers are Dr. L. L. Lewis and Dr. Hergis, who have been selected for the work by the Texas committee of the Medical Section of the National Council of Defense. This committee is composed of some twenty of the most prominent medical men of the state, and are putting on this campaign entirely at their own expense. Whilst this is a great deal of a sacrifice, it gives them a tremendously strong moral stand, for recruiting, and no man can back down from a commitment of this sort and save his face.

The doctors have been using the offices of Drs. Harsook and Stripling for the examination work, and they have been busy every minute of their stay here. They report a fine standard of men here, and up to this afternoon had accepted every applicant, not one being physically disqualified.

One of the greatest handicaps in the work, they say, is the existence in some places of individuals and groups who are seeking to profit by the departure of their competitors.

### NEWCASTLE MAN HERE WITH INGENIOUS DEVICES

An enterprising and inventive Texan, W. A. Boynton, of Newcastle, has invented a new cotton pin, and has brought both a model and specifications of it to the 1917 M. I. T. convention. Mr. Boynton's pin is constructed entirely of metal, galvanized iron wire, and is permanently attached to the clothes line. In fact the pins must be crimped upon the line before the line is hung, and they cannot be removed, except by taking down the line. Not the least satisfactory feature of this arrangement is that the pins cannot be borrowed. The device is a little difficult to describe in technical language, but the principle is not unlike that employed in the support. Mr. Boynton says that these pins can be manufactured as cheaply as ordinary pins, and they cannot be lost or borrowed. Mr. Boynton has had offers from manufacturers in Cincinnati and Philadelphia to make the pins for him. He being a loyal Texan is anxious to get it made in Texas if possible. The U. S. patent rights are secured.

Another ingenious device of Mr. Boynton's is a cotton picker's knee pad, which he has also patented. This is a small, light, and simple metal pad to go next to the ground.
