

DEMOCRATS TO OPEN CAMPAIGN THURSDAY NIGHT

Twelve of the Leading Figures of the Party Are Scheduled to Deliver Addresses

MESSAGE FROM WILSON WILL FIRST BE READ

Occasion in Annual Jackson Day Banquet to be Held at Washington

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Twelve of the leading figures of the Democratic party, including most of those named last week for the presidential nomination, are on the list of speakers made public today for the Jackson Day dinner to be held here Thursday night.

A message from President Wilson will be read first at the banquet and speeches will be made by the following: William Jennings Bryan, Secretary Daniels, Attorney General Palmer, Governor Cox of Ohio, James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany, Champ Clark of Missouri, former speaker of the House, Governor Corwell of West Virginia, Senators Hitchcock, Nebraska; Pomeroy, Ohio; Underwood, of Alabama, and Clegg, of Ohio, and Peter O'Brien, associate member of the national committee from Minnesota.

The banquet, incidental to the quadrennial meeting of the national committee to choose a time and place for the national convention, is expected to provide a vehicle for those in the running for the presidential nomination to place themselves before the party leaders and the country.

Mr. Bryan has been quoted as saying in a recent interview that he would be ready to accept the nomination if he were elected.

FIND IT DIFFICULT TO OBTAIN JURORS IN SPANELL CASE

BROWNWOOD, TEX., Jan. 6.—Difficulty in obtaining jurors is being experienced in the third trial of Harry J. Spanell in connection with the slaying of Col. M. C. Butler, U. S. A. and Mrs. Spanell at Alpine, Tex., in 1916.

Even jurors were selected from the first venire of 120 men, and Judge Woodward ordered another venire drawn. The jury probably will be completed tomorrow. The trial is for the killing of Colonel Butler for which Spanell previously was convicted, but the verdict was set aside by the high court on a technicality and a new trial ordered.

GREATEST BOOKS OF ALL AGES AND ALL RACES ARE INCLUDED IN NATIONAL READING CIRCLE COURSES

Books that came out of the hearts and minds of the people—for whom their authors were only spokesmen—are today speaking once more to the hearts and minds of the people of America.

Human books that take firm hold on human life—broad-minded books that are a heritage from the greatest literature of all ages and all races, translated into vigorous English—books whose authors saw life steadily and saw it whole—are today the trusted comrades and the daily companions of men and women, boys and girls, throughout the United States and its territorial possessions, as through the medium of the national reading circle of the Bureau of Education, thousands of Americans have carried their names, pledged to complete one or more of the reading courses outlined by the Home Education Division of the United States Bureau of Education.

The national reading circle was first organized in 1914, and since that time it has grown to include old and young, who have long wished for some guide in their reading and who have needed some inspiration to continue a course after having commenced it.

Such inspiration is provided in the awarding of a certificate bearing the seal of the United States Bureau of Education, signed by the Commissioner of Education, which is given to each person who offers satisfactory evidence of having read all the books in the list of any one of the courses mentioned.

The courses arranged for the national reading circle include:

1. The World's Great Literary Masterpieces.
2. Great Literature—Ancient, Medieval and Modern.
3. Reading Course for Parents.
4. Miscellaneous Course for Boys.
5. Miscellaneous Course for Girls.
6. Thirty Books on Great Fiction.
7. Thirty World Heroes.
8. American Literature.
9. Thirty American Heroes.
10. American History.
11. France and Her History.
12. After War Reading Courses.

About 50 courses on vocational subjects are now being prepared with the cooperation and advice of experts on machine-shop work, shipbuilding, seamanship and iron and steel.

Specialists Assist.

In the preparation of the courses of literature the bureau has called to its aid specialists in every subject, such men as Prof. William Lyon Phelps, of Yale university; Prof. Richard Burton, of the University of Minnesota; Prof. C. Alphonso Smith, of Virginia; and Prof. Charles Forster Smith, of the University of Wisconsin.

For the course in history, Prof. Myers, of Princeton university; Prof. Mann, of Syracuse; Prof. Riley, of Virginia; and Dr. Gordy gave valuable assistance.

Prof. Keller, of Harvard; J. D. McSpide, of the United States Shipping board; and Lieut. Commander A. W. (Arms) of the Transportation Service, have aided in the preparation of the vocational courses.

"The Call of Blue Waters," a reading course on seamanship, navigation and marine engineering, for men in the service and in the merchant marine, is intended to promote a

course, was written the Home Education, saying: "I live 30 miles from the railroad, and nine miles from school. I have been to school only three years in my life. I quit school two months before this year because I wanted to get some lands by which to get a start to finish my school."

A Mother Answers.

From Colorado, a mother writes: "We are glad that the government has an interest in the proper training of its children as well as its home, as it has previously assumed that anybody could raise a child, but they should have expert advice in the care of the stock. As we are in an isolated community, 13 miles from a doctor and three miles from a telephone, please give us all the help your department can. We have two little girls."

A Nebraska man writes: "Some of the boys who have finished the eighth grade would like to do some studying this winter. Also some of the parents."

The courses suggested by the Bureau of Education are so devised as to meet the needs of all ages. There is a course that appeals to the college-bred man or woman, who wishes to supplement his or her training. There is a course for the mother and home-maker, for the boy and girl, for the professional man, for the girl who had to leave school early, for the men and women who desire to follow a definite course of study in the leisure of the winter days.

Books listed in the various reading courses may be purchased from publishers or borrowed from libraries. The Bureau of Education does not furnish or lend books, in referring to the courses of the home reading circle, the Commissioner of Education says: "Read first for pleasure, look up necessary references, and make brief notes sufficient to be able to make a summary later."

"You will find it helpful to form a reading circle, by asking others in your community to take the course. Members of the circle may then talk the books over together."

Readers may take one or more courses. They are required to read Course 1 twice during the three years succeeding enrollment. Any other courses are to be read but once. No reading done previous to the date of enrollment will be considered adequate. A certificate will be given for each course completed.

Advise the Home Education Division, of which Miss Ellen C. Leonard is director, when each book is begun and when it is completed.

Programs of each course, giving detailed information and a list of books included in the course, will be sent upon application to the Home Education Division, Bureau of Education, Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C.

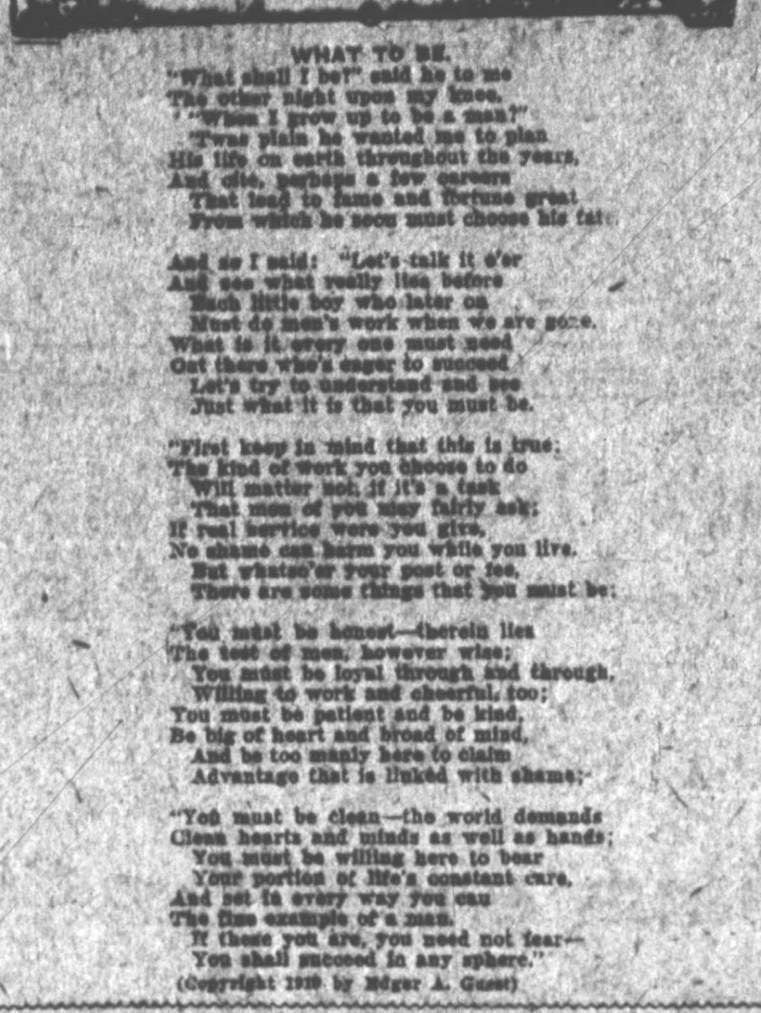

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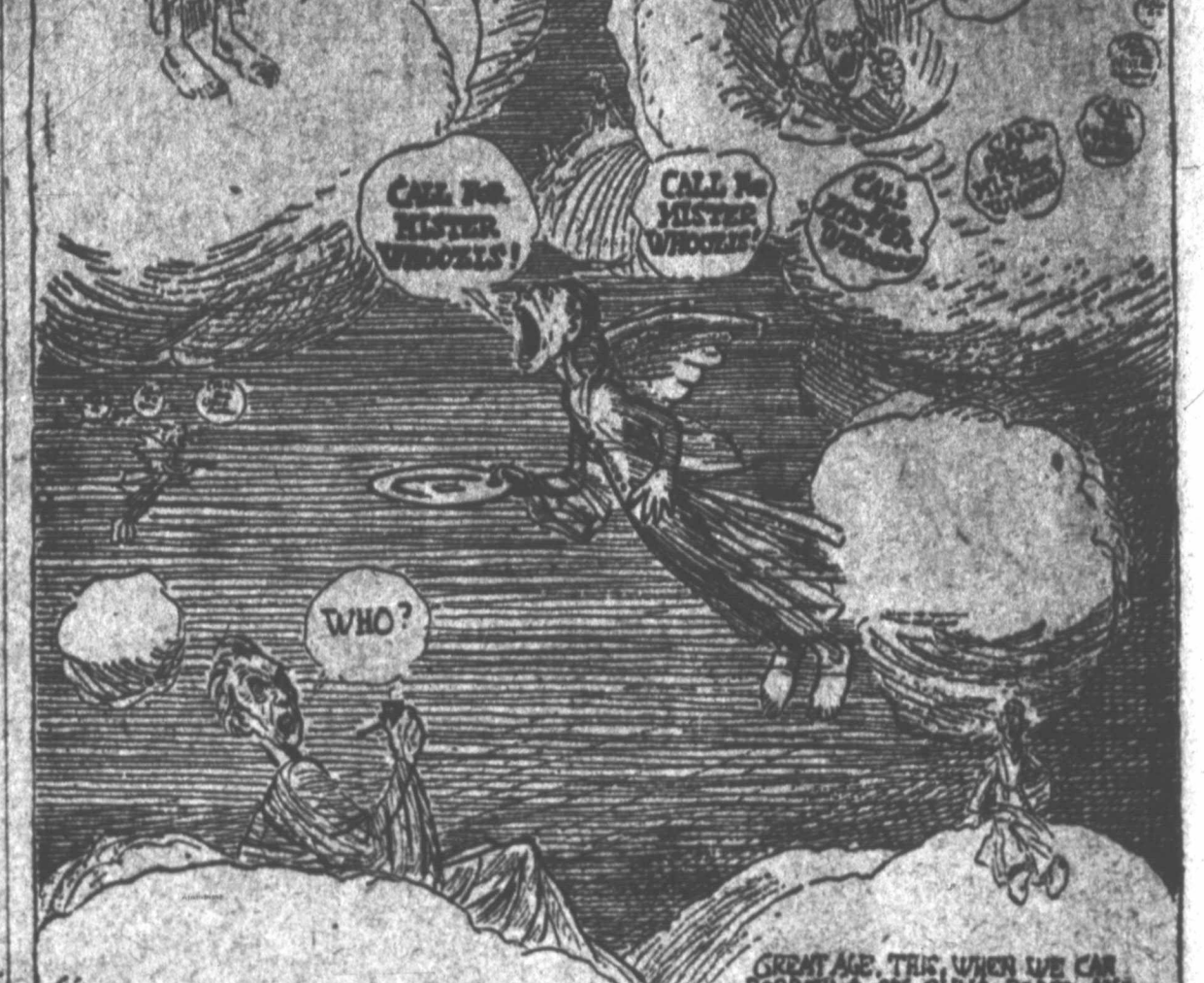

End weather hindering the plans of the club women of Wichita Falls for taking a large number of women to the collectors office today to pay their poll taxes, the committee which has been organized in the various clubs of the city are urged to continue their work of interesting women to pay their poll tax, and to make every day remaining until Jan. 31 "Poll Tax Payment Day." A number of payments were expected to be made today, according to Mrs. T. B. Snook, the chairman of the board meeting in Wichita county, despite the bad weather, though the full strength of the organization of committees in the clubs was not expected to be shown at this time.

At the Civic League meeting, this afternoon, it was planned to organize for an active campaign for the remainder of the month. The original plan was to have a committee of 10 in each club, each member of which would be responsible for influencing five women to pay their poll taxes. It was taken to the office if possible.

"We must work now in order that when the time of voting comes there will be no regrets from the women," said Mrs. T. B. Snook this morning. The general committee of the state urges through the local committee, that every woman in Wichita Falls should pay her poll tax, and pay it as soon as possible, not waiting like so many of the men do, until the last minute."

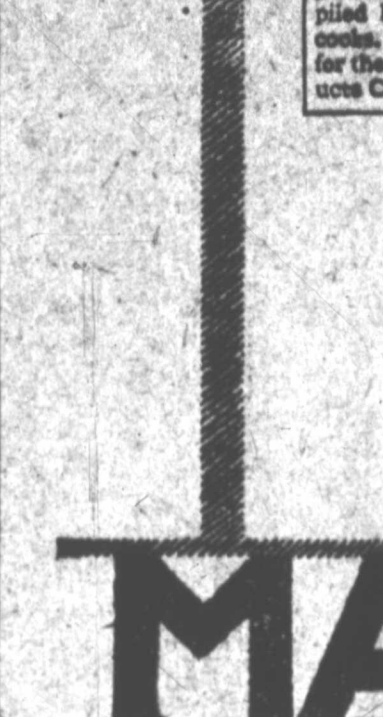

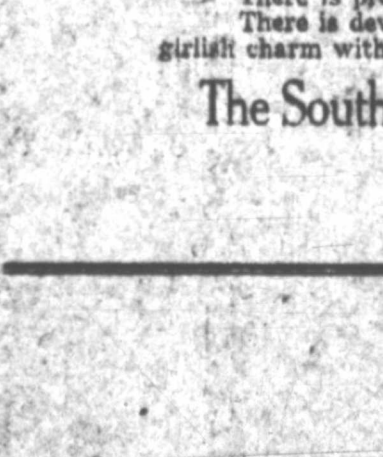

PROMINENT OPERATORS PREDICT MID-CONTINENT FIELD WILL SEE SIX DOLLAR OIL IN TWO YEARS

Encouraged by the recent and frequent advances in the price of crude oil, and by the signs that the end of the forward movement is not yet, many conservative operators in the Wichita Falls district—men with a lifetime of experience in oil fields in all parts of the country—are predicting that the next two years will see six dollars of oil in Mid-Continent fields. The demand for refined products is advancing much faster than the increase registered by crude oil production, and the demand for the former is gaining steadily all of the time.

A healthy stimulation of the search for new production, and a stimulation of the development of newly discovered pools, has certainly already resulted from the steadily mounting price, for even the present levels, to say nothing of the levels which it is considered sure to attain, means an opportunity to make big money from properties which are developed with the proper regard to the intensity with which they are drilled.

It is the producer and the public who are getting the benefit of the present movement, the producer getting more money for his oil, while the public for the present, at least, is getting the refined products at the figures which obtained before these advances set in. In October, it is the refiner, especially the small independent refiner who is forced to buy his crude supply in the open market, who is playing the fiddler and beginning to feel the effects of the cause.

With the last advance in the price of crude, expected as it has been by local operators, but which became a reality when the standard stepped to the front with the formal announcement, many operators in the Texas fields, and especially in the Waggoner pool and the Burburnett localities, begin to see real daylight for their oil ventures for the first time. Other recent advances, which had carried the price up seventy-five cents in about 40 days time, meant to many of them that their properties, overdeveloped and by this reason the subject of needless expense, would not be a losing proposition. Now, with the last advance and the almost assured prospect of more in the future, they, for the first time, begin to see an opportunity for making real money. For those who own oil properties obtained at a sensible price per acre and which have been developed on a sane and sensible basis, with a well to every two or three acres for instance, the prospect means a chance to make bigger money where some of them had been making big money before.

And for those who have rushed into some of the highly advertised but very treacherous fields to the south, which had been fast earning the name of a graveyard, the prospect is for necessarily cutting down the losses which many of them had already figured on having to stand.

Continued advances in the price of crude oil, amounting as they have to \$1 since October, without proportionate advances in the price of refined products, are without doubt creating a serious situation as far as the numerous small independent refiners which have sprung up in the Mid-Continent fields are concerned, so much so that many of them who are some distance removed from a source of crude supply, and who are

having to pay premiums for their crude oil, are even now on the brink of quitting, or of doing business at a loss on the chance that refined products might be boosted this side of \$1.00 being forced to go out of business.

A larger and more permanent independent, located near a source of crude supply, such as the refiner in Wichita Falls who owns production sufficient to run on, or whose own sufficient production to meet this need, will not be greatly affected by this condition, and will be able to weather this movement to practically any extent that the big fellows may care to go.

It is the refiner of flimsy structure, scores of which have sprung up in the various oil sections within the past few months, which were floated more for the sake of the promotion which would result from their organization, who will be squeezed out if the big companies continue their onward march with the crude price, without raising prices for their refined products.

And all indications are that this advance in price will continue—the price expected in most cases from the companies who supply the great Standard oil refineries, with the large independents apparently planning to meet all of these rises, and follow right along with the bellerether. And the knockout of many of this latter class of independents, arguing from the point of conservation of the remaining oil resources alone, is probably an end not entirely to be undervalued, for most of them carry the refining process only far enough to secure the cream of the business, and sell their residue, rich in the many by-products which can be taken from the oil, as simply fuel oil.

The shutting out of all the independents on the other hand, is not by any means to be desired, nor, as above set out, is it likely to be a development, at the best of them, are probably in shape to meet any pressure which may be brought to bear. In fact the survival of the best of them is eminently to be desired, as it must be remembered that the ad-

Accompanying Mr. McAdoe are: S. H. Bertron, a Wall Street banker who already has some oil interests, and two New York oil men, L. V. Benoit and M. E. Kurt, both of whom are associated with Mr. Bertron in business. William G. McAdoe Jr., son of Mr. McAdoe, joined the party at Dallas and accompanied it to Wichita Falls. Mr. Bertron accompanied Mr. McAdoe on his former visit in November.

MAGNOLIA ADVANCES THE PRICE TO \$3.00

DALLAS, TEX., Jan. 3.—The Magnolia Petroleum company today put into effect the \$3 a barrel price for crude oil at the wells. The advance, which is about 35 cents, meets increases announced yesterday by the Sinclair interests.

PRODUCTION IN STATE OF CALIFORNIA SHOWS AN INCREASE

FRANCISCO, CAL., Jan. 6.—Production in California in 1919 is estimated at 100,000,000 barrels of oil, according to the state oil commission. This is a slight increase over the 1918 output.

The total value of crude oil at the well was approximately \$135,000,000, according to the state oil commission. It has advanced in just about the same degree as farm products, the commissioner said, adding that "the price of oil has not been so high as it has been in the past few years."

The increase or decrease of the output of oil in storage has for several years been generally considered an index for field prices, said the commissioner. "During the past year and a half, however, the effect of oil on field prices has been very obliterated or neutralized by the general condition of advancing prices of all commodities."

Such a rise as is sought by the interests that are making representations to Hamon & Kell would traverse the developing region of a field that has already shown remarkable oil resources and which is believed to be the best undeveloped natural gas field in the state of Texas. It is said by engineers that a line eastward from Frankel to Mineral Wells would present no more difficulties than the frequently surveyed line north of there along the northern lines of Stephens and Palo Pinto county, which has long been considered a feasible route for a new line into Fort Worth and the southern route that is now being urged is through a more developed and probably more promising oil and gas field. Such a line as suggested would add a second new oil field line to the Fort Worth list of railroads, the main line of the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad being the first new line to Fort Worth via Dublin.

GROWING INTEREST IN PALO PINTO AND STEPHENS COUNTIES

RANGER, TEX., Jan. 6.—Development of oil in the eastern part of Stephens county and the western part of Palo Pinto county is increasing with the drilling operations and the results of drilling have been so favorable that operators are paying a great deal of attention to this territory. Like the country north of Ranger in Stephens county, this region is without artificial facilities. The building of the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad north and south through Stephens county has attracted attention among the people of the eastern part of that county and of Palo Pinto county and a result is a movement to induce the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth line to build a line from Frankel to Mineral Wells. This branch would be 40 miles in length. It would follow a course almost due east from Frankel to Mineral Wells.

YANKEES PURCHASE HOME RUN KING OF AMERICAN LEAGUE

BOSTON, Jan. 5.—Babe Ruth today sent the following telegram to John Tappan, his business manager here: "Will not play anywhere but Boston. Will play for the next Monday."

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Jan. 5.—In what is termed the biggest deal ever pulled off in baseball, Miller Huggins, manager of the New York Yankees, today announced that he had obtained the signature of Babe Ruth to a contract, thus completing the purchase of the champion home run hitter from the Boston Americans.

We named 5:00 o'clock yesterday as the time the deal was completed. Ruth, interviewed at 6:30 p. m., was quoted as saying he had not met Huggins but had heard he was in Los Angeles.

WAGERING HOW MUCH THE AMERICANS PAID

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The most popular indoor sport in New York today was guessing how much the New York Yankees had paid for George H. (Babe) Ruth, the home run monarch. The nearest approach to anything of an official nature was the smiling admission of Colonel Jacob Hoppert, the Yankees' president. That he understood at least \$1,000,000 for Ruth was refused last summer by Harry Frazee of the Boston club. Sporting writers estimate the price paid from \$125,000 to \$150,000.

Followers of the national pastime recalled that it was not so many years ago the baseball world was staggered at the news that the New York Giants had purchased Rube Marquard for \$11,000. Since then the sale of players has mounted even faster than the high cost of living. Until the sale of Ruth yesterday, the record price was \$50,000 and two players paid by Cleveland for Tris Speaker and \$20,000 for the Chicago American for Eddie Collins.

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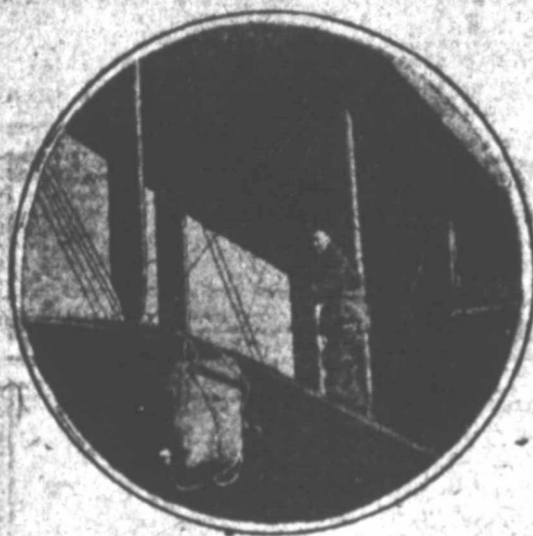

Will the Air Tourist of the Future Find the Parachute an Equivalent to the Life Preserver, Landing Safely from Any Height?

The Business of Dropping Out of the Sky

Just How the Parachute Jumper Leaves a Plane in Flight and Reaches Earth, and Why Picking His "Spot" Is a Part of Wisdom.



Out on the Wing Toward the Dropping Place.

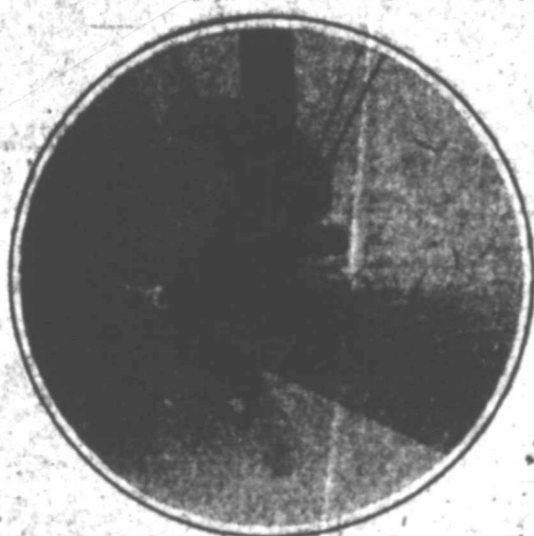
PARACHUTES provided for all air passengers. The air liner of tomorrow will doubtless offer this inducement just as steamships today provide lifeboat accommodations. Although this means of landing from an airplane may not appeal to most travelers, the parachute, nevertheless, is practically 100 per cent. efficient. An air-craft carrying parachutes against possible accidents is said to be safer than an automobile. Most of the deaths due to flying accidents could have been avoided by the use of parachutes.

A remarkable demonstration of the parachute was made the other day over Washington with the assistance of a number of government machines and fliers. Several of these aviators have distinguished war records and have done valuable work in perfecting this life-saving device. The drops were thus made under the most favorable conditions. A few years hence, when the aircraft has come into its own, the business of dropping from the sky will be commonplace.

The scenes above Washington were reproduced by moving pictures which were later to be run off before some 20,000,000 people, thus giving the mere landlubber an interesting glimpse into the future. Accompanying the parachute man and pilot aloft, but not in his descent, were several correspondents including the writer. The drops were made from the giant seven-ton Handley-Page, the largest airplane in the government service.

The drop was carefully rehearsed before leaving.

Illustrating the Position of the Packed Parachute and Dropping Tackle.

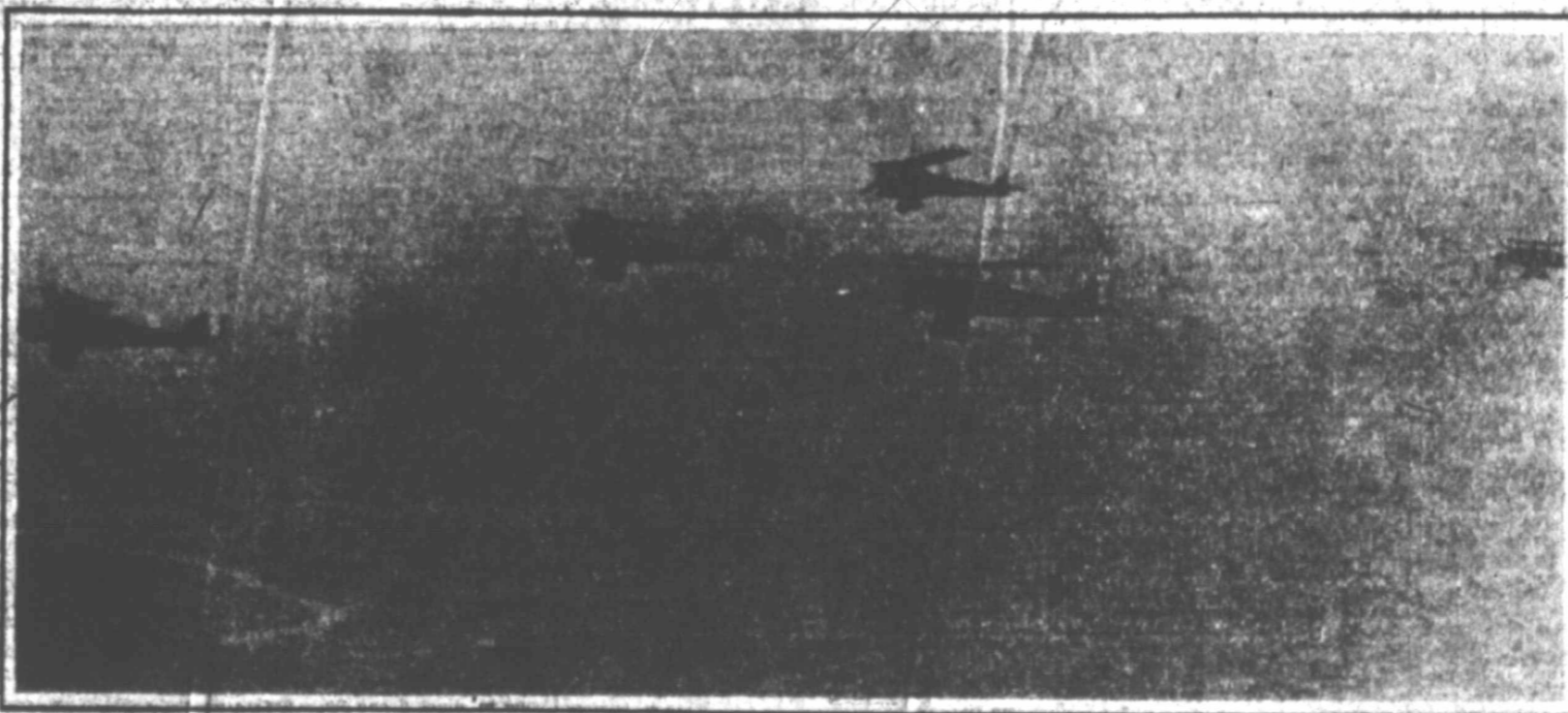


Making Attachments for the Big Drop.

ing the ground. The wings of the Handley-Page have a spread of a trifle more than 100 feet, equal to the width of a wide street. The jump was made from the forward edge at the extreme end. It was planned for the aviator making the drop to wait until the machine had reached an elevation of 3000 feet, when he was to walk out on the wing and drop in full view of the movie camera. Since the airplane would be traveling at a speed of 100 miles an hour or faster, he would thus be

obliged to face a gale holding on to the struts and wire braces.

The parachute is carried in a canvas bag tied to the end strut. The jumper donned a strong harness before going up so that it only remained for him to hook the parachute to this harness and jump.

A second airplane, a fast De Havilland 4, carried aloft a second moving picture man to photograph the descent. When the Handley-Page had reached an altitude of 3000 feet, the smaller plane was to rise beneath it and take the designated position. The parachute jumper was to take his signal from the second camera man and as a wave of his arm go over the edge. If all went well, the smaller machine would then descend in a rapid nose dive, tracing a circle about the descending parachute and keeping it in range of the camera's film from the moment the jumper let go until he reached the ground in safety or otherwise.

The Real Thrill of Flying

To the parachute man, Sergt. Billy Moon, of the 258th Aero Squadron, this thrilling experience was an old story. The sergeant had made hundreds of such drops and in conducting experiments in France he frequently averaged eight drops a day. He went about his preparations with a cheerful alacrity which inspired confidence. "You soon get used to it," he explained. "There's nothing to flying any more. It's as dull as a trolley ride. You ought to make a parachute drop to get the real thrill of flying. The first 200-foot drop until the parachute opens is lively, of

course, but after that you float along down slowly and have plenty of time to look around you and enjoy the view. There's nothing at all to it, really."

Later the sergeant sat on the same seat with the writer as the airplane rose to 3000 feet and was perfectly self-possessed throughout his thrilling experience.

Aboard an airplane everyone looks alike. The heavy flying suits lined with sheepskin give everyone the same dumpy, ungainly figure. One's head is covered with a shapeless leather cap lined with sealskin, which fits down over the ears and ties under the chin. When a pair of goggles are added to this outfit the only feature remaining exposed is one's mouth, which does little good since the roar of the propellers drowns the loudest shout.

Our ship's company for this air voyage included eight persons. Out forward standing in the cockpit stood the camera man with his moving picture machine firmly wired to the gun mount. Behind him sat the pilot with his complicated assortment of levers for controlling the wings and rudders and faced by many impressive looking dials and indicators. A mechanic sat beside him. Behind these in turn sat two passengers. The others, including Sergt. Moon, were seated further astern in the great fuselage. You enter this "cabin" through an opening in the floor of the fuselage. Standing on the ground beneath it your head just reaches through this door so that you must climb awkwardly enough in your heavy flying clothes to the seat inside.

Above the seat you find a small hole triangular in shape in the roof of the fuselage. By standing on the seat your head and shoulders project

outside the cabin. There is really no danger of falling out, but the impulse is to crouch down on the seat and stay there. On either side of the fuselage and back of the seat are two long narrow windows covered with insulating glass. Inside the

minute. The most familiar scenes are difficult to recognize. The seat allotted to the writer was an open affair of laths. Someone with mistaken kindness had left open the door in the floor of the fuselage directly beneath it. It was thus possible to look straight down through the open seat to the earth already a thousand feet and more below and rapidly growing more distant. The sensation was that of sitting on a trapeze bar swinging at an impossible height above the earth.

It was already time for the parachute leap. Sergt. Moon needed no urging. He smiled reassuringly and shook hands all around. It was useless to try to speak. Climbing to a standing position on the seat the sergeant thrust his head through the opening in the roof of the fuselage and heaved himself outside. The wind was blowing faster than 100 miles an hour and foisting on the smooth roof of the fuselage was precarious. Moon continued to crawl cautiously forward until he came to the planes and then let himself down on the floor of the lower plane still holding on to the wire stays, literally for dear life.

A Rescue in the Air

An air rescue in the future will be better arranged. It would be much easier, for instance, to drop from a hole in the cabin floor. In time a parachute may be devised which will be extended before one trusts his weight to it. At any rate the parachute rescue is likely to be far safer than to take to open boats at sea.
