The city officials in nearby Clovis have recently ordered a crackdown on high school age drivers who continually drove up and down Main Street in that city, impeding traffic and acting as a detriment to business.

More than one Friona businessman has voiced his opinion that perhaps something of this nature should be done in Friona.

The Clovis drivers were given tickets for driving too slow, conversing with drivers alongside their car or behind them, darting in and out of traffic, burning rubber and speeding.

Young drivers in Clovis argued, and this would no doubt be the situation locally, that dragging Main Street was at least "something to do."

We don't know the answer to the problem. It's true that we don't have much of an alternative to offer the young people. A youth center would help the situation.

But it's a shame when we have near-miss traffic accidents caused by the young "dragers," involving other drivers attempting to leave parking lots.

While on the subject of teenagers, a friend of ours contributed the following, which was an open letter distributed by the Juvenile Court of Denver, Colorado:

"Always we hear the plaintive cry of teenagers: 'Where can we go? What can we do, 'The answer is -- go home!'

"Hang the storm windows. Paint the woodwork. Rake the leaves. Mow the lawn. Shovel the walk. Wash the car. Learn to cook. Scrub some floors. Repair the sink. Get a job. 'Help the church. Visit the sick. Assist the poor. Study your lessons. And then, when you are through--and not too tired--read a book.

"Your parents do not owe you entertainment. Your community does not owe you recreation facilities. The world does not owe you a living. You owe it your time and energy and talents so that no one will be at war or in poverty or sick, or lonely again.

"In plain, simple words, Grow up; get out of your dream world; develop a backbone, not a wishbone, start acting like a man or a lady."

Actually, we have some pretty good teenagers in Friona, and with people such as Mary Rando as their spokesman, they're in good shape.

We heard Mary speak again this past Sunday night in a special patriotic program at church, and she's really great. We wish it were possible for Mary to take a goodwill tour throughout the world, such as her "goodwill tours" she has taken across the Panhandle.

Mary makes you proud that you're an American when you hear her speak. She also makes the cold chills come up your spine at the thought that unless we dedicate ourselves to the task of preserving freedom, that communism is waiting in the wings.

Last week we ran a list entitled "Why is it that?" We haven't received any satisfactory answers to any of the questions, but wanted to add a few more that we had to leave out last time:

Why is it that politicians, who while campaigning for office always promise to eliminate this and that program if elected, and then begin searching for ways of continuing to finance the programs?

Why is it that there seems to be nothing as permanent as a "temporary" federal tax?

Why is it that the weather can be too bad to go to church, but not too bad if we just want to "go somewhere"?

Why is it that you can't get a job without experience, and you can't get experience without first having a job?

And why is it that if I'm always winning these contests, that I'm notified by "boxholder" mail permit, sometimes with the notification addressed to "occupant"?

Ayers Takes Oath As Adjutant General

Brigadier General Ross Ayers of Friona had his appointment as Adjutant General of Texas confirmed by the Texas Senate last week, and took his oath of office on Tuesday.

State Senator Jack Hightower, announcing Senate confirmation of the Governor's appointment, stated that Ayers was sworn in by Texas Supreme Court Justice Tom Blackwell.

General Ayers served with the 36th Infantry Division during World War II. For his outstanding service to the United States, he received the Silver Star, the Bronze Star, the French Cross of War and the World War II Victory Medal.

The new Adjutant General is a 1934 graduate of Texas Tech in Lubbock and received his MA from the University of Texas in 1946. He was graduated in 1963 from Army Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

He is a member of the Lions Club, the American Legion, the National Guard Association of Texas, the National Guard Association of the United States and is an Elder in the Presbyterian Church.

General Ayers began his military career in 1931 when he enlisted in the 131st Field Artillery Battalion, 36th Infantry Division. In March, 1939, he was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant (Artillery) in the Texas National Guard.

In November, 1940, General Ayers entered active Federal service with his Field Battalion.

Snowfall Brings Moisture, Smiles

The best and wettest snowfall of the year blanketed the Friona area last weekend, and brought good general moisture to farmland.

The moisture will help lay groundwork for land preparation for planting, and should boost the wheat crop.

Most farmers reported upwards of five inches of snow from the Friday and Saturday snow. The official measurement by the City of Friona was four inches.

After several days of below normal temperatures and a threat of snow, the moisture finally began to materialize on Friday night, March 14. One to two inches fell during the night on Friday, which snow wasn't exceptionally wet. But on Saturday afternoon, big wet flakes began to fall, and continued into the night. This brought an additional three to four inches, and good moisture.

The snow fell as perfectly as can be expected in this area, with a minimum of drifting. To cap off the "perfect" weekend, the sun came out on Sunday, and by the end of the day most of the snow was melted.

The official "melt" by the city gauge for the weekend snow was only .2 inches, but it is expected that the gauge did not catch an indicative amount of snow. Most people believe the moisture derived from the snow was at least equal to a half-inch rain.

Sunny, warm weather the first of this week is heralding the approach of spring, slated to officially arrive during the day on Thursday. But with the sort of month the area has had so far, most people aren't putting up their winter clothing just yet.

DUES ARE REVISED

Chamber Maps Program Of Work; Sets Drive

The Board of Directors of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, in an attempt to finance a bigger and better program of work for 1969, has voted to raise the dues for businesses and farmer-businessmen to \$60 per year, and those of individuals (employees) to \$36.

The previous dues set-up, which brought in a total of \$7,900 for 1968, did not allow the chamber enough money to pay a full-time manager's salary for the entire year, plus office expenses.

In addition to its own office expenses, the Friona Chamber of Commerce also has paid monthly rental for both the Soil Conservation District office and Texas Employment Commission office.

The chamber is encouraging businesses to pay dues in multiples of \$60--according to the size of the business. Each additional \$60 would entitle them to an additional vote in chamber affairs.

It is also recommended that a monthly bank draft arrangement be considered, in order to keep from having to pay a "lump sum," and also to keep money coming into the chamber's treasury in an orderly fashion.

Dues statements will be mailed out in the near future, according to Chamber president Doyle Elliott, and he urges members to respond quickly, so that the chamber can get its program of work underway.

One of the objectives of the chamber will be to hire a manager, but just how soon a manager could be hired is a matter of speculation, depending on the chamber's finances for one thing.

The increased dues would give the chamber a proposed budget for 1969 of approximately \$14,500. The directors also plan a drive to secure additional members to the organization, who have not joined in previous years, which could add to the above figure. "We firmly believe that our com-

munity has a good chance to grow and prosper in the immediate future, and we need the support of every business, farmer and individual to help us secure all the growth potentials possible," said Elliott.

It was pointed out that neighboring Hereford, which carries on a full-fledged Chamber program, operates with a budget of over \$25,000 per year. The proposed dues are in line with those paid in that city.

In other business at the monthly meeting Tuesday morning, Elliott appointed director Paul Fortenberry to head a committee on transportation and communications.

W.D. Buske was appointed to a committee to develop a study of the area's present grain production and supply, in relation to cattle feeding in the area at present and in the immediate future. Charles Allen was appointed the chamber's board member on the Friona Public Library board, replacing Richard Collard.

Hinkson Gets Bid

Frank Hinkson, Lazbuddie farmer-stockman, has been appointed as one of four new members of the Texas ASC state committee, by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin.

Hinkson's appointment was announced this week by Congressman Bob Price.

Other members were from El Paso County, Harrison County and Fort Bend County. The vacancies were caused by resignations of former committee-men.

Hinkson, 59, has operated his own farm since 1932. He produces wheat, grain sorghum and corn. He also operates a large cattle feedlot. In addition, Hinkson operates cattle ranches in Arizona and New Mexico.

A member of Farm Bureau, American National Cattleman's Association and Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, Hinkson attended the University of Nebraska.

TEC Completes Good First Year

Friona's branch office for the Texas Employment Commission recently completed its first year of operation locally, and compiled some impressive figures for a new office.

During the year, over 2500 job openings were received. A total of 2208 people were placed on jobs. There were 372 individuals placed on farm jobs, with 157 different farmers. In addition, some 1643 people were placed on farm jobs in crews.

In non-farm positions, there were 266 job openings listed during the year from 82 non-farm business places. Of these openings, 193 people were placed. The office accepted a total of 889 applications during the year from individuals looking for work.

The figures top those from several other TEC offices in the area, many of which have been in operation for several years.

The office has assisted in all special programs, such as Job Corps, MFTA, Rehabilitation Programs and others.

Fred Jackson is in charge of the Friona TEC office, assisted by Kathy Whitaker. "We wish to thank the people

of Friona and the surrounding territory for using our office during the past year, and urge them to continue to do so," Jackson says. He reminds employers and employees that there is no charge for the service.

Anyone looking for work is urged to come by the office and register, and anyone need-

ing employees should call the office or go by and talk to Jackson. The office is located at the corner of Sixth and Euclid Streets.

The TEC office was located in Friona last March after the Friona Chamber of Commerce offered to furnish office space. The chamber continues to pay the monthly rent for the office.

But this one takes the cake; you allow me only \$600 to take care of my child, but will give through A.D.C. \$800 to care for an illegitimate child. This leads me to believe you feel he is more important than mine. I am yelling, Uncle, because I think it is time someone pointed out these inconsistencies.

40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 22, 1929

30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 24, 1939

Patrol Investigates 9 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of February, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$6,760.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during

the first two months of 1969 shows a total of 19 accidents resulting in no persons killed, eight persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$14,285.00.

Others who will present devotionals are Brenda Blackburn, Wednesday; Leta Wyly, Thursday; and Susan Floyd, Friday.

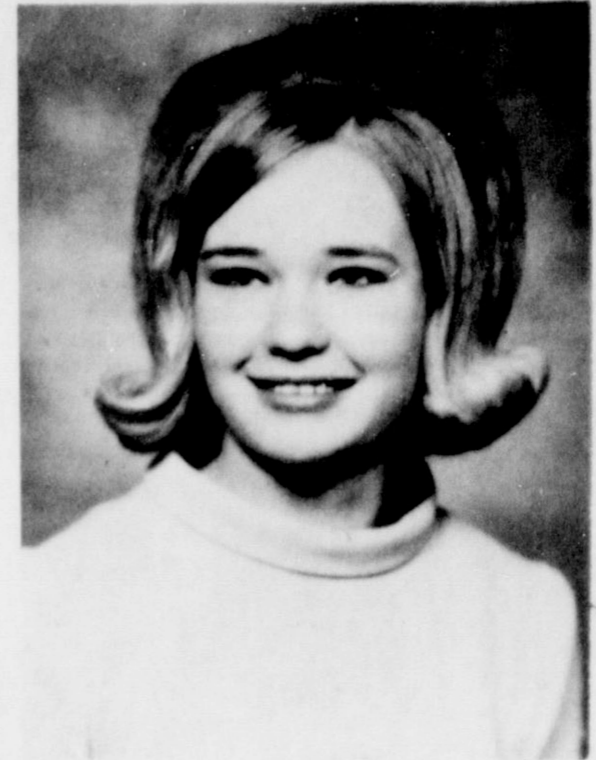

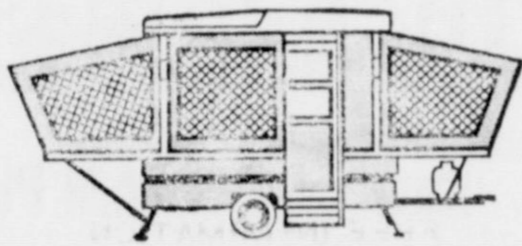

Auto Owners Have Deadline Date

"With the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near, only 31 percent of the registered vehicles in Parmer County have been inspected," stated Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Unless there is a rapid increase of inspections, long

waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches. The authorized inspection stations are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles if owners will not wait until a few days before the deadline," Johnson added. "Any driver operating a vehicle on public roads after April 15 that is required to be inspected will be operating

in violation of the law," Johnson said.

Captain Johnson called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program in 1951, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13 percent to three percent.

Johnson said, "The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident."

Grant Made To Bookmobile

Texas State Library, Austin, announces a grant of \$2,000 to the four-county High Plains Bookmobile library headquartered in Muleshoe. This grant is made under Title I of the Library Services and Construction Act for federal fiscal year 1969 for the purchase of books, binding or microfilm.

Hereford Men Explain NFO Aims, Objectives

Tuesday evening, March 4, the newly organized Farmer County chapter of the National Farmers' Organization met in the Hub Community Center. Presiding over the group of 60 people was Elvin Wilson, Friona. Neal Bradshaw was sworn in as a grain committee member.

The program, presented by Gerald McCathern and F. A. Marnelle of Deaf Smith County, was especially oriented to give information to new and prospective members. Special emphasis was put on working together with surrounding counties to strengthen the NFO's bargaining power.

Facts brought out in the pro-

gram included the following: American farmers receive a return of three cents on the dollar they invest; while industry gets 25 cents per dollar invested. For each dollar the farmer turns, 6.8 to 7.2 dollars are added to the national economy. If a farmer received 100 per cent of parity, he would make three times his present income.

Also farmers receive only five per cent of the consumers disposable income. Statistics also show that for every 10 farmers leaving the farm, one small businessman goes out of business.

McCathern emphasized that the NFO is completely non-

Permanent-Press Fabrics Present Problems

Permanent-press cotton fabrics are a real boon to the homemaker—that is, until she goes to alter clothes made with the fabrics. Alterations become noticeable—especially when hems are lowered,

leaving tell-tale creases. To help the consumer with this problem, Agricultural Research Service scientists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture are developing a new finish which allows old creases and seams to be ironed out and new ones ironed in. So far, the new fabric has only been tested in the laboratory and is not available to the public. Results are promising and

a new future may be in store for permanent-press clothing. Dr. Graham Hard, Extension clothing specialist, says applying this finish to cotton garments would allow the homemaker to alter clothes without fear of leaving old creases and lines in the fabric. If hemlines should go down, lengthening skirts made of this new permanent press cotton would be no problem for the homemaker, she adds.

Common Tax Errors Are Simple

The good tax filers try real hard every year to get tax instructions that taxpayers can follow without getting mixed-up. Of course, the law is real complicated and the IRS folks that write the instructions have their work cut out for them. Taxpayers have more trouble getting the right tax table, and the right line or column on the tax table than anything else. Since the law requires a lot of different tax tables, the instruction must be detailed or even tedious. About the only thing we can do is to re-check our tax computation carefully.

More than half of the errors reported by the computer for Dallas district taxpayers are caused by taxpayers getting mixed-up and getting the wrong tax table, line, or column. So re-check your instructions, your computations and everything. Be real careful! If you don't the computer may send you a little notice pointing out your error.
