QUARTERLY CONFERENCE IS HELD BY THE NEW CONGREGATION.

RESIDING ELDER PRESENT

Church Now Has Membership of 258 and \$104,000 Has Been Raised to Carry on Work.

wonderful showing was made Monday evening when the Floral Heights Methodist church held its first quarterly conference. The congregation is more than two months old. In brief time remarkable things have been accomplished. When the pastor, W. L. Tittle, received his appointment a few weeks ago there was no roll of membership, no church building, no lot upon which to build, no money to buy a lot, no money to build, and not a dollar in the treasury with which to do any of these things. The pastor found a few Methodist people whose hearts were yearning to see Wichita Falls Methodism and enlarge so as to meet the present demands of this rapidly growing city. He unhesitatingly says he found the best board of stewards, the best women workers and the best all around church membership he has ever seen anywhere. A letter taken from the reports of the last evening will convince anyone that this wide-awake pastor has a congregation of people who are doing things that are making the church a financial way wonderful success story. With not a dollar on hand when the pastor arrived, the reports of the last evening that in a few days time \$51,500 had actually been raised in cash by this congregation for the purchase of a lot and the building of a church. This added to \$52,500 of gold edge subscriptions ready to be paid as soon as needed, shows a total of \$104,000. The pastor, realizing the fact that such a large number of outside people have been added in their donations, the great of this sum of money has actually been paid by his membership. Reports showed a wide-awake and zealous Sunday school which is growing rapidly and doing efficient work. A report of Epworth League, thoroughly organized, was reported. A Missionary society with two large circles actively at work was reported. Plans Being Prepared. MORE THAN 500 PAY POLL TAX DOWNTOWN

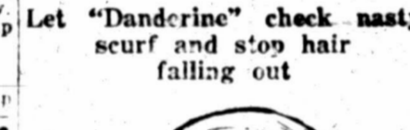
THREE WHITE KUHN'S FEATURE PANTAGES BILL

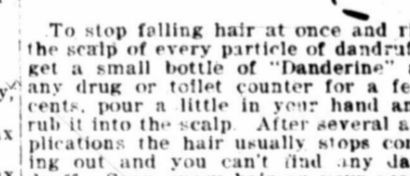

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COOKS AND WAITERS PLAN TO ESTABLISH A POPULAR PRICE CAFE

Whitney Hoffman, business agent of the Cooks, Waiters and Waitresses' union, this morning declared that the food, increase at restaurants and cafes are "unreasonable and outrageous." He is seeking the aid of the Chamber of Commerce, city clubs and various civic organizations in an attempt to obtain a downtown location for a new restaurant.

"The union," he said, "is willing and eager to open a community restaurant, engage cooks and waiters at the new scale, reduce prices in the restaurant below prices being charged now—and willing to gamble that a handsome profit will result. I vehemently protest against this increase in prices. People can accuse me of seeking public sympathy or anything else, but I stand back of the statement that the Cooks, Waiters and Waitresses' union is loyal to Wichita Falls. We want to help make this the best little city in the south, and we want a square deal for every citizen here. Our new wage scale is a fair scale and open to the examination of anyone—but it is not fair for the restaurant proprietors to gouge the public because of it."

"The union isn't looking for restaurant profits. Give us a location and we'll open the community restaurant. It can be made—and we'll give every cent of the profits to charity—to a building fund for a new hospital, to the Y. W. C. A., to the Boys' club, to a fund for paving city streets or to any other purpose that will help Wichita Falls. This isn't a bluff; we'll go through with it."

In the meantime one can still buy a slice of pie for 15 cents—the slice being one of five taken from a pie that cost in its entirety from 16 to 20 cents to make. "Wick 'em, cowboy!"

RENEW WARNING THAT CONTRABAND LIQUOR IS DANGEROUS TO DRINK

Federation officials Tuesday again issued a warning to the public to let contraband liquor alone. Extended investigations carried out by department officials show that practically all liquor seized here from bootleggers contains wood alcohol in sufficient quantities to produce total blindness or perhaps death.

Federal officials say that the liquor has been mixed with wood alcohol by the local bootleggers who are effecting the deadly poison sale. They are urged to be extra careful in buying liquor from Kansas City and other cities in the Middle West.

ENERGETIC CAMPAIGN IS BEING STAGED TODAY BY COMMITTEES OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Two hours before schedule time this morning more than a score of energetic hustlers for a bigger, better Wichita Falls were canvassing the city for additional members of the Chamber of Commerce. As a result of the unusual enthusiasm taken by several teams in the campaign, the total number of memberships at noon today had passed 2,200 with promise that many more would be added by night fall.

Team captains today were permitted to select their own "victims." Don Farnsworth, manager of the campaign, had prepared a list of over 700 names of men and women who should be members of the new Chamber of Commerce—and from this list the workers selected individuals they felt in advance they could bring into the fold. The result was—results!

The new Chamber of Commerce, the commercial organization that has pledged itself to spend time, money and effort to make Wichita Falls a better city in which to live, will come into being at a meeting to be held in the Methodist church at 7:30 p. m. Thursday. At that time and place, with the big membership drive successfully concluded, the new chamber will be completely organized and whipped into shape for its 1920 work.

Officers and a board of directors will be elected, and the business council, the most important branch of the new body, will be perfected. The meeting will wipe out the old chamber officially, and create the new—and every man or woman of the 2,000 odd who have pledged memberships is earnestly asked to be present and "take a hand" in the proceedings.

A careful check of all the memberships received in the campaign thus far conducted shows 21 distinct business, trade and professional classifications. Each of these will have two representatives on the business council of the new chamber, thereby creating a council of 62 members representing practically every profession and industry in the city. With a chairman and a vice-chairman whose duties will be to represent the council at all chamber meetings, it is believed this bunch of the new organization will be the most powerful weapon for civic betterment ever connected with a commercial club.

WICHITA FALLS TO PAY A HEAVY LUXURY TAX

It is reported that while Wichita Falls is smaller than either Fort Worth or Dallas, yet luxury taxes paid here are almost equal to that of the larger cities of the state.

ANNOUNCE TEACHERS EXAMINATION TO BE EARLY IN FEBRUARY

Examinations for teachers' certificates of the first and second grade will be given at the court house on Friday and Saturday of the first week in February, County Superintendent Hall announced Tuesday. The examination is specially called in order to secure teachers to fill the great number of vacancies reported in various sections of the state. Miss Anna Webb Blanton states in a circular letter to county superintendents, Superintendent Hall reports that there are no vacancies in the schools of Wichita county at the present but that there is great demand for teachers in other parts of the state.

GIVING ATTENTION TO THE MANUFACTURE AND SALE OF MOONSHINE WHISKEY

CHARLESTOWN, W. VA., Jan. 27.—The manufacture and sale of moonshine whiskey in the mountains of Southern West Virginia is attracting the close attention of W. S. Hallanan, prohibition commissioner, who with a large force of deputies continues to raid and arrest almost weekly. There have been times in the last few weeks when the officers have met determined resistance and already two men, Preston Mullens, an alleged moonshiner, and John D. Kennedy, a deputy sheriff, have lost their lives in the campaign. This fight, the most serious in recent years, occurred in the Panther creek section of McDowell county, on the Virginia border. Panther creek, the prohibition authorities say, is one of the most active moonshining districts in the state. There, according to Mr. Hallanan, have been gathered some of the most famous manufacturers of moonshine from Buchanan county, Virginia. They know all that is to be known about the industry, and some of them are famed for the qualities of their "corn liquor." Usually their stills are extremely difficult to locate, but gradually the prohibition officers are hunting them out and destroying them. There is another kind of moonshiner in that section who is giving the officers much trouble. He makes his moonshine as quickly as possible, markets it with the least delay, and then moves his still to some other place. The country is mountainous and rough with many fertile valleys. These valleys, the commissioner has discovered, were this year used to a large extent for the growing of sugar cane, the high price of sugar having driven some of the old time moonshiners to producing what they needed for domestic and moonshine purposes.

TO RECEIVE APPLICATIONS FOR VOCATIONAL TRAINING

A representative of the federal bureau for the rehabilitation of wounded soldiers will be at the Quannah Hotel, Quannah, Texas, from January 31 to February 3 to receive applications from disabled soldiers who care to take advantage of federal vocational training, according to a letter received on Tuesday by County Superintendent Hall from W. F. Doughty, head of the bureau of rehabilitation with headquarters in Dallas.

THREE THOUSAND SALOONS TO GO OUT OF EXISTENCE SATURDAY AT MIDNIGHT

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—New York's 3,000 saloons will go out of existence next Saturday at midnight with the expiration of the short term certificates issued last October by the state excise department in lieu of licenses. There is no provision for further licensing except to drug stores. Licenses have been granted to 250 drug stores in Manhattan, according to the excise department, and 100 of these were issued in the last 10 days.

SENATOR SHEPPARD SECURES THE LIFTING OF EMBARGO ON CANADIAN NEWSPRINT

Special to The Times. WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The Canadian embargo on newspaper paper which has caused a shortage of newspaper in nearly every southwestern newspaper office, in some instances threatening suspension of publication, has been lifted largely through the efforts of Senator Sheppard. Senator Sheppard received many telegrams from Texas publishers recently, some of them saying that unless the shortage was overcome they would have to stop publication. Sheppard appealed to the treasury and the state department to ask the Canadian government to remove the embargo. This was done and today it was announced the embargo has been lifted.

MANDATE FOR ARMENIA MAY BE GIVEN HOLLAND

PARIS, Jan. 27.—In case the United States refuses to accept a mandate for Armenia it may be given to Holland, according to a dispatch from The Hague to the Matin, quoting rumors in that city.

GENEVA, Jan. 27.—Nearly 375,000 of the 500,000 Austro-Hungarian prisoners of war taken by Russians have perished in Siberia from smallpox and typhus, according to Vladivostok dispatches to International Red Cross headquarters here. The rest were kept alive only by the efficient work of Japanese, American and English doctors, who have been assigned to different towns along the trans-Siberian railroad. East of Lake Baikal, Chinese physicians are also helping, but the work is difficult, owing to the Bolshevik invasion.

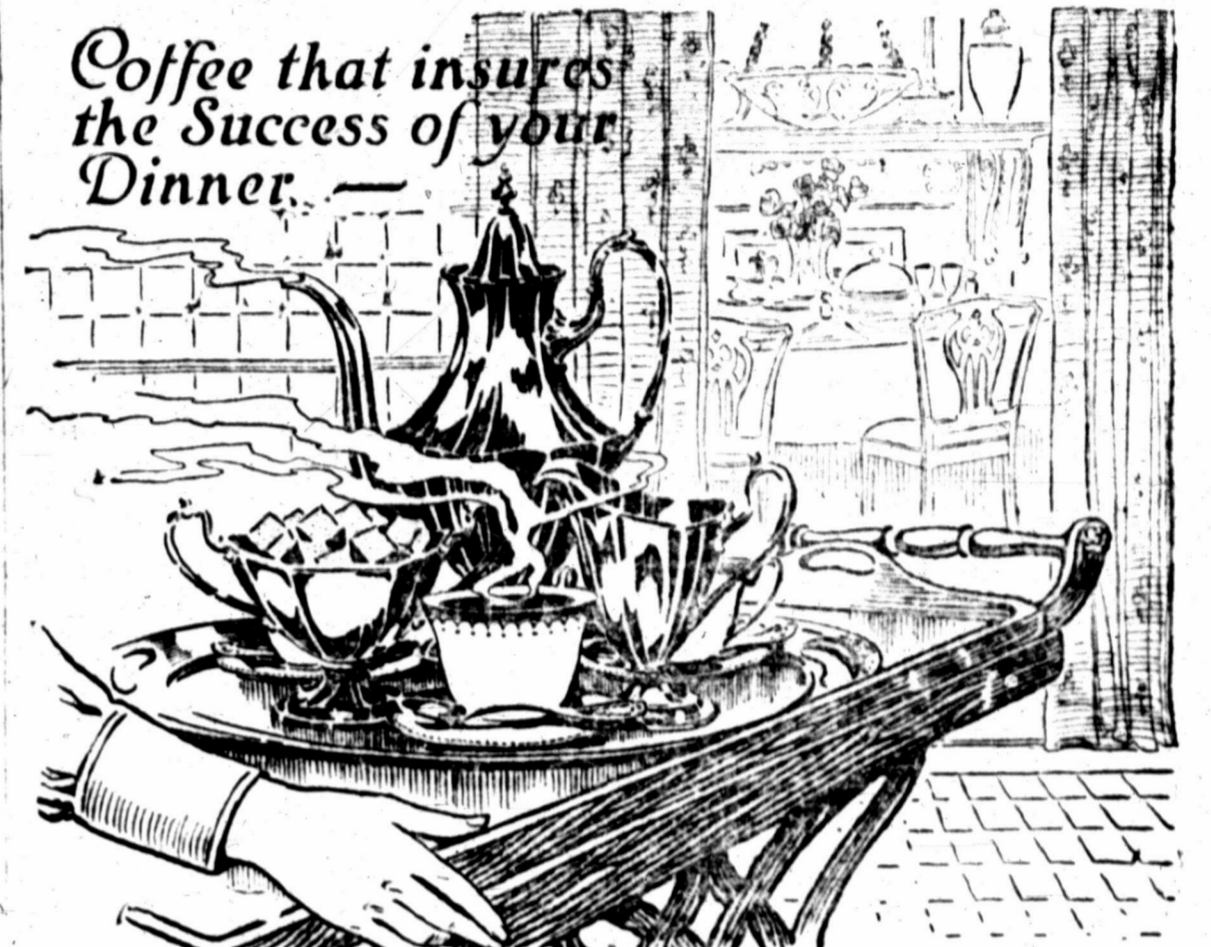
UNDECIPHERABLE SIGNALS INTERRUPT MARCONI WIRELESS AS WAS CASE BEFORE THE WAR

LONDON, Jan. 27.—Interruptions of the Marconi wireless instruments by mysterious undecipherable signals which were noted before the war and have been publicly referred to since, are especially featured in the Daily Mail this morning and discussed by Marconi in an interview published by the paper. "We occasionally get very queer sounds and indications, which come from somewhere outside the earth," said Signor Marconi. "We have had them both in England and America. The Morse signal letters occur with much greater frequency than others, but we have never yet picked up anything that could be translated into a definite message. The fact that the signals have occurred simultaneously at New York and London, with identical intensity, seems to indicate that they must have originated at a very great distance. We have not yet the slightest proof of their origin. They might conceivably be due to some natural disturbance at a great distance, for instance,

an eruption of the sun causing electrical disturbances." Asked whether possibly attempts were being made by another planet, Signor Marconi said: "I would not rule out the possibility of this, but there is no proof. We must investigate the matter much more thoroughly before we venture upon a definite explanation." He added that the mysterious

sounds are not confined to any particular diurnal periods; they are equally frequent by day and night.

MID CONTINENT OIL AND GAS ASSOCIATION TO MEET AT TULSA

TO SELECT REPRESENTATIVES TO ATTEND MEETING AT CHICAGO.

SECRETARY SENDS OUT CALL

Plan to Discuss the Income and Excess Profits Taxes and Other Live Issues.

A meeting of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association will be held at Tulsa, Jan. 29 to select representatives to attend a meeting of the National Petroleum Institute at Chicago Feb. 6 to discuss the income and excess profits taxes. Members of the organization here are receiving notices of the meeting. In announcing the meeting Harry H. Smith, secretary of the organization, has issued the following letter.

Office of Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, Jan. 19, 1920.

Dear Sir: Saturday morning, Jan. 17, the committee on federal tax legislation held a meeting at which a policy was outlined with reference to federal taxation. It was the unanimous opinion that the time has now arrived when not only the oil business and all its branches but all business of every kind in the United States should take up the federal tax question along broad lines and endeavor to improve the system of raising revenue so that all industry may prosper in the future.

Instead of being hampered or throttled by a system of taxation which destroys free capital and threatens serious embarrassment of business generally.

It was pointed out that approximately 90 per cent of the revenue required by the federal government is now being paid in by approximately 90 per cent of the taxpayers of the United States. That this condition is not only antagonistic to legitimate business but prevents progress, renders our industries unable to cope with foreign competition and destroys that free capital which is necessary to finance new projects and new methods of production.

Furthermore, that when 90 per cent of the people do not contribute materially to the expenses of government, they do not take an interest in the matter of keeping down government expenditures. That that system of taxation is wisest and best which affects all of the people and, therefore, causes the greatest ability to in-late upon congress adopting an adequate budget system and other means of checking governmental disbursements.

To this end it was resolved that we communicate with the American Petroleum Institute and suggest calling a national conference of the oil industry which will bring together all those who would have before it two specific propositions as follows:

1. That the oil industry take the initiative and go on record in favor of a nationwide organization of all business associations. This national organization to provide the necessary committees, employ experts and specialists to advise and prepare a system of taxation which will accomplish the above mentioned purposes and which system of taxation shall be submitted to congress as a substitute for the present tax scheme.

2. That the said national conference of the oil industry, as a matter supplemental and secondary to the aforementioned primary consideration, consider and pass upon such amendments as are immediately necessary to protect the oil industry against discrimination or inequities in the present income and excess profits tax law.

Business everywhere in the United States is waking up to the fact that labor is well organized and is pressing its demands—that other classes are organized and promulgating propaganda in their behalf. That it is now necessary for all business which relies upon capital for its operations to organize and assert itself before the present or future congress adopts a permanent policy for raising revenue. The purpose of such an organization would not be purely selfish nor would its accomplishment tend toward class distinction. Private business from its very nature is a patriotic enterprise desirable and essential to the prosperity of all citizens.

In the past few years it has been customary for a certain branch of business to send representatives to Washington for relief against some provision of the income and excess profits tax. These representatives

were usually hurriedly selected and went before congress without sufficient preparation. Their request for relief was presented and when considered, the fact was disclosed that the granting of the relief would mean the loss of a certain amount of revenue which the government must have.

When called upon to suggest an alternative method of raising that revenue the said representatives were unable to make the necessary suggestions. The result was that many requests were denied. Nothing of consequence can be gained in the future by the various branches of business or the various disconnected lines of industry proceeding without organization. There must be a concerted effort by all business backed up by specific recommendations and constructive suggestions for a change in the revenue system.

The danger is that unless something of this kind is done congress will perpetuate the wartime policy of raising the major portion of the revenue through income and excess profits taxes instead of spreading it out and apportioning it among all the people by means of indirect and other equitable methods of taxation. There is no time to lose. We, therefore, ask the hearty cooperation of members of the oil and gas industry in bringing about and perfecting this unified national movement.

We have sent a communication to the American Petroleum Institute asking it to take the lead in calling this national conference of the oil industry. At this conference the plans for calling the larger and all important meeting of all lines of business can be discussed and perfected.

The membership of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association will be advised from time to time of the progress made.

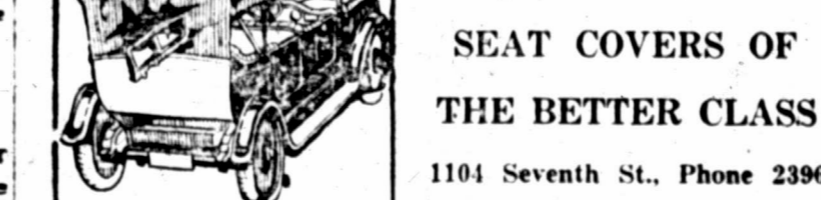

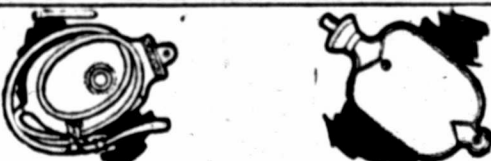
