Things are beginning to pop in Friona, business-wise, and perhaps in succeeding issues we will have even more business news to report.

Governor Preston Smith plans to answer the state's big money question on Friday, when he appears on a state-wide television hookup whether he will veto the Legislature's one-year budget bill, and if so, when the special session to re-vamp the finances will be scheduled.

At noon the following day, Governor Smith will present further views on the subject when he addresses the 90th annual summer convention of the Texas Press Association in Arlington.

We expect to be on hand for this latter speech, and should have something to report next week.

State officials have disagreed sharply on many points of the finance question, and many expect the governor to veto the bill.

Smith told us a few weeks ago at Plainview (when the legislature was still struggling with the bill) that he wished the legislature had followed his wishes and worked out a two-year budget. He said he hated to call a special session, or an annual session next year in the event of a one-year budget, because it cost the state a bundle of money every time the legislature convenes.

Donnell Echols, Dawson County farmer and vice president of Plains Cotton Growers, calls the House of Representatives voting 224 to 142 in favor of limiting to \$20,000 the total payments an individual farmer can receive under the 1970 farm program as "almost unbelievable."

Yet, the action was taken, and the appropriations bill now goes to the senate. Strong efforts are being made by farm leaders to have the limitations amendment taken out by the senate.

## THANKS TO RAIN

# Farmers Get All Rows Out At Once

The smile on the faces of Friona area farmers the past several days as they congregated at gathering places in town came because they all have been caught up on their irrigating thanks to a two-inch rain they received last Friday and Saturday, which called a halt to farming activities.

In the city of Friona, a total of 1.75 inches of rain were measured in showers which spanned the day. A total of .54 inch fell between 7 and 8 a.m. Another .52 inch was measured between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m., and .19 inch was added in sprinkles up until 8 a.m. the next morning.

The measurement on area farms averaged two inches, and came just right for young row crops of maize and cotton, as well as sugar beets, which are well along.

Some farms received another half-inch of rain Sunday night - just to the west of town. However, this shower was spotted, and not like the rain of last Friday, which apparently gave everyone a general rain from the Rhea Community to Hub to Black.

No particular hail damage was noted in the immediate area, although a strip of bad hail damage was reported between Bovina and Oklahoma Lane last Friday. Farmer County as a whole appeared to have escaped the excessive water and hail damage which was reported in some counties between here and Lubbock last Friday.

The local rain came just about as good as you could ask for this territory, with hardly any runoff. In Friona, some hail fell momentarily just before noon on Friday, but soon turned into a shower of rain.

The cloudy and cool conditions have persisted through Tuesday, but the only measurable moisture was .03 inch in Friona Monday morning, with a trace on Tuesday morning.

Wheat farmers are the ones with a wary eye to the sky. However, observers say that given a few days of clear, warm weather, the wheat harvest will probably begin.

Agricultural observers say this is the best shape the area's farmland has been in from a moisture standpoint at this point of the season in many years.

The past week has found

farms in the area "too wet to plow," and that silensound you have heard has been those irrigation engines getting a well-deserved rest.

## ACCENTUATE THE POSITIVE

A popular song of yesterday dealt, as you may recall if you are in the over-30 bracket, with accentuating the positive to eliminate the negative. Many people merely accepted the song as an idle lyric, largely intended to entertain bobbysoxers.

Actually, there is a lot of sound advice in the lyrics. It seems to us we've been stressing the negative too often. In the pages of newspapers, on radio newscasts and telecast news as well as in private conversation. It is the duty of the news media to report the events of the day in unbiased form. If man bites dog, it's news and should be brought to the public eye. But there are means of telling the story in a positive way in many cases.

Here is an example: In 1967, a group of anti-war demonstrators marched in a New Jersey city. The marchers were, in the eyes of the editor of the town newspaper, demoralizing the men fighting in Vietnam. The town paper's headline read as follows:

346 ATTEND PEACE MARCH  
23,438 DO NOT

This is an instance of what one might call a negative turned into a positive. The 346 marchers were assigned their proportional place in the scheme of things.

Contrast this with an instance reported a short while ago on a Baltimore television news program. The report was on a survey financed by B'nai B'rith. The newscaster said that "the poll showed one-third of the citizens of the U.S. were anti-Semitic." Couldn't he have said that two-thirds were not?

There is a small shoe repair shop in downtown Boston which deserves a special accolade for accentuating the positive. Most shoe shops display signs saying "Shoes Repaired While U Wait." The proprietor of the Boston store found a better way to put it. His sign read, "Shoes Repaired While You Rest." It's likely he retired a rich man. Positively.

## ON KEEPING UP WITH A JONES

The Long Beach, Calif., Press-Telegram recently carried a story about the Piney Woods Country Life School in Mississippi, and its remarkable success in keeping pupils busy and happy.

The story was entered in the Congressional Record by Senator John Stennis of Mississippi. We believe the story should be passed along for the benefit of other administrators.

The founder of the Piney Woods Country Life School is Dr. Laurence C. Jones. It began some 58 years ago when the Doctor began teaching a small boy to read. The two sat beneath the shady branches of a cedar tree, and the following day the lad returned with a gang of friends. The pupils and their mentor drove a flock of sheep from a nearby abandoned cabin and turned it into a schoolhouse.

Eventually, with financial aid from Northern friends and donated lumber from the local sawmill, teacher and students raised a new schoolhouse. More land was acquired at \$10 per acre. A herd of Ayrshire cattle was received as a donation. New buildings went up, including a machine shop, woodworking shop, a dairy barn, dormitories and additional classrooms.

Donations of \$1,017,000 were received in 1955, when Dr. Jones was honored on a TV network show. The school today has an endowment fund of \$4 million and 1,600 acres of land. Dr. Jones has been awarded honorary degrees by three universities and a medal from Freedoms Foundation. He now has 350 pupils working toward high school and junior college diplomas.

The secret of the school's success is simple: hard work and plenty of it. The day begins at 5 a.m., breakfast at 6, school or work at 7, with time divided between a task in the morning and another in the afternoon. At 4 p.m., athletics and after that study, study, more study.

The Press-Telegram calls Dr. Jones "a remarkable man". So do we. More educators should try keeping up with this Jones.

Dusting of the City of Friona has been postponed due to the unfavorable weather. It will be dusted as soon as the weather permits.

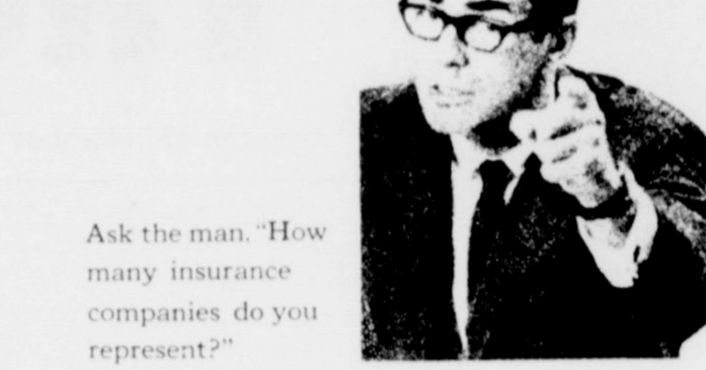

bate and vote on the issue. "For those of us on the farm and in Congress who understand farm programs and can see the full implications of a payment limit, there seems to be no logical reasons at all, other than political, for the House making such a move," Echols says.

Echols stated that area congressman George Mason of Lubbock shot down every argument advanced in favor of the limitations amendment, but the house passed it by the lopsided vote anyway.

It was shown that driving the large farmers out of the programs would disrupt the supply-demand balance which is the prime objective of farm programs.

"They people seem not to understand what agriculture means to the total economy of the nation and that a limit on payments will destroy the farm programs that keep agriculture going. And they don't seem to want to understand," the PCG official concluded.

Outland At Annual Meet

City Manager A. L. (Jake) Outland attended the annual spring convention of the Texas City Managers Association in Amarillo last week.

A total of 261 of the approximately 300 city managers from throughout the state attended the meeting, which was held in Amarillo for the first time.

One of the major problems discussed was the money problem facing just about every city government to a varying degree, according to Outland.

The managers talked of a closer tie between the city governments and the state government.

Those at the convention attended a banquet at the new Amarillo Civic Building. The meeting next year will be held in Dallas.

Clovis Chamber Makes Area Labor Survey

The Clovis Chamber of Commerce is conducting a labor survey among ladies in the area who would like to work, for an apparel manufacturer which is considering locating in Clovis.

The Kellwood Company, one of the largest apparel manufacturers in the United States, say they will locate a plant in Clovis if the labor supply is sufficient.

The plant expects to employ some 600 women, but wants 3,000 job applications before it begins its plant.

Representatives of the Clovis Chamber told the Friona Star and representatives of the local chamber on Monday that in making the survey locally, they were in no way trying to encourage people to move to Clovis.

"But we believe there may be many ladies in the Friona area who would like to work - and we need their applications on file," said Bob Spencer, manager of the Clovis C-C. The Clovis representative speculated that car pools from neighboring cities probably would be the rule once the plant began operation.

Wages will start at \$2.00 per hour, and the pay will be based primarily on production. The plant is to be located on the eastern outskirts of Clovis, east of the Curry County Fair Grounds.

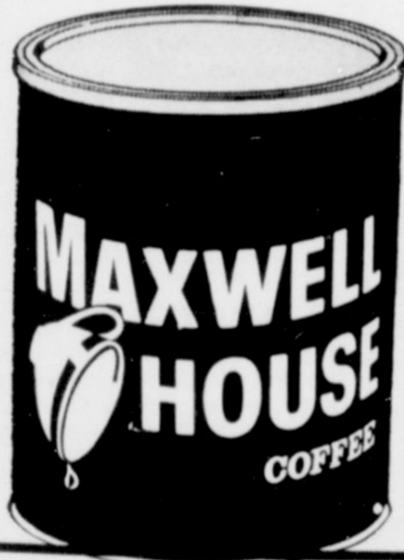

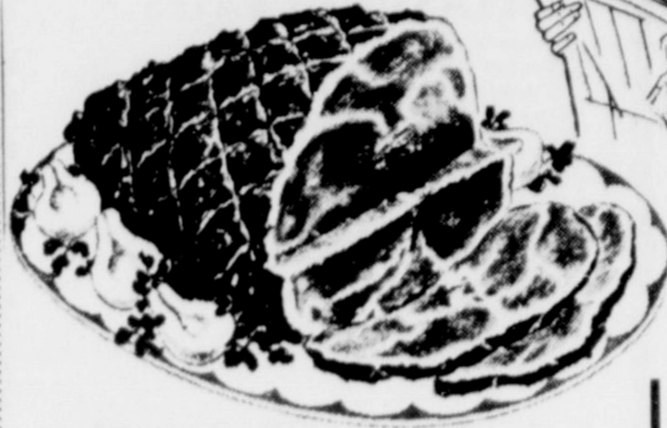

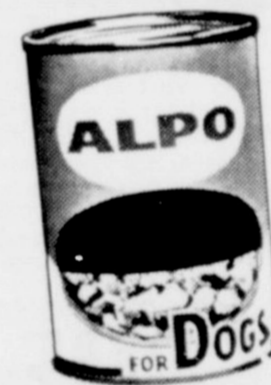

### Social Security Received In County Nears \$1 Million

"This year, residents of Texas will receive over \$1 billion in social security benefits," Wayne Klipping, social security Field Representative for this area commented. "Of this amount, nearly \$1 million will be received by beneficiaries in Parmer County."

Obviously social security is big business. This emphasizes the necessity of keeping social security records accurate, so that correct amounts may be paid to the individuals involved. Both employers and their employees, as well as self-employed individuals, are involved in this teamwork with the Social Security Administration. Here are a few simple tips to assure this accuracy:

- (1) Each employee should SHOW his social security card to his employer - not just give it to him from memory or from a slip of paper.
- (2) Each employer should make certain that the number is copied from the employee's card and recorded accurately in the employer's records.
- (3) When a woman marries (and many will be doing just that this month), she should notify the Social Security Office promptly of this fact so that her social security card may be corrected.
- (4) At least once every three or four years, every employee and self-employed person should request a statement of his account from the Baltimore headquarters of social security. A post card form (Form 7004) may be secured from any social security office for this purpose. Anyone wishing assistance with his social security card or record should see Klipping in the Council Room at the City Hall from 9 a.m. until noon on the third Tuesday of each month.

**Sorghum Growers Told To Watch For G. Bugs**

Sorghum growers should be on the alert again this year for the pesky and destructive greenbug. This tiny pest which sucks the juices from the sorghum plant and did such widespread damage in the Sorghum Belt last summer is back at it in many areas.

If there are greenbugs in your fields be prepared to spray -- but do so only after you have positively identified them. Unless you're certain you have the greenbug you might be destroying beneficial insects by spraying. There are several other insects -- primarily the corn leaf aphid -- which resemble the greenbug.

Some key identifying characteristics of the greenbug are: a length of about 1/16 inches, a general light green color with a dark green stripe down the back, green legs with black tips, and black cornicle tips (the cornicles are two small tubes at the rear of the body). There are both winged and wingless greenbugs.

The greenbug feeds under leaves and near the ground. In contrast, the corn leaf aphid which is similar in appearance to the greenbug, but lacks the dark green stripe down its back, usually feeds in the whorl on new growth.

If you do identify a greenbug infestation, how do you decide whether its severe enough to spray?

Texas A & M, Oklahoma State, Kansas State and the University of Nebraska all offer these general tips:

1. If plants are up to six inches high, spray when there is visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on lower leaf surfaces.

2. Beyond six inches and up to pre-boot, spray before any entire leaves are killed.

3. From pre-boot on, spray when greenbug numbers are sufficient to cause death of more than the two lower, normal-sized leaves.

For spray materials, Wayne Fowler, agronomic education director for DeKalb Ag-Research, Inc. reports that the most frequently recommended chemicals are Diazinon, Malathion, Ethyl Parathion, Phosdrin and Systox.

Fowler says the Diazinon and Malathion can be applied as a ground spray but he advises that the other three are highly toxic and should be sprayed from the air. He warns against using the methyl form of Parathion because of potential damage to the plants.

After a first spraying farmers should keep a close watch on their plants and be alert

to a reinfestation says Fowler. It may be necessary to spray again. If another application is required, be certain the chemical can be used a second time in a season. Some materials are labeled for one spraying only.

Be certain to check with your local extension personnel or your seed dealer on any questions regarding greenbug infestation and spraying.

Such natural enemies of the greenbug as lady beetles, lacewings and certain wasp species, normally keep greenbug populations under control. But with cool, wet weather conditions, greenbugs are able to reproduce faster than these natural enemies can eliminate them. When these weather conditions prevail sorghum growers must be especially watchful.

**Conservation Applies To City Dwellers Too--Batte**

"Soil and water conservation applies to town and city people as well as farmers and ranchers," says Soil Conservation Service Conservationist Gary A. Batte of Friona.

Among the more serious conservation problems around the home are surplus water management and disturbed soils.

Land that may never have had soil and water conservation problems when in its native state can well be plagued with them as it is converted to suburban uses.

Rain that once fell on open land now falls on roof tops, driveways, and paved streets. Even the best land can be ruined by uncontrolled water runoff. It can quickly rob areas of valuable surface soil, smother green lawns with silt deposits, and flood homes and basements.

"To control runoff," SCS advises, "be sure that the soil is shaped so that water drains away from the house and low areas are filled."

Erosion can be prevented by covering the ground as completely as possible with growing

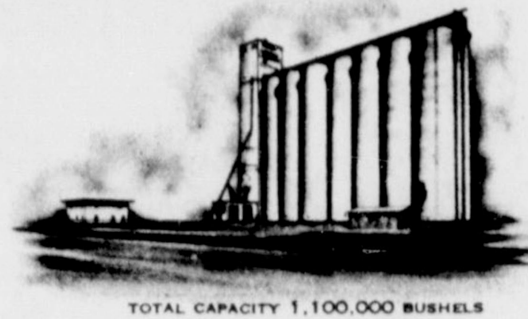
vegetation or some substitute such as mulch, or gravel. Areas that must carry concentrated runoff need to be permanently paved or protected by special turfs, riprap, or other means.

The surface soil in the average new subdivision is usually less than ideal. The original soil may have been scraped off, and tar paper, wood scraps, siding, brick, plaster, and other materials that limit plant growth are often found just under the soil surface.

When locating sites for shrubs or trees, it is a good idea to dig a much larger hole than necessary to check for buried debris. At the same time the soil can be checked for root penetration and permeability.

More information on solving soil and water conservation problems around the home and in improving lawns and gardens can be found in Agricultural Information Bulletin 244, "Soil Conservation at Home" and in the Yearbook of Agriculture reprint, "Home Gardens and Lawns."

The trend is established. Farm prices continue to drift downward, with only an occasional short-lived price rise. NFO is designed only to help farmers reverse the trend. Farmers cannot do this as individuals -- but they can do this as an organized group.

NFO is not asking farmers to desert their present farm organizations, but only to join the NFO for the purpose of bargaining collectively for a fair price. NFO has the system to gain better farm prices and to protect the farmer in the market place.

If this area's economy is to remain stable, all segments of the economy must continue to receive a fair return for goods and services. The businessman needs the farmer and the farmer needs the businessman.

NFO has the communication system to give the best information on supply and demand of farm products. Because farmers have failed to set their price in the past, the buyer has been forced to set it for them. Through NFO, farmers are setting their own price -- NFO members in the grain sorghum producing areas of Texas and bordering states are asking a minimum net price to the farmer of \$2.00 cwt for milo--a price not unrealistic considering that full parity for milo is \$3.08 cwt. NFO has also been responsible for an upward pressure on livestock prices resulting in better cattle and hog prices closer to parity.

NFO is now the largest active participating farm organization both locally and nationally. Let's keep it that way. Be at our next meeting and participate in the business.

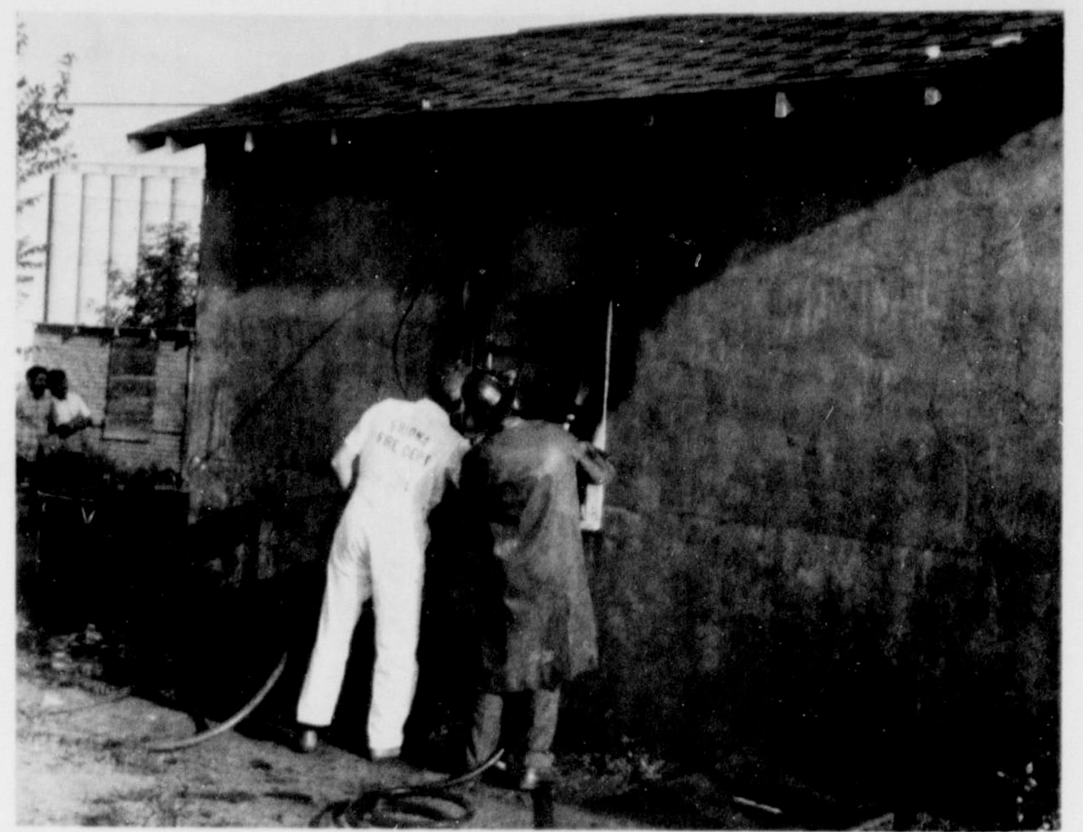
Because of the short time remaining to test applicants, immediate inquiry is urged for young men to contact the nearest DPS office of patrolman.

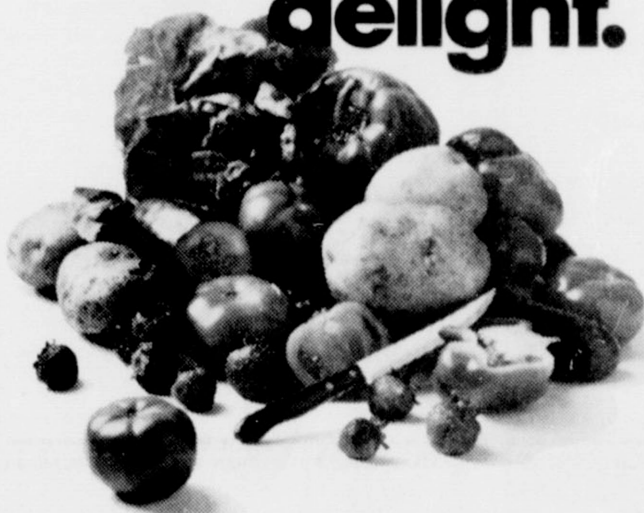

Black was among those appointed by the governor to the committee.

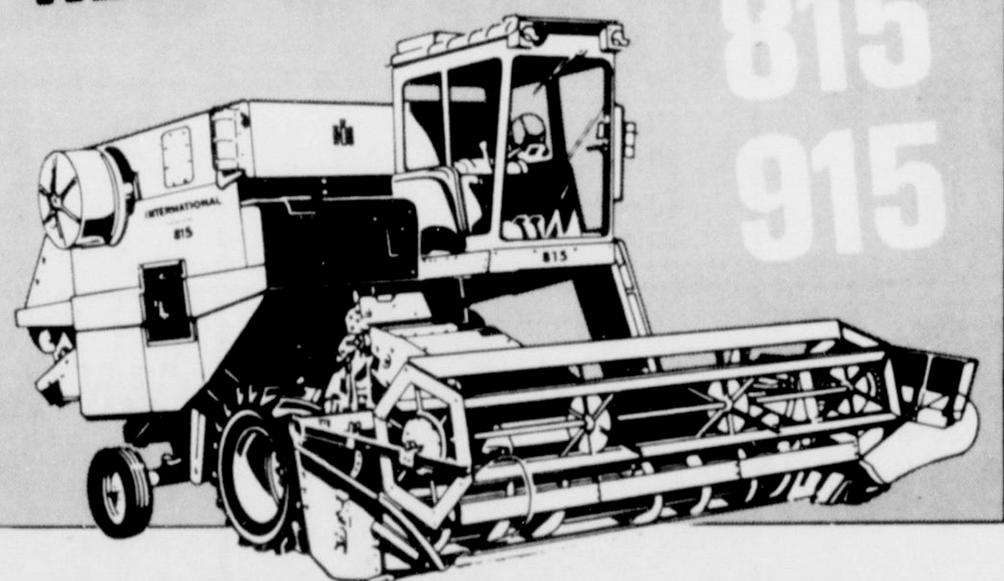

## Cattle "Futures" Place Farmers In Good Shape

Present levels of livestock and livestock futures prices have placed farmers in the favorable position of being able to lock-in the best profits in years on hogs and cattle, according to Harold Heindl, president of Heindl Commodities Inc. of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

A similar unique situation exists in the grain markets where by farmers can presently realize more money by hedging 1969 crop corn than they can by placing their crop under the government loan program.

Economists who have long maintained that the use of the futures market can help stabilize farm prices are quite jubilant over the situation. It proves again, they say, what they always contended—that "hedging" by farmers through commodity futures can play a vital role in farm economy.

Farmers are apparently aware of the livestock situation, Heindl says.

"There is a greater percentage of the nation's cattle and hogs hedged through futures contracts right now than there ever has been," he claims.

"We have had record volume in cattle and hog contract trading during the past two weeks," Heindl Commodities is one of the largest members of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange and has branch offices in 26 cities throughout the country's largest livestock-producing areas.

Among the branches is one in Hereford, Tex., managed by Ed Schroeter.

"The prices for hogs and cattle are at such levels that it is impossible right now for a farmer not to make a profit by 'hedging' them through live hog and cattle futures," Heindl says.

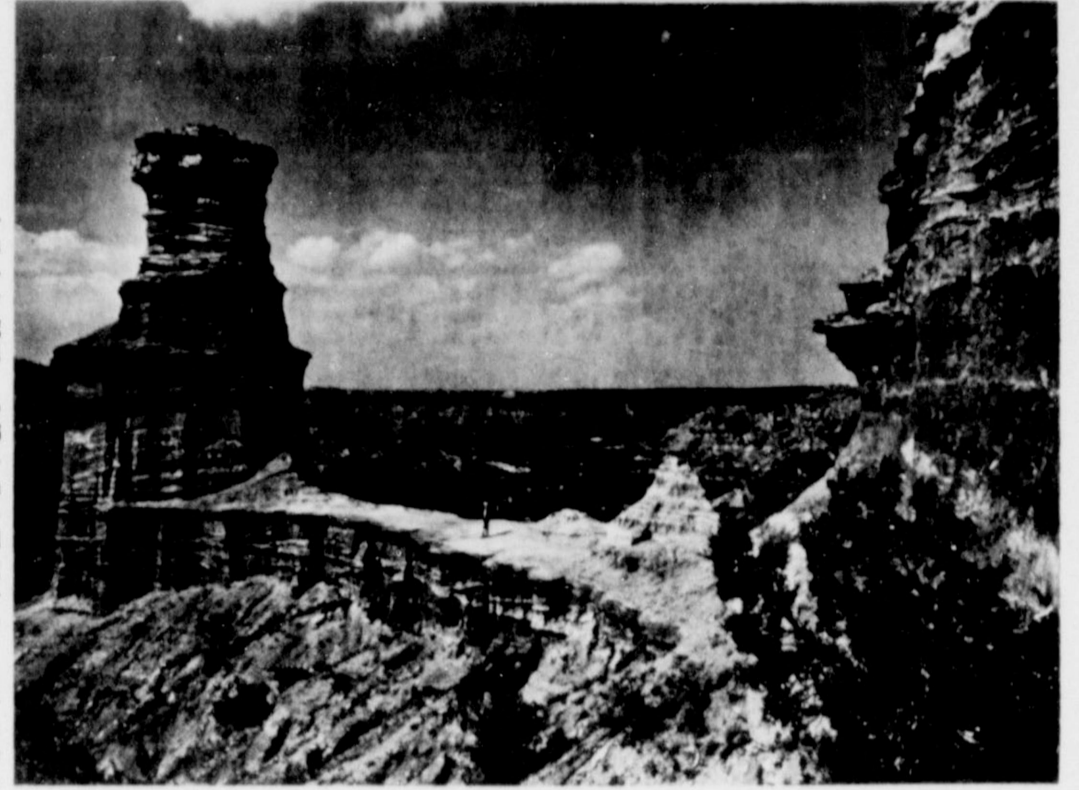
"With cattle prices at 30c to 33c and hog prices at 22 to 26 cents, a farmer can sell a futures contract for the month in which he expects to sell his livestock and be assured of a good profit. He is assured of making good money on either the livestock sale or his futures contract.

"If the market drops, he can buy his contract back at a profit. If the futures market goes up, he can deliver the live cattle or hogs at the price he sold his futures contract. He could also buy back the contract at the higher price, but sell his cattle on a cash market higher than he anticipated.

Ralph Klopfenstein, general manager of Heindl and a grain marketing specialist, points out that farmers can do better on the crop they will harvest this fall by selling a December corn futures contract now than they can by placing the grain under the government loan program.

"After paying storage charges a farmer can realize just a little better than a \$1 a bushel under the loan program. By selling a December contract he is certain to assure himself \$1.11 to \$1.12 a bushel.

Growing farmer interest in hedging crops through futures is apparent in that Heindl has been asked to address the National Livestock Marketing Congress on commodity futures and their role in marketing June 26 at Monterey, Calif. Heindl is also president of Heindl Hog Markets, the world's largest buyer of hogs.

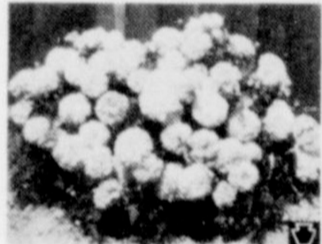
Gene Strickland socked a home run for the winners, and Johnny Rando had a two-run blast for Star-Hurst. David Blackburn was the winning pitcher.

## Two Local Girls Attend Girls State Convention

Amelia Sims and Janet Mingus of Friona are taking part in the annual American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State this week in Austin at St. Edward's University.

Miss Sims was elected to the position of city attorney in the "City of Atomic Ants" in the June 12 election, and Miss Mingus was elected city councilman, place 4 (Friendly Farmers).

Miss Sims is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.P. Sims. Miss Mingus is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Mingus. They are sponsored at the convention by American Legion Auxiliary Unit 206.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, the purpose of the Girls State program is to

provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults. They learn the problems of government by performing the same duties as office holders. Citizens are selected at local levels principally on a basis of character and leadership from students who have just completed their junior year in high school each year. The 1969 session of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. This year, 430 girls are in attendance, plus two from Mexico City, making a total of more than 8,400 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program.

Former citizens of Girls State and members of the Texas American Legion Auxiliary comprise the 60 members of the staff and counselors who volunteer their services to direct and lead this program. The Director, Miss Frances Goff of Houston, is Director of Special Projects for The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston. The Associate Director is Mrs. J.J. Manning of Houston, Counselor of the Clear Creek High School in League City. Associate Director for Education, Miss Virginia Kennedy, is an Urban Research Consultant in Houston. Chairman of the Auxiliary Girls State Committee is Mrs. J. B. Martin of Trinity, Texas.

Former Associate Justice Meade Griffin of the Texas Supreme Court administered the oath of office to the various elected state officials of Bluebonnet Girls State Monday, June 16, in the Rotunda of the State Capitol. After a parade of flags, the Girl State officials were escorted to the inauguration by their official counterparts in Texas State Government. Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes was the principal speaker for this occasion.
