The capture of General Llave is considered an important feat and is expected to result in peace and security in the rebel district in the state of Vera Cruz which has been terrorised by cultaws led by Generals Vazquez



# HEDRICK ACQUITTED OF MURDER CHARGE IN THIRTIETH COURT

J. W. Hedrick, commonly known in the oil regions as "Boots" Hedrick, was acquitted late Friday in the 30th district court of a charge of murder in connection with the death of Earle Mimms, a young oil field worker. The verdict was returned about 9:00 o'clock after the jury had been out







# HEDRICK ACQUITTED OF MURDER CHARGE IN THIRTIETH COURT

J. W. Hedrick, commonly known in the oil regions as "Boots" Hedrick. was acquitted late Friday in the 30th district court of a charge of murder in connection with the death of Earle Mimms, a young oil field worker. The verdict was returned about 9:00 o'clock after the jury had been out but a short time.

Earle Mimms died in the Wichita terrestyle beariest and in the Wichita

General hospital early in January from the effects of gunshot wounds believed to have been received following a drinking carousal in the Burkburnett-Waggoner City oil re-Burkburnett-Waggoner City oil regions. "Boots" Hedrick was arrested in his tent in Newtown at midnight following the shooting which occurred about 8:00 o'clock and was brought to the Wichita county jail.

Attorneys for the defense based their argument upon the fact that Hedrick was temporarily insane at the time of the alleged homicide and

the time of the alleged homicide and therefore was not responsible for his actions. Counsel urged that Hedrick's reason had bee overthrown through the poisonous effects of a drug which was not alcohol and therefore was not alcohol and therefore was the prounds for defense. Hedrick legal grounds for defense. Hedrick testified that he had been drinking that the effect of various depressent. straighth" whiskey while in Burkburett the afternoon preceding the nett the afternoon preceding the alleged shooting but upon reaching Newtown drank a quantity of lemon and organge extract. He testified that both the lemon and the orange extract was adulterated with some other liquid. He first said that the extract was mixed with jamaica ginger but drinks. Attorneys, however, pointed

liquid. He first said that the extract was mixed with jamaica ginger but later said that the flavoring was perhaps mixed half and half with "Mexican hot" or soda water.

Each of the alleged ingredients said to have been mixed in Hedrick's drink was thoroughly analyzed by pharmacists who, using standard medical textbooks, among them the United States Pharmacopoeia of the 190' edition, testified that the mixture concocted by Hedrick was much more deadly to the reason than straight whiskey or alcohol.
