

WARNS PROSPERITY AND ACTIVITY MAY BECOME ARTIFICIAL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Warning that the prosperity and activity indicated by banking figures may become artificial and deceptive was given today by John Skelton Williams in his annual report as comptroller of the currency.

Remembering that in 1919, there was not a national bank failure involving loss to depositors, and that the banking power of the country has increased 300 per cent in the last 20 years, Mr. Williams added:

"A large volume of money cannot mean increase of real wealth while there is decrease of production and the accumulation and movement of securities and currency represent abnormal inflation values put on diminished supplies of essentials.

"It is clear that no country can be enriched by merely increasing prices of products produced and consumed by its own people. We might prosper for the moment, if we could sell our products abroad at the highest prices, but we gain nothing when we sell and buy at corresponding abnormal prices."

FORMER KAISER FORBIDS HIS SON TO SURRENDER

BERLIN, Feb. 11.—The former kaiser has forbidden his son, the former crown prince, to surrender himself to the Allies and has requested the Dutch government to prevent such procedure, the Kreuz Zeitung said today.

A cablegram received in Washington Tuesday signed by the former crown prince addressed to President Wilson said Frederick William would surrender himself to the Allies for trial if charges against the other accused Germans in the Allied list of war guilty were dismissed.

WOOD IN FAVOR OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS WITH RESERVATIONS

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—The League of Nations should be accepted as "modified and safeguarded by the existing Lodge reservations," Major General Leonard Wood said in his reply to Senator Borah's questionaire on the peace treaty, made public here today.

"The Lodge reservations Americanize the treaty and safeguard traditional American policies," Wood said. Wood declared himself as opposed to delaying the ratification of the treaty for the verdict of a general election. "The people have clearly indicated they are in favor of the treaty if America's policies, interests and freedom of action are fully safeguarded," Wood stated.

"The treaty with the Lodge reservations does not impair the well established foreign policy of the American government which conserves and promotes the interests of the country," Wood said.

DALLAS TO HAVE A WIRELESS STATION FOR BUSINESS USE

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—Wireless telephone service for commercial purposes will be established between Chicago and New York, it was announced today following a successful conversation held last night. Robert F. Gowen, in New York, inventor of the radio telephone, talked for 30 minutes with R. H. G. Mathews in Chicago.

A wireless station also will be established at Dallas, Texas, it was announced, and test stations will be set up at points in Kansas and North Dakota.

WAS FIRST LIEUTENANT COMMANDED SUBMARINE

BERLIN, Wednesday, Feb. 11.—A first lieutenant commanded the German submarine that torpedoed the English channel steamer Sussex on March 24, 1916, according to a local newspaper which comments on the extradition list received from the Allies. It is declared this man has since died.

Captain Steinbrück is charged on the extradition list with being responsible for the attack upon the Sussex which caused the death of 50 persons.

GREAT BRITAIN TO FIGHT ANY ATTEMPT AT MINORITY RULE

LONDON, Feb. 12.—Great Britain will fight any attempt to force minority rule as advocated by proponents of nationalization of industry, Premier Lloyd George told the house of commons last night. The so-called nationalization amendment, the premier said, "challenges the fabric of free government." Its advocates, he added, propose a minority rule if a majority in favor of their contention is unobtainable.

The premier's statement was taken at a direct answer to trade union demands for nationalization of mines and railways. Commons showed its support of the premier by defeating 329 to 64, the labor amendment to the reply to King George's speech, which proposed to insert a clause specifying regret that the king's program did not include nationalization of mines.

BUILDING IS DELAYED BY SHORTAGE OF CARS

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—"Give us cars" was the cry of members of the National Association of Sand and Gravel Producers in convention here today. The acute shortage of housing facilities in large cities could be considerably relieved of the sand and gravel producers could secure cars to move their materials, H. J. Atwood, chairman of the arrangements committee of the association said. "Many buildings are being held up because the car shortage has prevented the contractors from securing supplies of sand and gravel," Atwood said.

NEE-NO-SHE OIL CO. RESUMES DRILLING IN HARDEMAN TEST

Special to The Times. QUANAH, TEX., Feb. 12.—The Nee-No-She Oil company of Colorado has resumed operations on their well in Section 211 on the Acme Dome, after a short delay in repairing their boilers. Two new crews are now on the well, and the officials announce that the well will be put down with the least possible delay.

Interest in this well is very keen, both locally and foreign, as the structure was carefully mapped by the company geologist, William S. Willett, who spent several months in the field studying the details of the formations, before the company entered the field. Leading companies of the state—Sun, Empire, Sinclair and others—have acreage over this dome, and are watching the progress of the well. At about 90 feet, this well found its first showing of oil and gas, and since that point other showings in the shale have been observed. Water tests of this section have reported numerous showings of oil and gas, which leads to the conclusion that the shales and sands of the entire dome are saturated, and the operators expect one of the deeper sands to be commercially productive.

Formations thus far drilled, have run true to the details prepared by their geologist, and approved by some of the leading geologists of the Mid-Continent fields. Some of the sands mentioned in these reports will be found in the near future, and operators confidentially expect the first production to be in one of the sands to be found at from 12 to 17 hundred feet.

TAX COLLECTIONS IN HARDEMAN THE BEST FOR SEVERAL YEARS

Of the \$155,623.99 of assessed taxes, the collector's records show that \$136,664.02 has been paid to date. Even a better record has been made in payment of local city and school taxes.

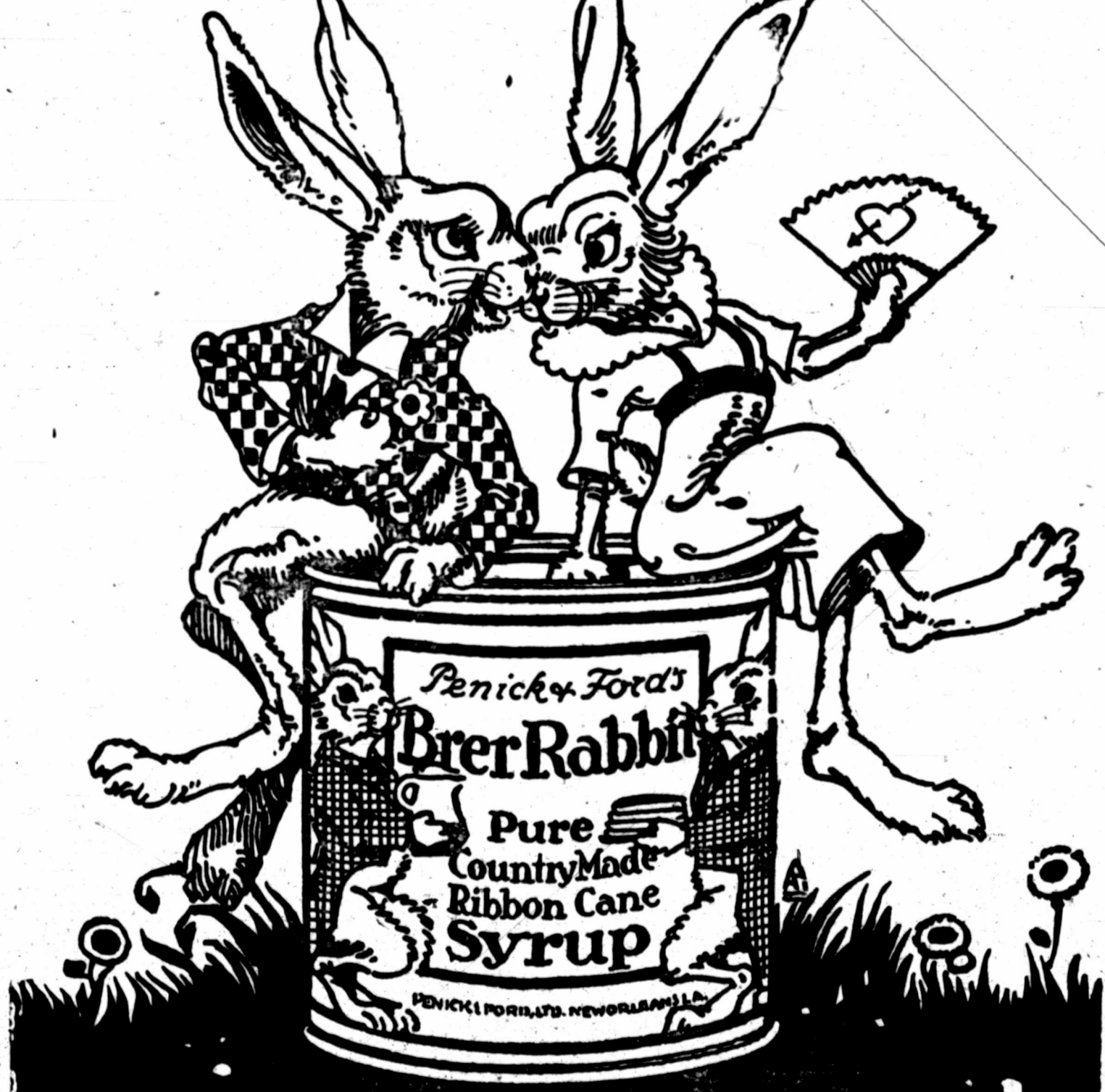

IMPORTANT ARREST IS MADE BY ONE OF CITY'S DETECTIVES

The arrest of James P. Payne and wife, wanted in Wichita, Kan., by City Detective I. M. Johnson in San Antonio Wednesday ended a chase from coast to coast that has been in progress for nearly a year and one that has called forth the best crime detecting agencies in the country.

James P. Payne, alias I. M. Johnson, and his wife, Rosa, were arrested in Wichita, Kan., March 30, 1935, on a charge of mayhem. They forfeited a \$15,000 bond and eluded all efforts to find their whereabouts. They were also alleged to have stolen a Ford touring car in which they and four of their children left.

The local police force, according to Deputy Police Commissioner Robert Goodfellow, had been working on the case for some time as it was believed the couple was in this section. Different clues as to the whereabouts of the hunted man and wife led local officers to points in Oklahoma, East Texas, Galveston and elsewhere.

Each place the indications pointed that the couple had just left. Finally they were traced to San Antonio, where the arrest was made. The telegram to Mr. Goodfellow from Detective Johnson said the couple would waive extradition papers and would return to Kansas.

That the local police should win the honor of making such an important arrest in a case that has baffled the efforts of some of the best detectives in the country is a tribute to the efficiency of the department and no small degree of praise belongs to Mr. Goodfellow for his skillful handling of the case, those acquainted with the facts in the case declare.

The reward money for the arrest amounted to \$500 for the man and \$250 for his wife, which will probably go to Mr. Johnson.

MAN IS ROBBED OF \$130 WEDNESDAY AFTER CRAP GAME

Another alleged "highjacker" will "high jack" no longer, or at least until he is tried for the party was arrested by Plain Clothes Man Hunter, Wednesday on complaint of a man who claimed to have been forced to surrender over \$130 in coin of the realm after a crap game close to the banks of the sandy creek that forms the northern boundary of this city, which is sometimes dignified by the title of river. The alleged "high jacker" was a bad loser, according to the complaining party and when the "Mississippi marble" game was over and he had lost all his money, he endeavored to induce the winner to disgorge not only what he had won, but also about \$100 of his original "pile."

When Officer Hunter scoured the domain of the tented colony close to the river he located a man who answered the description of the victim. This man he brought to headquarters, where he was identified by the loser. After a brief investigation the prisoner was turned over to the county on a charge of theft of over \$50.

H. Chenault, aged 83, for twelve years a resident of Wichita Falls, died Wednesday at Gallatin, Tenn., his former home, where he had been visiting since Christmas. The funeral will be held Friday in Gallatin, and Mr. Chenault will be buried beside his wife, who died some time ago.

Five children, four sons and one daughter, survive and all were at his bedside when death came except N. B. Chenault, who was on his way to Gallatin. Mr. Chenault was ill in December and his sons from Wichita Falls at that time, but N. B. Chenault was called back to Wichita Falls later because of illness of his own family. He left Tuesday on a second summons to Gallatin.

W. L. Chenault, N. B. Chenault, Charles Chenault and Mrs. Anna Chenault make the home in Wichita Falls while the four sons, P. S. Chenault, resides in Sherman.

Mr. Chenault has been retired from active business practically since coming to Wichita Falls, but owned several business houses.

CONFERENCE WAGES FOR TOMORROW

(Continued from Page 1)

The men to refer the controversy to the railroad wage boards to be created by legislation now in congress under authority of which the roads will be run to private control. The union leaders presented to Hines a mass of statistics on living costs prepared by the labor department showing, they said today, the absolute failure of the government to reduce prices. Hines countered with the statement that government reports showed the peak of rising prices had been reached and that a decrease is now close at hand.

DISPOSITION IN THE HANDS OF PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Disposition of the wage demands of more than 2,000,000 railway employees today was in the hands of President Wilson. Decision to lay the matter before the President was made late yesterday after Director General Hines and representatives of the employees had failed to reach an agreement. Statements setting forth the views of both sides in the controversy—giving the reasons why the unions demand an immediate increase in wages, and the other explaining why Director General Hines could not agree to such increase on the eve of the turning back of the roads to private ownership—were in course of preparation this morning and will be presented to Mr. Wilson today.

Expect a Settlement

Just how much time the President will require in considering the statements is problematical, but it was believed it would be short. Whether he upholds the view of Director General Hines or decides that the demands of the employees are just and should be granted, the opinion was expressed that a settlement finally will be made through the machinery to be set up by legislation now pending which will govern the return of the rail properties to their former owners. As prepared for presentation to the White House the statements did not include the separate grievances of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and Mr. Hines arranged to confer further today with W. G. Lee, president of that organization. Likewise Mr. Hines will confer with a committee representing the maintenance of way employees whose officers have called a strike to become effective February 17.

Not Understood

The action of the maintenance of way men in calling a strike has not been understood by railroad administration officials and the conference today was expected to clear up the confusion. Just what bearing this phase of the wage controversy, if any, the meeting yesterday between Mr. Hines and Attorney General Palmer had, had not been discussed today. Neither Mr. Hines nor the attorney general would discuss the probability of meeting the proposed strike through injunction proceedings similar to those employed in the recent coal miners' strike.

The break in the wage negotiations, which began here February 3, came yesterday after Director General Hines had reiterated his view that a wage increase should be made by the government now just as federal control of the roads is about to end. The employees' representatives took the position that the wage demands had been held in abeyance since July 1 because of the promise of the government that a reduction in living costs would be forced and that a wage increase should be made in proportion to the reduction in living costs had not been effected today.

KANSAS TO PROSECUTE IN EVENT OF A STRIKE

TOPEKA, KANS., Feb. 12.—Warren has gone out to brotherhood unions to advise that the state will prosecute those responsible for a railroad strike within its boundaries. In a circular letter to officials of the Maintenance of Way and Shop Laborers union within Kansas, Attorney General Hopkins urged them not to go on strike. If they strike, Hopkins added he must enforce the industrial court law, which makes illegal any tie-up of necessary industries, including the railroads.

FARM LABOR CONGRESS CONVENES AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—The All-American Farmer-Labor Co-Operative congress opened here today for the announced purpose of "standardizing co-operative methods, and promoting direct trade and co-operative banking and credits." Approximately 199 delegates were in attendance. One phase of the congress was an exhibit of goods produced by farmers and by co-operatively owned factories and mills, which was under the direction of the co-operative commission organized in Chicago last November. The congress will last three days.

WEAR OLD CLOTHES AND REDUCE DEMAND

TOPEKA, KAN., Feb. 12.—Wear your old clothes until the clothing manufacturers can catch up with the demand; then the prices will come down. This is the advice contained in a statement circulated today by Ed T. Harkney, state fair price commissioner. He asserts that 27 per cent or more than one-fourth of all the clothes made in the United States are made on the overtime of the workers, for which the workers receive double wages.

VISIT WASHINGTON IN CONNECTION WITH THE NATIONAL GUARD

Special to The Times. WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Adjutant General Cope, Brigadier General Walters and Major E. L. Field, U. S. A., who are here on Texas National Guard matters, conferred today with officer of the general staff and Major General Carter, chief of the militia bureau. The visitors will be here several days going over Texas guard matters at the war department.

ABOUT 200 AMERICAN SOLDIERS WED GERMAN

AMERICAN HEADQUARTERS, Cologne, Feb. 1.—Two hundred and fifty soldiers of the American forces in Germany who have married European girls have been instructed to start soon for America with their wives, in accordance with a recent order of Major General Henry T. Allen, in command.

In connection with this order it was announced that army authorities would not consent in future to marriages of American soldiers on duty in the occupied area, officers contending that men without wives in Germany are better soldiers under the present circumstances.

About 200 soldiers have married German girls since the American forces reached the Rhine, the others included in the order having married principally French girls or young women from Belgium or Luxembourg.

INVESTIGATION DEVELOPS RANCHMAN WAS AMBUSHED

FORT WORTH, TEX., Feb. 12.—Following an investigation last night and this morning by officers in Fisher county, it developed that J. J. Singleton, ranchman, whose bullet-riddled body was found Tuesday night in one of his pastures, was ambushed. Singleton lived in Fisher county. Apparently he was working on his fence when shot, for in one of his hands was grasped a number of staples and a hammer was by his side. Two guns were used in the killing and 12 wounds were counted on Singleton's body. Two arrests have been made.

DELAY ANNOUNCEMENT OF ELECTION RESULT

LONDON, Feb. 12.—Announcement of the result of today's parliamentary election in the Paisley constituency, in which former Premier H. Asquith is a candidate, will not be made until Feb. 25, according to a statement made public here this morning. Many women appeared at the polls. The votes of women are expected to have a great influence upon the result. The whole country is watching the election with great interest. The press generally maintains that it has a serious import for the future of liberalism and may exercise an important influence upon the reorganization of parties.

LITTLE ROCK HOSPITAL IS DAMAGED BY FIRE

LITTLE ROCK, ARK., Feb. 12.—Fire originating on the third floor of St. Luke's annex hospital here early today endangered the lives of 48 patients and for more than an hour threatened to destroy the entire institution. All patients were removed from the building and taken to other hospitals. Several serious injuries were made by two Missouri Pacific railway switchmen, who left the scene before their identity was learned. The loss on the building and contents is estimated at \$15,000.

MEXICO REFUSES TO ADMIT A MAN WHO RECENTLY TESTIFIED

EL PASO, TEX., Feb. 12.—When W. R. Simmons of Denver, Colo., presented his passports for view at the Mexican consulate general here yesterday he was met with a refusal because he had testified unfavorably to Mexico before the senate sub-committee investigating Mexican affairs, two days before, according to an official announcement made today by Alberto Ruiz Sandoval, acting consul general here. Senor Sandoval said he acted under special instructions from Mexico City.

"It is inconceivable to me that a man should testify that conditions in Mexico City are as bad as they could be on Feb. 9, and then ask to be admitted into Mexico on Feb. 11," Senor Sandoval said.

"I do not question the right of any man to have his own opinion. I merely contend that it is illogical for any one to wish to return to a country in whose capital city conditions are so bad."

Mr. Simmons wished to proceed to Parral, Chihuahua, at the time he presented his passport to the consul.

GREY AND THE TREATY.

Lord Grey's principal objection to the proposed reservations to the peace treaty is not those interpreting Article 10 or restating the Monroe doctrine, but to that article which essays to equalize the voting powers between the United States and Great Britain and her self-governing dominions (Art. 14).

BEGIN TRACK LAYING SOUTH FROM RANGER ON OIL BELT RAILWAY

RANGER, TEX., Feb. 12.—Track laying on the Wichita Falls, Ranger & Fort Worth railroad south from Ranger yards began Monday, using a track laying machine that is expected to average a mile of track a day. The contractors, J. J. Harrison and F. C. McCabe, have 20 miles of completed roadbed and bridges ahead of them all the way to Jakehamon in Coman-

che county in the Hog Creek oil field. Beyond Jakehamon four large gangs of graders are at work on the roadbed, and the contract calls for operation of trains out of Dublin to Ranger by the middle of April. The contractors expect to have the track completed before that date. As soon as the track is completed to Dublin through passenger trains will be operated from Fort Worth to points on the line as far north as Breckenridge to which place the track will have been completed in the meantime. The points thus to be reached over the Wichita Falls, Ranger & Fort Worth railroad via Dublin are Jakehamon, in the Hog Creek oil field, Edinohy in the northern extension of that field, 12 miles south of Ranger, Frankell, the division headquarters, Frankell, 12 miles north of Ranger in the most active field in Stephens county, a town between Frankell and Breckenridge near the present Parks Camp and the old county seat of Stephens

county, Breckenridge, that has waited 40 years for this railroad to make its advantages available by rail.

General offices of the Wichita Falls, Ranger & Fort Worth Railroad Co. are maintained at Ranger. The company is building a large general office building here to house the increasing force.
