

WILSON SUBMITS PROPOSAL TO RAILWAY UNIONS

CANADA WANTS TO BE A FULL FLEDGED MEMBER OF LEAGUE; OBJECTS TO COVENANT CHANGES

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—Canada has given Great Britain notice that it objects to any change in the covenant of the league of nations which will prevent the dominion from being a full-fledged member of the league and having a vote in the assembly. After a meeting of the cabinet last night urgent representations were forwarded to the imperial authorities protesting against acceptance by Great Britain of the Lenroot reservation to the peace treaty which now is being considered by the United States senate.

RATIFICATION MAY TRY GERMANS BY DEFAULT IF NOT SURRENDERED

PARIS, Feb. 13. (Havas).—Premier Millerand of France, who is attending the meeting of the supreme allied council in London, is energetically insisting upon the execution of the extradition clause of the Versailles treaty and urging if the Germans refuse to surrender men accused of war crimes that they be tried by default, says the Echo de Paris.

U. S. MAY NOT TAKE PART IN TRIAL OF FORMER KAISER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Democratic Senate leaders will announce their position on a compromise on article 19 of the League of Nations covenant late this afternoon, Senator Hitchcock said. It was said Democrats were ready to submit a definite proposal about which it is understood they have been consulted. This proposal is understood to be based on one of Wm. H. Taft's reservations.

OPPOSING LEADERS PASSING RESPONSIBILITY TO OPPOSING SIDES IN TREATY FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—The Peace treaty is nearer ratification today than at any time since it was laid before the Senate, in the belief of administration officials. Steps which must follow its ratification already are being considered. One of the first will be a conference between President Wilson and Secretary Lansing, for the purpose of arranging the details incident to American representatives attending the League of Nations council and assembly.

GERMAN ARMY TOLD NOT TO SURRENDER ACCUSED

BERLIN, Feb. 13.—General Reinhard, commander-in-chief of German forces, has published an order of the day, saying: "Some regarding the surrender of men accused of war crimes an impossibility, an opinion with which the army agrees and will in no case abandon."

NEW ALLIED NOTE TO HOLLAND BEING DRAFTED

LONDON, Feb. 13.—A new allied note to Holland regarding the extradition of former Emperor William will be dispatched tomorrow, according to the Evening Standard today. The note, says the newspaper, makes a strong appeal to the Dutch government not to create greater difficulties in Europe by insisting on the right of asylum for the man characterized as the author of the world's present troubles.

SWITZERLAND'S NEUTRALITY UNDER CONSIDERATION

Precedent May Be Laid for Refusal of U. S. to Send Military Force Abroad

ROOT INVITED TO HELP PREPARE PLAN

LONDON, Feb. 13.—Eliu Root is one of a number of distinguished men from various countries who have been invited to become members of the committee to prepare plans for the constitution of a permanent court of international justice. The list was announced at today's session of the council of the league of nations.

LONDON, Feb. 13.—The council of the league of nations is considering the appointment of 11 jurists of international reputation to compose a committee for an international court of justice. It was learned authoritatively today.

The name of Eliu Root has been mentioned as a possible selection. Root's name has been urged, it was said, regardless of whether the United States becomes a member of the league. Members believed his presence eminently desirable. It was said, and will ask his appointment even if America refuses to join the league—if such action is found possible. Other wise his presence will be contingent on America's entry.

Other names mentioned included Professor Fedeo Aly, Rafael Altamira, Spahn, Senor Drago, former minister of foreign affairs in Argentina, and Lord Phillimore, Great Britain.

The council, in its secret meeting yesterday was reported to have arrived at several important decisions including an official reaffirmation of Switzerland's neutrality, possibly creating the precedent for the American senate's reservation, refusing to send American military forces abroad.

NEGRO 'CORPSE' SAT UP AND DEMANDED CLOTHES IN UNDERTAKER'S SHOP

DALLAS, Feb. 13.—Dan Clay, 50, today was a "Marked Nigger." If he were inclined to voodoo, converts would flock away from him like two dusky undertakers did when he sat up on the embalming slab and began to demand his clothes, because—

He had been dead for several days.

Wednesday afternoon Dan's brother found him in bed, cold, stiff, his head and an arm hanging over the side of the bed. A physician pronounced him dead of "flu" and the body was carried away in a "dead basket."

"The hours passed. And then— Night—An embalmer, workaholic. Rigid bodies "laid out." Two large-eyed negro embalmers doggedly, at their gruesome tasks. A clock struck twice.

"Well take that 'un next," Undertaker Smith muttered, pointing an embalming instrument to Dan. "It was too much. 'Looky heah, Niggah, what you's tryin' do to me' Dan demanded, sitting up.

When the ambulance attendants coaxed the undertakers back, Dan was able to walk to the dead wagon.

The resurrected Dan today was more inclined to anger than voodoo. "Ah hates travelin' round in dead wagons. Next time make sho' ah's dadd. Yo' Niggahs wants a funeral too much."

SCARCITY OF WORKMEN REPORTED FROM QUANAH

RAILROAD OFFICIALS PROMISE RELIEF FOR WEST TEXAS COTTON INTERESTS AT STAMFORD MEETING

Special to The Times. STAMFORD, TEX., Feb. 13.—A number of West Texas towns were represented at the first of a series of conferences being conducted by Felix M. Williams, special representative of the United States Railway Administration, to look into the cotton congestion of this section Thursday. In addition to Mr. Williams, F. Holden, traffic manager of the Kansas City Southern, S. V. Covington, general superintendent of the Denver lines, W. F. Sterley, general freight agent of the Denver roads, O. E. Maer, superintendent of the Wichita Valley lines, and Mr. Rice, federal manager of the Denver lines, were present at the conference.

Lifting of the cotton embargo simultaneously with the ordering of the present investigation will provide relief for cotton already signed for, was the consensus of opinion of complaining towns. Railroad officials ascribed the past and present congestions to the unprecedented crop production of the west and the inability through bad weather to maintain tracks and from the shortage of labor, together with the paucity of equipment and motive power. The oil business also conspired to bring about the present situation, the officials explained. A measure to relieve inbound freight long overdue is to route it a roundabout way where congestions are not so acute.

Messrs. Sterley, Holden and Covington believe the situation has now reached the point where it can be easily removed. About 50,000 bales of cotton are still to be handled on bills of lading already signed, while only about 50 per cent of the cotton crop has yet been handled. The cotton acreage in central west Texas will be increased at least 40 per cent over that of 1919.

The series of conferences will be resumed Friday at Spur, at Floydada and Creabytton Saturday, at Snyder Monday and Sweetwater Tuesday.

F. S. Hastings, manager of the S. M. S. ranch, presided at the session which was held in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce room.

Anson's Complaint

Secretary Bishop of the Anson Chamber of Commerce was the first representative called upon to describe past and present conditions at his town. He declared that appreciable relief is now being obtained since the cotton embargo has been received. He declared that Anson had been practically 60 days without a cotton market. Bills of lading for 3,400 bales of cotton had been issued, and much of this has been moved. In the territory contiguous to Anson he figures that there are 10,000 bales of cotton held by farmers who cannot market it. Several thousand bales remain unpicker in the fields. Eight gins are running, one of which has already tied out more than 6,000 bales of cotton this season.

Mr. Bishop declared that he had been reported to him that every seller of cotton had lost from \$10 to \$25 a bale and every seller of cotton sold from \$5 to \$10 a ton because of the recent railway handicap. Mr. Bishop declared that the depot provided by the valley road there was an eyesore and inadequate. He declared that the most of the seats were broken and lady passengers were put to much inconvenience thereby. As an instance of the slow movement of commodities, he related how a car of coal badly needed at Anson and which left Wichita Falls February 3 had not yet reached its destination. He told of numerous cases of farm implements which had been shipped for weeks and no trace could be found.

Federal Director Rice promised that the station at Anson would be repaired and new seats provided.

The Situation at Haskell

Secretary B. M. Whitaker of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce gave his views on the situation, reporting that there had been considerable relief in the last few weeks. He declared that Haskell has been without cotton buyers for several weeks. He believed a part of the cause of this is to be charged to the inability of the railroads to handle the cotton tendered.

Manager Perkins of the Stamford Corpra declared that his press was now in condition to handle all transit cotton offered it by both the Wichita Valley and Katy lines, as well as diverted cotton from other compression points. He said the press had at present handled 38,000 bales and has about 4,000 bales of concentration cotton. He expects to obtain several thousand bales from the Stamford and Northwestern. He ascribed occasional congestions partly to the press and partly to the railroads, saying that he could not always get the Wichita Valley to switch him cars. He preferred, of course, the transit cotton.

Representative Hunt of Haskell declared that Haskell had ginned 10,000 bales of cotton and 3,000 more were expected. He declared he continued to purchase cotton, but has sustained loss because it could not be put to destination promptly.

Mayor R. L. Penick of Stamford outlined the situation at Stamford, showing the trouble occasioned merchants by reason of the long delay in inbound freight. The importance of securing shipments of farm implements and agricultural tools for this spring's use

development. He referred to resolutions passed at the Abilene convention of the organization to indicate the position of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce toward big business. He declared the organization was not opposed to higher freight rates for the roads if the desired service could be obtained in return. What we want is service, and we are willing to pay for it, he declared. "Of course," he said, "we expect extensions of lines in the West to aid in its development."

The officials declared that they had never attended a conference of this kind where a greater feeling of freedom of thought was shown. They declared they would use their utmost efforts to find a solution of the situation, since they were vitally interested in the development of the west. They pointed out that higher freight rates were necessary if the lines should be taken out of the hands of receivers following their return to private owners.

Mr. Holden left in the afternoon for Hamlin to confer with Orient line officials with reference to removing certain restrictions.

Mr. Williams and Manager Porter A. Whaley leave Friday for Spur, where an important session of delegates from points in that territory will be held. In succession the series of conferences will be held at Floydada, Creabytton, Snyder, Sweetwater and other points.

The meeting Thursday is expected to be prolific of good things for West Texas besides the immediate benefit of the cotton business, it was believed.

MEMORIALS FOR FAMILIES OF THE AMERICAN DEAD

Several of These Memorials Received for Distribution by Commander of Legion Post

The first three of the French War Memorials to the American soldiers and sailors who died in the world war have been received by Duncan M. Perkins, who as commander of the local post of the American Legion, will distribute the memorials. In the jurisdiction of the Post (Carriagons Post) there are 31 memorials to be distributed to the next relative of the dead. Mr. Perkins states:

The memorials he has received are for Frank Garrett McSwadden, to be sent to James M. McSpadden of Byers; Leonidas Robert Estill to go to Mary A. Estill of Electra, and to the Earl Patton, to go to F. C. Patton of Petrolia.

The memorial is an engraving on heavy paper, the work of Franklin Douglas. There is a symbolic group of figures placed on a cenotaph on which is engraved, in French, the following dedication: Above the signature of the president of the French Republic, Raymond Poincaré:

To the Memory of of the United States of America France's Homage The President of the Republic.

The principal figure of the group symbolizes the soul and spirit of the American army which helped France to maintain alive the flame of the torch of liberty and justice.

The sword is not in the scabbard but ready at any moment to protect and defend against the weak and oppressed—who are symbolized in the group to the left by a mother holding her baby to her breast—and to insure freedom and justice to the coming generations, represented by the figure of the kneeling boy, praying and thinking God for deliverance.

At the right, the figure of a man, chained and shackled symbolizes the spirit of evil and victory over our enemies. Also at the right, crowning the spirit of America, stands "Glory" who rejoices with the old war veteran, standing to the left of the principal figure, symbolizing the armies, who are always ready to fight for the good of humanity.

Universal fame is symbolized by the winged figure, flying over the group, and triumphing to the world the great triumph in which the United States participated. The American eagle posed on the staff of peace watches anxiously, and stands ready to swoop in case our enemies again endeavor to disturb the peace of the world, so dearly acquired.

The entire group is framed by a border of oak and laurel leaves which are always discerned to the victors.

At the foot of the cenotaph the flags of France and America are draped and joined together by a wreath, which is the mark of gratitude and homage which France pays to our sons who gave their lives for liberty and justice.

The lines inscribed on the wall behind the group are taken from one of Victor Hugo's famous poems, and when translated read:

Those who died piously for their country: Have the right that at their graves, the people come to pray.

INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC AT QUANAH IS ABATING

QUANAH, TEX., Feb. 13.—Bad weather and sickness have interfered to a large extent with the farmers in gathering the remnant of Hardeman county's big cotton crop. Most of the picking is now scattering, however, a few fields have never been picked. The grade of this cotton is consider-

ably damaged. Labor shortage, together with wet weather will result in a material decrease in the wheat acreage for the county, and incidentally, the cotton and row crop acreage will be greatly increased.

MANY VETERANS OF THE WORLD WAR IN FOURTH CAVALRY

The Fourth Cavalry, Texas National Guard, the headquarters of which is maintained in Wichita Falls, is one of the best drilled and most thoroughly equipped militia organizations in the United States, according to information given out at regimental headquarters here.

Attendance has been excellent at the meetings held so far, and Chairman B. E. Hester hopes to see the continuation of the Council's interest in this important work. The Council also is important for any line not to be represented.



WOMAN ARRESTED AFTER SHOOTING OF B. M. FUGITT

A. M. Fugitt, a transfer man, received slight wounds late Thursday in a shooting affair said to have occurred in the rear of a barber shop at 632 Indiana avenue. He was taken to the Wichita General hospital where his wounds were dressed. He left the hospital about 11:00 o'clock Thursday night going to his apartment at the hospital. A complaint alleging assault on Fugitt was filed Friday in Justice R. V. Gwinn's court against Mrs. Lillian Renfro. The woman accompanied county officers to the court house late Thursday where she made a statement to District Attorney Fletcher Jones asserting that she fired the shot after Fugitt had made improper advances toward her. She was released on bond fixed at \$500 by the district attorney.

Fugitt Makes Statement.
In a written statement given to a representative of the Times, Fugitt vigorously protested against the charge that he had made improper advances toward Mrs. Renfro. "Mrs. Renfro had been in my employ recently but I discharged her last Tuesday," Mr. Fugitt said. "There was no feeling between us. Yesterday I went to the rear end of the barber

shop where her husband conducts a small sign painting establishment for the purpose of getting a sign her husband had painted for me.
"I did not know Mrs. Renfro was there until I entered. She was the only one in the room. I immediately asked her where the sign was and she said she knew nothing about it. I then turned around to walk out of the shop. She said, 'You stand still,' and immediately shot me. As soon as she fired I turned toward her and seeing the gun wreathed it from her hand and carried the gun out into the street, asked a man to get an officer."
Fugitt's injuries are not serious. He left the hospital after his wounds were dressed, being confined to the infirmary not more than four hours. He had just recently been released from the hospital where he had been confined for several weeks suffering from injuries sustained in a railroad accident.

Mrs. Lillian Renfro's statement alleging that Fugitt had made improper advances toward her were made to District Attorney Fletcher Jones late Thursday following her arrest by county officials.

NEW CHARTER WILL BE SUBMITTED FOR VOTE MARCH 30TH

Submission of the new city charter to the voters of Wichita Falls was fixed for Tuesday, March 30, by the city council, meeting Thursday night. The meeting was held at the home of Alderman W. S. Curlee, who was still confined to his home from a recent attack of influenza, and whose presence was necessary for the obtaining of a quorum. The other members attending included Mayor Marlow and Aldermen Reed and Eandy. Alderman McFall, the remaining member is in Mineral Wells, where he is also a victim of the influenza.

Action for the submission of the charter was necessary at last night's session in order that the charter might become effective before the municipal election, which comes on the first Tuesday in April. The charter as drawn provides for a straight out commission form of government in the hands of a mayor and five aldermen who have authority for the appointment of all other city employees. The employment of a city manager is made optional with the governing body. The powers given the city manager in the charter, in the absence of such an official, are retained by the council.

Printed copies of the proposed charter, which will be mailed to each voter, are to be prepared as soon as possible. The charter contains 40,000 to 50,000 words.
The form, sale and fixing of taxes for support of the \$500,000 bond issue for the purchase and extension of the water system were fixed in an ordinance adopted at the meeting.
The salary of the acting librarian at the Kemp library for the past four months was approved and ordered continued in the future on the notification that Miss Roberts, the librarian, would not be able to return to her position.

LOUIS LEE CONSIDERING ENTRY INTO MAYORALTY RACE, FRIENDS SAY

The probability of there being a second candidate in the mayoralty race for the coming year developed Friday when it was announced that Louis Lee, proprietor of the American hotel and the lease owner of a number of downtown business buildings, had been approached by a number of local people in this connection, and who had taken the matter under advisement. Mr. Lee has been a resident of Wichita Falls for almost two years and is well known locally, particularly by a considerable portion of the local oil men.

ELEVEN REVENUE MEN MEET HERE TODAY TO GET INSTRUCTIONS

Deputy internal revenue collectors, 11 in number, who will direct the income tax returns in the 60 counties of this district, were assembled in Wichita Falls Friday for the purpose of outlining the work for the coming season. The conference is under the direction of A. F. Bowden, deputy collector and district chief.
L. Shields, deputy internal revenue collector stationed at the Wichita Falls office, who was recently ordered transferred to the San Antonio office has received notification of the granting of his request to remain in Wichita Falls. During his short stay here Mr. Shields has made quite a favorable impression on the Wichitians with whom he has been brought in contact, both by reason of his thorough knowledge of the income tax law and his untiring courtesy and affability.

CAPT. ROBERT POLLARD ENDS LIFE FRIIDAY

AUSTIN, TEX., Feb. 13.—Capt. Robert L. Pollard of the state fire insurance commission and former state purchasing agent, shot and killed himself at his home here shortly before noon. He had been ill for several days.
Captain Pollard had been active in Texas insurance circles for more than 30 years. He came to Austin from Houston about 18 years ago and entered the insurance business here. When the former fire insurance rating board was created by Governor Campbell, Captain Pollard was one of the first members of the board. He was reappointed by Governor Colquitt.
After the amendment to the law which created the fire insurance commission, Captain Pollard retired and purchased a ranch in Uvalde county, where he remained until he was appointed purchasing agent by Governor Hobby. He held this position until the office was abolished by the board of control at the first of this year.

NOTARY FEES EXEMPT FROM INCOME TAXES

Notary fees are exempt from income taxes as being remuneration received for a public service. It is stated by L. Shields, deputy collector of internal revenue, stationed at the local office, these fees have been held to come within the provision which exempts remuneration received in the performance of their duties by any officials of a state or any political subdivision thereof. Federal officials and employees have to pay the income tax with the exception of members of congress, who were apparently overlooked when the income tax legislation was framed.

COMPLAINT CHARGES OIL-FIELD WORKER WITH ROBBERY BY FIREARMS

Howard Miller, oil field worker, was arrested late Thursday night on the road between Burk Burnett and Wagoner City and brought to Wichita Falls where he was lodged in the county jail on a charge of robbery by firearms. A complaint alleging robbery by firearms was filed in Justice R. V. Gwinn's court Friday against Miller and his bond was fixed at \$2,000, following preliminary hearing in justice court. Miller's arrest is in connection with the alleged robbery of a grocery establishment in the northwest extension oil fields reported to have occurred late Thursday.
Officials on duty in the oil regions say that two men robbed the proprietor of the grocery store but that one of them escaped while Miller was arrested shortly after he left the store. Officials are searching for Miller's alleged accomplice.

PHOENIX, ARIZ.—The Arizona assembly ratified the federal suffrage amendment, becoming the 31st state to do so.

FIVE COUNTRIES WILL BE REPRESENTED AT HAGUE

THE HAGUE, Feb. 12.—Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland and Holland will be represented at the conference which opens at the peace palace here on February 16 to discuss the formation of an international court of justice. This conference will aim to establish by comparing and examining plans already drawn by commissions of experts from other countries, a uniform plan for a permanent tribunal such as is provided for in article 14 of the covenant of the League of Nations.

SMALL TORNADOES SWEEP SECTIONS OF GEORGIA

ATLANTA, GA., Feb. 13.—One person, a 13-year-old negro girl, is known to have been killed and a number of others injured in the series of small tornadoes which swept sections of Georgia late yesterday. Reports of additional deaths have not been confirmed.
Property damage was reported from Irwin and Mitchell counties. The tornadoes were said to have cut paths approximately 400 feet wide.

NEW YORK STOCK EXCHANGE TO ERECT 22 STORY BUILDING

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—The New York stock exchange will erect a 22-story office building adjoining its present Wall street home. It was announced today. To acquire space for enlarging its trading floor and to provide for future needs in board room requirements, the exchange recently purchased the Wilks & Mortimer building, pioneer nine-story "sky-scraper," which will be torn down to make way for the new structure. The enlarged exchange will extend a whole block on Wall street.
The cost of the new structure is estimated at \$3,000,000 while the combined assessed value of the present exchange, the two buildings and the land is \$8,000,000.

COALITION-UNIONIST CANDIDATE WINS BY SMALL MARGIN

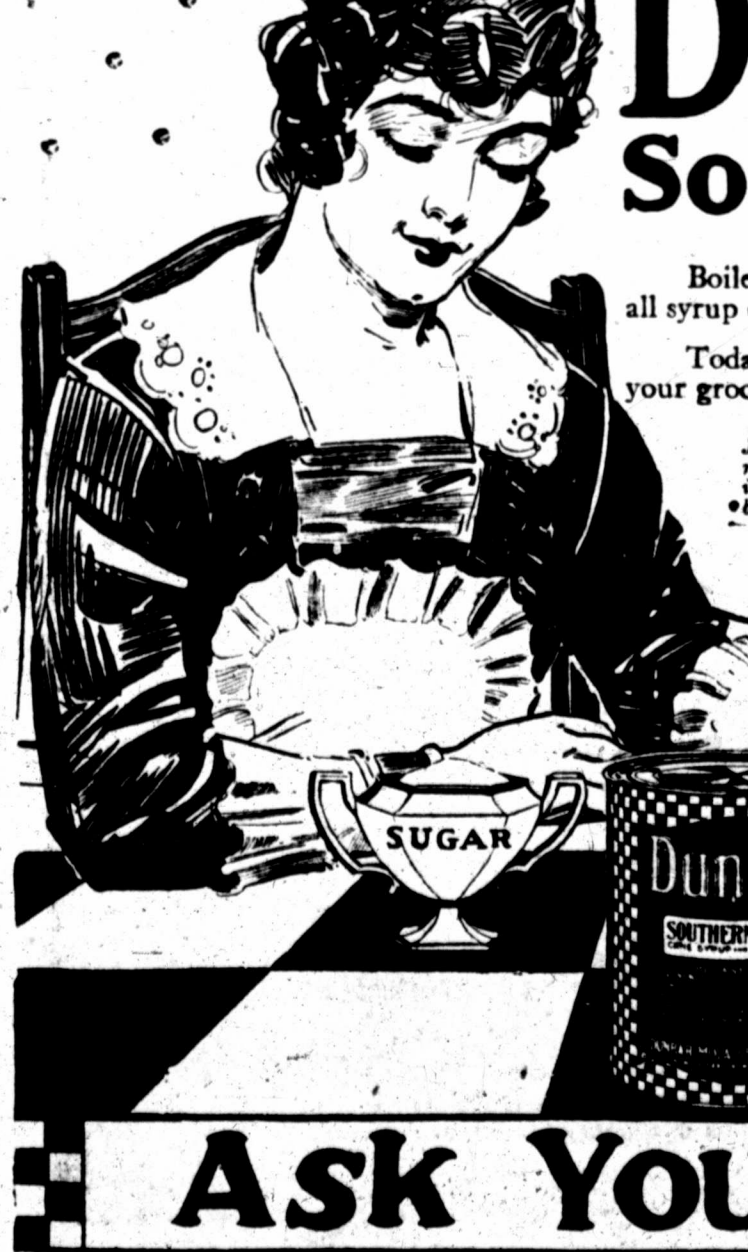

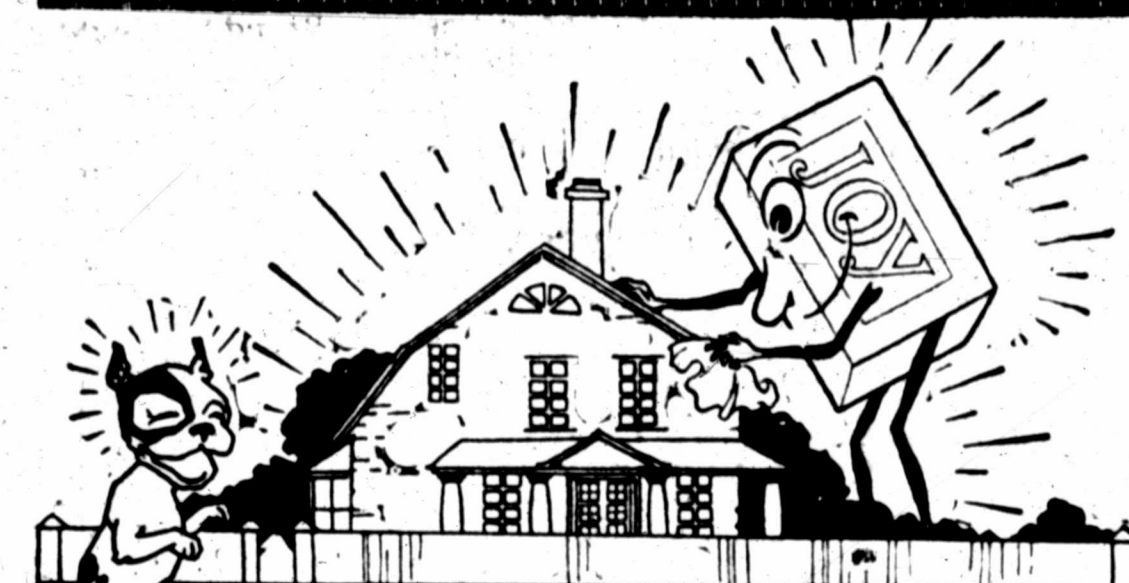

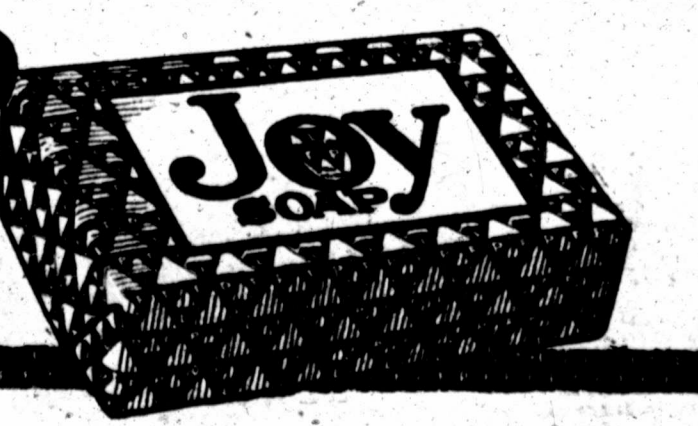

MRS. CATT OPENS SUFFRAGE MEET AT CHICAGO TODAY

Enemy of Woman Suffrage Is Fly on the Wheel of Progress She Declares

DENOUNCES SENATORS BORAH WADSWORTH AND HITCHCOCK

Executive Committee Expected to Use Amalgamation With Women Voters' League

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—The enemy of woman suffrage is a "fly sitting on the wheel of progress" imitating he can command it "To remove no more and that it will obey," Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National Suffrage Association, said in her opening address at the convention of the organization here today.

Mrs. Catt reviewed the battle for the federal suffrage amendment in the difficult which were overcome in securing its passage by Congress and in the present fight for quick ratification by the states.

She attacked Senators Borah of Idaho; Wadsworth of New York and Hitchcock of Nebraska as "refusing to represent their states" in the 68th Congress when the amendment failed to pass.

"As the amendment needed but a single vote in the 65th Congress; the responsibility for its failure to pass may be laid upon any one of the four," she said, "they not only put their own states to the expense of extra sessions, but all the other states as well."

Mrs. Catt attacked upon suffragists to rally to the support of any government who may be attacked by their political opponents for bringing the extra ex-

pend upon their respective states.

The executive committee of the suffrage association was to meet early today to vote on the plan to dissolve the organization when the federal amendment is finally ratified. Little doubt was expressed by members of the council before the meeting that action recommending dissolution of the association and urging members to join the new League of Women Voters would be taken.

The convention was to take up consideration of the plan late today. The executive council will work out details of the proposed dissolution including disposition of property, funds and records.

Recommendations formulated by various committees outlining the future plans of the League of Women Voters, will be submitted to the convention next week. These recommendations include a broad program of educational, social hygiene, child welfare and food control work. Plans made by the conference of women lawyers of the country, which will be presented to the convention, include standardization of all laws concerning women.

Laws affecting marriage, divorce, independent citizenship for married women, control of wives' wages and mothers' pensions, were discussed.

Suffragists were jubilant today when they learned that Arizona had ratified the federal amendment. It was the first state to approve of the amendment. Five more are needed. Suffrage leaders were confident these five could be procured before the convention adjourned next Wednesday.

A political row developed today over insertion of an advertisement in the official program by the Illinois Republican women's committee, asserting that it is to the Republican party that you owe passage of the federal suffrage amendment.

"It is a shocking thing to put a non-partisan advertisement in a non-partisan organization program," declared Mrs. George Bass, head of the Democratic women's committee. It is not a true statement and I consider it shocking and most unethical.

The Republican women took the attitude that they had "put one over" on their Democratic sister.



PROMINENT YOUNG BUSINESS MAN OF VERNON IS DEAD

VERNON, TEX., Feb. 13.—An epidemic of influenza is prevalent at Vernon. It is mostly in mild form, there being no fatalities except where complications of pneumonia prevailed. Charles E. Warren Jr., 27, a young business man of Vernon, died yesterday of pneumonia and complications. He was born in Dallas and leaves a wife and three children, besides his parents of New York, a brother, Henry, a sister, Mrs. Wilbur Campbell, both of New York. His wife is a daughter of the late Judge W. L. Campbell of Dallas. He is a nephew of R. T. Harris of New York, Baylis E. Harris of Galveston and related to

Robert Irby of Galveston, all widely known cotton men. Funeral services were conducted at the Church of the Holy Family in Vernon by Father J. P. Cuma. Young Warren was manager of the General Auto Supply company and late manager of the Harris-Irby Cotton company's interests at Vernon. Eugene Sammie McElwee, well-known in Vernon, died Monday and his remains were interred in East View cemetery. He was 36 years of age and though paralyzed in his lower limbs since the age of 2 years, was noted for his industry and supported a mother. The family have lived at Vernon for 25 years. Carl Ashley and Merle Bourland, 8 and 7 years of age, son and daughter of E. Hourland, living east of Vernon, were the victims of a tragic death last Sunday, as a result of a cave-in of a bank on Plum creek, where they were playing. The children were playing on the creek when the embankment caved in on them.

DEPUTY STATE LABOR COMMISSIONER HERE U. M. Lee, deputy state labor commissioner, is in Wichita Falls this week obtaining statistics for the department. He finds some unwitting violations of the child labor law here and he wishes to give warning that it is unlawful to employ children under the age of 15 between the months of September and June, except in certain cases where permits are obtained from the county judge. Mr. Lee says that there are now few violations of the 64-hour law governing the employment of female workers. ONLY 569 NEW CASES OF INFLUENZA REPORTED AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—Only 569 new influenza cases were reported to the state health department for the 24-hour period ending at noon today. This

is the lowest mark reached since the epidemic became statewide.
