New Commander Named For SAC Installation

A new commander will take over at the Strategic Air Command's remote base at Benger Air Park this Friday.

MSgt. Leslie Bradshaw will replace Sgt. Walter H. Lucas, who is returning to his home base, Matagorda Island Range.

Sgt. Lucas has guided the SAC remote base, which scores missions of "bombers" which fly a corridor from Elkhart, Kansas to Eunice, N.M. The remote base has been in operation the past three months.

The first mission was flown locally on February 2. Currently, missions are flown practically daily except weekends, involving from two to 40 planes each night.

Strategic Air Command B-52 and B-58 jet bombers are used in the mission. The flights are low-level in nature, at 800 to 1300 feet above ground level.

The mission "corridor" runs roughly between Black and Summerfield, an eight-mile wide stretch.

MSgt. Bradshaw is a native of Virginia, and his home base is in Hastings, Nebraska.

"The project is going very smooth. Everything has been real fine, and the people of Friona have been most cooperative," said Sgt. Lucas, who will leave on Friday.

A crew of six new men for scoring operations arrived this week, from Holbrook, Arizona. They replaced a six-man crew which was sent to Kentucky.

There are 19 men working on the local detachment, which is known as "OL 33 Remote." It is a detachment from the First Combat Evaluation Group, Barksdale AFB, near Shreveport, La.

Another 60-man crew is detached at Eunice, N.M., at the southern extreme of the mission.

The local detachment will be deployed until July 19.

MBP Plant Told For Plainview

R. E. (Gene) Frye, president of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., announced Wednesday plans for constructing a beef slaughtering and processing plant at Plainview.

The new beef plant will have a slaughter capacity of 10,000 head per week, and facilities for breaking and fabricating.

(Note: the plant announced for Plainview would have approximately the same capacity as the company's Friona plant.

Construction will commence in the third quarter of 1969 with projected completion in the fourth quarter of 1970.

The location of the plant in Plainview will be approximately three miles north of the city limits on Interstate 29, and will be served by Santa Fe railway. The site will contain 240.69 acres.

Complete breaking and fabricating facilities are being added to both MBP's Friona and Rock Port, Mo. plants.

Miss Whaley also has been active in FHA. She was a member of the National Honor Society, Future Nurses and Future Teachers.

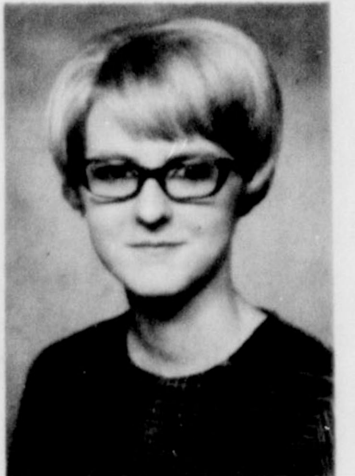

Pause And Reflect

Anyone old enough to read a newspaper, listen to a radio, or watch a T.V. is bound to feel, from time to time, a certain amount of frustration.

It is becoming increasingly difficult not to enter the ranks of the crepehangers or to begin to think in terms of "sackcloth and ashes".

Recently we were warned that the billion dollar coast of California was doomed to drop into the sea.

It's still there - high and dry!

In 1880 a bunch of people sold all their worldly goods, donned white raiment, and met on a hilltop to witness the end of the world.

Imagine their frustration when Old Sol appeared as usual and the busy world began another routine day!

However, there is plenty of justification for concern - "concern", not morbid worry.

As a means of bolstering our courage to the point of dealing with the 20th century universe it may not be a bad idea to take a backward look into that era when "the earth was without form, and void".

We fear only that which we do not understand, therefore a review of plant and animal life on our planet can strengthen our spiritual faith and benefit our material life.

For this we need go no further than the Museum of Blackwater Draw just north of Portales, New Mexico.

Here you will see, in a fine new building, the story of old Mother Earth graphically displayed, and explained in laymen's language.

And it pays particular homage to the Paleo-Indian cultures which are a part of our own southwestern history.

Space does not permit a description here - drive over on any Wednesday, Saturday, or Sunday afternoon between the hours of one and five - you will be well repaid for the effort and will come away with a better understanding of the Almighty's master plan for all mankind.

The advantages of this visit are twofold.

Aside from any historical or scientific benefits gained; the story of the man who first discovered the Blackwater Site is a very timely one; especially in these days of stressing the sorry plight of uneducated, downtrodden, minority groups.

George McJunkin, an American Negro, was born in slavery. He learned to read and write while working as a cowboy on a New Mexico ranch. His only equipment was a slate and a ten penny nail.

Scratching letters and numbers with his nail on the old fashioned slate he educated himself to the point of becoming a much sought after lecturer and in the area of ancient flora and fauna was the most learned man in eastern New Mexico.

He became a ranch foreman, an expert pistol shot, and won many horse races.

Due to his help an outlaw was captured and hanged. It was McJunkin who found the first relics at Blackwater Draw in 1893 and it was he who tried for thirty years to get the excavations started.

He was not to see the fulfillment of his dreams. He died in 1923 - three years before the site was officially opened by the scientists.

Remember the old "square" adage - "The Lord helps those who help themselves".

He was just a tiny ball of dirty white fur - wet, cold, half starved.

Two little pink ears and two large blue eyes were the only clues to his identity.

But that was enough to win the heart of a little girl. She fed, bathed, and cared for him for a year and a half - and then one evening he failed to show up at dinner time.

The little girl went looking for her cat and just before dark she found him.

Only this time her loving care would work no miracles.

40 YEARS AGO-MAY 3, 1929

Effective May 1, 1929, the Friona Star and the Hereford Brand changed ownership, the properties having been purchased by the Nunn-Warren Publishing Company, with main offices in Amarillo. The change should not affect the Star materially. John White will remain as editor. Seth Holman had been the owner of the paper since December of 1926.

35 YEARS AGO-MAY 4, 1934

The junior-senior play will be presented May 7 and 9. It is entitled "Laugh Clown". Stars include Dorothy Crawford, Mildred Hughes, Joan Clinkscales, Paul Spring, Forrest Osborn, Wilbur Meade, Bennah Burton, Virginia Short, Harold Lillard, Wayne New, Meliza Chronister, Claude Miller, Orville McElroy and Paul Parr.

25 YEARS AGO-MAY 5, 1944

Pvt. Nathaniel Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. E.E. Taylor of the Messenger community, was drowned last Friday while swimming in the San Marcos River near San Marcos, where he was stationed at the Army Air Field.

20 YEARS AGO-APRIL 29, 1949

Miss Murna Welch was crowned "Miss Friona" at the beauty contest and pie supper which was held at the school auditorium on Monday, April 25. Dorothy Nell Guinn and Lunell McFarland placed second and third respectively.

A classified advertisement which appeared in the Friona Star on September 3, 1948 has been printed in the last issue of the Reader's Digest. The ad read: "Wanted, a home for a three-months old puppy, housebroke except when very happy."

10 YEARS AGO-APRIL 30, 1959

The Friona Squaws crowded to a 41-point decision Monday afternoon in the swirling dust to win the first annual girls track meet here. Lorenzo's "one girl team," Tanya Terrell, scored 17 points for her team to win second place single-handedly. Hereford, Happy and Tulla also competed. Mary Ann Boggess scored a total of 20 points for the Squaws. A freshman meet was also held, won by Friona.

5 YEARS AGO-APRIL 30, 1964

Deposits at Friona State Bank topped the \$7 million mark for the first time on a regular quarterly statement, with deposits at \$7,136,435.96 on April 15, according to a report issued by the bank this week.

ONE YEAR AGO-MAY 2, 1968

Larry Frank Truitt, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Truitt, and Becky Coffey, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Coffey, were named valedictorian and salutatorian for the 1968 graduating class at Friona High School this week.

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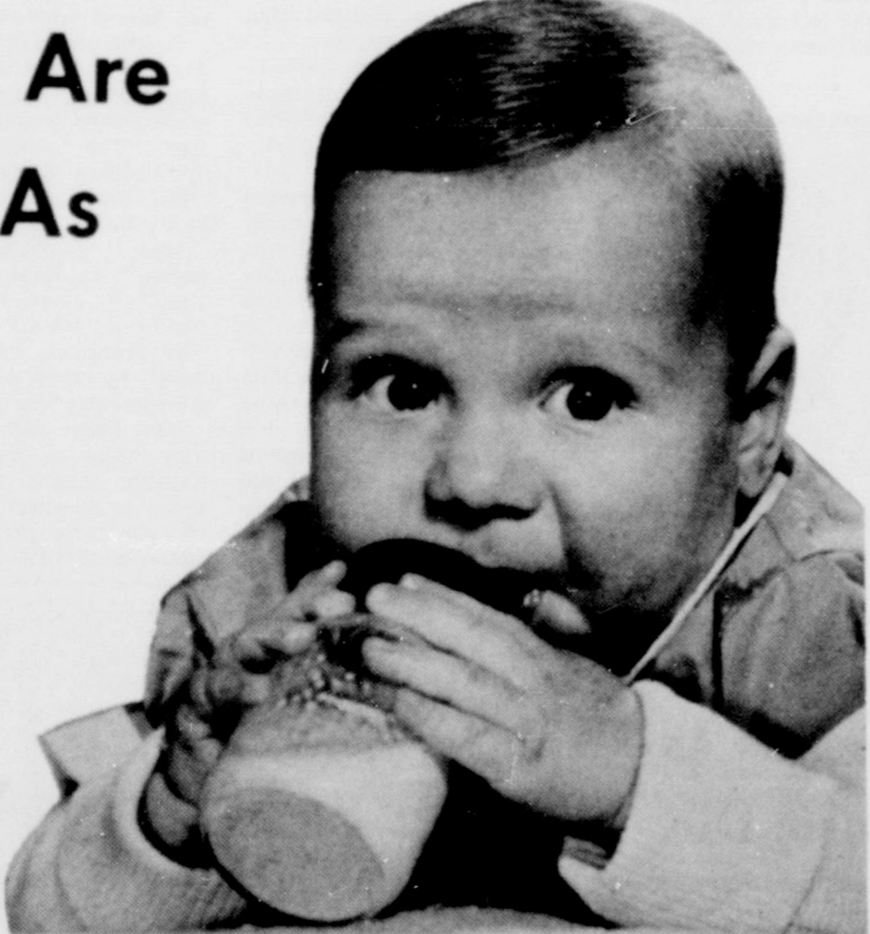


Striped and mottled colors are interesting when they're those in zinnias. Peppermint Stick is marked with pink, red or purple over a white ground. Ortho Polka also has red or orange markings over yellow ground, and larger blooms. Persian Carpet has foot-high plants and the inch-and-a-half-wide flowers are combinations of yellow and mahogany in many different shades, with the petal tips lighter than their centers.

If you didn't manage to plant peas in early spring, you still can have them this summer by planting the variety Wando. This has small pods but peas in them are of high eating quality and are produced even in hot weather.

Make successive sowings of Wando up to July 1 for a steady supply of fresh peas for eating or freezing.

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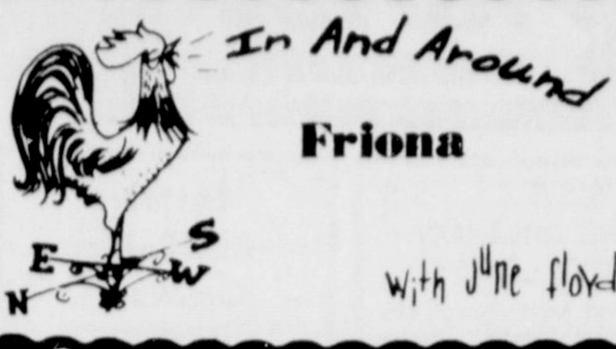

Pesticides

The increasing use of pesticides to keep homes free of insects and protect plant life requires certain precautions on the part of the user. First, read the directions on the label of the container and note all cautions and warnings. Second, keep pesticides away from children or pets. Third, make certain the container is tightly sealed and never transfer the contents to another unlabeled container.



Cotton growers in Parmer County will vote during the period of May 5 through May 9 on whether to permit the transfer of 1970 cotton acreage allotments to farms in other counties by sale or lease.

If in any county at least two-thirds of the growers voting favor the transfer, growers of that county will be permitted to transfer their allotments by sale or lease to farmers in other counties within the same state.

Any lease agreement filed

with the county ASC committee between June 1 and Dec. 31 1969, where an allotment is transferred within or outside a county, will, if approved, be honored by the committee for the number of years specified in the lease.

Where approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the county, transfer of allotments to other counties will be permitted during 1970. The transfer of allotments is authorized in the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965.

The May 5-9 referendum on this question will be the fourth to be conducted by mail.

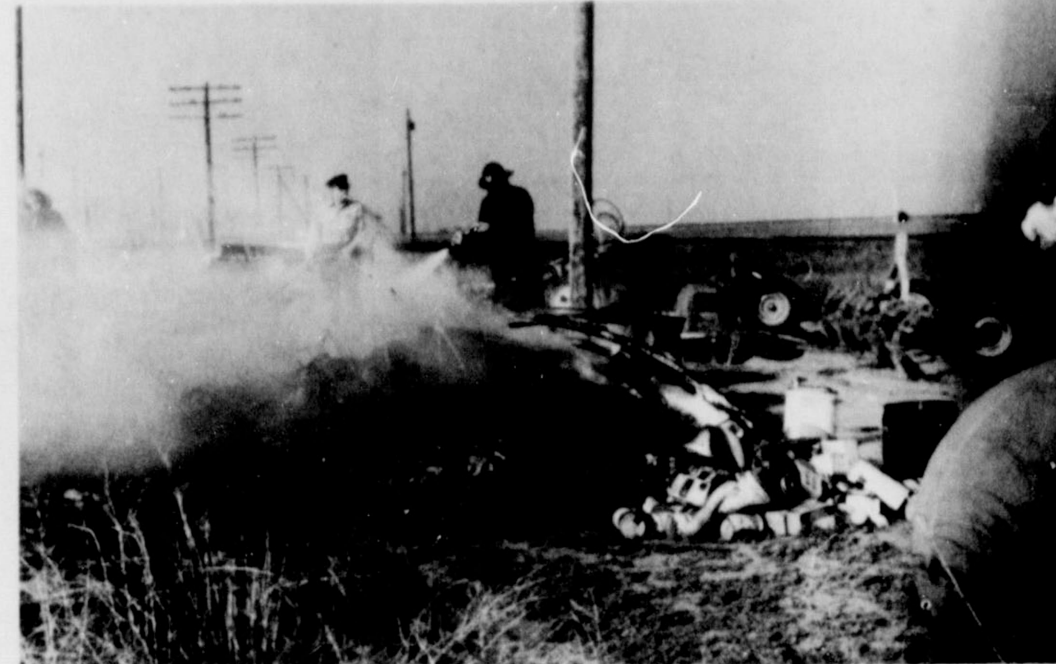
Keck is also a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, and the Golden Gate Seminary. Services will be conducted Monday through Friday at the

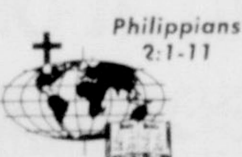
Windows of the Soul

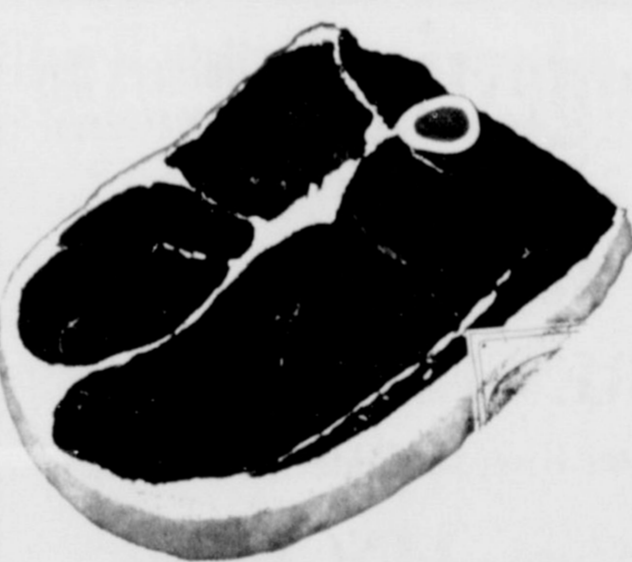

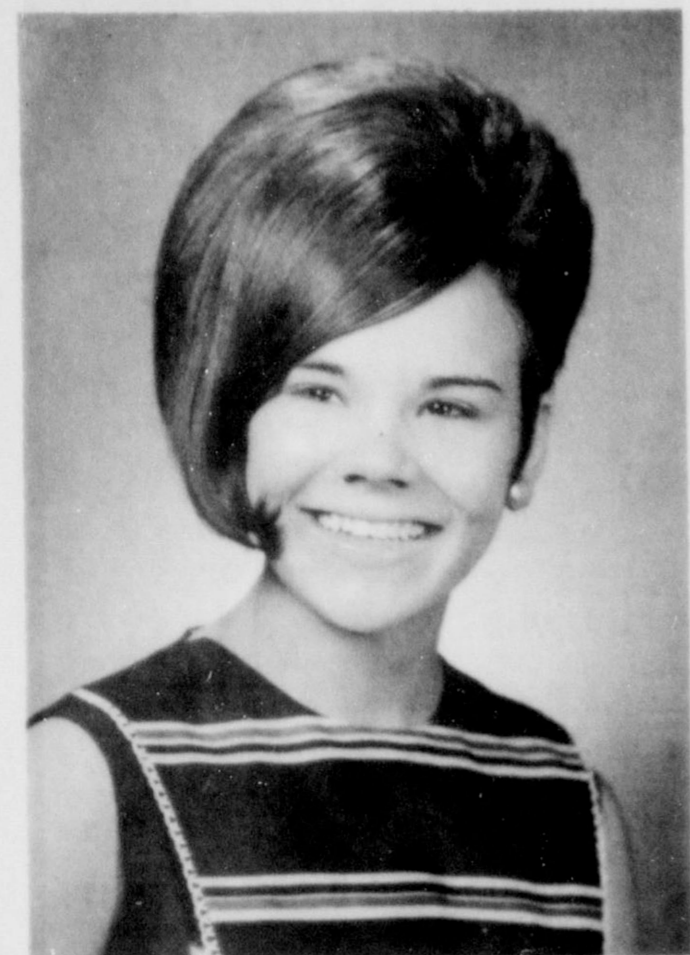

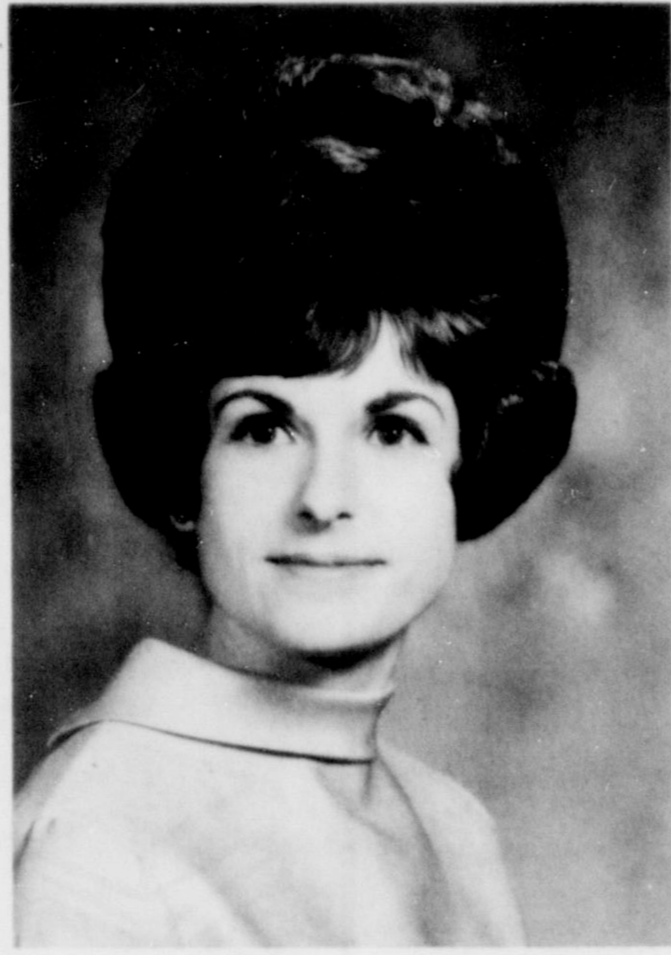

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for the assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services to or on behalf of:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons;

(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition:

"The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows:

"Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law.

(b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto.

(c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b.

(d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.

(e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."
