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CHANGE LABOR PROVISIONS OF RAILROAD BILL

Creates a Board of Appeals as Recommended by Director General Hines.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—A permanent system of arbitration which it is believed will be satisfactory to labor has been agreed upon by Senate and House conferees as the finishing touch to the railroad bill.

The labor provisions were changed at the last minute because of recommendations made by Director General Hines, which are understood to represent the views of President Wilson.

The plan adopted is similar to that proposed by the President as the means of settling the present railway wage dispute.

All anti-strike or compulsory arbitration features were previously eliminated from the conference report and the new system relies entirely upon public opinion for its enforcement.

The conference report which will be submitted to the House tomorrow creates a board of appeals and allows the formation of railway adjustment boards whenever satisfactory to both carriers and employees.

The adjustment boards are of a temporary nature and may handle disputes over hours, grievances and working conditions but not wages.

After a failure of the adjustment boards to agree an appeal can be taken to the appeals board which has the exclusive jurisdiction of all disputes concerning wages.

This provision being added to insure uniform wages throughout the country.

The make-up of the appeals board was one of the last minute changes of the conferees. It had been tentatively agreed that the board was to be composed of five members, three of whom represented the public.

Hines recommended a board of nine, with three representatives each of the public, the carriers and the employees.

Under this plan was accepted with the limitation that at least one of the public representatives must vote for an increase in wages before it can be accepted.

A majority vote is required to make an award. The adjustment boards are composed of equal numbers of representatives of the carriers and the employees.

Members of the appeals board are to be appointed by the President for terms of two, three and four years, with the approval of the Senate and their salaries are fixed at \$10,000. There are nine members.

NEW HUNGARIAN NATIONAL ASSEMBLY CONVENES MONDAY

BUDAPEST, Monday, Feb. 16.—Hungary's new national assembly which was elected Jan. 25 convened today. It will be called upon to consider important matters during the session among them the acceptance or rejection of the peace treaty, determination of the future form of government for Hungary and economic laws.

Premier Huszar, in the course of his opening address, said: "Count Apponyi, who defends our cause before the world's court, has the confidence of the whole nation. We solemnly declare it is impossible to dissect Hungary into five countries. There can be no peace until unity is restored. We want a plebiscite and will not accept territorial dispositions provided for in the treaty without it."

HALE HOLDEN HAS RESIGNED POSITION AS RAIL DIRECTOR

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Hale Holden, railroad director of the Central Western state, has resigned, Director General Hines announced today.

H. H. Ashton, director of the North-western region, will take over Holden's authority until March 1, when railroads are to be returned to private control, according to present plans.

All regional directors will cease to function on March 1. Rail Director Hines sent a telegram to all regional directors thanking them for their cooperation.

WILL RESUME PLACE WITH BURLINGTON CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—Hale Holden will resume his place as president of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railway, when the railroads are returned to private ownership, it was announced today. His resignation as a regional director was to permit his assumption of his former tasks.

COLONEL CRAWFORD PROMINENT TEXAS ATTORNEY IS DEAD

DALLAS, Feb. 17.—Colonel William L. Crawford, prominent Texas attorney, died at his home here today. He was born 31 years ago in Estell, Kentucky. During the Civil War he was a lieutenant colonel of the 90th Texas Infantry.

Colonel Crawford was a member of the Texas constitutional convention of 1875. He got his early law training in the office of David B. Culbertson, father of Senator C. A. Culbertson, and his legal prowess gained for him a wide reputation in the South.

His death was a great loss to the legal profession in Texas. He was a man of high character and a devoted citizen.

He was a member of the bar of the state of Texas and had practiced law for many years. He was also a member of the Texas Bar Association.

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DR. GRAYSON IS AT WHITE HOUSE MONDAY NIGHT

Incident Gave Rise to Reports That He Had Been Summoned by Family.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Dr. Cary T. Grayson, President Wilson's personal physician, arrived at the White House about 11 o'clock last night, it was learned today. This gave rise to reports that he had been sent for by the President's family.

There was no confirmation early today of rumors that the President's health had caused Dr. Grayson to be summoned. At the White House it was stated that Dr. Grayson spent the night here.

Dr. E. R. Stitt, who was one of those in regular attendance on Wilson during his illness, called at the White House late yesterday. Upon leaving he declared he had not seen the President, but had merely dropped in to see Grayson on private business.

It was stated at the White House that there was no truth in rumors about Wilson being "up and shaving" and talking to Dr. Grayson.

DECLARES PRESIDENT CONTINUES TO IMPROVE WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—President Wilson continues to show improvement and was up early today, shaving himself and going about his usual routine, Admiral Grayson, his physician, said. Dr. Grayson's statement was prompted by published reports that the President had a relapse last night and that Dr. Francis X. Dey, a Philadelphia specialist, had been hurriedly summoned to the White House for a midnight conference.

Dr. Grayson said he had not been in communication with Dr. Dey since Saturday when the latter visited the White House and found the President making steady progress.

The President's cabinet probably will not meet this week, Dr. Grayson said, but he added that if the President desired to call one his physician would not object.

NERVE SPECIALIST NOT CALLED TO WHITE HOUSE PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Feb. 17.—Dr. F. X. Dey, nerve specialist, denied a report today that he had been summoned to Washington to attend President Wilson.

"The report is absolutely false," he said.

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 17.—As soon as the railroads are returned to private ownership, Kansas maintenance of way and railway shop laborers will file formal complaint with the court of industrial relations, asking investigation and an increase in wages.

Announcement of this move was the following conference between Judge Clyde Reed of the industrial court and A. H. Martin, head of the local Union Pacific and Rock Island unions.

PRICES FOR MEAT WILL SOON GO DOWN DECLARE PACKERS

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—Lower prices for meat in the near future was predicted today by the American Institute of Meat Packers. Resumption of pig-iron production in foreign countries and the low rates of foreign exchange will force the prices down, the institute declared in a statement issued here.

As an example of conditions in Europe, the institute cited the fact that England now had on hand a seven-months' supply of bacon, and American bacon which formerly was exported to the British Isles, must find a market in this country.

E. A. Cudahy Jr., a director of the institute, stated "lower prices were inevitable." He said just how soon prices will drop depends on the livestock supply.

The exportation of pork has now practically ceased, although 2,500,000 pounds were exported last year. Beef exports have also stopped, the statement said.

Thomas E. Wilson of Wilson and Co. said it was "reasonable to assume prices would go down," but he was not prepared to say how much or when.

CHICAGO PRISONERS TO WITNESS HANGING

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—Prisoners in the Cook county jail will witness executions in spite of protests made by women, public officials and others. Sheriff Peters announced today Jack O'Brien will be hanged Friday for the murder of a policeman and the procedure will be the same as in the hanging of Raffaelo Durango about a month ago. O'Brien will be executed with the prisoners in surrounding tiers of cells looking on, the sheriff said.

"The mere hanging of a particular subject is not meant to punish the subject alone," said the sheriff, "but the real object is to punish the criminal class. If capital punishment means anything at all it is a deterrent to further crime and an example to others. Every class is intended to reach are those confined in the jail."

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ONLY ONE BID FOR NINETEEN FORMER GERMAN STEAMERS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Contrary to expectation, only one bid for any of the 39 former German liners was received today when the shipping board auction to receive competing offers was resumed with the ships offered one at a time. A bid of \$550,000 for the Ostego by E. J. Roberts, Acme Operating Corporation, New York, was the only one made for the 19 steamers offered. Commissioner Scott then asked if there was any desire to bid further on groups of vessels and closed the auction when no offers were forthcoming.

The Leviathan, Agamemnon and George Washington were among those offered individually without attracting offers.

Commissioner Scott again informed bidders that all offers, received at the auction or previously made, would be submitted to congress before the board took action. When the District of Columbia court did not interfere with the sale.

In addition to the three big ships named, the Mount Vernon, Van Steuben, Martha Washington, America, De Kalb, Aetna, Huron, Maccasani, Mercur, Powhatan, Orion, President Grant, Nansemond, Philippines, Wyandotte and the Freedom were offered individually without any bidders.

According to shipping board calculation, the best offers received yesterday represented a total of \$21,800,000 which includes \$13,100,000 offered for six vessels by the International Mercantile Marine and a total of \$8,700,000 for nine ships individually.

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WARNING IS ISSUED AGAINST SOLICITORS WITHOUT AUTHORITY

Warning against solicitors for charitable purposes until the solicitors and their institutions have been cleared into and approved by some responsible local agency, such as the welfare association, was addressed to the people of Wichita Falls by the executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce at their meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, Kemp & Kell building, Tuesday morning. This action was taken following the calling of the attention of the body to operations of a solicitor for a school located in North Carolina which correspondents to whom inquiries were addressed declared of doubtful value. The correspondents further declared that the representations of the solicitor as to conditions in this section to be misleading and untrue. The particular case in question, on request of Mayor Marlow, has been referred over to the police department "with authority to act." QUESTIONS INVITED REGARDING DIFFICULT INCOME TAX POINTS

Through the courtesy of H. F. Bowen, in charge of this district of the internal revenue department, the Times will run a column of "questions and answers" of difficult points of the income tax law in an endeavor to cooperate with the taxpayers and help them solve their problems. The only requirement is that the questions concerned shall be actual conditions and not hypothetical cases where the taxpayer is trying to evade the letter of the law. In this manner, the more complicated questions, like those commonly confronting the oil man, who must render a statement of so many different transactions, can be answered for one case which will probably help a number of other oil men similarly affected, and will save time and worry for everybody concerned. To cite an example of a common case that often causes the taxpayer concern in making up his report is that of a man who buys a 20-acre oil lease for \$10,000 and sells one-half of it or 10 acres for \$10,000. Then he invests the profits in an other lease. How do you treat this transaction for income tax purposes? The answer is: "To establish the profit made on the above transaction you must first determine what was the cost of the portion of the lease which was sold, which is done as follows: 20 acres cost \$10,000; 10 acres cost \$5,000, the selling price is \$10,000, therefore the profit is \$5,000 and you still have one-half of the lease. If you invest \$5,000 profit in another lease and own it the last day of the taxable year you still have made \$5,000 and must pay income tax on this amount.

WOMEN TAKE UP RESPONSIBILITY AS VOTERS IN A SERIOUS WAY, SAYS LEADER OF ASSOCIATION

By CARRIE CHAPMAN CATT, President of National American Suffrage Association.

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—The seriousness with which the women of the fifty-first annual convention of the National American Woman Suffrage Association and the first annual convention of the League of Women Voters are meeting their new responsibility was indicated yesterday when the entire program of speeches in which the delegates had a personal interest was fitted out to make room for further discussion of the legislative program which the political parties will be asked to incorporate in their 1920 platforms.

Decorations of honor which were to be awarded to veteran suffrage workers gave way to earnest consideration of the proposed legislation recommended by committees of the League of Women Voters. First on the program came a list of laws asked in the name of the women workers of the nation—legislation aimed not at special privilege for women, but rather to bring the standards for working women up to that now prevailing for men in industry. Other legislation which the league is to back includes food regulation, compulsory education to improve citizenship, naturalization of married women on their own right, child labor laws, an adequate appropriation for the federal children bureau, the Sheppard-Towner bill for public protection of maternity and infancy, and social hygiene regulations.

The agreement specifically states:

REVENUE OFFICIAL TELLS HOW TO OBTAIN PRESCRIPTION BOOZE

AUSTIN, Feb. 17.—The following statement relative to the regulations governing the use and procurement of intoxicating liquors for medicinal purposes, is issued by the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

"Any physician duly licensed to practice medicine and actively engaged in the practice of such profession may obtain a permit to prescribe intoxicating liquor and may then issue prescriptions for distilled spirits, wines or certain alcoholic medicinal preparations for medicinal purposes for persons upon whom he is in attendance in cases where he believes that the use of liquor as a medicine is necessary. In no case may spirituous liquor be prescribed by one or more physicians in excess of one pint for the same person within any period of 10 days.

"No specific limitation is placed upon the quantity of wines which may be prescribed for medicinal purposes. The regulations merely require that no prescription be issued for a greater quantity than is necessary for use as a medicine. Physicians who do not hold permits to prescribe intoxicating liquor are under no circumstances permitted to issue prescriptions.

"All prescriptions for intoxicating liquor are required to be written on prescription blanks prescribed by the regulations (Form 1403), and to be provided by the bureau, except that in emergency cases physicians may use their regular prescription blanks provided the same contain the date of issue, amount prescribed, to whom issued, and directions for use, stating the amount and frequency of dose. Pending an adequate supply of the official blanks being printed and distributed to directors and acting directors, physicians holding permits have been authorized to issue prescriptions on blanks regularly used by them.

"Prescriptions for intoxicating liquor may be filled only by registered pharmacists who hold permits authorizing them to do so, or who are employed by retail druggists holding

such permits. Pharmacists and druggists holding such permits will procure their supplies of intoxicating liquor from manufacturers or other persons holding permits authorizing them to sell liquor.

"Persons to whom prescriptions for intoxicating liquor are issued by physicians may procure the liquor prescribed through pharmacists or druggists holding permits without obtaining a permit.

"Physicians may also obtain permits entitling them to procure not more than six quarts of distilled spirits, wines or certain alcoholic preparations during any calendar year for administration to their patients in emergency cases where delay in procuring liquor on a prescription through a pharmacist might have serious consequences to the patient.

"Provision is also made in the regulations for issuing permits to hospitals and sanatoriums to enable them to procure intoxicating liquor to be administered for medicinal purposes to patients at such institutions and also for issuing permits to manufacturing, industrial and other establishments maintaining first aid stations, authorizing them to procure such liquor for administration to their em-

ployes for medicinal purposes in emergency cases.

"All applications for permits above referred to should be made on Form 1404 in triplicate and forwarded to Collector of Internal Revenue.

"Complaints of exorbitant charges for liquor for medicinal purposes which place the dispensers thereof in the class of profiteers will be investigated."
