PROPOSES PAYMENT OF A LUMP SUM OF \$500 TO SOLDIERS

The governor bitterly assailed Russel on the floor of the Dimocratic state convention recently and the state house, in special sessions last week, investigated the so-cillet "Cat" charges. The investigation resulted in a report that there was no evidence upon which to base impeachment proceedings.

Russell's latest attack is in the form of a statement in which he proposes that the governor and himself party.

GERMANS ANXIOUS ABOUT FRIENDSHIP OF THE AMERICANS

By CARL D. GROAT.
(United Press Staff Correspondent.)
BERLIN, (By Mail.) — "What is sentiment in America toward Germany? Is America ever going to be friendly toward us again?" These are the most frequent ques-tions an American meets in traveling about Germany. The writer has just returned from a journey on which he had an opportunity to question—and be questioned. And he found that the two above constituted the leading things in which the travelers were interested.

some of them asked in the manner of people who didn't or wouldn't under stand why America came into the war. Others asked hopefully; they were for the most part persons with relatives in America, and they hoped that relations would again be friendly in the near future. Self-interest plays the largest role in

the questions. Germans realize America is the land with the money bags at this time. And they are interested in friendly relations mainly because they feel that such relations would mean added food and added raw ma-terials from the American storehouse. 


