NEWBERRY MANAGER DENIES COMMITTEE AIDED JAMES HELME

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH., March 6.—Paul H. King, manager of Senator Newberry's campaign in 1918, testifying in the Michigan election fraud trial today, denied that the Newberry committee financed the candidacy of James W. Helme.

Helme, entered the primary campaign in opposition to Henry Ford. The government contended his candidacy was fostered by the Newberry committee in order to defeat Ford and that Helme was paid a weekly salary by the Newberry committee.

PLAN SALE OF FIVE MILLION BARRELS OF FLOUR TO EUROPE

WASHINGTON, March 6.—A resolution authorizing the United States Grain Corporation to sell 5,000,000 barrels of soft wheat flour to needy European nations on credit was approved today by the house ways and means committee.

It will be offered as a substitute for the treasury department proposal that loans of \$50,000,000 be made to Austria, Poland and Armenia for food relief.

The reservation voted on was that exempting the United States from paying expenses of the league of nations without congressional action and it was readopted 46 to 25, after a proviso had been added excluding from the stipulation the office expenses and salary of the secretary-general.

Senator Kellogg, Republican, Minnesota, offered the proviso, which had been agreed to in the b-partisan conference and it was accepted 55 to 12, with both Republican and Democratic leaders supporting it.

In discussing the request for a conference between the president and Senator Simmons, while house officials pointed out that Senator Glass, Democrat, Virginia, recently had talked with Mr. Wilson, who on that occasion, they said, made clear his views on article ten.

Later in the day, however, Senator Glass denied on the senate floor that he had gone to the White House as an emissary of Democratic senators while many of his colleagues asserted privately that they considered final or definite, as to what the president would accept as a compromise.

Glass Declines to Say Senator Glass declined to say publicly what the president had told him regarding the treaty but other senators are understood from their knowledge of the conference to have gained the impression that Mr. Wilson would not pocket the treaty if it were ratified with article ten reservation drawn up.

STAFF OF THE BAPTIST MEMORIAL SANITARIUM QUIT THEIR POSITIONS

DALLAS, March 6.—The entire staff of the Baptist Memorial Sanitarium and the faculty of Baylor Medical College, a Baptist institution here, has tendered their resignation effective whenever desired, it was learned today.

The resignations are designed to permit easiest re-organization of the institutions in connection with a greater medical center program, for which it is expected the Rockefeller foundation will appropriate several million dollars.

The re-organized medical institution is expected to be second to none in the United States.

POPULATION OF CITIES ANNOUNCED BY BUREAU

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Population announcements for 1920 issued by the census bureau tonight:

Toledo, Ohio, 243,109, an increase of 71,612, or 44.3 per cent over 1910.

Charlotte, N. C., 46,318, an increase of 12,204, or 26.2 per cent.

The population of Charlotte, N. C., increased 80 per cent during the 10 years from 1910 to 1920. Toledo showed an increase of 71.6 per cent in the same time. Toledo had the

larger growth in the 12th census having increased 61.9 per cent in the 10 years from 1890 to 1900, while Cincinnati's increase was 66.8 per cent.

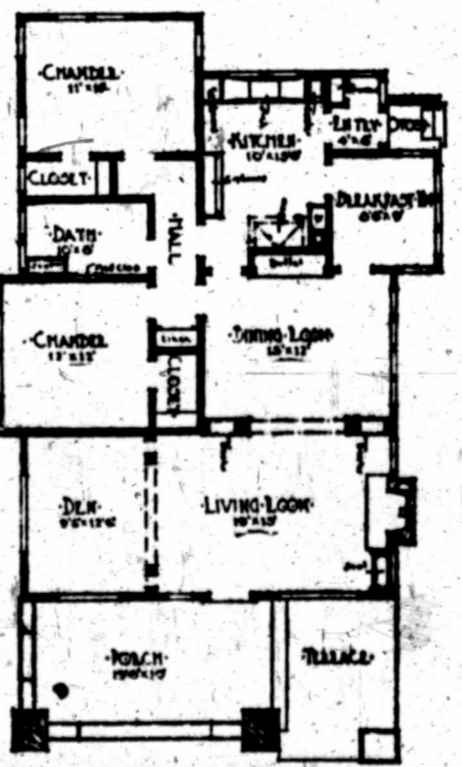

A House That Is A Home

This house contains a living room, dining room, den, two bedrooms, a breakfast room, bathroom and kitchen, besides a rear screened porch. The living room and dining room are connected by a colonnade opening, there is a low built-in book case on either side of the passage. The former room possesses a fireplace, construction of brown tile, with a small window seat to the right. In the latter room is an excellent buffet. Between the living room and the den is also a colonnade opening. The broad passageway connecting them enables these three rooms to be converted into virtually one large room, should such be desired, or by the use of portieres they may be satisfactorily closed. The woodwork of these rooms is of pine, finished to imitate mission oak. The floors are of polished oak. The walls are papered. A paneled wainscot is used in the dining room and the den. Along the side of the den is a built-in desk. Each of the two bedrooms contains a clothes closet, and in the hall, which connects these rooms with the bathroom, is a small linen closet. The bathroom has a built-in seat and a medicine cabinet, besides the usual fixtures. The kitchen possesses ample cupboard space, and the screened porch contains a closet for brooms.

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THREE POINTS IN AGREEMENT OF PREMIERS

Restrictions on the Issuance of Paper Money in European Countries.

SYSTEMATIC BUYING AND DISTRIBUTING MATERIALS

Steps to Facilitate the International Reduction of Armaments

By HENRY WOOD. United Press Staff Correspondent. PARIS, March 6.—The text of the widely discussed economic agreement drawn up by the council of premiers at its London conference embraces three main points. Stephen Lausanne, famous French editor, declared today:

Restrictions on the issuance of paper money through Europe. A combine of European nations for the systematic buying and distribution of raw materials. Steps to facilitate international reduction of armaments.

Lausanne has been in close touch with the French premier, Raymond Poincaré, he predicted, will accept the decisions reached on trade with Russia, the Turkish treaty and the decision to extend economic aid to Germany.

CHICAGO HAS AN EMBARGO ON ALL EXPRESS BY RAIL

Follows Strike of Insurgent Clerks Who Demand an Increase in Wages.

CHICAGO, March 6.—An embargo today was placed against all express shipments except newspapers and funeral equipment by the American Railway Express Company following the strike of "insurgent" railway express clerks who demanded an increase in wages of 25 per cent.

TRUSTEES WIN THE CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CASE

Board of Directors Restrained From Interfering With the Society.

BOSTON, MASS., March 5.—The trustees of the Christian Science Publishing Society today won their suit against the Christian Science board of directors to restrain the directors from interfering with the society.

At the same time, John V. Dittmore won his suit for reinstatement as a member of the board of directors. John Frederick Dodge, as special master, found that the directors had no legal right to remove Rowlands from the board of trustees and that the charges against him were not sufficient in law nor made in good faith.

The suit involved interpretation of two deeds of trust made by Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy, founder of the church. The first, made in September, 1892, gave to four trustees, to be known as the "Christian Science Board of Directors" with certain powers, the real estate upon which the mother church was later erected.

The second deed, dated January 15, 1898, gave the trustees the property of the Christian Science Publishing Society upon certain perpetual and irrevocable for the promotion of the interests of the Christian Science, and required payment of the net profits to the treasury of the mother church.

The suit was prosecuted in March, 1919, when the board of directors, composed of Mrs. Annie M. Knott, Dittmore, Rowlands, and John V. Dittmore, attempted to displace Rowlands. After voting to do this, the board passed another resolution which after reciting certain reasons, voted to displace Dittmore. The trustees immediately brought suit to restrain the members of the board of directors from interfering with the publishing society and to declare the action of the board illegal.

JAPAN WILL NOT GIVE UP CONTROL OF VLADIVOSTOK

Also Plan to Hold the Chinese Eastern Railway and Junction Trans-Baikal

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Although planning to withdraw the bulk of her troops from Siberia, Japan will not relinquish control of Vladivostok and vicinity, the Chinese Eastern railway and the strategic railroad junction in the Trans-Baikal, according to official information received here.

Japan appears to be proceeding with plans to remove troops now guarding the long line of Siberian railway in the Amur and maritime provinces where the heaviest Japanese casualties have occurred and the principal conflict with the Russians have arisen.

The Chinese Eastern railway connects with the Trans-Siberian line at a point about one hundred miles east of Vladivostok. It is said that the maintenance of troops at that point would mean control of all the Siberian rail lines west of Vladivostok.

THREE ARE ARRESTED LATE SATURDAY ON A CHARGE OF FORGERY

Three alleged forgers were taken into custody late Saturday following a series of attempts to pass forged instruments at local mercantile establishments. "I must qualify my word, beautiful," the speaker hastened to add. "Perfection of feature is not enough. Beauty must be more than skin deep. The most perfect features in the world without the womanly emotions to back them up, to give them tone, are flat as a plaster side wall."

"I thought artists did not bother about that sort of thing," was ventured. "Isn't it mostly contour and coloring they demand in their models?"

"If that were all," sighed the artist, "our search would be easy. There are girls coming to this studio every day with features to shame a Greek goddess. Their coloring and contour are perfect, absolutely without a flaw. Yet two minutes conversation, sometimes even a second glance, convinces me they are impossible. Stupidity in the answer, stupidity that crushes overtone which blots out every vestige of beauty, erases it as effectively as a piece of felt drawn across the chalked profile on a blackboard."

No inspiration! Stupidity. "It is utterly impossible for me to derive any inspiration from a dull-witted beauty, no matter how perfect her features may be. I cannot work up even a casual interest in my drawing. I cannot feel my work. I have tried it many times, in a pinch but the

trial has invariably ended in the waste basket.

"A woman must have a soul to swing the brush of the artist. She must have emotion, vivacity, life and thought. You have been to the theater and seen the different effects produced by throwing varicolored lights on the same scene? So various emotions and feelings reflect themselves in the face of a sensitive woman. They are radiant lights, shining from within. Eliminate them and you have nothing more than a piece of cold, clammy clay."

Which, I wondered, interested Mr. Christy most, blondes or brunettes? I asked him.

"Personally," he replied, "type is rather a matter of indifference. As an artist I prefer blondes. There seems to be more color in them for portraiture. Their coloring is more effective in drawings, especially the gold tints in their hair."

"Brunettes usually have straight hair, which gives severity to the subject. Any number of brunette models call here, and invariably they draw their hair back smooth from their face. Very few faces can stand such a frame. They are enhanced by a soft outline. I have seen fairly good looking women make themselves hideous by affecting an exaggerated style of hairdress whereby they pulled and plastered their hair away from their faces."

"As an artist I always feel like

stepping up to them and saying, 'Madame, if you will loosen your hair over the ears and about the temples you will cease to resemble a cartoon and look almost human.'"

"As to size," I suggested, "do you like us large or small, tall or short, billywig, bun pole, or fair to middling?"

"Rather tall, not too thin," Mr. Christy was quite decided on these points. "When I get a tiny, attenuated creature to draw I feel as if there was nothing there, nothing to work on. For the same reason I find children difficult to do. In real life, too, I admire the girl of some stature, the healthy, vital looking woman. She seems to me more typical of the spirit of American womanhood."

"Perhaps you have had, or have now, a favorite model who embodies all of these ideas," was suggested.

"Which of all the women you have drawn interested you most?"

"A pause, replete with hesitancy—hesitancy with a satisfied smile to lend it poignancy.

"Yes," after a while, "I have a favorite model. She embodies all of these ideas. I don't know whether I should tell who she is or not. You see, if I do I may be accused of being biased, even spiteful. The carpenter will cry, 'Of course, Christy chose her. He had to.' But if your choice is the true one, surely you do not care for the carpenter," I urged.

"No, that is right. My friends will know I am on the level, and the others do not mind anyhow."

"And the favorite model?"

"My wife."

It was out. The artist watched me intently for any lingering signs of doubt that might convince themselves. He saw only gratification—and added interest. At my request he told me what Mrs. Christy is like.

"She is blond, dark blond I suppose you might call her, the brown-gold style," he said. "Her eyes are blue, sort of a gray-blue with tints of hazel in them. Her height is medium and her build rather inclined to athletic but athletic with none of the soft feminine curves lost. She has been the inspiration for much of my best work. Remember Saxon in Jack London's 'Valley of the Moon'?"

"She posed for Saxon. She has been the model for the majority of my war posters. There is a picture I am doing of her now."

We turned toward where an easel reared its frame in the firelight shadows. A wonder woman with gold-brown hair and brooding blue-gray eyes reflecting a trace of the bronze in the hair, was taking form on a great square of white poster paper. No wonder the artist turns to his wife for inspiration!

"And age," I asked. "At what time of life do you find a woman holds your deepest fancy?"

"Generally speaking, around 35," was Mr. Christy's decision. "It is then, to me, she reaches the flood tide of her womanliness."

Age uncertain quantity. So much depends on how a woman treats herself. She can burn herself out at 30, and she can be fresh with youth at 40. Go into the pleasure haunts of the cities where the crowds are gulping life in great gulping draughts and you will see women who will be used up and dry before they are out of their twenties.

Go into a sane, well ordered home, where women are living a sane, well ordered life, keeping reasonable hours, eating nourishing food, enjoying wholesome pleasures, thinking clean thoughts, taking care that they are well groomed and well uniformed, and you will see women who have stumbled upon the fountain of youth and have taken a plunge in its magic waters. The bright lights of Broadway have left little a beauty to early oblivion.

"A very young girl, Miss Seventeen, interests me immensely, but only as a child."

I asked Mr. Christy if he would be good enough to lend me a photograph of himself.

"Nancy," he called, "where are those photographs?"

"What photographs?" came a soprano voice from somewhere aloft.

On a balcony stretching its carved rail along one side of the studio appeared a tall, statuesque, dark-blond with gray-blue eyes and a complexion like a Marshall Ney rose. She leaned over the rail and smiled down at her artist-husband.

A beauty with a soul! Howard Chandler Christy has made a most convincing choice.

TO MAKE EXTENSIVE LAKE IMPROVEMENTS FOR COMING SEASON

The contract for all of the coming season, including the pavilion, swimming pool, boating and everything controlled by the traction company, was closed Saturday with W. D. Barney, president of the Wichita Falls Amusement Company. It is understood this company contemplates spending a good deal of money on improvements and hope to make this resort one of the best equipped and most attractive to pleasure seekers in the entire state. While the tentative date for the opening of the summer season has not been announced it is thought it will be between the 15th of April and the first of May.

Plans will be undertaken, according to L. L. Albritton, manager of the Wichita Falls Traction Co., within the next 30 days to provide a good schedule for car service to the lake and they will make ample provision to take care of the heavy traffic which warm weather will bring.

QUESTION OF PARTICIPATION IN SUIT AGAINST GAS COMPANY TO BE TAKEN UP ON MONDAY NIGHT

Whether or not Wichita Falls will participate in the suit for a receiver-ship for the Lone Star Gas company recently brought by the City of Dallas, will probably be decided Monday night at a special meeting of the council. It was announced by Mayor Marlow Saturday. It is expected that by that time the members of the city council who are absent from the city will have returned and a meeting possible. Although he made no definite statement, Mayor Marlow indicated that his attitude toward entry into the suit on the part of the city was favorable. Should the council, after a full discussion, come to the conclusion that the appointment of a receiver would have a beneficial effect on the gas situation, B. F. Johnson, who represented the city council and the business council of the Chamber of Commerce at a meeting of representatives of the cities served by distributing companies who receive their gas from the Lone Star Gas company, where the sentiment of the representatives on the whole was in favor of joining the suit brought by Dallas, will probably be called on for a report at the Monday meeting.

The suit for a receiver was brought by the City of Dallas following an examination of the books of the Lone Star Gas company by representatives of the city, the attitude taken by the plaintiff being that the company's efforts to secure and develop new sources of gas supply had not been as diligent as should have been the case in view of the earnings of the company made through their operations.

VENIRE OF 100 MEN EXHAUSTED WITHOUT SECURING FULL JURY

A special venire of 100 men was exhausted with the selection of only 11 jurors in the case of Charlie and John Burnside, being tried before Judge Edgar Scurry in the 78th district court on a charge of murder and final selection of the jury was postponed until Monday morning at 9:00 o'clock. The special venire of 100 men was called for Thursday morning but actual selection of the jury was not commenced until Friday. Scores of prospective jurors were excused when they asserted conscientious scruples in assessing the death penalty or were excused due to the fact that they had fixed opinions regarding the case.

John and Charlie Burnside are being tried on an indictment alleging murder and robbery in connection with the death of Kenneth Goodwin, refinery worker, purported to have occurred in North Wichita on the night of February 20.

Von Bernstorff Declares Diplomacy Shot's Finish Work of President Wilson.

BERLIN, March 6.—German diplomacy "must take up the struggle at that point where President Wilson permitted it to slip away from him," said Count Von Bernstorff, former German ambassador in Washington, at a mass meeting of university students in a discussion of the nation's foreign policies.

Von Bernstorff declared that the president had merely touched upon the problem of negotiating a just peace but failed to solve it, after being first to assert that the war was not to end in the creation of a new balance of power.

Count Von Bernstorff said he had warned against any attempt to achieve a revision of the treaty through negotiations with industrial and financial powers. Such a procedure, he characterized as a "dangerous illusion" which was calculated to expose Germany to the charge that she was intriguing.

"In punishing Germany," he said, "the entente forgot to take cognizance of the economic conditions of the world at large. The vanquished are unable to pay the war costs of the victors; the whole world with the exception of the United States, is bankrupt."

In connection with her declaration Germany must convince the entente that she was unable to meet the treaty's conditions unless given raw products and ample credits which will enable her to work off the indemnity, he declared.

Discussing the League of Nations, Von Bernstorff said that Germany should not beg to be received into it, which would be undignified, but must indicate through her disposition and her attitude that she was willing to join.

DRUNK PICKED UP FROM DENVER TRACK; HAS \$80 ON PERSON

A drunk who was picked up by the city police Saturday night ought to be grateful—they saved his life and his money. He was found in a drunken stupor and nearly frozen to death, in the middle of a railroad track in the Denver yards and when he was searched \$80 in bills of small denomination. He was brought to the city hall and given a bed in the "emergency hospital" alongside of the man who attempted suicide several days ago and who is passing through several uncertain days. Under the warming influence of the stove he thawed out a little but still remained motionless.

Assistant Police Commissioner Goodyellow examined him and discussed the probability of using a stomach pump on account of his lifelessness suggestive of wood alcohol poisoning. Outside of the money the only possessions of the man was a half empty bottle of tabasco sauce.

The man may not feel very grateful to the officers for arresting him but if they hadn't he would have undoubtedly been robbed, run over by a train or would have frozen to death.

RIVERS AND STREAMS BREAK OUT OF BANKS

Three Ships are Driven Ashore and Others Are Reported in Danger.

The east was suffering from combined storm and flood conditions today resulting in hundreds of thousands of dollars damage.

The blizzard which recently swept the west turned into terrific gale as it swirled its way across the eastern Atlantic states and out to sea.

Rivers and streams in eastern Pennsylvania and in New Jersey broke over their banks last night and early today, flooding large areas and driving hundreds of families from their homes.

Three steamships were reported aground on the Atlantic seaboard; telegraph and telephone lines are down from the weight of sleet and the fierceness of the gale all over the northeast portion of the country and New England is in the storm center.

The United States coast guard cutter Manning was speeding to the assistance of the steamer Marsodak, which went aground between during the night at Rehoboth Bay, Delaware.

The steamer Orient reported she was aground off Ocean View Beach, near Hampton Roads. She has asked assistance.

The steamer Morristown asked immediate aid from Tulsa, reporting herself aground five miles north of Fernandina, Fla.

The steamer Rock Island reported she is aground in a heavy fog off Crowley's Point.

The mercury in New York city dropped from 46 yesterday afternoon to 13 early today, changing a heavy rain to sleet and then to snow.

STILL COLDER WAVE FOR KANSAS CITY

KANSAS CITY, MO., March 6.—Still colder weather tonight with the minimum temperature near zero, was the weather forecast today. Tomorrow will be fair and cold and may bring some relaxation of the storm, weather experts said.

VIGOROUS PROTEST AGAINST ABOLITION OF DIFFERENTIAL

AUSTIN, March 6.—Vigorous protests against abolition of Texas differential territory in the new interstate tariffs to be published will be made by Chairman Allison Mayfield of the railroad commission to the interstate commerce commission at Washington March 16, he said today.

Mayfield contended that if Texas differentials are abolished in the interstate tariffs, it would be only a short time before Shreveport would invoke what is known as the "Shreveport doctrine" and demand the abolition of intrastate tariffs, thus spreading the common point blanket over the entire state.

QUICK TO WIND UP RED CROSS ACTIVITIES

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Herbert Quick, of West Virginia, former member of the federal farm loan board, was named today to head the commission winding up red cross activities in Siberia. He will sail soon for Vladivostok.

WANTS GOVERNMENT TO BUY ALL LIQUOR NOW HELD IN BOND

WESTERVILLE, OHIO, March 6.—Purchase by the federal government of all liquor stocks in bond is urged by the Anti-Saloon League, in a statement issued here today at the league's national headquarters by Ernest H. Cherrington, secretary of the league's executive committee. The statement says:

"Now that prohibition has gone into effect everything which the government can do to make it easy to enforce the law should be done. With over sixty million gallons of whiskey in bonded warehouses, there is a constant temptation to devise ways and means of utilizing that liquor in spite of the law. Moreover, so long as that whiskey is in existence, those who own it, realizing as they do, its commercial value ex-

PROBABILITY OF AN EXTENSION OF ROCK ISLAND FROM GRAHAM AS A RESULT OF BRAZOS BRIDGE

THROCKMORTON, TEX., March 6.—Just as the development of Stephens and Eastland county resources is being promoted by construction of the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth Railroad through those counties, the development of Throckmorton and parts of Young county is to be accomplished by some body extending the Rock Island railroad from Graham west. Graham is the old county seat town of Young county. The Rock Island railroad was ordered out last fall for west into the country from Bridgeport a few years ago and probably destroyed by the head of a steel bridge in order to cross the Brazos River and get into Throckmorton county. Throckmorton county has no railroads. It is like Stephens county was prior to beginning construction on the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth Railroad that is now awakening the hills of that county with its labor pains of construction. The Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth Railroad will build a steel bridge over the Brazos River at Newcastile. It may be that the east and west line from Graham—that seems to be adumbrated by the development to the west of Graham—will be able to use the same bridge. That will be an elegant simplification of the railroad situation for Throckmorton county and will give to the southern part of Young county an east and west line crossing the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth line that runs north and south through the county. The territory embraced in the counties of Erath, Eastland, Stephens, Young, Archer, Throckmorton, Callahan, Baylor, Shackelford and Palo Pinto is growing more rapidly and substantially than any other part of West Texas. This growth began with the development and prospecting for oil. It is stimulated by the agricultural and livestock interests of the territory in question and by the great natural resources in the form of minerals, clays, gins and coal that are abundant and undeveloped as yet in most of the region. In the area traversed by the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth Railroad there are veins of coal at the surface and other deeper as disclosed by well logs that are going to be important factors later in the industries of Stephens county. The old court house at Breckenridge, before the discovery of gas was for

many years heated by coal taken from outcrops on the banks of Gonzales Creek. The same outcrops are found further up the creek in the vicinity of the new towns of Frankell and Brockwalker in the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth Railroad. The coal fields of the southern and central part of Young county are known and are being worked to advantage at this time. The railroad builders are making a new and most attractive country out of the counties mentioned. They are undeveloped from many points of view. They are all in the territory that is being tested or producing oil and natural gas. They are areas of good valley lands and great industrial possibilities—ideal places for the farmer, stock raiser or manufacturer, having good soil, abundant raw material and natural gas that promises ideal cheap fuel for many years with a reserve of coal that will continue to supply for many more years.

Organized labor in Moncton, N. B. has elected five aldermen and will control the city council.
The shortage of labor has caused a shutdown of over half the tinplate mills in South Wales.
Sheet metal workers in Los Angeles, Cal., have been granted an increase of \$1 a day in wages.
The National Confederation of Workers in Spain, comprising 1,000,000 members, has been dissolved.
In 1916-17 in India there were 254,499 persons employed in cotton mills and 262,552 in jute mills.
Sugar plantation workers in Honolulu have suspended work pending a settlement of their wage differences.
The insurance department of the Pennsylvania Department of Labor announces that the "insured payrolls of Pennsylvania in the principal industries are so

large that the Keystone state will practically be self-determining in the future as respects to compensation insurance rates for these industries."
All records of shipbuilding in the state of Maine for more than half a century were broken last year.
The United States Steel Corporation expended \$723,707.45 for pensions to employees during the year of 1919.
Through the closing of the Berlin railway repair shops 7000 workers temporarily are without employment.
A 44-hour work week and a minimum wage of \$48 per week is the latest demand of Chicago window washers.
Members of the St. John's (N. F.) Journeymen Bakers' Union have been given an increase in wages amounting to 40 per cent.
Rural letter carriers in the State of Washington have organized and have affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.
Of the 3,802,750 men who had been demobilized in Great Britain up to January 2, 3,361,334 had been absorbed in industry.
Several banking and shipping firms in Japan have distributed among their employees bonuses ranging from 20 to 200 per cent.
Organized reed workers in Los Angeles, Cal., as a result of an organizing campaign have been able to increase their daily wages.
During 1918 in the mines in Great Britain there were 135 coal mine fatalities due to explosions, of which 85 were at the bituminous mines.
A commission appointed by governor Smith of New York has granted a wage increase of 15 per cent to garment workers in that state.

KNOWLEDGE FOR CAR OWNERS

Interesting and Important Facts That Every Motorist Should Know.

A garage should never be allowed to become a warm, far more than is desirable to the car.

It is essential that radiator oil should be changed after every 100 miles of running.

Always put a cloth over the fenders when working on the engine so as to prevent soiling them.

Never put curtains away when they are damp or wet. If you do they will surely become mildewed. Always dry them before stowing away.

In slippery or snowy weather a piece of rough carpet comes in handy when starting the car by placing the carpet under the back wheels. It gives them something to start from and keeps them from skidding.

If there is a sudden thaw in the weather don't forget to remove the cover from the front of the radiator.

The best method of cleaning spark plugs that have become fouled with oil is to boil them in a solution of washing soda and water.

Tires will last much longer if they are changed over from time to time. It does them no good to have them exposed to the sun and rain on the running board or at the rear of the car.

Never fill the tank with gasoline from discarded oil cans. The chances are that these contain some oil residue that goes into your car along with the fuel which is detrimental to the clear working of the mechanism.

Sediment in time will collect in the bowl of the carburetor and from time to time the drain cock in the bottom should be opened to rid the instrument of any foreign particles which may have accumulated.

A section of bronze bushing stock makes an admirable bronze hammer which is useful about the sheet metal parts of the body and fenders. By threading a steel bar, running on a nut and then placing another nut on the outside, the head of the hammer is retained.

Horseshoe nails may be made into very satisfactory battery connectors by soldering about a foot of insulated wire, one nail on each end. The nails are then driven into the battery post under the connector. If the nails get dull or bent they may be easily sharpened or straightened again.

A slightly tapering bolt with a number of steel washers under the head so that by removing one or more the bolt may be tightened in its bearings makes an excellent steering gear connection. Too much adjustment cannot be given to obtaining dependable steering gears.

If a hub cap is so tight that you cannot budge it with a wrench by your own efforts, bring a jack into play. Always use a fairly long handled wrench and place the jack under the end of the handle. A few strokes of the jack will get the best of the stubbornest hub cap.

When making a journey where garages are few and far between, always make it a rule to have an extra tire and tube and see that the air pump is in good condition. Also that the rubber glue and patch kit, as it will save many a weary hour

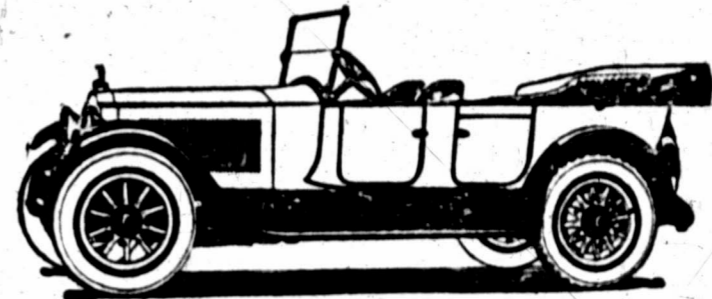

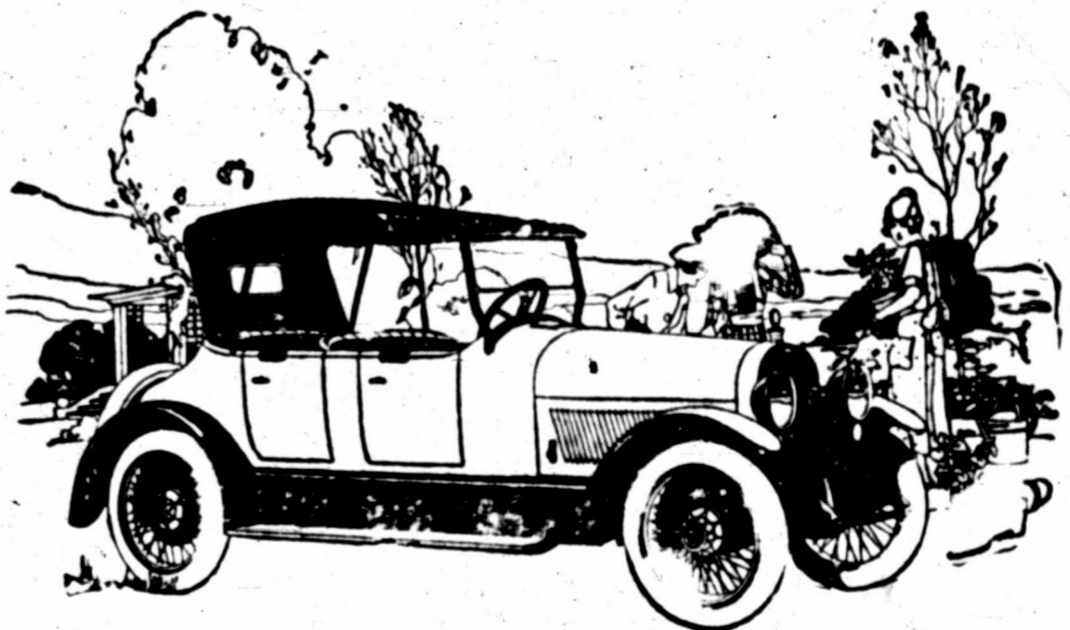

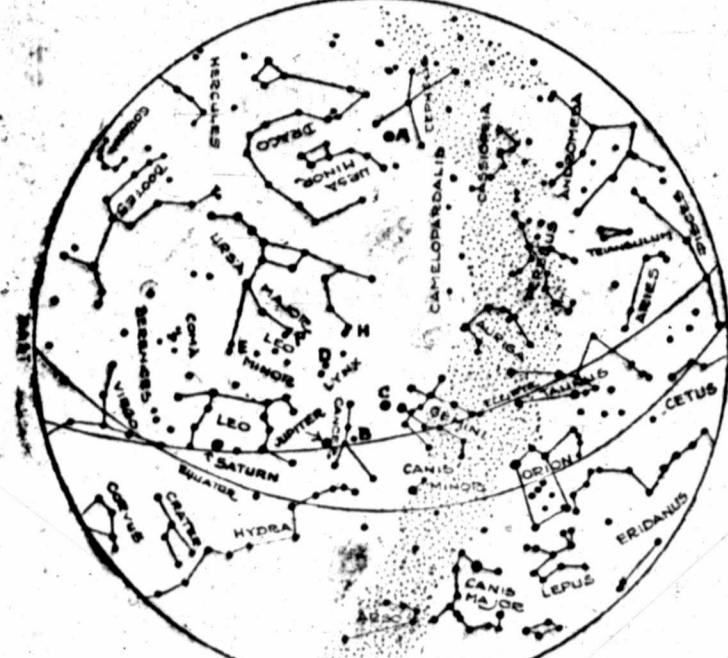


Fig. 1—The Constellations March 1, 9 p. m. (if facing south hold the map upright; if facing east hold it inverted...)

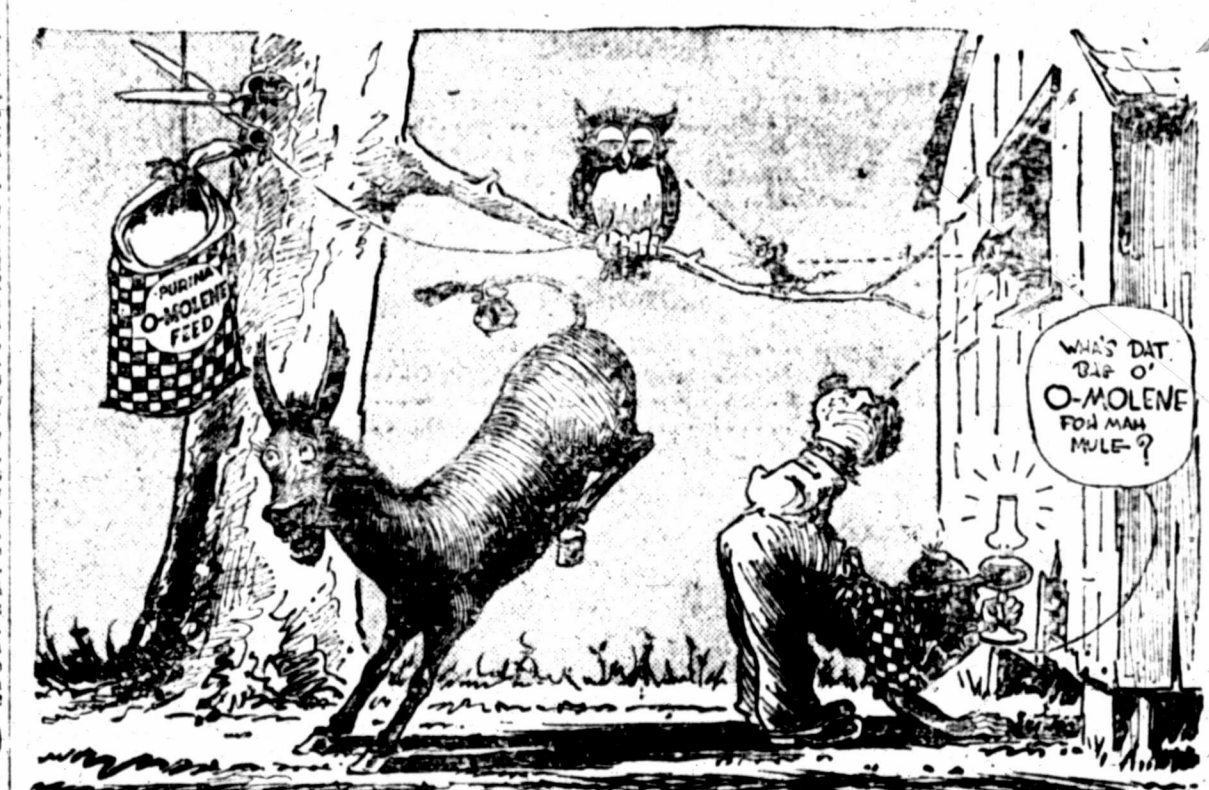

WILL BE A DELAY IN THE REMOVAL OF THE DENVER OFFICES

The Denver offices will not be moved into their new building for about two months, according to an announcement from the superintendent's office Saturday.

following a raid upon a rooming house in the business section of the city by Deputy Constables Belcher and Spiller. She was found lying semi-conscious upon a cot suffering from an overdose of herion, officials say.

The story told by the youthful habitue is filled with pathos and plainly shows the fiendish actions of a certain gang of drug peddlers of this city who purposely cause young women to form the drug habit in order that the illicit traffickers might have a market for their wares.

The young woman told officers that she had been lured into a dining booth of a downtown cafe, where a "nice looking young man" had persuaded her to take just "one tablet" of herion. She declares that after "I had taken one grain of herion my appetite for the drug immediately became uncontrollable and I would often visit the dope peddlers' headquarters in order to get a fresh supply of the drug."

Herion is one of the most deadly narcotics known to the medical world. It is derivative of opium and although closely resembling morphine sulphate in toxic reactions is said to be much stronger and when the drug habit has once seized its victim, it is hard to ever break the shackles of its slavery. Local officials say that there are

many youthful herion habitues in this city.

In a raid upon a local hotel recently officers found a large supply of morphine together with hypodermic needles. Officials are certain that drug peddlers maintained headquarters here and that addicts frequented the place to secure a supply of their precious drug. Four girls were arrested when the place was raided. Two young men, well known to the underworld of this city are being held by federal authorities under charges of violating the Harrison anti-narcotic act.

Investigations carried out here by federal officials disclose that narcotic drugs are being sold upon the streets of Wichita Falls at prices almost unparalleled in the history of the bootleggers' art. One ounce of morphine sulphate is known to have brought as high as \$85, which is several times the regular market quotation for the drug.

Officers believe that at least some of the contraband narcotics being sold in this city have been smuggled here from Mexico. It is certain, however, that most of it has been secured through illicit physicians' prescriptions or by other fraudulent methods.
