TO ASK CONTEMPT PROCEEDINGS AGAINST THE TEXAS RANGERS

ENID, OKLA., March 13.—Frank W.
Dale, attorney for the Judsonia De-

not vacate until told to do so by

DEMOCRATS MEET IN DALLAS TO PLAN FOR THE CAMPAIGN

DALLAS, March 12.—The administration democratic executive committee met here today to consider plans for the campaign, outlined at a state-wide conference in Dallas last Saturday, looking to the election of delegates to the national democratic convention who will support the Wilson administration. A campaign manager and select committees were to be appointed during the day's session, it was said.

The sessions today were executive, reporters and other "outsiders" being barred. It was understood the committee expected to take action on the "challenge" of the Bailey faction, issued yesterday, that William Poinsett, of Cleburne, and Governor Hobby go before the democratic voters of Texas in a primary May 1 as the respective candidates of the Bailey faction for delegate at large to the national convention. This, it was declared, would give the voters an opportunity to pass on the principles of the two factions.

The resolution adopted by the council follows:
"Whereas, Report in the Evening Times of this date indicates that the Rotary Club has resolved that alleged high wages paid workers is entirely responsible for the high cost of necessities of life and that by inference high wages alone constitute a serious menace to industrial and commercial life and social organization of the country;

"Whereas, The facts appear to be that in Wichita Falls as in many other places a relatively smaller part of the cost of necessities than heretofore is traceable to wages or salaries included in cost of production;

"Whereas, The Rotary Club has either through ignorance or malice indicated a prejudice against organized labor in the action as reported in the Evening Times of this date, in that no mention is made of condemnation expressed of rent profiteers, excess commissions to stock brokers and promoters, or of unearned profits to vacant lot owners who strangle city development on the reasonable cost basis desired by the Rotary Club and penalize those who aspire to build a city and also ignore higher rates of interest charged by banks and others when mathematical calculations will clearly indicate that cost factors based on percentage should remain stationary or decrease if the charge that labor factors were entirely at fault in higher costs of manufacture is to be maintained;

"Whereas, Better comprehension and understanding of all facts and problems involving the matter tends toward nearer justice and equity and minimum friction and misunderstanding, therefore,

"Be It Resolved, That the Central Trades Labor Council of Wichita Falls respectfully asks the Rotary Club to submit the proof of its charges for similar publication or debate the issues and charges that labor is entirely responsible to society before any impartial tribunal, the Rotary Club and the Central Trades Labor Council to represent the respective sides in the matter, the Rotary Club to substantiate its charges by taking the affirmative of charges as made.
