HOOVER STATES SITUATION WAS A CRITICAL ONE

Festifies Regarding Conditions in Europe Result of Sinking of Allied Ships. WORST PERIOD WAS FROM APRIL UNTIL SEPTEMBER. Mr. Hoover Was Called Before The Committee at the Request Of Admiral Sims.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—While refusing to comment on military plans or policies, Herbert Hoover today told the senate committee investigating the navy department's conduct of the war that owing to the loss of food and heavy sinking of allied merchant ships by German submarines, conditions abroad were critical from April until September, 1917.

WANTS PERMIT FOR INCREASE IN EXPRESS RATES

American Asks to Be Allowed to Make Advance of From 10 to 75 Per Cent. WASHINGTON, March 13.—Increased express charges, ranging from 10 to 75 per cent and estimated to yield \$25,000,000 additional revenue annually, were asked by the American Railway Express Company in a petition filed today with the interstate commerce commission.

SIMS SAYS THAT INFORMATION WAS KEPT FROM HIM

Declares He Was Left in Dark During the Critical Days Of The War. DELAY AND CONFUSION AND LOSS OF CONFIDENCE. First Learned of Important Naval Movements Through the British or French.

Sims today declared that the navy department kept him in the dark as to vital operations during critical days of the war, thereby leading to delay and confusion and causing allied naval forces in Europe to lose confidence in the American naval staff.

PLAN FOR U. S. TO OPERATE THE HAMBURG LINE

Program Being Worked Out To Take Over and Operate Pre-War Trade Routes. ANY ARRANGEMENT WILL BE A CO-OPERATIVE ONE. Sixty Routes Include Those To Germany, the Orient and South America.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—A plan under which American steamship companies would take over and operate with American ships the sixty pre-war world trade routes of the Hamburg-American line is being worked out by the shipping board, subject to the approval, it is understood, of the German company.

NEW GOVERNMENT PROCLAIMED FOLLOWING THE OVERTHROW OF PRESIDENT EBERT AND CABINET

BERLIN, March 13.—It is reported that it is intended to proclaim Field Marshal Von Hindenburg "imperial president." PARIS, March 13.—The Ebert government in Germany has established its seat in Dresden, the capital of Saxony, according to advices this afternoon. LONDON, March 13.—Herr Noske, minister of defense, the Ebert government, has surrendered to the new government, according to reports received here from Berlin.

GERMAN LEADERS ISSUE PROCLAMATION

BERLIN, March 13.—Chancellor Kapp of the new German government and Major General Von Luttwitz, have issued following proclamation: "The overthrow of the government must not be taken as a reactionary. On the contrary, it is a progressive measure of patriotic Germans of all parties, with a view to re-establish law, order, discipline and honest government in Germany. It is an overdue attempt to lay the foundations for the economic resurrection of Germany, enabling her to fulfill those conditions of the peace treaty, which are reasonable and not self-destructive."

WASHINGTON, March 13.—News of the revolution in Germany sustained the conviction of some officials and diplomats here that a test of strength between the socialist and the military and conservative element was inevitable. They said the military and conservative parties had seized upon every opportunity to secure the enforcement of the armistice and peace terms to goad the German people into resistance and had not found it difficult to listen to responsibility for the acceptance of these terms on the Ebert government.

CHICAGO PAPER IS DEFENDANT IN SUIT \$150,000 DAMAGES

CHICAGO, March 13.—Mrs. Jennie M. Vale, mother of Mrs. Ruth Randall, a wealthy divorcee, who a week ago killed Clifford Blyer, wealthy advertising man and then ended her own life, brought suit for \$150,000 damages against the Illinois Publishing and Printing Company, publishers of the Chicago Herald-Examiner, today.

ST. LOUIS REJECTS THE DAYLIGHT SAVING PLAN

ST. LOUIS, March 13.—Hopes of St. Louis workers for an extra recreation hour this summer were "doomed" today, following rejection of a daylight saving ordinance last yesterday, 22 to 4.

CONGRESSMAN EAGLE CAUSES A SENSATION WITH ADVERSE REPLY

NEW YORK, March 13.—A letter from Representative Joe H. Eagle of Texas, declaring "women's club work should be making one good man a good wife and properly rearing a family," caused a sensation in the women's chamber of commerce, a national organization of professional and business women. The letter was the only "adverse" reply. It was said, received from more than a score of governors and public officials in the country to a request to give the organization all aid possible.

MINE WORKERS TO FIGHT KANSAS LAW TO FINISH

KANSAS CITY, MO., March 13.—With the declaration that the United Mine Workers of America intended "to fight the Kansas industrial court law to a finish," Alexander Howat, president, adjourned the biennial convention of the miners here this afternoon. "Governor Allen," the miners head declared to the convention, "is going to have a chance to demonstrate his law. There is going to be a fight. A strike is called in Kansas—and I am inclined to think it will be called. It will be a strike not only in protest against this law, but a strike to show the operators they must respect the rights of the United Mine Workers of America."

SECOND SHIPMENT ARMS FROM JAPAN REACHES MEXICO

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., March 13.—Authentic advices received here today of the landing several days ago at Manizillo, Mexico, on the Pacific coast, of a second shipment of arms from Japan conveyed by the Mexican cruiser Yakuma. The shipment is said to consist of artillery and was brought on a merchant ship. The cruiser Yakuma then departed for south of California waters. The first shipment of arms from Japan to Mexico was reported unloaded in January, but later denied.

DEATH SENTENCE IN 46 CASES OF GERMAN GUILTY IS DEMANDED

PARIS, March 13.—The allied test list of war guilty has been sent to the Berlin government, it was learned today. The list totals 46 names. A death sentence is demanded for each of the accused. The allies reserve the right to take "other measures" in each case if they consider the findings of the German tribunal at Leipzig, before which the accused will be tried, as unequal. The list, it was understood, includes the name of Enver Pasha, former leader of the young Turks party and now understood to be in league with the Turkish rebels, and Talaat Pasha, former grand vizier. Both the accused Turks are said to be in Berlin.

Governor Wires Rangers To Remain on the Job In Disputed Territory

Texas rangers holding litigated oil lands in northern Wichita county Saturday morning received a telegram from Governor William P. Hobby ordering them not to relinquish possession of the disputed territory, according to authentic information given out in Wichita Falls Saturday. It is understood that the rangers accepted service from federal officials but refused to leave the litigated area. United States Marshal J. A. Baggett stated Saturday afternoon that the rangers accepted service from his deputy Saturday without protest, and no hard feeling resulted from the serving of the injunction papers. Marshal Baggett stated, "It is understood, however, from authentic sources that the rangers late Friday refused to accept service from Oklahoma deputy marshals. It is not known here what the next step on the part of federal authorities will be but it is believed that contempt of court proceedings will be lodged against the Texans. In this event the case will very likely be carried to the United States circuit court which sets at New Orleans. PROCEEDINGS AGAINST TEXAS RANGERS DELAYED. ENID, OKLA., March 13.—Contempt proceedings against Texas rangers who are alleged to have refused service by a deputy United States marshal of an order issued by Judge Frank A. Youmans in federal court here, directing the rangers to turn over to the Judsonia Development Company, Oklahoma claimants, valuable oil lands in the Red river bed, was delayed here today owing to other cases being under way. The matter is to be taken up for the Judsonia company, who is here the first of next week. Frank W. Dale, one of the attorneys to present evidence in the contempt matter, said today that he had affidavits which would be submitted to Judge Youmans tending to prove that two employees of the Judsonia company had been arrested when they attempted to go on the disputed property after the court order had been served.

U. S. DISTRICT JUDGE WILSON SENTENCES TEN OF PRISONERS

ONE DRAWS FOURTEEN MONTHS IN FEDERAL PENITENTIARY AT LEAVENWORTH. WAS VARIETY OF OFFENSES

Ten federal prisoners convicted during the present session of federal court here were sentenced Saturday afternoon by Judge James C. Wilson. Great leniency was shown by Judge Wilson in assessing sentences, but one defendant being sentenced to Leavenworth. The longest sentence imposed was drawn by C. Ingham, convicted following his plea of guilty to a charge of violating the wartime liquor law. He was sentenced to serve 14 months in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas. The evidence showed that he had sold liquor while engaged as a service car driver here. His young wife was present when Judge Wilson pronounced sentence. Leniency was shown by Judge Wilson to persons convicted of violating the federal liquor laws in cases where the evidence showed that the defendants merely had the liquor in their possession for personal use and had not been engaged in "boot-legging." Jack Lazard, negro, pillation porter, pleaded guilty to violation of the Reed amendment. He admitted receiving a quantity of liquor sent him by a relative in St. Louis. The negro greatly amused court officials by his witty testimony. Lazard vigorously asserted that he did not know "exactly what kind of present" his relative in St. Louis was planning to send him. "I just received a letter from my nephew in St. Louis and he wrote that he was mailing me a present. I didn't know what that present was until a pillation porter gave me several plates of whiskey in Dallas which my nephew had given him in St. Louis to deliver to me," the negro told Judge Wilson. "Do you mean to tell me you didn't know what your nephew was sending you," questioned Judge Wilson. "I sure didn't judge, I didn't know whether it was wine, whiskey or beer," the porter answered. Judge Wilson gave the negro a fine of \$25. E. L. Hopkins of Pueblo, Colo., was given a jail sentence of 50 days, following his plea of guilty to violating the Mann white slave act. The sentence was dated back to cover the time Hopkins had been in jail and the defendant was released. He is alleged to have transported a young woman from Colorado to Texas for immoral purposes. Earl Carmichael of Waco pleaded guilty to being implicated in the theft of Wichita Falls & Northwestern railway checks valued at \$1,000. He was given a nine month jail sentence and the sentence was dated back to cover the time the defendant had been confined in jail and he was released. S. S. Alexander, railroad man, was sentenced to serve six months in the county jail on a charge of violating the white slave act. His sentence was also dated back to cover the time he had been in jail which was four months. He will serve the remaining two months of his term in the Archer county jail. Alexander was convicted by a jury on a charge of transporting a woman from Oklahoma City to Wichita Falls for immoral purposes. John A. Lutan, railroad man, was assessed a fine \$25, following his conviction on a charge of stealing a shipment of liquor from an interstate shipment of commerce. J. F. Phillips was assessed a fine of \$25 following his plea of guilty to a charge of using the mails to defraud. It is alleged that Phillips placed advertisements in newspapers stating that he had chickens for sale and that he received money in answer to his advertisements but failed to deliver the chickens. The evidence showed, however, that Phillips attempted to return some of the money he had received but lost the addresses of the persons from whom he had received checks. Judge Wilson said that he would take into consideration the defendant's excellent record as a soldier upon the battle fields of France. Jimmie Sparks of Denver, Colo., was given a 90-day jail sentence following his plea of guilty to violating the Harrison anti-narcotic act. He was convicted on a charge of having a small quantity of morphine in his possession, the drug having been illicitly secured. W. V. Simpson, a Burk Burnett barber, was also given a 90-day jail sentence upon a similar charge. The sentences will be served in the Archer county jail. Both Sparks and Simpson had been in jail for some time and the defendant's sentences were dated back to cover the period of their confinement. IRRECONCILABLE FOES OF TREATY ARE IN SADDLE

Compromise Is Now Apparently Further Away Than Ever.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—With the irreconcilable foes of the peace treaty again in the saddle and with a compromise apparently farther away than ever, the senate agreed by unanimous consent today to bring swiftly to a conclusion its fight over the decisive question of article ten.

Under the agreement, reached after the warmest advocates of compromise had declared nothing could be gained by delay, a final vote on all proposed reservations to article ten will be taken before adjournment Monday night and speeches during the day's session will be held within a fifteen minute limitation.

Tonight, hope of ratification was not entirely dead among some of those who have worked for compromise though they conceded that the cards had run against them and that only a last minute reversal could save the treaty from another deadlock, which would throw it into the political campaign. The leaders thought the ratification vote probably would come by the middle of the week.

Control the Situation

The irreconcilables, who alone of the senate elements had kept their forces intact during the general confusion of the past two days, gained control of the situation when they induced Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, the republican leader, to accept a change they proposed in his substitute reservation to article ten. The move ended the bitter attack of the reconcilables on the substitute and required the republican members to but it also drove away democratic support of the compromise proposal and befuddled the efforts of democratic compromise advocates to make definite pledges of any aid at all from that side of the chamber.

Shortly afterward, the administration and irreconcilable leaders announced that all danger of ratification with the republican substitute was past, declaring they had the votes to beat it and could hold them securely under an absolute pledge.

NOT SURPRISED AT GOVERNMENT TAKING THE OIL

Tribal Officials in Osage Nation Were Expecting to Receive Such Order

PAWBUKA, OKLA., March 13.—The decision of the government to take over the entire oil production of the Osage Indian Nation totaling more than 15,000,000 to insure an adequate supply of fuel oil for the navy, shipping board and war department, was not a surprise to tribal officials and business men here. Judge Leahy, who has represented the Osage Indians for several years and who accompanied the tribal council to Washington recently said:

"The announcement was expected. When we were in Washington it was being investigated as to the government's authority to take over operation and control."

"I am of the opinion that government control of the oil production will mean that the Indians will get future royalties in oil and not in money as in the past."

Judge Leahy said he did not believe the government will hold up development, nor is he sure the United States will maintain prevailing market prices.

NEWS IS SURPRISE TO TULSA OPERATORS

TULSA, OKLA., March 13.—Representatives of oil companies here who are doing business in the Osage Nation were surprised by the United Press dispatches today from Washington that the government had taken over the entire oil production of the Osage Indians, but were not inclined to discuss the situation pending further explanations.

However, few representatives of the largest companies here were inclined to believe the action would tend to paralyze lease sales for a time.

James B. Biles, attorney for the Gypsy Oil company, was of the opinion that the government might fix the price of crude oil temporarily but could not hold it under the market price for any length of time.

AVERAGE ANNUAL SALARY TEXAS TEACHER \$682.66

AUSTIN, TEX., March 12.—The average annual salary of Texas school teachers, according to figures given out by the state superintendent of public instruction, is \$682.66. The increase in this average since last year is 12.2 per cent.

INDIVIDUALS MAY SECURE AN EXTENSION OF TIME FOR FILING INCOME TAX RETURNS FOR 1919

Extension of time for filing individual income tax reports may be secured by personal application to the local office of the internal revenue department, 226 postoffice building, before midnight Monday, March 15, provided further that the report is filed at the local office with one-fourth of the estimated tax attached. Tax payers desiring an extension should make a written request for same, stating thereon the full facts to show why the extension should be granted, and bring the request in person to this office for approval. Tentative returns may then be filed, and the tax payer will be granted an extension. This is in no way to be considered as a blanket extension to the public, and failure to get the report in the local office and approved will subject the tax payer to the delinquent penalty.

Authority for this announcement has just been received, and up to date, it has been necessary for an individual to secure an extension from either the collector or the local office, but the procedure is to file a tentative report on form 1120, with one-fourth the estimated tax attached, together with a formal request for extension pinned to the return. Upon receipt of this tentative return, the collector will forward the corporation necessary extension form which should be attached to the final return when same is filed. May 15 is the extreme time limit which will be given, and the tentative report and request for extension must be made before midnight March 15.

During the past week the work of the local office has been hampered a great deal by tax payers failing to compile their data before calling for assistance. We cannot take the time, in justice to those who have their reports ready, to figure out a person's salary for him, and it is urged that each tax payer have his figures ready. Full instructions are given on the forms, and a close study of same will enable the tax payer to at least fill out the necessary demand for forms, our supply of 1040A's for incomes under \$5,000 is entirely exhausted, but we have plenty of the large ones which can be used instead, and may be secured by application at the office. Returns may be sworn to without charge, and taxes paid right here. Attention is called to the fact that all reports must be filed on or before March 15 and must be in the hands of the revenue department either here or at Austin before midnight Monday. The local office will be open until 12:00 o'clock, midnight, March 15, to receive reports.

the overthrow of the Ebert and promising that the new government would carry out the terms of the peace treaty.

The proclamation declares that the old Ebert government was really the reactionary government.

The revolution is called a domestic affair for Germany concerning no other nation.

Under Ebert, Germany was on the "brink of economic and moral collapse" and the only way to save the country was to form a new government, the proclamation continued.

It invites the populace to help the new government in order to bring well being to the nation again.

The proclamation says that the old government declared freedom of the press and at the same time shut down many newspapers.

The Ebert regime ostensibly stood for popular freedom, but in reality suppressed freedom, according to the manifesto.

FORMER EMPEROR NOT IMPLICATED SAYS REPORT

THE HAGUE, March 13.—Neither the former emperor nor the crown prince is implicated in the overthrow of the government in Germany, so far as can be learned here. The Associated Press was assured today on reliable authority that both Amerongen Castle, where the former emperor lived, and the island of Wieringen, where the former crown prince makes his residence, are already so closely

guarded that it will be absolutely unnecessary for the Dutch government to make further measures to prevent intrigue or their escape.

It is learned, however, that J. B. Kaas, secretary general of Holland, who is charged with guarding the former emperor, and crown prince, is engaged in conference with the minister of justice, having previously consulted officials of the home ministry.

ALLIED MISSIONS ARE NOT BEING MOLESTED

BERLIN, March 13.—Members of the allied mission in Berlin are not being molested, and they are allowed to pass without hindrance in military motor cars through the barricades which have been set up in the street. There are no signs of hostility toward foreigners who are moving freely about the city.

Woman At Temple Throws Her Bonnet Into Political Ring

TEMPLE, TEX., March 13.—Mrs. Bennett F. Smith of Temple, said to be the first woman candidate in Texas for a seat in the state legislature, today announced that she had thrown her "bonnet" in the ring in the race for electoral representative from Bell and Milam counties.

Mrs. Smith came into prominence in legislative circles last year through her fight for a state home for dependent and neglected white children.

APPROXIMATELY 100 PLUMBERS ON STRIKE WANT \$15 PER DAY

Approximately 100 union plumbers of Wichita Falls left their work at noon Saturday following refusal of their demands for an increase in wages from \$12 per day to \$15. A conference of contractors and plumbers held at the labor Temple Saturday afternoon ended in the parties failing to reach an agreement. Announcement of the Plumber's strike was made by labor leaders Saturday afternoon.

Union carpenters of Wichita Falls numbering approximately 1,000 workmen are threatening to strike for an increase in wages from \$1.25 per hour to \$1.50 per hour. A vote is to be taken immediately but it will not be known definitely before Monday whether the strike will be called. It was announced at the labor temple Saturday. Other buildin, crafts are not affected as yet and no demands for an increase in wages is expected at the present from the electricians, painters and allied trades it is understood.

LOCAL CARPENTERS VOTING ON PROPOSED INCREASE IN SCALE

Local carpenters Saturday were voting on the proposed demand for an increase in wages. Votes will also be received Monday and Tuesday and the ballot will be counted on Tuesday night. Votes are being cast at the office of the "Wichita Falls carpenters' union at the labor temple. It was announced Saturday night by labor leaders that a vote taken last Tuesday at the regular meeting of the carpenters showed that a majority of members present were opposed to demand for increased wages at the time. It was agreed, however, to hold another election and three days were given in which to cast the ballots in order that all members of the local union might participate.

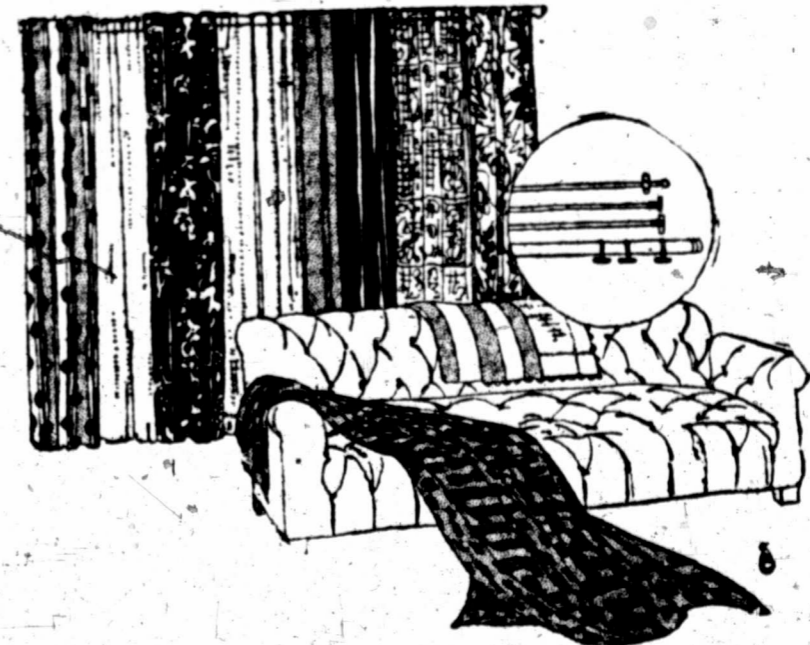

The couple was finally located again at Coffeyville. Dispatches from Topeka, Kansas, Saturday said that Mrs. Lowe had been served with a writ directing her to turn over Barnett to his guardian. Men who came into contact with Mrs. Lowe while she was in Wichita Falls are looking for her to make some counter move. They do not believe she will give up her millionaire husband without a fight. Old-time Indians around Henryetta, Okla., had predicted that springtime would bring the old Indian back to his farm in the wooded country near Henryetta. The millionaire Indian has always lived in the open. He has commuted with the trees in the springtime when the buds were bursting and the leaves coming out. He has rambling among the wild flowers in fair Oklahoma when the grass is green, and has felt the aroma of the country air for so long that not even a good looking woman, as his wife is said to be, can keep him away, according to a government official. The old man's feet are now "itching" to get off the pavement and onto the earth again, they declare, and it will only be a few weeks now before he breaks through the barrier that his wife has placed around him and goes back to the field of his childhood, down in the hills of Oklahoma county.

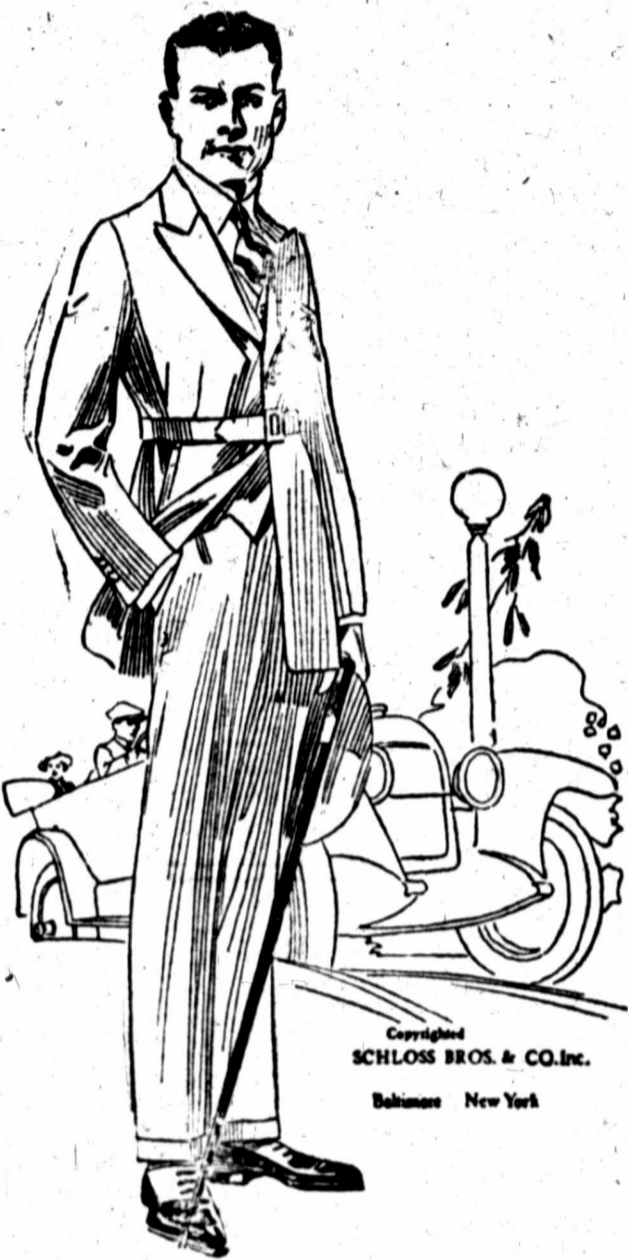

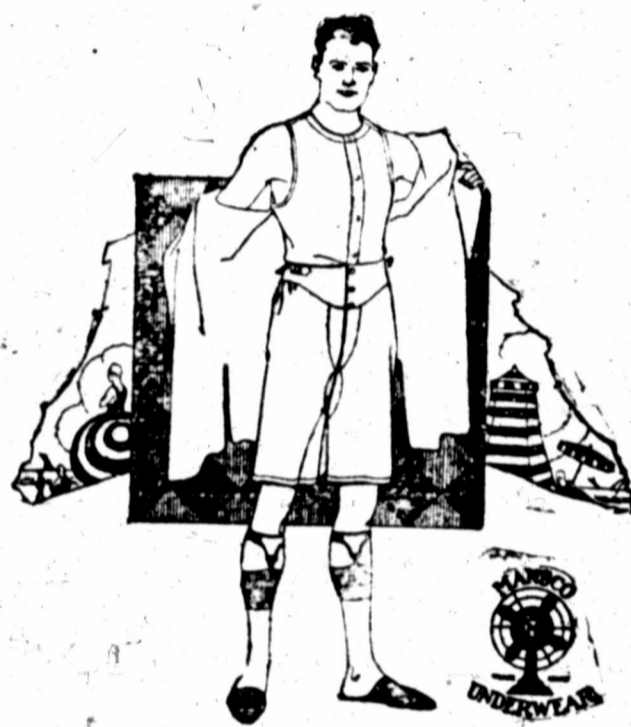

OPERATORS MAKE LOCATIONS IN MARILLO DISTRICT

TESTERMAN TEST IS READY TO COMPLETE, FLOWING BY HEADS

According to the theory that the section in the Panhandle district is found north of the great developed north of Amarillo northern part of Potter county, operators of Wichita Falls operators have made locations and have started operations at three points on holdings of 27,000 acres in this district.

The hanging of the swab in the hole is complete, the completion of test of Testerman et al in section 4-14, Tillman County, according to week-end reports from Tillman County. In spite of this, however, the test is reported as flowing by heads whenever opened up, and one 500 barrel tank of oil was reported run by the pipe line during the week. According to latest reports the test had been drilled only six feet into the sand.

The first test is that of the Masters company, which is composed of Clark and associates, and which is making test drilling at 400 feet in No. 10, E. L. & R. R. survey, in county, just north of the Potter line, and northeast of the gas line.

The rigging up of a standard, which has been under way for ten days, has been completed, and it is expected that the test will be drilled further into the sand during the coming week.

Further to the northeast, in section 10, N. R. R. Co. survey, block 8, Shamrock Oil company, of Mr. Clark is president, is building the west of the first two locations in the northwest part of section 10, E. L. & R. R. Co. survey, Roy B. and associates have made locations for a test and have announced operations to begin immediately. The tests are to be drilled with possible speed.

Owners of acreage in the vicinity of the Alberta to complete the well. Brinson et al, owners of acreage in the vicinity of this test, have taken the test of the Alberta Oil Company over and will complete it, according to a statement by C. E. Everts of Everts, O'Neil, managers of the company, made at the local stock exchange Saturday afternoon.

Three tests mentioned, while the test north in this immediate part of Panhandle, form only a part of general development going on to north of the gas fields, a large number of other tests drilling to the east and northeast of the gas area, are bearing area, which bears the shape of a triangle, covers more than a hundred square miles in and has furnished some of the best gas production in the history of the oil and gas development in the southwest.

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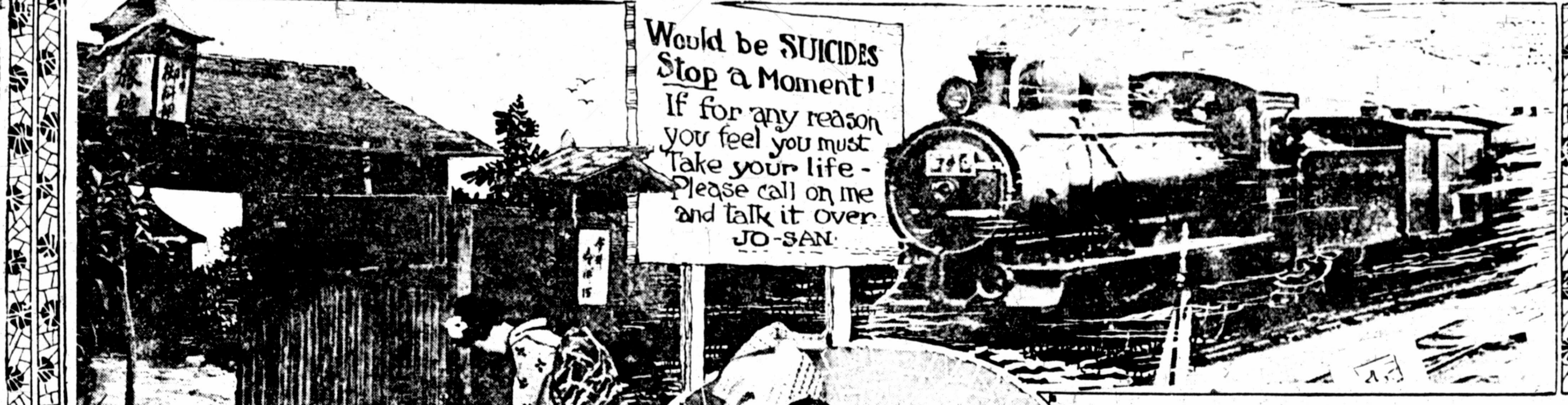
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ENGLAND'S EFFORTS TO SUPPRESS INDIA'S REVOLT



No. 1.—The Identification Parade at Kasur—On account of the political unrest at Kasur the British placed the town under martial law. Lieutenant Colonel Macrae and his staff held an identification parade, in which the entire population (about 10,000) were made to walk before British officers, who picked from the passers by those suspected of complicity in the movement. Those who were picked as suspects were then arrested and tried under martial law, some of them were hanged, others flogged. This punitive review lasted for six hours. No. 2.—Flogging a Sikh Soldier—This Sikh, whose headress shows him to have been a former soldier in the British army, was tied to a steel ladder, stripped, and is being lashed by an English soldier. This is only one of hundreds of students and soldiers who were flogged in public places all over the Punjab. No. 3.—The Prisoners' Cage at Kasur—During the disturbances thousands of men, women and boys were arrested at Kasur and were placed in this open air cage. Even at the inquiry held by Lord Hunter's British Commission, fruit was found with this "open" as, for one thing, it provided no protection whatever from the terrible Indian sun. No. 4.—The Gallows at Kasur—These were the public gallows erected by the English on which to hang those convicted by court martial after being in the open air "open." Hundreds were publicly hanged to impress the countryside with the seriousness of not conforming with British law. Evidences of many of these public executions appear on the centre post, on which remain many bits of rope. This particular gallows was not taken down until after many, many persons had been put to death.

JO-SAN, THE SUICIDE LADY OF KOBE.



High up on a hill overlooking a harbor where great ocean liners nose in from the Pacific, lives the Suicide Lady of Kobe. Her real name is Mrs. Jo, or Jo-San, as she is respectfully called by the Japanese and foreigners who know her. It was only during the past year that Jo-San became the Suicide Lady. Her husband was a Christian pastor. For sixteen years after his death, Jo-San worked as a Bible woman among her people, opening her home to those who were in distress and her heart to all whose lives she touched. Her evolution into the Suicide Lady concerns a certain railroad crossing at Suma and a bad Japanese tendency to cut the skirts of life instead of trying to untangle them. Suma became a popular suicide resort. Men and women came from many parts of Japan to end their lives by jumping into the sea, or by throwing themselves under the wheels of passing trains. Police stationed at the railroad crossing managed to prevent some of the suicides, but the number of deaths remained large.

It was when police measures failed that Jo-San had her inspiration. One day all Suma was startled to see a large sign-board at the railroad crossing and another near the water, bearing the words: "Would-Be Suicides, Stop a Moment! If for any reason you feel you must take your life, please call on me and talk it over." This announcement was followed by Jo-San's name and address. In just four months, 169 for peace and disillusioned after many years of service to Buddha, women and girls turned back from death to accept Jo-San's invitation. Geisha girls in pitifully gay kimonos and young women from excellent families stumbled side by side up the hilltop path which leads to Jo-San's.

One of the first surprises was the fact that the majority of the women came from well-to-do homes. One of them was the daughter of a famous Tokyo educator, who had married against the wishes of her family and who was too proud to let them know that she regretted the match. Another rebelled against a forced marriage with a rich silk merchant many years her senior. Another, the wife of a public official, was persecuted beyond endurance by a disapproving mother-in-law. One of the first to come was an aged woman who had spent five years and nearly all her savings making a circuit of all the Buddhist holy places on the island of Japan. She hoped that by making the 250 mile journey over and over, she would at last find peace. One day, during her pilgrimage, a Buddhist priest held her up on the high-road and robbed her of all her money. Disappointed in her quest, the gas-hatted woman turned her steps toward the Mercia of Suicides. Jo-San's signboard carried its message of hope to her and so it was that the woman who had sought peace for five years in the holy places of Buddha, found it at last in the gospel of Jesus.

Loss of health or occupation, strained family relations, and intemperate husbands started the large majority of the women on their journey to Suma. One young woman had entered a house of ill-repute, in order to pay the expense of her husband, who was studying at an American university. Though the life was more than she could endure, she had no reproaches whatever for the husband who put her in it. She was his wife, and therefore bound to make his welfare her first concern.

Perhaps this modern graduate in philanthropy would find fault with Jo-San. It is doubtful if she ever heard of a card-index system. If one of her girls was referred to as a case, she would not understand. Her only "system" is to open her home to those who need a haven during the days of readjustment, to call on the disapproving mother-in-law, the unkind father, or the intemperate husband, to find em-

employment for those who must support themselves, and to touch each life with the golden wand of the gospel. Jo-San may be quite unscientific in her methods, but the fact remains that of the 169 discouraged women who sought her aid, not one has since taken or attempted to take her life. Somehow or other, Jo-San must have set them right.

Under the name of the Women's Welfare Association, Christian workers in Kobe give what support they can to the Suicide Lady. But the house on the hill-top is no longer large enough for all who have turned back from Suma; and as Jo-San's work is undenominational, no one board has assumed responsibility. Therefore the inter-church World Movement survey committee for Kobe is asking \$2,000 for a new house, so that those who come to Jo-San may be sure of shelter during the first trying days of readjustment.

Meanwhile Jo-San's fame has spread abroad throughout Japan, and, day by day, the steep path goes weary factory girls and disappointed wives, happy geishas and tired old women—all seeking as their last hope in life the Suicide Lady of Kobe.

PLAN TO CARE FOR INFLUX OF PEOPLE TO PECOS COUNTRY

PECOS, TEX., March 13.—The double tracking of the Santa Fe railroad from Carlsbad, N. M., to Pecos to tap the rich Pecos county territory opened by the oil strike of the Bell well at Dixieland, and the extension of the line to the south to connect with the Southern Pacific, thus providing a direct line from San Antonio and the Southern Texas cities to the new wonderland here was proposed today by General Manager Ware of the Santa Fe at a conference with oilmen here today.

Representatives of the Texas & Pacific railroad were here also getting data on additional service needed by Pecos as a result of the sudden jump of Reeves county to the oil map. A regular Pecos sleeper on all through trains is to be asked of the T. & P., while the extension of the schedule of the Chicago-Carlsbad train of the Santa Fe from Carlsbad to Pecos is to be asked of the latter road.

LOCAL AGENTS U. S. DEPARTMENT JUSTICE MAKE GOOD RECORD

Operations of agents of the department of justice in Wichita Falls and vicinity during America's participation in the World War which led to the arrest and internment of fifteen enemy aliens at least two of whom were alleged to be among the most dangerous agents of the Kaiser have been disclosed by former government operatives. Various schemes followed by government agents in detecting enemy aliens were kept secret during the period of hostilities but with the signing of the armistice and withdrawal of American troops from overseas many interesting detective stories of the most alarming nature have come to light.

It was in the spring of 1918 when the gray-clad legions of Ludendorff were rushing toward the Marne and Krupp's "Big Bertha" hidden in the deep forest of Argonne were knocking at the doors of the French capital, that secret agents of the Kaiser hidered behind the American citizenship, gnawed like rats at the very vitals of American freedom. It was the duties of special agents of the department of justice to ferret out these paid agents of Prussianism and perhaps no more efficient work was done anywhere in the entire United States than was accomplished by the heroic head of the department of justice bureau here during the World War, and his corps of eight assistants.

Predicts 40 Cent Gasoline Within Next Few Months

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Forty-cent gasoline is in sight, according to Joseph Phelan, shipping board official. "I shall not be surprised to see this record price reached in August or September," said Phelan. "It is a certainty that the present price of 32 cents will be increased continually within the next few weeks. It may not stop at 40 cents.

The only way to keep the price down is to burn less gasoline. We must have less joy riding and less automobile buying.

The increasing price of gasoline is due directly to the outrageous increase in consumption. The country has gone auto mad. Everybody is buying an auto. Everybody is using an auto to get about.

Hon. H. F. George recently returned from Walsenburg, Colo., where he purchased an interest in the Turner coal mine and arranged for the shipment of 60 cars of coal into this territory for distribution at Vernon, Okla., Harrold, Electra, Iowa Park, Wichita Falls, Bellevue and Burkburnett. He also contracted for a large supply of alfalfa hay at Dawson, N. M., and has contracted for a supply of oats from Bellevue, Tex.

Mr. George has made speeches in all of the towns where he has done business, in the interest of his candidacy for nomination for the legislature from the 101st district comprised of Wichita and Wilbarger counties.

"The number of office holders and the number of clerks serving under him have been doubled within the past 10 years unnecessarily," he said. "If

selected to the legislature my efforts will be for economy." Mr. George said that in his youth he had served a term in the legislature. "I was inexperienced then and performed no special service for my constituency," he said. DECLARES OVERTHROW GERMAN RADICAL GOVERNMENT IS NOT A DISTURBING ELEMENT AT PRESENT

By W. T. MASON (Written for the United Press) NEW YORK, March 13.—Overthrow of the German radical government by monarchists, conservatives and patriots is not a disturbing symptom at present.

The only possibility of danger to Europe is that the radicals may attempt to regain control of the government by counter-revolutionary means. The position of the army will determine whether such an attempt on a serious scale will be made.

The radical government has not won public confidence because it has been unable to restore Germany's industrial life. It cannot count, therefore, upon certainty of general support in its present troubles. A very important source of the government's weakness has been the fall of its principal intellectual leader, Dr. Eruberger, on account of charges of financial corruption.

The east with which the revolution was accomplished suggests the radicals had been losing public confidence quietly for a considerable time. Germany is not naturally a radical country. Its instinct for conservative government control of national life is undoubtedly being counted upon by the new Kapp ministry to rally the people to the support of the revolution.

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TO RESUME WORK MONDAY MORNING ON NOCONA WELL

NOCONA, TEX., March 13.—The Nocona well, which has been shut down a few days for fuel oil, will resume work Monday. This well has been swabbed for some time but the water has not been materially reduced. The oil and gas increases when the water pressure has been lifted off, by the swab. This indicates to old-timers that the well has considerable strength, and should it not be possible to rid the well of water trouble, they believe it is near to production and that it will start the ball to rolling that will open a real oil field in Montague county. While this locality has not been advertised, it is attracting wide attention, and is even being discussed in the different oil centers as entitled to be put in the next-biggest class. Its location is excellent—on the Pennsylvania structure and across Red River to the southwest from Headton. No Cretaceous or Permian to drill through in the main part of the structure, and with favorable conditions, so say the geologists. And surrounded on all sides by production and drilling wells. Why shouldn't it be an oil field? It will require the drill now to tell the story, or rather, to complete it. It is seldom that one well opens an oil field; that it, that strikes it in the solar plexus, and it need not be surprising, should the rule not be broken here. It may require several wells to find the rich spot or spots. That was the case at Burk Burnett, and what a field it has proven to be! The persistent wildcatter opened Burk. In fact, if it were not for the wildcatter, it would not be long until oil would reach a much higher notch than the record-breaking elevation it has now reached.

Encouraged by the Nocona strike, it is known that oil men, who have been watching developments, will start another well, though the location has not been given out, and this may not be far ahead of a second well out north, and one or two at other points in the county. This will be good news to those watching development work in Montague county. Five cars of material have been delivered to the Shims Petroleum Co. location in section 14-16-4w, and about a mile and a quarter back from Red River on the Oklahoma side. This location is to the northwest in a general direction from the wells on the Texas side and was made by Lee Hager, geologist, and will be watched with more than the usual interest, as it is the first well in this locality to have been located by a geologist. It usually does not cost any more to drill on a geological location. Statistics show that from 50 to 65 per cent of the chance for loss is eliminated by following geological dope. Montague county will not be overlooked from now on.

Automobile News

President Liberty One of Old Timers In Auto Industry

Back in the old days in the west when mining booms called towns into being almost overnight, one who lingered for a brief time became known as an "old timer." Something of the same sort is true of the motor car industry. Men who today are only a few years removed from youth are pointed out as "old timers" in the automobile business.

Take Percy Owen, president of the Liberty Motor Car company, for example. See Mr. Owen around the auto show and you observe a young man—a very young man to be president of a motor car company that has made remarkable strides in public esteem in the past three years.

KNOWLEDGE FOR CAR OWNERS

Interesting and Important Facts That Every Motorist Should Know.

Never start your car with a jerk. It is preferable to engage the clutch gradually and see that the car starts with as much ease as is possible.

The asphaltum on the top of a battery cell may be sealed again by the application of a little heat.

If a horse driving along in front of you shows any inclination to be frightened, always slow down your motor and if necessary stop your motor.

When the leather fan belt develops considerable slippage it is probably because the rough side of the leather is against the pulley surface. The smooth side of the leather has a much greater traction adherence.

Whenever your car has suffered a bump of any kind, a check against the curb or anything of that sort, the wheels should immediately be tested for alignment, as a change of this kind is quite enough to force them out of correct alignment, which will lead to excessive wear.

Batteries should never be tested with a screw driver as it causes a great drain on the batteries. It is always best to use a hydrometer and if the liquid reads 1.275 to 1.300 all is well. If it gets down to 1.200 have the system looked over by an expert.

Throwing the ignition switch to "off" position and then leaving the keys in place, does not insure the car from theft. Always make it a rule to take the keys with you no matter how short a time you are leaving the car unattended.

When the tires are being inflated in a public garage the figures on the gauge on the tank should not be accepted as strictly accurate, because this gauge usually registers twenty pounds more per inch than is in the tire, since it takes that amount of pressure to open the valve.

If you have detached wheels remember that only metal parts may rust. Occasionally, when you change a wheel, cover the metal contact surface with grease, otherwise the detachable wheel will no longer be a detachable wheel.

When the car owner is confronted with the condition of excessive oil consumption and no reasonable explanation is forthcoming, it is well to suspect the rear crank shaft bearing. Looseness in the fit of the bearing permits the oil to work out and materially increase the consumption.

From the man who wants to get maximum mileage from his tires, the habit of using a spare tire to afford regular changes, beginning at the right front and progressing around the car, is a valuable one to form. In this way each tire nets a week's rest in four, during which time it should be gone over carefully and have any cuts and abrasions vulcanized.

The continued use of rims that have become bent or badly dented will invariably

cause rim cutting, which means the end of the casing usefulness. Another error is to neglect to keep the valve stem and stay bolts tight. When this is not done, water will get into the casing on wet roads and cause no end of trouble.

If in a hurry to stop a spring from squeaking pour a little kerosene over it, guiding the oil down the sides, with finger so it will run in between the leaves. Wipe off the excess. Four cylinder oil over the springs, the same way, then shake the car, so the oil will be drawn in and find the leak.

Never add acid to a storage battery unless you have been advised by an experienced battery man. If the solution is weak it means that the acid has entered the plates and the battery needs recharging. Adding acid will oxidize the battery and ruin it.

When the motor shows any tendency to labor on driving, upgrade on high gear, shift back into the lower gear which has been provided for just such a purpose.

A self-lubricating bushing for a spring bolt can easily be made by drilling, say eight holes, each 3/16 of an inch in diameter, through a new bronze bushing. These holes are packed with graphite when the bushing is in place. Then by removing the spring bolts every six months and repacking the bushing with graphite a nearly self-sufficing bushing, so far as lubrication goes, will result.

A good cleaner for greasy or dull enameled parts is made of two and one-half gallons of lukewarm water to a pound of washing soda crystals. Apply briskly with a soft rag, then polish with flannel. Before using the solution be sure that all the crystals are dissolved. This solution will ruin varnish and paint surfaces. Use only where the bare enamel is exposed.

Before driving down a hill decide how you will descend, that is, whether you can control the car with the brakes alone or whether it will be necessary to use the second or first gears for their braking power. Then if the grade of the hill is quite long, it is best to alternate with the foot and emergency brakes as too long application of either one will cause it to heat and burn the brake friction material.

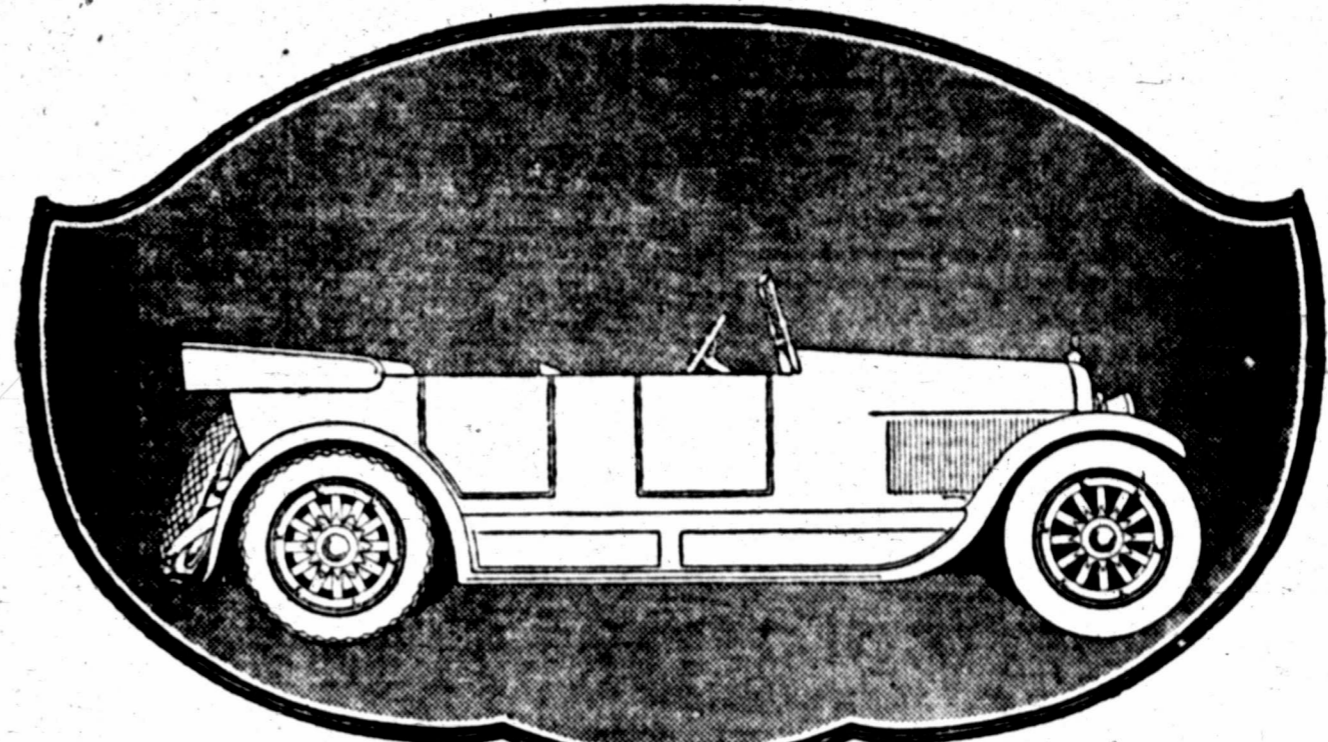
The Discovery of the Asphalt Roadway.

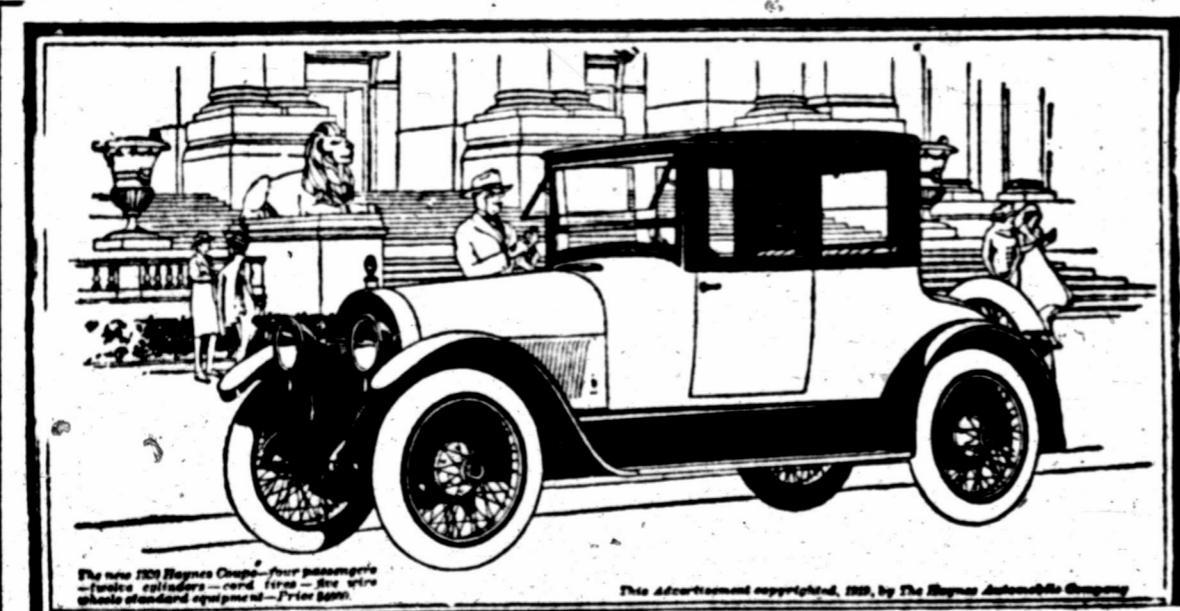

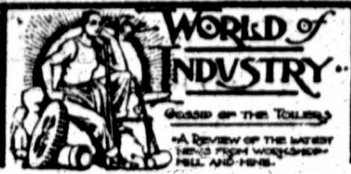

Labor in Brainerd, Minn., is now 95 per cent organized.

New Zealand mines on an average of 2,000,000 tons of coal annually.

Canadian electrical workers will receive 27 cents an hour after April 1.

The coal mines of Alberta, Canada, have a daily output of more than 10,000 tons.

There are 800,000 factory workers in New York who cannot speak the English language.

In Russia, out of 180,000,000 inhabitants, 150,000,000 are peasants and about 20,000,000 are workers.

Many of the airplane factories in England are now turning their attention to the manufacture of toys.

More than 50 per cent of the population of Canada depends upon agriculture as a means of a livelihood.

Since the war began the number of married women who have gone into industry has increased 100 per cent.

The recently discovered phosphate mines in Italy are probably the richest and most extensive in the world.

The Goodrich Tire and Rubber Company at Akron, Ohio, employs 27 teachers in their Americanization school.

New Haven tailors are demanding that they be given an increase of \$9 on each complete suit of clothes made by them.

Between April and the end of November last year Ireland paid out in out-of-work donations more than \$10,000,000.

During the last year pearl button workers in New York city have been granted wage increases amounting to 60 per cent.

Burlington (Ill.) foundry workers, who are 100 per cent organized, have been granted a 10 per cent increase in wages.

Boot and shoe workers in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., have received an increase of 10 to 15 per cent in wages through negotiations.

The 184 locals affiliated with the International Brotherhood of Union now have a membership of more than 21,000.

Furniture makers in Johannesburg, South Africa, are so busy that they are unable to take all the orders that are forthcoming.

Increased wages paid to coal miners in New Zealand are responsible for only 28 per cent of the increased cost of production.

Operated by compressed air directed by one man's hand, a new invention for use about the mines lifts heavy loads from pits into cars.

Employers and employees in the Ohio pottery industries are working on a plan to establish a sick, disability and pension system.

The refusal of the British government to act on the desires of the coal miners for nationalization of the mines is likely to precipitate a general strike.

The Chicago Building Trades Council, comprising 13 unions, is proposing a wage demand that will insist on the payment of \$1.25 an hour for their members.

Male workers in the furniture industry in the United States received an average of \$17.80 per week for 51 hours work during the calendar year of 1919.

In Baltimore a decrease of from 30 to 40 per cent is found in the output of labor. Wages in the textile industry have been doubled, but production has decreased more than 50 per cent.

Statistics of the United States Bureau of Labor show that the rate of accidents in the iron and steel industry during the period of eight years was highest among the non-English-speaking workers.

During the period from January, 1918, to October, 1919, the United States Employment Service found employment for more than 6,000,000 men and women. The cost of this service was estimated at \$1.24 per placement.

Colliery workers in Pemberton and Orrell, England, have by a special levy, raised more than \$50,000 as a relief fund for the widows and children of colliers who lost their lives in the war and for the disabled.

One of the most protracted and bitter conflicts in the history of British trade unionism was that of the recent strike of the iron molders. More than 50,000 men were involved and only went back to work when they were exhausted.

In 1921, the United States possessed 71 factories, producing toys to the value of more than \$7,000,000. In 1918 the number of factories had increased to 145, and the total amount of manufacturers reached nearly \$24,000,000.

In the four years that the Pennsylvania Workmen's Compensation Board has been in operation more than \$11,000,000 has been paid as compensation in non-fatal

cases and the awards in fatal cases have totaled almost \$20,000,000,000.

Marian K. Clark, chief investigator of the Bureau of Industries and Immigration in New York state, estimates that one-half the accidents in factories, with a resultant loss of \$40,000 a day to industries, are due to the ignorance of the English language.

In October, 1919, as compared with October, 1918, the number of persons employed in dock and riverside labor in Great Britain shows an increase of 72.1 per cent. The cement trade shows an increase of 69.7 per cent, the food preparation trades, an increase of 40.1 per cent, quarrying, an increase of 38.6 per cent, and the printing trade, an increase of 28.4 per cent. The largest decrease—5.8 per cent—appears in iron and steel.

Comparing October, 1919, with October, 1918, on the question of earnings of employees in Great Britain, increases of 71.8, 112, 65.6 and 63.5 per cent are shown in cement, cotton, food preparation, printing and brick trades, respectively. Fourteen trades show increases ranging from 25.8 to 69.6 per cent, while linen shows an increase of 6 per cent, and the printing trade an increase of 1 per cent.

Osaka, the commercial metropolis of Japan, has become a literal forest of smokestacks, while Tokyo, regarded as only the political and educational center, now has over 17,000 factories, and between Tokyo and Yokohama, a distance of 18 miles along the railroad, over 2000 factories were built in one year. The employees in these factories, mostly girls, number into the millions, but the sanitary conditions are abominable, vice is cheap and temptations, most insidious, are everywhere in the spinning mills, minders and carders, is not known, but carders are expected for the first time to make a claim for wages on an equality with minders. If conceded, this will involve a large advance. Weavers are expected to ask for 100 per cent increase on the present rates, which is more than four

times pre-war prices. About 500,000 people are affected, weavers being in the proportion of 2 to 1.

A recent study on works councils in the United States by the National Industrial Conference Board, furnishing another evidence of the widespread interest in plans for representation of employees in industry, covers 176 companies or corporations having works councils in 225 different industrial plants, affecting approximately 200,000 workers. In addition to those plans created as a result of awards of the National War Labor Board, the Shipbuilding Labor Adjustment Board and other government agencies, there are 105 which were voluntary put in operation by employers. The term "works council," which has not been generally adopted in this country, was determined upon, the report states, as being more definite and exact than that of "shop committee," which has been commonly used.





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TEXACO FIELD AGENT MAKES A REPORT ON STATE'S PRODUCTION

HOUSTON, TEX., March 13.—A review of Texas livestock production in 1919 by E. M. Johnson, field agent united bureau of crop estimates in part says:

"Following a protracted drought which affected the entire state for three years, Texas in 1919 made an unprecedented recovery which places her first among all the states in the production and value of agricultural products.

"Taking first rank in the value of all crops with a figure of \$1,076,163,000, as compared to a five-year average (1913-1917) of \$623,935,000, it is followed by Iowa with a valuation of \$861,538,000 and by Illinois with \$813,164,000.

"Turning to livestock we find that Texas still ranks first in the number of stock cattle with a figure of 4,158,000 which is a decrease of 1,024,000, as compared to 1917. The nearest approach is the state of Nebraska with 2,940,000 head. The value per head on Jan. 1, 1920, was \$41.80, making a total valuation of \$186,344,000 for this class of livestock alone.

"In aggregate livestock value, including cattle, sheep, hogs, horses and mules, Texas, with a valuation of \$572,000,000, is outranked only by Iowa with a valuation of \$640,000,000.

"This record has not been made without attending evils which lowered production far below the states possibilities. The coastal belt has been unproductive, rice has been greatly damaged by continued wet weather, cotton grew rank and was greatly damaged by boll weevil and other pests, a tropical storm did damage to both cotton and forage crops in the south section of the state, continued rains lowered the yield and quality of all grain crops in the north and central parts of the state, while in the Rio Grande valley broom corn and truck crops suffered greatly from flood and storm damage.

PARDON ADVISERS TO HAVE HEARINGS IN SEVERAL CITIES

AUSTIN, Te., March 13.—To give friends and relatives of inmates of state penal institutions an opportunity to present pleas in behalf of the unfortunates, and especially those who are without financial means, the Board of Pardon Advisers has announced it will hold hearings shortly at Dallas, Fort Worth, Waco, San Antonio, Houston, and El Paso. The action was initiated by Gov. W. P. Hobby, in a letter to the board.

In announcing the proposed hearings the board said:

"A man in the penitentiary that has plenty of friends and plenty of money does not need any particular looking after, as their friends will not permit their cases to be forgotten; but there are a number of people in the penitentiary who have not made application for pardon. These are the ones in the heart of the governor.

"In arranging the itineraries and dates in cities mentioned, we expect not only those who were convicted in that place to come to see us, but also those from adjoining counties. The time and place will be advertised in the papers and every precaution will be taken to get due notice to every one interested.

Governor Hobby, in his letter to the Pardon Advisers, upon which the board's action was based, follows in part:

"After a careful investigation, I find that out of 2,500 convicts confined in the penitentiary, 854, or about one-third of the number, were convicted from seven counties, to-wit: Tarrant 97; Bexar, 99; Dallas, 186; Harris, 226; El Paso, 91; Galveston, 69; McLennan, 89.

"I further find that less than one-third of the number from these counties have applications pending before your board for pardons. I judge that the majority of the remainder have not made application for pardon, and that this majority are of a poor and friendless class of people, too poor to appear before the board or myself for a hearing to present their claims for executive clemency. Undoubtedly a large proportion of these sentences, are men and women who have served a large proportion of those friendless who have maintained good records, whose cases are entitled to investigation, and in many cases deserve executive clemency.

"I have received numerous letters, as doubtless you also have, from parents and relatives of these unfortunate convicts, resulting many pitiful instances of poverty, starvation, and

hardships, these letters outlining in their feeble way the poverty and distress that is being endured by the helpless mother, father, wife and child or other relatives on account of being deprived of the support of the one who has been convicted and sentenced.

"After serious thought I have come to the conclusion that it would be advisable for members of the Board of Pardon Advisers to visit the county seats, of the above named counties, and other counties you may deem necessary; that you give notice of your visit, and spend at least a week there in order to give these families and friends an opportunity to appear before the board and present their cases to you in person. Where practicable, I suggest that you go into the homes of these people and see for yourselves the status and condition of these families; and whenever or wherever you find a case that is worthy and, in your judgment, meritorious, that you report the same to me with your recommendations."
