OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., March 17.—Adding another muddle to the already complicated controversy over the ownership of the \$200,000,000 Red River oil field, the state board of land commissioners decided that the disputed land is the property of the state of Oklahoma.

### HOOVER WARNED WILSON AGAINST TREATY PROGRAM

Suggested United States Stay Out of the Various Commissions Proposed

### EXPLAIN THAT HE LATER MODIFIED SUCH VIEWS

Charges Publication of Memorandum was a "Breath of Good Taste"

### WASHINGTON, March 17.—

Publication of a letter written by Herbert Hoover to President Wilson last April created widespread discussion among senators as treaty debate entered upon what they believed to be its final stage.

### NEW YORK, March 17.—

Herbert Hoover, in a statement here this afternoon, characterized publication of a memorandum he prepared during the peace conference in which he warned against American participation in various international commissions, as a "breath of good taste."

PARIS, March 17.—A news agency dispatch from Basle says that a soviet republic has been proclaimed at Chemnitz, Germany.

LONDON, March 17.—A news agency dispatch via Copenhagen says the Independent Socialists and Communists in Berlin have proclaimed a republic and delivered an ultimatum to Dr. Von Kapp, head of the revolutionary government.

THE HAGUE, March 17.—The resignation of the government of Chancellor Kapp in Berlin was handed in this afternoon, it is announced in a Berlin dispatch from the semi-official Wolff Bureau, received here shortly before 4 p. m.

The political situation in Germany today apparently was passing beyond control of either the counter-revolutionary government in Berlin or the Ebert government in Stuttgart.

There were indications that the Spartacan and radical elements have taken advantage of the general strike and the generally chaotic condition of the country to push their hope for a soviet government with all their power.

In the great Essen industrial district, dispatches said, a "revolutionary labor council" has been constituted to negotiate and alliance with the Socialist parties in the lower Rhine and Westphalia.

The purpose of this coalition would be establishment of a dictatorship of the proletariat, it was said.

Spartan outbreaks already have been reported in Dresden, Munich, and other south German cities.

Reports of clashes between conservatives and radicals and supporters of the Ebert or von Kapp's government continue. Twenty-three were killed at Hagen, Westphalia, when workmen clashed with soldiers who attempted to occupy the city.

Political observers in foreign capitals hoped the meeting of the national assembly, scheduled to convene in Stuttgart late today, would reach decisions enabling the formation of a stable government.

PARIS, March 17.—News from Berlin and other German points telling of sanguinary clashes at Essen, Dortmund, Leipzig, Mannheim, Frankfurt and Brunswick, together with a report that a council of workmen had assumed power at Chemnitz, has given the impression here that there is more to be feared from a revival of the Spartacan movement than from the activities of the Kapp government in Berlin.

According to the latest dispatches, the military movement has resulted in bloodshed in 24 German towns. The Spartacans are reported to have risen in Berlin, where a class war struggle declared to have resulted in a casualty list of 100 dead and 300 wounded.

Fighting in Breslau, Hamburg and Kiel also is reported.

CONDITION, SAID TO BE GROWING WORSE

PARIS, March 17.—Conditions in Germany, already chaotic, have been growing worse during the last 24 hours, it was indicated by dispatches reaching this city late last night.

There is no doubt the Ebert government, appalled by the economic consequences of a prolongation of existing conditions, is negotiating, if not with the cozier led by Dr. Kapp, at least with conservative forces who have been careful not to identify themselves with Dr. Kapp.

A combination of forces making for restoration of order as rapidly as possible may be brought about but how far political parties are masters of the situation is a mooted point.

The next few days will demonstrate whether it is possible to stem the tide of disintegration in Germany.

LONDON, March 17.—The German revolution, headed by Dr. Von Kapp, was believed near its end today.

Dispatches said that Von Kapp, faced with growing opposition on all sides and deserted by many of his supporters, had tendered his resignation.

There was every indication that the action of the dictator was barely in time to avert widespread civil strife.

Scores of lives have been sacrificed and hundreds of persons wounded. From 400 to 500 persons were killed in Kiel when a cruiser bombarded the city, according to a Kiel dispatch to the Morning Post by way of Copenhagen.

The cruiser opened fire when anti-Kapp groups staged a demonstration, the dispatch said. Heavy loss of life was reported in other parts of the nation.

Scores were reported to have been killed in clashes in the Berlin, Hamburg and Dresden districts.

Berlin dispatches said that Field Marshal von Hindenburg, German military idol, had refused to appoint anything to do with the revolutionists.

Von Kapp Leaves Berlin.

A report received in Paris late last night said that Von Kapp had fled from Berlin, but this was not confirmed from other sources.

Bloody fighting between communists and police was reported from Duisburg, where 14 persons were said to have been killed and 80 wounded.

### NEARLY 700 PEOPLE HAVE BEEN KILLED

Nearly 700 persons have been killed and hundreds wounded in fighting resulting from the German counter-revolution since Saturday, according to compilations by the United Press today.

government and had refused to obey Von Kapp's instructions to pay 100,000 marks for current expenditures, including pay for troops.

A dispatch to the Berlingische Tidende confirmed dispatches to the United Press that the fighting in Dresden between communists and Reichwehr troops, the dispatch said, had continued throughout Monday and yesterday.

Another Copenhagen dispatch reported that the general strike, called by the Ebert government to break the revolution, had reached the second zone of Schleswig, which recently voted to remain German.

Railway workers joined in the strike, the dispatch asserted and traffic was paralyzed.

The supreme council of the peace conference in session here was reported to have agreed unanimously to adopt the French viewpoint regarding Germany, which is that because of the obscure situation in Germany, the only suitable allied attitude is to demand strict carrying out of the treaty of Versailles.

Further allied action will be determined as soon as the situation becomes stable. Meantime the allies will make every effort to see that Holland and the former kaiser remain close.

Basle dispatches quoting advices from Berlin said opposition to Von Kapp was growing in the German east and that an important faction of the security guard has joined with the Spartacans in opposition to the revolutionists.

REQUEST IS MADE TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The Ebert government has telegraphed to foreign countries asking them to withhold any recognition of the new revolutionary government.

At Berlin, the state department was advised today from the German capital.

Announcement of the appeal was said to have been made in a statement distributed by airplanes in Germany.

The state department's advice said that the Ebert government laid its fight from Berlin to a desire to avoid bloodshed.

COUSINS OF KAPP RESIDE AT BRYAN

BRYAN, TEX., March 17.—Cousins of Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, chancellor of the new government of Berlin, reside at Bryan, Tex., it was learned today. They requested that their names be withheld from publication.

# BODY OF WOMAN IS FOUND IN A TRUNK IN HER APARTMENTS

NEW BERLIN, CONN., March 17.—The body of Mrs. Anna M. Evans, 37, was found in a trunk in her apartment here today. She had been strangled by her little son's toy reins, which were knotted about her throat. The police are searching for her husband, George Evans.

According to the police, the murder took place between 9 o'clock and noon yesterday. A grocer called at the Evans' home at 9 a. m. and took the customary daily market order from Mrs. Evans. He delivered the order at 11 o'clock, he said, but did not see Mrs. Evans. The rear door was open, he told the police, and he saw the Evans 8-year-old boy playing with another child in the kitchen. Mrs. Albert Powell, a sister of Mrs. Evans, went to the latter's home today. Not finding her, Mrs. Powell searched the apartment and noticed a large wardrobe trunk had been moved from its usual place to the center of the room. She notified the police, who broke open the trunk and found the body.

## WARNING IS ISSUED TO PHYSICIANS AND DRUGGISTS BY PROHIBITION DIRECTOR

AUSTIN, March 17.—Information has been received, said Clifford G. Beckham, Texas federal prohibition director, today that physicians and druggists have, in many instances, been violating the provisions of the national prohibition act. Data received has been compiled and discussed, and will probably, he added, lead to a number of prosecutions.

Mr. Beckham continued:

"Abundant opportunity has been offered both physicians and druggists to comply with the law and regulations and all violators will be vigorously prosecuted.

"In justice to the ethical practitioners and ethical druggists, the co-operation of all individuals and organizations favorable to the decent observance of law, is earnestly solicited. The bootlegging doctor and the bar-

tending druggist must cease other vocations—and in the class of bootlegging doctors will be considered the convivial physician who favors a friend with a prescription for intoxicating liquor for old time's sake and the class of bartending druggists who include those druggists who treat their friends and physician patrons to intoxicating draughts.

"The attorney general of Texas, the comptroller and all other officials, state, county and city, are assured of the most earnest and cordial co-operation of the federal prohibition enforcement organization in Texas. To local officers will be given, in all cases, the opportunity first to enforce the law, but the law must be enforced. There will be no invasion of state's rights, but in equal dignity with the doctrine of state's rights is the doctrine of state's obligations. Prohibition is going to prohibit."

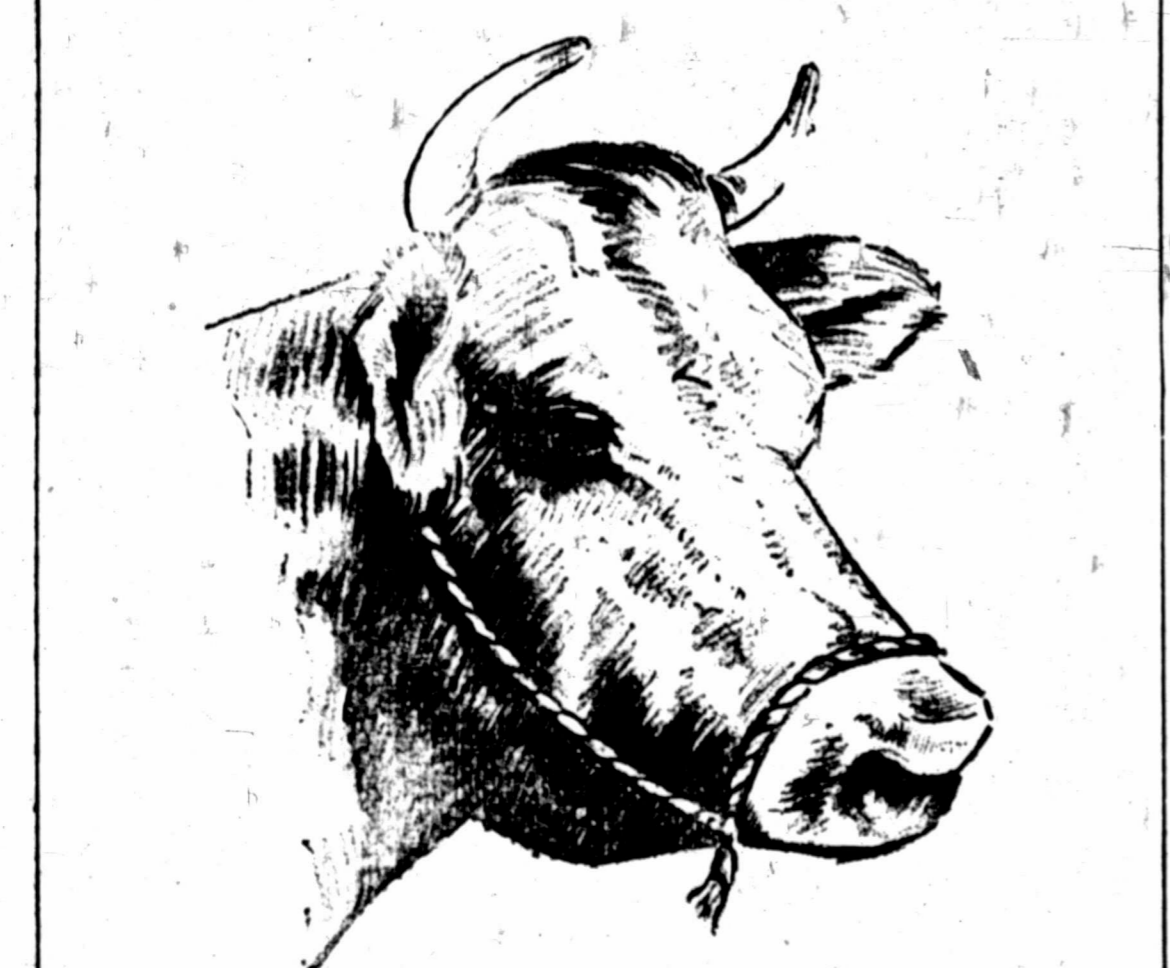

# BRYAN TALKS OF ISSUES AND THE CAMPAIGN

Says Prohibition and Peace Treaty Should Not be Numbered Among Issues

## DESIGNATES THE TREATY AS THE ONE BIG THING NOW

Declares it Must be Ratified No Matter What Senators May Think of Reservations

By HUGH BAILEE, United Press Staff Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The presidential campaign must be fought out on the big domestic issues of interest to all the people, but prohibition and the peace treaty should not be numbered among these issues, in the opinion of William J. Bryan, as indicated in an interview here today. "Both parties will put prohibition planks in their platforms and nominate candidates pledged to enforcement of the law," Bryan declared. He asserted his appearance in Washington had nothing to do with the peace treaty situation, but said: "As a democrat, I am interested in seeing my party remain true to the principles of democracy and refuse to believe that any considerable number of democrats will join the irreconcilable opponents of the treaty to prevent ratification. Such a course is unthinkable and for the democrats to do such a thing would be an unseemly disgrace forever afterward."

Bryan waved aside reference to prohibition and declared the treaty was the big thing now. "It must be ratified," he insisted. "It must be ratified no matter what senators may think of the reservations that have been adopted, nearly all by more than a two-thirds vote. If the democratic party feels that the senate has made a mistake it can ask for a reversal at the polls and then proceed to secure the league of nations any change that the people want made. But we cannot afford to stand before the world as a nation fighting to make the world safe for democracy, if we are not willing to trust democracy in our own country." Bryan's arrival in Washington was ignored by the democratic organization officials of which he professed to know nothing of his movements. He said he was just here by chance, being en route to New York to celebrate his sixtieth birthday. Friday. But it was generally understood that he was getting in touch with his friends in the senate and making a final effort to force ratification in spite of President Wilson's stand against ratification with the Lodge reservations, and his willingness to carry the treaty fight into the campaign.

# FIVE ARE DEAD RESULT STORM NORTH DAKOTA

Young Girl Gives Life to Save Her Brother and Sister From The Blizzard

BISMARCK, N. D., March 17.—Five known dead and thousands of dollars of property damage was the toll taken by the blizzard which for two days has been sweeping the state. The storm early today was reported to be gradually subsiding with temperature sinking. One girl gave her life to save her sister and brother, while the heroic effort of another youth proved futile.

When their sleigh was wrecked by the wind, Hazel Miner, aged 18, took off her coat and wrapped it and blankets around her small brother and sister near center. They lay in snowdrifts before they were found by searching parties. Hazel was dead when found but her action in bundling up the little ones saved their lives.

Adolph Wohlka, son of Gust Wohlka, a farmer living near Ryder, attempted to bring assistance to his three brothers when the team of horses he was driving home became exhausted and died. After making his three brothers as comfortable as possible, he attempted to reach home. His father found him and the three other children frozen, 24 hours later, in a deep snow drift.

# NO REDUCTION OF INCOME TAX PRIOR TO 1929

Such is the Opinion Expressed by Secretary of the Treasury Houston, Today

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Federal income taxes cannot be reduced until after 1929, Secretary of the Treasury Houston today informed the house ways and means committee.

He declared, however, that revision of several of the present federal taxes should be made and revenues adjusted to make up for the loss the government will sustain as a result of the supreme court decision which divided the income tax on stock are non-taxable. To make up for the loss in revenue caused by the supreme court decision knocking out stock dividends, Houston recommended a tax on the undistributed profits of all corporations after Jan. 1, 1929.

Excess profits taxes also cannot be reduced until 1929, the secretary wrote the committee. "The greatest need, Houston said, is a simplification of the income and profit taxes. "Public opinion has not awakened to the gravity of the consequences which are likely to follow failure to simplify the tax law at this legislative session," the secretary wrote. Houston proposed that the present excess profits tax which are graduated from 20 to 40 per cent be changed and a flat tax on profits in excess of the distributed earnings substituted. He suggested that the rate of this flat tax be 25 per cent for 1929, 20 per cent for 1930 and 15 per cent for 1931.

Reduction in income and profits taxes for the calendar year 1929 to be paid in 1929 must be "very modest," he said. "The excess profits taxes should be simplified and then repealed as soon as government financial conditions warrant," Houston declared. "Other recommendations were: Simplification of liberty bond exemption. Authority for the treasury department to make immediate settlement of claims made for overtaxation. Limitation of time for making claim for overtaxation. Houston warned the government could not long continue to collect surtaxes ranging as high as 85 per cent.

# SIMS WANTED ONE NATION TO CONTROL NAVY

Suggested Operations During War Be Turned Over To One, The Others to Co-operate

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Rear Admiral William S. Sims urged that entire control over naval operations during the war be turned over to one of the allies, the others to put their resources at this nation's disposal, he disclosed in testimony before the senate naval affairs committee today. Although he did not suggest that Great Britain was the nation to assume this unrestricted control, he pointed out to the senate department that she was bearing the brunt of the war and that London was the logical center for directing all allied naval operations.

The navy declined to take this view, Sims declared, he was denied such a staff as any business concern would have provided; that troop shipments were endangered because his staff was too small to handle necessary details; that repeated requests for extra help were ignored by Washington and that he was compelled to take commanding officers from destroyers to do office work necessary to protection of troop ships.

# SHIPPING BOARD DECIDES TO TAKE OIL AT \$2.07

Will Enter Into Private Agreement With Standard and Mexican Petroleum Co.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The shipping board today decided to enter into a private agreement with the Standard Oil company of New Jersey, the Mexican Petroleum company and one other big corporation to provide 15,000,000 barrels of crude oil at a price averaging \$2.07 per barrel. This is expected to care for the needs of the shipping board for six months.

The price is far below that offered by the navy department in bids opened yesterday which ranged from \$3.65 to \$4 a barrel. Formal announcement of the contract by the shipping board is expected tomorrow or Friday.

The problem confronting the navy now is being studied by President Wilson, who has before him a complete history of the ineffectual attempts of the navy to obtain fuel oil together with recommendations from the council of national defense that the navy take over the entire output of the Omege Indian oilion amounting to 15,000,000 barrels a year. After having decided to take over the Omege production as recommended by the council, navy and other government officials delayed announcement of this until they examined the latest bids.

# CLAIM OKLAHOMA PAPER USED DISCRIMINATION

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., March 17.—Claims that the Oklahoma Publishing Company used discrimination in refusing to publish advertisements are contained in charges before the corporation commission by Corporation Commissioner Campbell Russell. Russell alleges that advertisements accepted and printed were charged for at an exorbitant rate and that the defendant company refused without just cause to print others. He also charges that one advertisement which he paid for was not printed at all.

Russell's charges are the result of an investigation during the recent special session of the legislature when a commission was appointed to probe this allegation of irregularities in the pardon and parole system. There is indicated in a charge by Russell that the publishing company printed untrue statements about him in connection with an address which he says was made before the state press association.

# BONILLAS ACCEPTS THE NOMINATION FOR PRESIDENT MEXICO

NEUVO LAREDO, MEXICO, March 17.—In the presence of a great crowd assembled today in front of the Concordia theater here, Ambassador Bonillas accepted the nomination by the Civillista party for the presidency of Mexico. The nomination was tendered him by Gen. Frederico Montes and Manuel Amaya. The ambassador's speech of acceptance was brief. He announced he had withheld his acceptance until he set foot on Mexican soil. Bonillas was met at the international bridge this morning by distinguished military and civil officials and thousands of citizens, who accorded him a great demonstration. When speaking he frequently was compelled to wait until cries of "Viva Bonillas" had subsided before continuing his remarks. He will board the special train for Mexico City tomorrow.

# LEAGUE SEEMS TO HAVE LOST IN NORTH DAKOTA

Will Be Several Days Before Returns Are Received From Over The State

BISMARCK, N. D., March 17.—The National Non-Partisan League here was threatened with defeat today for the first time in four years. Blizzards throughout the state yesterday interfered with the rural vote in presidential primaries and the urban vote was believed to have been in favor of the republican faction opposed to the league. Senator Hiram Johnson was believed to have received the big vote for a republican nominee. W. J. Bryan's name was the sole entry on the democratic ballot. However, the names of A. Mitchell Palmer, W. G. McAdoo and former Ambassador Gerard were written on many. Figures will not be available for several days, election officials said. The total vote was light, due partly to weather conditions and partly to the action of one republican faction in advising republican candidates to refrain from becoming candidates.
