As a test the commissioners adopted a resolution urging the attorney general to institute proceedings to recover fifty acres now held by the North Texas Oil Company.

Land commissioners base their claim on a state law which says that beds of all streams more than two chains in width are state property. In this event the entire tract, thirty miles long and from a couple of hundred yards to a mile and a half in width belong to the state.

"Regardless of any personal point of view in this matter there is to me nothing that is such a breach of good taste, or the very foundation of the relations among government officials as for them to issue to the public press correspondence that may have passed between them and their superiors in the course of their service, without approval on both sides. I am informed it was not issued from the White House. It is scarcely necessary for me to say it was not released by me and that a searching inquiry in my office satisfies me that inquiry in my office satisfies me that it has not come from my staff."
