1992 Highlights Presented

Weather, Wrecks Are In The News

County political races, which saw races for County Commissioner in Precinct 1, County Tax Assessor-Collector and County Sheriff, spiced up the news as mirrored in Friona Star headlines during 1992.

A sampling of the 1992 news as recorded in the pages of the local newspaper for the year shows the following:

JANUARY

A contract, in the amount of \$10,795,844.15, was awarded to Amarillo Road Co. for the second stage of the widening of U.S. Highway 60, from Friona to Bovina. A pre-construction conference was held at the City Hall in Friona on January 9.

Charles Schmidt, spokesman for Amarillo Road Co., said it was his company's hopes to finish the project by December 1, 1993. That would roughly mean a year for construction of the two new lanes and another year for reconstructing the present two lanes of the highway. The contract allows the company 29 months for completion.

In a light turnout of voters January 18, Friona voters approved holding of bingo games for charitable organizations in the city, by a 19-vote margin, 123-104.

John G. Mars of Friona announced his candidacy for Commissioner of Precinct 1, subject to the Democratic primary March 10.

Youngsters from Lazbuddie, Friona and Farwell exhibited the top animals at the 45th Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show January 24-25. Monty Schueler of Friona exhibited the grand champion lamb and Lori Bradshaw of Lazbuddie showed the grand champion steer. Shane Roberts of Farwell owned the grand champion barrow.

FEBRUARY

Funeral services for Beelee K. Goodwin, 43, were held February 5. Goodwin died February 3 after suffering a heart attack. Goodwin had served as Friona City Manager since October of 1983. He was a past president of the Panhandle City Managers Assn. and was very active in activities of the PRPC.

Parmer County telephone subscribers began using 9-1-1 services on February 13. The availability of 9-1-1 service in Parmer County was made possible through a cooperative effort with Parmer County, the cities of Bovina, Farwell and Friona and the PRPC.

The F.H.S. Squaws clinched a spot in the basketball playoffs for the first time in five years, with district wins over defending state champion Tulia and rival Dimmitt. The Squaws tied for the second-half lead after placing second to the Bobbies in the first half. The Friona girls had a 4-1 district record in each "half" of district play, and compiled a 21-10 regular-season record.

The Squaws lost to the eventual state champion Canyon Lady Eagles, 68-23 in their bi-district playoff game on February 21.

The Friona Star beat the odds by having a third weekly issue published on the leap-year date of February 29 within a 24-year period. Ordinarily it would take 84 years for a weekly newspaper to have its turn at three Leap Year dates, but the Star had changed days of publication twice in the past two decades to beat the odds.

Local resident Lonnie Ellis was pictured on the occasion of his 11th "full" birthday--February 29.

Carol Aistrup is the new office manager at Friona's Excel Corp. A native of Wichita, Kansas, she replaces Bob Buchwald at the position.

MARCH

Erika Bermea entered the project named "Best of Show" at the annual Friona High School Science Fair March 3.

Johnny Mars edged Ernest Anthony for the nomination for county commissioner, 175 votes to 162. Doris Herington defeated Bob Stafford in defense of her tax assessor-collector office, 617-450.

Governor Ann Richards assured a capacity crowd in Muleshoe March 6 that although they live a long way from Austin, they still have some political clout with her. The governor was a big hit with the banquet crowd.

Stan Cobb, alias "Cowboy Jack," served as speaker for Friona's 1992 Chamber of Commerce banquet on March 19.

Receiving honors at the annual Chamber banquet were Cordie Potts as Man of the Year; Marca Lynn Herring, Woman of the Year; Vickie Copley, "Employee of the Year" and Tommy Carr, Teacher of the Year. Antonia Torres and Chad Hamilton were honored as outstanding young people.

A weather system hit the Friona area the night of March 27, spawning tornado funnels that caused some damage in the rural area. Bearing the brunt of the damage was the Wells Feedlot, about 1.5 miles east of the city. A leg for a large grain-drying facility was twisted, a tank was blown across Highway 60, and other damage was done.

APRIL

Over 100 members of the American Legion attended the 18th District spring convention of the organization in Friona April 4-5. J.P. Sims of Friona serves as 18th District commander.

Four Friona High School students placed first with their entries at the Regional Science Fair in Amarillo. They were Abraham DeLaO, Jeff Schueler, Steven Burns and Joseph Ryan.

The first circus to visit Friona in several years, the King Royal Circus, put on performances here on April 14. The nation's second-largest tent circuses featured "Boo," a 3-1/2 ton

Cora Snyder Is Injured In Collision

A head-on collision six-tenths of a mile southwest of Friona on U.S. Highway 60 Monday, January 4 seriously injured Cora Snyder.

Mrs. Snyder was air-lifted to University Medical Center in Lubbock after being stabilized at Parmer County Community Hospital. She sustained head and chest injuries, a broken wrist, broken hip and broken leg, according to DPS trooper Craig Hunt.

Mrs. Snyder, driving a Dodge pick-up, was struck head-on by a pickup driven by Alfredo Chavez of Clovis, when he attempted to pass another vehicle near the Frio Draw bridge. Mrs. Snyder was southwest-bound. The wreck happened about 8:15 a.m.

Chavez, an employee of Excel, was treated and released from the hospital. He was reportedly enroute to Liberal, Kansas.

Hunt said Thursday that no citation had been issued at that point in time.

Project Has Good Response

Project Christmas Card raised over \$4300 for Parmer County Community Hospital, it was revealed this week.

The exact total was not readily available at the Star's press time this week, but it appears that the gifts for 1992 topped those for the previous year by perhaps 10 per cent.

The proceeds will go to purchase a new microfilm camera for Parmer County Hospital.

Project Christmas Card is co-sponsored each year by Modern Study Club and the Friona Star.

City To Enforce Ordinance

The City of Friona has received numerous complaints on dogs running loose, and plans to enforce its animal ordinance, according to City Manager Paula Wilson.

Mrs. Wilson pointed out that the fine for a dog running at large is \$33.00. If the animal has not had its shots, another \$30 can be levied; plus \$18.00 for no tags; \$7.50 for picking the animal up, plus \$3.00 per day for the pound charge.

As you can see, a single ticket on an animal can run from \$65.00 to \$100.00.

The city has traps available, if residents need them to help catch troublesome dogs or cats. They may pick these up at the City Hall.

New Dumpster System Is Inaugurated Locally

The City of Friona began its new trash pickup system, utilizing the B.F.I. Company of Canyon, on the first of the year, and certain regulations need to be followed.

According to state law, certain items cannot be disposed of in the dumpsters. These unlawful items include:

*batteries; *tires; *containers of insecticide or paint (unless washed three times, the containers crushed and any hazardous or poison stickers removed or covered up); *oil filters; *55-gallon drums; *refrigerators (unless the freon is removed, the motor removed and tagged by a licensed freon remover); *wire, *hot water heaters *appliances.

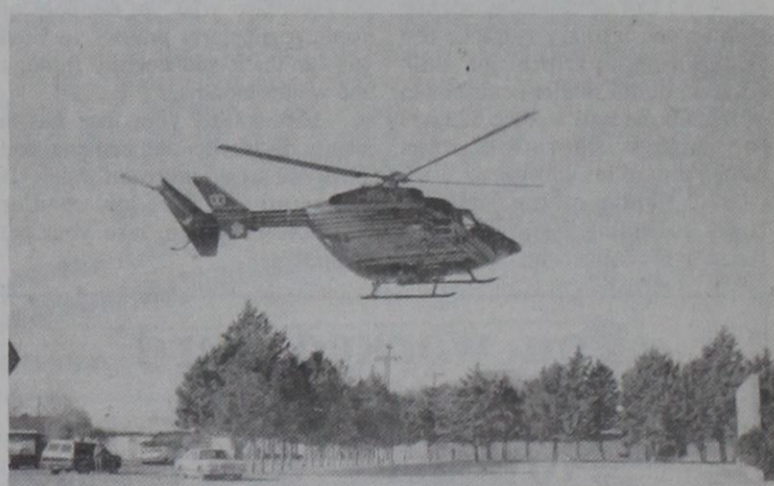
These items can be taken to the large roll-off boxes, which will be placed at the City Barn, to handle tree limbs, furniture and appliances.

Within two years, grass clippings and tree limbs will be prohibited, according to City Manager Paula Wilson.

Initial complaints or questions should be addressed to the City Hall. After the transition period, it will be necessary to call the 800 number on the dumpsters.

City officials added that residents should not place any garbage outside the dumpster or in the alley. Also, no tree limbs or furniture. Those still having Christmas trees are asked to bring them to the City Barn.

Mrs. Wilson said that in the residential district, one dumpster will service roughly four homes. "They ran short in the western part of town, and some additional dumpsters will be added there in the near future," she said.

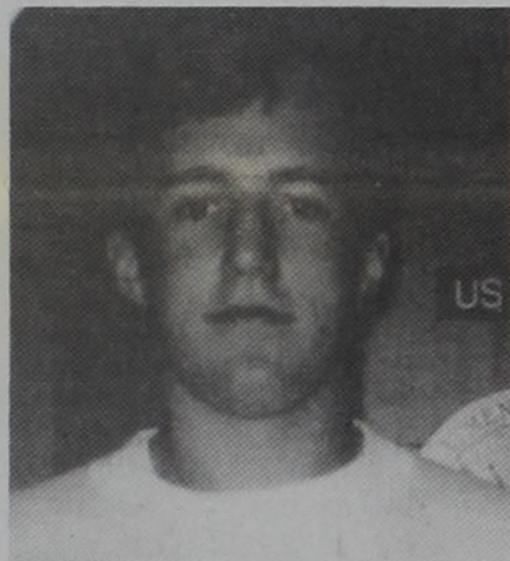
Local Boy Enlists In U.S. Army

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Chiefs Have Run Of Rotten Luck

If it weren't for bad luck lately, the Chieftain basketballers would have had no luck at all.

The team competed in the annual Caprock Holiday Tournament at Lubbock the week after Christmas.

Talk about luck of the draw--the Chiefs drew Krum in the first round. The small North Texas school ended up as tournament champs after blasting their way through all the top teams in the tourney, making Friona's 73-43 loss not seem so bad.

The Dallas-area school had a season record of 18-1 following their 5-0 exhibition against the best of the South Plains had to offer.

Kyle Potts' 16 points led the Chieftains, and he was the only Friona player in double figures.

In the second round, the Chiefs drew always-potent Lubbock Dunbar, and made a game of it against the Panthers, before dropping a 76-70 decision. The loss eliminated the Chiefs in the tournament.

Blair Burney's trio of baskets and Mark Outland's pair, including a three-pointer, helped the Friona boys pull to within two points, 35-33 at the half.

After Dunbar took a 54-48 lead entering the final quarter, Kyle Potts warmed up with a trio of goals from the field and hit two of two at the free throw line and teammate Terron Talley added seven points, including a bonus basket, as Friona outscored the Lubbock team, 22-18 and made it close at the finish.

Outland led the Chiefs in scoring with 17 points; Potts had 15 and Talley 13.

The Chiefs visited Nazareth Tuesday of this week, to battle the Swifts.

Potts rang the bell with three baskets in the opening quarter, his first one a bonus shot, and hit two

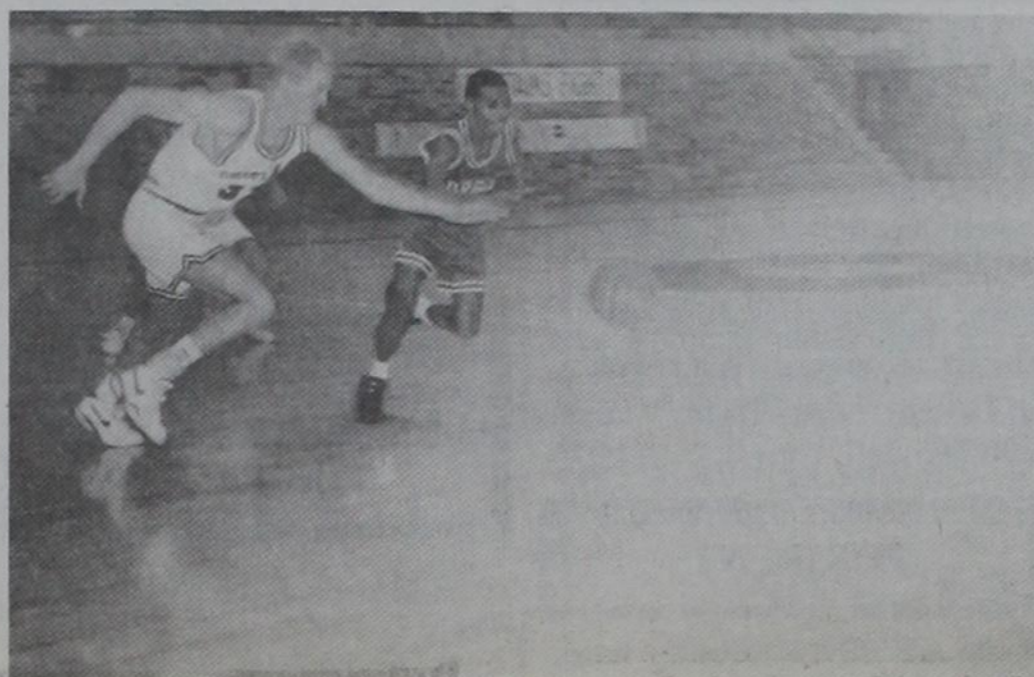

Squaws Sparkle In Holiday Meet

The FHS Squaws played some outstanding basketball at the Caprock Holiday Tournament in Lubbock December 28-30.

The team battled to the Division A consolation finals, where they lost to Midland Lee, 68-60 in the trophy game.

But enroute to that confrontation, the team compiled a 3-1 record against some outstanding basketball teams.

Friona downed Midland High School in the first round, 72-51.

The Squaws got some great shooting, with four players in double figures. Angela Belcher paced the point-makers with 22; Tena Willard added 15; Renee Downey and Renee Martin scored 11 each.

Friona hit 47 per cent from the field, and a sizzling 85 per cent from the line (17 of 20).

In the second round, the team had the misfortune of facing Randall, and lost to the Canyon team for the second time this season. It was a 33-28 game at the half, but the Lady Raiders outscored the Squaws, 24-7 in the third quarter to put the game away.

Miss Belcher scored 15 and Tena Willard 11 to pace Friona.

The team bounced back the next day with a 46-38 win over Stephenville.

Tena Willard's trio of baskets and Miss Belcher's seven points helped the Squaws take a 29-20 halftime lead over the team from another region. The team lost Miss Willardon fouls, but held on for the win.

Miss Belcher scored 27 and Miss Willard 14 to pace Friona.

Early Wednesday, the Squaws met district-mate Tulia in the semi-finals of the bracket.

After a 19-all first half, Misses Belcher and Tena Willard paced the team to a 24-15 edge in the second half for the margin of victory.

Renee Downey, who hit four three-pointers, led the scoring with 18 points. Miss Belcher scored 15 and Miss Willard 10.

In the consolation finals, the Squaws hooked up in a barn-burner against the Midland Bulldogs. It was 25-all after one quarter, as Friona clicked on FIVE three-point

shots, including two apiece by Renee Downey and Gena Willard.

Midland clung to a 37-36 halftime lead. Scoring slacked off in the second half, and Midland had to outscore Friona, 18-10 in the final quarter for the win.

The Willard twins scored 39 of Friona's 60 points. Tena scored 20 and Gena 19. The Squaws had a good shooting game, hitting 40 per cent from the field, and 10 of 11 from the line, needing more free throw opportunities. They had only six shots in the first half (hitting them all), and five in the second (hitting four).

On Tuesday of this week, the team scored its 13th win of the season against only six losses when they downed Nazareth there, 53-39.

Friona's 17-6 run in the second half put them in control, and they canned 12 straight free throws in the final quarter to ice the game.

Renee Downey scored 16 and Renee Martin 12. Miss Downey had four three-point baskets. Friona hit 44 per cent from the field (17 of 39) and 80 per cent from the line (12 of 15).

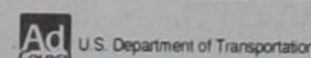

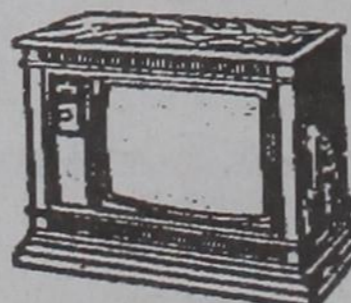

Screening Clinic Is Scheduled In Friona

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer

Society for breast screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Tuesday, February 16 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Wednesday, February 17 from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland. Exams are done by appointment only.

Wildlife Habitat Discussed

If you like to improve wildlife habitat, some of the best improvements that could benefit the lake areas would be to plant food plots around the outer areas. This could include milo, millet, corn, or native grasses.

From a wildlife standpoint, the greatest benefits would be in the development of nesting and brood-rearing habitat for pheasants, quail, rabbits and a wide variety of non-game wildlife species.

The nesting period for most wildlife in the area is the period from April through August. These are the critical times and spraying, mowing or other disturbances should be kept to an absolute minimum.

At this time, the Parmer County S.W.C.D. has available wildlife packets from the Texas Forest Service. These are for quail

and pheasants, deer, turkey or squirrel.

The deadline to order trees or wildlife packets is March 1, 1993.

All services are available regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, marital status or handicap.

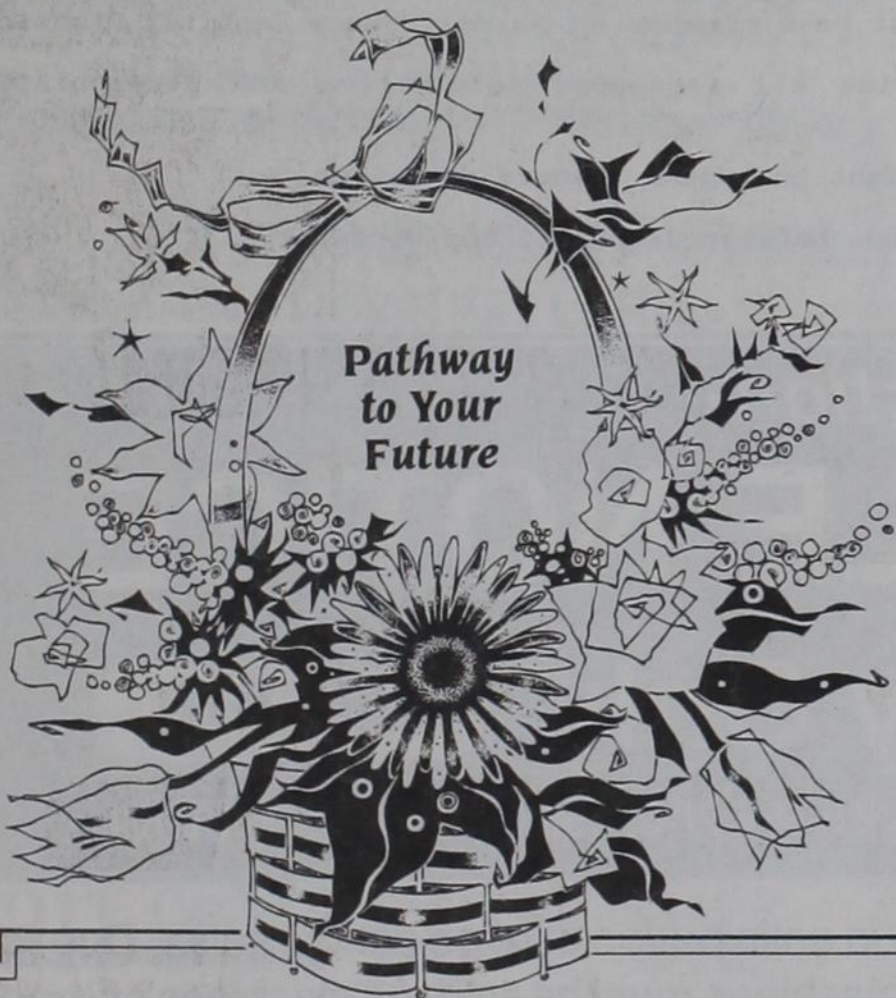

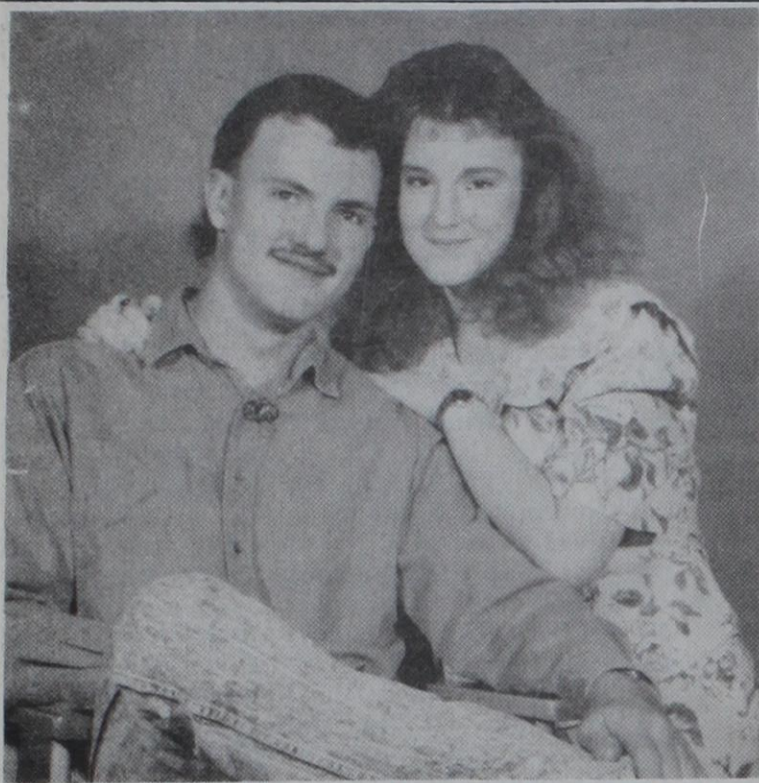

Homemade Pizza

BY CARLA McKEOWN

One of our favorite wedding gifts is a pizza pan set that a friend from Chicago gave us. Tony and I enjoy working side-by-side in the kitchen creating the pizza of our dreams.

Sometimes we make pizzas completely from scratch, including the crust and sauce. Other times when we want the meal but not the hassle, we use refrigerated pizza dough and canned sauce. Either way, we're guaranteed a pizza made exactly the way we want it.

For an even quicker "pizza," top a variety of prepared breads—English muffins, tortillas, pita halves, sliced French bread—with pizza sauce, cooked meat and cheese.

To make any pizza—traditional or quick and easy—spread pizza sauce on the crust, sprinkle with shredded

cheese, and top with the meat and vegetables of your choice. Bake until the crust is browned and the cheese melted and bubbly.

Experiment with different combinations of toppings. Try the traditional ground beef, pepperoni, Italian sausage; or opt for something new, such as shrimp, chicken or turkey. For a vegetarian pizza, use sliced squash and eggplant, chopped onion, mushrooms, bell peppers, garlic and chopped parsley.

Use an assortment of cheeses, including Mozzarella, Cheddar, Swiss, Monterey Jack, American and Colby-Jack.

Try the following recipes, adapting them to your tastes if necessary.

PIZZA SAUCE

- 1 15 ounce can tomato puree
- 1 14-1/2 ounce can whole tomatoes, drained and chopped
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon dried basil leaves or 1-1/2 teaspoons chopped fresh basil leaves
- 1/4 teaspoon dried tarragon leaves or 1 teaspoon fresh tarragon leaves
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano leaves or 1 teaspoon fresh oregano leaves

Combine all ingredients in a large skillet; bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Cool. Makes about 2-1/2 cups.

PIZZA CRUST

- 1 package active dry yeast
 - 3/4 cup warm water
 - 2-1/2 cups packaged biscuit mix
 - Vegetable oil
- Soften yeast in warm water (110 degrees). Add biscuit mix; beat vigorously for 2 minutes. Dust surface with biscuit mix, knead dough until smooth. Divide dough in half and roll each piece of dough into a 12-inch circle. Place dough circles on greased baking sheets; crimp edges. Brush dough with oil. Fill with desired toppings. Bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes or until crust is done. Makes 2 12-inch pizzas.

QUICK AND EASY MEXICAN PIZZAS

- 1/2 cup Pizza Sauce
- 1/2 cup hot or mild salsa
- 1 tablespoon minced cilantro or parsley
- 4 large flour tortillas
- 1 8 ounce can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1 5-1/2 ounce can canned chicken or turkey, drained
- 1/2 cup drained canned pinto beans
- 1 4 ounce green chilies, drained, cut into strips
- 1 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese

Mix pizza sauce, salsa and cilantro; spread on tortillas. Arrange corn, chicken, pinto beans and chilies over sauce; sprinkle with cheese. Broil until cheese is melted, about 3 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

QUICK AND EASY FRENCH PIZZAS

- 1 cup pizza sauce
 - 1/4 teaspoon dried tarragon leaves
 - 1/8 teaspoon dried thyme leaves
 - 4 pita breads
 - 1-10 ounce can baby or minced clams, drained
 - 1 4-1/4-ounce medium shrimp, rinsed, drained
 - 1 small red pepper, sliced
 - 8 pitted ripe olives, sliced
 - 1 tablespoon drained capers
 - 1/4 cup crumbled goat cheese
- Mix pizza sauce, tarragon and thyme; spread on pita breads. Arrange clams, shrimp, red pepper and olives over sauce. Sprinkle with capers and goat cheese. Broil until cheese is melted, about 3 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

Thanks to an arrest this week by Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams, the Friona packing facility is hoping to put an end to this problem. Three Clovis men were arrested for a threat that happened October 6.

An Abernathy man, Gary Dale Green, 39, was killed October 14 when the tractor-trailer rig he was driving was struck by a Santa Fe Railway train at a crossing 1.4 miles west of Friona.

Five Friona teenagers were arrested the week of October 17 in conjunction with the burglaries of two local residences. Homes broken into were the Trey Ellis home, and the D.T. King, Jr. residence.

The year-end report of Prairie Acres showed a current census of 57 residents, an increase of about 16 since last year, it was reported. Overall, the nursing facility has shown a dramatic improvement in its census and its financial situation.

Dr. Robert Alexander was named Physician of the Year by the Texas Academy of Physicians, Panhandle Chapter, at the group's annual banquet October 24 in Amarillo.

For the second time in just over two weeks, a fatal accident happened at the Santa Fe crossing about 1.4 miles southwest of Friona on Friday, October 30. Killed was Ben Marquez, 52, of Bovina, an employee of Parmer County.

DECEMBER

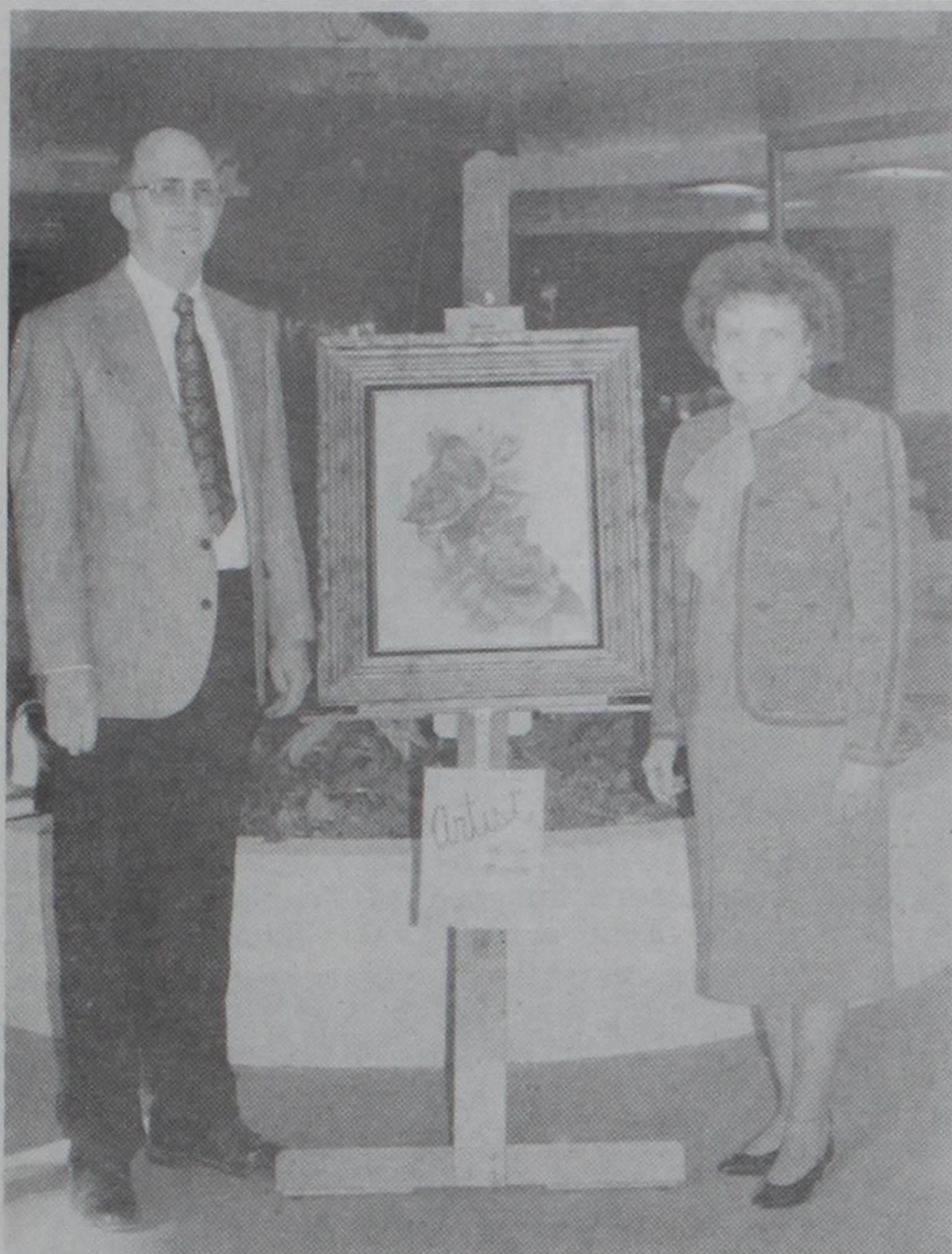

"If Christians take that challenge seriously, it would greatly diminish such problems as crime, drug abuse and broken families," Stone added.

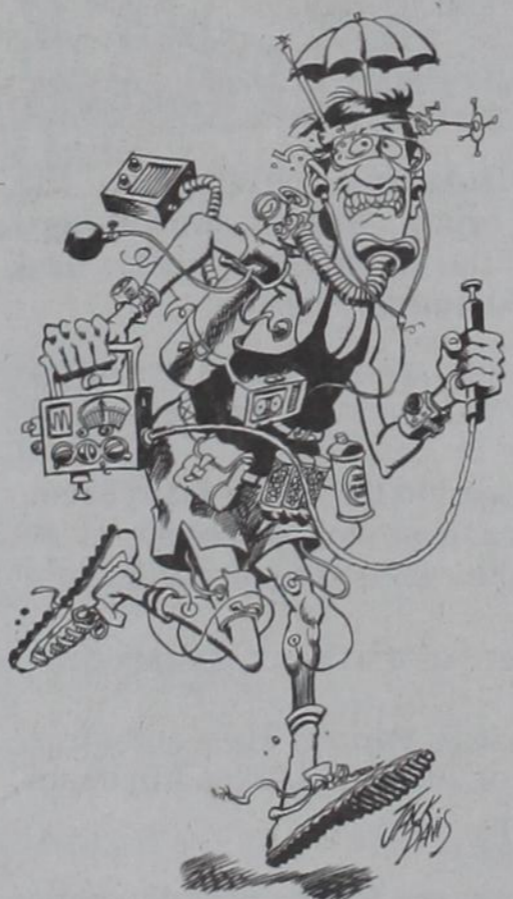

Is A Living Trust For You?
 Mail-order shopping is becoming the American way. People today buy clothes, furniture and even food from catalogs and 800 numbers.
 Likewise, living-trust information often reaches investors by way of advertisements or direct mail. The fact is, though, that reputable attorneys seldom promote living trusts to the general public because, like any legitimate estate-planning tool, they are structured to individual needs.
 A common misconception about trusts is that they will keep creditors at bay or will enable a person's estate to avoid inheritance taxes and legal fees.
 Basically, like most trusts, a living trust enables you to shift assets to a trustee who oversees and distributes the assets according to the guidelines written in the trust. A living trust enables you to retain nearly total control over the assets while you're alive.
 Another benefit of a trust is that it can give you more control over the distribution of your estate. With a will, the assets of an estate

are immediately distributed to the heirs unless specific provisions are made. With a trust, however, you can designate the amount and timing of each heir's distributions. For example, one heir could receive 50 per cent of his or her distribution at age 21 and the rest at age 25, while another may receive 100 per cent at age 30.
 A living trust can also increase the privacy of your estate. Issues involving probate are matters of public record. Because a living trust bypasses probate, the details of your estate can remain confidential. This prevents anyone from having access to information such as your estate's value, the names of heirs and any debts attributed to the estate.
 One potential drawback to a living trust is its typically higher start-up costs compared to other estate-planning tools, such as wills. Because an attorney is involved, and the trust itself is a lengthy document prepared to your individual specifications, it costs a little more to establish. However, the extra cost may be worth more to you in future estate savings.
 If you're in the market for a living trust, remember that each is tailored to an individual's needs and is usually best drafted by a qualified estate-planning attorney.
