COPENHAGEN, March 24.—Formations of a new German cabinet are a matter of only a few hours and independent socialists are sure of getting several important portfolios, according to telegrams from Berlin this morning.

They are said to be dissatisfied with the government's "soft methods" toward "traitors" while armament spurs are simply staked against the wall.

WESSEL, GERMANY, March 24.—Six thousand government troops, reinforced by armed countrymen, had a skirmish with communist guards numbering about 10,000 near here last night. Reports are that 62 were killed and upwards of 100 wounded.

NEGRO CASE PROVIDES AN INTERESTING SESSION OF LOCAL POLICE COURT

A real old time Southern darkey, who looked like he had just stepped out of an "Uncle Remus" story, was before the bar of justice in city court Wednesday morning as one of the defendants in a case charging fighting. His opponent in the affray was another negro, several years his junior. The trouble arose, the testimony brought out, over the ownership of a certain quantity of lumber. It seems that a negro named "Miss Lula" borrowed lumber from both of the men to build a shack and when she later moved away told both of them to take what belonged to them. And there was the "rub."

Both of the participants in the fracas told widely differing stories. The old darkey said the other man made a pass at him whereupon he grabbed up a pinch bar and cracked the other behind the ear. He said the young negro then jumped on top of him and would have beat him to death had not some female relatives arrived and separated them. The young darkey flatly contradicted the tale and said the first inkling he had of trouble was when he discovered that he had been knocked unconscious by a pinch bar. When the city attorney asked him how he knew what the others were doing if he was "knocked" all the while he seemed nonplussed for a time.

CONSIDER ADVISABILITY OF THE USE OF ASPHALT FOR FURTHER PAVING

With concrete paving apparently held up to a large extent by a shortage of cement, the paving committee of the business council of the chamber of commerce is looking into the advisability of using asphalt paving here. It is felt that the demand for more paving is so great that some means should be found to carry the work forward without delay.

The chamber of commerce has been advised that the crushed rock which is so important an element in asphalt pavement can be obtained at the rate of 10 cars daily, beginning April 15. The Lone Star Stone company, headed by G. D. Anderson of the city, which is supplying crushed rock for the county's road-building operations, is able to furnish 10 cars daily, Mr. Anderson announces, and would make every effort to supply Wichita Falls' needs.

The business council is also looking into the question of the cost of asphalt, as compared with concrete paving, and will probably be able to make the figures public shortly. Preliminary figures indicate that asphalt can be put down cheaper than concrete.

Swarthmore College Romance Begun in School Days May Lead to White House.

The moment a man becomes a presidential possibility the first thing every woman in the country wants to know is whether he is married and what his wife is like.

An old fashioned wife in an old fashioned home surrounded by old fashioned furniture—that is a thumb nail picture of Roberta Dixon Palmer, who may become the first lady of the land.

Old fashioned she is, in that in a world of women seeking personal glory and furthering individual ambition, she believes that the greatest and most fascinating career is to be a wife and mother, and new-fashioned she is in that she also believes in votes for women and a woman's right to make her own place in the world.

This combination might seem paradoxical were it not for the fact that Mrs. Palmer, like the Attorney General of the United States, A. Mitchell Palmer, himself, comes of old Quaker stock, and the Quakers, generations ago, maintained the freedom and equality of women, while their wives tended the hearth fires with quite as much devotion and skill as their own women.

Her Quaker Birthright.

It is because of this Quaker birthright that Mrs. Palmer can be a suffragist, stand for all that is progressive in woman's affairs, and still find that being the wife of A. Mitchell Palmer and the mother of a charming, ten-year-old Mary Dixon Palmer, is the most thrilling adventure in the world.

There need be nothing contradictory in Mrs. Palmer's opinion; between old ideas and new necessities.

which other women may discover something of the secret of her husband's success.

Since they were married Mrs. Palmer's husband has gone from court stenographer to successful lawyer, Congressional leader, Cabinet officer, and finally to a candidacy for the presidency which is seriously recognized throughout the nation.

Their marriage might be called a Swarthmore romance. It was at that Quaker co-educational institution that they discovered each other. Mitchell Palmer was a senior when Roberta Dixon was a sophomore.

In those days, when young Palmer was glad to have a job as court stenographer, while he read law at night, not even Roberta Dixon's fondest dreams included his being attorney general, let alone a presidential possibility.

From Plain Everyday Beginnings.

And the Palmers are of that refreshing sort who remember that they came from plain, every-day beginnings. Mrs. Palmer has long been prominent in affairs at the National capital, but she does not forget the days when her husband was establishing his law practice and she was mothering her first babies, two little boys who died in childhood, leaving little Mary Dixon Palmer to bear the sorrow brought by their passing.

Mr. and Mrs. Palmer still live in their home the "thee" and "thou" of their youth, but despite her Quaker deprivation and training, Mrs. Palmer, like most women, has one extravagance. COMMUNIST PARTY OF RUSSIA TO HOLD CONVENTION 27TH

MOSCOW, March 24.—The ninth annual convention of the all-Russian communist party, which will open here March 27, will be of vital importance to the future of Soviet Russia as it will be given the task of outlining the internal economic policy of the country during the coming year.

Three principal matters of discussion will be before the convention, these being industrial rehabilitation, the agricultural policy, and the development and status of the co-operative societies. Two distinct parties have been formed, one favoring centralization of power and the other opposing that policy. The former proposes handling the industrial question through the mobilization of working forces, using the peasant military organizations as a basis. It also favors extensive development of agricultural communism and complete governmental control of cooperative societies, this being the official government program and having the support of Nikolai Lenin and Leon Trotsky.

The decentralists favor greater latitude for local trade unions, small hand grants and no immediate development of agricultural communes. This element consists mainly of provincial delegates who ask that more power be vested in local soviets. The outcome will have an important bearing on the external economic relations of Soviet Russia.

NO AUTHORITY TO PASS TREATY OVER PRESIDENT'S VETO

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Congress has no constitutional authority to pass over the president's veto a joint resolution declaring a state of peace between the United States and Germany, Senator Thomas, democrat, Colorado, declared today in the senate.

The senator said he had heard reports that leaders in congress planned to adopt such a resolution and, in the event of its disapproval, to pass it over the president's veto.

A resolution so adopted he said, would be ineffective, because under the constitution, the president is empowered to wage war and therefore must have a part in terminating it.

Y., March 24.—The five suspended socialist members of the state assembly "are ineligible and disqualified to occupy seats" counsel for the assembly judiciary committee asserted today in a brief filed with the committee, which conducted an investigation into the charges of disloyalty against the men.

It is by the organization to which they belong that these men must be judged," says the brief. "Their individual acts and declarations insofar as they have been proved—serve merely to illumine and to show in concrete the principal purposes and program of the organization, which stands and to confirm the seditious purposes of the party to which they belong."

"Socialists are trying to bring about a change of government by political action, backed by a general strike, the two being employed as the two strong arms of a giant to pull down the structure of our government."

The brief contends the socialists are ineligible "because of their disloyalty to the United States of America and State of New York."

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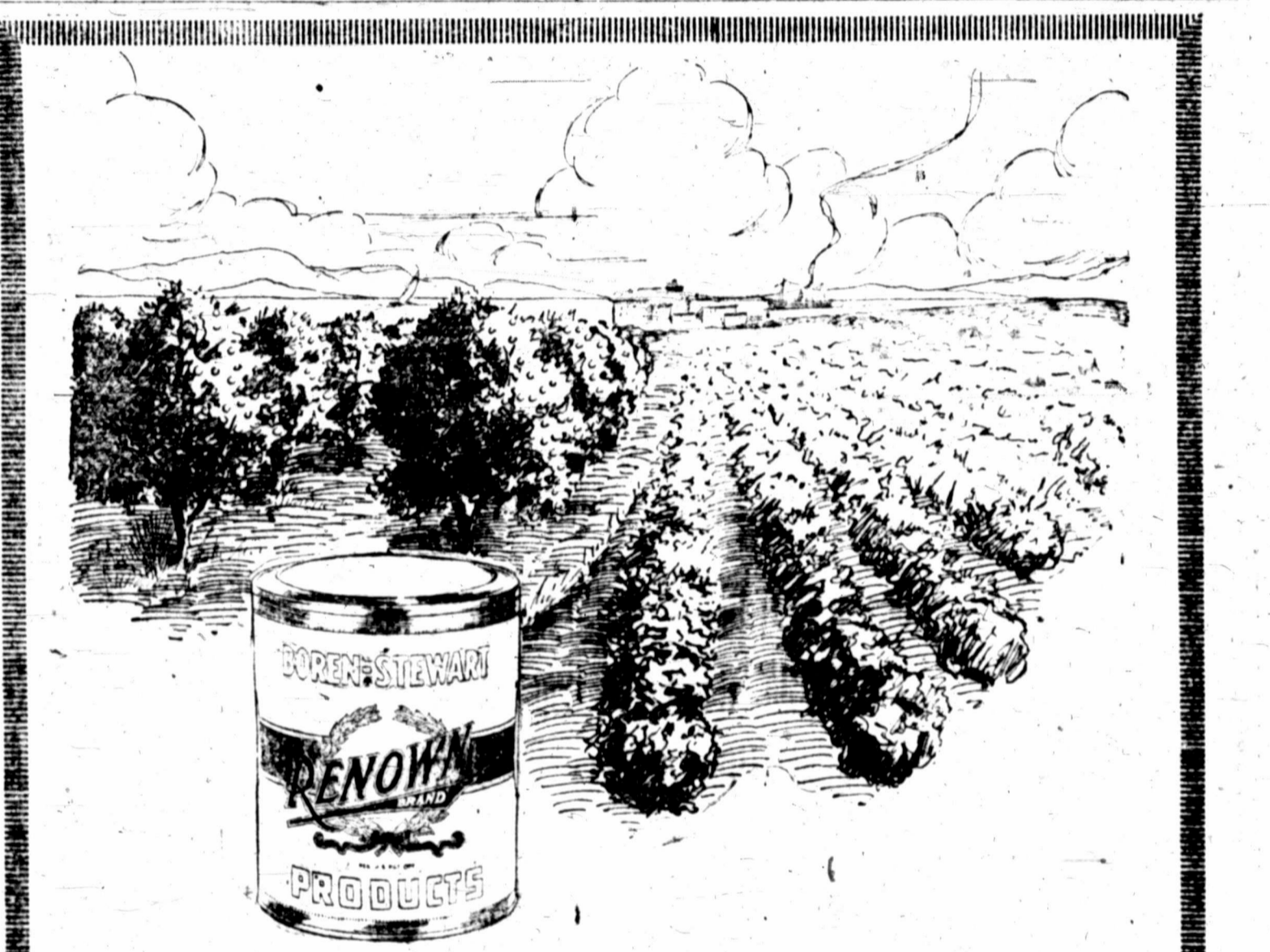

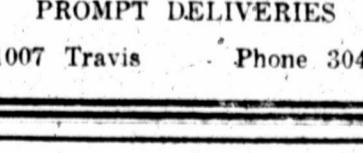

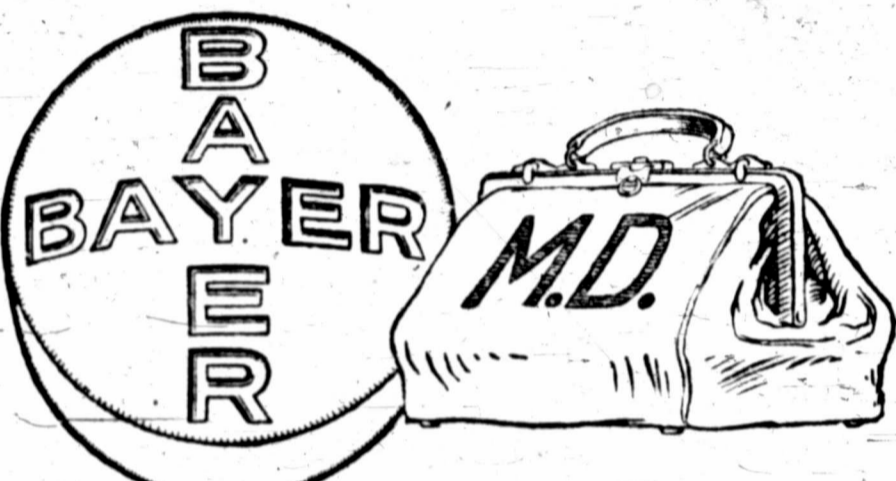

HOOVER ENDORSES WILSON INDUSTRIAL CONFERENCE PLAN

BOSTON, MASS., March 24.—Herbert Hoover, in addressing the members of the Boston chamber of commerce today, declared the Kansas law establishing an industrial court a "valuable experiment," but held little hope of its solving the industrial situation.

In periods of industrial prosperity, the advancing wage usually adjudicated by the industrial courts prevents strikes. Hoover said "but in times of industrial depression decisions against the working people give rise to the old form of resistance. No one denies the right of the individual to cease work. The question involved in this form of legislation is the right to combine in common action, by strike. Whether the right may be it is a certainty that the working community of the civilized world adheres to this right as an absolute fundamental to their position. The plan for settlement of labor differences drawn by the Wilson industrial conference, of which Hoover was a member, was supported by the speaker as "fundamentally the promotion of collective bargaining under fair conditions of representation of both sides. It would be neither a plan of arbitration, nor is it an industrial court," Hoover declared. "It is substitution to self government."

COTTON TAKES BIG SLUMP ON MARKET

NEW YORK, March 24.—March cotton contracts broke ever more rapidly and sensationally at the opening of the cotton market today than they had broken yesterday. The first sale was at 41.40 cents a pound and the price dropped to 40.25 cents on the next transaction, or 255 points below yesterday's closing figure and nearly \$12 per bale below the high record of yesterday morning. Only one notice of delivery was reported, but it was believed that unreported shorts had finished covering yesterday as there were only one or two buyers in evidence at the start. The big break in March had a confusing effect on "central settlement" and later deliveries were unsettled, selling off approximately 20 to 30 points under liquidation.

The suffrage plank was adopted in a session of the resolutions committee which lasted until after midnight. The convention opened last night, Senator Frank B. Hurdge delivering the keynote speech.

LONDON, March 24.—The Miners' federation of Great Britain has voted unanimously to reject the government's offer for a wage increase of one shilling six pence a day. The miners held to their demand for an increase of three shillings a day.

HOUSTON, TEX., March 24.—Nearly 100 farmers of seven southeast Texas counties met here today to discuss the pink boll worm situation. It is expected that vigorous steps will be taken to oppose the proposed quarantine and the non-cotton zoning system. Many farmers here say that the pink boll worm menace is largely imaginary.

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RESUME WORK ON FRIZZELL WELL IN HARDEMAN COUNTY

Special to The Times.—March 24.—Interest in the Harde-man county field is on the increase, with much activity in leases as a result of the recent showings and present prospects for oil in the Frizzell well, and the general development made possible by favorable weather during the last few weeks. Many men from the different oil centers have visited the county, among which were representatives of some of the larger operating companies of the state, many of whom have made extensive investments.

The Frizzell company's A. J. Norton No. 1 has resumed drilling at 1,672 feet, the officials having decided to pass up the showings at that depth and drill through the hard formation that underlie it, the casing having been set on the formation. The drill continues to get showings of oil and gas. This company's No. 2 on the Fortfield tract, and No. 3 on the Edgar Norton tract are changing to rotary machinery.

The Gilliam tract, owned by the Gilliam tract, have moved heavy timbers to their well and will begin the erection of a new derrick, afterward wrecking the old one which is too high for the work.

The Quannah Drilling association has received the proper tools, after a few days' delay, and have resumed operations on their test south of Quannah in Harde-man county.

The Mid-West company, having completed their Wheat well to the contract depth of 2,500 feet, have made a new contract to drill the well 4,000 feet, until the Pennsylvania formation is reached. The excellent formations in this well were responsible for the new contract, as the company believes that it will get a well.

The Walters well, northeast of Quannah, drilled into a gas pocket at about 250 feet, which increased the interest in the county.

The Mulkey test, being made by the Mid-West company, northeast of Quannah, has resumed drilling, after a few days' delay, due to inability to get tools.

PROPOSED SOLDIER BONUS BECOMES POLITICAL ISSUE

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 24.—The proposed soldier bonus has now become a political issue and will cause a lot of trouble to many a candidate for the house seats in the November elections.

Republicans members of the house charge the democrats are opposing the bonus, a bill for which will soon be drafted by the house ways and means committee.

A number of congressmen will be well pleased to see the bonus fall at this or any other session. A few are outspoken against it. Many will oppose the legislation in ways which do not become public.

TOPEKA.—Attorneys for Robert Hill, wanted in Arkansas on a charge of inciting to riot and arrested yesterday on a charge of impersonating a federal officer, announced Federal Judge John C. Block had agreed to a hearing on the merits of the case instead of sending the prisoner back to Arkansas upon approval of the indictment of the Arkansas court.

BERLIN.—The strike committee unanimously proclaimed the general strike ended.

GETTING COUNTRY BACK TO A PRE-WAR BASIS PROVING SOME PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Amid all the confusion and herbivorous legislation at the capital, some of which is pressing hard on congress, senators and representatives are finding time to consider the problem of how to get the country from a government standpoint, back to a pre-war basis.

In other words to separate from the White House all of the extraordinary powers conferred on the president during the war. Congress, which had to play second fiddle during the war, wants to resume as quickly as possible its pre-war function, that is as part of the tri-partite system of bar government, legislative, executive and judicial. The judiciary, even, was in large part set aside during the war.

Among the democratic and republican candidates, Attorney General Fahner is the only one who is willing that delegations be instructed for him. He allowed his name to remain on the Georgia primary ballot and pursued the same course in Pennsylvania, his home state. McAdoo is insisting that all delegates be uninstructed. Governor William J. He further expresses the hope that the steady influence of the banking power of this country will bring about a policy with manufacturers and other business men of accepting for the present smaller profits with a view to building up general and substantial prosperity for the future, and the habit of thrift and economy among the people.

was next on the list with a valuation of nearly \$342,000,000 as compared with \$189,000,000 during 1918. The other items which exceeded \$300,000,000 in its import value was hides and skins which was over \$306,000,000. Other important articles were coffee, \$251,000,000; rubber, \$221,000,000; wool, \$216,000,000; vegetable oil, \$133,000,000; chemicals, \$126,000,000; precious stones, \$106,000,000. The extent to which the popularity of precious stones has grown is well shown by the fact that this figure of \$106,000,000 shows an increase of over \$65,000,000 above the imports for the 12 months of 1918.

Another estimate of War Costs. Direct and indirect costs of the war approximated \$400,000,000,000, according to a comprehensive report made by the Carnegie endowment for international peace. Taking each of the countries engaged in the war, the report estimates the direct cost at \$186,000,000,000 and the indirect cost at about the same. Property losses are divided as follows: On land, \$29,960,000,000; shipping and cargo, \$6,800,000,000; loss of production, \$45,000,000,000; war relief, \$1,000,000,000. The cost to neutrals through indirect losses is placed at \$1,750,000,000 and the total indirect costs to all nations, both participants in the war and neutrals, at \$1,812,542,500.
