BOUNDARY HEARING IS ENDED

HERMANN MUELLER DECLINES TO FORM A NEW GERMAN CABINET ACCORDING TO LATE DISPATCHES

PARIS, March 27.—Hermann Mueller, foreign minister in the cabinet of Premier Bauer, has declined to accept the task of forming a new German ministry, according to information by the French foreign office today.

The Bauer government resigned as a body after it was attacked bitterly by the radical trade unions. The cabinet was in existence less than 24 hours.

Hermann Mueller, former minister of foreign affairs, was reported to have expressed doubt as to his ability to carry out President Ebert's instructions to form a new cabinet. The chief political parties—the Majority Socialists, Independent Socialists and Centrists—seemed unable to reach any agreement and the situation was complicated by the bitter antagonism of the radical laborites. There was some talk that Karl Leber, secretary of the trades union organization, may be asked to form a government in event Mueller definitely refuses the president's request.

Follows Fight on Cuno
The cabinet's resignation followed a fight upon Geheime Rat, director of the Hamburg-American steamship lines, who had been named minister of finance. He accepted only provisionally, declaring he must have the consent of the ship line owners. Leber's belief Cuno would be inimical to their interests. They also attacked Eugene Schiffer, minister of justice, accusing him of disaffection in negotiating with Von Kapp insurrectionists.

In some quarters the fall of the Bauer cabinet was hailed as a victory for independent Socialism. He had forced Bauer and his ministers out. Johann Liebert who was minister of posts and telegraphs in Ebert's cabinet, returned to the Ruhr district last night after conferring with the insurrectionist workers there. He was optimistic, believing order soon would be restored. Activities of the Red army in their district have been exaggerated, he said.

President Ebert it was understood, has decided the central government will confiscate the estate of Dr. Von Kapp, leader of the Berlin insurrectionists. Von Kapp, Ebert supporters said, will be punished if he can be found. One report said he was in Danzig.

IDENTITY OF SLAYER OF 11-YEAR-OLD GIRL NOT YET ESTABLISHED

STUEBENVILLE, O., March 27.—Identity of the person or persons who killed 11-year-old Frances South near her home at Adena, 35 miles west of here, three days ago, had not been established today in spite of the fact that numerous armed posses have scoured the surrounding country since the body of the girl was found Thursday afternoon.

Polish Government Removed From Warsaw To Bromberg

LONDON, March 27.—The Polish government was removed Thursday from Warsaw to Bromberg, in Polish Posen, 25 miles northwest of Thorn, according to a Berlin dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company, quoting rumors in that city.

FIRST TEST MONDAY OVER THE BLUE RIDGE OPTION TO PURCHASE

AUSTIN, TEX., March 27.—The first test of the attorney general's opinion that the state's option to purchase the Blue Ridge prison farm, upon which oil has been discovered, for \$50 an acre was not legally relinquished by the action of a majority of the prison commission and the governor in signing a release, is expected to come when the case in which Bassett Blakely, owner of the farm, is attempting to clear his title, is taken up in the district court at Richmond, Tex., Monday.

W. W. Caves, assistant attorney general, said he would leave tonight for Richmond, where he will represent the state. In cross action the state had named 91 defendants, most of whom are those who secured oil leases upon the land involved. It is expected that evidence secured during the legislative investigation of circumstances surrounding the resigning of a release of the option will be introduced at the coming trial.

SIX MEN INJURED IN 35-FOOT FALL AT DEVOL REFINERY

Six men employed at the Constantine refinery near Devol, Oklahoma, as tank builders, who were injured in a 35-foot fall into a steel tank when the tank collapsed about 10:30 this morning, arrived here on the 2:00 o'clock train and were taken in ambulances furnished by O. W. Hines and Merkle & Lunn, to the Methodist hospital.

The injured men are: T. C. Duncan, sprained back and broken legs; A. W. Shores, leg injured, possible internal injuries; W. H. Allen, leg injured, head badly sprained; C. Blodgett, injuries undetermined; E. H. Rhodes, injured about the back, legs and head. All of the men with the exception of one or two who are believed to be injured internally, are expected to recover, it is said. The accident occurred when a wooden frame scaffold on which the tank builders were standing, gave way and sent the six men hurtling into a tangled mass to the bottom of the tank, a distance of 35 feet.

Medical attention was slow in arriving at the refinery on account of the location of the place where the accident occurred, and the trouble experienced in getting word to town. Doctors from Devol arrived and gave the men the best first aid attention at the scene.

The report on the injuries is necessarily incomplete and inaccurate on account of the fact that only a hurried examination was given at Devol and the report had not been made by the surgeons at the Methodist hospital at the time of going to press.

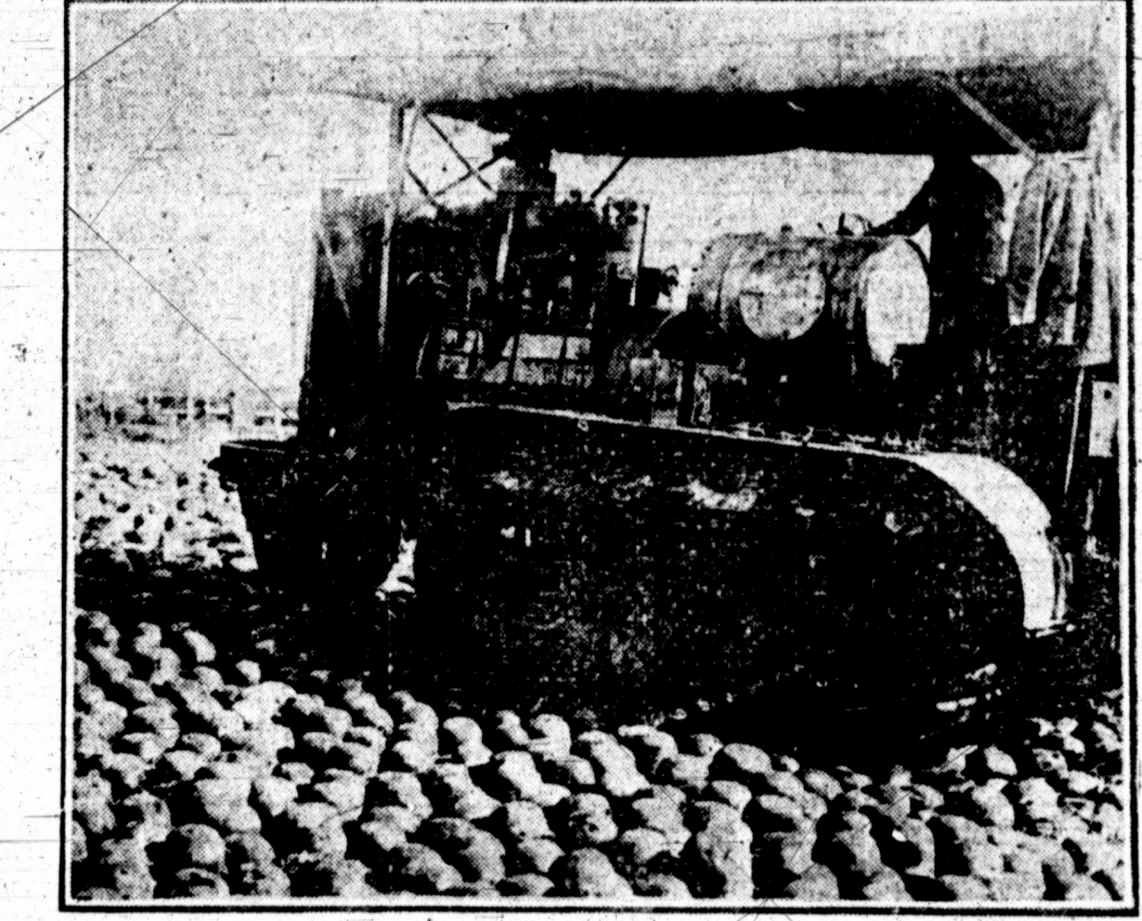

WORKERS WAGE DELAWARE FIGHT OVER SUFFRAGE

Little Let-Up in the Struggle Notwithstanding Recess of the Legislature

DOVER, DEL., March 27.—Although the Delaware legislature was in adjournment until next Monday, today little let-up in the struggle for ratification of the amendment for the woman suffrage amendment. Workers on both sides continued campaigns in preparation for the vote expected next Tuesday or Wednesday.

Throughout Delaware today champions wearing the yellow and purple colors of the suffragists and the red roses of the opposition were engaged with special pressure on members of the lower legislative branch which, so far, has maintained a majority against ratification. Many campaigners were at Wilmington, Philadelphia, and some at Washington existing aid in the fight.

An end to the fight next week is regarded as assured. General belief is that the vote will come on Wednesday, first in the house, and should it decide for ratification, immediately afterward in the senate.

Suffrage advocates declared that should Delaware refuse to be the thirty-sixth state to ratify the amendment, they will turn their attention to four other states—Connecticut, Vermont, North Carolina and Louisiana.

PARIS, March 27.—Odessa, the great Russian port on the Black Sea, has been occupied by Ukrainians under General Pawlenko, commander of the Ukrainian national army, according to information received by the Ukrainian mission in Paris today.

LONDON, March 27.—Novorosl, the last base in southern Russia under control of General Denikine, has been captured by the Russian bolsheviks, according to a wireless dispatch from Moscow.

DIRIGIBLE SEEKS TO LOCATE TWO FRENCH STEAMERS AT SEA

PARIS, March 27.—The dirigible AU-9 today sought trace of the French steamers Lux and Viduban, believed to have sunk with 142 passengers en route from Algeria to Marseilles.

The viduban was a steamer of 1,304 tons built in 1913, owned by the French National railways and registered at Marseilles. Lloyds register does not list a steamer Lux.

WELL NEAR VERNON WILL BE UNCAPPED; CROWD IS ON HAND

VERNON, TEX., March 27.—Anxiety over the Sigler well will be relieved today when the well will be uncapped and allowed to show what it will do. More oil men, photographers and scouts from all parts gathered to witness bringing in the well. Officials state the well will make 1,000 barrels minimum. Leases a mile from the well are bringing \$1,500 an acre.

WILSON WILL NOT GIVE OUT PLANS AS YET

Does Not Propose to Make Public His Intentions Until Near Convention Time

WASHINGTON, March 27.—President Wilson does not propose to make public whether he will ask re-election or which candidate he will support until shortly before the San Francisco convention, a prominent congressional democrat, was told today by those close to the president, in answer to demands that Wilson state definitely whether he will run.

Likewise, the report was current among house democrats that the president favors, uncommitted delegates to the convention.

Meanwhile, the rebellious house democrats, who believe the president's silence is injuring the party's chances, are planning a series of attacks against him on the floor. It was learned today, unofficial word was circulated at the capitol that the president does not intend to ask for a third term, but feels to state so would endorse his party leadership and obstruct his plan to have the convention endorse his course in the peace treaty fight.

Factions of the party including the senators who voted for the Lodge reservation, the majority of the house democrats, and the forces led by W. J. Bryan, apparently do not wish to make the peace treaty an issue.

WARSAW, March 27.—Confusion and wretched conditions generally prevail throughout Russia, according to a report made to British and American representatives here by a technical expert who has spent months in Russia. There is absolutely no wheat or flax throughout the country for export, and wool is scarce, as sheep throughout the country have been killed for food.

DISMISS APPLICATION FOR WRITS OF ATTACHMENT AGAINST TEXANS ON MOTION JUDSONIA COUNSEL

JOHNSON SAYS HE IS WINNER IN MINNESOTA

Declares Figures Bear Out Statement But Have Not Been Made Public

BUFFALO, N. Y., March 27.—Senator Hiram W. Johnson of California in an address here yesterday asserted that he, not Major General Wood, had won the presidential preference primary in Minnesota.

"I went into Minnesota where the state machine is for Wood," he said. "They repealed the presidential preference law and then the machine called a trick primary to be held in the middle of the winter between 7:30 and 8:30 o'clock in the evening and with a lot of the voting places not announced. The conditions disenfranchised the farmers. But I went into Minneapolis and I paid and called on the people to repudiate the machine and they did."

"I have with me the figures of the primary vote there and they show I won. But the Associated Press has not sent out these figures and has allowed the impression to prevail that Wood carried Minnesota."

The results of the Minnesota presidential primary, held March 15, were not tabulated by the Associated Press. The returns were gathered and announced by the Republican state committee, the senate yesterday.

MANAGER FOR WOOD ANSWERS CHARGES AS TO USE OF MONEY

CHICAGO, March 27.—W. C. Procter, national campaign manager for Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, in a statement made public today, answered charges against the senator yesterday by Senator Borah regarding campaign expenditures of presidential candidates.

"Any money used in furtherance of General Wood's campaign has been expended openly and perfectly legitimately in the presentation of the rank and file of the republican party in the primary states, and not one cent for any indirect or corrupt purpose," said the statement.

The people approve campaign methods of the open and straightforward sort that is being adopted. We resent any statement of imputation of illegal or corrupt expenditure, and shall hold the guilty person responsible therefor. This attack at this time looks like the last stand of the old guard."

CUBAN INDEPENDENT CIGAR MANUFACTURERS PLAN TO BRANCH OUT

HAVANA, March 27.—Independent cigar manufacturers, about 12 in number and representing capital aggregating several millions of dollars have initiated the formation of a great cooperative sales agency with the purpose of entering the foreign field on a larger scale than ever before, according to newspapers here.

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., March 27.—Attorneys representing the Judsonia Development company this morning withdrew their motion for a writ of attachment against Texas officials in the Red River case before Judge R. L. Williams. This disposes of the case.

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 27.—Counsel for the Judsonia Development Association, Oklahoma claimants to the disputed Red River bed oil lands involved in the boundary dispute between Oklahoma and Texas, brought about a new and unexpected development when the federal district court opened at 10:00 o'clock this morning by moving that their application for writs of attachment against Texas claimants and petitions for arrest for the latter be continued until the writs be dismissed. Federal Judge R. L. Williams immediately granted the motion and the court took an entirely new case dropping the Red River case indefinitely.

There was no indication this morning and no announcement by the court as to whether Judge Williams' announced desire to appoint jurors in the case and the order to call government the time when the hearing will again be taken up. No one could say what the next move in the much-discussed case would be.

The motion for dismissal of the writs of attachment was made immediately upon the opening of court by J. B. Root, of counsel for the Judsonia Development Association. Williams granted it without discussion. Indefinite postponement was announced and the court proceeded to hear another case.

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., March 27.—"No man's land," unclaimed, undredged and uncared for, until oil was struck in the narrow strip, continued to hold the center of the stage in district court as the fight over the Red River re-opened this morning.

With many bitter attacks and stirring motions, the case yesterday presented her claim to the territory before Judge R. L. Williams yesterday. The Oklahoma plaintiffs will have their chance to launch a counter barrage of legal argument today. Justice B. Root, attorney of Butte, Montana, is expected to lead the attack for the Judsonia Development Co. of Oklahoma.

The case being heard by Judge Williams is an application on the part of the Judsonia Development Co. for a writ of attachment and warrants for the arrest of Texas rangers and other Texas charged with contempt of court in holding lands of the company located in the Red River territory, in defiance of an order to vacate issued by Judge Williams in a United States court at Enid last week. It is the first of a long list of individual suits resulting from the boundary dispute over possession of the Red River bed oil fields which the state of Texas and Oklahoma are claiming possession in the supreme court of the United States.

Sharp Exchange of Words
Two days ago the crowded court room was thrilled by a sharp exchange of words. Once when Attorney T. M. Gregory, who led the Texas fight, hinted that some difficulty would arise when the state of Texas took the land from the Texas receivers, Judge Williams fired back before the words were out of his mouth: "If I find I have jurisdiction over this case, you had better not be issued and served if I have to take the whole United States army down there."

Again when the judge made an effort to get both parties to agree to the appointment of joint receivers for the property, Oklahoma authorities asserted a disinclination on the part of their clients to such a step. Judge Williams retorted yesterday: "You had better not proceed under the theory you have the world by the tail, if one party interested intervenes in this suit I'll appoint joint receivers; I don't care whether the other party agrees or not."

The rival claims to the land are based on the part of Texas by the judicial and civil control over the disputed territory since 1847. Grand asserted for a number of years; on the part of Oklahoma to the treaty of 1819 designating the south bank of the stream as the boundary. Judge Williams retorted yesterday: "You took the view that the south bank of the stream was the boundary, but that he was not convinced whether the high water mark or the low water mark could be called the bank. The disputed oil holdings lay between these two points."

Irlinger Adds One More to His String of Mat Victories

Henry Irlinger added one more to his string of victories last night when he downed George Sauer of Houston in two straight falls, the first in 40 minutes, the second in nine.
