He accepted only provisionally, declaring he must have the consent of the ship line owners. Laborites believed Cuno would be inimical to their interests. They also attacked Eugene Schiffer, minister of justice, accusing him of disaffection in negotiating with Von Kapp insurrectionists.



President Wilson's attitude on the Turkish question-that the Turk be put out of Europe-is, we are sure, a reflection of the sentiment of an over whelming majority of the American people. The Turk has been a source of trouble and anxiety to Europe from time immemorial; he has played one side against the other successfully up to now or he long ago would have been put back across the Bosphorus into Asia where ethnologically and geographically he belongs. Unless the influence of the United States is sufficient to throw the balance in the scales against him this time, he will again have played one influence against the other and kept his dirty hands on European territory, where he is an atavism. The American de mand for the erection of an Armenian state also is in line with the best thought of the American people. It will be to these a matter of regret that the weight of our influence is tremendously lightened by the fact that a majority of our American senstors want to influence allied decisions but would avoid altogether any responsibility. The time has passed when we of the United States can wash our hands of affairs outside our continental limits, or ignore conditions that exist internationally of coneern to the world. We may shirk our duty, but we cannot avoid the consclousness that we are shirking it at a time when the whole world needs our influence for its rehabilitation and reconstruction along the lines of altruism and self-respect.







## EQUILIBRIUM IN PRICE SITUATION IS MORE PRONOUNCED

DALLAS, TEX... March 25.—"A more noticeable tendency towards an equilibrium in the price situation than has been observed for several months." was a notable February development in the Eleventh Federal Reserve district, according to the monthly review issued today by the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas.

There was "an appreciable tightening of the money market and a moderate reaction in the public and retail buying movement," the report says. Furchases in some of the more important retail lines it is declared, "showed a perceptible falling off during the month."

Both the merchants and the public," the report continues, "having apparently caught up with their buying for immediate needs, show no eagerness to enlarge their commitments for future requirements, and this spirit of conservatism seems to be ateadily spreading."

Banks in the Eleventh district set a new high February in deposits, the report says, aggregating approximately \$399,000,000 of or almost double the deposits of the corresponding period last year.
