The new Jimmy Dean Meat Company at Plainview bids to be another in the series of industrial additions to this section of the state which will be of great benefit to the area's agricultural-based economy.

We had the privilege last Saturday of attending a special breakfast featuring sausage processed in the plant, and a tour of the new pork-processing industry.

Dean says that within a year, the plant will make Plainview the "quality pork capital" of the nation.

To those of us who are used to going through Missouri Beef's plant here, the new pork processing plant seemed small. At 7500 square feet, it is just larger than the new addition which is being built at MBP's plant here for breaking purposes.

However, hogs are a great deal smaller than cattle, so it wasn't hard to imagine that 600 hogs per day could be slaughtered in the plant.

Like our MBP plant, the pork plant was spotless and clean—practically clinical in nature.

The goal of the plant is to make Jimmy Dean Pure Pork Sausage a household word, and to produce the best sausage available.

"It's the first thing I've put my name on and believe me, I want it to be good since it's bearing my name," Dean says.

The meat produced is bound to be quality meat, because a big majority of the swine used will be raised at the "Jimmy Dean Pig Parlor" at Edmondson, where specially-bred disease-free pigs are raised.

Other swine will be purchased for slaughtering than the SPF swine, but only the SPF variety will be utilized in the Jimmy Dean Pure Pork Sausage. The other carcasses will be sold to packing plants in areas where there is a lack of live hogs.

The plant will employ more than 60 persons, and have a payroll in excess of \$70,000.

By getting the pork plant and Missouri Beef's expansion plant, the city of Plainview should be able to satisfy a big portion of the demand for these two major types of meat.

The way the plant came about is kinda funny. Dean says one day he and a couple of friends were having breakfast, which included sausage.

One of them, picking a piece of gristle from his teeth, said "Some day I'd like to get ONE order of sausage without having to get all of this gristle with it."

One thing led to another, according to Dean, and the disease-free pig operation was the first result, and the processing plant evolved. The owners have over a million dollars invested in both enterprises.

But the manner in which Dean broke into show business is even more strange. During his high school days, he became known as a local entertainer, but was about to go into the irrigation business when he was taken into the Air Force.

One night a quartet of G's, who performed at night in a local Washington, D. C. spot, asked Jimmy to come along when their fiddler took sick. He brought his accordion, earned four dollars, thereby launching one of the most luminous careers in the entertainment world.

Following his service duty, Dean remained in the Washington area, until he came to the attention of CBS executives. He stayed in Washington some 10 years, averaging over ten hours each week on radio and TV. Then in the mid-50s CBS brought him to New York where he was one of the network's stalwarts for over two years.

His recording of "Big Bad John" which he composed himself, sold over 3,000,000 copies, and skyrocketed the amiable Texan into international prominence.

"I was doing all right until that dang record came along and shot me into another income tax bracket. Then I had to work a lot harder," Dean says.

Friona Lions Assist Girlstown Cattle Gift

The two Lions Clubs of Friona have assisted Girlstown in securing a herd of registered polled Hereford cattle worth an estimated \$17,000.

The Friona Lions Club, along with the Friona Noon Lions, financed the moving of the 53 cattle from a ranch near Houston to Girlstown last week fulfilling the only stipulation by the donor.

W.L. (Preach) Edelman, past District Governor, and member of the Friona Lions Club, was contacted about the project by the director of Girlstown, Marshall Cooper. Edelman is a member of the board of directors for Girlstown, which is located near Whiteface.

The donor had offered the herd of registered cattle to Girlstown if the institution would see that they were moved from near Houston to the Whiteface location.

The two local Lions Clubs gladly accepted the project, and hired Johnny Tannahill, a Friona trucker, to move the cattle. The clubs will split the cost of

transporting the cattle.

"We thought this was an excellent service project for our local clubs, and we were happy for the opportunity to be of service to such a worthwhile organization," Edelman re-

marked.

"The cattle feature a fine blood line, and should be of great value to Girlstown for years to come," said Cooper when contacted by the Star on Tuesday.

"This gift could provide more long-range benefits than first meets the eye," the organization's administrator said.

More details concerning the gift will be made public in the near future.

Origin Of Memorial Day Is Traced By Article

MEMORIAL DAY is one of the most beautiful and significant of the so-called national holidays observed in this country. It was observed originally in connection with veterans of the Civil War. Now it has grown to a day of solemn commemoration for the dead of all wars.

The origin of Decoration Day, as it was first designated, has been a subject of controversy. Several claim the honor for first decorating graves of the soldier dead.

In 1867 General John E. Murray inaugurated the practice of placing flowers on soldier graves at his home in Waterloo, New York. In the spring that year women of Columbus, Mississippi scattered flowers upon graves of both Union and Confederates soldiers. This gesture on the part of these women inspired the familiar poem:

"THE BLUE AND THE GRAY,"

It was not until May 1868, however, that General John A. Logan, Commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, conceived the idea of setting apart the 30th day of May as a day of commemoration.

As Commander-in-chief, he issued an order that this day should be marked by appropriate exercises and the decorating of graves of fallen comrades of the G.A.R. Compliance was made with the order and on June 3, 1868, General Logan, then serving as a member of Congress, introduced in the House a resolution which gave official recognition to Memorial Day.

The idea spread rapidly. Legislation after legislature enacted it into law, until Memorial Day is now a legal holiday in nearly all states.

Observance of Memorial Day

has traditionally been dignified and reverent, usually with a military aspect. It has also become a day of renewal of family ties, a day of dedication to the task of preserving a free America, and building a world which can live in peace.

## Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of the Friona Star

#### 40 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1929

Announcement was made this week that the Turner-Parr Trading Company has contracted for two lots on the west side of Main Street adjoining the south side of the F.L. Spring building.

A 50x140 foot building will be constructed on the lots, all in one building, but just what the building will be used for is not known at this time.

Crop prospects in the Friona territory are said to be better than the past several years. The wheat is looking like a better than average crop, and while only a few row crops are planted, hundreds of acres of sorghum grains, sudan and corn will be planted in the next few days.

#### 35 YEARS AGO--JUNE 1, 1934

On Friday evening of last week the Friona draw overflowed its banks at Friona and as usual swept down the State Highway No. 33 for the distance of nearly a mile. This overflow was caused, not by any heavy rain falling within the immediate territory, but from rain that fell over in New Mexico.

Two cars, unaware of the recent overflow, dashed into the wet road at this point, one being overturned and nearly buried, while the other barely escaped being ditched right where the other capsized.

#### 30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 2, 1939

Miss Alice Guyer of Friona, and Mr. Charles B. Lovelace of Farwell were married in the home of the groom's sister, Mrs. H.L. Thurston at Aspermont May 27. Vows were read by Rev. H.L. Thurston, a former pastor of the Friona Methodist Church.

The regular monthly meeting and banquet of the Chamber of Commerce, which was held in the basement of the Congregational Church Monday night, was well attended, and a delicious meal was served by the ladies of the Methodist Church.

#### 25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 2, 1944

Martin V. Collier was killed in action on May 12 in Italy, according to a War Department telegram received Wednesday afternoon by his father, Joe B. Collier of the Hub Community.

The Santa Fe Railway has announced that advanced preparations of box car supply is already underway to take care of the annual grain loading, which will begin with the opening of the harvest season.

#### 20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 3, 1949

The Road Bond Issue election held in Parmer County last Saturday was defeated, in that a two-thirds majority was necessary for passage. The vote for amounted to 562, with 289 against. In Friona, the count was 231-32 in favor of the road issue.

#### 15 YEARS AGO--MAY 8, 1954

The contract was let Monday to Hammock Bros. of Lubbock for the new elementary building. Contract price was \$147,200. The location is across the street east from the old grade school building. The building will house grades one through four, putting the school on a four-four-four basis.

#### 10 YEARS AGO--MAY 28, 1959

Graduation exercises will be held tonight for 45 boys and girls at Friona High School.

#### 5 YEARS AGO--MAY 28, 1964

Graduation exercises for St. Friona High School seniors will be held at 8 p.m. Friday night. Rex Nelson and Lois Meyer will give the salutatory and valedictory addresses respectively.

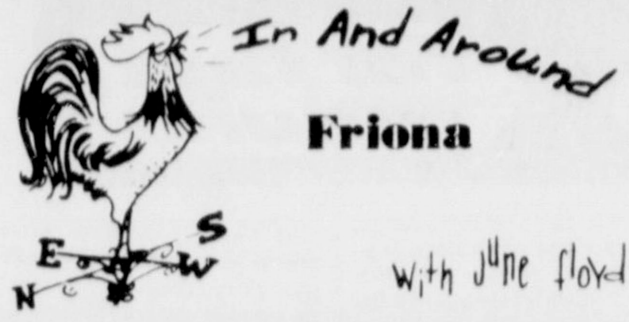

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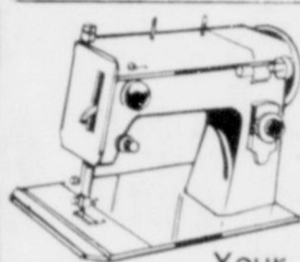

### On The Farm In Parmer County

#### CONTROL OF GREENBUGS ON GRAIN SORGHUM -

After last year's round with greenbugs in grain sorghum everyone will be on the lookout for them in 1969. As a result of last year's experience and research it is hoped that the information gathered will be beneficial in 1969.

A recent Texas Cooperative Economic Insect Report has reported greenbugs attacking grain sorghum in Denton, Cook, Grayson, and Collins Counties.

Although damage was not serious in these areas, farmers in Parmer County should be on the alert to possible greenbug infestations. Recent rains received in the county the past few weeks have helped to reduce greenbug numbers on wheat, johnsongrass, and volunteer grain sorghum.

The extent of greenbug damage in grain sorghum is dependent upon greenbug numbers, plant size and stage growth, moisture conditions, presence or absence of parasites and predators and plant vigor. Producers are cautioned to observe plant condition closely and the development of greenbug numbers and damage. Damage from the seedling stage up to early pre-rod often re-

sults in stand loss and plant death.

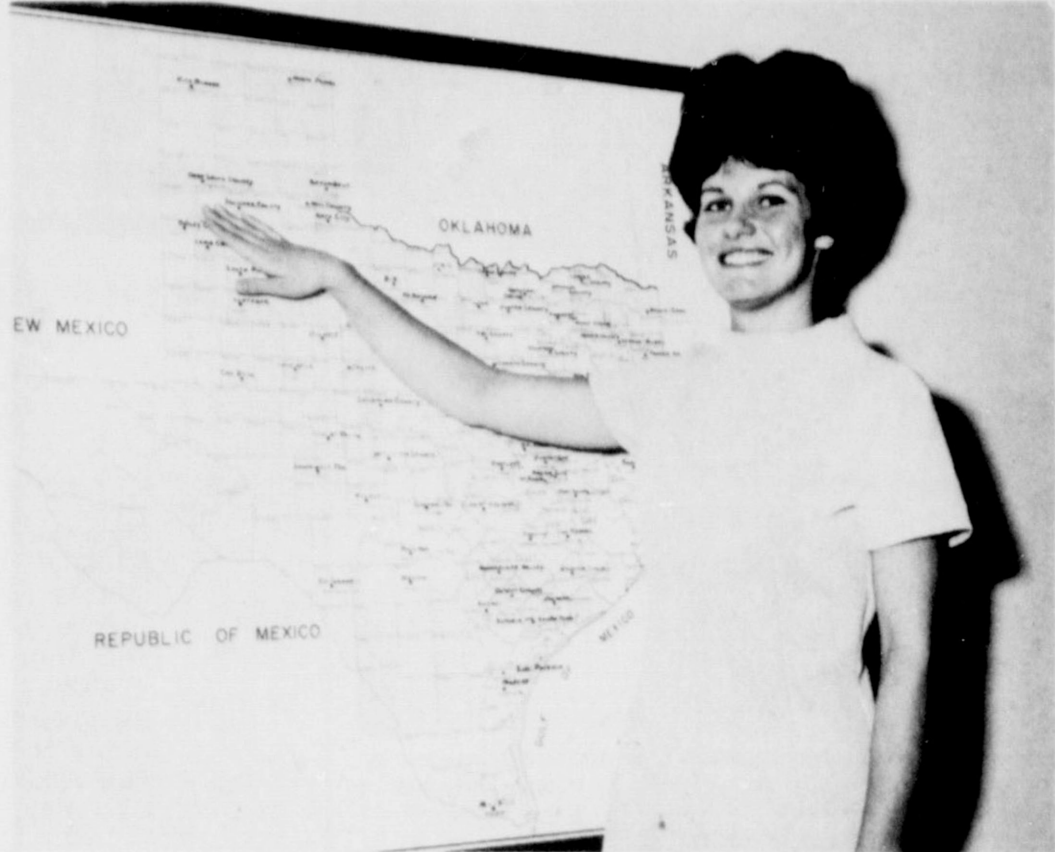
Plants from emergence up to about six inches in height, showing visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on the under leaf surface, should be treated. Research data from 1968 indicates that larger plants, up to the pre-boot stage, may tolerate more greenbugs. Large numbers of greenbug on this size plant should be controlled before any entire plant leaves are killed.

Yield reductions during the pre-boot, boot, blooming and grain development stages are dependent on greenbug numbers, length of time that greenbugs have infested plants and plant condition. Based on one year's experience and research, heavy populations can cause extensive damage to pre-boot and older plants. Indications are that greenbug numbers, which result in death to more than the 2 lower, normalized leaves, should be controlled.

The above general guides are based on the assumption that the greenbug buildup is occurring more rapidly than effective control by beneficial insects. Also if a plant is undergoing stress, plants cannot support as many greenbugs without suffering yield reductions.

### Area Farmers Have Most Of 1969 Crop In Ground

With mostly clear weather for the past week, farmers in the Friona area have planted almost 100 per cent of their row crops, with most crops which had to be replanted due to hail also back in the ground.

In fact, the hot, sunny days which have seen the mercury rise above the 90-degree mark several times the past week

has caused some farmers with wheat to begin to irrigate, or make preparations to water this crop an additional time.

With the wheat in a peak growth stage, most of the moisture from the rains earlier in the month has about been used up, and many say another irrigation may be necessary, unless the predicted rains for the latter part of the week materialize.

Wheat not affected by the hail of two weeks ago continues to look good, and the row crops which escaped the weather are coming along fine.

**TEC Announces Course For Mechanic Training**

Job training for mechanics has been announced for Hereford.

Texas Employment Commission is now recruiting applicants for an auto mechanics class and another for farm equipment mechanics which is scheduled to start here possibly next month, according to TEC manager Lester Rape.

Classes are to be conducted eight hours a day five days per week and will continue for one year, Rape said.

"This training is made avail-

able through the Manpower Development and Training Act of 1962," he said, "and is offered at no cost to the trainees. In fact, if they should meet certain requirements, they may draw a training and transportation allowance while they are being instructed."

Anyone who desires to be a mechanic but cannot afford to go out of the city to attend a training school are urged to call in person at the local TEC offices at Seventh and 25 Mile Ave.

"The main requirement is the desire to be a mechanic," Rape stipulated. Other requirements include being 18 years of age or older with at least an eighth grade education.

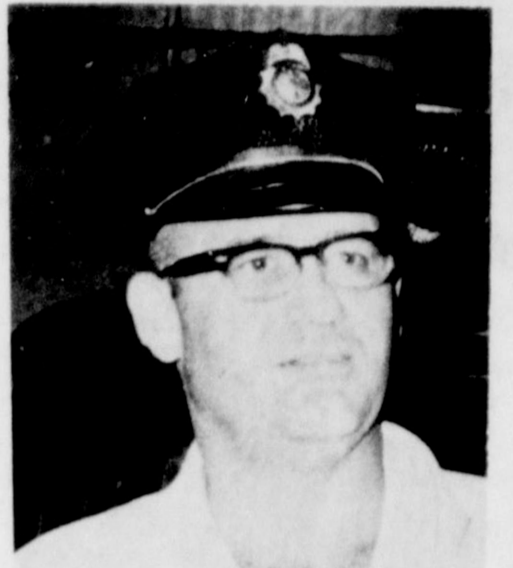

**Government Official Is Scored By Cattle Chief**

"Government officials have an obligation to the public to assure themselves that statements they make to the news media are correct" said Jack Carrothers, President of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, today, in commenting on a statement made by Arnold Chase, Deputy Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Chase said in his comments associated with cost of living increases: "It appears that at least some of the food price increases were the result of withholding action by farmers." Chase said, "The increases come at a time when prices for these commodities, particularly livestock, usually decline, and there appears to be some voluntary withholding to bring about higher prices."

Commenting on Chase's remarks, Carrothers said, "Livestock feeders in this region and throughout the nation are marketing fed cattle with a shorter feeding time today than ever in history. Slaughter weights of fed cattle are at or

near record low levels because of this reduced feeding time."

Carrothers said, "It is out of order for a Department of Labor official to be critical of livestock price levels when on April 15, 1969, the index of prices received by farmers for livestock and livestock products was only 20% compared to the 1957-59 average. Wage rates paid by livestock producers, on the other hand, had increased 77% during the same period. Beef cattle prices in April of this year were only 85% of official USDA parity, which could hardly be classed as exorbitant."

Kenneth Dilline, General Manager of Glover Packing Company, which has plants at Amarillo, Texas, Roswell, New Mexico, and Hernando, Mississippi stated: "We are having a difficult time in finding a sufficient quantity of fed cattle which have adequate time on feed to meet our kill requirements. Feedyards throughout the area are very current, and there is obviously no withholding on the part of cattle feeders." Bill Mosley, head buyer for the packing plants, said: "The demand for fed cattle from buying interests from outside the region makes it obvious that this very current marketing condition exists throughout the nation."

"The demand for the quality beef being produced by the beef cattle industry has greatly increased," Carrothers said, "and for the first time in many years livestock price levels may allow all segments of the livestock industry closer to a fair return for their labor and capital invested. Consumers today can purchase twice as much beef for a lesser percentage of their disposable income than required 15 years ago."

"With the closer trimming by retailer, there is more lean beef in that package than ever. Ounce-for-ounce, beef today is an improved protein product."

"It is very unfortunate," Carrothers said, "that a protein official would insinuate that livestock producers were being unfair in their marketing practices. He should stick to the facts."

### Snake Bite

Snakes are more dangerous during spring and summer months. While only 19 of the 132 species of snakes are classified as poisonous, be cautious when traveling through snake country. Since most snake bites are inflicted in the legs, wear high leather boots or leggings. Signs of a poisonous bite include: bleeding at the bite, burning pain; rapid pulse; and discoloration. Snake bite victims should remain as quiet as possible, and a physician should be called immediately.
