SUPREME COURT HEARS ATTACK PRO AMENDMENT

New Jersey and Wisconsin Cases Now Being Argued Before Tribunal

NEW JERSEY OFFICIAL MAKES OPENING ATTACK

Maintains Amendment in Nature and Revolutionary in Its Character

WASHINGTON, March 29.—The constitutionality of the prohibition amendment and portions of the enforcement act were argued before the supreme court again today in connection with consideration of the original suit brought by the state of New Jersey and Wisconsin.

The cases today involved virtually the same questions as the Rhode Island, Kentucky and Massachusetts cases recently presented to the court, but the original New Jersey suit, embodied a more extensive attack upon the validity of the eighteenth amendment and parts of the enforcement act than heretofore brought to the court's attention.

The eighteenth amendment to the constitution known as the prohibition amendment, is legislative in nature and revolutionary in character, according to Attorney General McCran of New Jersey, in opening his argument before the United States supreme court in New Jersey's suit to have the amendment declared void and the Volstead act unconstitutional.

Attorney General McCran's brief declared that the eighteenth amendment was not constitutionally proposed; that the proposal is subject to judicial review; that congress did not by two-thirds in numbers of both houses affirmatively vote for the amendment; that the ratification of the states have not ratified in the constitutional sense.

The brief also declared that the national prohibition act is unconstitutional legislation; that there is no right in congress to legislate outside the scope of amendment; that the words, "beverage purposes" sufficiently describe the intent of congress; that the term "intoxicating liquors" is its own definition; that the Volstead act fixing the standard is oppressive and unconstitutional; that the federal government is restricted by the arbitrary act of congress.

U. S. RECEIVER ASKED FOR RED RIVER LANDS

Government Asks Permission to Intervene in Behalf of Indians

WOULD ENJOIN BOTH OKLAHOMA AND TEXAS

Lands Back to Bluff on Texas Side Involved in Government Action

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29.—The government in motions filed today asked permission to intervene in the controversy between Oklahoma and Texas over the ownership of oil lands in the Red river district and that Texas be enjoined from granting title or permits to land located north of the river's south bank.

The motion also asks that the court likewise enjoin Oklahoma and Texas authorities from permitting any of their representatives from trespassing upon the contested lands or sinking any additional oil or gas wells and that a receiver be appointed to take charge of the lands together with the oil machinery and tools and operate wells already sunk.

In presenting the motions, Solicitor General King told the court that Oklahoma has approved it, but Texas authorities had only agreed to this step in part. Mr. King said quick action in the matter is necessary, whereupon the court would hand down its opinion upon the matter tomorrow.

Notice that the government will intervene in the federal court suit in Oklahoma in behalf of claims advanced by the bureau of Indian affairs, and will today file a petition in the supreme court of the United States asking that the federal court be enjoined to take charge of all the land in controversy in the river bed, clear to the bluff on the Texas side, was served on Attorney General Cullen of Texas Saturday night, according to a message received from Cullen by Orville Bullington, Judge A. H. Carrigan and other local attorneys representing holders of the Texas titles.

The decision to bring this suit directly in the supreme court, instead of in an inferior federal court, was announced in the nation's first announced intention, is regarded as a moral victory of the state of Texas and directly due to the strenuous resistance on the part of the federal government through the Texas ranger force, to the attempt of any control on the part of the inferior federal courts—Texas winning her contention to have the entire matter tried in the supreme court alone.

The federal government is intervening in the suit on the ground that some of the lands belonged to the Indians. The government, it is understood, will maintain that the boundary which is in dispute on account of the shifting of the current of the river, extends along the line where it was on February 1851. This substantially Oklahoma's contention.

WAGE AGREEMENT WILL BE SIGNED BY BITUMINOUS MINERS

NEW YORK, March 29.—A new wage agreement based on the majority report to President Wilson by the bituminous coal commission, will be signed within a week, it is predicted by members of the general scale committee of operators and miners who arrived here today to negotiate a new contract.

The mine workers want at least a 21 per cent increase and a seven-hour day. The award of the commission gave them a 27 per cent increase and an eight-hour day. The increase included the 14 per cent given the workers when they returned to work after the recent strike.

REVOKE PERMITS MARLIN SELLERS OF INTOXICANTS

AUSTIN, TEX., March 29.—State permits to sell intoxicants held by two physicians at Marlin were surrendered and the permit of another physician there was revoked as a result of investigations by State Comptroller M. L. Wighton, who returned to Austin today.

DALLAS, TEX., March 29.—Mrs. Nannie Webb Curtis, president of the Texas Woman's Christian Temperance Union, died early today at the home of her son, Roy G. Webb, in Dallas, after a lingering illness.

GIRL SLAIN BY HER JEALOUS LOVER

NEW ORLEANS, March 29.—In view of hundreds of persons, A. W. Favola, 32, traveling salesman, early today shot and killed Miss Carrie Fitzhacker, 22, then turned the weapon on himself, inflicting a wound that caused almost instant death.

40 DEATHS FROM STORMS IN GEORGIA AND EASTERN ALABAMA

ATLANTA, Ga., March 29.—Because of demoralized wire conditions few details of last night's tornado which struck Georgia and eastern Alabama had come in early today. The death list still stood at approximately 40, with many hundreds injured, some seriously. There was no accurate estimate of the property damage, but it was expected to run well into the millions.

The storm reached the Chicago district near noon just as the crowds were leaving churches. Seven were killed in Elgin and seven in Chicago, and fourteen in the Chicago suburbs of Melrose Park, Maywood, Plainfield and Evanston.

The Chicago Junction Railroad has notified roads here that no livestock for the Chicago market, other than hogs, need a work permit for an increase of \$20 to \$45 per month and the elimination of Sunday work.

At present they are receiving from \$115 to \$154 per month with time and one-half for overtime, according to the company officials.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—President Wilson will spend the summer at the home of Charles R. Crane at Woods Hole, a village on the southern coast of Massachusetts, near Martha's Vineyard. It was said today at the White House.

CHICAGO, MARCH 29.—Tornadoes which swept eight states on Sunday claimed a total of approximately 125 lives, destroyed millions of dollars worth of property and left hundreds of families homeless.

Reports today showed there were two distinct storm areas—one in Georgia and Alabama, and the other in the middle west, starting at St. Louis and extending northeast to Lake Michigan. Fire followed in the wake of the storm in some cities, adding to the suffering.

Food, hospital supplies, physicians, nurses and clothing were rushed to the stricken areas today. Injured were cared for in temporary buildings. The debris was combed in the hunt for missing.

La Grange, Ga., appeared to be the hardest hit by the storms. Between forty and sixty were reported killed there and 300 were homeless. West Point, Ga., reported five dead, and Agritons, Ala., five dead.

LA GRANGE, Ga., March 29.—Casualties resulting from the storm which swept this section late yesterday were placed today at about 50 dead and 100 to 125 injured. Approximately 100 homes were destroyed. Property damage is estimated at \$500,000.

One Killed Near Detroit. DETROIT, MICH., March 29.—One known dead, eight others reported killed and thousands of dollars of property damage was the toll taken by the violent wind and rainstorm which swept through southern Michigan late yesterday, according to reports reaching here early today.

Nine Killed at Portland, Ind. MUNCIE, IND., March 29.—Reports reaching here early this morning from Portland, Ind., 25 miles from here, give the known dead a nine in the tornado that swept over this section of Indiana Sunday evening.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—By refusal of the supreme court today to review the conviction of a San Antonio, Texas, man, V. F. Miller, on charges of using the mails to defraud through the sale of a "fairly salesman" guaranteed to bring success in business, Miller was sentenced to 18 months imprisonment.

ALL VOTERS URGED TO GO TO POLLS AND SUPPORT CHARTER

"I hope that every voter in Wichita Falls will go to the polls tomorrow," said J. A. Kemp this morning in speaking of Tuesday's charter election. "It is the most important election of the year, and while I am confident the charter will carry, I would be disappointed with anything less than a great big majority. A matter like this means too much to our city for anyone to be indifferent about it."

The final work in the campaign for the charter was in progress today. No meetings were scheduled for today and it was expected that the Open Forum session at the Labor Temple would be given over to Senator Bailey's address. It has been planned to discuss the charter.

A number of volunteers are being

enrolled this afternoon to work for a big vote tomorrow. With about 5000 qualified voters in the city, it is hoped to bring out a record vote.

EIGHT ADDITIONS AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH SUNDAY

Rev. J. B. Holmes of Dallas, long active in evangelistic circles in Texas, spoke at the First Christian church Sunday morning, his text being "Loving Thou Me More Than These." The church was packed at both services and there were 8 additions during the day. In the evening, Rev. J. L. Keovil, the pastor, preached on the story of Ruth and Naomi.

A picture of John W. Bradley's Bible class, one of the largest in the city, was taken at the Sunday school service, 74 being present; the total attendance at Sunday school was 427.

The Christian church choir is practicing regularly for the Easter cantata next Sunday night, the title being "The Life Everlasting." About 30 will take part. At the Easter morning service Mr. Keovil will preach on the Resurrection theme, and efforts are being made to have every member of the Christian denomination in Wichita Falls present at the services, including Sunday school.

SHUTTLE TRAIN PROPOSED FOR VERNON TRAFFIC

Improved train service between Wichita Falls and Vernon is to be provided shortly, if plans of the chamber of commerce traffic bureau materialize. Traffic Manager J. W. Chatham has taken up with the Denver officials the matter of installing a shuttle train between the two points, for the convenience of the many Wichita Falls oil men who are interested in Wilbarger oil developments.

The highway to Vernon is far from ideal for motorists, and it is thought that by having an additional train daily, convenient service could be arranged. A large number of local oil men are watching Wilbarger developments closely just now, and it is felt that better train service should be maintained, particularly if subsequent oil developments are favorable.

SUNDAY SCHOOL OPPOSES SUNDAY PICTURE SHOWS

By an overwhelming majority, the congregation of the First Baptist Church Sunday morning passed a resolution of support, backing up the county and district officers in their enforcement of the Sunday laws, and all

other laws. The morning service, at which the vote was taken, was exceptionally well attended, as was the night service, a number of additions to the church being made.

OIL FIELD WORKER FINED \$300 FOR PISTOL TOTTING

Henry Van Kirk, oil field worker, was convicted on a charge of carrying a pistol, following his trial before Judge J. P. Jones in county criminal court Monday. He was assessed a fine of \$300 and sentenced to serve 10 days in the county jail.

Harry Black, negro, was convicted upon a charge of petty theft and sentenced to serve one day in the county jail and pay a fine of \$25. He is charged with the theft of two cartons of cigarettes.

LEE FLOWERS BUYS 640 ACRE LEASE IN WILBARGER

MONDAY SHOWS ARREST TRI...
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SHOWS OPEN SUNDAY ARRESTS ARE MADE. TRIALS ON TUESDAY

Eight proprietors and employes of Wichita Falls theaters were arrested Sunday when local motion picture houses opened in violation of the Sunday closing law. The defendants were placed in jail for a few minutes pending arrangement of bond. Those arrested were F. E. Lancaster, W. J. Wilkie, J. M. Esaley, W. E. Page, H. St. Ford, Elmer Carter, Charles Kirkpatrick and M. Pop. Operators and ticket salesmen were arrested at the Gem, Majestic, Wichita and the Plaza theaters. The Empire theater did not open. The theater men were released shortly after bond to the extent of \$500 had been approved by county officials. The arrests were made by Sheriff Bob McFall and his deputy sheriffs. The Plaza theater did not open until the night performance, the other three theaters having operated in the afternoon as well as at night.

Regardless of the fact that both ticket salesmen and operators were arrested the theaters operated through-out the afternoon and at night. The theater men will be tried Tuesday before Judge J. P. Jones of the county criminal court. It is understood that the defendants will fight their cases and will demand a trial by jury. Theater proprietors announced that the shows will be in operation next Sunday, while county officials declare that persons engaged in Sunday amusements will again be arrested and committed to jail while bond is being approved. Bondsmen for the theater men are J. B. Marlow, C. W. Reed and H. E. McConnell.

SAVE MONEY ON MEAT CAMPAIGN MAKING PROGRESS

WASHINGTON, March 29.—In response to inquiries as to whether the campaign to "Save Money on Meat" by utilization of the less costly cuts, especially those from the fore-quarter, will have a tendency to raise prices of such cuts, the Department of Justice today issued the following statement:

"The effect on retail prices to the consumers of the campaign to 'Save Money on Meat' by utilization of the less costly cuts is indicated clearly in the conclusion reached by the Bureau of Markets, United States Department of Agriculture, with its unequalled knowledge of marketing problems, that if people would use more of the less costly portions their doing so would reduce prices of living and 'prices of meat as a whole would be greatly reduced and would be more stable."

"The facts, with reference to the effect of the campaign on prices, are as follows:

"At the present time, neglect of the less costly cuts of meat, especially those from the fore-quarter, has retarded the sale and distribution of these cuts; has thus caused proportionately greater shrinkage and diminished volume; has caused some meat literally to be wasted; has caused numerous retailers to chop and sell to hotels and others, cuts which could be used by the consumer to better advantage in its unchopped form, and has increased the retailer's overhead.

"Every particle of the loss, shrinkage and waste has been borne by the consumer in the price of all meat which he does buy. The extent of the loss, shrinkage and waste can be appreciated if it is remembered that the less costly cuts—which exclude the ribs and loins—constitute about three-fourths of the meat animal.

I. W. W. LITERATURE FOUND IN RAID IN YOUNG COUNTY

Radical literature sufficient to fill a large trunk was seized Sunday during a raid upon a place in Young county which federal officials believe is the headquarters of "Reds" operating in all regions of Northwest Texas. A man believed to be a bolshevik agitator was taken into custody and placed in the Wichita county jail Monday morning. The man was brought here from Graham by Deputy United States Marshal Frank Morgan who went to Graham Sunday to bring several federal prisoners here. The literature seized in the raid is of the most radical nature and largely consists of propaganda of the Industrial Workers of the World. More than 500 stamps bearing the picture of a prisoner behind the bars, above the picture are the words "general defense" and below the letters "I. W. W." the stamp is sold for \$1 and the proceeds are said to be used in the general fund being raised to employ counsel to defend radicals recently arrested in raids upon Red headquarters. The man behind the bars" as shown upon the stamp is said to represent

"Armistice Day" riots last fall and is probably wanted in Washington in connection with the killing of a former service man during the Armistice Day parade. Washington state officials will be consulted regarding the man's identity.

Federal officials here are certain that the man has been active in organization work in the coal regions of North Central Texas and perhaps in towns of the Texas oil field belt. He is being held pending further investigation before formal charges are filed.

GENERAL MANAGER OF THE ORIENT RAILROAD IS DEAD

SAN ANGELO, TEX., March 29.—N. J. O'Brien, of San Angelo, who died suddenly Sunday while attending church at Wichita, Kan., was vice-president and general manager as well as a director of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railway of Texas. The Orient lines in Texas virtually were constructed under his personal supervision.


Mr. O'Brien came to the Orient in 1906 and attained the rank he held at the time of death in 1912. He was well known in railroad circles throughout the country, his earlier connections having been with the Southern Railroad at Washington, the Union Pacific at Omaha and others.

He was 57 years of age, unmarried, and is survived by two sisters and one brother, Moses P. O'Brien, of Omaha, where he will be buried.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCK RECORDED AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, March 29.—An earthquake shock of considerable intensity was recorded by the seismograph in the office of the weather bureau here today. The tremors started at 11:34 p. m. last night and continued until 12:20 a. m. today. It was most intense at 11:37 p. m. The earthquake was centered approximately 1,300 miles from Chicago.

FATHER BONIFACE CORRECTS CENSUS AS TO CATHOLICS

Wichita Falls, Tex., March 28. Editor Wichita Times:

In regard to the religious census recorded today in your paper, permit me to say that it is a farce, not at all in harmony with the much heralded community spirit nor in harmony with the spirit in which the chamber of commerce endorsed the movement.

I asked various Catholics whether they were approached and up to the date failed to meet. One was asked about his religion. Our church has a seating capacity of over 500 and this church is filled to overflowing each Sunday morning at two services separated by an interval of only 30 minutes.

This proves that over 1,000 Catholics attend mass every Sunday, and the religious census credits us with only 458. If we take the Catholics here and elsewhere, that is to say within the city limits or the sphere of Wichita Falls, that are prevented from attending mass on account of work and those that stay away on account of congested conditions in our church, and especially the Mexican population that numbers over 1,000 and for whom we have no accommodation, and who should necessarily have a church of their own, but are prevented from having one on account of the scarcity of priests, the Catholics here and elsewhere will pass the 2,000 mark with flying colors.

This much for a correction of the report of the delinquent census.

J. A. WRAY MAKES KNOWN HIS VIEWS ON CIVIC MATTERS

"I believe that it is due the voters that they know, at least in a general way the attitude of those who are to be voted on for official position," said J. A. Wray Monday in discussing the forthcoming city election, "and as my friends have seen fit to file a petition to have my name placed on the ticket for alderman, I take this opportunity to express briefly my attitude on some of the issues that are of vital interest at this time.

"First of all I am for a bigger and better Wichita Falls. By that I mean that I want the city to continue to grow commercially and at the same time promote civic development until it is known, not only as the busiest, but as the best city in the state, ranking first in the beauty of its streets, its parks, as well as in its general appointments.

"Realizing that the city has outgrown the present form of government, I appreciate the fact that the adoption of a new charter is necessary to the future development of Wichita Falls, and will therefore support the draft to be voted on in the election Tuesday. I am opposed to the principle of the board of aldermen selecting a successor to the mayor or a member of the board in the event of a death or resignation but this provision can be amended, along with other changes that may be desired, at any time that the citizenship may desire, and the importance of the measure as a whole outweighs such minor objections as may now be raised.

"I shall favor the strictest economy in the conduct of the city's affairs without stinting its continued growth and development, and shall also favor the lowest tax rate that will provide sufficient funds to carry on the business of the city government.

"I believe in keeping the city clean and consider this one of the most important duties of an administration, involving as it does not only the appearance of the city, but the health of the citizens as well.

"I want to see more street paving and will encourage such improvement in every way possible.

"I would favor keeping the fire and police department at the highest state of efficiency.

"I believe that the city of Wichita Falls should make some provision for more adequate hospital facilities, should provide, if possible, to care for emergency cases where those afflicted are unable financially to afford necessary accommodations.

"I believe that charity patients should have first consideration in the management of an institution that is erected and operated from taxes collected from the citizenry.

"I shall insist that public utility corporations operated under a franchise from the city, provide a service commensurate with the growth and demands of the city, and would favor fee-splitting franchisees in instances where such service is not rendered when possible, and would also favor the enactment of laws, if within the province of the city council, prohibiting the collection of bills for other than actual services rendered.

"If with these expressions of my attitude on such of the issues as are mentioned, the voters of Wichita Falls feel that I can perform an acceptable service to the city, I shall use my very best efforts to the end that the next two years may be the most profitable and successful in the municipal history of Wichita Falls.

The Saturday morning services will begin at 7 o'clock. Preceding the mass will be the blessing of the baptismal font.

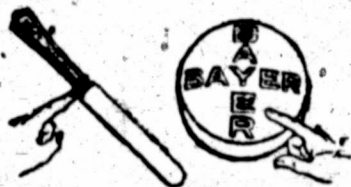
The Easter high mass at 10 o'clock next Sunday, which will be followed by benediction of the blessed sacrament. This will conclude the Easter services.

FAIR GROUND AND RACE TRACK ARE BEING PLANNED

Owners Oklahoma City Plant Negotiate for Grounds Near Call Field

PROPOSE TO HOLD RACE MEET HERE COMING SUMMER

Company Will be Organized With Capital of \$50,000 For Enterprise

Plans have been practically consummated which will result in Wichita Falls having a fair grounds and racing track which will be one of the largest plants of its kind in the South-west, being practically a duplication of the Oklahoma City plant, although in many respects an improvement on that plant, it was announced Monday morning.

R. J. Bell of Fort Worth, and J. C. Williams, both actively associated in the Oklahoma City plant, are the prime movers in this project. These men were interested in the project and were brought to Wichita Falls through J. L. Albritton, general manager of the Wichita Falls Traction Company, and have obtained an option on the necessary land, located between Call Field, Lake Wichita, the lake car line and the lake road, from Frank Kell and associates of this city.

Breaking of ground for the race track and for the building of the grandstand, which are to be completed by July 4, when the first races will be held here, will start between this time and the first of the coming month, Mr. Bell announces. The building of the other buildings, coliseum, exhibition hall, necessary to the holding of a fair will also be started as soon as possible, although these, of course, cannot be finished in time for a fair for this year.

The races to be held on July 3, 4 and 5 are made possible through the splitting of the racing card which has been booked for the Oklahoma City fair at that date, it is announced.

"The Oklahoma City fair is one of the largest, and I believe without exception the best and most completely arranged in the entire Southwest," said Mr. Bell. "We can duplicate this plant very quickly in Wichita Falls, and even make improvements. Guided by their experiences and with all the data collected during the operation of this fair, I believe we can build a fair association which will surpass the one at Oklahoma City in three years where it took them thirteen."

Mr. Albritton, who was interested in the bringing of the men to Wichita Falls, is also particularly enthusiastic over the outlook. "I believe that this fair will give the most important thing for Wichita Falls, which has come along in many a day," he declared.

The association will be incorporated under the name of the Wichita Falls Fair & Racing Association. Of the capital stock, Wichita Falls people are to be asked to subscribe to \$50,000 of the total, although it is announced by those interested that the Fair Association will go through irrespective of this local subscription.

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TRACK WORK PROGRESSING AT UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS

AUSTIN, Tex., March 29.—Track work at the University of Texas is progressing nicely in spite of handicaps imposed by the recent rains and high winds. Fairly good time is being made in several of the events, and it looks now as though by the time of the first meet, a good team can be assembled. Two 100-yard dash men have been shown up in the past week in addition to the veteran from year before last, Herbert Beavers. Joe Moss is back on the hurdles with every prospect of cleaning up on all corners as he has done for the past two years. Dr. Witt Warrick has cleared 3 feet 11 inches in the high jump and 21 feet 3 inches in the broad jump. Other events have strong representatives.

The first meet, as now scheduled, comes on April 7 when the Longhorns and the Owls meet in Houston. This will probably be a hard meet, since these are practically the best teams on the Owls, but continued rumors give them credit for having worlds of stuff. Baylor comes next in a meet in Austin. This will be close if present expectations are lived up to. The Bears have several noted athletes on the string, especially Frazer who placed four times in the southern intercollegiate meet last spring, and they may be able to work havoc in the Longhorn pen.

April 24 will see the Farmers in Austin. So far they have not given much information in regard to their team, but have boasted they are going to get four undefeated teams this year. They still have track and baseball to win. A good, hard-fought meet is certain to come from them.

Prospects of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association for this season are good. Better material this year than in two or three years is out for training, and consequently, better records should be hung up. It is too early, however, to predict on this branch of sport. The only factor worth noting is that Oklahoma University is out and that a new team, Phillips University, is taking her place.

In the opening game the whole Exporter team went to pieces, especially the pitchers, who were touched for a total of twenty-two base hits. But in the second game the local "team back" and staged a great battle. They advanced another notch for the third game and were able to stop the Mackmen, who had won twelve consecutive exhibition starts.

Joe Mathes' staff of pitchers was strengthened Friday by the arrival of Henry Jasper, a right hander from St. Louis. Jasper finished the season with the Cleveland Indians last fall. Stuart Jacobus, of the 1919 pitching staff, has wired the local boss that he will report here Monday. Jacobus has been ill at his home in Cincinnati for some weeks. Joe Martina, start of last year's staff, also is expected to report here this week, which will complete the roster of the Exporters.

Mathes has so far been unable to make up his team. Walter Alexander and Ted Easterly will share the catching burden. Don Rader will look after the short field and Nick DeMaggio one of the gardeners, but there the certainty of the positions on the local club ends. Miller and Shiras are having a great fight for the first base job. Johnny Monroe, a recruit, looks good as second, but has not yet gotten a toe-hold on the berth. Third base is notably weak unless Jack Stansbury is given the assignment. Stansbury can play either around the diamond or in the garden and Mathes has not yet made up his mind as to Jack's place. Jack, however, is sure of a berth. He is hitting the ball hard in the exhibition games.

There are no dearth of outfielders here, but DeMaggio appears to be about the only one certain to land. Others are Charlie Clapp, who is handicapped by an injured ankle; Charlie Bartlett, Tommy Taylor, who also is a pitcher and infielder and John J. Morrison.

Andy Trauth, outfielder, was released several days ago by the Beaumont club to the Rayne club of the new Louisiana State league.

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COUNTERFEITING CHARGE AGAINST 16-YEAR-OLD YOUTH FILED HERE

V. C. Jones, a 16-year-old youth, is charged by complaint in federal court with passing a counterfeit bank note. The lad was arrested at Euwala several days ago and was brought to Wichita Falls Sunday by Deputy United States Marshal Morgan. He is alleged to have been implicated in a counterfeiting scheme by which a \$5 bank note and a \$10 bank note were raised to a \$50 denomination. The five-dollar figure was cut from the currency note and a twenty-cent stamp over the one-dollar figure of the \$10 bill thereby raising the \$10 denomination to \$50. Federal officials do not believe that Jones is the ring-leader in the counterfeiting ring but are suspicious that he was merely used by shrewd counterfeiters for the purpose of passing their "phony" bank notes. It is alleged that Jones passed one \$50 counterfeit bank note upon a bank at Graham and was attempting to pass another check when arrested at Euwala. He is being held in jail here in default of \$750 bond.

COMPLAINTS CHARGE TWO WITH THEFT OF PIPE

E. L. McAully, a former railroad man and L. M. Carroll, a switchman, are charged by complaint in federal district court with theft in connection with the stealing and later sale of a carload of oil field pipes valued at approximately \$15,000. It was announced by federal officials Sunday. McAully and Carroll were arrested the first of last week but announcement of their arrest was withheld by federal officials pending further investigation. Preliminary hearing for the two men was conducted early last week and bond for McAully was fixed at \$3,000 and bond for Carroll at \$2,000. Both have been released on bail.

The carload of oil field pipes is purported to have been stolen in the Wichita Falls railroad yards. According to testimony introduced in the case before United States Commissioner Lantz the car was unloaded at night and later sold to local oil men.

ALL INJURED IN TANK ACCIDENT WILL RECOVER

All of the six tank builders who were brought to the Methodist hospital here Saturday suffering from injuries sustained when a scaffold collapsed near Devol, Okla., are reported to be getting along nicely by the authorities at the hospital. A. W. Rhodes, the only man whose recovery was thought to be doubtful, is recovering, it was reported Monday afternoon.

START DRILLING IN RIVER BED NORTH OF GAMBLE-PRICE

Saturday drilling was begun on a test in the bed of Red river, northwest of the Gamble-Price well, which may attract attention to this hitherto neglected part of the river bed, while Oklahoma has been laying claim to the northwest part of the county, after the recovery of oil from the river bed. This new test is being drilled by F. E. Routledge and associates, and is in the Rutledge Survey, east of the State Excess lands, patented to Mr. Routledge some months ago. In leasing this land Routledge and associates are planning for an extension of the sand found in the Gamble and Price well, and a connecting pool between the south Burkburnett shallow pools and the Clay county sand, and though they expect to get the Texhoma sand are drilling with cable tools, and are prepared to go deep enough to make a thorough test. The spudding in the test Saturday was the third time that the Routledge test has been started. Some time ago the test was built and preparations made to drill, but a windstorm demolished the derrick and when it was rebuilt it was on a new location, further to the east. This location was inaccessible because of the quicksand and was abandoned after a depth of 200 feet was reached. The third location was then decided upon, and a series of continuous drilling operations.

Mr. Routledge states that the public will be welcome at all times, and that a log of the test will be available to those desiring it.

STRONG SHOWING OF OIL IN K. M. A. NO. 2 REPORTED

Strong showing of oil, and an increase in the gas pressure, were encouraging results of the agitation caused by the attempt to pull casing in the Kemp-Munger-Allen No. 2, and though the first effort to pull the casing was a failure, the company is much pleased with the showing, and is confident that the No. 2 will make a producer. The hotel motor has taken us from the depot to the hotel. The charge was twenty-five cents. Returning to the depot, one of the party discovered that he had forgotten his overcoat. He returned and brought it back in the bus—charge twenty-five cents round trip.

When word came into Vernon and thence to the world Wednesday morning that oil had been discovered in a well in a part of the oil field of the town, the people had a very vague idea of what was going to happen. Business men came into town and leased everything they could lay hands on. What they could not lease they bought outright. Vacant lots basements of buildings unfit for human occupancy window space, and residences of all kinds were grabbed up by outside interests before the

The circumstances of Dwyer's murder were almost identical with those in the murder of James MacCarthy, Sinn Fein leader who was shot and killed in the bedroom of his home at Thurles Saturday. The Dwyer murder is believed to be the result of the belief here that two rival murder societies were warring upon sympathizers of Sinn Fein and the British government throughout Ireland.

MEXICAN POLITICAL SITUATION BECOMES TENSE FOLLOWING ARREST DEPUTIES

PERFECT CAMERA THAT WILL PHOTOGRAPH THE BOTTOM OF OIL WELLS

RANGER, TEX., March 29.—A camera that will photograph the bottom of an oil well has been perfected by R. A. Dodge of this city. DOHAN AGAIN ATTACKS PRACTICES OF WOOD

WASHINGTON, March 29.—Retelling his charges of excessive expenditures in the interest of Major General Leonard Wood's candidacy for the republican presidential nomination, Senator Dohan, republican, Idaho, telegraphed General Wood today declaring that unless the practices of the Wood campaign were corrected they would bring disgrace upon your name upon your party and upon your country.

Information from various states, the message added, had convinced Senator Dohan that his previous statements about the Wood campaign expenditures were "modest."

The message follows: "The press dispatches state you claim the attack upon you was to sway the voters in Michigan. You are in part correct."

"It was intended to sway the voters not only in Michigan but in the United States. I know of no other tribunal to which to appeal to correct these practices. But it can only be effective provided the facts I stated are correct. It is within your power to give to the Michigan and other states a list of your subscribers, the amount you are expending, the amount which you did expend in South Dakota, the amount which you propose to expend, for instance, in Ohio and Illinois."

"If you will make a statement of these facts over your signature I will correct any erroneous statements which I have heretofore made. The material which is coming from South Dakota, Illinois and Ohio, convulses me. I wish to make in my statements, General Wood, if you are not familiar with what is going on in your behalf for the presidency, I take leave to assert that unless you familiarize yourself and correct it, you will bring disgrace upon your name, upon your party and upon your country."

"It is up to you as a soldier and as a man to come out boldly, meet these facts and either show the public that they are unfounded or else repudiate the men who have manifested their determination to control the national convention through the use of money."

Senator Dohan sent the telegram just before departing for Michigan to speak in the interest of the candidacy of Senator Johnson, of California.

A letter from William G. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, endorsing Senator Dohan's proposal for federal control of pre-convention expenditures was put into the senate record today by Senator Sheppard, democrat, Texas. Mr. McAdoo also declared himself in favor of a congressional investigation of such expenditures as suggested by Senator Kenyon, republican, Iowa.
