

FEDERAL RECEIVER IS APPOINTED

JACOB M. DICKINSON IS NAMED BY THE U. S. SUPREME COURT; TAKES CHARGE IN FIFTEEN DAYS

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Texas was enjoined today by the Supreme Court from issuing any permits affecting contested oil lands in the Red River valley pending a final decision on the boundary proceedings instituted by the State of Oklahoma. The court also enjoined both states from removing any of the machinery now used in taking gas or oil from the land and ordered the appointment of Jacob M. Dickinson of Chicago, as receiver to take possession of the lands and property. The injunction was granted at the motion of the government which asked to be made a party to the proceedings. Mr. Dickinson, who was secretary of war under President Taft, was ordered to take possession of the lands and property within 15 days and after a complete investigation report to the Supreme Court relative to the development of the contested lands. He also was authorized to operate or close any of the wells if advisable. His bond was fixed at \$100,000. The boundary controversy arose after the discovery of valuable oil and gas deposits in the Red River region and recently became so heated that armed conflict between the states was threatened.

THE MEMBER SOCIALIST PARTY EXPELLED FROM N. Y. ASSEMBLY AFTER DAY AND NIGHT SESSION

ALBANY, N. Y., April 1.—The 80th session, Louis Waldman, August Hansen, Charles Solomon, Samuel DeWitt and Samuel Orr, of New York city, the entire Socialist party in the New York assembly, were expelled from the legislature today after a day and night session. The majority in favor of expelling the men, supported on the closing day of the legislative session, charges of disloyalty were substantiated.

CHICAGO FIRE FIGHTERS MAY GO ON STRIKE

CHICAGO, April 1.—Threats of a general strike by the fire department today as a result of their wholesale resignations as a "strike" for higher pay. Seven hundred firemen signed resignations yesterday, union officials say, and by tonight they expect to have similar action by 1,800 of the 2,267 city firemen and pipemen.

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DELaware House Again Defeats The Woman Suffrage Amendment

DOVER, DEL., April 1.—The federal suffrage amendment was defeated in the Delaware house here this afternoon by a vote of 22 to 9. Three members did not vote and one was absent. The action of the assembly, opponents of the suffrage amendment hold, definitely removed this state as the possible 36th state to ratify the amendment, thereby making it effective.

MUCH DAMAGE IS DONE BY STORM IN AND ABOUT DALLAS

DALLAS, TEX., April 1.—A hard rain accompanied by a heavy hail did considerable damage to small plants and window panes here last night. Service on several street car lines was tied up and one section of the city was in darkness for a while as a result of the storm.

LEADER OF TURKISH NATIONALIST DECLARES WAR ON GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, April 1.—Mustapha Kemal, leader of the Turkish nationalist rebels, has declared war on Great Britain, a dispatch from the Constantinople correspondent of the Morning Post says today.

GENERAL STRIKE OF MARINE WORKERS IS EFFECTIVE AT ONCE

NEW YORK, April 1.—A general strike order effective immediately on all railroad boats except ferries, was issued by the Marine Workers Affiliation this afternoon. Workers on ferry boats of railroad companies were ordered to quit work at 1 o'clock tonight. The union announced that 5,000 men would obey the order, and that the strike would tie up 40 per cent of the total harbor traffic.

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JAPANESE AND RUSSIAN TROOPS STAGE A FIGHT

VLADIVOSTOK, March 22.—Russian and Japanese troops clashed at Nikolavsk, a city located at the mouth of the Amur River, on March 13, the Russians reporting their losses as being 40 killed and 80 wounded. It is expressed here that this encounter may start a series of wars which will spread through all eastern Siberia, if the Japanese do not evacuate the country.

STRIKE WHICH HAS TIED UP THE CHICAGO STOCK YARDS 4 DAYS WILL END ON FRIDAY MORNING

CHICAGO, April 1.—The strike which has tied up the Chicago stock yards for four days and threatened to close all packing plants here, was settled today, the men agreeing to return to work and arbitrate their wage differences. Work will be resumed at the yards tomorrow. More than 7,000 packing house employees were thrown out of work when feeders and stock handlers at the yards quit.

FEDERAL CONCILIATORS MEET WITH LEADERS

CHICAGO, April 1.—Federal conciliators met with union leaders today in an attempt to bring about a settlement of the strike of 900 stock yard workers which has resulted in a gradual closing down of the Chicago packing industry. Nearly 10,000 packing house employees had been forced out in work early today and officials forecast a general shutdown of the plants within forty-eight hours unless the strike is ended, permitting livestock shipments to flow in the Chicago market. Retail butchers today predicted sharp advances in meat prices here and a shortage of fresh meats will be felt during the emergency. Packing plants in other parts of the west were notified to increase their output to provide for shortages in regions normally supplied by Chicago. Dennis Lane, international secretary of the meat cutters' union, conferred with strike leaders today in an effort to bring about an agreement. The workers, who receive \$30 to \$35 a month, are to receive an additional \$400,000 increase of from \$30 to \$40.

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### RESOLUTION PROVIDES PEACE WITH GERMANY INTRODUCED IN HOUSE

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Peace with Germany through adoption of a joint resolution declaring the war at an end was put squarely before congress yesterday by republicans in control of the house.

The resolution follows: "Whereas, the president of the United States, in the performance of his constitutional duty to give to congress the information of the state of the union has advised congress that the war with the imperial German government has ended, received by the senate and the house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, that the state of war declared to exist between the imperial German government and the people of the United States by a joint resolution of congress approved April 6, 1917, is hereby declared at an end.

Section 2. That in the interpretation of any provision relating to the date of the termination of the present war or of the present or existing emergency in any acts of congress, joint resolutions or proclamations of the president containing provisions contingent upon the date of the termination of the war or of the present or existing emergency, the date when this resolution becomes effective shall be construed and treated as the date of the termination of the war or of the present or existing emergency, notwithstanding any provision in any act of congress or joint resolution, providing any other mode of determination of the date of termination of the war, or of the present or existing emergency.

Section 3. That with a view to securing reciprocal trade with the German government and its nationals, and for this purpose it is hereby provided that unless within 45 days from the date when this resolution becomes effective the German government shall duly notify the president of the United States that it has declared a termination of the war with the United States and that it waives and renounces on behalf of itself and its nationals any claim demand right or benefit against the United States, or its nationals, that it or they would not have the right to assert had the United States ratified the treaty of Versailles, the president of the United States shall have the power, and it shall be his duty, to proclaim the fact that the German government has not given the notifications heretofore mentioned and thereupon and until the president shall have proclaimed the receipt of such notification, commercial intercourse between the United States and Germany and the making of loans or credits and the furnishing of financial assistance or supplies to the German government or the inhabitants of Germany, directly or indirectly by the government or by the inhabitants of the United States shall, except with the license of the president, be prohibited.

Section 4. That whoever shall willfully violate the foregoing prohibition whenever the same shall be, shall upon conviction be fined not more than \$10,000 or, if a natural person, imprisoned for not more than two years, or both; and the officer, director or agent of any corporation who knowingly participates in such violation shall be punished by a like fine, imprisonment, or both, and any property, funds, securities, papers, or other articles or documents or any vessel, together with her tackle, apparel, furniture and equipment, concerned in such violation, shall be forfeited to the United States.

Section 5. That nothing herein contained shall be construed as a waiver by the United States of its rights, privileges, indemnities, reparations or advantages to which the United States has become entitled under the terms of the armistice signed Nov. 11, 1918, or which were acquired by or are in the possession of the United States by reason of its participation in the war or otherwise, and all fines, forfeitures, penalties and seizures imposed or made by the United States are hereby ratified, confirmed and maintained.

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### PANHANDLE HAS A SPECTACULAR FIRE IN NORTH WICHITA

A spectacular fire in North Wichita, Falls, which was still burning Thursday, resulted in the destruction of 55,000 barrels storage tanks in the farm of the Panhandle Refining Company from a bolt of lightning during the wind, rain and electrical storm of Wednesday afternoon. Something over 15,000 barrels of oil were in the tank and the tank itself was a total loss, the loss being estimated at between \$5,000 and \$50,000, covered by insurance. The levee surrounding the tank, confining the burning oil to the immediate vicinity of the tank on fire, prevented further damage.

Considerable damage to telegraph and telephone wires along both the Denver and the Katy lines is reported as a result of the storm. Reports received here from Bowie are to the effect that the electrical power house there was unroofed, the debris falling into the machinery and putting it out of commission, resulting in the town being left in darkness Wednesday night.

### FLIRT FOR A DIME AND KISSES FOR 15 CENTS DON'T GO IN ST. LOUIS

ST. LOUIS, April 1.—Flirt for a dime, kisses for 15 cents and for a quarter "you'll be surprised" may have been all right when the songs were written but not now in St. Louis where the price has gone up, musicians and music publishers declared here today.

Oliver Shattinger, head of a large piano and music store estimated the advance in prices of musical instruments from 10 to 15 per cent in the last four months.

### TULSA POLICE MUST PAY \$5000 FOR DEATH OF VERNON HATFIELD

TULSA, OKLA., April 1.—Tulsa "cops" will have to pay \$5,000 for the death of Vernon Hatfield, killed January, 1917, by local police officers, according to a verdict brought in by a jury here late yesterday.

Damages for \$20,500 were asked by the boy's parents. It was alleged that the police shot without cause killing the 13-year old boy while he was driving an automobile. Police claimed they shot only after the boy shot at them in trying to resist arrest. The officers declared that Hatfield had liquor in his car and therefore refused to let it be searched. The mother denied this. The jury deliberated for more than two hours.

### WOMAN WHO KILLED CHILDREN DECLARES THAT SHE WAS CRAZY

ELK CITY, OKLA., April 1.—Regaining consciousness for a few minutes before her death, but unable to speak, Mrs. Eimer Cowart, who yesterday murdered her five children and slashed her own throat, scribbled with a pencil a word at a time her explanation of the tragedy: "I was crazy" she wrote. "I was tired living. I know all about it now." She died at 4:45 yesterday afternoon.

Further investigation of the tragedy revealed the fact that she used an axe, butcher knife and a razor to end the lives of her children ranging in age from four months to twelve years. Mental derangement which caused the mother to murder her children is believed to have been caused by a long life of poverty, sickness and loneliness in a tent on the property of her parents with whom she was estranged.

The husband and father is suffering from a nervous breakdown and is unable to make a statement. Funeral arrangements are now completed.

# PREMIER NITTI IS IN CONTROL OF GOVERNMENT

### Takes Advantage of Last Night's Vote of Confidence by the Chamber

By CAMILLO VIANFARRA (United Press Staff Correspondent)

ROME, March 31. (Night)—The government of Premier Nitti was firmly back in control today despite continued opposition from the socialists.

Taking advantage of last night's vote of confidence by the chamber of deputies, the administration today brought up the bill against war profiteers and accomplished its defeat easily. The measure, back by the socialists, would have confiscated excessive profits of war profiteers. Voting had been delayed by the government until the confidence vote was secured.

The socialists, however, scored a point when they obtained adoption of their order of the day disapproving the price of bread recently increased by the food control. The immigration question took up considerable time today. Deputy Treves declared the Italian movement to North America had ceased and that in future the "great" productive stream of Italian energy would be turned to Brazil, Austria, Germany, which before the war had aimed to assert herself there.

Premier Nitti spoke briefly, thanking the deputies for their vote of confidence and promising to attack the many problems confronting the nation at home and abroad with renewed energy.

# ADOPT TENTATIVE SALARY SCHEDULE FOR THE TEACHERS

A tentative salary schedule for the teachers in the Wichita Falls schools for the coming year was adopted by the school board at a called meeting held at the high school Tuesday night. With the help of the \$100,000 fund that the business men of the town have pledged to raise the school board will be able to increase the salaries of the present corps of teachers and also make attractive offers to competent additional teachers that are needed. By disposing of the financial question at this time of the year it is believed the school board will be able to keep the present force of teachers, on account of the knowledge of exactly how much can be paid for teachers and what percent of increase in pay can be given.

The \$100,000 to be raised by the business council of the Chamber of Commerce will be needed to supplement the largest amount of money that can be raised by taxation to run the local schools for the next year. Other things disposed of at this meeting included the authorizing of election ballots for the coming school trustee election. So far the three present incumbents, Judge A. H. Carrigan, J. L. Downing and M. A. Bundy, are the only candidates that have announced.

# BROKERAGE FIRM WILL TAKE ALL STUTZ STOCK

NEW YORK, April 1.—The Allan Ryan brokerage company today announced it would purchase New York stock of the Stutz Motor Company ofered for sale.

Trading in the stock on the New York exchange was suspended by the board of governors because it was alleged Allan A. Ryan, a member of the exchange has "cornered" \$0,000 of the 100,000 outstanding shares of Stutz. The action of the company in offering to purchase any outstanding stock was taken to protect owners against loss.

The Consolidated Exchange also barred its members from trading in Stutz stock. At the opening today a number of outside bidders were making a nominal market in Stutz, bids ranging from 270 to 350 and offerings from 420 to 425. No sales were reported.





This information was given out here after a wireless report had been picked up at Laredo late yesterday declaring Obregon had been imprisoned at Tampico and repeating a Mexico City report that Ignacio Bonillas, another presidential candidate, had been injured in a demonstration there.

LABOR SITUATION IN ENGLAND IS CLEARING

LONDON, April 1.—The British labor situation was beginning to clear today. The strike of bus drivers was called off and the threatened strike of tramway workers averted through an agreement between the men and employers. Negotiations between the government and the coal miners were proceeding favorably and it was believed the threatened strike would be averted. The men were considering a new compromise offer put forward by the government.

PLAN ORGANIZATION FOR HERBERT HOOVER

DETROIT, Mich., April 1.—Permanent organization of Herbert Hoover's presidential candidacy has begun in the middle west today with the formation here of a Hoover Republican club. "The real fight will be after the primary," said one of the Hoover managers today. "Hoover will surprise the wisecracks with the vote he will poll Monday but, of course, there is not enough time for us to win the primary fight in Michigan." Candidates today continued their efforts to win Michigan's preferential vote.

SALESMANSHIP CLUB PURCHASES A FARM

HOUSTON, TEX., April 1.—The Salesmanship club of Houston bought a house and farm on the shores of Galveston bay today and dedicated it to the Harris county orphans. The place is to be turned over to the orphans each summer and maintained by the recreation fund of the club.

LOUISIANA RAILROAD MUST PAY \$100 FINE

SHREVEPORT, LA., April 1.—As a result of an order promulgated by the Louisiana railroad commission more than a year ago, the Louisiana Railway and Navigation railroad was fined at yesterday's session of the commission, the sum of \$100 for failure to improve and repair its tracks in conformity with the order.

EMPEROR OF JAPAN IS REPORTED ILL

HONOLULU, April 1.—Emperor Yoshihito of Japan is ill, according to a Tokyo cable to the Nippon Jiji, a Japanese language newspaper, here. He is said to be suffering from sciatica, with symptoms of glucosuria.

URGE RECOGNITION OF IRISH REPUBLIC

WASHINGTON, April 1.—About 20 women, carrying flags and banners, urging recognition of an Irish republic, gained entrance to the capitol building today by claiming to have appointments with Senators Francis and Gore. They distributed circulars asking congress to abrogate treaties with Great Britain.

DAILY PRODUCTION PAST WEEK SHOWS 6500 BARREL INCREASE OVER RECORD PRECEDING WEEK

Although completions in the Wichita Falls district during the past week were considerably fewer in number than in the past several weeks, the sizes were reminiscent of the early days in the Wagoner, especially in the case of the completions on the George and C. P. Evans tracts, resulting in an increase in production over the preceding week of 6,500 barrels. The total runs for the district during the week averaged 4,800 barrels per day, divided as follows: Elkhart, 10,000 barrels; Burkhardt, 5,000; Iowa Park, 500 barrels; Holliday, 200 barrels; Perot, 100 barrels; Burkhardt is responsible for the entire increase in fact. It is to be almost entirely credited to the Wagoner pool. The No. 6 W. F. Evans tract is the best completion for some weeks, at an estimate of 2,000 barrels being placed on this well by officials of the company. Several other completions are reported by this company, including the No. 2 W. F. George estimated at 600 barrels; the No. 3 at 1,200; No. 4 at 800 and No. 5 at 500. Two completions are also reported by this company from the J. B. Evans tract, an estimate of 1,000 barrels being placed on each of them. The Texas Oil Co. 2 C. Birk reports a fine part of the week is completed for a 1,000 barrel well. The Houston Oil Corporation is credited with several completions on its Lillis Morgan lease, the No. 2 being rated at 200 barrels; No. 3 at 200 barrels and No. 4 at 200. Block 9 gets its first production this week through the completion of the Texas Annelimated Oil Co. No.

Lillis Morgan, a 500 barrel well in the northwest corner of the block offset to the southeast corner of Texas Oil Co.'s C. Birk lease. The single completion of the well from the east end of the Wagoner is the E. A. Johnson, No. 1 Brannon in block 89, which is making around 125 barrels. The Apple, No. 2 Roberts, in block 820, in the Red River section, is reported swabbing better than 300 barrels from the top of the sand, and is reported preparing to drill deeper in the sand. GENERAL COLUMBA ASSUMES COMMAND BROWNSVILLE, TEX., April 1.—General Rafael Columba, who arrived in Matamoros yesterday, assumed command of Mexican forces along the Rio Grande between the gulf coast and Mer, opposite Roma, Texas, today. # Oil News

## OIL BOOTLEGGER IS ADOPTING NEW PLAN IN THE LOCAL FIELD

The latest move of the oil "bootlegger" as the larger operators term the small oil jobber, is the making of contracts with the royalty owners on property with which the large pipe lines have made connections, for the purchase of his oil, at 25 cents over the market price, erecting storage on the lease to care for it. Of course one-eighth of the oil belongs to the land owner and he may do what he pleases with it, and he is in many instances, it is reported, pleasing to make these premium contracts by which he takes in two bits a barrel more than he will get from their pipe line company.

Although premiums in the field have become quite a rule with practically all of the smaller companies and some of the large ones, the greater part of the large operators choose to pass up the premium for the connection with the big pipe line company from whom he knows he will get his check. And in making these connections the pipe lines considered that they would run the royalty owners oil as a matter of course, or did it at least until the jobber broke out in this new plan, jeopardizing an eighth of the business of the companies, and thereby creating quite a serious situation for the representatives of the companies in these times when there is the hottest kind of competition for the running of production.

The role being played by the "bootlegger" in this connection is an exact reversal of the role he played in the heyday of the flush production of the Waggoner, when the capacity of the pipe lines was far from sufficient to take care of production, and when, in order to get the oil marketed and meet his obligations, the producer was in many cases obliged to sell them his oil for most any price they wanted to pay him for it. Thousands of barrels of oil were marketed daily in this manner at anywhere from a dollar on up, when the larger companies, who did not make an effort to take advantage of the situation were holding the price up to the then posted price of two dollars and two bits.

"The bootlegger, however, did not profit to any great extent by his operations in those days, and is hard up against it now when he has to pay a premium to get any oil," said a prominent producer here recently in discussing the state of affairs prevailing here last summer. "The oil he got at a dollar, on up to a dollar-sixtyfive was thrown on the market, in most instances, for a profit which averaged little better than a carryover charge, and he hasn't the surplus which he might have had to fall back on now and pay a premium."

## INCREASED INTEREST IN SOUTHWEST PART OF WAGGONER FIELD

The increased interest in the southwest section of the Waggoner, brought about by the Texas companies two big wells on the C. Birk, is reflected in new drilling operations in this section. The John Siber tract, immediately south of the C. Birk, which has been previously somewhat overlooked in the drilling, because of seemingly unfavorable developments earlier has had several new locations made this past week. The Congressional Oil company has a rotary up for its No. 1 John Siber, and No. 2 is a location, while in the north corner of the block James Mulligan has made four locations. One new location is also reported from Block 70, White and Green, No. 1 L. Morgan while other new drilling is understood as ready to be started shortly in this block where James Amagamat brought in their No. 1 several days ago.

The No-Tex Oil and Refining company's drilling campaign on the J. B. Evans tract, "reclaiming" the lease west of the Tennessee company's holes, is being vigorously prosecuted, and new derricks, rigs and locations to the number of 16 are reported. Since the first test on this tract struck the sand two others have been put down, and six others are now drilling. It is reported from the company's office, at depths from 200 to 1400 feet. The drilling plan calls for six rigs to be running at all times until 16 wells have been completed.

Among the new locations in the river bed pool are several by the Bass Petroleum company in the Durfee survey, north of Block 819, bringing their total number of wells, derricks, rigs and derricks up to 12. The Champion Oil and Development company is reported to have made location for their No. 1 Schnakenberg, in the northwest part of Block 819, along the river, and the Liquid Gold Production company's No. 1 Schnakenberg, also in the north part of Block 819, is a new location.

On the Holtzen, the center strip of

land in Block 819, the Trinity Oil company's No. 1 Holtzen is reported as a new location and the eastern strip, the Michna, is also represented in the new drilling operations, the Eight Nineteen Syndicate No. 2 Michna being reported a derrick.

The Gold Burk Oil company's No. 1 Morris, Block 67, is reported as abandoned, dry at 2,000 feet. There have been few failures reported from any of the pools recently, and the past week has seen a larger amount of outside drilling started than at any time since the early drilling activity, when none of the lines of production were defined in the Waggoner.

## JAKEHAMON IS LOOKING AFTER FIRE PROTECTION

JAKEHAMON, TEX., April 1.—The Jakehamon Chamber of Commerce is meeting the situation incident to rapid growth of the town since the new railroad was built in here by taking every precaution to prevent fire risks and to assure sanitary conditions in the town. These are rather difficult tasks owing to the rapid building and increasing population, that marks the present stage of the town's development.

## CONFESS TO THEFT OF A FORD AUTOMOBILE

A confession has been obtained by the city police department from a party who with his partner, was arrested by Detectives Jackson and de Graffenreid, with a Ford in their possession Wednesday afternoon, that he stole the car and changed the motor number with a steel die. The attention of the detectives was first called to the theft when the owner of the stolen car claimed he recognized the car on the street. Jackson and his partner waited until the two men showed up to drive the Ford away, then detained them until they examined the car thoroughly. It was discovered that the motor number of the car had been changed and all of the other parts of the car corresponded to the car stolen, so the two were brought to the city hall and locked up. Here, one of the men is said to have confessed to stealing the car but declared the other man knew nothing about it.

After the two men had been safely put in jail the detectives visited their living quarters and shop in the industrial district close to the window glass factory, and found two other cars in the process of rebuilding, which he believes to have been stolen. A complete outfit for changing the motor and frame numbers of the cars was also found in this shop.

The increased new production that has marked recent reports from this field is due to the deeper drilling.

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# VERNON BUDGET

## VERNON IS IN THE THROES OF A GENUINE OIL BOOM AND THE TOWN IS CROWDED TO THE LIMIT

By A. C. McCONNELL

VERNON, TEX., April 1.—With the Prescott-Peoria well a certainty, and flowing at the rate of 3,500 barrels a day, Vernon is in the throes of an oil boom. With streets and hotels and oil exchange lobbies crowded with an ever increasing rush of spectators and countless rumors flitting about, the town is rapidly becoming the rival of Wichita Falls and Burkburnett as an oil center. It is almost impossible to secure hotel accommodations and real estate of all descriptions is constantly changing hands. Many have even found that their homes and houses, residence and business, are sold from under them and the only fortunate ones are those who have leases on buildings or own their own property. Real estate agents are making a house to house canvass for the purpose of securing property for listing for sale. Owners of property have been assured local citizens that adequate train service would be put on immediately to care for the large crowds coming into Vernon, and arrangements for the present emergency, it is estimated that there are over 5,000 people in the city, who are paying fabulous prices for homes and business property.

New companies to drill south of Vernon are organizing over night and the sidewalks are congested with men with maps and blue prints who are again coming into their own. Promoters from the Burkburnett and Wichita Falls centers have invaded the Vernon field with promotions.

Frises to build.

The Frisco railroad will build a line of railroad from the city of Vernon south to section 51, block 2, 10 miles south and west of Vernon, location being the Prescott-Peoria well. This action was announced at a recent meeting of the stockholders and directors of the Prescott-Peoria Oil Co., and this week at Wichita Falls following a visit of the Frisco officials to the well. Plans for a town site on section 51 has been consummated. Sigler City will be the name of the new town named in honor of Lloyd Sigler who persistently worked on a theory that he was going to step on the tail of a wildcat. Negotiations have been started for buildings to go up on the townsite.

Will Have Conveniences.

House furnishings, adequate water and light facilities and every possible fire protection will be installed. The city will be between Vernon and the Prescott well. A tent city is the newest development from the outcome of his project. Tents are being erected all over Vernon to care for the influx of visitors.

At a meeting of the stockholders of

the Prescott-Peoria Oil Co., at Wichita Falls, the "Sigler Oil Co." named in honor of Lloyd Sigler, whose faith and money brought about the great wave of development in section 51, as christened, Sigler is general manager of the company and the name was changed from Prescott-Peoria to Sigler Oil Co., at this meeting. The change in name was unanimous. Every stockholder was present, as far as the company and as far west as the town of Arizona.

Bank for Sigler City.

P. P. Langford, a Wichita Falls banker and one of the stockholders in the Sigler well, announced that he would organize a bank at the town of Sigler City to be built near the city. Other business institutions are seeking quarters in the new town, which will bid fair to exceed "New Town" of the Burkburnett field in notoriety. All provisions have been made for the establishment of Sigler City.

At the meeting of the directors a sum of one million dollars was subscribed by the stockholders to be used for the immediate development of the acreage held by the Sigler Oil Co. Ten derricks will be erected at once on the company's holdings within the next few days. Four rotary rigs have been purchased and on their way to the holdings. The original 3,000 acres owned by the company will not be sold, but retained and developed, according to a statement given the reporter by Mr. Sigler and Harry A. Frankel. Within a circle of the disintegrator well 10 wells will be drilled at once.

VERNON, TEX., April 1.—The Sigler Oil company purchased the three-story Lutz building in the heart of Main street from its former buyer, Harry A. Frankel. The price is said to run into seven figures. The building will be known as the "Sigler building" and the entire building will be used for the company's offices, etc.

At the Wichita Falls meeting announcement of the plans regarding the sale of 3,000 acres that the company holds surrounding the well, exclusive of the 3,000 acres originally held, was made. A contract was closed with Seay, Cranfill, Graham & Co., of Wichita Falls, and J. E. Lutz, Harry A. Frankel and associates of Vernon, whereby these two firms will have the exclusive sale of these leases, outside of the leases to be developed by the company. It is reported one firm sold around \$1,000,000 of this acreage following the placing on the market of the same Tuesday. The leases will only be sold to independent companies with specifications that drilling must begin in 90 days of purchase of lease and one well drilled to every five acres.

Reynolds of New York, Charles E. Burton of Ash Fork, Ariz.

Several important deals in acreage have been consummated this week in close proximity to the wells. Oil men have made subsequent purchase in Vernon real estate. A number of bricks on Main street have changed hands at fabulous prices. In the block

surrounded by the Baptist church, really values are advancing and a number of large deals consummated. This section is only one block from the business center.

Amos G. Carter and associates, formerly owners of the Waggoner Ranch Oil company, absorbed by the Prescott-Peoria Oil company, have closed several big deals this week in acreage near the new Sigler well. It is reported authentically that they sold Block 15 of the former Waggoner subdivision, including 640 acres at prices from \$100 to \$1,500 an acre to P. P. Langford and associates of Wichita Falls. The Wilbarger County Southern Oil company is a new organization here with P. L. Massey, president. The company was organized by McAdoo, Oakes & Shaffer, with 20 acres two and a half miles of the Sigler well, with 200 acres checker-boarded. The capitalization is \$110,000.

Several other companies have been organized to drill, and the sale of the townsite plots are going fast.

The Department of Justice makes very satisfactory reply to the charge made in congress the other day that the "Save Money on Meat" campaign would have a tendency to raise the price of the cheaper cuts—the charge being made by a majority member who apparently was much more concerned in making political thunder than in helping along a move designed sincerely to help cut the high cost of living. The Department's reply points out that neglect of the less costly cuts of meat, especially those of the forequarter, has retarded the sale and distribution of these cuts; has caused proportionately greater shrinkage and diminished volume; has caused some meat literally to be wasted and has caused retailers to chop and sell to public eating places meat cuts which could be used by individual consumers to better advantage in unchopped form, thereby materially increasing the dealer's overhead.

We think the Department is correct, moreover, when it says that "every particle of the loss, shrinkage and wastage has been borne by the consumer in the price of all meat which he does buy. The extent of the loss, shrinkage and wastage can be appreciated if it is remembered that the less costly cuts—which exclude the ribs and loins—constitute about three-fourths of the meat animal." It is not difficult to believe, either, the statement that, paradoxically, the consumer and the livestock producer will both receive benefits if the campaign gets the widespread support hoped for it, for with the stockman unable to raise a steer consisting only of prime roast beef and porterhouse steaks, anything that will bring about utilization of the parts now neglected will mean a stable market for all parts of the farmer's meat animal.

The price received by the farmer will not be decreased by this campaign, but the effect on retail prices to the consumer, by the elimination of waste, shrinkage and uneven demand, is clearly indicated in the statement made by the Bureau of Markets quoted above. And to make it doubly sure that there will be no profiteering among retail meat dealers to upset the economy of the plan, the Department has issued drastic instructions to all fair price commissioners and United States attorneys to insure that prices are not boosted to use the campaign as a plan for increasing profits.

TOO MUCH CARELESSNESS.

Commenting on several errors pointed out by Justice Key in the Texas statute to limit campaign expenses of candidates and candidates' friends in their behalf, the Dallas Journal very justly says:

It is a pity that the writing of important laws should be entrusted to persons who either do not understand the English language or else do not keep up with the bills to see that they are kept free from error. Blunders such as Judge Key has pointed out are not excusable. None such is made in legislation sought by the big corporations, for those concerns employ men who know how and who take nothing for granted. Maybe the state could get the loan of some of these men, just for the asking.

Justice Key pointed to the omission of a very important "not" between "shall" and "exceed" in the bill; to the discrepancy between the limitation of expenditures to "ten dollars" in words and "1000" in figures, and to the further fact that the statute reads that any person violating its provisions "should" be punished, when obviously the wording should have been "shall." Errors in enrollment of bills in the legislature have cost the state of Texas more than one special session and much annoyance; dozens of other statutes have been invalidated by the general sloppiness of the wording which could mean one or two of several different things. The legislature ought to hire a good copy-holder and a proof-reader or two who would see that the wording of bills as finally passed conformed to the wording of bills as they were intended by their authors and supporters.

The Dallas Journal thinks it can hardly be doubted that the Wichita Falls proposal will be approved by the people, for the reason that an inter-

ban line to Wichita Falls and intermediate towns is needed much more than are the lines to Terrell and Greenville. Dallas now has very good and fairly frequent service by steam railroads to Terrell and Greenville, whereas the service to Denton, Wichita Falls and other towns and cities to the northwest is neither good nor frequent, and we are therefore handicapped in dealing with that territory. Wichita Falls folks will be interested in ascertaining just what Dallas citizens think of the necessity of a direct interurban connection with this thriving city, which, with many interests in and much friendliness for Dallas, is separated from it by very much greater distance than the 130-mile airline would be, not to mention the inconvenience of having only one round-about through-line connection. Dallas citizens are going to vote on their preference—two lines of thirty miles each to two of the three towns of Denton, Greenville or Terrell, or the one-line northwest to Wichita Falls via Denton that will open up an entirely new trade territory to both the terminals of the proposed road.

Not even the Federal Reserve bank system, which has been boasted by bankers and economic experts generally as the greatest financial system in the world for the prevention of financial power getting into centralized influences, is sacred from Mr. Bailey's attack. "You believe in Wilson," he told his hearers at Garland the other day. "I don't. I don't even believe in his currency bill, although there are some good things about it." He admitted that one of these good things was that it renders a panic impossible, but he hated to admit that, for he added a proviso, "as long as the banks don't want a panic." In its seven years the Wilson administration has been responsible for many things. Winning the war was one, the Federal Reserve system and the Farm Loan banks were some of those to which ordinary democrats have pointed with pride. In all that seven years the Wilson administration has done just one thing for which it has received the public approval of our former junior senator—when he vetoed the Volstead prohibition enforcement bill! Do the democrats of Texas believe that is the only commendable thing the democratic administration has achieved?

TIMES' ECHOES

Whose Liberty. Bird S. Coler, erstwhile comptroller of the city of New York, and now commissioner of charities, has written a book, "Two years ago," he said in an address the other day, "I should have been against prohibition, but the recent results have been remarkable. The number of alcoholics received at Bellevue hospital has diminished to seven or eight a week, and the alcoholic wards are being abolished. The demands for ambulance calls in the Harlem district, where stabbings and murders were formerly so frequent, have fallen off one third. There are far fewer children committed to institutions, while the decrease in social disease cases is phenomenal."—Wichita Falls Times.

A people out of jail, out of hospital, out of the poor-house, out of orphanages, out of asylums, out of eleemosynary institutions various and sundry, certainly have more personal liberty than those immured in such places. But it is not easy to make a man believe it, or rather it is difficult to get such a man through the brain of an individual whose idea of personal liberty is his right to fill himself to the sunwheels with firewater and whoop like an Indian. The Texas representative of a jail-building company told the State Press recently that his business in this state had declined 60 per cent since prohibition went into effect. How much personal liberty has a prisoner? How much personal liberty has an orphan? Everybody knows the answer, yet there are thousands of men in Texas—some say a majority—who are dissatisfied with the Eighteenth amendment because it interferes with what they are pleased to call personal liberty. And if they can bring back personal liberty, which is the polite name for bonified booze, they mean to do it. They have got their triggers set. Everybody in Texas knows the triggers, fortunately, and the chance is that only a few will blunder into the trap.—Dallas News.

If you are a working man or woman, at the first sign of a cold, go home at once, if possible, if not, get quitting time and go right to bed and have your dinner in bed, lie down and read and put your light out at least an hour earlier than usual. If you can stay in bed for a day so much the better. That rests you and keeps you from draughts. Don't Get Chilled. Second—keep warm. It's a good thing to keep warm, but if you have that shivery feeling down your back, don't let yourself get the slightest bit cool. Third—use a good gargle and nose spray. Use a good gargle and nose spray and use them the second you feel the symptom of a cold, even if you have to get up in the night, to do it. Have a glass of bicarbonate of soda beside you, mixed in the proportion of a quarter of a spoonful of soda to a third of a glass of water, and take a third of a glass every 15 minutes for an hour, then one dose more an hour after (this was recommended by a doctor). Above All Things Be Prompt. Take a cathartic. If you think there is the slightest need. Take your favorite pills if you want to (I don't). Do everything promptly. In nothing is time so much the essence of the contract as in fighting a cold. Of course I'm not a doctor and perhaps I shall be reproved by the medical profession. You needn't take it too seriously if you don't want to, but these are my methods for simultaneous attack. And whether they are professional or not, they have one great merit—they work.




