GREAT BRITAIN WITHHOLDS REPLY

EIGHT THOUSAND FIREMEN AND ENGINEERS IN CHICAGO DISTRICT DEFY UNION AND VOTE TO STRIKE

CHICAGO, April 7.—Representatives of 8,500 members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers employed in the Chicago switching districts today had defied their union officials and voted to join the unauthorized switchmen's strike called nearly a week ago.

Freight train through the expansive Chicago district already was restricted seriously and strike leaders and railroad officials were agreed that if the force of strikers was augmented such traffic would be brought virtually to a standstill.

While the vote of the firemen and engine men came in the face of predictions of grand officers of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and the Switchmen's Union of North America, with which the striking switchmen are affiliated, that by Saturday the strike would be broken by loyal union men rushed here from other cities.

Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, said: "The strike of Chicago switchmen is illegal and will be so considered by the engineers' brotherhood."

K. M. A. COMPANY SELLS 50 ACRES AT \$10,000 AN ACRE

Sale of 50 acres out of the 500-acre holdings of the Kemp-Munger-Allen Oil Company to a syndicate composed of W. D. Cline, W. W. Silk, John P. O'Connell, M. D. Rowe, W. C. Norton and A. W. Culp for a consideration of \$10,000 per acre, half cash and half to be paid from the oil produced, was announced Tuesday afternoon by J. A. Kemp, president of the company. The 50 acres has an offset location to the Keen-Wolf, No. 1 Mungers, and runs north in a narrow strip, several other deals of this nature are still pending, it is reported.

GEN. DENIKINE IS FUGITIVE ON BRITISH SHIP

Seeks Safety Following Assassination of His Former Chief of Staff

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 6.—General Denikine, former commander of anti-bolshevik forces in Southern Russia, arrived here last night and is today a fugitive on board a British warship. Immediately after he landed he went to the Russian embassy with General Romanovsky, his former chief of staff, and was while he was there that the latter was assassinated. General Denikine is believed to be in danger because of the high feeling that prevails among Russian officers here, and went on board the warship under a guard of British soldiers.

General Romanovsky's murderer has not been apprehended and there is little chance he will be caught as attaches at the Russian embassy say, so far as they can determine, nobody saw the tragedy.

General Romanovsky was unpopular with the officers and soldiers, and many charges were made against him, but General Denikine refused to dismiss him, thus handicapping the movement, in the opinion of many Russians. Officials at the Russian embassy are displeased at Denikine's acceptance of a British guard while there, being technically at the time on Russian soil. General Wrangel, who was elected to succeed General Denikine as commander of the South Russian forces in Crimea, has assumed his duties.

MAKE PROGRESS IN EFFORT TO SETTLE LABOR DIFFICULTY

Amicable adjustment of labor difficulties in Wichita Falls depends on the attitude of the plumbers' local to the wage scales proposed at recent labor conferences representing building contractors, owners and representatives of the various building crafts according to statements issued by members of the conference following the Tuesday afternoon session. Final consideration from which it is hoped that an understanding on the part of all interested will be reached, is scheduled to take place at the Labor Temple at 4:30 Thursday afternoon.

Establishment of a wage scale and labor board composed of representatives and contractors, who will endeavor to fix a satisfactory wage scale, and secure contracts with the various crafts, and of a building trades department of the central labor council, composed of representatives of each building craft, with power to adjust all disputes arising under these contracts are embodied in the proposals adopted by the conference as a basis of settlement of the labor situation.

Charges of various forms of profiteering, including that of rents, again figured in the discussions being brought forward by representatives of the various interests, with J. A. Kemp pledging the use of his personal influence with the Chamber of Commerce to bring about an energetic campaign against all forms of profiteering in the city.

W. Newton Mear was chairman of the conference, and Hubert Harrison, secretary. Representatives of business men and contractors included: J. A. Kemp, E. Stanley Field, T. B. Noble, F. G. Swanson, John Hoffman, H. H. Bray, E. B. Lawson, C. H. Reid and J. L. Westlake. The labor representatives included Jack Prather, local organizer for the American Federation of Labor; Pat Malilburton, for the iron workers; Len Dalton for the plasterers; Harry Awker for the bricklayers; H. Whitworth for the electricians; E. R. Felts for the plumbers; W. B. Meekley and L. J. Good, for the carpenters; Louis Taylor for the painters and Elmer Rahe and J. W. Pugh for the day laborers.

The proposals adopted by the conference on motion of Mr. Field and second of Mr. Awker, read as follows:

1. In a sincere effort to bring about a condition in this city which will minimize strikes and other labor trouble, this committee proposes the establishment of a wage scale and labor board composed of representatives of labor and of contractors. Also they favor the establishment of a contract between the various labor locals and the contractors that may serve as a guide to the work of this board.

2. A building trades department of the Central Labor Council to be organized, composed of representatives of each building craft, and with plenary power to adjudicate all disputes arising under the above contract.

3. It is the sense of this committee that a necessary status is for all crafts to be at work at the scale prevailing before strike began and to agree to abide by the findings of this wage and labor board to be appointed.

Night News Briefs

TULSA, OKLA.—Judge T. D. Evans, republican, was elected mayor over Mayor C. H. Hubbard, democrat. Mrs. Frank Zama, republican, was elected city auditor.

BARSTOW COUNTRY REDEEMED FROM THE SCOURGE OF DROUGHT

BARSTOW, April 7.—Imagine, if you will, 3,333 acres in alfalfa and 6,666 acres in cotton in an arid region irrigated from a privately owned irrigation system. This gives you a means to understand how the Barstow country is being redeemed from the scourge of drought and made the peer of the Garden of Eden.

Four or five cuttings of alfalfa are made annually. Each acre averages from three-fourths to one and one-half tons a cutting. Cotton makes from one-half to two and one-half bales per acre. J. H. Miller, a local resident, made 21 bales last year on nine acres. J. W. E. Babham, another resident, paid income tax on 500 hives of bees, which feed on the alfalfa, flowers and trees of this luxuriant oasis of irrigation.

Barstow has splendid church edifices representing the Baptist, the Methodist, the Christian, the Presbyterian and the Catholic sects. The people are a fine class and refined. The city at present needs a domestic water supply. The water used in irrigating comes from the Pecora river and is alkali. A wonderful water source 10 miles away in the hills would be practicable and water would gravitate to the city without requiring pumping, giving at least 500 pounds pressure.

The Barstow valley will furnish an exhibit for the west Texas chamber of commerce display at the northern and state fairs this year. Barstow citizens are now intensely interested in the Red Bluff reservoir project just over the line in New Mexico, where water will be stored to irrigate 200,000 acres of Barstow valley lands. Barstow climate is equable, and therefore crops will be normal under irrigation the year around.

Though Barstow is not in what has been termed a cotton country, irrigation has usurped the place of drought and is alkali. A wonderful water source 10 miles away in the hills does unusually well, making a long fiber. The crop in 1919 brought Barstow farmers more than a million dollars.

FIRE DESTROYS THE LAUNDRY BUILDING EPILEPTIC COLONY

ABILENE, TEX., April 7.—Fire of undetermined origin last night destroyed the laundry building at the State Epileptic Colony, two miles south of Abilene. Most of the institution's linen was said to have been burned. Total loss was estimated at between \$30,000 and \$50,000.

SUNSHINE PIPELINE TO DOUBLE CAPACITY TO K. M. A. FIELD

"With Dallas agreeing to do her part, I think that there is little doubt that the Wichita Falls-Dallas Interurban will be built as quickly as possible—if Wichita Falls does its part, and I don't think there is any doubt on that score," said Frank Kell Wednesday morning in discussing the result in Tuesday's election in Dallas, where the people by a three to one vote decided to substitute the interurban to Wichita Falls in place of two shorter lines for which the street car system had contracted.

"Wichita Falls should benefit greatly through this project," Mr. Kell continued. "We are too far away from the large centers for injury to our retail trade territory through this line, on the one hand, and our retail trade territory should be considerably extended through the line, on the other."

Flowing by heads, whenever the tools are dropped in the hole, the Burk Cameron Oil Company's No. 1 Warner, block 833, reported on the sand on Monday, is today showing up for a good well, and interest in this new section of the Red River valley is growing rapidly. The well is only nine feet in the sand and will be drilled deeper, according to representatives of the company. Casing has been set to the top of the sand and all preparations are made for drilling deeper into the sand and completing. The Bowers Oil Co., which has one of the close-by tests, a short distance to the southeast, is drilling around 1500 feet in their No. 1 Ed Foster. This is a cable tool test, as is the Burk Cameron. The Burk Key Oil Co.'s No. 1 F. M. Myers, in block 831, is drilling with a rotary and is only around 800 feet down. Since the Burk Cameron strike these tests are being regarded with much interest.

GOVERNOR DECLINES TO MAKE A STATEMENT

TOPEKA, KAN., April 6.—Gov. Henry J. Allen declined to give out a statement this morning on the strike of 2,000 coal miners in southeastern Kansas yesterday afternoon. The governor said he understood it was only a one-day protest strike and that the court of industrial relations was in Pittsburg where a complete investigation would be made.

SAN ANGELO VOTES TO INCREASE SCHOOL TAX

SAN ANGELO, TEX., April 7.—Property tax papers of San Angelo yesterday voted 164 to 145 to increase the school tax from 60 to 75 cents on each \$100 valuation. It is estimated the increase will provide \$13,000 for the sole purpose of raising salaries of school teachers. In a separate election Mayor R. H. Henderson and all city commissioners were returned to office without opposition.

Few Beggars Left Result High Wages and Shorter Hours

WICHITA, April 7.—Where have all the beggars gone? There aren't any, any more hardly.

Work at high wages and easy hours is rapidly thinning the ranks of the beggar profession and turning the mendicants into industrious American citizens, according to observers here.

"Weary Willies" have also become incopulated with the work germ and their appearance at the bank door to "handle a handout" is now rare.

A survey of leading cities in the middle west and on the Pacific coast today showed that beggars, hobos and tramps quitting their professions to join in high salaried prosperity.

Two years ago Chicago had at least 2,000 beggars, according to Chief of Detectives Mooney here.

"Now I doubt if there were 100," he said. "They're going to work. There are still a few here, but a sight of one is a rare event."

Earning of beggars are twice what they were a few years ago, according to a blind mendicant on State street. People are making more money now and they give liberally, he said. "Of course it costs me twice as much to live."

This beggar said his earnings had between six and ten dollars a day.

"There are no letters in the I. W. W.," said Bill Haywood, head of that organization. "If there are any hobos left it's because they prefer idleness."

"Beating" on railroads is also decreasing, according to detectives. Hoboes, they said, are staying in the big cities because they can get jobs whenever they want them.

"Hinky Dink" (Michael Kennan), a famous patron of hoboes and whose schooners of beer were known to hoboes from coast to coast, is disgraced with the way things are going.

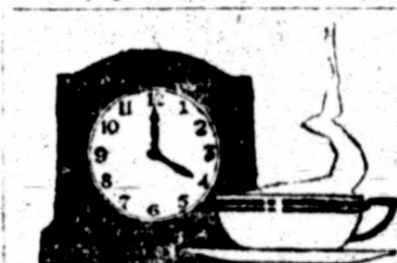

In the contest for delegates to the republican national convention those approved by Senator La Follette appeared to be leading though only a few hundred precincts have been heard from.

WOMEN FIGURE IN OKLAHOMA ELECTIONS

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., April 7.—The vote polled by the women of Tulsa was largely responsible for the victory of the republican ticket at yesterday's election, the feature of Oklahoma voting Tuesday.

The entire ticket, with the exception of Frank E. Duncan, was victorious. Judge T. D. Evans was elected mayor.

At Shawnee, Frank Urban defeated Mrs. G. C. Abernathy wife of a leading attorney, for chairman from the sixth ward. Dick Richards, democrat running mate, defeated Garland Hill by 200 votes.

By a majority of 79 votes J. D. Rivers was elected mayor of Holliston. Only 269 votes were cast.

The women's vote figured prominently again in the Wagoner election where Pete Reed, republican, was elected mayor, overturning normal democratic majorities.

H. H. Fellows, editor of the Henryetta Standard, was elected mayor of Henryetta by a vote of 891 to 661 for Ira Martin, the present incumbent.

The vote of the women was again largely responsible as Fellows waged his campaign on a moral clean-up issue.

BILLS INTRODUCED TO PUT SOCIALISTS OUT OF POLITICS

ALBANY, N. Y., April 7.—Two bills designed to carry out the recommendation of the assembly judiciary committee "for barring the socialist party of America from participation in politics in New York state" were introduced in the legislature today.

One measure is intended to require the attorney general of the state to begin action in the appellate division, third department, for a judicial determination of the question whether the "principles, doctrines or policies" of the socialist party, "if carried into effect would destroy, subvert or endanger the government of the state and nation."

The measure is designed to amend the public officers' law relating to qualifications of persons to hold office and to provide for their exclusion from public office and preventing the exercise of official duties.

WARM DEBATE OVER QUARANTINE PLAN

(Continued From Page One.)

already pledged to enact the legislation for indemnity.

The Texans formally presented a proposal that cotton be grown in the zones this year under strict inspection and quarantine with the pledge that meanwhile the legislature would be assembled and that in 1921 the growth of cotton in the infested area would be prohibited.

Representative Young, democrat, Texas, supporting the proposal, declared the federal government could not put into effect a general quarantine against Texas. This precipitated more debate.

"We appreciate the grounds upon which this proposal rests," Chairman Marlett said, "but it means a year of time lost, an opportunity given to the pest to spread all over the cotton territory."

An entomologist in the audience interrupted to say that "one storm could scatter it a hundred miles."

"There is a pest spot including one per cent of Texas," chairman Marlett continued, "that is a menace to the other ninety-nine per cent, and yet the state seems ready to stand as a unit in protecting it."

One of the representatives from Louisiana told the conference that the infection in the state would be met by "non-cotton areas," and that the growers aren't demanding a cent.

"We don't want to grow cotton in them, either," Henry D. Wilson, agricultural commissioner of Louisiana, said.

W. E. Hinds, Alabama state entomologist, presented a joint statement for the experts of Arkansas, Florida, Georgia and Mississippi, in which he said all other cotton states would be associated, declaring the Texas proposal would make extermination of the pest impossible. Three years of non-cotton growing in the infested area was recommended.

Chairman Marlett announced after the hearings concluded that the board would reach a decision within the next day or two as to whether to impose the quarantine against the whole state of Texas or accept the alternative proposals made by Governor Hobby, and the other Texas representatives.

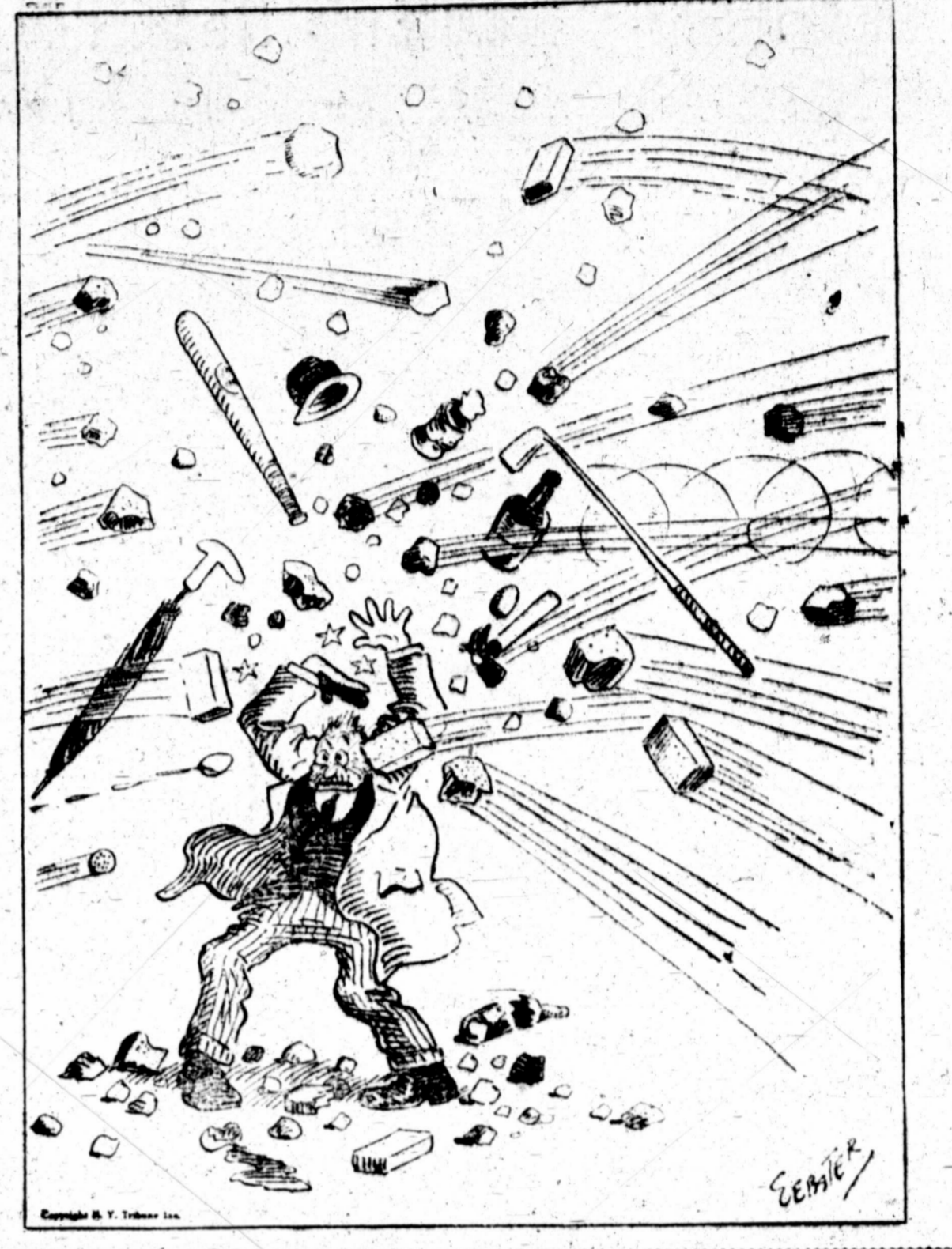

VERNON BUDGET

BIG COMPANIES ARE BUSY IN WILBARGER; LEASING IS ACTIVE

SIGLER WILDCAT IS STILL PERFORMING FOR LARGE CROWDS

By A. C. McCONNELL.

VERNON, TEX., April 7.—The Texas company is exploiting for oil on the W. T. Waggoner ranch; W. G. Burton et al. have about 75,000 acres under lease from A. B. Wharton; the Sigler Oil company has 8,000 acres in the Wharton ranch, and the Home Oil Refining company has appropriated \$400,000 to thoroughly develop their 258,000 acres located in the A. B. Wharton, Guy and Paul Waggoner ranches, besides many independent companies are preparing to exploit this field. This land is located south and southeast of Vernon.

Petroleum wireacres are watching development work of these companies with great interest, especially the Sigler well. If the Wilbarger county structure pans out according to their anticipations, they will have opened and controlled one of the largest oil pools yet discovered in Texas. These companies are hopeful of picking up the Piper and Burk Burnett sands, which are said to be prominent in many places over the county especially around the Sigler well, and only waits the bite of the bit to prove their worth, and all operators feel these sands are worth developing and are backing their judgment with their money. The general feeling throughout the county is one of expectation of developments of importance in any number of directions before the year has passed.

The Sinclair Consolidated Oil and Gas company has secured acreage throughout Wilbarger county. The leases are checkerboarded and are protected should any of the deep tests now going down prove up. They leased against practically every drilling well in the county.

E. M. Foster, W. J. and A. H. Shelton of Electra have 50 teams hauling drilling material to the Red ranch, located in block 3 near the Sigler casher, where they will inaugurate a drilling campaign. They have 5,000 acres in this area. The machinery is being hauled from Burk Burnett to the location, and the Monk Drilling company will have charge of the drilling. Four wells will be drilled.

Development of the Tee-Pee well in Block 13, which blew in a couple of weeks ago, sending oil, mud and slush over the derrick, are being watched with considerable interest, as it will no doubt indicate an extension of about five miles of the Piper field, to the northwest. The casing is being set at the well and will be drilled in by a star. An unusually strong gas showing was made by the well, and a few days ago while setting casing fire ignited from the gas escaping from the mouth of the hole. This well has a good gas and oil showing at 1,740 feet and will no doubt open a distinct pool from the Piper field.

A valuable extension of the Piper field is also promised by the Moon-shine Hill test in subdivision 76 of the Waggoner colony lands. At present the well is shut down at a depth of 1780 feet, repairing machinery. This well created considerable attention a short time ago by reports that they had encountered a good showing. Litigation set up and the test abandoned, but now all obstacles have been removed and the test will be given a thorough trial. Drilling was started at this well by P. P. Langford et al. of Wichita Falls, and has been sold twice since drilling commenced.

The railroad yards at Vernon are crowded with cars loaded with heavy rig and derrick timbers to be hauled to the Sigler section, where an intensified drilling campaign will be inaugurated.

VERNON, TEX., April 7.—The wildcat of Lloyd Sigler still gives performance to crowds assembled about the well as audiences. The show is pleasing and comes up to expectations of those who journeyed out to see the well in action. On several occasions the greasy fluid spouted from the mouth of the hole, flowing to the second tier of the derrick, spraying visitors with Wilbarger liquid gold. It was an unexpected scene when the drillers "opened her up" to try her out. Visitors had to wade in oil, as the high winds have sprayed the ground with oil. The bearcat performed up to the expectations of all. The production is still unsteady, as officials refuse to divulge anything.

Interest is still centered about the outcome of the Webb-Magness well, seven miles northeast of Vernon in the forks of the Red and Pease rivers. It is reported that the bit is resting on an oil sand, but officials of the well absolutely refuse to "give out" anything. They say they "think" they have a small well. The well is roped off and a field man is sleeping with "one eye open" in order that no one may be permitted to cross the confines of the company's property. The well is down about 2,030 feet. All acreage surrounding the test has been withdrawn from the market, with heavy calls for same. The stock is skyrocketing with much action.

DECATUR PLANS FOR ERA OF DEVELOPMENT DURING COMING YEAR

DECATUR, TEX., April 7.—Decatur, with a population of 2,000, wants a jam up hotel, in which it is willing to take from \$10,000 to \$12,000 stock. Decatur expects to become the mecca for oil operators in a few months, as evidence of oil is now convincing.

The Young Men's Business League with its 150 members is now working on a plan to get a sewer system in

which it offers to the lucky promoter control of the waterworks in connection therewith. It is working on the removal of the Western Union Telegraph office from the station, half a mile east from the business section, to an uptown building. The organization reports the city in the throes of a sidewalk building campaign. So rushing is the business that the secretary says another concrete man could find steady work filling new orders.

Around Decatur is the Pennsylvania formation. The topography of the section holds forth promises of oil which every geologist who has inspected it says resembles well that about the proven fields.

So far there has never been a completion of a deep test well in the territory. Much interest is now being evinced in the deep tests which are being put down. Wise county oil operators declare they will not be surprised to announce to the world the bringing in of an immense gusher shortly. There is not an abandoned well above sea level. For a radius of 10 miles there is a gradual drop of from 100 to 400 feet, causing oil men to believe that Decatur is situated upon the top of a large oil dome.

Contract has been let for a \$100,000 oil refinery. Material for it is expected to arrive shortly, when construction will begin.

Two additions to the town were put on the market this year and practically every lot in each was readily sold. A second flour mill is now being undertaken. It will be ready for the

next crop. A steam laundry has been secured and a mattress factory is a new enterprise just arranged for. Many new residences and cottages are being erected in all parts of town.

The Young Men's Business League, which was recently rejuvenated with a total membership of 150 is working effectively for the upbuilding of the city. It is now advocating increased property valuation rendition for increasing school funds. Greatly increased postoffice receipts, bank deposits and general augmentation of business reflect the prosperity of farm-

ers and business men of Decatur and Wise county.

FEWER ACCIDENTS AT GRADE CROSSINGS DURING PAST YEAR

AUSTIN, TEX., April 7.—Railroad grade crossing accidents in Texas during 1919 were fewer and accompanied by fewer casualties than those of either of the preceding two years, according to statistics compiled by the state highway department.

Three reasons for the decrease are ascribed by C. S. Wickline, who compiled the report. First, the excessive rainfall of the year curtailed tourist travel by keeping roads in bad condition. Second, fewer drivers were intoxicated because prohibition had been affected. Third, people became more cautious because of the intensive "safety first" educational campaigns.

There are probably not less than 5,000 grade crossings upon the main highways of the state, Mr. Wickline estimated, and within the last two years about 100 grade crossings have been eliminated by re-location of highways and by viaducts and cut-overs. The department is continuing its efforts to abolish grade crossings and provide accommodations to those which cannot be eliminated that will allow a clear vision of the track.

TWO THOUSAND COMMUNISTS IN OCCUPIED AREA

Cross the Rhine Into the British Zone and are Interned—More are Expected

COBLENZ, April 7.—Two thousand communists have crossed the Rhine into the British zone of occupation and have been interned. Twelve hundred more are expected to arrive today.

Flight of large numbers of the communists into occupied territory is considered an indication that the revolt in the Ruhr region is near an end. Bochum was still in control of communists late yesterday and they expected a big fight there. The situation in the Ruhr valley is bad and living conditions are almost unbearable. A railroad strike at Essen is reported and no trains are running.

The reaction locally to the movement of French troops into German cities east of the Rhine has not disturbed the population, which understands the policy governing the American military command. Firm conviction is expressed by Germans that the action of the French will solidify more than ever sentiment all over Germany against the allies.

Gelsenkirchen, north of here, and Dortmund and Schwerte, to the east, were captured today and occupied by advancing government troops.

SAYS SOLIDARITY MUST REPLACE THE MONROE DOCTRINE

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Solidarity among Latin-American nations must replace the Monroe Doctrine as the protective policy of those countries, President Carranza of Mexico declared in an interview printed recently by La Prensa, of Buenos Aires, copies of which have just reached Washington.

The Mexican executive was quoted as declaring his unalterable opposition to the Monroe Doctrine, which he characterized as inefficient for the purpose of meeting the needs of weak nations.

It is not true, President Carranza said, that the United States government assisted the revolution which placed him in power, nor did he believe any official assistance had been given from Washington to the various factions below the border, but he expressed his conviction that "unscrupulous merchants" are sending arms and ammunition into Mexico.

The most serious problem now facing Mexico, he said, lay in the coming elections, but he promised the federal army will uphold the successive candidate against all incursions.

According to La Prensa, President Carranza is of the opinion that the Mexican government will annul vast concessions granted foreigners in Lower California.

CONTINUE STRIKE ON MEXICAN RAILROAD DESPITE ULTIMATUM

NOGALES, ARIZ., April 7.—The week-old strike of employees of the Southern Pacific railroad of Mexico continued today despite the ultimatum of Carlos Velasco, federal judge of Nogales, Sonora, that unless the strike was ended today federal troops would operate trains.

Backed by a \$35,000 contribution from other Mexican labor organizations, the railroad men apparently remained steadfast in their expressed determination to continue their strike for increased pay.

Sonora state officials oppose government intervention in the strike, which was called in contempt of a federal court injunction. Political leaders predicted serious trouble between the state and federal troops in the event of military operation of the trains. These leaders said they saw in the proposed movement a pretext for carrying out the rumored military occupation of the state despite assurance to the contrary received from President Carranza.

Arrivals from Mexico during the past week reported heavy troop mobilization in towns just beyond the Sonora state border.

COTTON MARKET.

NEW YORK, April 7.—The cotton market showed extreme nervousness and a good deal of irregularity during today's trading. The opening was 150 points higher on April but there is very little interest in this month and while May showed an opening advance of 13 points over last month's unchanged 13 points lower under realizing. Buyers of yesterday on the more serious view of the pink boll worm situation seemed inclined to sell in some instances reports that prohibition of planting of infested areas would not affect acreage of producing more than 25,000 bales per year and private reports of better weather. Realizing or liquidation became active shortly after the call with May closing off to 40 1/2 and October to 24 1/2, 12 to 35 points net lower.

Trade interests continued to buy on the early decline and the market turned firmer late in the morning on a rally in sterling exchange and covering in advance of the weekly weather report. This appeared to meet bullish expectations, particularly in its reference to the southeast and was followed by a sharp bid in price with May selling up to 40.50, a new high record while later deliveries recovered most of their early losses with October selling at 25.00 or within 20 points of last night's close.

The bullish weekly report of the weather bureau substantiated buying despite the afternoon and all months made new high records. May sold up to 41 cents or 20 points net higher. The cotton market closed very steady.

NEW ORLEANS Cotton NEW ORLEANS, April 7.—The price of cotton led to 38 points during the first hour of trading today under selling encouraged by better weather conditions over the belt, the failure of Liverpool to make a good response to the advances of the local market and the unfavorable international political news. May fell away to 35.50 and October to 24.10. The market held steady at the decline.

Weekly crop returns were considered highly unfavorable and they stimulated new buying of good character over the belt, caused more or less covering of short contracts with the result that prices made a strong recovery. In spite of the fact that the market rose on weather news, May and July were stronger than the later months. May raised to 36 1/2, October to 24 1/2. The market became stronger in the late session when an important new demand for long account was felt, much of it from outside sources, and the further strengthening of values which it caused frightened shorts into large covering operations. Toward the close the trading months were 24 to 47 points higher than the last prices of yesterday. May 37 1/2, October 24 1/2. The cotton market closed steady at net advance of 15 to 27 points.

ELECTRA, TEX., April 7.—The completion of the Burkhurst well nine miles northeast of Electra, has resulted in renewed activity in local oil circles and is bringing many people to Electra, looking up acreage owned by local people.
This well is an extension of three fields and connects a length between them. The Electra pool is extended a distance of four miles, the Burkhurst pool about six miles and the Hamming pool four miles.
Oil men who have compared the structures are at a loss to know to which pool this one should be credited, or whether it is in reality an extension to any one of them. In the first place the oil is dark in color, which would indicate that it is either a poorer grade than the others, or that it is in the edge of a new pool. So far no water has shown up in the sand and today the baffle was run a number of times and the bit was placed in the hole several times, slowly feeling its way a little deeper.
Five Feet in Sand.
At present the well is said to be five feet in the sand. The top of the sand is standing 154 feet in the hole and the hole is standing 15 feet in oil.
The Burkhurst-Cameron Oil company was organized in Vernon several months ago with a capitalization of \$75,000 on 60 acres. E. H. Pigg is president and general manager of the company and G. D. Green, chief engineer. L. Green, is secretary and treasurer.
The announcement that this is a good well has had an encouraging effect on business in Electra. The Electra field has been producing oil for nine years and celebrated its ninth anniversary April 1 of this year.
Simultaneous discovery of several other wells comes from the vicinity of Electra and one mile north of Fowler has struck a most promising sand at 1500 feet, a new one for this vicinity and a number of oil men have been out to see this well. Clark Wilcoxson recently had a good completion in this shallow field at 740 feet, which is good for about 50 barrels settled production.
There are a large number of star machines drilling up the shallow acreage and several new completions may be expected in the next few days.
Report New Sand.
A report was circulated last night that a sand had been encountered south of here on the Nance farm, which was looking good, but no definite news has been let out in this territory.
The Baker well, three miles southwest of here, just about 200 yards over the county line in Webster county has not as yet been tested, due to a misunderstanding between the contractor and the company, but the drillers on the well report that they have a rich sand which looks good for a 200-barrel well.
The Buffalo Texas Oil company is reworking their Douglas No. 1 on the pump and has completed it on their second well. This well came in a few days ago, opening up a couple of miles of new territory with an initial production of 100 barrels.

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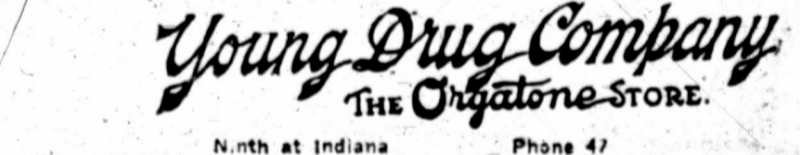

TWO AIRPLANES AND TRUCK TO ADVERTISE RESOURCES OF WEST

STAMFORD, April 7.—Two modern airplanes and a three-ton truck specially built for the purpose will leave Stamford June 1 for a trip through the east and southeast, visiting 250 cities and towns to advertise thoroughly by literature, exhibits and thirteen reels of movies the greatness of West Texas.

The West Texas chamber of commerce has entered into tentative contract with W. K. Whipple, general manager of the Panhandle Airplane Transportation company of Amarillo for the two planes. The aerial advertising project will require an expenditure of \$45,000, which is now being secured from towns and counties in the west, which wish to be advertised in the north, east and south. The planes will be conspicuously painted and carry a legend reading "West Texas Chamber of Commerce." It will carry many pounds of literature advertising town, city and county. A publishing man will accompany the planes.

Stops will be made in over 250 towns where "movies" of the west will be shown in theatres after an advance man has prepared the soil. The truck will be so built as to have two displays of exhibits from West Texas, including minerals, pecans and farm products. Literature will also be dispensed to the anxious and curious. The auto truck will be equipped with an electric dynamo so that the movies may be shown in the smaller towns. So far as known the airplane has never been used so extensively to put a large part of the nation on "the map" and focus attention to a great region. West Texas will be made known to all who can read or see. The thirteen reels of movies will be secured shortly. They will show the oil fields, irrigation, waving grain, beautiful mountains, tall skyscrapers and street scenes and the like. The project has been pronounced one of the most novel as well as effective ways to put the west before the people of the east and south, where emigration recently has largely increased because of the plethora of prosperity and money.

THREE SPEEDING CASES IN THE POLICE COURT

Three speeding cases composed Wednesday morning's session of corporation court. Three young men charged with violating the traffic regulations entered pleas of guilty and were assessed fines.
