SERVICE CAR DRIVER CHARGED WITH HAVING VIOLATED "DRY" LAW

Jim Lemmons, service car driver, was arrested Wednesday afternoon by Deputy United States Marshal Frank Morgan on a warrant issued by S. E. Backett, federal prohibition enforcement officer at El Paso. The warrant alleges that Lemmons entered into a conspiracy with two other men to violate the federal prohibition law. It is further alleged that Lemmons forwarded \$200 to his alleged confederates in El Paso directing them to buy and send to him by automobile one case of whiskey.

The warrant alleges that Lemmons alleged confederates bought of other wise secured a case of whiskey and sent it by automobile as far eastward as Pecos, Texas, where the occupants of the automobile were arrested and the illicit consignment of intoxicants seized.

A complaint alleging violation of the federal liquor laws has been filed in federal district court at El Paso before United States Commissioner A. J. W. Schmidt against Lemmons and his two confederates. The names of the alleged confederates were withheld by federal officials pending their arrest in El Paso.

Lemmons was arraigned Wednesday afternoon before United States Commissioner J. A. Lantz. His temporary bond was fixed at \$1,000, which the defendant made. Preliminary hearing is set for Friday forenoon.

Sipping Moonshine With the Real Kick Bluecoat is in Bad

This "bluecoat" had evidently been sipping moonshine that possessed a real "kick," according to a version of the story that leaked out Thursday at the city hall. According to one version of the tale, the policeman through some mysterious method secured some genuine liquor possessing an old-fashioned "kick" and shortly developed symptoms that rendered him ineffective for further service. The policeman went home where he immediately terrorized the block by dare threats of violence. Three sober policemen answered an emergency call and upon entering the "sober" policeman's home were welcomed with the point of a revolver. The policeman was setting in a corner of his sleeping quarters and drawing a "big kick" at the time the policemen who answered the call. At length the policeman was placed in the patrol and taken to the city hall. He was registered for the night and given quarters in the city hall. The moonshine soon began "kicking" with renewed vigor and the doctoring out of the drama witnesses the "kick" but not making a rope out of three bed blankets fastening the new-made rope to the bars of the jail and then spreading the bars, escaped into the darkness. Just how the policeman spread the bars of the city hall and where he secured his supply of moonshine is not made clear by rumors going the rounds Thursday at the city hall.

It is rumored that the policeman who played "leading man" in the above drama is the same character who began his official career a few weeks ago by arresting several bootleggers. He won a "city-wide" reputation as being the most effective prohibition officer in the department.

WAID IS HELD IN JAIL IN DEFAULT OF BOND

Ben W. Waid, one time prosperous Wichita Falls oil man and one of the organizers of the Volunteer Oil Company, is now joining in the Nashville, Tennessee, jail in default of a huge bond totaling more than \$100,000, according to information given out Thursday by federal officials here. Waid was arrested in Fort Worth charged with swindling and embezzlement in connection with illicit transactions while connected with the Volunteer Oil Company. A federal charge alleging fraudulent use of the mails was later filed against Waid in federal court for the Western district of Texas. Similar charges were later filed in federal court at Nashville and Waid was removed there regardless of his opposition to removal proceedings. He is being held in the county jail at Nashville, pending trial.

ITALIAN ARMY OFFICER VISITS THE OIL FIELDS

Court Enrico Luserna, an Italian captain of cavalry and assistant military attaché of the Royal Italian embassy at Washington, left today for Dallas, whence he will return to the capital. Luserna spent the past three days in this city, the guest of A. J. Taylor. He was brought here by William Fowler of the Texas Production company. He had purchased some holdings in the company here and came to look over the company's properties. While here he visited the oil fields and was amazed at the sights. Broken Glass Tells Of Active Argument With a "Roughneck" CONFERENCE ON LABOR SITUATION WITHDRAWS COMPROMISE OFFER; OPPOSE ANY RAISE FOR PLUMBERS

A roll of greenbacks almost sufficient to start a bank together with two "six shooters" are the evidence being held by county officials in the case of a suspect arrested in the oil region Wednesday on a charge of highway robbery. The suspect is a typical "roughneck" attired in his corduroys and wearing the regulation buttons of the oil belt. He looks more like a movie star than a high-jacker but county officials are wondering why the "roughneck" needed perfectly good guns and also where he got a roll of bank notes totaling several hundred dollars.

The "roughneck" is evidently a snappy sort of sport judging from an argument staged in the inner apartments of the district attorney's office Wednesday. The "roughneck" expressed strong opinions regarding certain methods followed by Wichita county officials. A loud crash resounded through the corridors of the county capital and broken glass covered the floor of the county attorney's office. The glass portion of the door leading from the county attorney's to the district attorney's office was minus the glass Thursday and the "roughneck" was safely housed in the county jail with more convinced opinions that the "present system" is all wrong.

DIFFERENCE IN A KICK AND A BUNT IS \$5.00, ACCORDING TO CITY JUDGE

The difference in a kick and a bunt is \$5, according to a ruling handed down Thursday by Corporation Judge Ogle. The proprietor of an Indiana avenue garage was arraigned in city court on a charge of striking a lad 16 years old. The boy testified that the auto mechanic had cursed him and had later thrown him out of his establishment, kicking him during the affray. The auto mechanic told Judge Ogle that he did not "kick" the youth but merely "bunted" him with his "five dollars and costs," replied Judge Ogle.

PROHIBIT USE OF ALLEYS FOR BUSINESS PURPOSES

The renting of alley space has been a paying enterprise in Wichita Falls during recent weeks but this clever scheme of local get-rich-quick is now on the taboo. Corporation Judge Ogle Thursday sounded the death knell to hamburger stand operators and other "alley merchants" by announcing that an alley is just as much the property of the city as are streets and are therefore exempt from occupation. Recent investigations have disclosed that enterprising tradesmen have erected soda stands, photograph establishments and various other "stands" in the alleys of the city. Under Judge Ogle's ruling these "squatters" will have to move on.

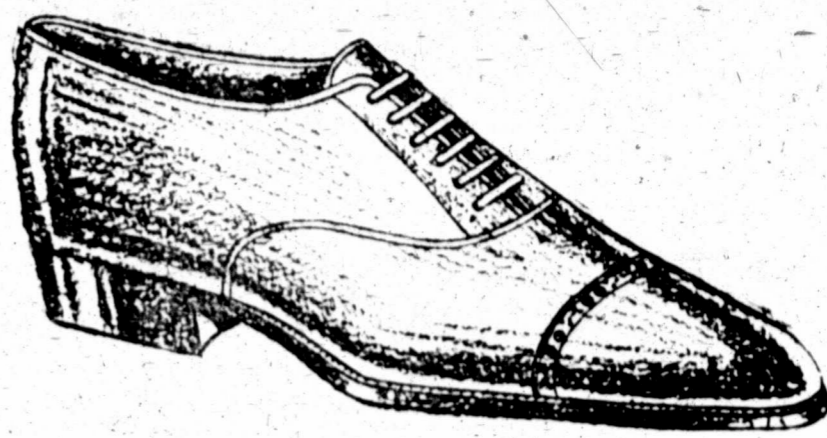

Frivolous Fashion. As to frivolous fashion, only a woman with puffy cheeks or a brain at tempt to stop on the heels of this Lady High Executioner. Fashion must have a laugh at the expense of feminine aims. How she must chuckle when she sights a follower of billowy proportions wading after down the street in one of those extremely abbreviated skirts so lately decreed; or a creature of hollow contour exposing the imperfections of her back to a surreptitiously snatching half-room; or a sallow complexion striving to appear fresh against a background of brass green; or a pudgy person trying to silhouette herself in a clinging satin sheath.

Fashion is responsible for many a comic vaudeville who imagines she is made-up to be irresistible, whereas she is merely made to appear ridiculous.

Now, then, when fashion comes to add to your wardrobe, be sure her offering is becoming before you accept her judgment. Nine women out of a possible ten dress to please the eye of some man or of men. 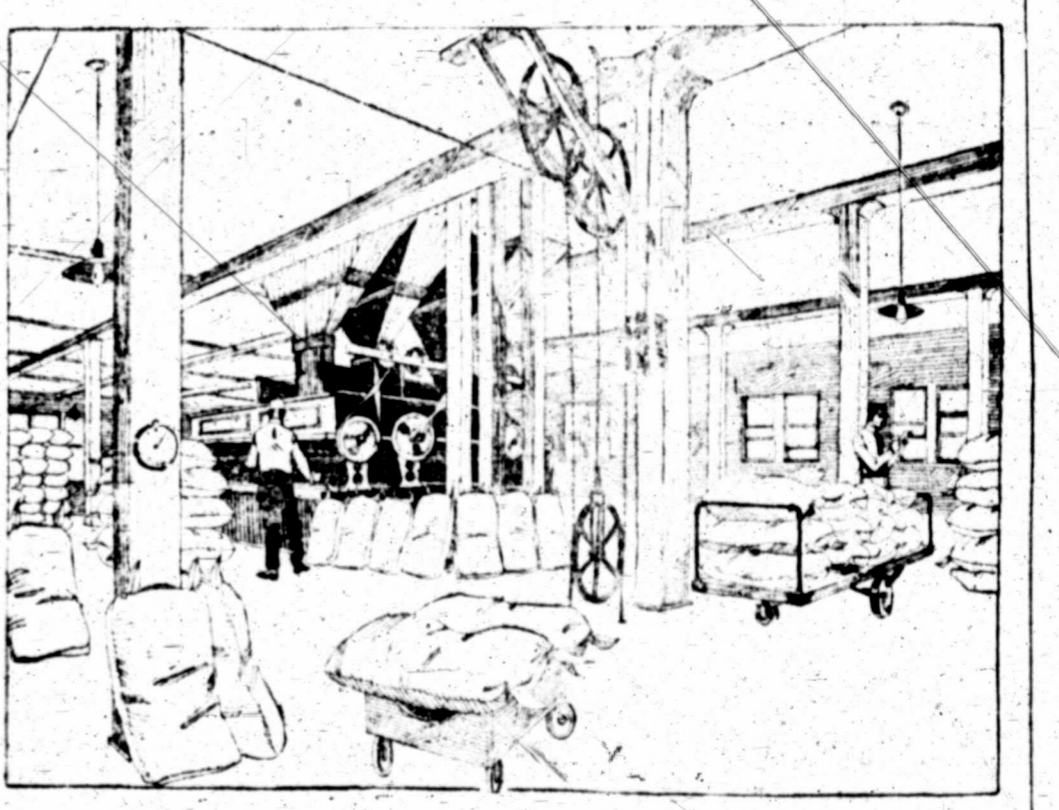

VERNON, TEX., April 8.—Oil and gas in the Wilbarger county field is being actively sought in 74 different places, according to a revised list recently compiled. These locations are being put down in all directions, a certain amount of derricks being observed at this time.

Wilbarger now ranks fifth in Texas in drilling operations, and is in the lime-light among operators and investors the country over, and Wilbarger acreage is playing an important part in the eyes of the investor. There is a quickening of activity in this section, especially in the Wilbarger and Hardeman counties, and the coming of spring should witness the outcome of several tests that have importance in the development of the field.

Drilling is very active in Wilbarger territory, and there are numerous factors, including the entrance of new independent operators, that will assist the campaign now being industriously conducted by many companies that give promise of a thorough test of the field.

Wilbarger has become a prodigious more quickly than any other county in the state. Thirty or more wells are being drilled, and it is daily yielding to the drill more wealth to their owners. Among the most prominent wells are the King, Shiner and Waterman, which are being operated by the Marquette and the Texas companies. These wells are located in Wilbarger county and are from these the water wells is being tapped into the Electric flow.

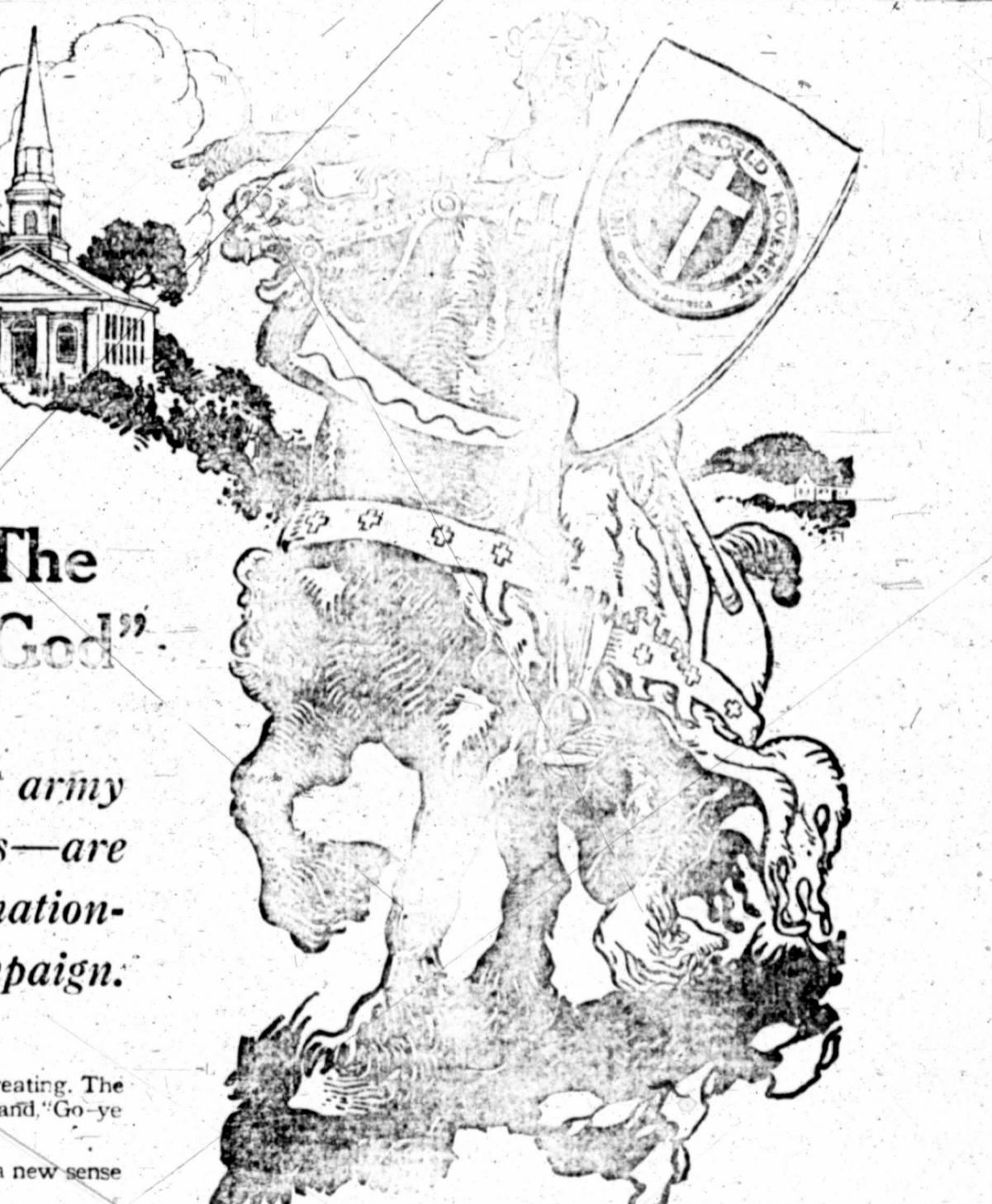

HIRAM JOHNSON AND WOOD ENTER MONTH'S DRIVE

Leading Republican Candidates Start on Campaign Through Several States

By **H. ROLAND D. JACOBS**
(United Press Staff Correspondent)

NEW YORK, April 8.—Senator Hiram Johnson and Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, leading in the race for the republican presidential nomination on the basis of delegates instructed today are swinging into drives that will carry them well into next month.

Johnson's itinerary already provides for speeches in New Jersey, Nebraska, Indiana, Montana, Oregon and possibly California.

Wood will speak in the following states: Illinois, Massachusetts, Delaware, Pennsylvania, New York, Indiana and Vermont.

Johnson will complete his New Jersey campaign Friday and will leave immediately for Nebraska, where he will remain five or six days.

From there he will go either to Indiana or Montana. At his headquarters would make two or three speeches in each state. After his tour of Oregon, his eastern managers said he might drop into California to visit his son in San Francisco and make one or two informal speeches there.

Fight in California.
The fight in the California primaries, which will be held May 4, is between Johnson and Herbert Hoover. This is the one state where Hoover's name remains on the republican ballot. The senator's friends say he is so confident of receiving the endorsement of his native state that he will make no extensive speaking campaign there.

Wood will end his invasion of Illinois with a speech in Chicago Saturday night. He will speak in Pittsfield, Mass., Monday, Boston, April 14, Wilmington, Del., April 15, Philadelphia and Newark, April 16, three times in New York city April 17 and will leave the following day for Ohio, where he will remain until April 21. After an incursion into Indiana he will go to Pittsburgh for a speech April 27. Hence he will again return to Indiana. On May 26, he will speak before the convention of the republicans at Burlington.

FIVE BUILDINGS AT LOVE FIELD BURN; LOSS IS MILLION

DALLAS, April 8.—Five main buildings of the aviation repair depot at Love Field burned early today with loss estimated at \$1,000,000.

The fire originated among the highly combustible wings of the wrecked German Fokker planes and only the perfect fire drill of the enlisted men prevented heavier losses, it was said. Fire drill had been held only yesterday afternoon.

The million dollar estimate of loss is considered conservative by Major J. B. Netherwood, commanding officer, said today. Many Liberty motors, spare parts and wrecked planes were lost in the destruction of the storage warehouse and on the shipping platform.

The fire was discovered by a guard at 3:50 and by the time the men could be called out the flames had enveloped the storage warehouse, the shipping docks and the boiler house. The "dope house" where wings received their final treatment, was consumed despite a system of sprinklers.

Three hundred civilians in addition to the enlisted detachment were employed at the depot.

No one was injured, though several men were exhausted in fighting the fire.

SEEK REMOVAL OF NEGRO TO ARKANSAS TO ANSWER CHARGE

KANSAS CITY, April 8.—The application of the United States district attorney of the Kansas district, for a writ of removal for Robert Hill, negro, wanted in the eastern Arkansas federal district for impersonating an officer, was on the docket for hearing before Judge John C. Pollock in the Kansas City, Kans., federal court today.

Hill was arrested at Topeka by the federal officers after Governor Allen of Kansas had refused to honor a writ of extradition from Arkansas, issued on a state warrant charging him with complicity in inciting a race riot at Helena, Ark., several months ago. He has been in jail in Topeka several weeks.

According to the information on which the federal warrant was issued, Hill was an organizer for the Farmers' Household and Progressive Union, an organization of negroes said to have been responsible for the riot, in which several persons were killed. Federal officials of the eastern Arkansas district charge that, in his activity in the organization, Hill represented himself to be a federal officer. The federal court has been petitioned by his attorneys for a writ of habeas corpus.

ALLEGED CORNER IN CORN SUBJECT FOR AN INVESTIGATION

CHICAGO, April 8.—An alleged corner in May corn will be the subject of a federal grand jury investigation, according to statements at the office of United States District Attorney Charles F. Clyne here Wednesday.

The jury, which was sworn in yesterday, was to be presented with documentary evidence regarding dealing of traders who have been under surveillance of federal agents. In addition to examining the books of grain men, many members of the Chicago Board of Trade are expected to be called to testify.

According to officials, several men whose dealings are being given close scrutiny, masqueraded as traders in the grain pit with a view to manipulating prices.

Clyne has been conducting a personal investigation for the last two weeks. The investigation was started at the request of several Chicago grain men who claimed the market was being manipulated by speculators.

FRANKFORT.—Colored French troops turned a machine gun into a crowd, killing two persons and injuring 5.

LITTLE ROCK.—The Missouri Pacific passenger station, the largest in the state and costing \$750,000, was destroyed by fire.

DETROIT.—Ritchie Mitchell of Milwaukee, and Mel Coogan of Brooklyn, boxed 19 rounds to a draw.

ST. LOUIS, MO., April 8.—Three men and a woman were injured in a collision between an automobile and a street car here early today.

Bunch's injuries were not thought serious. The accident occurred at an intersection and the injured were riding in the automobile.

GREEK TROOPS HAVE BEEN AUTHORIZED TO MAKE AN ADVANCE

ATHENS, April 8.—Greek troops have been authorized by the supreme military council of the allies to advance in Asia Minor in anticipation of an eventual attack by Mustafa Kemal. They have occupied a strategic position east of the sector they have held around Smyrna, according to a dispatch to the newspaper Ethnos.

ABSINTHE HAS RECENTLY REAPPEARED IN PARIS

PARIS, April 8.—Absinthe, forbidden during the war, has recently been creeping back into the stocks of some cafes in this city and its consumption has assumed proportions sufficient to attract the attention of the police. Government officials have developed a test which police officers can apply on the spot and if a drink shows the presence of absinthe all stocks of the beverage are confiscated and the vendor is arrested.

FORECAST WINTER WHEAT CROP WILL BE 483,617,000 BU.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Production of winter wheat this year was forecast today at 483,617,000 bushels by the department of agriculture which based its estimate on the acreage planted last December allowing for average acreage abandonment and assuming average influences until harvest.

Condition of winter wheat April 1 was 75.5 and rye 86.8 per cent of normal.

Winter wheat production last year was 531,636,000 bushels and the previous year 665,099,000. Rye production last year was 88,478,000 bushels and the previous year 91,941,000 bushels.

Condition of winter wheat a year ago was 92.8 per cent of a normal, two years ago 78.6 and the April 1 average for the ten years was 84.1 per cent.

Condition of rye a year ago was 90.6 per cent of a normal, two years ago 83.8 and the ten year average 89.0.

JAPANESE ELECTIONS TO BE OF GREAT IMPORTANCE

TOKIO, April 8.—Japan's general elections to be held in May will be of profound importance to the future of the nation, said Premier Hara today in addressing a meeting of leading members of the Seikwa, or progressive party.

"On the issue of the forthcoming general election depends the fate of the nation," he declared. "Universal suffrage, advocated by the opposition since at the destruction of social class distinctions and even proposes to temper with the conscription system which is the very basis of the country's defense, if speeches in the house serve as an index."
