The "outlaw" strike of railroad employes continued to spread today, although the situation was reported "easier" in Chicago, headquarters of the insurgent organizations.

Estimates placed the number of men out at not more than 25,600.



· A campaign, backed, do we believe its opening announcement, by more than 7,000 business concerns with an aggregate capital of more than \$1,300,-000,000, has been launched for a revision of the Federal taxation scheme, the purpose being to "reduce the excessive tax burden on business and other producing enterprises about \$1,000,000,000 by raising the same revenue by a Federal tax of one per cent on the privilege of holding land and natural resources valued (irrespective of improvements) at over \$10,000." "Land and natural resources" are taken to mean urban, agricultural, coal, oil, mineral and timberland, water powers, etc. Proponents of the plan, who are organized under the name "Committee of Manufacturers and Merchants on Federal Taxation' and who have incorporated as such, stress their charge that over fivesixths of the Federal revenues are collected from productive industry and less than one-sixth from the "privilege of land ownership," and assert that between fifty and sixty billions of wealth in vacant lands and idle natural resources are being permitted to escape the Federal tax collector altogether. Admitting there are all kinds of inequalities in taxation and taxation methods, many of them working serious injustices; yet it is also a fact that there is a very general and genuine class desire to shift the taxation on to other shoulders, and many of the inequalities and injustices in taxation have resulted from the successful efforts of the different organized efforts along that line. Equal taxation will come when the millentum comes and no sooner. But its arrival would be expedited, in one degree or another, if here were a whole lot more unselfish




