## RAIL STRIKE CONTINUES TO SPREAD

### FRANCE WILL NOT ACCEPT WORD OF GERMANY TO REMOVE TROOPS UNLESS GUARANTEES ARE GIVEN

#### RESPIRE IS TAKEN IN THE FIGHT OVER MILITARY TRAINING

WASHINGTON, April 10.—A respite was taken today by the senate in its fight over universal military training. Following adoption late yesterday of a plan for voluntary instead of compulsory training, the army reorganization bill went over until Monday with another spirited contest in prospect in an effort to strike out the voluntary system also. By agreement the senate session today was devoted to eulogies of the late Senator Martin, Virginia, former democratic leader.

#### REPORT PLANS FOR IMPROVING STATE'S SYSTEM EDUCATION

AUSTIN, April 10.—Plans for improving the state educational system were reported here today at a meeting of a portion of the general committee on education. Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction, reported on present educational conditions. Professor T. H. Shelby of Tyler, chairman of another sub-committee, reported on the present emergency in the educational system, and the third sub-committee headed by President R. E. Vinson of the University of Texas reported on constructive educational policies. A combined report will be prepared for the general committee and later be presented to the governor for recommendation to the legislature.

#### SAYS AMERICANS WOULD STARVE AND FREEZE IF IMMIGRATION IS STOPPED

NEW YORK, April 10.—Americans would starve and freeze to death if immigration were eliminated from our national life, Prof. M. A. Pupin, of Columbia university declared here last night in an address before the conference on foreign immigration, held under the auspices of the Inter-Racial council, to formulate an immigration program for submission to congress. "We could not do our work in 24 hours, or 24 years," the professor continued. "Sixty-one per cent of the workers in the bituminous coal mines are foreign-born; 71 per cent of the workers of the packing industry are foreign-born; 50 per cent of the railway maintenance workers and 72 per cent of the pottery workers are foreign-born."

#### GILMORE TO REPRESENT RAILROAD COMMISSION AT KANSAS CITY HEARING

AUSTIN, April 10.—Texas will be represented at a meeting of state railroad commissioners in Kansas City Monday, by C. E. Gilmore of the railroad commission. The conference will consider the proposed increase in express rates affecting the western and southwestern states. The express companies have made application to the I. C. C. for an advance of approximately 25 per cent in rates and after that body acts on the application, similar applications are to be filed with state commissions to apply on intrastate rates, Commissioner Gilmore said today.

#### CHICAGO POLICE SEARCH FOR MEANEST THIEVES

CHICAGO, April 10.—Chicago police today were searching for the meanest thieves in the city. 128,000 Bibles, valued at \$37,000, from the prison Bible society. The Bibles were carried away in a moving van.

HOUSTON, TEX., April 10.—Dr. W. R. Mercer, at one time a well known physician of Galveston, died here today at a patient at a tuberculosis hospital. Doctor Mercer has for some time spent a wandering life, sometimes as a messenger boy, at others, a farmer. He was 57 years old.

### SENATORS ARE PREPARED FOR BITTER FIGHT

Will Take Up Peace Resolution Passed by the House Early Next Week

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Senate leaders today were prepared for a long and bitter struggle over the peace resolution passed late yesterday by the house. Senator Lodge, chairman of the foreign relations committee, said he would call the committee to consider the measure as early next week as convenient. Senator Hitchcock, ranking democratic member, has left Washington and the date of Hitchcock's return at least is not definite. Lodge said he would wait until Knox gets back, but would not promise to hold off action until Hitchcock returned.

### PARTY OF ST. LOUIS CAPITALISTS ARRIVE HERE FRIDAY NIGHT

The party of St. Louis capitalists, stockholders in the United Drilling and Development Company, arrived Friday night in a special car. There were 16 in the party. Several of those who had been expected to make the trip were detained at the last moment. The party went to the fields to inspect their holdings Saturday morning. Instead of going by train as was originally intended, they motored out in order to give some of the men a better opportunity to see the entire field. The car will leave for St. Louis Sunday evening, although a number of the men will remain in Wichita Falls for a few days to close some important deals.

Funeral services for Mrs. John L. Waggoner, who died Thursday in Baltimore, will be held at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon from the family residence, 1500 Eleventh street. The body accompanied by the relatives who were in Baltimore for several weeks prior to Mrs. Waggoner's death, will arrive Sunday at 12 o'clock.

### TWO MORE VICTIMS OF AN EXPLOSION AT BEAUMONT ON FRIDAY

BEAUMONT, TEX., April 10.—Two more victims died early this morning as a result of an explosion under a receiving house at the Magnolia Petroleum company's plant here late yesterday afternoon, bringing the total number of deaths to five. Jules Monjeux, the sixth man injured, is reported in a serious condition and little hope is entertained for his recovery.

### Night News Briefs

WASHINGTON.—The Republican joint resolution declaring the state of war with Germany at end passed by the house and now goes to the senate.

WASHINGTON.—The federal horticultural board recommended a prohibition of cotton planting in nine counties of Texas and three parishes of Louisiana, as the only hopeful means of exterminating the pink boll worm in those districts. Governor Hobby of Texas has agreed to promulgate the non-cotton zones. It was stated, and has said he would call a special session of the legislature in May to amend the bill work act.

NEW YORK.—Joe Stecher, heavy-weight wrestling champion, defeated Fred Blakoff of Finland in 22 minutes 4 seconds.

MONROE, LA.—Every building in Eros, La., was damaged by a cyclone, which struck the town Thursday night, according to belated advices.

NEW YORK.—Herbert Hoover, in a telegram to Chandler M. Wood of the Massachusetts state democratic committee, again answered "No" to an inquiry as to whether he would accept the democratic nomination for president.

FORT WORTH.—Switchmen on all roads entering Fort Worth struck Friday night, according to railroad officials.

### ALLIES MUST TIGHTEN UP IF GERMANS OBEY

Such is French Statement After Considering the Reply of Great Britain

PARIS, April 10.—Recent events have demonstrated that the allied alliance must be tightened if Germany is to be held to the treaty of Versailles, the French foreign office said today after considering Great Britain's reply to the French note on occupation of the Rhine cities. "The life of the treaty swings in the balance," officials declared. They admitted that this close allied alliance of war times had diminished visibly.

The British threat to withdraw from the council of ambassadors if France persisted in following the policy of Marshal Foch in "going it alone" in enforcement of a French interpretation of the treaty was received with bitterness in many quarters.

The foreign office characterized discord at this time as "particularly unfortunate."

The entente needs to undergo a thorough house cleaning, officials said. It needs to formulate a positive policy towards Germany, they declared. France favored a new series of allied discussions to review relations with Germany and evolve a definite program to be followed in unison.

France, the foreign office indicated, will reply to the British communication asserting that she kept the allies thoroughly informed as to her intentions and was forced to act in occupying the Rhine cities to assure her own safety.

The French reply will reiterate France's request that the allies did not see fit to participate in the occupation and will renew France's desire for co-operation, it was said.

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### ESTIMATED MORE THAN 25,000 EMPLOYEES ARE IDLE AS RESULT; BREAK RANKS AT KANSAS CITY

The "outlaw" strike of railroad employees continued to spread today, although the situation was reported "easier" in Chicago, headquarters of the insurgent organizations.

The strike extended to Milwaukee, Indianapolis, Pittsburgh, Columbus, Ohio, and other cities.

In New York the striking yardmen and switchmen were joined by airmen. Suburban service was badly crippled, railroad officials admitted. The roads were making every effort to keep through trains running. Trains on the Hudson tube, connecting New Jersey and New York, also walked out.

Railroad managers and representatives of the railroad brotherhoods who were fighting the "rump" strike, declared they expected to be able to break the strike today. They announced that several crews which were first to strike in Chicago had returned to work.

Estimates placed the number of men but not more than 25,000. Thousands of men were thrown out of work by closing down of industrial plants unable to obtain fuel or raw material.

While the food supply in nearly all cities affected by the strike was reported sufficient to last until the latter part of next week, a serious shortage was predicted in case the strike is not broken by that time.

Food prices were raised in some sections in anticipation of a shortage. Dealers reported that practically the entire milk supply would be cut off tomorrow as a result of the fireman's strike.

KANSAS CITY, MO., April 10.—First break in the "rump" railroad strike here came today with return to work of the Rock Island switchmen and the Kansas City terminal engineers and firemen.

The strikers returned to work under the same wages and same working conditions as when they quit.

President Corbett of the Terminal, said return of the men to work indicated that the strike was breaking. He predicted switchmen on roads would soon be back at their jobs.

All passenger trains were moving without delay because of this, he added.

CHICAGO, April 10.—Despite assertions by railroad brotherhood officials of a break in the ranks of insurgent Chicago switchmen and engineers, unauthorized railroad strikes throughout the country assumed serious proportions today with reports indicating nearly 35,000 men were idle.

In the Chicago district, which brotherhood officials regarded as the key to the whole situation, improved conditions were reported, with some strikers returning to work, but from other sections of the country came reports of new walkouts and a strengthening of the insurgent forces.

Railroads across the country from eastern ports to the Pacific coast announced embargoes on freight shipments at various points and in industrial centers, although thousands of men had been thrown out of employment because of lack of fuel and raw materials.

Brotherhood officials declared reports that 35,000 switchmen and engineers were out throughout the country were exaggerated. They admitted that the seceding workers had gained strength outside of Chicago.

They asserted the strike would be broken in the Chicago district and said with that accomplished it was simply a case of allowing the strike fever to burn out in other sections.

A. F. Whitney, vice president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, announced that a group of striking switchmen on the Burlington road had returned to work in Chicago last night. A committee of strikers, from the Chicago and North-western, however, said, would vote today on ending the walkout here.

The strike is going to pieces right among the trainmen, Whitney said. Mr. Whitney, "When it breaks the men will go back in a hurry."

Report Crisis Passed.

A state police officer at railroad officials declared that all indications were that the crisis in the Chicago yard had passed.

Officials of the five big railroad brotherhoods, communicated to the West in Association of Railroad Workers, their intention to "support the integrity of our contracts," and asked further time to break the strike.

Insurgent leaders, however, claimed the strike was unbroken in Chicago, and declared that 95 per cent of the switchmen in that district were out. They said 25 chapters in the "rump" union, with 25,000 actual members, had been issued throughout the country.

C. E. Estey, who was alleged to have boasted of being an I. W. W., and urged sabotage at a meeting of the strikers, was expelled from the organization. He was arrested by detectives from State's Attorney Hoyne's office.

Livestock receipts at the stockyards were reported to increase yesterday with the delivery of 172 cars of livestock. Approximately 50,000 stockyards and packing house workers have been thrown out of work by stoppage of cattle shipments.

The coal supply in Chicago was reported to be dwindling with less than a week's supply on hand.

At Gary, Ind., 32 blast furnaces had been banked today, throwing 12,000 steel workers out of employment.

Steel mills in the Mahoning valley were preparing to close down today as the result of a strike at Youngstown and other points and company officials said 35,000 workers would be idle by tonight.

Toledo reported all but one of 23 roads tied up and a food and fuel shortage threatened. Freight movement west from Cleveland had ceased. It was reported, however, between 1,000 and 1,500 employees of nine roads there voted to organize a yardmen's union today.

Out at Columbus.

Switchmen and yardmen on the Norfolk and Western and Pennsylvania railroads walked out at Columbus last night and early today and four crews of the Baltimore and Ohio were reported to have gone on strike at Dayton.

Freight traffic in the St. Louis district remained at a standstill today, following the strike of 650 switchmen at midnight last night. Express companies refused to receive shipments on any basis and cars of switches are stacked upon many switches in the suburbs. Officials of the railroads estimated that late afternoon will see an improvement in the local situation, though switchmen deny this and say by tonight more than 1,000 will be on strike.
