

CARPENTERS AND PAINTERS SAY STRIKE OF PLUMBERS IS ILLEGAL; DELAY SETTLEMENT TO FRIDAY

With official notification from the two largest locals in the building trades, the carpenters and painters, that they will not support the plumbers' strike, which they term illegal and contrary to their international law, and that they will not come off a job on account of the employment of non-union plumbers, with unofficial notice from the bricklayers, another of the important building trades, that they plan similar action, and the statements of several other locals to the effect that they will go with the majority of the locals, the chamber of commerce and business men's labor conference, held Wednesday morning, have agreed to defer final action in regard to the local labor situation until Friday morning, allowing such locals as that of the electricians, who have not yet had a meeting, to go on a cord as to their attitude, and allowing others to communicate with their international officers. These locals who have not made a final report by that time will be considered as deciding adversely to the proposition, and with all reports on record, a final decision is to be made. The committee previously acting for this joint conference, headed by T. B. Noble, and including R. O. Harvey, J. C. Mytinger, W. S. Curlee and John A. Taylor, is continued to receive further reports until the Friday morning meeting.

his caller that everything was "fitting pretty" the groceries were immediately unloaded and arrangements made for the two men to return at a later date and receive their pay. The men returned, according to schedule, but to be surprised by being placed under arrest. They, however, made full statements to city officials and escorted the detectives to the Denver eating house on Michigan avenue, where a third man was arrested on a charge of being an accomplice to the crime.

Three men who gave the names of J. P. Turner, Katy fireman, H. W. Martin, a Katy roundhouse employe, and Ed Jones, a common laborer, were arraigned Tuesday afternoon before United States Commissioner Lantz, charged with theft from an interstate shipment of commerce. They pleaded guilty and were remanded to jail in default of bond fixed at \$1,500 in each case. The men are alleged to have secured the groceries which they offered to sell the Lake street grocery by ransacking a freight car in the Katy yards near the Eagle Refining company.

In making the decision to defer action until Friday morning, which was discussed at some length and opposed by several of the attendees at the morning conference, it was pointed out that an extension of this kind is before the possible precipitation of labor trouble here and the fact that the majority of the workers in the building craft who had shown themselves reasonable and moderate citizens in Wichita Falls in resisting unjustly the injurious demands on them on the part of a single craft.

It was agreed among those in attendance at the conference, that final action, one way or another, was to be taken at the Friday conference.

In connection with the plumbers' strike, the scales for plumbers wages over the United States were examined. It was shown that at the \$12 per day scale the plumbers here were receiving the highest scale in the United States, this figuring out at \$1.50 per hour, the nearest to which was a \$1.25 per hour scale, being paid in only four other cities in the United States. From this the scale graded down to 65¢ per hour being paid in some of the New York towns.

preach on the movement and urge attendance at the county mass meetings which are scheduled from April 20 to April 26. A special appeal will be made at all of these county mass meetings for the life enlistment of young people in Christian work both in the home and foreign fields.

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

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LEGISLATURE OF SONORA WILL BE CLASSED REBELS

Immediate Action Will Be Taken Accordingly It Is Stated Officially

WILL INCLUDE ALL OTHERS ACTIVE IN SECESSION MOVE

Movement For Mediator Has Been Started By Sonora Citizens at Mexico City

MEXICO CITY, April 13, (Night).—Members of the Sonora legislature and others participating in the alleged secession movement in that state will be regarded as rebels and immediate action taken according, it was learned officially tonight.

General Diezguz, commanding federal troops which were prepared to enter Sonora when the state first protested such action, was to arrive here tonight from Guadalupe.

He was called by President Carranza to confer on plans for a campaign against the Sonora forces.

The president also has called to the capital Governor Cantu of Lower California who has expressed his loyalty to the government. Cantu probably will be asked to take a leading part in the move to suppress the incipient revolt.

Movement for Mediation.

A movement for mediation was started today by a group of prominent citizens of Sonora who were in the capital. They were headed by Roberto Pesquera, former Mexican financial agent at El Paso and Washington and widely known in the United States. Pesquera asked an audience with President Carranza.

"There is only one hope for salvation from national disaster," Pesquera said in an interview with the United Press. "That is mediation or compromise."

"If the president grants us an audience we will propose that Governor De La Huerta (of Sonora) come to the capital for a conference. The government is willing. They will suggest that the government withhold troops from Sonora territory until they actually are needed there."

Behind Legislature.

"Should that be agreed upon I am confident the Sonora government will modify its attitude toward one of recognition of federation government, but if the federal government refuses I am fearful of the consequences, because the people of Sonora are unconditionally behind their legislature."

"There are 12,000 armed men in Sonora who will resist to the last."

Another movement was under way seeking settlement by mediation by federal courts. The supreme court was to give its decision on the legal aspects in the near future.

Both General Obregon and Pablo Gonzalez, rival presidential candidates, were scheduled to testify in the case of Robert C. Johnson, former bandit leader in Vera Cruz, at this afternoon's session of the court martial trying the bandit.

Charge Connivance.

Obregon was charged with connivance with the bandit, whom the government alleged Obregon attempted to delay surrender until after the presidential elections.

Huge oil concessions awarded American companies in Sonora probably will not be affected even if the state succeeds in separating itself from the republic, it was believed here today.

Representatives of the Marland interests of Pittsburgh, Pa., and Oklahoma pointed out that General Calles, one of the Sonora leaders, was minister of industry and commerce at the time Marland was given concessions under the recent federal decree.

The company, it was said, now has geologists en route to its new holdings to begin preparations for developments.

PREPARED TO MEET INVADERS WITH FORCE

AGUA PRIETA, SONORA, April 14.—This border town, the objective of Carranza troops under Colonel Fox, in the opening of the campaign to bring Sonora back into the Mexican fold, is being prepared to meet the invaders with force.

Building of trenches and fortifying of vantage points was begun Monday before the first movement of federal troops toward this state was reported. Carranza's troops, scheduled to leave Juarez today, will travel 125 miles by train to Casas Grandes and thence by foot over desert country and mountain passes for 200 miles before they can reach here.

Sonora officials estimate the first battle is still a week distant and this week will be spent in preparing for the attack.

Troop patrols have been guarding for the Sonora and Chihuahua frontiers all this week. Special attention will be given to guarding El Alto Pass through which the invading troops must come. Military officers assert that the pass can be guarded by a small force.

Federal troops are reported to be

well-equipped with arms and ammunition. In a statement issued yesterday at Hermosillo, Governor Adolfo de la Huerta, provisional president of the republic of Sonora, declared the entire state was supporting him in the secession movement. He declared that the state's action was legal and in defense of state's rights under the Mexican constitution.

In the meantime customs collections are being made as usual and business is not interfered with. Governor de la Huerta, in his proclamation, promised to protect the rights of foreigners as well as Mexicans.

SUN COMPANY HAS A 150-BARREL WELL IN YOUNG COUNTY

GRAHAM, TEX., April 14.—Steadily Young county is creeping into the class of first-class producers. Saturday the Sun Company's well, G. L. Donnell, survey 1212, fifteen miles southwest of Graham, at 2270 feet came in and is now making 150 barrels of high-grade oil and only four feet in the time. The well stands 2,000 feet in oil and flows 150 barrels of its own accord.

A night and day crew has been put on the Timmons, five miles southwest from Graham, drilling out the bridge from the 720 quart shot. There is yet about 80 feet of bridge above the shot. This well gives great indications of being a good producer, flowing several times through the bridge. The oil is 41.6 gravity and little doubt is entertained but that the well will be good for 500 to 1,000 barrels.

EXPECT ACTION ON SOLDIER BONUS BILL BEFORE JUNE FIRST

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Action on a soldier bonus bill is to be rushed in congress in the hope of passing it by June 1, or before members leave for the political conventions, republican leaders of senate and house agreed today.

Senator Long, sent word to Representative Fordney, Michigan, chairman of the ways and means committee, urging the passage of the bill by May 1.

ORDER ARREST OF FORMER MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT

GENEVA, April 14.—The German outposts and custom officers on the Swiss frontier have received orders for the arrest of Ignatius Trubich Lincoln, former member of the British parliament, and whose British certificate of naturalization was revoked in 1918. Lincoln, it is said, is accused of robbery and spying. It is believed here to be doubtful if he will attempt to cross the border as he could be extradited from Switzerland on a charge of robbery.

CHLORINE GAS MAY BE GENERALLY USED TO PREVENT THE FLU

ST. LOUIS, April 14.—Chlorine gas may come into universal use as an influenza preventive in the opinion of members of the American Chemical society in session here.

At a conference of the biological section of the society today, members stated that initial tests with chlorine during the recent influenza epidemic tended strongly to bear out their theory as to its value. They agreed, however, that the tests were not carried out to such an extent as to furnish conclusive proof on account of the rapid decrease in the number of influenza cases. The most extensive tests, it was said, were conducted at the University of Arkansas by Dr. Harrison Hale, head of the department of chemistry there.

During their course, 800 treatments were administered to 184 volunteers who remained for five minutes daily in a room containing a small amount of gas.

Only one of those who underwent the treatment developed influenza, it was said, and in that instance within a short while after the test, that it was believed the case had previously developed. More than two-thirds of those who took the treatment had been stricken with influenza during the epidemic in the fall of 1918, it was stated.

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GOODFELLOW IS POLICE CHIEF E. M. MANN IS CITY ATTORNEY; COMMISSIONERS ARE ASSIGNED

Assignments as commissioners were made for members of the city council, a salary ordinance fixing the salaries of a number of the city officials adopted and appointments made for most of the city offices at a meeting of the city council Wednesday.

Salaries were fixed and appointments made for the following offices: City tax assessor and collector—H. J. Anderson; salary \$4,000 per annum. Chief of police—Robert Goodfellow; salary, \$4,000 per annum. City clerk—George Thorburn; salary, \$3,600 per annum. City attorney—E. M. Mann; salary, \$250 per month. City recorder (police judge)—J. R. Ogles; salary, \$125 per month. The salary of the night chief of police was fixed at \$200 per month, but no appointment for the position was made. No appointments of inspectors or superintendents in the various departments were announced.

The assignments of commissioners were as follows: Police commissions—M. A. Bundy. Street commissioner—W. S. Curlee. Public utilities—W. N. Bonner. Finance—J. M. McFall. Sanitation—Dr. J. P. Reed.

No action was taken toward fixing the salaries of the commissioners. A leave of absence was given to Police Commissioner Bundy to go to his apple farm in Arkansas and leave was given Mayor Gilze to attend the meeting of the Texas chamber of commerce at San Antonio.

The council was in executive session Tuesday and again Wednesday morning. At noon Wednesday the session was made open and action was taken assigning members of the council to commissions, the adoption of an ordinance fixing salaries, and the appointment of officers.

Mr. Goodfellow, the new chief of police, has been acting for some time as assistant police commissioner. Mr. Anderson has been serving for several years as city tax assessor and collector. It will be a part of his duties to collect the sewer rents. At a meeting of the council last Thursday night this work had been diverted to the city clerk.

E. M. Mann, the new city attorney, came to Wichita Falls some time ago from Mart, Tex., where for a number of years he was city attorney. Mart was under the commission form of government. He was strongly recommended by city officials and business men of Mart.

W. S. Curlee was made mayor pro tem in the absence of Mayor Gilze.

NEW CHIEF OF POLICE CITY OF WICHITA FALLS

Later he was chief deputy fish and oyster commissioner of the state of Texas and served for a period as warden of the state penitentiary at Rusk.

He came to Wichita Falls to accept appointment as deputy United States marshal, a position he held for several years, resigning to accept appointment as assistant police commissioner.

In a statement Wednesday Mr. Goodfellow said that his appointment as chief of police at a salary of \$4,000 per annum, as that received by the county sheriff, ended his consideration of becoming a candidate for that office. He said he felt that the city had the first claim for his services. He said that he wished to thank friends who had tendered him their support, if he would become a candidate for sheriff.

HEARING CASE AGAINST NORTH TEXAS GAS CO.

The case of J. W. Stone vs. the North Texas Gas company is being tried before a jury in Justice R. V. Gwinn's court today. The plaintiff alleges overcharging on the part of the gas company. The case is the first of its kind to be tried in the local courts in some time.

BRIEFS TO BE FILED IN CONNECTION WITH RIVER CONTROVERSY

Briefs on the part of landowners and operators in the Red River lands involved in the recent receivership order of the United States supreme court asking for a reversal of the decision of the court to appoint such a receiver are to be filed with the court Wednesday and Thursday, largely by local attorneys, who are in Washington and Orville Ballington are handling the cases of claimants in what is commonly referred to as the "Highland group." Judge R. H. Ward and Judge C. E. Bass for the "Duffee group" and T. W. Gregory, former United States Attorney General for the "Sparks group."

The first of these briefs was filed with the court Tuesday, being filed in behalf of the Sinclair Oil & Gas Company, who have large holdings in the Moran-Meadowland and a number of claimants with similar interests, by W. A. Ledbetter, counsel for this company.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Motions on the part of the Sinclair Oil and Gas Company, the National Oil Company and the Arkansas City Pipe Line Company, owning and operating property in the Red River boundary suit, were filed in the supreme court today by W. A. Ledbetter, attorney for the companies, asking a modification of the court's order of receivership and injunction.

Jurisdiction of the supreme court to hear and determine the issues concerning the title of the land over which Texas has exercised jurisdiction for many years, is questioned, but if the court decides that it has jurisdiction, the court is asked to refer the cause to a referee to determine whether there is ground for the appointment of a receiver, and whether there is any reasonable probability that the State of Oklahoma or the United States will be able to establish on final trial any right to the property or the oil and gas rights therein. The court is further asked to remove the properties of these companies from the receivership. In event the court determines that the properties shall remain under the receivership, the companies asked to be allowed to operate, retaining all of the production, save one-eighth, which shall be left with the receiver to await the final determination of the suit.

In his argument in support of the motion, Mr. Ledbetter announced that the long continued exercise of jurisdiction by the State of Texas over the lands described in the motions, raises a strong presumption against claims of the United States and the State of Oklahoma, and cites the case of the State of Indiana against Kentucky, Rhode Island against Massachusetts, and Louisiana against Mississippi. The claimants assert that their rights and title came down from the State

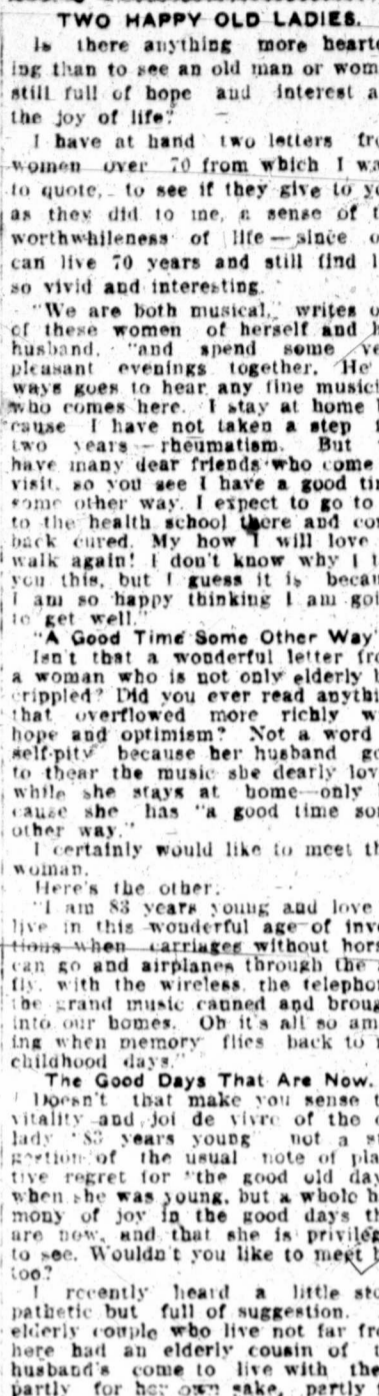

NEWS OF WEST TEXAS

VERNON CONTINUES TO ATTRACT PEOPLE FROM ALL SECTIONS

By A. C. McCONNELL.
VERNON, TEX., April 14.—The recent bringing in of the well on the Wharton ranch in section 21, block 2, ten and one-half miles south of Vernon, by the Sigler Oil Co., has created a sensation by all activities in the rapidly growing city of Vernon and it is becoming the focus of the American speculator and adventurers and oil operators.

The roads leading into Vernon is full of people every day and night in the week and at times crowded. By every mode of transportation is used—railway, automobile, coming by trucks, wagons, hacks and cabs, drawn by horses, mules and the "prairie mackinac bird." The city is "for oil." The mad rush to the oil fields a year ago is characteristic of the opening of other fields in North Texas. Fabulous prices are being paid for ground, houses, etc. Hotels and exchanges are crowded and Vernon has the aspect of a real boom.

Wilbarger county has another flowing well opening up a vast field. It is near the proven east Wilbarger field. A majority of Vernon citizens, together with hundreds from other towns and cities in Texas and other states, have seen the well in action. The oilstained crown-block and the field nearby bears the mute evidence of the fact that the well "gushes" to the derrick when the sand is fractured at a depth of 2000 feet, and since that time the drilling crew has not been busy. Visitors have seen, analyzed and witnessed the which flow of oil rising high into the derrick, by heads—and have gone away predicting that the Vernon field will rival that of Burkhardt, with Vernon the axis of activity.

Just what the Sigler well will ultimately be good for will not be definitely determined until an official test has been made, which will be indefinite owing to some complications arising which will be adjusted before the well will be given a chance to show what it can do. Reliable sources and experienced oil men are of the opinion that it is good for a big well, some predicting 500, 1000 and up to 2000 barrels. When last opened up the well flowed three hours in about 40 minutes, and that each load has flowed from 75 to 125 barrels. These flows fill the five tanks of 100-barrel capacity full. On this basis, it is estimated that the well will possibly settle down to from 400 to 1000 barrels after the rush is run off. Field Manager H. Lloyd Sigler and the driller, Mr. Bellinger, state there is no danger of encountering salt water, as they passed this danger when they got the

10-inch 290 feet above the pay sand. The depth of the well is 2051 feet and the drillers say the bit only punctured the oil sand to a depth of eighteen inches. What the results will be when the well is drilled deeper is the uncertainty which caused the optimistically inclined to predict the test as another Bark-Waggoner, opening up another new pool.

The Sinclair Oil Co. has made a hydrometer test of the oil from the well and it tests 37.8 gravity of oil, with paraffine base, of greenish tint and will stand the Mid-Continent test.

LITIGATION DELAYS WORK OF DEVELOPING POTASH RESOURCES OF THE WEST

LEIBROCK, TEX., April 14.—The great potash resources of the lakes of Terry, Gaines, Lynn and other adjoining counties are being delayed in development by litigation, according to a statement made here recently. An attempt at compromise is now being made in California, but in case it fails to produce an agreement, the matter will be taken to the federal court for trial at Abilene this summer.

Capitalists have been interested so that they are willing to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars, but they cannot proceed until the land controversy has been settled. Thorough test of the lakes has been made. Many barrels taken here and there from these shallow, saline bodies of water were analyzed in northern cities. The analysis showed considerable sodium salt as well as potash, says the V. Texas chamber of commerce. We estimate that the result that the potash resource was stronger as the well was deepened. The estimated daily production of the lakes is 100,000 to 200,000 barrels and 100,000 barrels of potash.

CONFIDENT SIGLER WELL IS GOOD FOR 500 BARRELS DAILY

VERNON, TEX., April 14.—The Sigler well, ten miles south and west of Vernon, is still flowing by heads, filling a 100-barrel flow tank from each flow. Harry Oliver and Fred B. Foster, Fort Worth operators have offered to post \$2,000 in a Vernon bank that the well will flow not less than 500 barrels a day. No definite estimates can be made of the flow and it will be some time before the production will be known, as litigation is holding back development in this area, which is regretted by citizens.

The Buckeye National Oil Co. have secured a lease on 80 acres in section 47, block 2, near the Sigler well, and will drill as soon as machinery can be placed on the ground. Capitalization \$10,000. Rig timbers being hauled to the site.

GYPSIUM COMPANY PLANT AT SWEETWATER PROVIDES A LARGE ADDED PAYROLL

SWEETWATER, TEX., April 14.—Supplementing Sweetwater's labor payroll by not less than \$250,000 the first year and adding property with a physical value of not less than \$1,000,000—this is what the United States Gypsum Company is going to do for this city in the next 12 months following the signing of a contract here a few days ago involving the purchase of 225 acres of virgin gypsum deposits. Actual work of erecting the first unit of the immense plant will start within the next 30 days.

The new plant will be located by miles east of the city, where the Santa Fe overpans the Texas & Pacific, having trackage with both lines. The gypsum deposits are so valuable and extensive that they will provide material for the mills for at least ten years. Another by-product plant will be located in south Sweetwater on the Orient line.

The United States Gypsum Co. owns and operates 28 mills in the United States, of which the largest will be Sweetwater. The plant here will manufacture every line of gypsum products, including wall plaster, wall boards, pottery plaster, molding plaster, partition tile and gypsum blocks. Wall boards of the heavier and schumacher type will be manufactured. These boards are of earth or gypsum made by a special process of melting and casting in frames. Each board is absolutely fireproof

and destined, it is said, to do away with wall paper and plaster.

present, making speeches and encouraging the work.

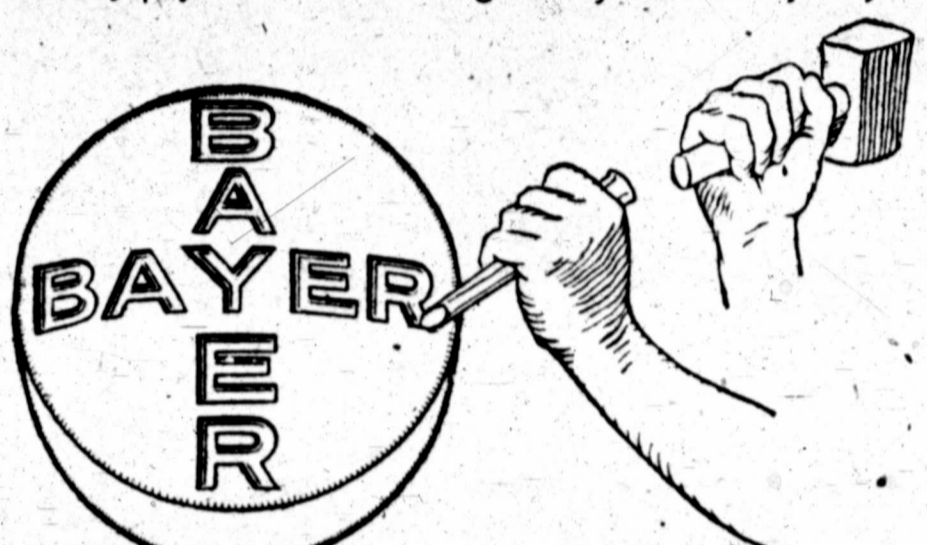

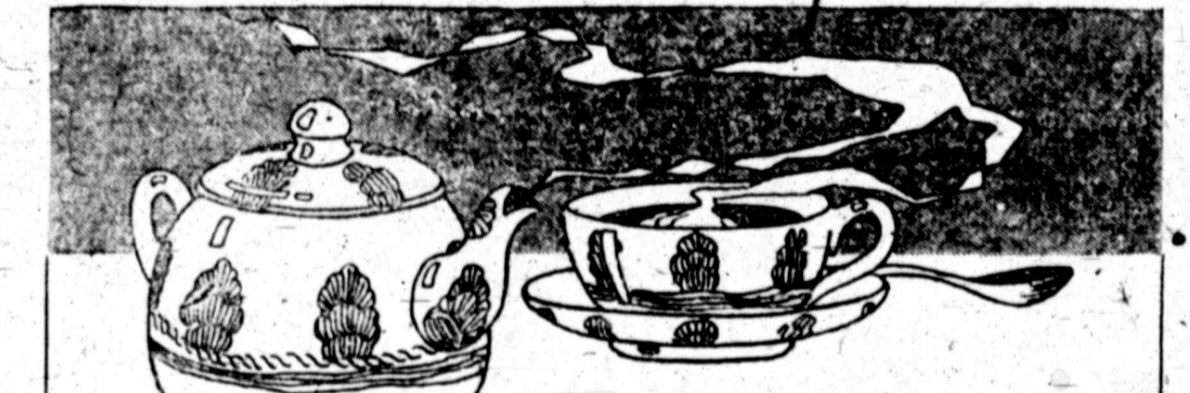

"The millionaire special" from upper Montclair rolled into the Erie terminal after a forty-five minute run. The firemen were Richard Sanderson, New York manager of the Baldwin locomotive works, and J. R. Quinn, the New England representative of that company.

There was no noticeable increase in the price of foodstuffs when the markets opened today. Department of Justice agents mingled with the marketeers on the lookout for profiteers.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Evidence obtained by the department of justice was said today to show that the Russian communist international is undertaking to use the railroad strike as the vehicle for the creation of a mass strike in the United States.

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GRANDFIELD TO HAVE A NEW OIL REFINERY

GRANDFIELD, OKLA., April 14.—Another oil refinery will be added to the industries of Grandfield by June 1, when on that date a 2,000-barrel plant owned by the Texas-Oklahoma Refining company is expected to be completed.

O. J. Marerer, superintendent of construction for the company, is in Grandfield now, overseeing the work. A large crew of men is engaged in the construction, and the plant is being rushed.

This is only one of four large refineries either already built, under construction, or about to be begun. With two large pipelines running into Grandfield from the Burburnett fields little more than 4½ miles away, plenty of oil will be available to keep a dozen refineries working day and night.

It is expected that the completion of the new Chattanooga-Grandfield extension of the Rock Island, bringing as it will, a large amount of additional trackside facilities to the city, will result in the construction of numerous other industries here, including whole sale houses of various kinds and oil well supply companies.

DEMAND IS URGENT FOR BETTER POSTAL FACILITIES

RANGER, TEX., April 14.—Postal facilities for the three new towns on the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad are the most urgent demand of the people in those towns at this time. The postoffice force at Ranger would also like to see some arrangements made for handling the mail for the new Hamon and Kell towns, as the local office is now made the destination for a great mass of mail matter destined to people in these new towns. Much of this mail is delivered to the railroad company's offices here and sent out on their trains, such mail being sent in care of the railroad. Applications for the establishment of postoffices and appointment of postmasters have been made by the people of Jakehamon, Edhobby and Frankell and favorable action is expected soon.

NEW RAILROAD CARRYING MUCH BUILDING MATERIAL

RANGER, TEX., April 14.—Building materials and merchandise for the three new towns on the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad are being carried by the new railroad to the extent of its capacity.
