BOARD OF CONTROL ACT IS UPHELD BY THE HIGHER COURT

AUSTIN, April 14.—The constitu-tionality of the act creating the state board of control was upheld by the supreme court today in answering 35 questions submitted by the third court of civil appeals at Austin in the case of Atlee B. Ayres et al vs. S. B.

Cowell, et al. The court held that the act creating the board of control and ab. ishing the board of managers of the Junatic asylums and conferring the duties of such boards on the board of control is not violative of section porfa 30-A. article 16, of the constitution Club. which relates to the management of

these asylums.

The mere mention of an office of its ferm, in a constitution, lacks much of creating an office or prescribing the duration for which it is to be held," said Associate Justice Green-

wood who wrote the opinion.

The effect of the decision is to held The effect of the decision is to held that the offices of the boards of managers were not intended to be constitutional offices by the constitutional amendment in question, nor to assure the tenures of office which could not be changed by act of the legislature. In this connection, Jus-tice Greenwood further said: "If the same legislature intended for section or to assure tenures, why did it not frame the amendment to so declare, as it did for the prison commissioners?"



While the day's chief parley was being held in the White House, other meetings were being held from coast to coast in an effort to end the tie-up affecting the nation's business.

A meeting of all strike leaders on the Pacific coast was to be held today in San Francisco while Jersey City, where forces at conflict in the New York district assembled yesterday, further conferences were being staged.

While these efforts were being made to induce the strikers to return, railroads in all sections of the country were seeking to meet conditions resulting from the walkout. Morning reports indicated that while in the west the crisis had been met and passed, in the middle west and New York district roads had difficulty in doing more than hold their own.

Strikers were said to be returning at several points in the central west and improvement was indicated in general traffic conditions there, but in Ohio and Michigan a crisis was reported as a stoppage of fuel supplies made itself felt on industry.





General Dieguez, commanding federal troops which were prepared to enter Sonora when the state first protested such action, was to arrive here tonight from Gaudalajara. He was called by President

ranza to confer on plans for a cam-paign against the Sonora forces. The president also has called to the capital Governor Cantu of Lower Cali fornia who has expressed his loyalty to the government. Cantu probably will be asked to take a leading part in the move to suppress the incipient

A movement for Mediation was started today by a group of prominent citizens of Sonora who were in the capital. They were headed by Roberto Pesquera, former Mexican financial agent at El Paso and Washington and widely known in the United States. Pesquera asked an audience with President Carranza. "There is only one hope for salvation from national disaster," Pesquera said in an interview with the United Press. "That is mediation or com-

promise.

If the president grants us an audience we will propose that Governor De La Huerta (of Sonora) come to the capital for a conference. The governor is willing. Then we will suggest that the government withhold senator Long sent word to Representative Fordney, Michigan, chair-troops from Sonora territory until man of the ways and means commit-

suggest that the government withhold troops from Sonora territory until they actually are needed there.

Behind Legislature.

"Should that be agreed upon I am confident the Sonora government will modify its attitude toward one of recognition of federation government. But if the federal government refuses I am fearful of the consequences, because the people of Sonora are unanimously behind their legislature.

There are 12,000 armed men in Sonora who will resist to the last."






