"The brotherhood is awaiting the de-

cision of the railroad labor board and any strike pending the conclusion of negotiations will be unauthorized by our organization," Grable said.

## VILLA HURRIES HIS SOLDIERS WESTWARD; CARRANZA TROOPS REACH JUAREZ IN TWO TRAINS

AUGA PRIETA, SONORA, April 20.—Both Sonora and federal Mexican leaders continued preparations today for the clash of forces which both sides expect as a result of Sonora's recent withdrawal from adherence to the Carranza government. Sonora's heartened by reports that Villa had aligned himself definitely with their movement, went about placing troops to prevent an incursion of Carranza troops. In planning the defense of their state, the Sonora leaders are putting large reliance upon Yaqui and Maya Indians. Military experts here commented on the fact that General Francisco Urbalejo, a federal leader, who, according to press dispatches, arrived at Juarez yesterday with troops destined for the march on Sonora, himself is a Yaqui.

General Urbalejo, Juarez reports declared, brought word that Carranza planned to send 65,000 men against Sonora, instead of 50,000 as reported some days ago. Two train loads of troops accompanied him to Juarez. Some days ago. Two train loads of troops accompanied him to Juarez.

AMARILLO, TEX. April 20.—Extending the range of possibilities in the monster Amarillo gas field about 12 miles, the Tuck Trigg has blown leself in, estimated good for between 25,000,000 and 30,000,000 cubic feet. The Tuck Trigg is about four miles south of the Canadian river, almost on a line with the Masterson gigantic. south of the Canadian river, almost on a line with the Masterson gigantic gasser. Though it is much smaller than some of the other gassers, it is said to have 600 pounds rock pressure, making it of great interest, the high pressure indicating a permanence of supply. The depth of the gas sand is somewhere between 3,500 and 3,900 somewhere between 3,500 and 3,500 feet, the well having blown itself in after a two weeks' shutdown, when the water was balled out to the depth of 3,500 feet.

The Tuck-Trigg was shut down a

little over two weeks ago because of failure of the water supply, the creek from which water was obtained having gone dry. When drilling was shut down the well was down 3,990 feet. A gas flow of 3,500,000 cubic feet was encountered at the 2,500-foot level. This gas was used in the boiler of the engine operating the drilling machin-

A new flow of gas was struck at 3,500 feet, but the hole was pushed on down to 2,900 feet, when operations ceased. The well was capped and began filling with water.

Last Thursday workmen started balling the well, and when down be-

low the 3,500-foot level the well blew in the big gas flow. It A not known at exactly what depth the gas is coming in, but it is established that it comes somewhere between the 3,500oot level and the bottom of the hole L. B. Newby, who with other men





# The Open Shop Means an Equal Chance to All Workers

The Open Shop Movement did not materialize in Wichita Falls until every reasonable means of avoiding it had been tried unsuccessfully.

Other communities in the Southwest formed open shop organizations after suffering far less from the radical elements in organized labor than Wichita Falls has.

It was not until every other means had failed, until the fruitlessness of negotiations and discussions had been demonstrated, that Wichita Falls citizens took the step.

The step was taken because some of the building trades unions were determined to support the plumbers in an illegal strike for an exorbitant daily wage under ureasonable working conditions. Others of the building trades unions were not willing to support the striking plumbers, but the number who did was not sufficient to stop building operations. hoteles and transfer they was a for

It was a question of submit or fight. We appreciated the fair-minded spirit displayed by the carpenters in refusing to play into the hands of another union, but carpenters alone cannot construct a building. We felt that it was an encouraging sign that so strong an organization as the carpenters would not permit blinded unionism to cloud its sense of jus-

tice, but most of the other building crafts seemed determined to swallow anything that had a union tag on it. So the Open Shop Association, now with more than 1500 members, came into being.

What do we mean by "open shop?"

We mean that the community's work must go on, regardless of whether the workers are holders of union cards or not; that limits on the amount of work to be done in a given time must not be fixed; that the right of any man to employ and discharge as he sees fit those who take his money in wages shall go unquestioned; that contracts between employer and employe shall be rigidly and literally observed; in brief, simple justice to, from and between employer and employe.

Does the Open Shop Association recognize the right of working men to organize?

Absolutely. It realizes that labor organizations are necessary, that they have accomplished much for their members, and that they have a vital and important part in society. It is the methods of organized labor, as demonstrated so often in Wichita Falls within recent months, that the Open Shop Association opposes.

Is the Open Shop Association opposed to organized labor?

It is opposed to those radical forces in organized labor that at times seem to be in control, who think nothing of breaking contracts, who bring about the limitation of production, who would by force and intimidation destroy the ambition and initiative of the individual worker, who care nothing for the rights of the employer, and who own no responsibility whatever to the public that, in the end, always foots the bills.

Does the Open Shop Association intend to reduce the wages of labor?

Recognition of the principle of a fair day's pay for a fair day's work is one of the ground tenets of the open shop movement, but the question of wages is secondary to that of efficiency. The scale of pay for practically all crafts in Wichita Falls is higher than anywhere elese in the United States, so far as records show. The question of wages is bound up closely with that of living costs, upon which it depends, and no member of the Open Shop Association would want any working man to have to labor for less than he could live upon in comfort. Let organized labor show a willingness to use fair methods, and it will find the great majority of employers, and the public, ready to do utmost justice in the matter of wages.

How can organized labor regain the confidence and good will of employers and of the public?

By living up to its contracts, by no longer stifling individual energy and initiative, by giving eight hours work for eight hours pay, by ridding its councils of the radical elements that have wrought such havoc within the anks, by seeing to it that a union card is a token of good workmanship and Americanism.

What is to become of those union men who do not favor the radical methods and unfair practices of those

who dominate the labor organizations?

To these the Open Shop association wants to extend every reasonable assistance, but they must choose this day whom they will serve. If they place unionism above Americanism, there is nothing for them to do but follow whither the radicals lead; but if Americanism comes first, they get a square deal, in the fullest meaning of that term.

Why is the Open Association enrolling as members everyone who subscribes to its declaration of prin-

ciples, whether an employer or not.

Because there are three parties to every labor contracts—the employer, the employe and the public. It is because the last-named party has come to assert his rights in the matter that so many open shop associations are coming into being. The public is directly, definitely and vitally interested in everything that passes between employer and employe, because the public in the end, must foot the bills.

Is that the only way in which this movement concerns the public?

No. The public is concerned because the principles that are involved have to do with the very spirit and purpose of this republic. Again, the general welfare of Wichita Falls is involved; if we are to "make Wichita Falls a better place to live" justice and fairness must be the guiding principle for our work.

## LET'S NOT STRANGLE OUR CITY'S GROWTH MAKE WICHITA FALLS' INDUSTRIES FREE

### DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES

Believing that the unrestricted development of Wichita Falls and the highest efficiency of co-operation between all classes of citizens in the upbuilding of the city will be fostered by Open Shop working conditions as distinguished from closed shop or labor union control, and believing that all other reasonable means for a settlement of local labor troubles have been tried, we the undersigned do hereby pledge ourselves as charter members of the Wichita Falls Open Shop Association, and agree to abide by and support the principle of this association as herein set forth and the constitution and by laws of the Association.

1. Absolute fairness to amploye and employer alike is one of the foundation principles on which Americanism rests.

2. We will work for the improvement of industrial relations, elimina-tion of class prejudice, which senerally results from misunderstandings, and the establishment of equitable and uniform working conditions fair alike to

3. It will always use its unled influence in opposition to injustice whether practiced by employers or employes.

4. It stands for the American plan which means absolute fairness to all classes of workers whether union or non-union. It unaiterably opposes the "closed shop" which shuts the doors of industry against the American workingman who is not a member of a labor organization.

5. It is un-American to interfere with the personal rights and constitu-etional liberties of the individual. Therefore, we shall oppose the use of force or intimidation by anyone endeavoring to persuade workmen either to join or to resign from a labor organization.

We hold that both the employe and the employer are privileged to terminate their relations whenever either choose to do so, unless, of course,

7. We do not countenance limitation of the amount of work which may be accomplished in a given time, or the manner in which payment shall be made for such work, whether by hourly rate, piece work, contract or otherwise. We believe that every workman should have an opportunity to earn a wage proportionate to his ability and productive capacity.

3. By encouraging fair dealings and broadminded policies, we, the undersigned, with the co-operation of Wichita Fails' thinking public, hope to bring about working conditions and wages which will make Wichita Fails known as a good city in which to work, to live and to raise children.

We agree to pay upon demand to the Treasurer of the Association the amount set opposite our names for the purpose of financing this organization according to our classification in the following schedule of dues: Class 1—Employes \$2.00 per year; Class 2—Employers \$2.00 to \$2.000 per year, based on \$1.00 per year for each employe; Class 3—General public, any voluntary amount not less than \$12.00 per year.
