55 DEATHS IN SOUTHERN TORNADO

ENTIRE STATE OF MICHOACAN IS RISING AGAINST CARRANZA; OBREGON LEADER OF REVOLT

AGUA PRIETA, SONORA, April 21.—Although lacking definite information through their own channels, leaders in Sonora's fight against the Carranza government of Mexico for states' rights drew encouragement today from news dispatches repeating the statement of a Carranza official, and recounting reports made to the American army intelligence service.

BRITISH TO BE IN CONTROL OF OIL DEPOSITS

American Position As Leader Fast Dwindling, Say Washington Reports.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Frequent statements credited to English sources that the British empire will soon control the future petroleum supplies of the world are borne out by information in possession of various departments of the government.

No disposition exists to blame Britain for her exploitations—they are regarded as an effort to assure fuel supplies for her own warships, commercial fleets and industries.

Acquisition of foreign oil lands by Americans is urged by government observers to insure fuel for the merchant fleet, the more than six million automobiles, the navy, which it is said, will be the largest in the world, and to provide the vast quantities of petroleum required by industry.

Private advice said General Arzuffo Gomez with 3,000 had occupied Tuxpan and was threatening Tampico according to reports from Monterrey.

Reports at the state department said 15 deputies had left Mexico City for Sonora by way of Laredo.

DETROIT MILK CONSUMERS PAYING 16 CENTS A QUART

JOHNSON CARRIES NEBRASKA; BRYAN LOSES LEADERSHIP

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RELIEF IS URGENTLY NEEDED; PROPERTY LOSS OF MILLIONS; WORST HAVOC IN MANY YEARS

BIRMINGHAM, ALA., April 21.—Assistance from the outside world is urgently needed for the relief of tornado survivors in a dozen counties of Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee, reports today from the storm-swept district said.

With a death list of 155 already reported and a property loss which will run into many millions, the tornado has taken rank as one of the most disastrous and as well as most widespread in the annals of the south.

Hundreds of injured require medical attention, and the forces of physicians and nurses available locally are inadequate to cope with the situation.

The storm apparently struck in the rich farming belt lying around Bay Springs, Jasper county, Mississippi, and moved northeast across the remainder of the state to vent its fury upon the extreme northwestern tier of counties in Alabama before moving into Tennessee.

All reports agree as to the extreme velocity of the wind which leveled everything in its path. In and near Meridian, 21 persons lost their lives, while 16 employes at a lumber camp in Neshoba county were killed in the destruction of the camp structures.

Mr. Taylor called the police, and Mr. Rohatsch, who in other account states heard the falling glass, came in response to the call. Boyer had managed to unlock the basement door, according to Chief McClure, who was at the building in a short time after the alarm was turned in. The young man was practically exhausted when the fire department arrived and was unable to give any coherent explanation of the explosion.

According to Chief McClure, the gas stove, which was connected with rubber tubing, had been blown from its connections, and the gas was escaping to the burning room. This gas stove seems to offer the only explanation of the explosion, but whether the flame in the stove had gone out, and then came on again, or had been blown out, or the connection had become parted, is not known. Mr. Boyer has been unable to say how the gas was ignited, his condition preventing any explanation.

### BANKERS-FARMERS EXCHANGE VIEWS IN STATE CONFERENCE

COLLEGE STATION, TEX., April 21.—Frank exchange of views between agricultural producers and bankers responsible for extension of market credits occupied the opening session here yesterday of the first annual banker-farmer conference at which 400 delegates were present, representing virtually every section of Texas. The sessions will be concluded tomorrow.

F. M. Law of Houston, president of the Texas Bankers' association, characterized the conference as a "meeting of Texas citizens with common interests coming together to see how they can best further those interests."

President Bizzell of A. and M. college stressed the necessity for stabilizing credits for agriculture and greater extension of credits to farmers in view of increased costs of production.

Other speakers were Joseph Hirsch of Corpus Christi, chairman of the agricultural committee of the American Bankers' association, whose subject was the "responsibility of Texas Bankers to Agriculture"; P. L. Downs of Temple, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Texas Bankers' association, who discussed "farm tenantry," and T. O. Walton, director of the extension service at A. and M., who spoke of "What the Extension Service is Doing for Agriculture."

Yesterday afternoon the bankers visited the college grounds and witnessed demonstrations in live stock judging, hog cholera, prevention and Texas fever tick eradication.

### THE CITY COUNCIL AT BURKBURNETT ADOPTS ORDINANCES

BURKBURNETT, April 21.—The Burk Burnett city council met in regular session Monday night, which was the first meeting since the installation of the new aldermen and officers, all of whom were present.

The chief action of the body on this occasion was the passing of four ordinances, in substance as follows: The levying of an occupation tax on such enterprises as would be listed as luxuries, including barber shops, soft drinks, motion pictures, skating rinks, gasoline, oil pump station, etc.

Another ordinance was the establishing of fees for all disembarment, and cases coming before the mayor's court.

A third ordinance for fixing the salaries and pay of all officers elective, or appointed by the mayor and council. Some of the salaries of these officers were changed from a per cent of fees to a stipulated annual salary in monthly payments.

Instructions were given the elective officers to make bond within the usual 30 days.

Dr. H. D. Pritchard and wife and Dr. Terrell of Newtown left tonight for Houston to attend the State Medical association, convening in that city this week.

Rev. Mr. Stubblebine, in charge of the near east relief for Armenian orphans and women, was in the city today and has arranged to have a Tag day Saturday when the public will be canvassed in behalf of these suffering people. A number of liberal donations were made today.

### C. T. BOYER SERIOUSLY BURNED IN EXPLOSION GAS TUESDAY NIGHT

Blown through a door into the draughtsmen's room by a gas explosion at 2:47 Wednesday morning, which wrecked the telegraph and telephone rooms of the Texas company's offices on the fifth floor of the First National bank building, C. T. Boyer, night telegraph operator, with his clothing aflame and suffering from burns from the horrible burns all over his body, groped his way through the flames and smoke filled offices, after breaking a hall window with a stool to make his exit, took down the emergency fire extinguisher and turned on the hose, probably preventing a serious fire. The heroic young man then dragged himself down the five flights of stairs, through the dark and empty building, to the basement, where his calls for help were heard, and answered, before he succumbed. Today he is in the Call Field hospital, in a very serious condition, and unable to make any statement as to the manner in which the explosion occurred. Dr. M. M. Walker, who was summoned when the accident occurred, pronounced his burns very serious, and was unable to make a forecast as to the possible result.

The room in which the explosion occurred was on the north side of the building, and so terrific was the explosion the plate glass windows in offices on the south side of the building, on the same floor, were blown out. The heavy marble siding which faces the corridor was torn off, and the noise of the falling glass on the pavement attracted Ralph Rohatich, night policeman to the scene, and when Boyer's calls for help were heard from the basement Rohatich broke in the basement, turned in a call for the police and the doctor, and then went to the fifth floor, where books, papers and furniture were in flames. He completed Boyer's attempt to extinguish the flames and the fire was practically out when the fire department reached the building.

Boyer was unable to discuss the accident at any length when reached by the fire department and the physician. It was supposed that he had attempted to light the gas stores in the office, which had blown out, and that much gas had accumulated.

Tributes to the great pluck of the young man were paid by the fire department and others who were first on the scene. His forethought in attempting to turn on the fire extinguisher, even in great suffering, was evidenced by the hose dragged down and partially turned on, and bits of burned clothing, and blood stains on the marble steps, down the five flights told of his painful progress to escape, and to turn in the alarm. The accident occurred exactly at 2:47, the clock in the telegraph room having been stopped by the explosion.

Mr. Boyer's wife was in Dallas at the time of the accident. She was notified by telephone and is expected to reach here today.

### MRS. KATE BIRDSONG BURIED AT DENTON

DENTON, TEX., April 21.—The body of Mrs. Katie (Hogue) Birdsong, wife of J. A. Birdsong of Vernon, was brought here yesterday afternoon for burial here this afternoon. Death occurred at Dallas where Mrs. Birdsong had been under treatment and had recently undergone an operation. Services were in charge of Rev. James L. Bell of Dallas. Mrs. Birdsong was a daughter of the late Rev. Dr. C. L. Hogue and Mrs. Hogue of this city.

### CHAIRMAN CUMMINGS NAMED AS DEMOCRATIC KEYNOTE

CHICAGO, April 21.—Homer S. Cummings, Connecticut, chairman of the democratic national convention will be the "keynote" at the democratic national convention in San Francisco in June, it was announced today. Cummings was the unanimous choice of the democratic executive committee meeting here.

E. G. Hoffman, Indiana, vice chairman of the national committee, will be designated to call the convention to order and present Cummings as the temporary chairman, the committee indicated.

### MINERAL RIGHTS IN REEVES AND PECOS COUNTIES SOUGHT

AUSTIN, April 21.—Evidence as to the ownership of mineral rights under land in Reeves and Pecos counties will be gathered by Assistant Attorney General E. F. Smith, who left today for west Texas. Land owners claim the mineral rights and object to drilling for oil and gas by persons holding mineral permits from the state.

Upon Judge Smith's return a suit will be filed in district court here to test this question. The state will ask for an injunction allowing mineral permit holders to drill.

### CHICAGO TRACTION MEN WILL DEMAND A LARGE INCREASE

CHICAGO, April 20.—Conductors and motormen employed by the Chicago surface lines will present demands for wages of \$1 and \$1.04 an hour, union officials announced today. Their present wage agreement expires June 1. Junior conductors and motormen are paid 65 cents an hour and others 67 cents under the present scale.

### Night News Briefs

WASHINGTON.—Miss Nancy Lane, daughter of former Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane, and Phillip C. Kauffman of Washington were married.

WASHINGTON.—Miss Edith W. Bonham, social secretary to Mrs. Wilson, married Rear Admiral J. M. Helm, senior member of the commission on navy yards.

WASHINGTON.—The principal stock exchanges of Japan closed because operators failed to put up additional margins, the state department was advised.

WASHINGTON.—The house passed unanimously the deficiency appropriation bill providing \$290,000,000 for the railroad administration to wind up its affairs.

STOCKHOLM.—Doctor Wolfgang Kamp, leader of the recent uprising in Germany, has written the Swedish government asking that he be permitted to remain in that country as a political refugee.

### VACUUM PUMPS TO BE USED ON WELLS UTILIZING THE GAS

AUSTIN, April 21.—Agreement has been virtually reached by the railroad commission and representatives of oil companies for the adoption of a new code of fire prevention in the oil fields, known as rule 39.

Prohibition of the use of vacuum pumps for extracting oil and gas under rule 40, has also been agreed upon, with the exception that vacuum pumps may be used for pumping where the gas is utilized and not wasted.

### KILLS WIFE AND HIMSELF JUST AS SHERIFF ARRIVES

EL PASO, TEX., April 21.—H. M. Harris, an El Paso insurance man and a woman known here as his wife, were dead today as the result of a double shooting Monday at Alpine, Texas. Deputy sheriffs carrying a warrant for Harris' arrest on a charge of bigamy, heard shots as they rapped on his hotel room and on entering found the man and woman mortally wounded.

The slain Harris confessed before dying that he had a wife and seven children in New York.

### LITTLE ROCK.—Governor Brough of Arkansas made public a telegram from Governor H. J. Allen of Kansas again declining to grant the extradition of Robert L. Hill, negro, in jail at Topeka, who is wanted in connection with the Phillips county, Arkansas, race disturbances last fall.

MOORHEAD, MINN.—Mrs. Eliza Lorring Nye, mother of "Bill" Nye, the humorist, died.

### RECEIVER DELANO CONFERRING WITH RIVER CLAIMANTS

Conference with the various interested parties, including both Texas and Oklahoma claimants to the affected lands, consumed practically all of the time of Frederick A. Delano, federal receiver for the property who arrived in Wichita Falls Tuesday. Mr. Delano's headquarters are, for the present, at the William and Mary hotel, where he and his party are stopping. Formulation of an operating policy will not be completed by Mr. Delano until a thorough survey of the situation here is completed, according to present indications, and until he has conferred into the case with all of the parties who have interests involved.

W. A. Keeling, assistant attorney general, W. D. Cope, assistant general, and J. Long Hunter, Texas receiver for the Sparks lands, are expected to remain in Wichita Falls for the next several days attending to the details of the transfer of authority over the lands now controlled by the state's officers.

No complications in the receivership of the lands involved in the boundary suit are expected by local operators from the suit brought on behalf of the Indian owners of lands on the Oklahoma side in the inferior federal courts in Oklahoma by John A. Fain, special counsel for the department of justice inasmuch as it is understood here that in this suit only lands north of the middle of the river are placed in controversy, being claimed by the government as accretions to the holdings of its Indian wards on the Oklahoma side.

Considerable significance is attached by Texas claimants to the language of the supreme court order fixing the boundaries of the lands which are to be under the control of Mr. Delano, the court defining the "middle of the river" as the "mid-channel of said river as the same meanders through the broad stretch of sand" instead of using the definition used by the receiver in asking for this receivership which defined the middle of the river as the "medial line of the broad stretch of sand."

### COMPLAINTS FILED AGAINST THREE MEN TUESDAY

Complaints alleging robbery by firearms were filed Wednesday in Justice H. V. Gwin's court against Marvin Ellis, Arnold Holcomb, and Anderson Lancaster. They are alleged to have robbed with firearms three negro men and a negro woman near Electric Monday night.

Ellis and Lancaster were brought to Wichita Falls Tuesday by John Ligon, city marshal at Electric. Holcomb has not been arrested but a warrant for his arrest has been issued, county officials say. Preliminary hearing is set for Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock in Justice Gwin's court.

### CO-OPERATIVE GROCERY STORE WILL FIGHT COST OF LIVING

JUNCTION CITY, KANS., April 21.—A co-operative grocery store, as an aid in fighting the high cost of living, will be operated here very shortly, it was announced today by the representatives of the Union Pacific shop workers. Four-fifths of the store's capital stock of \$50,000 is owned by shop workers, it is declared.

### MOTION PICTURES WILL BE MADE OF ROUND-UP

That the Round-Up to be staged here May 6-8, is attracting much attention is evinced by the fact that Mr. P. D. Hall of Los Angeles, California, formerly with the Metro Film Corporation and now connected with one of the big movie companies was in the city yesterday and made arrangements with Tom L. Burnett, manager of the Round-Up for producing moving pictures of the big contest.

While Mr. Hall declined to state just what company he represented wires passing back and forth from this city to Los Angeles seem to point conclusively to one of the larger corporations, and the fact that Mr. Hall's contract with Mr. Burnett calls for the exclusive motion picture privilege, to the exclusion of all weekly operators, and further calls for a certain number of side scenes leads to the belief that one of the big western movie stars will be brought to the city and a photo play with a story woven around the Round-Up and with the Round-Up scenes as the principal part of the hero's endeavor will be made here.

Whether the Round-Up production is taken just as it runs or woven into a story with one of the big stars in the cast the picture will be the means of much favorable advertising for this city and Mr. Burnett is being congratulated upon being the means of giving the city this publicity.

### COLEMAN DU PONT CONTROLS REPUBLICANS OF DELAWARE

DOVER, DEL., April 21.—Gov. John C. Townsend Jr. failed of election yesterday as a delegate to the national convention at the hands of the Delaware republican state convention, which named six delegates, the state's full representation to Chicago. The governor's defeat came in the Sussex county caucus, when the delegates elected at last Saturday's primary met and selected the county's two representatives on the delegation. He lacked eight votes of a majority to win and when the vote was announced it was urged by friends that he carry the fight to the floor of the convention, but this the governor decided not to do.

The delegates elected to Chicago, two from each of the three counties in the state, are: Gen. T. Coleman Du Pont, present national committeeman from Delaware; United States Senator L. Heister Ball, James A. Hiron, Alden R. Benson, S. S. Pennewell, former governor of Delaware, and Robert B. Elliott.

The convention adopted a resolution favoring the ratification of the woman suffrage federal amendment recently defeated in the Delaware house of representatives.

### KANSAN OPPOSES MEXICANS BEING BROUGHT INTO TEXAS

TOPEKA, KANS., April 21.—Wholesale shipment of Mexicans into Kansas to solve the harvest help problem was discouraged today by John H. Crawford, state labor commissioner, in letters to labor agencies in Kansas, Kansas City and Texas. Crawford declared Mexican labor lowered the standard of living of American labor and asserted that in the event of such a shipment Kansas cities would be filled with unemployed Mexicans following the harvest.

### TO PERFECT OPEN SHOP ORGANIZATION AT MEETING TONIGHT

Plans for the permanent organization of the association, which is to be effected at the mass meeting scheduled for the 75th district court room, Wichita county court house, at 8 o'clock tonight, have occupied the time of the various committees at work around the headquarters of the open shop association today, according to statement of the present officials of the association.

Among the matters to be disposed of at this meeting are the election of 21 directors for the open shop association, and the arrangement for permanent headquarters from which the campaign is to be conducted. Present headquarters are in the Chamber of Commerce rooms in the basement of the Kemp & Kell building.

### PARKER NAMED GOVERNOR OF LOUISIANA; VOTE IS LIGHT

NEW ORLEANS, April 21.—Although returns are not complete, John M. Parker, progressive party candidate for vice president in 1916, was elected governor of Louisiana yesterday on the democratic ticket over J. Stewart Thompson, republican. The vote was light.

BARTLETT, TEX., April 21.—Ability to ride without a saddle saved Hugh Morrison's life. Morrison was riding his cow pony across the Katy tracks when a northbound passenger train struck them. Unperturbed by the blow that killed his animal, Morrison fell astride the engine pilot and rode safely to the railway station, 100 yards distant.

When he landed at Marseilles yesterday efforts were made to get the aged statesman to talk, but all were futile.

"The war is over, isn't it?" he exclaimed to the correspondent of the Journal. "Yes? Well, all I want is to be left alone."

"What am I going to do? Why, just live until I die." The "tiger" growled out brief impressions of his visit to Egypt while the elephant tusk and mummy he brought back from the land of the Pharaohs were being placed on the dock.

"I got a fine case of bronchitis and found myself stuck in the middle of Egypt with both lungs out of commission, said Clemenceau, from believing in mirages. Evidently I shall not die from it, for I am still more solid than my dear friends think, but it prevented me from visiting Palestine."

### GERMANY TO HAVE ENVOYS AT THE HOLY SEE SAVES ROME

ROME, April 21.—The German government has concluded the necessary negotiations for having all Germany represented diplomatically at the Holy See, and shortly thereafter as Diego Von Bergen will be appointed German ambassador to the Vatican. Heretofore Herr Von Bergen has been Prussian minister to the

### Vatican. Only Bavaria will maintain a legation separate from the embassy.

Almost simultaneously the Holy See will institute a nunciature of the first class in Berlin. Monsignor Pacelli will be appointed Nuncio.

### G. O. P. PEACE MOVEMENT TO BE PASSED AS WRITTEN

WASHINGTON, April 21.—President Wilson has been informed by administration officials that the resolution will never be laid before him in anything approaching its original form, it was learned at the White House today.

Democratic congressmen and administration officials are convinced the resolution either will be delayed indefinitely, defeated in the senate or so changed as to make it practically only a repealer of wartime legislation.

CINCINNATI, April 21.—With the Ohio river rising nearly a foot an hour the local forecaster predicted that a stage of between 45 and 50 feet would be reached by this morning. This will represent a rise of between 10 and 21 feet in 24 hours, a record unequalled in the Cincinnati district.

Be sure your digestive organs are working properly, and that means not only your stomach but your intestines (and these latter should be controlled by diet not by drugs. Consult a doctor on the diet book on this matter).

Exercise. Don't Worry. Be Patient. If you want to deposit the fat on the healthy and artistic spots, get a doctor or gym instructor to tell you the exercises that will do the job, and do them. Do these exercises two or three minutes whenever you get a chance.

We are against it because such a condition would place the worker at the mercy of the unscrupulous employer, who in a majority of instances take advantage of every opportunity to lower the scale of pay and lengthen the hours of toil. Organization and collective bargaining is the only safeguard against oppression, the only guarantee against suffering and want. This right is recognized by the government and it cannot be taken from labor by any committee or chamber of commerce. The movement is going to fail in Wichita Falls as it has in other places where attempted. The fair minded people who think for themselves are not going to be misled, nor are they going to subscribe to the proclamation of the open shop association, that further development of the city can proceed "only along the line WE have laid down." That failure of the open shop movement is certain is proven by the experience of other cities making the attempt. As evidence we cite reports from nearby points, that speak for them themselves:

"The activity of the union workers in the two cities in Oklahoma where the open shoppers are shouting the loudest has resulted in larger increases in wage scales and more complete closed shop agreements than in other cities in the state.

"In Tulsa some time ago the union painters went for a substantial increase and got it. All union painters are working. More recently the Tulsa union carpenters went for a \$12 per week increase and got it. All union carpenters are working and 150 more union carpenters needed.

"In Okmulgee the union painters went for a \$1.25 per hour scale and got it along with a closed shop agreement with every contractor. All the union painters are working.

"All of which proves conclusively that when the show comes there is nothing to the open shop hullabaloo and in reality is having a reverse English effect than that intended by its advocates.

"The non-union lines in the cities mentioned are being diminished and at the present rate it will not be long before 95 per cent of the wage earners in all trades will be in the union ranks.

"Tulsa and Okmulgee are closed shop towns, noise to the contrary notwithstanding."—Oklahoma Federationist.

"Leroy Bristol has resigned from his "lucrative" position as manager of the Dallas open shop association. This information came from President Jackson of the o. s. a. The inference is that the job must have petered out. The open shop association has petered out, and, of course there no longer remains a need for a man to manage a thing that doesn't exist—except in imagination."—Special from Dallas.

## Do Not Endorse Propaganda

Much as we regret having to be a party to the circulation of such propaganda as that which is being published by the open shop association in The Times, in an effort to mislead the public, our contract is such that it is the duty of the employes to perform such work as is turned in by the management so long as the office keeps its contract

with the printing crafts of this city. This explanation is made that members of organized labor throughout the city may understand the position in which we are placed while at the same time being in full accord and in entire sympathy with the fight that is being made against the open shop.

# FISHER-WHALEY TO SINK SECOND TEST WITH ROTARY RIG

Location has been made for a rotary test on the Fisher Whaley lease in Tillman county, it was stated at the offices of the company Wednesday morning. The new test, which will be put down with a rotary to 1,480 feet, the depth of the first hole, which is being abandoned, is 150 feet north-west of No. 1.

Permission was secured from the Indian department, from which the Fisher Whaley company had the lease, to put down the second hole with a rotary, so that the extended delay which has been experienced in the first hole, would not further hold up operations. When it was seen that the first hole would have to be abandoned, officers of the company immediately sought permission to substitute the rotary for cable tools down to the present depth, then standardize and complete the hole to the 2,500 feet required by the department. This permission has been received and work has started on the new test. The casing is being pulled out of the old hole, preparatory to abandoning.

## PRAIRIE VICE PRESIDENT WICHITA FALLS VISITOR

W. S. Fitzpatrick, vice president for the Prairie Oil and Gas company with headquarters in Independence, Kansas, accompanied by W. A. Vinson of Houston, Texas, counsel for the company, and General Roy Hoffman of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma counsel, is a visitor at the local offices of the company on the fourth floor of the Bob Waggoner building. Mr. Fitzpatrick will remain in the city several days, during which time he will visit the various fields in the Wichita Falls district.

Whether the visit has any significance with respect to the possible entry of the Prairie Oil and Gas company into the production end of the game in the Wichita Falls district, none of the visiting officials indicated. So far the Prairie operations in the Wichita Falls district has been confined to the role of purchasers of crude oil, the company being known as the largest purchaser of crude oil in the Mid-Continent field. The production department of the company is carrying on large operations in the Rangely district, and has acquired large holdings in other north and northwest Texas districts.

## REPRESENTATIVE TEXAS CHAMBER COMMERCE HERE

Jean E. Thwaitt, of Fort Worth, field manager of the Texas Chamber of Commerce, is in Wichita Falls, and is enrolling a number of local individuals and concerns in the organization. Mr. Thwaitt expects to remain here several days.

Thirty-nine felony complaints have been filed in the justice courts here the past week, an examination of the justice court records disclose. Twenty-nine of these complaints were filed in Justice R. V. Gwinn's court and ten were filed in Justice C. J. Arrington's court. A major portion of the complaints allege theft of property valued at over \$50.

## REPORT TEMPLE NO. 1 PARKER IS ON SAND

Much interest is aroused in oil circles by the announcement that the H. Temple No. 1 Mattie Parker in Block 18, Palo Pinto county school lands, had an oil sand at 1,350 feet, which filled the hole 50 feet with oil in four hours' time. The sand has been drilled 18 inches, it is stated, being drilled Tuesday. Mr. Temple says that in his opinion the showing is for a well of possibly 300 barrels. The test is about nine miles almost due west of Wichita Falls and round 4 miles due south of Iowa Park. It is a short distance east of the shallow producers on the Munden tract, and opens up an entirely new sand possibility.

The test is being drilled with cable tools, and there is only about 20 feet of open hole.

## CRIMINAL APPEALS COURT REVERSES NEGRO'S CONVICTION

AUSTIN, TEX., April 21.—Because of error by the trial court to "instruct the jury on the law of cooling time as between the first and second shots," the court of criminal appeals today reversed and remanded the case of James Anderson, a negro from Dallas county, who was given the death penalty on conviction of the killing of Clarence Potter, a white man. The court affirmed the case of Jim Charles, from San Jacinto county, appellant having been awarded the death penalty on conviction of the murder of Lester Green; there was no reversible error.

The case of John Cokerley, from Hill county, was reversed and remanded. Cokerley having been given a life sentence in state prison on conviction of criminal assault. Affirmance was had in the case of Manch Grason from Wharton county. Grason was given fifteen years in the penitentiary on conviction of murder.

## TOWNSLEY ALLOWED BAIL BY COURT CRIMINAL APPEALS

AUSTIN, April 21.—George Townsley, charged with the murder of Lon O'Neal at Wichita Falls, was allowed bail today by the court of criminal appeals in the sum of \$10,000. Townsley was denied bail by the district court at Wichita Falls and applied for a writ of habeas corpus to the higher court, which was in the nature of an appeal from the action of the lower court.

"The evidence does not satisfy our mind that there is proof of a capital crime, to the degree that in the due administration of the law a jury would probably inflict the death penalty," said the court.

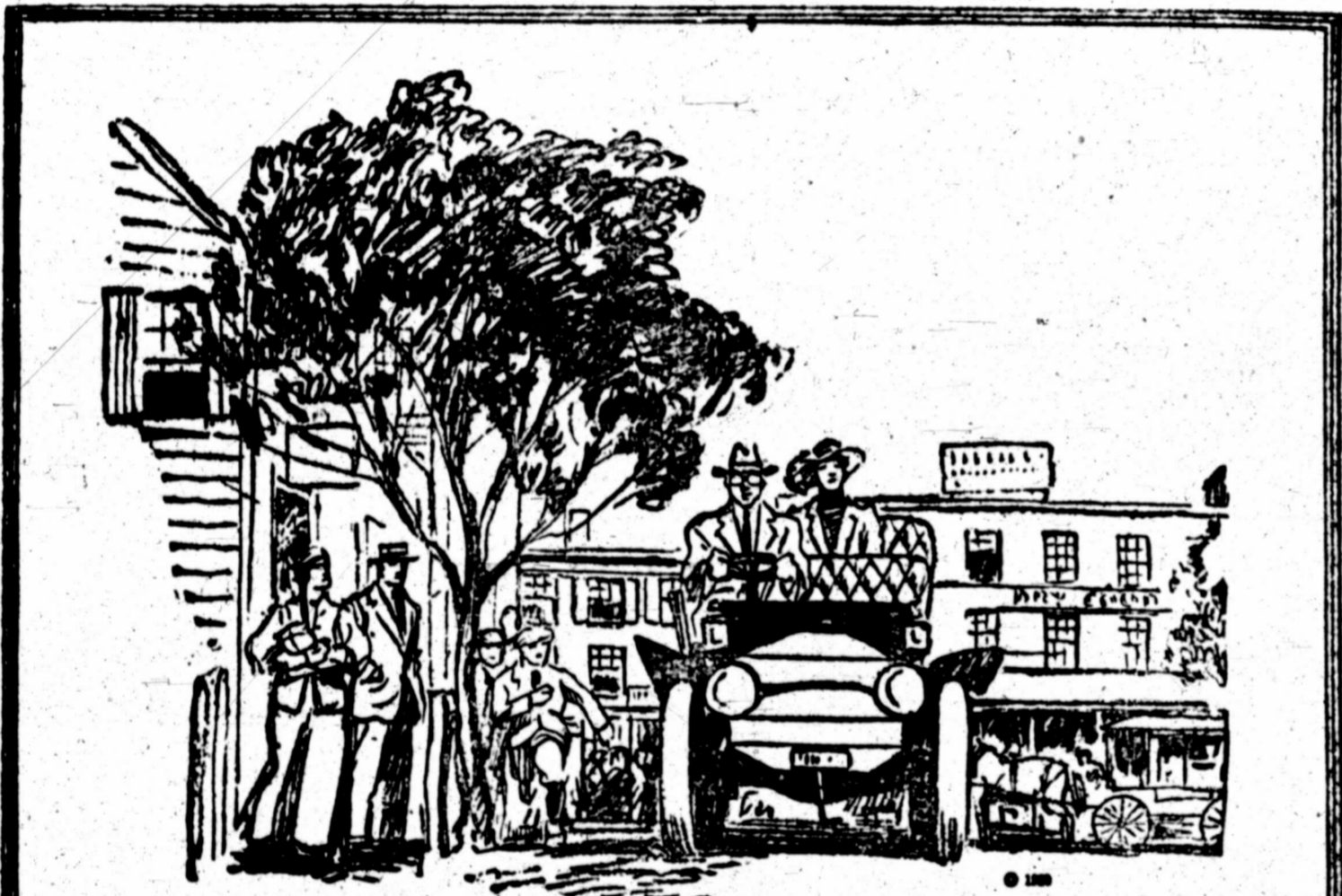

# NEWS OF WEST TEXAS

## PEOPLE OF ELECTRA RAISE MONEY TO CONTINUE SCHOOLS

By H. A. STROUD.

ELECTRA, TEX., April 21.—The people of Electra met a gala in the local schools at a mass meeting last night when their patriotism caused them to dig down in their pockets and raise \$7,000 to provide for the continuation of the schools until the end of the term.

At the beginning of school the teachers were receiving as low as \$70 per month as salaries and the school board meeting each teachers' pay was increased \$20 per month in order to give them a living wage. This caused a sum of \$4,000 more than last year for the operation of the school. An additional expenditure of \$2,000 was made for installing sewer system and providing modern water.

The meeting was a solemn affair and those were willing to admit that the school would be closed. Several addresses were made stating the necessity of closing the schools this week with the result that a number of patriotic citizens rose to their feet and guaranteed the money. A subscription was taken which resulted in over \$3,000 being raised at the meeting itself. Committees were appointed to raise the balance today and it is expected that the fund will be in the treasury before night.

Electra has a school with a first class rating and has affiliations with all state schools.

A deal has finally been concluded with the W. T. Waggoner interests for the purchase of lands adjoining the city of Electra which will add to the city which will be platted and sold. The deal was closed last week, Karl W. Will and Geo. F. Thompson being the buyers. The purchase price is understood to have been \$750 per acre for approximately 40 acres.

Electra has reached the point where future growth depended on the opening of a new townsite. The old town, as planned by Sol Williams several years ago has been built up until there were very few available lots left for building locations. The chamber of commerce and the entire town is behind the new addition, as it is one of the strongest items to the future building of the city.

There have been numbers of people after the Waggoner interests for a period of three or four years to secure this acreage, but all have failed until the Thompson bunch finally succeeded.

The chamber of commerce of this city is planning a banquet to be held the latter part of this week or the early part of next for the purpose of outlining a plan for permanent development and to arrange to take care of the through-going people who are clamoring at Electra's doors.

A consistent advertising campaign is now being worked out by the publicity department of the chamber, which provides for an elaborate booklet containing data regarding the city as a supply center and description of the oil fields. A newspaper advertisement campaign in leading daily newspapers is also being urged.

## FARMERS OF MUNDAY SECTION PROSPERING TOWN IS GROWING

MUNDAY, TEX., April 21.—Munday is a good town every day in the week. Farmers in the Munday section are in a more prosperous condition than in 20 years. The lands they till are among the richest in the southwest. Bank deposits of the two local banks are more than half a million. Thirty per cent of the enormous cotton crop of 1919 is yet in possession of farmers.

This town claims to ship more wheat, maize, oats and corn than any other town its size in Texas. Last year was the first year since 1900 that any grain was shipped into Munday, according to well informed Mundayites. With the single exception, great quantities were exported.

A few years ago W. A. Baker of the firm of Baker-Campbell Mercantile company, and for 20 years one of the leading business men of this section, shipped into Munday three registered Jersey cows by express from the famous Beaumont Jersey farm of Salem, Va. This was the beginning of a great dairying industry, until now there is hardly a farmer in the Munday section who does not own one blooded Jersey dairy cow. The result has been the production of thousands upon thousands of gallons of milk and cream, much of which is being shipped to creameries at Fort Worth and Wichita Falls.

Munday is in the throes of a significant building campaign. It has been retarded sharply by inability to get material. The first National bank is building a new brick to be occupied by a mercantile house, postoffice and other enterprises. J. M. Terry is building a 21-room brick hotel. The First National bank plans a handsome new brick building. George Isbell has sold his old garage and will build a modern brick garage. A number of other brick buildings have been planned. The city has a modern flouring mill running constantly and grinding locally grown wheat and corn. The schools employ 10 teachers and the population is expected to increase to 100 this year.

## PRATT WELL IN YOUNG COUNTY STARTED FLOWING

This company is especially well equipped for drilling and will rush work to completion on this test. ## U. S. EMPLOYMENT SERVICE OFFICE AT STAMFORD

STAMFORD, TEX., April 21.—Effective April 20 the United States department of Labor will open an employment service office in connection with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to handle the labor situation in West Texas and to clarify, through publicity manager of the organization, has been appointed district superintendent, with headquarters here.

During the world war Texas had 32 U. S. employment service stations, five of which were situated in West Texas, Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Abilene, Brownwood and San Angelo. These five offices sent thousands of men to war work in the east and south and worked effectively for the early winning of the war. From the Abilene office which had jurisdiction over 21 West Texas counties not less than 7500 men were sent out for the government. Of these 31 counties Jones county, of which Stamford is the largest town, was the banner sending more than twice as many as any other county in the district.

Last fall the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, in addition to its other multitudinous services, was called upon by practically every community in the west to find cotton pickers and laborers, with the result that it imported thousands of laborers, saving this region hundreds of thousands of dollars. Now the organization will cooperate with the department of labor and through the latter's offices and state federal directors will be enabled to obtain all needed labor wherever it is procurable. The services of this department are free to both employers and employees, whether they be members of the organization or not. This new department will endeavor to enlighten all persons desiring positions and work in the west to the end that they may appreciate the conditions of this section.

## CENTER TEXAS POPULATION IS MOVING WESTWARD

STAMFORD, TEX., April 21.—The center of population in Texas is going west, the 1920 census has not yet been completed, but it is expected to show a startling westward trend in this respect. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has just compiled reports on the movement of the "center of population," with the following reductions:

In 1880 the center of population was 6.4 miles southwest of Thornton, Hamilton county. In 1890, three miles southwest of Otto, Falls county, having moved 6.2 miles north and 12.2 miles west. In 1900 it was 4.5 miles north and west of Otto, Falls county, 2.5 miles further north and 1.5 miles further west. In 1910 it was seven miles west southwest of Waco, McLennan county, or 3.2 miles further north and 22.4 miles further west.

It is confidently believed that the 1920 census will fix the center of Texas population near McGregor, or a little north of it.

## NEW WELL SOUTH OF ELECTRA RENEWS INTEREST THERE

By H. A. STROUD.  
ELECTRA, TEX., April 21.—Interest is again broken in the south fields adjacent to and in the vicinity of the Gulf's Milton No. 1, on a tract No. A-423, three miles directly south of the townsite of Electra.

The sand was drilled into Saturday and was found at 1,420 feet. So far the drill has only some two feet in the sand and the hole is standing 1,000 feet in oil. A bailer was run yesterday and it is stated that better than 40 barrels were bailed out without lowering the fluid in any perceptible degree.

This well is about a mile out of the district and extends the field slightly to the westward.

### \$60,000 WORTH OF OIL SOLD FROM K. M. A. NO. 1

In reading his financial statement to the stockholders Wednesday Mr. Kemp read only one item from the sale of oil, amounting to \$35,000, and overlooking the second item for oil sales in the report, which brought the amount to the higher figures announced. "This amount of oil is exclusive of the amount of oil we have used in the drilling of our No. 2, 3 and 4 wells, a considerable item in itself, which was furnished by the No. 1 well," Mr. Kemp stated.

## HENRIETTA WILL HAVE TOWNSITE TEST FOR OIL

HENRIETTA, TEX., April 21.—Henrietta is to have a townsite test for oil. The company having been organized and arrangements made for a deep test. The location chosen was near the residence of H. M. Foree, in the northeast part of the city. The company holds several thousand acres, about the test and some distance away, some of it being as far out as 12 miles. The Henrietta Independent says:

A derrick is being erected near the residence of H. M. Foree in the northeast part of Henrietta for a deep test oil well. This well is owned by local people, the company having been organized some months ago. They have nearly closed deals with several parties to put down the well, but finally put one through. The company holds several thousand acres located around town, some tracts as far out as 12 miles.

### FURTHER RAISES IN PRICE OF CRUDE ARE EXPECTED BY OPERATORS

Further raises in the price of North Texas crude are expected as:

Pringle was one of the first operators in the Cherryvale (Kan.) field and has drilled many wells in Oklahoma and Kansas. He is now operating in Illinois, Pringle says.

"Clay, Montague, Archer, Cooke and Fannin counties look good to me. There are 40 drills busy in Clay and I understand that fully 25 operations are now under way in Montague county."

"Some of the biggest oil companies in the business are in Cooke county. I have just returned from a trip through that district. The Union Natural Gas company of Pittsburg is in Cooke; also C. B. Shaffer and the Trillicks of Columbus, O. Most of these operations will be carried on from Gainesville, Tex."

"All these operators are after the same sands that are producing oil in the Healdton field and around Ardmore."

"Clay county test will be a deep one. We expect to pick up the line at 4,000 feet up there. However, there is a chance that we will find a paying sand, the Burk Burnett, at 1,700 and 1,800 feet."

### UNITED CHIEF'S FOSTER NUMBER 1 IS READY TO TEST AT 2100 FEET

The United Chief Oil company's No. 1 Foster, Block 833, south of the Burk Cameron well, on an adjoining lease, has the hole cleaned out preparatory to testing the sand drilled at 2,100 feet. Frozen pipe has delayed operations for some time, but now everything is ready. It is declared by officers of the company, to connect up the casing again and make the test. This 2,100-foot sand is said by those who have examined it to be as good as the 1,840-foot sand, from which the Burk-Cameron is producing, and which the United Chief passed up.

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### INDUSTRIAL CENSUS IN WICHITA FALLS IS NOW BEING TAKEN

Taking of another census started in Wichita Falls today. This time it is an industrial census, in which facts and figures about Wichita Falls factories are being collected by the government.

Captain James E. Payne of the census bureau is in charge of the industrial census for the first, second, third, fourth, fifth and seventh districts of Texas, and is now here, getting Sam T. Higgins of Lewisville started on the work in the second census district, which includes Wichita county.

The canvass will include questions involving capital invested, salaried employees, labor, wages, time operated, taxes paid, cost of materials consumed, value of finished product, use of power and fuel.

"All manufacturers are required by law to answer the questions," Captain Payne said. "There is a penalty for failing to give this information. However, no individual factory figures will be made public, the government issuing a bulletin showing the totals for Wichita Falls and not for any individual factory."

"We are very anxious to include every manufacturing establishment, large or small, and every Wichita citizen ought as a patriotic duty to see that this city's industrial importance is fully shown."

### CHARGES AGAINST HOFFLING DISMISSED BY JUSTICE

The charge against Whitley Hoffling filed several days ago alleging theft of property valued at over \$50, was dismissed Tuesday afternoon by Justice C. J. Arrington, following preliminary hearing. The charge against Hoffling was the outgrowth of the Dokey banquet conducted Saturday, April 10, and was brought by the Rev. Parcell E. Bingham, pastor of the First Methodist church. Bingham alleged that Hoffling stole silverware, table linen and glassware valued at \$45 from the basement of the First Methodist church, following the big Dokey banquet. Hoffling, however, convinced Justice Arrington that he did not take the valuables, but that the articles were brought to his home by a friend who had been employed to clean out the church basement following the banquet and that the silverware and other articles were brought to his home through an error on the part of the man employed to clean the
