# GERMANS EVACUATE RUHR BASIN

# OKLAHOMA AND U. S. ORDERED TO SHOW CAUSE WHY TEXANS CANNOT MODIFY RECEIVERSH

WASHINGTON, April 26.—The supreme court today ordered the United States and the state of Oklahoma to show cause on or before May 3 why the petitions of Texas citizens for a modification of the court's recent order placing all the disputed Red River territory under a federal injunction and receiver should not be granted.

The court's order is one of mere routine, putting the attorneys representing the United States and the state of Oklahome on notice of the motions filed by the Texans, according to local attorneys to whom the matter was referred. Consideration of the motions filed by the Texans will be taken up by the court after the date set in this order as well as the briefs of the opposition, if any, filed with the court.

The promptness with which the order was issued, it is believed, is an indication of an intention by the court to expedite the matter as much as pos-

Modification of the original order Modification of the original order was asked in these motions, not only with respect to the territory which will be under the jurisdiction of the receiver, but with respect to the court's order preventing the removal of personal and movable property, such as rigs, tools and the like, which are on the ground the ground.

If the modification of the limits of the territory under the jurisdiction of the receiver is granted, as asked for in the petitions, it will leave the receiver without jurisdiction over any patented lands, and with jurisdiction over only the excess lands in the sand flats beyond the Texas bluffs.



# OKLAHOMA INDIANS LOSE TAX REQUESTS IN SUPPLEME COURT

WASHINGTON, April 26.—The supreme court today set aside Oklahom, supreme court decrees denying judgments to 67 Choctaw and Chickasaw Indian citizens in that state who sought a refund of \$10,000 collected by Love county officials and taxes on land allotted them under a treaty. They claimed the lands were exempt under the treaty.

The court also set aside Oklahoma supreme court decisions dismissing a suit brought against Carter county of ficials for reimbursement of taxes paid to 670 Choetaw and Chickasaw Indians on land granted them by the government. The payments were made while proceedings were pending to determine when such lands were taxable under a treaty made in 1898. The lower court held the payments were voluntary.





the United States, According to reports received by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor from retail dealers in 51 cities, the average family expenditure for 22 articles of retail dealers in 51 cities, the average family expenditure for 22 articles of food did not change in the month from February 15 to March 15. The cost of these articles of food on March 15 therefore, remained only six-tenths of 1 per cent below the cost in January, 1920, which month marked the highest point reached timee 1913. The figures for March, 1920, show an increase of 14 per cent as compared with March, 1919, and an increase of 106 per cent as compared with March, 1913. These comparisons are based on the average retail prices of the following articles, weighted according to the consumption of the average family: Sirloin steak, round steak, rib roast, chuck roast, plate beef, pork chops, bacon, ham, lard, hens, flour, corn meal, eggs, butter, milk, break, potatoes, sugar, cheese, rice, coffee and tea.

Since January, 1919, monthly retail prices of food have been secured for 48 food articles. During the month from February 15, 1920 to March 15, 1920, 19 of the 43 articles increased in price as follows: Oranges, 16 per cent; potatoes, 13 per cent; pork chops and interes and rais.





# 4 000 EX-SOLDIERS SHOULD BE TREATED FOR TUBERCULOSIS

AUSTIN, April 26.-In answer to a statement of the Thomas Dismuke Post No. 52 of the American Legion at Houston, which has raised the issue that there are not sufficient tubercular ex-soldiers in Texas to warrant the erection of a hospital at Kerrville for heir treatment by the Benevolent War Risk Society, from funds solicited throughout the state, Dr. C. W. God dard, state health officer and president of the Benevolent War Risk So ciety, has issued a statement in which he gives the authority for the estimate that 4,000 ex-soldiers in Texas will need treatment for tuberculosis. This estimate he attributes to Major John M. Holt, supervisor of the fourteenth district, United States public health e, who wrote Governor Hobby

Texas contributed 174,000 men national forces in the war. Ten percent of this number, or 17,000 will probably be in some degree disabled. Possibly 25 percent or about 4,000 would represent the number afflicted with tuberculosis. With this as an in-, and the fact that all available space has long since been taken by tuberculosis cases, and that we in conjunction with the fact that we are now obligated to send these cases out of the state and will be forced to do so until adequate facilities are provided, indicates the necessity for im-

mediate action.

Dr. Goddard stated that from the nature of the disease it may be four or live years before there will be 4,000 asses in Texas requiring hospital care, but quotes Assistant Surgeon General I. H. White of the United States rehild. ealth service to show that even with he Benevolent War Risk hospital beconstructed to care for 300 men d the United States public health spitals planned for 500, there will be minimum of 450 excess cares in the mmediate future to be cared for.
