ARMENIAN MANDATE CRITICIZED

DESERTION BY CARRANZA MEN WHO JOIN VILLA AND SONORA REBELS GROWS MORE GENERAL

AGUA PRIETA, Sonora, April 27.—Reported defections among federal Mexican forces through military sources and press dispatches yesterday encouraged Sonora military authorities in their plans for defense of the state against invasion of federal troops. There are now more than 50,000 soldiers who have joined the revolt.

UNDERWOOD LEADS THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY IN SENATE

Alabama Wants Any Reservations Assuring Treaty Ratification

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Senator Underwood of Alabama today was elected democratic leader of the senate by unanimous vote of the minority. The caucus at which Underwood was elected lasted five minutes. Underwood said he had no statement of policies to make at this time and that he did not contemplate an immediate visit to the White House. He intimated that another caucus might be held to discuss party plans.

MAY DEPORT PRISONERS CAUGHT IN WHISKEY RAID

FORT WORTH, April 27.—Instructions have been received by John Keith, department of justice agent from the immigration bureau, to investigate the citizenship status of the seven men recently captured in moonshine raids in Erath county with a view to deporting them if they are found guilty and are shown to be aliens. The men are said to be subjects of Germany, Austria and Italy.

STALLION PRINCE PALATINE BRINGS PRICE OF \$250,000

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 27.—Edward F. Elms, moving spirit in the racing stable campaign under the name of J. W. McClelland, has completed a deal for thoroughbred stallion Prince Palatine for \$250,000, according to a telegram from Lexington, Ky., printed in Louisville newspapers today.

HOUSE IS HEARING CHARGE THAT POST FAVORED RADICALS

Impeachment of Assistant Secretary of Labor May be the Result WASHINGTON, April 27.—Charges that Louis F. Post, assistant secretary of labor, had violated the law in behalf of aliens who have contempt for this government and who are trying to overthrow it, were made before the house rules committee today by Chairman Johnson of the house immigration committee. Mr. Post was not present but was represented by counsel.

SEVERAL PEOPLE INJURED IN OKLAHOMA ACCIDENT

MIAMI, Okla., April 27.—Several persons were injured, none seriously, at a crossing between Picher and Century, north of here, at 9:30 this morning when an engine of the Miami Mineral Belt railroad backed into a motor car of the Northeast Okla. railroad company. Both engines and the motor car were derailed and turned over. About twenty passengers were in the motor car and all were unhurt. Several were taken to the hospital at Picher.

HOLLAND INFORMED EX-KAISER CENTER OF PEACE MENACE

THE HAGUE, April 27.—Responsibility for the continued residence in Stockholm of former Emperor William of Germany was placed squarely and exclusively on The Netherlands government in a note sent by Premier Lord-George of Great Britain on March 16 and published today for the first time in the Orange Book containing documents relating to the demanded tradition of Count Hohenzollern. Lloyd-George's note says: "The allied governments have learned of the royal decree assigning the former emperor to a definite place of internment in Utrecht, this decree being accompanied by an undertaking by the Netherlands government to assume complete responsibility for the custody of the former emperor and control of his correspondence and relations with the outside world."

NEW YORK, April 27.—Net profits of the American Woolen company for 1919 amounted to \$15,513,416, less reserves for taxes and contingencies, according to the annual report issued today.

HOLD OVER CABINET'S FALL MADRID JOFFRE QUILTS SPAIN

MADRID, April 27.—Resignation of the ministry headed by Premier Alcala Salazar will not occur on Wednesday as has been expected, according to indications here today. The premier declared the cabinet would not resign this week because Marshal Joffre of France will be in Madrid on Wednesday and there is apprehension felt over the May Day strike called for Saturday.

OKLAHOMA CITY STORES SELL SUGAR AT 40 CENTS

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 27.—Sugars quoted at 40 cents a pound by several retail profit-takers here this morning, although the prevailing price is 30 cents. Wholesalers disagree as to whether the advance is a sign that the sugar has reached its peak while others assert that a further increase is to be expected this week. It is reported that prominent housewives here are circulating petitions, having already obtained hundreds of signatures, demanding an immediate investigation by the department of justice, appealing direct to Washington.

OHIO HAS HARDING-WOOD FIGHT

COLUMBUS, O., April 26.—Ohio voters today were expressing their preference for presidential candidates and electing delegates to both the republican and democratic national conventions. The principal primary fight was between Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood and Warren G. Harding, Ohio's "favorite son" for the republican presidential endorsement, and for control of the 48 delegates to be chosen for the national convention at Chicago. Gov. James M. Cox is unopposed for the democratic ticket and all delegates are pledged to him.

JOINT TERMINAL FACILITIES BEING WORKED OUT HERE

Joint terminal arrangements at Wichita Falls, participated in by the new Oil Belt road, the Katy lines and the Fort Worth and Denver were being worked out Tuesday afternoon at a conference held in Frank Kelly's office and attended by the operating heads of the roads concerned. In addition to Frank Kelly and Jake Hamon of Ardmore, owners of the Oil Belt road, C. N. Whitehead of St. Louis, vice president in charge of operation of the Katy lines and P. E. Clarity of Fort Worth, vice-president general manager for the Fort Worth and Denver were in attendance at the conference. Among the officials of the Oil Belt road present were B. H. Dally, general manager and P. J. Neff, chief engineer.

ERIE'S PASSENGER SERVICE REPORTED AS NORMAL AGAIN

NEW YORK, April 27.—For the first time since the railroad strike began the Erie railroad today announced that its passenger service was 100 per cent normal. Freight movements also were reported improved, with through freight 60 per cent normal. Other railroads terminating on the New York shore of the Hudson also issued optimistic reports. Many strikers had returned to Jersey City yards, officials said. Railway Claims Denied. CHICAGO, April 27.—Claims of railroad officials that 90 per cent of the normal freight traffic was being moved in the Chicago district today were disputed by manufacturers, who declared receipt of raw materials was seriously curtailed and that outgoing shipments were far below normal.

INQUIRY INTO STRIKE CONDITIONS BEING HELD IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, April 27.—Federal inquiry into strike conditions in New York was conducted today by Judge C. B. Ames, assistant United States attorney general. Ames planned to make a thorough probe of not only the outlay strike of railroad employes but also of the strike of longshoremen and steamship clerks. "Our purpose is to ascertain the facts," said Ames. The inquiry was held behind closed doors. Representatives of business men's organizations and civic clubs were the first witnesses to appear. Constant improvement in the railroad strike situation was reported by railroad managers.

NATION'S EYES CENTERED ON JERSEY FIGHT

Wood and Johnson Contend for Republican Delegates in That State NEWARK, N. J., April 27.—Chief interest in today's preferential presidential primary in New Jersey was focused on republican contests where the voters were asked to express their preference for either Senator Hiram Wood or Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood. Democratic voters were not asked to indicate a direct preference. The unopposed "big four" democratic delegation is pledged to the candidacy of Gov. Edward I. Edwards. Each party will elect 25 delegates to the conventions. The republican state organization has split on the "big four" delegation to the Chicago convention and from a state standpoint, this contest overshadowed the Wood-Johnson contest. The press of the state has featured the "big four" contest as a fight for political leadership between Senator Walter E. Edge and ex-Gov. E. C. Stokes, chairman of the republican state committee. Senator Edge and his colleague, Senator Frelinghuysen, who were left out of the "big four" slate prepared by the state organization, the Italians, led by members of the nobility, who are wintering on the Riviera, rose, and turning toward Prime Minister Lloyd George and Premier Millerand, shouted: "Long live Fiume and the Adriatic. We fought for them, but with 500,000 Italians dead, you gave a whole empire to Greece who murdered your soldiers in the trenches of Albania." Lloyd George and Millerand only smiled resignedly. There was bitter feeling in Italian circles over the failure of the council to settle the Adriatic. SAN REMO, April 26.—(Delayed)—Italians took advantage of a conference in honor of the visiting allied delegations tonight to stage a demonstration in favor of awarding Fiume to Italy. All the allied leaders who had been attending the sessions of the council of premiers, which closed at 8 p. m., were in the audience. When the orchestra struck up the Italian national anthem, the Italians, led by members of the nobility, who are wintering on the Riviera, rose, and turning toward Prime Minister Lloyd George and Premier Millerand, shouted: "Long live Fiume and the Adriatic. We fought for them, but with 500,000 Italians dead, you gave a whole empire to Greece who murdered your soldiers in the trenches of Albania." Lloyd George and Millerand only smiled resignedly. There was bitter feeling in Italian circles over the failure of the council to settle the Adriatic. NEW YORK, April 27.—After rallying from one bear raid, the stock market turned extremely weak, during the last half hour today. New lows for the days were made on many issues. Call money advanced 10 per cent. Reading went under 88, which was seven points off from the high. U. S. Steel was off nearly two points at 97 1/2. After an early high of 324, General Motors reached 14 points. Pan-American Petroleum lost over four points and Mexican Petroleum over eight points.

AUSTIN, TEX., April 27.—Texas Nurses association will hold its annual convention here May 4 to 6, and preparations are being made to entertain 400 delegates.

PARTY LEADERS DO NOT FAVOR EXPENSE AND POSSIBLE STRIFE FOR "POOR HOUSE OF WORLD"

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Rejection of the Allied proposal that the United States accept the mandate for Armenia, was forecast today when Senator Hitchcock, administration spokesman, declared he did not believe the American people would sanction such a proceeding. Added to Republican comment which declared the plan was an attempt to "wish on us the poor house of the world," Hitchcock's attitude was believed to indicate definitely that congress will never give its consent to the project. Senators take the position that the allied statement have stripped the near east of everything they want and now offer to the United States the mandate for Armenia. This mandate involves America in large expenditures and possible war, it is held. "If we accept the mandate, we should most certainly have Constantinople and control of the Dardanelles, but I see no mention of this in the offer of the allies," said Hitchcock. Senator Moses, New Hampshire, said that the action of the allied premiers represents the fresh effort to wish on us "the poor of the world."

INDUSTRIAL COURT STATUTE IN KANSAS PUT THROUGH TEST

PITTSBURG, KANS., April 27.—The law which created the Kansas court of industrial relations was put to a test in the Kansas judicial machinery today. Opponents of the law, centered around Alexander Howat, chief of the Kansas union miners, this morning attacked the law as unconstitutional when the injunction in the case instituted by the state to prevent the calling of a mine strike came up before Judge Curran county district court. On March 30 Judge Curran granted restraining order, restraining Howat and scores of other union officials from calling a strike. The following week the industrial court came to Pittsburg to start an investigation of the mining industry. Howat and other officials ignored subpoenas to appear as witnesses before the court and ignored the order of Judge Curran for them to appear. As a result the industrial court is guilty of contempt and sent Howat and three other officials to jail. After a week in jail at Girard, Ottawa and Iola, the officials gave bond and were out of the state. They are appealing to the Kansas supreme court. Counsel for the miners announced yesterday that they would make a complete attack on the new law, and that they would not be deterred by the law to test as speedily as possible. They deny allegations of a conspiracy made by the state. Mr. R. Hopkins, F. Jackson, attorney for the industrial court, and A. B. Keller, county attorney of Crawford county, represent the state in the proceedings today. The miners are represented by Frank P. Walsh of Kansas City, Byron Coon of Joplin, J. T. Clarkson of Albia, Iowa, and P. H. Calley, the regular attorney for the Kansas miners. The law walked out when Howat was sent to jail and the production of coal for the period from April 10 to the present has been practically nothing. Yesterday 1000 tons of coal were reported working. Fewer mines are working today.

CITY GAS PLANT EXPLOSION SHAKES DES MOINES, IOWA

DES MOINES, IOWA, April 27.—One man was killed and others probably fatally injured by the explosion and destruction by fire of the Des Moines city gas plant at about 5:20 o'clock this morning. The explosion shook buildings all over the city. All newspaper plants and other industries dependent upon gas fuel are at a standstill and thousands went breakfastless.

FAVOR STRICT ENFORCEMENT OF ALL STATUTES IN TEXAS

HOUSTON, April 27.—A resolution demanding that all peace officers of Fort Bend county enforce all laws has been adopted by the Jaybird Association of that county. This action follows a recent grand jury investigation which resulted in a number of indictments being returned for gambling and bootlegging. The Jaybird Association is the controlling political organization of Fort Bend county. JAMES LARKIN GUILTY OF CRIMINAL ANARCHY. NEW YORK, April 27.—James Larkin, Irish labor leader, charged with criminal anarchy, today was found guilty by the supreme court jury before which his case was presented.

SIX TEXAS CITIES SEEK NEXT FEDERATION MEETING

FORT WORTH, April 27.—Fort Worth, Waco, San Antonio, Galveston, Ranger and Dallas have entered the race for the 1921 state federation of labor now in session at Cleburne. The second day's session of the convention began today with the formal business matters before the body and with the various committees, named last night, organizing. The convention will adjourn this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock to visit Fort Worth.

SAVE AND ECONIMIZE CAMPAIGN IS OPENED

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 27.—Ministers of all church denominations, leaders of labor organizations, social workers and city officials today were called in for a campaign started by various women's clubs to discourage buying at present prices, curtail unnecessary spending and economize.

CONTRACT AWARDED FOR FLORAL HEIGHTS METHODIST CHURCH

Contract was let to the J. C. Jopling Construction Co., for the construction of the Floral Heights Methodist church, to start immediately, by the building committee of the church, following a meeting of the men of the church held Monday night at the home of J. M. Bland. The decision to proceed with construction, regardless of the raise in prices was made at this meeting, and plans were made to finance the extra cost, which will bring the church and parsonage expenditures to about \$150,000.

After thorough discussion the men present voted unanimously for the building committee to proceed at once with the building. The bid and proposition of the J. C. Jopling Construction Co. was accepted. Some of the materials to be used in the building have already been purchased and construction will begin well on way. The entire plant including parsonage and grounds will represent an outlay of about \$150,000. Rev. W. L. Tittle, pastor of the church, worked with Mr. Stanley Field in the development of the church plans, which are said to be a model of completeness in every detail. No feature of the life and work of a thoroughly modern and up-to-date church has been overlooked in the building plans. All departments have been thoroughly provided for.

It is said by those familiar with the plan that the church in the city is as complete and complete as this new structure is to be. Special features of the building will include gymnasium and shower bath equipment, a complete kitchen, a dining room, parlors, and one of the largest social rooms for the young people of the church to be found in any church building anywhere. The finances are being handled in a thoroughly business-like way.

CONFEDERATE REUNION MAY BE HELD THIS YEAR AT GALVESTON

Texas is to have the Confederate Reunion this year if plans under consideration at present are fully matured, and Galveston will extend an invitation to the executive board to hold the October reunion in that city, the first Texas city to be the scene of one of the greatest annual events for the entire South, since the reunion was held in Dallas, almost 50 years ago. This probability became known through a telegram, which Judge Edgar Scurry, the secretary of the executive committee, Sons of Confederate Veterans, received Monday night from the Galveston Commercial Association, asking for detailed information concerning the arrangements necessary to entertain the reunion. Judge Scurry, at the suggestion of General K. M. Van Zandt, commander in chief of the Veterans, and the Hon. N. B. Forrest, commander in chief of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, had written Galveston, asking if that city desired to extend an invitation for the reunion.

The Galveston Commercial Association asked for full information by wire immediately, and General Van Zandt, when the Galveston inquiry was repeated to him, authorized Judge Scurry and Commander Forrest to go to Galveston to represent him in the details of an agreement, if it was necessary. A definite decision from Galveston is expected shortly.

MARY DEVEREAUX BOLTON A WICHITA FALLS VISITOR

Miss Mary Devereaux Bolton, a Texas girl who is internationally celebrated as a pianist, and who was one of the group of entertainers with the Over There Theater league who played all over France and Germany, wherever there were American soldiers, is being entertained at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Gardner, 1904 Tenth, and is scheduled to speak at both the Wichita and Rotary club luncheons next week. Miss Bolton is a cousin of Mrs. Gardner.

France has an ardent champion in this Texas girl, who through the great demand made on her in various parts of the state for lectures and entertainment, is able to speak many a word for France, as she saw it, both during her residence there before the war days, and later after the war had brought desolation. Miss Bolton also resided in Berlin, while following her musical studies, and is able to contrast Germany of today, with the Germany of the days of the glory of the house of Hohenzollern.

"Any course which would leave France unprotected would be treachery to the people of France, the friendly, kind, simple living people of the village, the real heart of France," says Miss Bolton. "The France that has received criticism, that has been held up as an example of degeneracy, is not the real France. SUGAR CONSUMPTION REDUCTION IS ASKED BY CHICAGO HOUSES

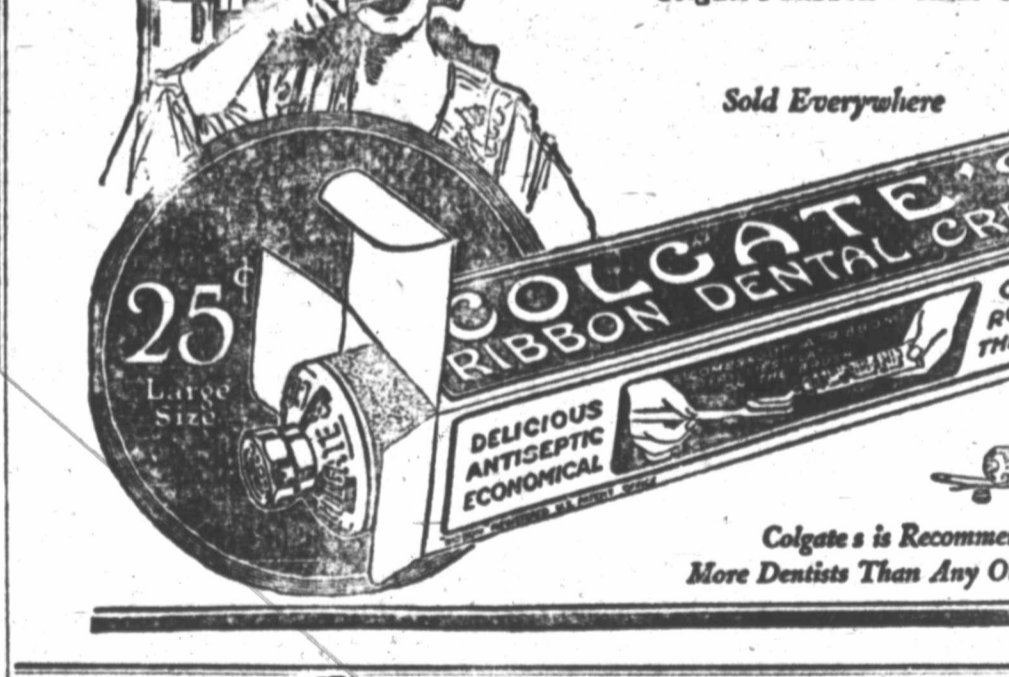

TO INVESTIGATE ASSESSMENTS IN THIS COUNTY

Chamber of Commerce to Investigate Alleged Inequity in Assessments

Tax assessments in Wichita county with relations to the rates of assessments as compared with valuations in other parts of the state are to be investigated by the directors of the Chamber of Commerce at their next meeting. It was decided at the regular meeting Tuesday. This action is taken at the suggestion of T. T. Moore, that the assessed rate in Wichita county, about 80 per cent of the value, is much higher than is general over the state, where the customary assessment is 33 1/3 per cent—resulting in Wichita county, with the higher rate of assessment, paying an amount to the state as taxes out of proportion with other counties in the state.

Recognizing that Wichita county's needs, under present conditions, require considerably more money than in the average counties in the state, Mr. Moore suggests that the property be assessed in conformity with the customary rate prevailing elsewhere, and that the local county rate be raised by the commissioners sufficiently to meet the county's needs, and at the same time equalizing the amount of money in taxes which the state takes from the county with that it receives from other counties.

being: McAdoo total 4,740, 2,820 of it from Texas; Wilson total 4,491, 2,599 of it from Texas. Governor Edwards, whose chief plank is his weakness, got 493 votes in Texas and Governor Cox, who looks to be a real possibility, got only 97. Of Attorney General Palmer's total strength, which is only 1,189, Texas furnished 670 or more than 60 per cent. The democratic standings, with 38,518 democratic votes accounted for, were: Bryan 3,885, Clark 1,555, Edwards 2,649, Marshall 7,593, McAdoo 6,740, Palmer 1,189, Wilson 4,491. Herbert Hoover, whose announcement of candidacy as a republican came at about the time the poll started, got more democratic votes than any of the avowed democratic candidates, remarkable to say, with a total of 9,974. Hoover furthermore, was the choice as a republican of 9,960 democrats and 3,574 members of "other parties," getting very many more of the independent vote than any of the other candidates for either party. General Wood led the republican list, and that too is explained by the location of the vote included, much of it in the east where Wood is strong. Wood, however, showed a considerable strength in every state reporting, getting 1,614 votes in Texas against 1,493 for Hoover, who was next. The others trailed in Texas, Johnson being next with 928 and 350 for Lowden being the next to him.

The newest popular protest against the high cost of things is the "shirt and collar" strike and the personnel of those behind the Chicago movement indicates there is something more than hysteria to it. These strikes and overall and old clothes club, and the like are indicative that a very great many people have reached the point where they are not going to go without making at least a protest. They probably are of greater importance psychologically as indicating the state of the public mind than in being studied out to secure the quickest results. But there are also signs, particularly in the East, that they are getting some tangible returns, and the Broadway overall parade the other day was confessedly the cause of a big Broadway store featuring its \$25 suits and topcoats that it had intended to make a big "drive" on at \$29.50 each. "This store does an annual business of about \$600,000 or \$2,000 a day," the manager told a reporter, "but our sales today show only \$1,200. Business seems to be approaching a dead stop. I don't know where this 'overalls' movement is going to end."

We get further insight into the overall club movement in the report that the rain which fell on the overall parade in New York the other day caused the denim's stripes to fade through on and ruin a parader's \$100 suit and \$30 silk shirt.

With Other Editors
 THE HABIT OF GOOD READING.
 (Ohio State Journal.)
 Efforts to develop the habit of reading good books are being made by the state department of education. It is one of the lines of work put under way to interest the public, the present and the prospective teacher in the value of reading. It ought to bring large results, because it produces so much of value and gives the reader so much of pleasure. There are good books obtainable at low cost and they contain a wealth of delightful entertainment and educational value. So many excellent judges have compiled lists of books for general reading that one needs make no mistake in selections. State Superintendent Pearson, who has found time each day in his busy life to read part of a book, says reading is an antidote for a disagreeable old age. It is his opinion that work in the schools ought to be so directed that it would provoke investigation of books, lead the boys and girls into intimate touch with the best authors and lay the foundations for a lifetime of reading. That teacher who is familiar with good literature and has an acquaintance with the standard authors, or some of them, has an advantage over the teacher who has missed that delight. But, while teachers should read that they might be better equipped to teach, reading should be one of the daily occupations of every man and woman in the state. Libraries are available, good books are plentiful. There are delightful hours if you will but use the opportunities at hand.

Does a Cold Glass Crack When Hot Water is Applied?
 (Copyright, 1920, by Wheeler Syndicate, Inc.)
 The fact that heat expands substances, while cold contracts them is responsible for the cracking of glass when the temperature is suddenly changed. The application of hot water to a cold glass causes the tiny particles of the glass nearest the water to expand very rapidly, more so than those on the opposite side of the glass. The expanding particles tear themselves away from those which are not expanding and the crack results. Precisely the opposite effect is produced when cold water is applied to a hot glass. The particles nearest the water contract and tear away from those which are still expanded, causing an immediate "crack" or fissure.
 Because of this unequal expansion, it follows that the thicker a glass is the more likely it is to crack and, for this reason chemists and others who use hot liquids pour them into very thin glass, where the particles can all become heated at the same time.

EVERYBODY ELSE'S JOB LOKKS BETTER TO ME THAN MINE

MICHIGAN OFFICIALS TAKE PRISONER AWAY AT NIGHT
 PONTIAC, MICH., April 27. — The body of Miss Vera Schneider, 20, telephone operator, killed here Saturday, was taken to Elkhart, Mich., today for burial, while authorities here and at Detroit continued their search for her assailant.
 Detroit police were checking up the statements of Alfred Webb and his wife in effort to substantiate or disprove Webb's alibi.
 Webb was spirited away from Pontiac to Detroit last night, while a crowd of 1,500 persons, including many women, surrounded the county jail threatening violence. He was held without a warrant pending investigation of his story to the effect that he had known the Schneider girl and accompanied her home from work two nights last week, but had spent last Saturday and Sunday with his wife at Detroit. Mrs. Webb corroborated the statements.

RULING REGARDING SEPARATE RETURNS COMMUNITY INCOME

Income from community property may be divided between husband and wife in Texas in making returns to the federal government, according to a recent ruling from the commissioner of internal revenue, but income from salary cannot be divided in making return.

L. Shields, deputy collector of internal revenue in this district, has received a copy of the ruling of the commissioner which follows:

A husband and wife may not divide the salary of the husband or of the wife for the purpose of reporting such salary in separate returns for income tax purposes.

Under the laws of Texas and Washington property owned by the husband or wife prior to marriage remains the separate estate of the owner. Accordingly income, such as rents and interest from such property should be reported by the husband or wife separately after marriage.

The legal owners of community property (property acquired after marriage) in the states of Texas and Washington are the husband and wife jointly in equal shares, and the income accruing therefrom is the joint income of the husband and wife in which each is entitled to one-half. Such income may therefore be divided for income tax purposes and the husband and wife may each report in separate returns one-half thereof. This is held to be true notwithstanding that in law the husband is given the right to manage and control community property the same

as his separate estate and that as regards personal property he and he alone may dispose of it. (Ruling 21-13-528, Sec. 233, Art. 401, modified.)

POWELL OIL CO. LETS CONTRACT FOR 8 WELLS

The Powell Oil company, which has lately undertaken operations in both the Wichita and Wilbarger county fields, on Friday last let a contract to the Texomax Producing and Refining company, which calls for the drilling of eight wells on two leases held by the company.

Four wells will be put down in Block 523, Wichita county, where a lease on 20 acres has been taken, and four on Block 101, Wilbarger county, where another lease on 20 acres has been secured.

The acreage in 523 is in the north-west corner of the block, lying directly between the Sisley well, which is reported on the sand, and the Burk-Cameron well, which is producing around 300 barrels daily.

The Wilbarger lease, in the south-east corner of block 101, lies approximately 7,000 feet northwest of the Sisley gusher, which created such a sensation in oil circles a short time ago. This well, according to authentic reports from the field, Wednesday morning, put over 75 barrels of oil in the tank in less than an hour and a half.

W. O. (Dump) Powell, the president of the company, has dictated an energetic and aggressive drilling policy, which will assure the rapid development of both leases.

According to Mr. MacDonald, the secretary-treasurer of the Powell organization, the contract with the drilling company provides for the starting of actual drilling operations on the lease within 10 days.

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LIND TELLS SENATE AMERICANS WANTED HUERTA RECOGNIZED

Some Details of His Journey There in 1913 as Envoy Given at Hearing

WASHINGTON, April 27.—John Lind, former governor of Minnesota, described today before the senate committee investigating Mexican affairs, his 1913 efforts as special emissary of President Wilson to get the late Victoriano Huerta to abdicate. Mr. Lind refused to detail conversations with the Mexican chief of state, but gave instructions given him by the president except as they were outlined in printed memoranda which he submitted.

"My object, according to my instructions, was to bring about an adjustment between the contending powers," he said, "so that the country have peace and a de facto government be set up which the United States could recognize."

"That involved the elimination of Huerta, did it not?" he was asked.

"Not necessarily," Mr. Lind replied. He referred to President Wilson's memorandum published at the time, which suggested a general armistice and an election at which Huerta would not be a candidate. American financial aid for Mexico was promised.

Americans in Mexico at the time, he said, wanted Huerta recognized. Those engaged in agriculture, he added, desired intervention by the United States, while "the American mining interests in the north were against it."

"I though I'll admit that the struggle for power among a few is to some extent the cause of Latin-American disorganization," Mr. Lind said, "the primary causes, it seems to me, are social and economic. In the tropical plantations owned by Americans I saw men working almost as slaves, guarded by men with revolvers and whips, and locked up at night. The mines in the north and commercial enterprises, of course, are carried on in a different fashion."

"Don't you think American influence and ideas has gone far toward ameliorating these conditions of Mexican labor," the witness was asked.

"I don't think the influence of Americans has gone far in the south," Mr. Lind replied. "I think more has been done by Mexican workmen who have lived in the United States."

ARSON COMPLAINTS AGAINST TWO FOR BIG NEWTOWN FIRE

Two men, both employees of oil companies in the northwest extension field, were arrested at Burkburnett last night on charges of arson in connection with the big oil field blaze in the Waggoner pool last week that destroyed three blocks of Newtown, and cost the lives of two young women. The men were arrested by Frank Watkins, deputy sheriff at Burkburnett. The two men made a statement to Assistant County Attorney John M. Martin Tuesday. It is understood they implicated a third man, notorious in the oil regions as a gambler and gunman. This third man, according to evidence said to be in the possession of the county attorney, paid the oil field workers arrested last night, a large sum of money to ignite a quantity of crude oil in the rear of a Newtown eating establishment, starting the big blaze which almost wiped out the mushroom oil field settlement.

The two men held by the county attorney are said to be characters known throughout the oil regions as "bad men," and several serious charges are now pending against them, county officials say. In case they are properly connected with the Newtown fire the charge against them will be both murder and arson, inasmuch as they were directly responsible for the death of the two young women who lost their lives in the Waggoner City rooming house. Two young men escaped death by jumping from a flaming hotel. They sustained serious injuries in the leap from the burning house.

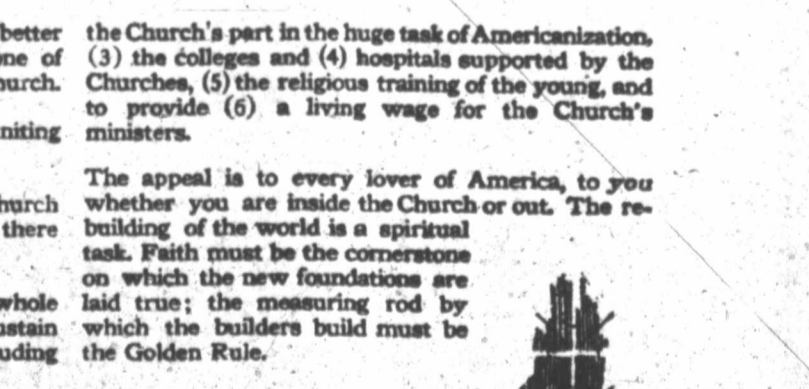

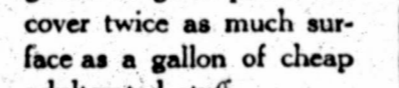

**SUNDAY SHOW ARRESTS
MADE BY CITY AS WELL
AS COUNTY AUTHORITIES**

The City of Wichita Falls has entered the lists as a combatant in the struggle against Sunday amusements, according to an announcement given out Monday afternoon by Police Chief Robert Goodfellow.

The theaters are located in the city limits of Wichita Falls and the police department has jurisdiction in the enforcement of the Sunday closing law, the chief of police declared when interviewed Monday afternoon. Chief Goodfellow sprang a rather surprising coup Sunday afternoon by arresting seven local motion picture men. Deputy sheriffs later visited the theaters and again arrested the motion picture men. They were escorted to the court house where five pleas of guilty were received but one theater man, Charles Kirkpatrick, manager of the Wichita theater, refused to enter a plea of guilty and will contest his case. This is perhaps the first case of contested jurisdiction wherein the city and the county are involved in the recent history of Wichita Falls.

The six show men to enter pleas of guilty were H. M. Craig and H. R. Picklin of the Wichita, L. V. Ford and W. P. Page of the Majestic and M. P. and Fred Hoon-schidt of the Gem. They were arraigned before Judge J. P. Jones of the county criminal court Sunday afternoon and assessed fines of \$25. County officials take the stand that the city, although having concurrent jurisdiction with the county in the enforcement of the Sunday closing law, is really interfering in the enforcement of the law inasmuch as the city entering the contest as this stage is liable to shroud the real contest by causing a question of doubtful jurisdiction to arise. County officials point to fights waged against Sunday amusements in other cities and declare that the enforcement of the law there rested entirely upon the shoulders of the county attorney and not upon those of the police commissioner.

Meanwhile the motion picture men face the rather unique problem of having paid a fine in county court for an offense and to have the same offense registered against them in corporation court.
