

WOOD WINS IN NEW JERSEY PRIMARY

REVOLT REACHES CHIHUAHUA, LEADERS SAYING SPREADS TO NORTH WITH NO BLOODSHED

AGUA PRIETA, Sonora, April 28.—Mazatlan, Sinaloa, a port on the Pacific coast of Mexico, is being attacked by revolutionary forces under General Angel Flores, according to an unconfirmed report received at military headquarters here today. General P. Elias Calles announced the attack had been expected since yesterday.

AUGA PRIETA, Sonora, April 28.—Approximately 4,000 Carranza troops at Parral and Jimenez, Chihuahua, revolted yesterday, according to information given out here today by General P. Elias Calles, commander of the revolutionists in northwest Mexico.

AGUA PRIETA, Sonora, April 28.—The revolutionary movement initiated in Sonora has spread into Chihuahua where additional Carranza military leaders were reported to have joined the rebels, according to press and Sonora official advices available here today. Sonora revolutionary leaders said it was indicated the Carranza government rapidly was losing ground in northern Mexico, without bloodshed.

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FRENCH FORCE TO LEAVE TWO RUHR SECTIONS

Frankfort and Darmstadt to be Given Up After Germans Have Withdrawn

PARIS, April 28.—Premier Millerand and the chamber of deputies today on the results of the supreme council meeting at San Remo, said that the Frankfort and Darmstadt territories would be evacuated by the French as soon as the allied commissions have established that the German forces have the number allowed by the convention of August, 1919, had been withdrawn.

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GENERAL ALSO GIVES HARDING HARD RACE IN OHIO, STANDING ONLY 12,281 VOTES BEHIND HIM

According to the latest reports from New Jersey and Ohio, General Leonard Wood led Senator Hiram Johnson for the republican presidential nomination in the former state and was not so far behind Senator Warren G. Harding in the popular vote in the latter. Likewise, he received several delegates in Massachusetts.

NEWARK, N. J., April 28.—Major General Leonard Wood, who secured 26 of that state's 28 delegates to the Chicago convention. However, the vote was very close, seldom showing a margin of more than 533 for Wood against Johnson. It is hardly probable that the exact status there of two republican candidates will be known until for a day or two.

LANDSBERG BUYS BRITISH BREWING INTERESTS IN U. S.

Believes Country Will Force Sale of Drinks With Alcohol.

CHICAGO, April 25.—Edward Landsberg, for many years president of the United States Brewing company, represented the extreme in optimism today.

Landsberg has purchased the entire American stock of the Milwaukee and Chicago Breweries, Ltd., an English concern, it was announced.

By the purchase he becomes one of the largest holders of breweries stocks in the United States.

Despite the present indications of brewery production, an optimistic view of the future of the brewing industry, Landsberg said today. "It is my opinion that public sentiment eventually will force a more reasonable tolerance of mild alcoholic beverages and that the present radical national prohibition law will be greatly modified."

ANSON BEST ADMITS KILLING YOUNG GIRL PROSECUTOR STATES

PONTIAC, MICH., April 25.—Anson Best, formerly of Flint, Mich., confessed early this morning, according to Prosecutor Glenn C. Gillespie, that he killed Miss Vera Schneider, 15, telephone operator, whose body was found early Sunday morning on the porch of an unoccupied dwelling.

Best, according to the prosecutor, had been questioned throughout the night and broke down after being identified by a workman as having been seen while washing his hands in the Clinton river near the scene of the crime a few minutes after its discovery.

"She asked me to kill her," Best was quoted as saying. He even declared, according to the prosecutor, that he met Miss Schneider for the first time last Saturday night.

The confession, Mr. Gillespie declared, was made in the presence of a stenographer and several police officers and gave no other reason than Miss Schneider begged Best to end her life because she was tired of living and was "simply in the way of others." She even drew the handkerchiefs from his pockets and asked him to tie them together and place them about her neck. Best was quoted as saying: The officers said Best told them that when he compiled her at first refused to pull the handkerchiefs tight, but she begged him to do so, saying she was ready to die.

Continuing the statement quotes Best as saying he left the body and walked to the river nearby, where he washed his hands, which had been slightly blood stained from blood that came from the girl's mouth. He retraced his steps to the place where the body had already been found by officers and when stopped by a policeman, even took a searchlight, went to the porch and looked at the girl's face.

Best was released at that time, but was re-arrested Monday night when a workman had told of seeing a man coming up from the river shortly after the body was discovered.

TEXAS PROFESSOR UNDER \$500 BOND ON BIGAMY CHARGE

AUSTIN, April 25.—Dr. E. W. Hawkes, professor of anthropology at the University of Texas, is under \$500 bond awaiting an examining trial upon charges of bigamy preferred by a woman who claims to be his wife and gives her name as Mrs. Flora Hawkes. She arrived in Austin Monday from Milwaukee with her three small children, and she says that after an interview with Professor Hawkes, she filed the charges against him.

Hawkes told police officers he is divorced from the woman. He has been married to his present wife, with whom he is living here, twice.

Hawkes is an expert on physical measurements and served in the army during the war in this capacity. He is said to have lived three years among the Eskimoes, studying them. At the university he has had charge of measurements of students in gymnasium classes.

LIVING COST GOES UP 94.8 PER CENT SINCE JULY, 1914

BOSTON, April 25.—The average cost of living for American wage earners advanced 7 per cent between November, 1919, and March, 1920, according to a report by the National Industrial Conference, and announced today. This makes a total increase in the cost of living of 94.8 per cent since July, 1914, and of 41 per cent within one year, the report said.

Food prices in March were 100 per cent higher than the average prices before the war, according to quotations from more than 2,000 dealers in 51 cities. Rents averaged 58 per cent higher than 1914 and clothing advanced 177 per cent according to figures furnished by 309 dealers in 72 cities.

POLES ADVANCE IN UKRAINE TO EXPEL "FOREIGN INVADERS"

WARSAW, April 25.—A general advance by Polish forces along a 130-mile front in the Ukraine was announced in today's communique by the Polish general staff. The movement, it is set forth, is for the expulsion of the "foreign invaders" (Russian bolsheviks).

The Poles covered about 50 miles the first day of their forward movement, their advanced line taking them within 60 miles of Kiev.

The advance was explained in a proclamation issued in the name of General Pilsudski, head of the Polish state, and posted in cities and villages through which the Polish forces marched. The document announced that after the expulsion of the foreign elements the Poles would remain in the Ukraine only until an authorized Ukrainian government should take control.

In Sweden the public houses are closed on Saturday—day while the savings banks are kept open until midnight.

TICK ERADICATION CASE DISMISSED BY HIGH COURT

AUSTIN, April 25.—In dismissing the application of W. C. Smallwood from Gregg county, for a writ of habeas corpus, the court of criminal appeals today did not pass on the constitutionality of the tick eradication law which was involved. The application was dismissed because of defective record. Smallwood was convicted under this law and assailed its constitutionality.

The court affirmed the case of H. L. Walker from Harris county. Walker was given the death penalty on conviction of the murder of a man named O'Leary in April, 1919. The court found no reversible error. The case of Shelby Jolly, from Morris county, was reserved and remanded. Jolly was given a term of 25 years in the penitentiary, the charge being that "the entry was made to contain M. E. Stegall and that nitroglycerine, gun powder and dynamite were used." The case was reserved because the state failed to prove beyond the kind of explosive which was used, said the opinion.

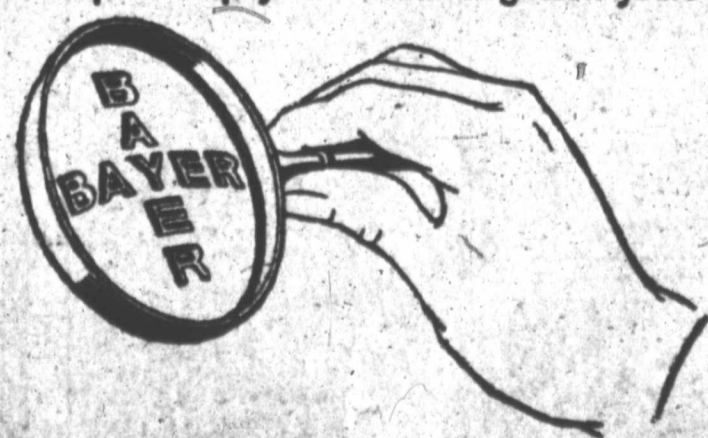

No matter how much you may approve of the many constructive acts of the Wilson administration and no matter how much you may deplore the attitude of selfish sulking in the hour of the nation's peril on the part of the administration's chief opponent in the campaign now being waged to repudiate the administration and the democratic record of the past seven years you will register no political influence if you do not attend the mass conventions at two o'clock next Saturday afternoon at your usual voting places and vote for delegates to the county convention whom you know are supporters of the administration.

THE OHIO PRIMARY.

By running Senator Harding a close race in the latter's home state, Ohio, General Wood has pretty much eliminated the Ohio statesman as a contender in the first division for the republican presidential nomination, and at the same time has advanced his own strength and will renew the enthusiasm of his supporters. General Wood's candidacy had been overshadowed somewhat in the past ten days by the remarkable showing of Hiram Johnson.

Either party is likely to need Ohio to win in November and Tuesday's primary is likely to give General Wood's stock a big boost.

Returning from Massachusetts and New Jersey were also favorable to the military man.

REPUBLICANS ALSO UP IN THE AIR.

(Houston Chronicle.)
So far as confusion goes the democrats have nothing on their opponents. At San Francisco promises an appropriate setting for another "cross of gold" speech, Chicago seems likely to afford an opportunity for a 1912 stampede. If democracy has her beads and her Baileys, republicanism has its Johnsons and its Borahs.

Whatever the Wilson administration may face by way of opposition and revolt, it faces nothing more serious than does the old guard. There is, in fact, no such thing as solidarity in either party. Both are split, not only one way, but many. Both are divided on most of the principal issues. If either is able to hang together through the campaign, it will be through compromise and sidestepping.

The republicans are, of course, helped by the strain and discontent which have developed as an aftermath of the war. This comes about, however, not from anything they have done, or anything they profess to stand for, but simply and solely from the fact that they are the out party.

So far as policy goes, they have none. As to economies, military measures, foreign relations, etc., they are as hopelessly divided, if not more so, than are the democrats.

Their platform is bound to be a medley, if, indeed, it does not precipitate a bolt. Their candidate is bound to be unsatisfactory to considerable minorities, if, indeed, they do not find themselves with more than one candidate.

As things now stand, the republicans can not write a plank on the peace treaty, the industrial situation, the question of armament, soldier bonuses, railroads, etc., which would be acceptable to all factions of the party.

Republicans do not stand agreed on anything more recent than the Spanish war. If, indeed, they stand agreed on that. Some of them are as hotly opposed to prohibition as Governor Edwards. Some of them are as heartily in favor of a league of nations as is President Wilson. Some of them are as reactionary as Mr. Bailey. Some of them are as radical as Mr. Townley.

Think of Johnson and Penrose sitting down to a love feast, or Calder and Macomber, or McCormick and Holt.

The girl came into a room where I was sitting the other evening. They both wore dark blue silk frocks.

One of them had about her neck a pendant of platinum set with diamonds. I suppose it cost at least three times what the corals cost, if the stones were imitation, and 50 times if they were genuine.

Take a gray dress, how much character you can give it by the skillful use of some contrasting color.

Yellow, for instance, is always both smart and artistic with gray.

Robin's egg blue is most effective with the right shade of gray.

Emerald green and gray is another combination which an artistic friend of mine uses to good effect.

You Must Choose Carefully.

VEGETABLE COOKING OILS IN UNIFORM CONTAINERS

AUSTIN, April 28.—Consideration of the adoption of standard sizes of containers for vegetable cooking oils was begun today before the department of markets and warehouses, with representatives present from manufacturers and from housewives leagues throughout the state.

NEWS OF WEST TEXAS

TEST IS PLANNED MILE AND HALF EAST OF VERNON LIMITS

By A. C. McDONNELL

VERNON, TEX., April 28.—Drilling operations will begin soon on acreage east of the city limits of Vernon. The Vernon Home Oil Company, which has about 3,000 acres propose to begin drilling operations in May. The location is one and a half miles east of Vernon. D. L. Green, L. G. Hankins and other local operators are behind the project.

The Powell Oil Co. has been formed in Vernon to wage an extensive drilling campaign on their acreage in Wilbarger and Wilbarger counties. One tract of 20 acres in Wilbarger county lies about one and one-half miles of the Sigler well in Block 101 and four wells will be drilled on the acreage. The tract in Wichita county is located in Block 322, approximately 1200 feet of the Burk-Cameron producer, upon which four wells will be drilled. W. O. Powell is at the head of the organization and E. MacDonald is secretary-treasurer.

The railroad yards are full of rig timbers and heavy trucks and wagons are busily engaged in transporting heavy drilling materials to the various locations. Lack of material and fuel oil is holding back development to some extent. Inability of railroads to deliver shipments of drilling machinery has caused many wells that were ready to spud, to postpone for a time operations. There are 434 cars of lumber and material enroute to Vernon and a problem is confronting the railroads as to how they will handle this unusual supply.

Higgins-Castlebury Test
The Higgins-Castlebury well in section 86, block 14, adjoining section to the famous Castlebury gasser and about a mile and a quarter of the Sigler well, created quite a furor in oil circles Tuesday by the report that a pocket of gas had been encountered around 850 feet, which gave evidence of being a good find. The log of this well is running identical to that of the 3,000,000 gas well on the adjoining section. The fraternity is betting on this test being the next producer in the Sigler pool. The well is being drilled by Burke-Wagoner.

There is nothing new developed by the Sigler No. 1, Wharton. The well still flows by heads every 26 hours, each head about 150 barrels. Storage is erected and the oil is being sold to wells drilling nearby for fuel.

The Gardner well in block 15 and the Frost-Pitts well in the same block have developed something unusual in the annals of drilling experience in North Texas.

The Garner well in section 48, drilled to a depth of 850 feet before encountering a drop of water. When this depth was attained a mighty flow of fresh water was encountered. No surface water was encountered during the drilling, which was extraordinary. The well of Frost-Pitts on the Vaughn farm in section 6, has been drilling through hard lime rock since they attained a depth of 1050 feet. Drillers have been at work for six months on this test and are now down over 1600 feet, drilling in hard asphalt for over six hundred feet, which is the hardest formation ever encountered in North Texas. Drillers of experience say both tests are developing something new in drilling.

It is reported that the Tee-Pee in section 24, block 13, have settled all litigation in connection with its title, and there should be some developments at this well in a few days. A few weeks ago this well blew mud, slush and oil into the crown block.

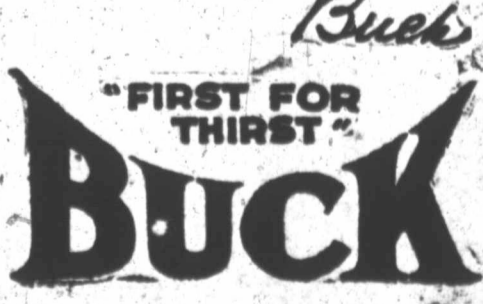

FROM SMALL BEGINNING IN 1916 TEXHOMA OIL AND REFINING CO. ONE OF CONSPICUOUS SUCCESSSES

With the report from an authoritative source that the management of the Texhoma Oil and Refining company has recently declined an offer running into millions of dollars for the company's plants and holdings, attention is again strongly attracted to one of the most conspicuous successes of the Wichita Falls oil district. For in four short years this concern has grown from the small beginning of one shallow well to its present holdings, which include production which reached 5,400 barrels per day last week, two refineries running 5,000 barrels per day, a tank car line of 230 cars, two pipe lines and 200,000 barrels of storage, and several hundred acres of proven acreage in the various fields in the Wichita Falls district, particularly in the Texhoma or South Burkburnett district.

The Texhoma Oil and Refining company began operations in May, 1916. The first test was on the M. F. Cooper farm in what is now known as the Texhoma field, about two and one-half miles south of Burkburnett. This well was purely wild cat, it being more than five miles to the nearest production. W. B. Hamilton and Judge A. W. Walker and associates from Dallas drilled the first well as a partnership, afterwards incorporating under the name of Texhoma Oil and Gas company.

The first test was a producer, having reached a pay sand at 230 feet. This well came in with initial production of 30 barrels per day, 41.5 gravity oil. The first year and a half after the company was organized was spent in developing the shallow production south of Burkburnett. The company's attention was next turned to developing its acreage on the J. B. Evans farm, where it drilled three 1600-foot wells with an initial production of 150 barrels each.

In the Burkburnett townsite the Texhoma company brought in several large producers, their No. 1 on block 26 making a record production as shown by pipe line runs for the field. This well averaged 1200 barrels per day for approximately three months.

In the northwest extension of the Burkburnett field the Texhoma company brought in two wells on block 26 which produced more than 1,000 barrels per day each, and two wells on the Evans with even larger daily production.

In January, 1919, the Texhoma company drilled the first producer in the 1200-foot sand on the A. F. Dodson farm about a quarter of a mile east of the first shallow well in this pool. In March a second well was drilled on this same tract, which had an initial production of 250 barrels per day. In September, 1919, their Daniel No. 1 came in flowing 200 barrels per day.

In the Texhoma district alone the company holds about 600 acres of proven oil lands. The company is now producing between four and five thousand barrels daily on its lease on the W. F. George tract in Block 818, making a total production daily of more than 5,000 barrels, 1,000 of which is settled production.

In April, 1919, the Texhoma company bought the Fisher & Gilliland refinery in north Wichita, which at that time had a capacity of 400 barrels per day. Since then the capacity of this plant has been increased to 3,000 barrels daily; also more than 100,000 barrels of steel storage has been constructed. A 4-inch pipe line has been laid from this plant through the Texhoma field, and the town site of Burkburnett, to the company's production on the George lease in Block 818.

In July, 1919, the Texhoma company was merged with the Wichita Valley Refining company. This plant has been completely overhauled, the capacity practically doubled, large storage constructed, and a new four-inch pipe line laid to the northwest extension of the Burkburnett field, and to the town of Burkburnett. With the merger, N. H. Martin, J. A. Kemp, C. W. Snider, J. J. Perkins became directors of the Texhoma company. W. B. Hamilton has been vice president and general manager of the company from date of organization. Mr. Hamilton attributes the success of the company to the undivided loyalty of its production. The chief cause of this loyalty is largely due to the management's faith and confidence in men, and his continued encouragement and praise for their work. "The Texhoma spirit is to co-operate, be happy and keep going," he says.

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RENT STRIKES IN GOTHAM FEARED BY HOUSE OWNERS

NEW YORK, April 27.—Prospects of disorders in connection with the threatened rent strikes here on May 1, have become sufficiently alarming to attract the attention of department of justice agents. J. W. Hilly, chairman of the mayor's committee on rent profiteering, said today a representative of the department would confer with the committee during the day to work out plans for preventing serious outbreaks. Mr. Hilly announced recently he had learned that more than 100,000 tenants in the Bronx and Brownsville had been organized for the strike and that sabotage was planned as a measure of revenge against landlords.

JOHN RUDISH HELD UNDER \$1,000 BOND

Bond for John Rudish, charged by complaint with theft from person, was set at \$1,500 Tuesday by Justice G. J. Arrington. Rudish waived preliminary hearing and was remanded to jail in default of bond. He was arrested at Waggoner City Sunday night charged with taking \$17 from the pockets of a man said to have been drunk in a Newtown rooming house.

ENGLAND'S DIVORCE LAWS SOON TO BE MODIFIED

LONDON, April 15.—Legislation modifying England's divorce laws will be urged by the present session of the house of commons. The government, it is contended, will in that event be morally bound to facilitate the passage of a measure which will sanction divorce on the following additional grounds: Wilful desertion for three years; cruelty; lunacy; habitual drunkenness, and committed death sentences. The church view concedes the demand for the cheapening of divorce proceedings, the equality of the sexes and increased grounds for nullity, but declines to go further.

NEGRO WOMEN CHARGED WITH ROBBERY WITH FIREARMS

Gertrude Price and Mable Foster, negro women, are charged with robbery by firearms in a complaint filed Wednesday in Justice R. V. Gwin's court. The women are alleged to have held W. F. Teague and E. T. Wineham at the point of revolvers and to have taken \$58 from them. The men were crossing the tracks near the Fort Worth and Denver City round house when two women came out of a dark alley and ordered the men to "stick up." The robbery is said to have been committed shortly after midnight Tuesday morning. The negro women were arrested shortly afterward by the police and turned over to county officials.

GERMAN SUGAR PRODUCTION CUT IN HALF IN TWO YEARS

BERLIN, April 15.—German sugar production declined during the period from September 1, 1919, to February 29, 1920, there being 4,960,000 tons of refined against 8,880,000 tons in 1918. During the same period 825,000 tons of raw sugar were produced against 1,150,000 tons in 1918.

LARGE CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY WILL BE BUILT IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, April 28.—A large Catholic university will be constructed in Chicago, according to Archbishop George W. Mundelein. The announcement followed the acceptance of a \$500,000 gift from Edward Hines in memory of his son, Edward Hines Jr., who died in France.

TAG DAY BETTER SCHOOL CAMPAIGN SET FOR SATURDAY

Saturday, May 1, the Better School Campaign Tag Day, will be held in Wichita Falls, in common with every city and town of size in the state to raise funds for the Better Schools Campaign, the tag day chairman, Mrs. John C. Kay announces. Mrs. Kay will be assisted in the arrangements by Mrs. J. W. Lee and Mrs. J. E. Sharpe, and by a number of school girls, and it is hoped with good weather, that this tag day will be as highly successful as the similar collections for various objects have been. The money raised by this means will go toward financing the campaign to secure the passage in November of the constitutional amendment, permitting each school district to provide for its own taxes for school maintenance. "In the November election there will be submitted to the voters of Texas an amendment to the state constitution. This amendment purports to remove the limit on the amount of taxes which the people of any district may vote to support their own schools. If this amendment carries, the people of any district can vote money to pay teachers better. Those districts which desire to have good schools and to keep well-prepared teachers, will have liberty to take such steps as they deem proper towards this end. Those which prefer to leave their school situation as it is at present, will also be free to do this. The amendment is a local option measure. It does not raise taxes; it merely permits each school district to make such provision as it chooses for the support of its schools. Those who favor local self-government can not consistently oppose this measure."

WORLD'S MILITARY BURDENS AFTER GREAT WAR ARE FOUND HEAVIER THAN EVER BEFORE

By HENRY WOOD.

PARIS, April 19.—Militarism exists today in almost every country in the world on a bigger and more crushing basis than before the war. "La grande guerre," which was to have been the world's last war and which was to have inaugurated an era of universal peace and reduced armaments has had for its sole effect to date the increasing of the military burden of almost every country in the world.

In fact the only exceptions are those defeated countries whose armaments were limited by the peace treaties, but even these—and notably Germany and Austria—are doing everything in their power to escape the treaty clauses and increase their armies to a much larger basis than is now stipulated. Even the United States, presumably the most peaceful country in the world, has failed to escape from the mania for increased armaments which "the last war" has entailed.

While all nations of the world have not yet succeeded in reorganizing their armies on the basis which the recent war appears to have rendered necessary, yet in almost every country an internal reorganization project is under consideration, and there is not a single one that does not provide for an increase over what the military effectives and costs were before the war. While, theoretically, the question of the military force to be maintained is purely an internal one which every country has a right to settle for itself, yet, as a matter of fact, every country has always been the case in the past, is obliged to govern the size of its military effectives and strength by what its neighbors are doing.

Likewise as in the past, Germany is still the world's preeminent factor in this respect. The peace treaty originally reduced the German army to 100,000 men. Later this was temporarily increased to 200,000 in order to enable Germany to meet internal troubles and possible bolshevik assaults from without.

many's army, dictates the size for every other country. At Washington despite the recommendations of Secretary Baker for an army of 300,000 men, the present bills before congress provide only for 300,000 men. Nevertheless, this is double the United States effectives of before the war.

In Italy the reorganization of the army provides for an increase from 103 regiments of infantry to 120 and from 28 regiments of artillery to 30 drawn by horses and 15 by tractors. While a shorter period of military service is provided for the financial burden is immeasurably increased.

In France, the definite plans for the reorganization of the army have not yet been worked out. In the meantime France has just called to the colors her entire class of 1920 and as her period of service has not yet been changed they come under the old three year term of service adopted just before the war. With the necessity of furnishing the great bulk of the troops for all the foreign expeditions necessary for enforcing all the various causes of the peace treaty, France hasn't a ghost of a chance of decreasing her pre-war military burden either in men or munitions.

While Sweden appointed a commission to see if her regular army could not be replaced by militia, the force of military organization on every hand caused this commission to go out of business last December. In Holland, the action of the chamber in suppressing military budget of 1,800,000 florins caused the war minister to resign.

Hungary is more determined than ever that the peace conference shall let her have a larger army than originally conceded. But the military pretensions—and consequential burdens—of Germany.

Hungary and the other defeated states—are famous indeed compared with those of the new states that have been born out of the war. All of the new border states that have come out of Russia, for example, insist on maintaining armies that will be an increase rather than decrease over what the Russian army was before the war.

Poland, Czechoslovakia, Rumania, Serbia all feel that their existence depends upon military strength. While they haven't even had time to think about reorganizing their armies on a peace time basis, it is absolutely certain that whenever that time comes, each will insist on an individual army that taken altogether will more than offset any reduction that might have been hoped for by the breaking up of the old time military levy of Germany and Austria.

Aside from this actual increase in the standing army of the world that "la grande guerre" has brought on the increased cost of living with its increased cost of army maintenance means that the world is looking forward to a greater and more crushing military burden than ever before carried.

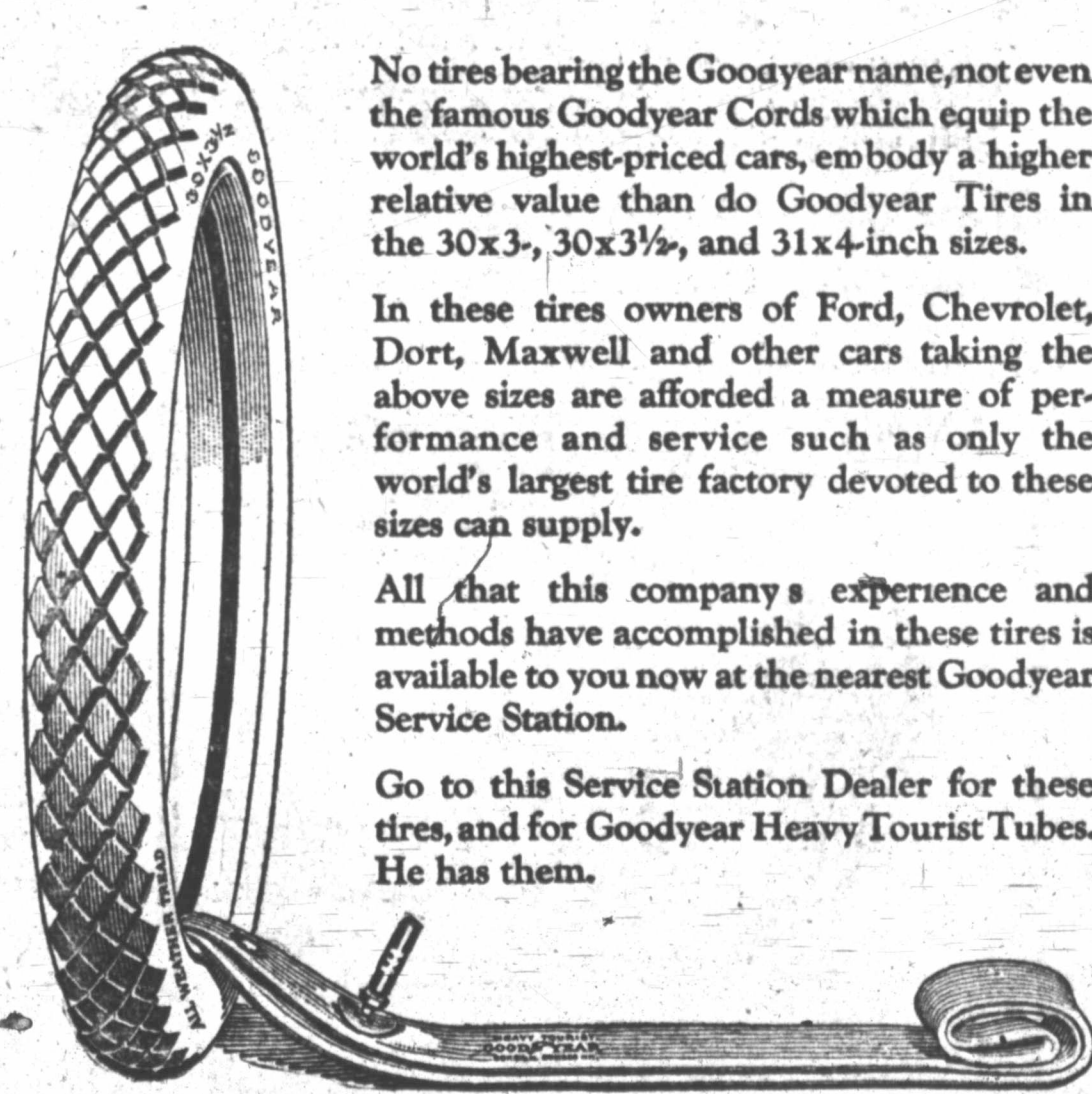

OPERATORS IN TERRITORY UNDER RECEIVER TO BE HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR MISTAKES OR FOR NEGLIGENCE

Tests in the Red River bed territory under the jurisdiction of the federal receiver, Frederick A. Delano, which are uncompleted and which at such depth that unless they are ceased or otherwise protected would result either in the loss of the hole and the labor and material expended on it, or result in any damage to the oil properties on which they are situated, should be finished to such a point as will result in the protection of the operator and to the adjoining property, according to a statement issued Wednesday by Mr. Delano.

Any damage to a well or to property under the jurisdiction of the receiver resulting either from a mistake in judgment or through negligence of the operator, the receiver or operator accountable to the receiver for this injury, the statement continues. The receiver further recommends that tests which have just been started in this territory, and which are not done to such a depth as to make their immediate completion necessary, should be shut down until a representative of the receiver can be on the ground to supervise their completion. The statement further states that he has no authority under the mandate of the supreme court to reimburse any parties for drilling or other development on their leases. Operators are urged to report to the work of preparing inventories required in the questionnaires addressed to them by the receiver, and are notified that the inventories cannot be checked by the receiver or his representatives until the leases have been cleaned up and all the loose material assembled thereon, and the cleaning up of the leases is especially urged by Mr. Delano in the interest of the reduction of fire hazards.

OPPOSITION TO OPEN SHOP URGED BY TEXAS LABOR MEN

CLEBURNE, TEX., April 22.—Organized opposition to the open shop association was urged in a report of officers of the Texas Federation of Labor, in session here today. C. F. Rusek, of San Antonio, third vice president, said that the open shop movement, "born in that city last year, is rapidly disintegrating." He asserted that unions have profited by the opposition to them through the open shop movement, but advised union carpenters to remain away from San Antonio. He urged the organization of many unions at Dallas to combat the open shop movement there and said that Dallas unions would "get the organizers goat and crowd him on to other destinations."

BODIES OF 353 AMERICAN SOLDIERS BACK FROM FRANCE NEW YORK, April 22.—The bodies of 353 American soldiers of whom all but 89 died in France, arrived here today on the army transport Mercury from Antwerp and Southampton.

Their arrival marked the first return of soldier dead from France. The bodies of four officers were aboard, including the second lieutenant, William F. Martin, Engineers Corps, of Big Springs, Texas.

Each body will be accompanied home by a member of the family of the man who will remain with his charge until the casket is lowered into the grave.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—No large quantities of cotton with the qualities of the American product will be produced outside of the United States for many years, is the conclusion of the department of agriculture after a survey of the most promising regions for growing the staple.

Even with the necessity both of protecting the domestic industry and of supplying an increased world demand, new fields of larger production are not in sight, says the report.

The development of cotton growing along scientific lines has been in progress for a number of years in different parts of the world; yet the production in foreign countries has done little more than hold its own.

The need for cotton with the characteristics of the American has been uppermost in the minds of those investigating the situation; but so far as the investigation could ascertain the total quantity produced in new regions within the last 15 years frequently in the United States.
