Angus McSween, heading the Johnson campaign forces, announced that counsel had been retained to file petitions for a recount with circuit judges in the districts in which the Johnson forces considered their candidate's count to be in doubt.

NEWARK, N. J., April 29.—Major General Leonard Wood this afternoon had increased his lead slightly over Senator Johnson of California in the New Jersey preferential primary contest. The vote with 45 districts missing stood 51,920 to 51,209, giving the general a lead of 711.


