J. R. HUIRT ADMITS MURDER OF TWO WIVES AND MAY HAVE KILLED MORE, SAY ATTORNEYS

LOS ANGELES, April 30.—At least two of the numerous Secret Service Men Confer in women James R. Huirt is alleged to have married in various Many Cities on May Day parts of the country were murdered by him, two others met "accidental" deaths while with him and "he might have murdered more," according to an alleged confession hade public early today by his attorney and county officials. Huirt said he "could not remember" what happened to some of the women because of his still weakened condition resulting from two attempts to commit suicide, the reputed confession said.

Huirt has been held here several days while officers inves-

tigated reports of numerous marriages. He married "12 or 15 women, probably more," the officers ficials were concentrating on efforts quoted Huirt as saying. A desire to kill obsessed him four to protect the lives of officials, feder-years ago, Huirt was alleged to have said, and women were his especial victims. There was no direct motive for their deaths and he had no desire to kill men, children or animals, he was quoted. He will be charged with murdering Nina Lee Delaney.

quoted. He will be charged with The women Huirt confessed having stain were Nina Lee Deloney and Elizabeth Pryor, the officers said. They quoted Huirt as saying he killed the former at Long Beach, Calif., with a hammer and the latter near Plum, Wash, by crushing her head with a sledge hammer. The "partial confession," according to the officers, related to the death of Bertha Goodnich and Alice Ludvigson, who were said to have married Huirt. Miss Goodnich, the efficers said, was fipped out of a boat in Lake Washington, near Seattle, and Miss Ludvigson was drowned in a river in Idaho. Huirt's actual words in compection with the deaths of Micses Goodnich and Ludvigson, the officers said, were that they were killed "by accident."

Nina Lee Deloney, whose home was at Eureks, Mont, married Huirt, the officers said, under the name, of Charles N. Harvey on December 5, 1919. She was last seen at a hotel at Santa Monica, Calif., January 26, 1920. She had property valued at \$20,000. Some of it was found in Huirt's possession, the efficers declared.

Bertha A. Goodnich, of Spokane, Wash, married Huirt, they said, under the name of H. L. Gordon, June 11, 1919, at North Yakima, Wash. Her body was found near Plum Station, Wash, a short time afterward. Trunks belonging to her were located in a Vancouver, Wash, warehouse. Alice N. Ludvigson, whose home was in Seattle, married him under the name of Andrew Hilton, the officers said, October 6, 1917, at Port Townsend, Wash. Property of hera, various papers, her will and their "marriage" license, they declared, were found in Huirt's possession. "marriage" license, they declared, were found in Huirt's possession.

Elizabeth Pryor was a waitress of Wallace, Idaho, and Spokane, Wash. She married Huirt, according to the officers. under the name of Milton Lewis at Coner d'Alene, Idaho, March 25, 1919. She had little property. Her picture and some tax receipts in her name were among Huirt's effects when he was arrested, they added.

More than 25 marriages have been attributed by the officers to Huirt. Seven are listed by the officers as missing. They include beside the four named in the alleged confession, Mrs. Gertrude Wilson, Seattle: Beatrice M. Andrews of Canada and England, and Aghes Wilson, Alberta, Canada.

The first to die, according to the alleged confession, was Miss 'Ludvigson. Huirt was quoted as saying he was in a boat with her fishing in a river in Idaho. His memory was weak as to the exact time and location. The boat, he stated, jammed against logs which were lashed to the bank of the river and he and Miss Ludwigson tried with their arms to free the craft. When it broke away, he narrated, the woman lost her balance and fe'l into the river and was drowned.

He said the death of the Goodnich weman came about in this way:

rough and she fell overboard in trying to go from the stern to the cening to go from the stern to the cen-ter. Later on, the officers said Huirt himself referred to this death as a "murder."

MADRID. April 30.—Spanish ediplomats are forbidden to marry without royal permission by a decree published today in the official Gasette. If this order is edisregarded the offending person will be suspended from office and his wife excluded from ediplomatic privileges.

The object of the decree is to prevent diplomats marrying women without means or who possess undesirable characters. Similar rules are applied in the case of naval and military officers and noblemen.

JOHNSON AND WOOD AT SWORD'S POINTS OVER JERSEY VOTES

General May Not Have Easy Time Because he Has Given No Quarter

NEW! YORK, April 30 .- Politicians were speculating today on the possible far-reaching effects of Senator Hikam Johnson's charges of fraud in Tuesdays primary in New Jersey, which has resulted in his demand for

This was the first open break between republican presidential candidates in the pre-convention campaign. It marked the culmination of a growing enmity between the organizations of Senator Johnson and Maj. Gen. Leopard Wood, which had its inception in the Dakota primaries in March and nearly reached a similar crises in the Minnesota preferential vote. On the Minnesota preferential vote. the face of returns, Wood won in New Jersey by about 1,000. Politicians saw in Johnson's charges the elimination of a possible compromise be-tween the general and the California senator at the Chicago convention

Wood has shown an utter disregard for the unwritten law of politics that accords to a "favorite son" the uncontested right to unanimous support of his home state. He has been more or less successful in splitting the delegations of Governor Lowden in lilinois; Senator Harding in Ohio, and Governor Coolidge in Massachusetts. But in so doing, political observers assert, he has incurred the displeasure of these candidates followers and assert, he has incurred the displeas-ure of these candidates' followers and has probably killed any chance of re-ceiving their support in case their re-spective choice is éilminated in the

It has so happened that most of the t has so happened that most of the spectacular fights to date have been furnished by Wood and Johnson. The Dakotas, Minnesota, Michigan, Montana, Nebraska and New Jersey have seen them pitted against each other in







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WATER POWER BILL **CREATES BODY FOR** USE OF AUTHORIT

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WASHINGTON, WASHINGTON, April 30.—Described by Chairman Jones of the senseribed by Chairman Jones of the senate commerce committee, as legislation affecting every citizen of the United States, the water power bill as agreed in conference would create a federal power commission, composed of secretaries of war, agriculture and interior. This commission would have authority over all matters pertaining to the development of water power in which the federal government has jurisdiction or in which it is interested as an owner of lands or other property necessary to such projects.

The commission may issue pre-liminary permits allowing applicants three years in which to make examliminary permits allowing applicants three years in which to make examinations of water power projects, prepare plans and make financial arrangements. The commission also may issue licenees for a period of 50 years from expiration of the preliminary permits or it may reserve such projects as should be undertaken by the federal government. Preference must be given by the commission to states and municipalities if they are equally adapted to utilize water resources.

The bill also would encourage the utilding of headwater storage reserbirs to equalize power production, revent floods and obtain water for irrigation purposes after being used for generation of power. Provision is made for construction of locks in power dams in navigable streams so as to extend navigation into the upper reaches of rivers.

At the axpiration of the 50 year license, the government under the bill, is given the option of purchasing the hydro-electric plants by paying the licensee his net investment, or it may issue a new license to the original licensee or to a new licensee who shall pay the original owner his net investment. Licenses are placed under the supervision of state public service commissions to the rates and regulation of service.

The federal government, the bill provides, may take over and operate

The federal government, the bill provides, may take over and operate any water power under license in time of war for manufacture of ex-

time of war for manufacture of explosives or any use conductive to national safety.

Senator Jones in a statement said
he was informed that water power developments to be undertaken on enactment of the bill would have a capacity of more than 4,000,000 horse
power and would open up to navigation more than 400 miles of the upper reaches of streams.


