MEXICAN FIGHT IN MOUNTAINS

J. R. HURT ADMITS MURDER OF TWO WIVES AND MAY HAVE KILLED MORE, SAY ATTORNEYS

LOS ANGELES, April 30.—At least two of the numerous women James R. Hurt is alleged to have married in various parts of the country were murdered by him, two others met "accidental" deaths while with him and "he might have murdered more," according to an alleged confession made public early today by his attorney and county officials.

Hurt has been held here several days while officers investigated reports of numerous marriages. He married "12 or 15 women, probably more," the officers quoted Hurt as saying. A desire to kill obsessed him four years ago, Hurt was alleged to have said, and women were his special victims.

The women Hurt confessed having slain were Nina Lee Delaney and Elizabeth Pryor, the officers said. They quoted Hurt as saying he killed the former at Long Beach, Calif., with a hammer and later near Pluma, Wash., by crushing her head with a sledge hammer.

The "partial confession," according to the officers, related to the deaths of Bertha Goodrich and Alice Livingston, who were said to have married Hurt. Miss Goodrich, the officers said, was flung out of a boat in Lake Washington, near Seattle, and Miss Livingston was drowned in a river in Idaho. Hurt's actual words in connection with the deaths of Miss Goodrich and Livingston, the officers said, were that they were killed "by accident."

Nina Lee Delaney, whose home was at Breckenridge, Wash., and Elizabeth Pryor, the officers said, were killed by Hurt. The officers said, under the name of Charles N. Harvey on December 5, 1919. She was last seen at a hotel at Santa Monica, Calif., January 26, 1920. She had property valued at \$30,000. Some of it was found in Hurt's possession, the officers declared.

Elizabeth A. Goodrich, of Spokane, Wash., married Hurt, they said, under the name of H. L. Gordon, June 11, 1919, at North Yakima, Wash. Her body was found in a shallow stream near Seattle, Wash., a short time afterward. Trunks belonging to her were located in a Vancouver, Wash., warehouse.

Alice N. Livingston, whose home was in Seattle, married him under the name of Andrew Hilton, the officers said, October 6, 1917, at Port Townsend, Wash. Property of various kinds, including a car, a typewriter, a radio, and other "valuables," were found in Hurt's possession, they declared.

Elizabeth Pryor was a waitress, of Wallace, Idaho, they said. She married Hurt, according to the officers, under the name of Milton Lewis at Coner d'Alene, Idaho, March 23, 1918. She had property valued at \$10,000 and some tax receipts in her name were among Hurt's effects when he was arrested, they added.

U. S. IS READY TO COPE WITH ANY OUTBREAK

Secret Service Men Confer in Many Cities on May Day Red Demonstration

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Federal agents have been instructed to go as far as "the law will allow" in breaking up May day radical demonstrations. In making this announcement today, Assistant Attorney General Garvan said department of justice officials were concentrating on efforts to protect the lives of officials, federal and state, who have been marked for destruction, and to prevent violence generally.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Secret service agents of the department of justice today were in conference with officials of all big cities, planning to cope with May Day demonstrations of Reds which Attorney General Palmer believes are planned for tomorrow.

The radical plan, according to justice department officials described by Palmer, is to stir up strikes, riots and confusion. It will not succeed, he predicted.

Public men whose lives were to be attempted have been warned and precautions taken, Palmer said. Palmer claims he has been receiving letters daily from Reds, who are planning to break up the alleged plot.

Guard Officials and Judges

NEW YORK, April 30.—William J. Flynn, chief of the investigation bureau of the department of justice, conferred today with his New York lieutenants regarding possible May Day demonstrations in the city.

Special preparations to guard the criminal court houses and Justice Weeks' court room and chambers have been made for Monday when James Larkin, Irish labor leader, recently convicted of criminal anarchy, is scheduled for sentence.

OVERALL MOVEMENT HAS ITS EFFECT ON STORES

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 30.—Local clothing merchants have issued a challenge to the overall club and the patch 'em and wear 'em club, women's accessories, by offering to sell all cotton garments at cost.

At the same time Frank Spain, chairman of the fair price board, announced the merchants have agreed to confine their net profits to 15 per cent on men and women's wearing apparel.

The action of Birmingham's clothing merchants, Spain said, was taken at the request of the board and a vigilance committee has been appointed to see that the 15 per cent profit agreement is carried out.

PULPITO PASS BATTLE MERELY FORECAST OF MORE DECISIVE ENGAGEMENT AT EARLY DATE

AUGA PRIETA, Sonora, April 30.—Clash of Carranza and Sonora troops at Pulpito Pass in the mountains southeast of here late yesterday forecasts a larger and more decisive encounter in the near future, rebel leaders here said today. On either side of Pulpito Pass both factions have been concentrating men for more than three weeks.

The El Paso report that Ignacio Enriquez, candidate for governor of Chihuahua, was marching with "home guards" to reinforce revolutionists near Chihuahua City was accepted as true here. A few days ago a report was current here that Enriquez had revolted with the defense societies, but military officers said the report was "premature." They admitted that negotiations for the revolt of Enriquez were under way.

Pass was a mere skirmish. He declared that troops at Casa Grande were adequate for protection of the state from invasion by Mayo and Yaqui Indians through the mountain passes.

More Troops Revolt

SAN ANTONIO, April 30.—Mayor La Piedad, an important town in the state of Michoacan has revolted in favor of the revolution and was followed by 200 troops under command of Colonel Rodolfo Lopez, Major Francisco Lopez, Captain Jesus Bavaus and Lieut. Abundo Martinez, according to advices which have just reached here.

These troops have cut the railroad between the city of Mexico and Guadalupe and have captured Zamora, the second largest city in Michoacan, the reports state. The Catholic bishop of Michoacan, who had his headquarters at Zamora, is said to have fled when the rebels entered the town.

At La Cruz, a small town between Jimenez and Chihuahua City in the state of Chihuahua, the rebels are holding the federal garrison, with their captains are ported to have revolted. The action of these men is considered of more than ordinary importance because of the position they occupy in the state and the damage they may be able to do to the railroad to El Paso, the important transportation route and the bringing of troops into Chihuahua.

JOHNSON AND WOOD AT SWORD'S POINTS OVER JERSEY VOTES

General May Not Have Easy Time Because he Has Given No Quarter

NEW YORK, April 30.—Politicians were speculating today on the possible far-reaching effects of Senator Hiram Johnson's charges of fraud in Tuesday primary in New Jersey, which has resulted in his demand for a recount in several districts.

This was the first open break between republican presidential candidates in the pre-convention campaign. It marked the culmination of a growing enmity between the organizations of Senator Johnson and Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, which had its inception in the Dakota primaries in March and nearly reached a similar crisis in the Minnesota preferential vote.

On the face of returns, Wood won in New Jersey by about 1,000. Politicians saw in Johnson's charges the stimulus of a possible compromise between the general and the California senator at the Chicago convention.

Wood has shown an utter disregard for the unwritten law of politics that accords to a "favorite son" the uncontested right to unanimous support of his home state. He has been more or less successful in splitting the delegations of Governor Lowden in Illinois; Senator Harding in Ohio, and Governor Coolidge in Massachusetts. But in so doing, political observers assert, he has incurred the displeasure of these candidates' followers and has probably killed any chance of receiving their support in case their respective choice is eliminated in the convention.

It has so happened that most of the spectacular fights to date have been furnished by Wood and Johnson. The Dakota, Minnesota, Michigan, Montana, Nebraska and New Jersey have seen them pitted against each other in bitter primary battles.

Certain politicians profess to see significance in the fact that Lowden, Harding and Hoover have personally issued absolute mandates that their followers must make no attempt on any rival candidate. In so doing they have obviously left the way open for any compromise that may be made on the floor of the convention.

The democratic campaign has been particularly free from any bitterness other than a few feckless disputes in isolated communities that will have no bearing on the general situation.

YARDS AT BUFFALO AGAIN TIED UP BY STRIKING WORKMEN

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 30.—For the second time within two weeks, every railroad yard in the city was tied up today by a walkout of freight switchmen and conductors who are members of the recently organized Yardmen's association.

Disaffection with delay in taking action on their demands for increased pay was the reason given by President Edward C. Holman of the Yardmen's association local, for the recurrence of the strike, but it was also said by the strikers that the refusal of the railroads to reinstate yardmasters who would not do switchmen's duty during the first strike and were discharged had much to do with the present walkout.

The railroads were preparing today to place embargoes on freight in and out of the city. Passenger traffic, it was claimed, would not be affected by the strike.

Want Rival Union Scuttled.

NEW YORK, April 30.—Officials of the Amalgamated Association of Street Electrical Employees, with which the majority of employees of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company are affiliated, announced today that if the company does not take prompt measures to scotch a movement for a rival union, a mass meeting of Amalgamated employees will be called at which the executive committee will recommend a strike at once.

One of the reasons back of the attempt to form a new union, it was said, was the prospect that Amalgamated association would ask for a closed shop when the present contract with the company expires in August. The man back of the organization are said to be veteran employees who have returned to join the Amalgamated association.

STATE MAY BECOME LARGE USER OF FUEL OIL

AUSTIN, Tex., April 30.—Oil burners may be installed in the boiler rooms of all the elementary institutions of the state, according to a plan under consideration by the State Board of Control, said Chairman S. B. Cowell. Should this plan be adopted the state would probably be the largest consumer of fuel oil in Texas, he said, and it is estimated that \$1,500,000 would be required to purchase a year's supply.

The reason for this suggestion in change of heating facilities is that coal is becoming higher each day and the question of transportation is also acute, said Mr. Cowell. He pointed out that by the use of oil it would be necessary to go outside of Texas to get the commodity. Some of the state institutions are already partially equipped to burn oil.

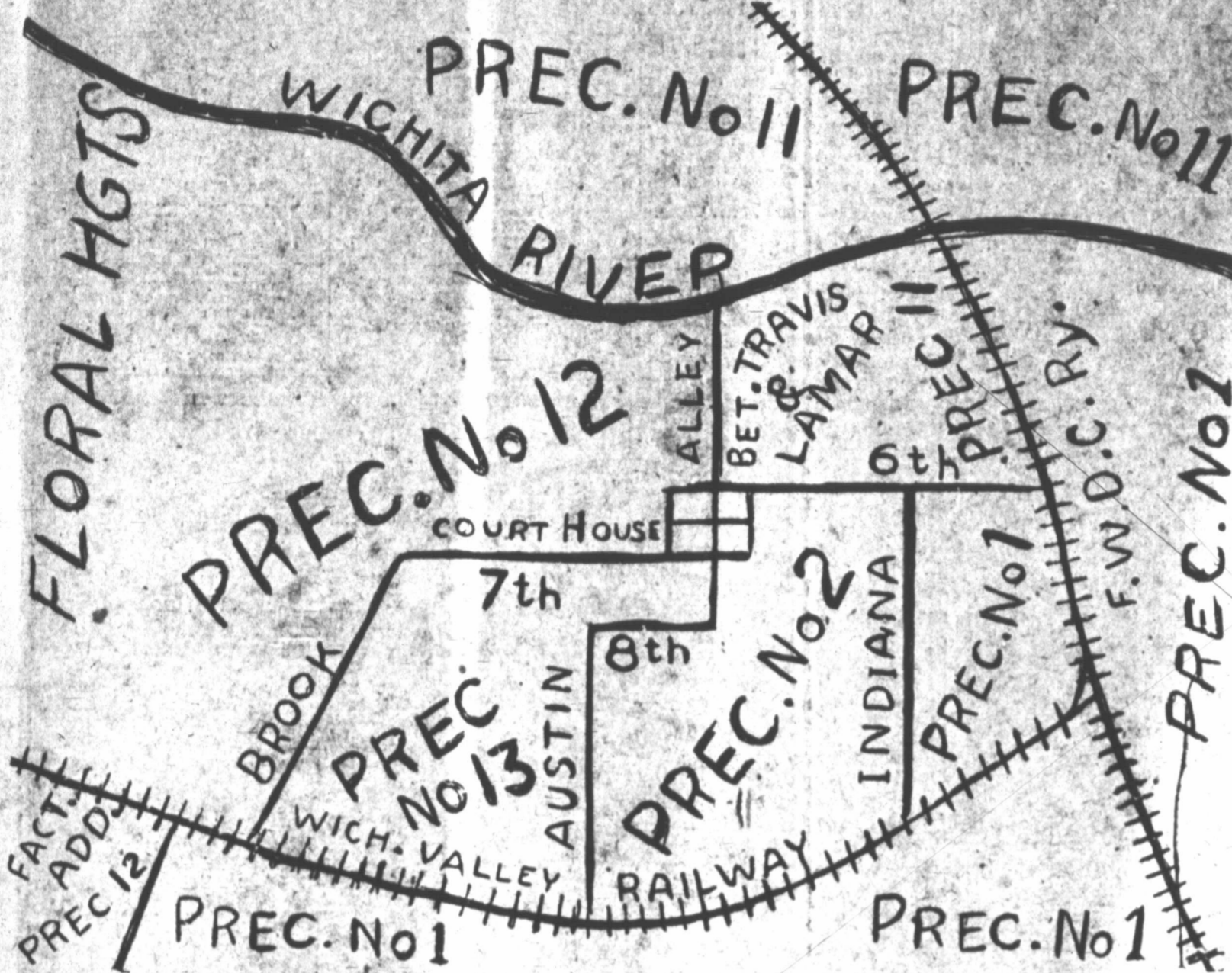

DEMOCRAT PRECINCT MASS CONVENTION WILL BE HELD AT TWO O'CLOCK SATURDAY

Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock precinct mass conventions will be held in the 14 precincts in Wichita county to select delegates to the county convention to be held on Tuesday, May 4. The county convention in turn will select delegates to the state convention to be held in Dallas at which Texas 40 delegates to the democratic national convention will be chosen.

R. E. Huff, chairman of the Wichita county democratic executive committee, has issued the following announcement concerning the precinct mass conventions:

"To the democrats of Wichita county:
Saturday, May 1, at 2:00 o'clock p. m. sharp, precinct mass conventions of democrats will be held to elect delegates to the county convention to be held in Wichita Falls Tuesday, May 4, meeting also at 2:00 o'clock.
The democratic precinct committees will preside in each precinct. If precinct committeeman is not present the democrats of each precinct are authorized to elect a chairman of their own, and after making out a roll of all democrats present, who are voters, can then proceed to the election of delegates.
All conventions will be held at the usual voting places, except in the city of Wichita Falls. In the city of Wichita Falls the precinct convention No. 1 will be held at the city hall, precinct No. 2 will be held in the court house, precinct No. 3 will be held in Justice Gwinn's court room in basement of the court house, precinct No. 12 will be held in the 30th district court room, precinct No. 13 will be held in the 18th district court room.
Ladies who have paid their poll tax can take part. All persons taking part must be democrats and voters. A voter must have been in the state one year and in the county six months, and if they were in the state of Texas on the first day of January, 1919, they must have paid their poll tax.
A person coming from another state after January 1, 1919, who has been in the state a year and in the county six months can vote without having paid poll tax.

This will be the first precinct mass convention in which women voters will participate and it is hoped that many will attend.
Each precinct will select one delegate to the county convention, or each 25 votes or fraction thereof cast for the democratic candidate for governor in the last general convention. On this basis there will be 34 votes in the county convention with the following representation from each precinct: Precinct 1, Wichita Falls, 4; Precinct 2, Wichita Falls, 2; Precinct 3, Allendale, 1; Precinct 4, Casson, 1; Precinct 5, Burk Burnett, 2; Precinct 6, Iowa Park, 3; Precinct 7, Denny, 1; Precinct 8, Clara, 1; Precinct 9, Electric, 7; Precinct 10, Wichita Falls, 1; Precinct 11, Wichita Falls, 5; Precinct 12, Wichita Falls, 7; Precinct 13, Mt. Carmel, 3.
It is important that voters be at their precinct convention places promptly at 2:00 o'clock.

TAG DAY SATURDAY FOR BETTER SCHOOLS CAMPAIGN IN TEXAS

Tomorrow Wichita Falls will join other cities in the state of Texas with a Better Schools Tag day, and another club workers and students are preparing to assist in making this tag day one of the most successful of the sort ever held in this city. The tag are to be sold for any amount which the purchaser can and will give, from 10 cents up, the money to be used in the better schools campaign, which is to be state wide. Mrs. John C. Kay, chairman; Mrs. J. W. Lea and Mrs. J. E. Sharpe are the committee on Tag day.

Three purposes for which the money will be used are: To inform parents of Texas as to school conditions; to arouse pride and determination to have better schools; and to inform the public of the nature of the amendment to be voted upon at the November election.

"If the amendment is beaten it will be because voters do not know what it is," said G. O. Clough of the State Teachers' association. "Editors have advised us they intend to oppose the amendment to 'raise the tax limit, to increase teachers' salaries; no such amendment is pending. Others say they oppose changing the tax limit; the amendment makes no such change. As a rule editors are rather accurate in their knowledge of constitutional amendments, but all who have written us about it have misunderstood this one."

"After prescribing what may be done, the present constitution closes Section 5, Article VII, with the words, 'providing these limitations shall not apply to incorporated cities.' The amendment proposes to change the final period to a comma and add, 'or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by general or special law.' So the amendment merely gives local districts in school affairs incorporated cities now enjoy. Once the public realizes this is a proposal to let districts do what cities have always had the right to do, opposition will die. It should. For while we demand county life be made attractive, we prohibit rural districts from exercising their judgment in adding their schools while the cities have liberty."

TEE PEE WELL WILL BE BAILED EARLY NEXT WEEK PRESIDENT SAYS

B. A. Laselle, president of the Tee Pee Oil Company, returned from the well last night and states that they have completed the standard rig and have all equipment on the ground and expect to bail the well out Monday or Tuesday of next week. The engine is set in place, steam lines and water lines are laid, and the derrick is anticipated as there is plenty of water to complete the well.

The center of the gang's operations are believed to have been at Burburnett, but thefts are also reported in Wichita Falls, Vernon and several other cities of the oil belt.

Investigations carried out by special agents of various railway non-pauses during the past six weeks have netted more than a dozen arrests on charges of theft from interstate shipments of commerce. Four men connected with the railway service here were arrested recently on a charge of stealing a carload of oil field equipment Saturday. The foreman of the railway warehouse at Electra was arrested on a charge of theft from interstate shipments of commerce. It is held to be the county's duty to suit for the collection of delinquent taxes. The opinion also holds that the reservation of mineral rights in land by the grantor is properly subject to taxation.

BOLSHEVIK FORGES HURRYING TO MEET HOSTS OF INVADERS

LONDON, April 30.—The loss of Zhitomir, 80 miles southwest of Kiev, to the Poles, was admitted in an official wireless today from the soviet government at Moscow. The message also referred to a Polish threat against Kiev.

WARSAW, April 29.—Polish and Ukrainian troops, driving toward Kiev, have occupied the town of Malin, on the railroad about 50 miles northwest of Kiev. The advance is continuing toward the Dniester River, except on the southern sector of the front where the Russian bolshevik forces are making a stubborn stand along the right bank of the Bug River. The bolsheviks are rushing the fifth and eighth divisions from the Caucasus region to reinforce the 13th soviet army, which has its headquarters at Kiev. In an action which resulted in the occupation of the village of Kovatsh, southwest of Zhitomir, Polish cavalry captured 2,000 prisoners, 10 cannon, one tank and the colors of the 55th bolshevik division. Airplanes, armored trains and automobiles are being used by the Poles and crack cavalry divisions have been brought into action. Posen troops which fought during the great war in the German army, are engaged in the advance.

A wireless communication regarding the Polish offensive has been sent to Polish newspapers by the press bureau of the soviet foreign office. It asserts that the bolsheviks are not yet defeated and have not changed their peace intentions. "In view of the fact that the Poles and the Russian soviet government have been unable to agree regarding the proposed withdrawal of the soviet conference at Borssov," the note says. "The soviet government is willing to meet Polish delegates at Ordono or Bialystok near Warsaw, if the Poles will agree upon a date."

right name, but admitted having used many aliases.

He said he knew nothing of his parents, but did know he was born somewhere in the south. He said he had little education. "A desire to kill" came over him according to the alleged confession, about four years ago, "during the war."

He said he married first in Canada about that time, but had been "married" so often since that he could not remember names, places and dates.

Throughout his statement, which was given at intervals over a period of nearly four hours from 8 o'clock to nearly midnight, he was hazy as to details.

He admitted, the officers said, that he had no direct motive in killing his victims. Some of the slayings were the result of violent quarrels, they quoted him as saying.

He said, they declared, he had killed some women who "had no money." "Something just told me to do it," he was quoted.

He told them he obtained a certain satisfaction in the very act of murder, the officers said and experienced a sense of relief that the woman in each case was dead.

Attorney Marmaduke, representing Hurt, stated at the conclusion of the alleged confession that it had been given to the district attorney "in the best interests of his client."

J. J. SCOTT WELL ATTRACTS INTEREST IN YOUNG COUNTY

Special to The Times. GRAHAM, TEX., April 30.—Five new locations are being made around the J. J. POST IS FLAYED BY JOHNSON IN ENEMY ALIEN PROCEEDINGS

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Attempts to break up "the most damnable conspiracy against the government in the nation's history," was frustrated by disagreements between the department of labor and justice, Chairman Johnson of the house immigration committee, testified today at

the renewal of the investigation by the rules committee into the handling of deportation warrants by Louis F. Post, assistant secretary of labor.

Arrests of 5,000 communists was followed by an "awful mixup" between the two departments, resulting in the release of the big majority of those held, Johnson said. The department of justice did its part, he added, but an obstacle appeared in Assistant Secretary Post.

Johnson told the committee that George Andrechich, described as "a prince of the I. W. W.," was released by the department of labor after letters had been exchanged by radical leaders saying "that if we can keep Secretary Wilson out making speeches Post will release Andrechich." Later, he said, Andrechich was arrested for renewed radical activities in the Michigan copper district, convicted in the federal court at Chicago and sent to Heavenworth.

DOPE PEDDLER SUSPECTS DISAPPEAR FOLLOWING FILING OF COMPLAINTS

Although complaints were filed against 10 persons said to live at Waggoner City and Bradley's Corner on charges of violating the Harrison anti-narcotic law, but one arrest has been made, it was learned Friday. When government officials went into the oil regions to serve warrants the persons wanted had disappeared.

One man known among this comrades of the oil belt as "Red" was arrested late one afternoon. The next morning the other nine defendants were gone and all efforts on the part of the government to locate them has failed. Federal officials are sure that "Red's" arrest spread the alarm and that his confederates left the oil regions to avoid arrest.

In other words only astronomers and a few others whose vocations or curiosity or love of the study draws them into the realm of the higher branches of pure mathematics can have any real comprehension of the Einstein theory of gravitation, while practically anybody can understand the simply stated gravitational law that Sir Isaac Newton evolved from the fall of the apple. The Einstein theory may be more nearly correct than the Newtonian, but it will be a long time in achieving popularity if a thorough understanding of calculus is a pre-requisite.

Can You Judge Ages? Are you good at judging ages? It seems to me that the average person is extraordinarily poor at this popular indoor sport.

Two young men came last summer to the inn at which I was stopping. The elderly ladies at whose table they were placed were sure they were college boys. Later they asked the young men if they came from the nearest college, and they said yes, they came from there—10 year ago.

New anyone who really stopped to think, would have realized that though their skins were fresh and their eyes bright as any college boy's, there was a look of strength and character, a certain stamp of experience in those faces that would not have been found on the faces of the average college boy. Youth and Age Cannot Judge Each Other's Years.

I have noticed that elderly people are apt to be vague in their judgments about youth, just as youth is vague in its judgments about age. To extreme youth, grown-up people (meaning anyone over 20) are a heterogeneous group, all about the same age. And even to a girl of 16 or 18 the grown-ups are divided into not more than three classes—people big brother's or sister's age, people father's and mother's age, and people grandfather's age. ONLY 9,000 BARRELS PRODUCTION IN DISPUTED AREA

Less than nine thousand barrels daily is the production of the area involved in the federal receivership growing out of the boundary litigation, a check of the producing wells in this district shows. This is far less than was first thought, being less than an eighth of the production in the Waggoner pool, and less than a tenth of the oil produced in the Burkhardt district. A modification of the receivership order, along the lines prayed for by the Texans in the motions filed before the supreme court, and to which the United States and the state of Oklahoma must answer Monday, which would exempt the patented lands from the receivership, would cut this production almost down to nothing, probably to little more than a thousand barrels per day—the production as yet being largely confined to patented lands. Such a modification will relieve at least a part of the production of practically all of the operators in this district. It is pointed out, and would save many of the affected operators from severe financial straits which might result from their property and their credit being tied in a long receivership.

The strictness of the court orders for the receivership is just beginning to dawn upon local operators. It is stated on responsible authority that instances of the far-reaching effect of this order, which is merely being enforced by the receiver as issued by the court—are cited to show instances of hardship and possible injustice through its operation. Among the instances cited in this connection are instances of where two drilling contractors, who were partners in a small lease in the affected district, had drilling rigs on the property—not engaged in drilling it—and can not move them off without furnishing a surety bond which would be almost impossible, it is stated, for them to secure under the conditions. The same operators have a warehouse on the lease in which they had stocked up tools and fittings sufficient to carry on their operations for a long time to come—and can't touch this property, which merely happens to be stored on a lease in the affected district—without digging up such a bond. "It simply means that I will have to go to work for some one else until this thing winds itself up," one of these operators is quoted as saying.

Another instance concerns some materials delivered to a lease in the affected district through mistake in the truck driver's being intended for a lease in an entirely different section. They cannot be moved without surety bond. The order is interpreted to take in everything on a lease to whom ever it may belong, according to authoritative statements, including cold drink stands which happen to be located in the area.

WATER POWER BILL CREATES BODY FOR USE OF AUTHORITY

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Described by Chairman Jones of the senate commerce committee, as legislation affecting every citizen of the United States, the water power bill as agreed in conference would create a federal power commission, composed of secretaries of war, agriculture and interior. This commission would have authority over all matters pertaining to the development of water power in which the federal government has jurisdiction or in which it is interested as an owner of lands or other property necessary to such projects.

The commission may issue preliminary permits allowing applicants three years in which to make examinations of water power projects, prepare plans and make financial arrangements. The commission also may issue licenses for a period of 50 years from expiration of the preliminary permits or it may reserve such projects as should be undertaken by the federal government. Preference must be given to the commission to states and municipalities if they are equally adapted to utilize water resources.

The bill also encourages the building of headwater storage reservoirs to equalize power production, prevent floods and obtain water for irrigation purposes after being used for generation of power. Provision is made for construction of locks in power dams in navigable streams so as to extend navigation into the upper reaches of rivers.

At the expiration of the 50 year license, the government under the bill, is given the option of purchasing the hydro-electric plants by paying the licensee his net investment, or it may issue a new license to the original licensee or to a new licensee who shall pay the original owner his net investment. Licenses are placed under the supervision of state public service commissions to the rates and regulation of service.

The federal government, the bill provides, may take over and operate any water power under license in time of war for manufacture of explosives or any use conducive to national safety.

Senator Jones in a statement said he was informed that water power developments to be undertaken on enactment of the bill would have a capacity of more than 4,000,000 horse power and would open up to navigation more than 400 miles of the upper reaches of streams.

"DOWN WITH JEWS" CRY VIENNA YOUNG MEN IN WILD MOB

Riots Among University Men Are Against Hebrews and Socialists

VIENNA, April 30.—A anti-Jewish demonstration by German students continued in a more serious form today and was also directed against other students recognized as socialists. Cries of "Down with the Jews" mingled with "Down with the reds." The students of the university gathered and occupied a position near one of the colleges the young men being armed with sticks and their leaders carrying swords. Jews were attacked violently who they entered lecture rooms and were compelled to leave. A Jewish wa kitchen also was raided. During the order there were cries of "Long live the Hapsburgs," and the old national anthem was sung. Police forces were stood off for a time and found to draw their swords to disperse the students.

WILSON TO SUBMIT TREATY TO SENATE AGAIN, SAY RUMORS

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Re-submission of the peace treaty to the senate is being "seriously considered" by President Wilson, according to well informed democrats. They said the pact is to be sent back at the "psychological moment." Three dates have been suggested, but none have been decided on. They're: When the senate takes up the peace resolution. When the president returns the resolution with his veto. Just before congress recesses in June.

SECRETARY DANIELS AT SEA TO REVIEW ATLANTIC FLEET

NEWPORT NEWS, VA., April 30.—Secretary Daniels put to sea from Hampton heads on the destroyer Goldsborough to board the super-dreadnaught Pennsylvania, flagship of the Atlantic fleet, on which he will go to New York. On arrival there tomorrow he will receive Admiral Wilson's command which is returning from the annual winter maneuvers in the West Indies. The secretary was to meet the fleet on the southern drill grounds off the Virginian capes. As this was to be the first time a naval secretary had visited the fleet at sea, a somewhat unusual ceremony had been arranged.

FORT WORTH WHOLESALERS ARRANGED FOR PROFITS

FORT WORTH, TEX., April 30.—E. H. Carr and E. A. Want, each president of a wholesale grocery company bearing his name, were arraigned before United States Commissioner Mitchell today on a charge of violating the Lever food control act in that, it is alleged, they sold sugar at an excessive profit. The bond of each was placed at \$1,000, which each gave after pleading not guilty before the commissioner.

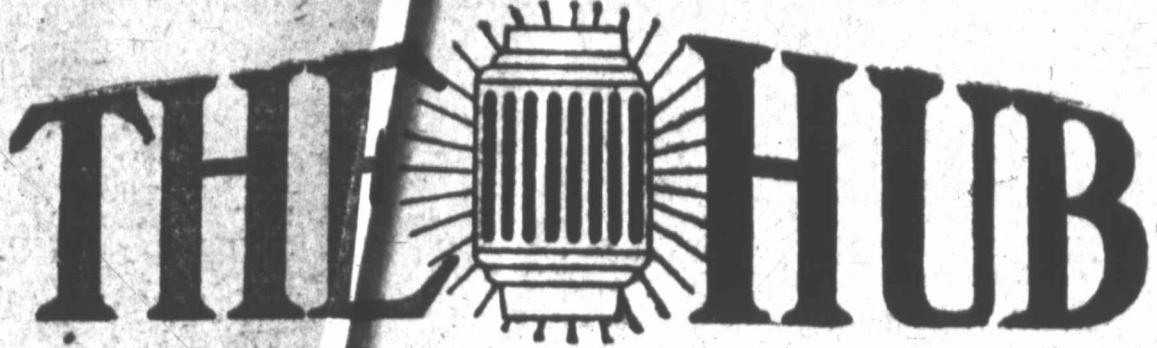
PRICES OF BAKERY GOODS INCREASE IN ST. LOUIS

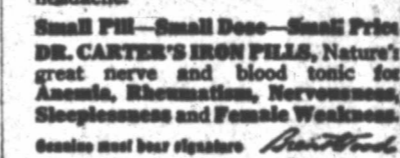

COLLEGE INDUSTRIAL ARTS ISSUES BULLETIN ON FEEDING THE CHILD

DENTON, Tex., April 26.—A new bulletin entitled "Feeding the Child" by Juanita B. Durrah is now ready for distribution from the Department of Extension of the College of Industrial Arts, Denton, Texas. This bulletin contains information as to the proper food for the child from infancy through the twelfth year. Loss of life among children in the trenches, in the streets, has been greatly exceeded by the death rate of our children, particularly among babies less than a year old. The scientific method of feeding is not artificial feeding, the last named being responsible for the most deaths. In cases of illness or infection of the mother, bottle feeding is necessary. Special care is required in preparing modified milk for such infants. Clear and concise directions for preparing infant food will be found in this bulletin. Methods for treating infantile colic and diarrhea are also given. Each period of the child's life is illustrated by a full page picture of one day's menu, that is, for feeding children of the ages from three to five, five to seven, and eight to twelve. Scientific study is brought down to every day language and the bulletin tells in popular style the requirements of the body at different stages of the child's development, and what foods will best furnish the needed energy, body-building, and mineral supply. The United States has twenty-five million school children of whom fifteen to twenty-five per cent are under-nourished and seventy-five per cent have various physical defects, largely due to faulty diet. A considerable portion of this bulletin deals with the diet of school children, with illustrations of the proper school lunches and the desirable lunch box. One section deals with the proper nourishment of the teeth. This bulletin contains thirty pages and five full page illustrations, also, tables indicating proper height and weight of the average normal children between the ages of five and eighteen. A copy of this bulletin may be secured by writing to the secretary, Department of Extension, College of Industrial Arts.

WASH WOMAN DRIVES TO WORK IN OWN AUTOMOBILE
AMARILLO, TEX., April 30.—Amarillo faces a labor situation that housewives are finding hard to solve. That problem is finding a washwoman. This shortage has been felt in many other cities of the United States for the past two or three years, but Amarillo is just beginning to feel its effects. The latest story going the rounds here is that the washerwomen are becoming independent in ways as well as wealth. One woman said her washwoman drives up to the house in an automobile and returns the clothes when she can find time or when the automobile is not being used by some other member of the family.

OPPOSES CONSIDERATION OF PUBLIC UTILITIES BILL

AUSTIN, Tex., April 26.—Opposition to the consideration of a bill regarding public utility regulation was expressed by Sen. H. P. Dorough of Texas today.
