BLAME PROFITS AND NO WAGES FOR HIGH COST

Railway Report Asserts Small Pay Increases Go With Big Fortunes... WASHINGTON, May 7.—A study of profiteering in American industry, made under the auspices of the railway brotherhoods, was presented to the railroad labor board today in support of the railway workers' demands for higher pay for the increased charges that increased labor costs are responsible for the high cost of living.

Calling attention to the many war-made millionaires, the study contends that a three-fold relationship exists between high prices, profiteering, and the addition to the quota of millionaires, and that the increase in the wealth of the wealthy is an "unavoidable" reflection of the attempt to charge labor with profiteering and to all attempts to hold labor responsible for the high cost of living.

### BAVARIAN TROOPS HAVE BEEN TAKEN FROM RUHR BASIN

#### Military Air Service Disbanded Under Terms of Treaty Declares Berlin

BERLIN, May 7.—Bavarian troops, which have been in the Ruhr basin, have been withdrawn, according to the *orddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung*. The Prussian assembly has adopted proposals for the creation of local guards which will be connected with the state police.

Germany's military air service has been disbanded under the terms of the Versailles treaty, according to a semi-official announcement made here today.

The entente commission here intends, according to the *Tagliche Rundschau*, to destroy all aerodromes and flying establishments which were built at a cost of 60,000,000 marks. The newspaper says the commission will leave standing one hangar and one airplane factory, which will be used for international service.

#### German Elections in August.

LONDON, May 7.—Germany's presidential election probably will be held late in August, according to a Berlin dispatch to the *Exchange Telegraph* company. The *Deutsche Zeitung* is quoted as saying President Ebert will not be a candidate for re-election.

### EMMA GOLDMAN IS HOMESICK FOR U. S. SAYS HER LETTER

#### Has Not Become Active in Any Social Work Because She Lacks Language

CHICAGO, May 7.—Emma Goldman, whom the government transported to Russia, is homesick for the United States, according to a letter from her made public by Dr. Ben L. Reitman today.

In the letter, written March 8 from Moscow, Miss Goldman said: "I miss America. I lived there 30 years, you know."

"Not a word has reached us from any one in the United States so far. You can imagine how we feel about it."

"It is very difficult for me at my age to acclimatise one's self in a new

country even under the best conditions, in normal times. But Russia, held white by over four years of war and starved by the inhuman blockade, is not a place where one may hope to take root easily. However, if I could at least hear from those dear to me I left behind, it would not be so difficult."

Miss Goldman added she had not become active in social work in Russia because of her lack of language and because "I must first familiarise myself with the new and strange situation."

### 10 FEET OF OIL STANDING IN HOLE ON GRIFFIN RANCH FOUR MILES WEST OF K. M. A.

Oil standing in the hole of the depth 1,500 feet is reported from the test of the Wichita Valley Oil and development company on the Griffin ranch about four miles west of the Kemp-Munger-Allen territory. Reports the well could not, however, be completed Friday. Acreage in the vicinity of the test has had a sharp swing the past two days, rapid advances in price featuring the play. The test, it is understood, has been the sand for several days, but the news that it was showing for a producer did not become current until Thursday.

### BOGER-ARD-MAER BLOCK 41 FLOWING OVER THE CASING

Oil was steadily flowing over the top of the 6 5/8-inch casing of the Boger-Ard-Maer in Block 41, a mile south of the Kemp-Munger-Allen, Friday morning, according to a report received by one of the owners of the test. The boiler which was dropped into the hole Wednesday afternoon has not been recovered, contrary to an earlier report, no effort having been made to get it out Thursday. A steel line was secured Friday, however, and it is believed that it will be recovered during the day and the well bailed down. Considerable confusion apparently prevails with respect to the Keen-Wolf No. 2 Mungler, which became a producer Wednesday night—this test being confused with the No. 4, which has not started drilling, and leading to reports that the No. 4 was nearing completion. The test in the southwest corner of the Keen-Wolf lease is the No. 2, this being the producer—the confusion arising from the fact that all four locations along the south line were made the same day. The No. 3 will probably be in the northeast corner.

### RESTRAINING ORDER AGAINST BURKBURNETT OFFICIALS

Mayor R. D. Laney and the city council of Burkburnett are restrained from interfering with the construction of a derrick and standard rig to serve the "K. A. P." well on block 30, Burkburnett township, by a temporary injunction issued Thursday by Judge Edgar Scarry of the 78th district court. Defendants named in case include R. D. Laney, mayor of Burkburnett; J. M. Hayworth, Dave Thorne, and P. G. Williams, city councilmen; R. J. Abbot, fire marshal, and City Attorney McBride. The defendants are ordered to appear before Judge Scarry of the 78th district court on Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock to show cause why the restraining injunction should not be made permanent.

Plaintiffs named in the case are J. H. Ashley and L. L. Beacham, who aver the Burkburnett city officials stopped construction of a derrick and standard rig being erected for the purpose of cleaning the hole of the so-called "K. A. P." well. A city ordinance prohibiting erection of standard rigs within the limits of Burkburnett municipality is the basis for action by city officials, the petition states. Ashley and Beacham, however, declare that the ordinance is an unjust regulation and should be set aside by legal process. Owners of the "K. A. P." well assert the well is now producing 16 barrels of crude oil daily but declare this production could be substantially increased if they were permitted to erect the proper derrick and rig for cleaning out the hole.

### EAT ACTIVITY SEVERAL SECTIONS WILBARGER COUNTY

BY A. C. MCCONNELL.  
 VERNON, TEX., May 7.—Activity in the oil business and real estate, in addition to the work on two new wells by the Sigler Oil company, together with other developments in the Sigler district, has marked oil developments in the Vernon district the past week. The news that suits pending over the famous Sigler pool had been settled, leases and acreage have been a decided jump, several large transactions being closed at boom prices. Numerous locations are being made around the Sigler pool and thousands of dollars of drilling material are being distributed from Vernon.

The Sigler Oil company is constructing a large number of bunk houses and other buildings on the lease on the Wharton ranch, 11 miles south of Vernon, which indicates that they expect to continue with their intensive drilling campaign for some time to come. Already 15 houses are built on the lease to take care of the employees of the company; additional housing facilities are being erected as fast as workmen can put them up.

According to Superintendent Rayatcher of the Sigler Oil company, Sigler discovery well is now a clean hole. While no information will be given out regarding the yield of the well, yet it is known that the well is making from 150 to 200 barrels by heads at intervals of 14 hours, and the intervals are becoming closer and the flows are holding up to all expectations, Sigler No. 3 is drilling past 500 feet, Frank Mischeax, a driller of 20 years' experience, is drilling No. 2. He has drilled wells in Persia, Russia and the United States, being credited with bringing in a 75,000-barrel well in Russia. He concedes the field to be the equal to that of the Northwest Extension, as he has had experience in that field. He says if litigation had not interfered the well would have been down about 1,500 feet. He expects to bring in a producer in another month to rival that of the Sigler discovery well. No. 3 Sigler is about ready to spud in; No. 4 has a derrick up, with locations for others. Material is being hauled to the lease for an extensive drilling campaign, notwithstanding the many obstacles in the way by litigation, etc.

Lease business is quite active and lease values are steadily on the increase. Several large deals have been consummated the past week, among

transactions being a 10-acre tract one mile northeast of the Sigler discovery well, which was bought by practical oil men for \$20,000. Their identity was not disclosed, but it was given out that the purchasers will develop their newly acquired property. It is understood other parties are negotiating for 10 acres near the Sigler for \$20,000. This report can not be confirmed.

**Activity Around Harrold.**  
 While most of the operations are apparently centered about the newly discovered Sigler territory, other sections of the county are coming in for big play. Prospective development around Harrold is assuming a more promising outlook since it has become known that the Tee-Pee well in Section 34, Block 13, about a half-mile west of Harrold, have completed standardizing and will commence hauling out their well this week. The well is set in place, steam and water lines are run, and the well will be drilled in this week. Legal complications in regard to a minor heir have been disposed of and the well is ready for a rotary rig on the Cochran lease at a depth of 1,733 feet, drilled with a rotary into the sand with an unusual amount of gas and oil showing.

The Harrold-Texas company is moving a rotary rig on the Cochran lease for their No. 2 well. Well No. 1 is ready to go with cable tools.

The Federal Oil company is drilling their No. 1 Baker section 20, block 5, deeper. This well has been the attraction for some time an account of the report that they had struck an oil sand. Upon being tested, it was found the sand was not of commercial value and it has been determined to go deeper. They are down about 1,800 feet.

P. H. Robinson, drilled in a 10-barrel well on the Smith lease in section 25, block 13, last week, at a depth of 225 feet. This territory has been condemned by deep tests, the Liberty test being abandoned at over 2,200 feet, but a shallow field here is evident, and Mr. Robinson is going to wage an extensive drilling campaign in Section 25. The well will be put on a pump. The second well is being drilled now. In this area there are many shallow producers, being small pumps. This section adjoins the famous Piper pool.

"The Open Shop Association of Vernon is now operating. It has listed all kinds of workmen and on proper notice can secure all the men necessary for a given job. Builders, contractors, architects and everybody who wishes workmen may list their needs with the association, telephone 38, free of charge. The association is being financed by the business interests of Vernon for the purpose of speeding up building operations so as to take care of the substantial growth that is sure to come to Vernon; in fact, it has already come."

## Thought He Had an Easy Mark Wilson But Finds Out Different

NEW YORK, May 7.—Tex Richard, who knows a lot of things about the ring, said in a few wise words just a few days ago that Mike O'Dowd will agree with—"a sure thing is never sure."

O'Dowd bucked a sure thing in Boston last night and the only thing sure about the fight was that he lost his middleweight championship title to Johnny Wilson, a second rater of Charlestown, Mass.

Wilson outpunched his way to the title. He caught the champion with a left to the jaw and knocked him down in the second round and he succeeded in keeping his left so much in the St. Paul boy's face that the referee switched the crown after the fight.

O'Dowd can't be censured, for if it were not for the same inclination to clean up easy marks he never would have been champion.

Back in 1917, Al McCoy, the champion, had expected to knock off one Mike O'Dowd, an unknown from St. Paul. The unknown finished him in six rounds.

Unknowns have a funny way of doing things in the ring. Jimmy White, the flyweight champion, picked one for his debut in America and Jack Sharkey won from him.

Bob Martin, the heavyweight champion of the Allied nations, picked Sergeant Ray Smith as a velvet step on his way to the top and he saw his castle tumble in the sand. To O'Dowd's credit it must be said that he had to take on the easy marks as his division was practically barren of known qualities.

The result of the fight was a great surprise. Since his discharge from the army, the St. Paul boy had been putting most of his opponents to sleep and had begun to convince some of the critics who accused him of being a "bust" that he was a real champion.

He also said to his credit that when the call came for the biggest fight of all O'Dowd did not don the uniform of a boxer instructor nor did he dash to the shipyards. He went to the trenches and was one fighter whom the real fans have been really proud.

Faddy Mullins, the ex-champion's manager, gave credit to the winner and asked for a return fight.

# The SPORTLIGHT by Grantland Rice

## TWELVE YEARS AGO.

Twelve years ago, at the end of the season, we turned in a brief history of Southern League campaigning for the "Spalding Baseball Guide." In looking over this guide a night or two ago we ran across the following: "About the only individual performer who displayed any exceptional merit was Tris Speaker, of Little Rock, a brilliant outfielder and a very fine hitter."

Several drops of water have trickled under various bridges since that was written. But in the meanwhile Speaker has become the greatest outfielding star in baseball, ranked by many as the greatest outfielder, from a defensive viewpoint, that ever played the game.

## THE SPEAKER OF 1908

We still recall our recollections of the Speaker of 1908. He came as a youngster, just up from the Texas League, with Mike Pina's Little Rock team. No experience in vision or judgment was required to see even then that he was a star—not only a fine player, but one with an unusual personality. Speaker not only batted .350 for the season, but when he went after a fly ball, whether to the right or left, coming in or going back, there was always one result—an apparently easy out.

He was an outfielding bird even as a youngster just breaking in—and even as a youngster he had a free, full swing at bat that produced both ease and power, which is always the ideal combination. And with all this he had a likeable presence, that made him extremely popular with the fans at large.

## THE SPEAKER OF 1926

Since 1908 Speaker as an outfielder has moved out beyond such stars of the past as Bill Lange, Jimmy McAleer and other notables who were marveled at running down a fly ball. For ten years Speaker has not only shown rare ability at going in any direction for a fly ball, but he has also shown uncanny judgment in shifting for a batter.

We have seen Speaker take a line hit in left center, and on the next play he was waiting for a line smash to right center, sixty yards from the vicinity of the other drive, and in neither case was he called upon to move more than a step.

In the period between 1908 and 1926 Speaker has not only become the most brilliant all-outfielder, but in that time he has proved to be the only ball player who could stop the rush of Ty Cobb, an achievement which the Cleveland star put across four years ago.

## IN ANOTHER ROLE

Today Speaker appears in a new role. Ten years ago it was no uncommon sight to see a manager leading his men from the field. Then we had such active campaigners as Frank Chase, Fred Clarke and others who could both lead and play.

Today Speaker is the last field manager left. Gavy Cravath hurls into the pastime once in a while when a timely home run is needed to break up some close game. But Old Cactus could hardly be classed as a regular. And the others, McGraw, Moran, Mack, Huggins, Griffith, Robinson, Stallings, etc., are all bench mandarins.

Speaker alone is leading his team, and out there absorbing hits and delivering winning blows at one and the same time.

## SURE TO MAKE GOOD

There is no gamble about Speaker making good as a manager. After he took charge of Cleveland last summer the club began to come like a young man working his way across the Indian Ocean. At one stretch it won something like twelve out of thirteen games. Cleveland then was coming so fast that if the race had been extended to the usual 154-game schedule, Ohio would have held both pennant winners.

Since the mid-April start, Speaker has had his machine working smoothly. He has had his men hustling in an age where hard work seems to have gone out of fashion and any extra effort is held to be old-fashioned and not worth while.

Cleveland was picked early to win the pennant, but this general prediction did not prevent Speaker from sending his club along at a fast clip from the first spring training day. He had been in baseball too long to take anything for granted.

The delegate from Cleveland, Ohio and Hubbard City, Texas, is proving himself to be a manager of rare merit. The recipe is simple—to know baseball and to know how to lead men. Speaker is well fixed both ways. He has keen intelligence, a lot of magnetism, and he has studied his profession as closely as the old timers did when baseball was at least 50 per cent sport.

And unless he has some bad luck he will more than likely give Cleveland the first pennant she has ever known and thereby taking his place in Ohio history with an Irishman named Pat Moran.

Some have shown trials of a sensational nature. All of which means, turfmen here declared, the most open race since its inception, 46 years ago.

# SAUL'S

It is an astonishing fact that nine out of every ten young women who apply for screen work are deeply, almost unalterably, convinced that they are particularly fitted by nature and by their own cleverness to succeed as motion-picture actresses.

Apparently they have taken unto themselves the famous reply of the milkmaid in Mother Goose, who, when asked:

"What is your fortune, my pretty maid?"  
"My face is my fortune, sir," she said!  
Most of the girls who apply for work are, as a matter of fact, pretty, but mere prettiness is not, unfortunately, a guarantee of success in motion pictures.

A successful actor before the camera must, as a general rule, have regular features and a graceful carriage.

But success absolutely depends upon two fundamental characteristics—intelligence and an ability to work hard. Experience leads me to believe that at least five years of work before the camera, accompanied by hard study of technique, are necessary before the average player may be called "a good actor."

The leading motion-picture actors became such only after many years of comparative obscurity, but it is very hard to persuade the average candidate that she or he must also work and wait.

**Grabbing Opportunities.**

For instance, it is difficult for a society woman, accustomed to the exact requirements of the drawing room or the dinner table, to understand that this does not, necessarily, fit her to act in a drawing room or dining room scene for the films. Such scenes are faithful to real conditions, but must be carefully staged in order to suggest reality.

Therefore, my advice to the beginner is that he or she come prepared to take part in anything that may be offered, whether it be a "mob scene" or otherwise. There is always time and room for another star.

As to the mere routine of "getting into the pictures," the applicant is first asked to supply the following information, which is placed in a card index file for instant reference:

Name, address, telephone numbers, age, height, weight, color of hair and eyes, chest and waist measure, nationality, experience. In addition the applicant is asked to state his or her ability to ride, drive, swim and dance.

An unretouched photograph is demanded in some studios.

Then, after a wait of a couple of days, or perhaps two or three weeks or longer, the summons to the studio may occur.

Opportunity has opened the door!

But, again I want to emphasize the hard work part of it. Fame and fortune may follow the commonplace announcement that Miss Jones or Mr. Smith is wanted at the studio—the casting director has done his initial part and the result depends upon the individual who seeks a screen career. Upon arriving at the studio the future star dons the proper costume and reports to the director; soon the camera man begins to turn the crank and the big adventure is on.

**Defining Screen Beauty.**

From the cameraman's viewpoint, screen beauty is a highly difficult thing to define. Whether you will or will not photograph well is a matter of which no photographer can definitely pass on without the aid of a trial "shot." But there are certain elemental physical characteristics which help or hinder, as the case may be.

Perhaps the first and most important matter which engages the attention of the cameraman is the color of the candidate's eyes. Dark eyes, whether black, brown or dark blue, will pass the camera test without difficulty. Light gray or blue eyes are a never-ending source of worry. Eyes of the latter class do not "pick up," as we say. In other words, they photograph white, or nearly so, and the result on the screen is a disappointing lack of expression.

Regular teeth form another important requisite for screen beauty, as the cameraman views it. Irregular teeth mean endless camouflage on the part of the man behind the camera. He must redouble his care on lighting in order to cover up this shortcoming in his subject.

To the cameraman who strives for a pictorial beauty—and what cameraman does not?—blond hair is a thing of joy forever. Golden-hued tresses permit the photographer to achieve lighting effects which can not be dupli-

cated with a dark-haired subject. A soft, halo-like effect, which adds materially to the beauty of the individual, is possible with the use of very little "back light," which is just what the name implies.

**Ability and Sincerity.**

Dark hair will not yield these results. Even blond hair with a strong reddish or brownish note in it requires so much light to get this effect that the rest of the picture is seriously affected.

As for the other features there is no hard and fast rule by which they can be judged. "Makeup" will alter many things. A large mouth, a double chin or a too prominent nose can be subdued to the point where the camera will miss their faults. But such irregularities are a handicap, neverthe-

less, entailing extra work for both the actor or actress and the cameraman.

So if you would find favor with the cameraman offer him dark eyes, regular features and preferably—although not necessarily—blond hair. That's if you are of the feminine gender. And with the exception of the color of the hair, the same general rules apply to candidates of the other sex.

There was a time when the motion-picture actress' one requirement was good looks. If she were beautiful she needed nothing else. And to some extent the actor was judged by the same standard. If he were good to look upon—in a virile, masculine way, of course—nothing more was asked.

Today two other requirements come first.

They are: Ability and sincerity.

To be sure, looks count for something, but not for everything—as they did in years gone by. The actor who is really an actor, who is capable and sincere in his work will succeed.

**Lure of the Movies.**

Motion pictures offer many heart-breaking disappointments, just as they furnish sudden happiness change ap-

parent failure to sensational success overnight, and offer reward beyond the limits of one's imagination—and just at a time when reward seems out of the question.

I recall a very charming girl who started as an extra in a picture. In the next picture she had "a bit." She was a beautiful girl, with an unusually sweet and attractive personality. She did such remarkable work in her "bit" that in the very next picture she was selected as a leading woman. She made good. Today she is a star.

But with others Fate has not dealt so kindly. Girls who were "extras" five or six years ago are still "extras." They have not lost their ambition, but thus far they have been cruelly disappointed. Many, of course, will never advance, for it is their lot to go plodding along with nothing to brighten their lives. But some will be recognized and then the dreary days will be forgotten.

The possibility of big reward—financially and in many other ways—in the chief lure of motion pictures. And the possibility of quick reward—the reward that comes overnight, so to speak—is always there. Because of this every motion-picture studio is besieged by countless numbers pleading for a chance to break in or, once that they are in, anxious for an opportunity for continued work.

**Success Depends on Individual.**

Probably luck plays a big part in securing the first opportunity, though natural qualifications and persistence are the applicant's chief assets. And once the first step is taken, the measure of success depends entirely on the individual. Some may get the opportunity earlier than others, for no apparent reason, but the opportunity will come if the qualifications are what they should be.

Let me give this bit of advice to those of you who have ambitions for a motion-picture career—be sure that you have the needed qualifications, otherwise your life will be only one long series of disappointment; when you are sure, set about your work seriously and sincerely. Do not dishearten if the road seems rough—if you "have it in you" you will get there!

There is room in motion pictures for men and women of talent and a willingness to take hard knocks with the same cheerfulness that they accept success.

For the would-be motion-picture actor who is not willing to surmount disappointments and remain level-headed over small initial successes, however, there is little to look for in the silent drama.

**THE REAL REASON WHY SCENARIOS FAIL**

Why do scenarios fail? The best answer to this ever new, ever old, question persistently asked by the beginner, is that: Scenarios do not fail! Writers fail—to make scenarios!

A scenario—much-abused word—should consist of a good story, well told, in form possible of effective production on the screen, says Gardner Hunting, production editor of the Famous Players Lasky Corporation. If it consists of anything else, it is not a scenario.

Perhaps I should add, right here, that the story should have some element of freshness in it, for many a good story is an old story. There are some who argue that all stories are old, but I am prepared to take issue with that discouraging and untrue statement at the proper time and place. All that is necessary on that subject here is to hint that the human skeleton is an old and familiar structure, but that no two faces of figures built upon it are exactly alike, and that fresh beauty is born every hour of every day.

**The Best Stories.**

A story, to be a story, must contain the principal character, with whom the sympathy of the audience is paramount; and that character must have one chief, worth while purpose, which will appeal widely to human beings as a human aim; and between that character and the accomplishment of that purpose must stand one great obstacle, the more apparently insuperable the better; and then your character must surmount this obstacle and accomplish his purpose, by his own efforts and not by accident. Interest on the part of the audience will rise just so high as its sympathy rises—no higher; suspense will be proportionate to the degree of difficulty your hero has in accomplishing his great purpose—and to the depth of his troubles and sorrows on the way. An opposing will is the strongest of obstacles—barring the Divine will, which may not be overcome. And if four story lacks either a purpose or an obstacle, it will fail to have a struggle, conflict—which is the prime essential of story.

The much-talked-of, but always more or less mysterious "punch" in the story always lies in one of the elements mentioned. If the story lacks punch, it lacks either conflict or appeal to the sympathies. Without con-

flict, sympathy can not exist. Without sympathy, conflict is nothing. Remember, you can have all the conflicts of a bloody battlefield, and if your sympathies are not enlisted on one side or the other, you will not be interested—except in the mere spectacle—and neither will anyone else. You must be ardent partisan in any struggle at which you are a spectator or you will not care what is the outcome. And the more you care, the more intensely interested you will become in the finish. The best story is the story in which your concern for the hero's welfare and success is so great as to be poignant!

**Creating Sympathy.**

A story may lack a character with whom an audience can sympathize or the hero may do something that loses him the sympathy that should be his. He may have an unworthy, or trifling, purpose to accomplish, which no audience will consider worth wasting time over. He may accomplish his purpose so easily that nobody will have a chance to be sorry for him. Or he may be helped by accident or the doings of others about him as to make his feat insignificant. In any of these cases the story will fail to interest.

A story must have the basic qualities that please. Gloom and horror do not please. Sunshine, pathos, love, optimism—these are the things that please. And hope! Ah, there's the thing! Put something into your stories that will inspire somebody to overcome his own obstacles or troubles, to accomplish some much-desired end of his own, that will point the way for care-worn, discouraged people, by which they may find their share of happiness; that will show some wrongdoer how he may square himself with the world and with himself; that will make everyone who sees the picture want to do something worth while, live a real life, achieve, grow, climb, win—and that will make him believe that living, achieving and winning are possible to him! Avoid the sordid, the repulsive, the unclean, the pessimistic, the horrible—not only because they are unpleasant, but because dwelling on them is no way to cure them. No man ever cured himself of an illness by brooding upon its painful details. We all know enough about trouble to be dead sure we want to avoid it. What we do want to know is how to escape it. We don't need to

be told the miseries of despair—we want to be shown that the road to hope is open to us! One thing you must remember, ambitious writer; if your pet idea is not snapped up and bought, after you have submitted it to a sufficient number of editors to be sure you have allowed for a difference in individual company and star demands, it is because there is something the matter with the idea, or with your presentation of it. Does your language express your meaning? Is there a careless phrase somewhere in it that gives a wrong impression? Do the words you have chosen fit the ideas they are meant to convey better than any other words will? It takes some industry to acquire skill. Some people are too impatient or too lazy to become skillful—or to use the abilities they possess. The old Latin phrase has it right: "Life gives nothing to mortals without great labor."

**Necessity of Continuity.**

For the benefit of those who do not know we will explain the meaning of continuity which is a technical phrase. It is the script, the scenario written

for the guidance of the director, arranged by scenes telling the story in action and titles as it is to appear on the screen.

Continuity writing is as important as writing for the stage. It is the basis of the picture and requires in the writer constructive ability and genuine authorship. A continuity writer must be able to tell a story adequately, effectively dramatically and with power. He must be able to arrange the material in the most effective way, to invent effective incidents and supply interesting human business, fresh and novel.

—as they themselves see it, and their pictures would be more alive. There is a vast difference between merely telling incidents, and making the picture seem like a bit of actuality. Unless the writer puts human stuff into the continuity we see a picture in which actors merely go through bits of motion or exhibiting their so-called bags of tricks, without a spark of real life of the kind that thrills the imagination and the heart. For this result the writer is to be blamed more than the director.

**Study the Craft.**

Most continuities from amateurs have little evidence of careful study and thought. It seems almost inconceivable that they are serious in their ambitions. From simply watching the pictures shown in the local theaters it is possible to grasp the basic principles of continuity writing. I can not understand how one, having ambitions to write for the screen, can fail to recognize them.

My advice to young writers would be, do not try to write for the screen because it is a nice easy profession and said to be well paid. Study the craft. Don't try unless you are ready to give everything you have to the effort. If there ever was a time when continuity could be dashed off without forethought or afterthought, that time is long since past. It takes brains, judgment and good hard work to succeed at continuity writing as at any other occupation that is worth while. Occasionally a brilliant fellow may win notice by a fluke, but sooner or later he will have to knuckle down and grind. He will have to study, think and create.

The qualities of eagerness, earnestness, sincerity and purpose are, as a rule, to be preferred in a writer, rather than brilliancy. The best continuity writers are those who have had training and some success in fiction writing, for the reason that they have learned to tell a story in the most effective way. Knowledge of the technical end of writing for the screen can be gained in comparatively short time, providing one has the story-telling instinct. But a continuity writer must be a story teller—who loves a story and can live it—and tell it so that others will love it.

Teachers in art schools say that anyone can learn to draw. They refer to making lines on paper representing

objects. But this sort of drawing does not make one an artist, until he is able to put that something into his work that conveys a vision or meaning to the spectator. A continuity writer who merely writes scenes, fails to produce a vital or entertaining picture until he puts into these scenes something right out of life, the kind of life that will carry a message from his mind and heart to the minds and hearts of others. The bare bones of a skeleton are neither interesting nor attractive, but when clothed in flesh, blood and beauty, the result is a human being that is interesting, vital and lovable. And a continuity that is just a succession of scenes is just so many bare bones—until it is clothed with flesh and blood and beauty of human life and feeling and action.

**HANDLING THE "JUICE" THAT LIGHTS THE "MOVIE."**

MODERN photoplay producing has brought into the foreground new and startling light effects, which add materially to the clearness of the picture, and enhance the beauty of the story. This is done by means of several different kinds of lighting equipment, the most used being the Cooper-Hewitt "banks," and spotlight arcs, overhead arcs, and several other styles of lamps and globes.

At one large studio there is a complete lighting plant, under a manager, who has assistant, a night foreman, and 23 expert electricians. Current is brought over high tension wires in 60,000 volts, and "stepped" down to the required strength for the studio lights. There are three motor-generating plants on the grounds, besides a number of smaller stations, stage switchboards, and individual setting boards.

The lighting equipment includes 250 separate lights. An average of fifteen lights are used to one setting, and these require constant attention, shifting, focusing and re-setting.

All the back-lights, and the many different styles of flowing light upon settings, subjects, and action, are produced with the aid of these electric lights. The days of "diffusers" and sunlight rays are past, for in this day nearly all scenes with the exception of exteriors are made under the lights.

### VERNON IN MIDST BUILDING BOOM AND PROSPERITY

VERNON, TEX., May 7.—It has been a month since the announcement was made of the discovery of oil in the Wharton ranch by the Sigler Oil Company and this section is now undergoing a mighty transformation by tremendous building development in Vernon and Wilbarger county, and the landscape in the Sigler pool is dotted with derricks where operators are feverishly rushing to see who will be the first to reach the Sigler pay sand. The town of Vernon is looking up into the big cities and cannot but be impressed with the almost Aladdin-like building campaign now being conducted in Vernon, where two refineries, scores of brick business houses and about 150 residences are going up in record-breaking time.

While there are now 13 lumber yards doing business, they cannot meet the demands made upon them for building and rig materials. Before the Sigler well came in, Vernon only boasted of two lumber yards, but there are now 12, with more coming.

Bank deposits in the four banks have increased from \$3,000 to \$5,000, being an increase of 67 per cent or an average of \$109 deposited per minute about the amounts withdrawn.

Another bank will open its doors in Vernon shortly.
