REPUBLICANS GIVE UP SALES TAX FOR BONUS REVENUE

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Uninterupted flow of oil from Mexico is essential to the United States, Franklin K. Lane, former secretary of the interior, told the senate Mexican officers committee today. Last year the United States consumed 30,000,000 to 40,000,000 barrels of oil more than it 40,000,000 barrels of oil more than it produced.

"There is plenty of oil for our needs there," Lane said, "and we can get it if the United States is sufficiently interested to see that no unfair thing is done either there or here.

"Americans bought land in Mexico, discovered oil, and developed it under the smile and approval of Mexico. They should be entitled to use it in the interest of their country if it doesn't conflict with Mexico's interest." EL PASO, May 10.—Mexican revolutionists overtook and dispersed the troops escorting President Carranza in his flight

from Mexico City, "causing them serious losses," according to a message from General Obregon to Governor de la Huerta, supreme commander of the liberal constitutionalist army, made public here today.

General Obregon detailed the capture of Mexico City, confirmed the report of a wholesale execution of military prisoners at Mexico City by General Francisco Murguia before the Carranza leader fled the capital and told of further states to join the revolution and of the capture of Puebla City, one of the largest in Mexico. Among the victims were General Triana, Lechuga, Artigos, Roberto Cejudo and others, according to General Obregon.

WASHINGTON, May 10 .- With Mexico City, Vera Cruz and Tampico in the hands of the revolutionists, American destroyers were en route today to Mexican waters to afford protection in Mexican gulf ports.

Official confirmation of the fall of the Mexican capital was received yesterday from the American embassy which reported there was no disorder incident to the transfer of authority. Tampico and Vera Cruz also were reported quiet.

The American embassy report made no mention of President Carranza and reports from Vera Cruz said that the search in that city had failed to find him. One report was that he had been arrested in Esperanza, state of Vera Cruz, but this was without confirmation here.

BIRTHS EXCEED DEATHS BY THIRTY-FOUR PER CENT

WASHINGTON, May 10. — Births within the registration area of the United States, which covers about 52 per cent of the country's estimated population in 1918 exceeded deaths by 34.4 per cent, Statistics for that year just completed by htecensus bureau show a total of 1,363,649 births in the territory included in the registration area, which is a small decrease compared to 1917, while the deaths, 1,014,620, show a slight increase. Of every 100 infants born during 1918, the figures show 10 died before reaching the age of one year, a fractional decrease over 1917. Mortality rates among male infants were 22 per cent greater than that for female infants. The birth of 15,342 pairs of twins and 147 sets of triplets, was reported.

STAND ON TREATY N. Y. DEMOCRATS TO WILSON'S CALL

Telegram President Says Honor of National in Party's Hands

WASHINGTON, May 9.—A call to the democratic party to go into the campaign standing foursquare in favor of the treaty of Versailles and against the senate's reservation, was issued to night by Presid . Wilson in a telegram to Oregon democratic leaders, made public at the White House.

Declaring that the party had "the honor of the nation" in its hands, the president said that the Lodge reservations were "utterly inconsistent" with that honor as well as destructive of the role of world leadership, which the United States must assume.

The only true Americanism, the president said, was "that which puts America at the front of free nations and redeems the great promises which we made to the world."

It would be a violation of such promises, he said, to attach reservations to the treaty which "whittle it down or weaken it as the republican leaders of the senate have proposed to de."

The telegram was in response to the following message from G. E. Hamaker of Portland, Oregon, chairman of the Multnomah county democratic central committee:

"Please wire whether you consider it important to nominate candidates pledged to ratify Versailles treaty without Lodge reservations."

The reply of the president follows:

"I think it imperative that party should at once proclaim itself the uncompromising champion of the nation's honor and the advocate of everything that the United States can do in the service of humanity; that it should therefore endorse and support the Versailles treaty and condemn the Lodge reservations as utterly inconsistent with the nation's honor and destructive of the world leadership which it had established, and which all the free peoples of the world including the great powers themselves, had shown themselves ready to welcome.

"It is time that the party should proudly avow that it means to try, without flinching or turning at any time away from the path for reasons of expediency, to apply moral and Christian principles to the problems of the world. It is trying to accomplish so-

isn principles to the problems of the world. It is trying to accomplish social, political and international reforms and is not daunted by any of the difficulties it has to contend with. Let us prove to our late associates in the war that at any rate the majority party of the nation, the party which expresses the true hopes and purposes of the people of the country, intends to keep faith with them in peace as well as in war. They gave their treasure, their best blood and everything that they valued, in order, not merely to beat Germany, but to effect a settlement and bring about strangements of peace with which they have now tried to formulate in the treaty of Versailles. They are entitled to our support in this settlement and in the arrangements for which they have been striving.

CALLAN FACES TRIAL ON CHARGE OF MURDER

CHARGE OF MURDER

LLANO, TEX.. May 10.—James Callap, Menrad county ranchman and former president of Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, faced trial here today chasged with killing Vernon R. Billing, a young cattleman of Dewitt county on the Callan ranch near Menard on November 12, last. The case was brought to Liano county on a change of venue.

Callan, who is a former president of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, was released on \$20,000 bail at the conclusion of his examinating final at Menard on November 23. He testified that he never had seen Billing before the time of the shooting and that he fired in the belief that his own life was in danger:

Billings was shot on the Callan ranch, through which he was driving a herd of horses. Billings was shot from his horse, the only builet fired penetrating his heart. Witnesses at Callan's examination, supporting a defense contention of self defense, told of the alleged sudden shifting of reins by Billings and maneuvering of his horse during the quarrel.



The Story of Modern Bread Making-Chapter XI:



The Fermenting Room

ROPER fermenting of doughs is one of the processes in the modern bakery which especially demands expert knowledge.

In the fermenting room the temperature of the air and the humidity are under absolute control. In the far corner of the room is shown the humidifying machine, which continually pumps washed air of a temperature of 80 degrees into this room, through the air ducts.

This air has a humidity of 7Q degrees, whereas the average hu-midity of the air is only 30 degrees. Wet air prevents the surfaces of the doughs from drying and hardening during the 5-hour fermenting period.

The temperature of each dough is taken at regular intervals. At the proper time comes the

"punching" process, to expel the waste gases and incorporate fresh air in their place, a process which

If the fermenting period is too short the gluten in the dough will not be properly expanded by the carbonic acid gas, and the result will be a small, heavy loaf.

If over-fermentation takes place the finished loaf will be marked by sourness and crumbliness.

Under and over-fermentation are common occurrences in home kitchens and unsanitary bakeshops.
