# REBEL FORCES ARE CLOSING IN ON CARRANZA

(Continued from Page 1)

Only American patrons will be permitted for the present. Alfonso Vasquez, commercial agent of the insurgents, has been appointed revolutionary vice consul at El Paso, it was announced here today. Alfonso Pasqueira will succeed Vasquez as commercial agent, the report said.

### CARRANZA SHAVED BEARD AND WENT UNRECOGNIZED

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., May 13.—President Carranza made his escape minus his beard. This report received here today caused considerable mirth and laughter. According to the report President Carranza fled Mexico City last Saturday with Vera Cruz as his destination. He was accompanied by a number of troops he believed loyal. On the way a number of them revolted. After reaching Matlascanals, Carranza and his men were surrounded. With capture imminent, Carranza, according to reports, decided to effect a disguise by shaving his beard. In this way he made his way unrecognized through a cordon of rebel soldiers who surrounded his train. The disguise was so effective that his own men failed to recognize him. Realizing that he could not escape to Vera Cruz, Carranza is

attempting to reach the Isthmus of Tehuantepec. Candido Aguilar, son in law of Carranza has not been killed, according to latest reports here. Silvestre Aguilar, a brother of Candido was wounded during the fighting.

### MORE MEXICAN OFFICIALS HAVE GROSSED RIO GRANDE

BROWNSVILLE, TEX., May 13.—Gov. Gustavo Espinosa Mireles of the Mexican state of Coahuila, crossed to the American side of Rio Grande City, Tex., early today, according to a report to United States army headquarters at Fort Brown. Mireles was quoted as saying that Gov. Rafael Cardenas of Tamaulipas, Gov. Jose de los Santos of Nuevo Leon and Gov. Severino Martinez of San Luis Potosi are now across the Rio Grande, opposite Fort Ringgold, Tex., awaiting transportation to the American side.

E. Reyes, a revolutionary agent, crossed to Matamoros to negotiate with Gen. Rafael Colunga, the federal commander, for the peaceful surrender of the town. It was reported Colunga wishes only to retain command of Matamoros long enough to assure quiet and order, while a change in government is being effected.

Governor Mireles, according to the reports to Fort Brown, said 1,000 Carranza troops entered Camargo, opposite Rio Grande City, this morning. The rebel garrison offered no resistance, having departed in the night. It was believed here the rebels entering Camargo were under command of Gen. Alfredo Ricaut, a nephew of President Carranza.

KEARNEY, N. J., May 13.—Carrying a suit case in each hand, little Vera Thurston, 10, trudged down the tracks of the Erie railroad near Arlington this afternoon. Behind her with hands in his pockets walked Roy Davis, 13.

Charles Schmitt, gate tender, recognized them as the young couple who "eloped" Tuesday night when Roy's foster parents threatened to send him back to the state home for boys, and the search which police and members of their families had kept up for two days was ended. They said they spent Tuesday night in a garage and on Wednesday visited New York returning to New Jersey at night and sleeping in an open field.

### LEGION WILL ATTEMPT TO FORCE BONUS BILL

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The executive committee of the American Legion has been called to Washington next week in an effort to force through congress a soldier bonus bill before the convention recesses, it was learned today at legion headquarters here.

Plans are for the committee, which is composed of representatives from all states to continue in session until the measure is passed or until the recess is taken, which probably will be early in June.

If the bill fails a delegation will be sent to each convention to obtain approval of the bonus in the party platform, it was learned.

### TESTIMONY IS STARTED IN CALLAN TRIAL

FORT WORTH, TEX., May 13.—The hearing of evidence in the trial of James Callan, pioneer stockman, and for many years president of the Texas Cattle Raisers' association, began at Liano this morning. Callan is charged with the killing of young Victor Billings of De Witt county on the Callan ranch in Menard county last November after a quarrel over the opening of a pasture gate. The jury in the case was completed late Wednesday.

Callan will plead that Billings, mounted on a spirited horse, was about to ride over him when he fired. Furthermore, he will plead that Billings had left open a gate between a "clean" and a tick-infested pasture, thereby spoiling the quarantine work of many seasons. Each side is represented by a large array of counsel from various parts of Texas.

Just before the first witness was put on the stand this morning by the state, attorney for Callan asked the judge to instruct the jury to return a verdict of not guilty. This motion was based on certain statements, which District Attorney Christian made before the jury. The motion was not granted and Sheriff F. M. Slaughter was placed on the stand. The sheriff described his visit to the scene of the killing, wounds in the body of young Billings and an inspection of the ground on the day after the shooting.

### ROAD CONTRACT FAIR PROVIDING BOTH SIDES HONEST, SMOCK REPORTS

"There is nothing in the road building contract let by the county commissioners court which is not fair to both sides, provided both sides are honest," Tom B. Smock, chairman of the public affairs committee of the Rotary Club, which at the instance of W. Fred Weeks, local attorney, were instructed to investigate the contract, in rendering his report before the Rotarians at their Thursday luncheon. "As it is to be presumed that both sides are honest, it didn't strike the committee from this club that much could be done about it," Mr. Smock continued.

"The contract, while in effect a cost plus contract, is apparently the best contract that can be made under present conditions, which are such that a straight contract can not be obtained. The contract is being revised now by a committee appointed by Judge R. E. Huff at a general conference, but nothing much can be done, in my

opinion, to alter the contract except in minor particulars." Several boxes and a considerable number of tickets for the Rotary Club-Wichita Club baseball game, scheduled for 3:30 p. m. Thursday, were subscribed for at the luncheon.

### MASS MEETING LIKELY FOR INTERURBAN PROJECT

A citizens mass meeting for the purpose of putting over the Wichita Falls obligations in connection with the building of the Wichita Falls-Dallas interurban is to be held early in the coming week, probably on Monday, it was announced Thursday by J. A. Kemp. It is expected that by the time of the meeting R. A. Thompson, widely known and experienced railroad builder, who is now in San Francisco, will be in attendance to advise with local people on their end of the project. # STREET LIGHTING PLANS NOW BEFORE THE CITY COUNCIL

The purchase of a grading plow for use upon the streets of Wichita Falls was ordered by the city council Thursday. The purchase of tractors, however, was postponed upon the motion of Councilman McDowell until the proposed tractors could be examined by a competent business man named by the city council. Final action upon the question of purchasing tractors, however, is expected to be taken at the next regular meeting of the board of aldermen.

Various petitions regarding street paving were submitted to be acted upon later. Councilmen have expressed the view that no paving should be permitted until all property owners along the street to be paved sign the petition. This requirement is the source of much delay due to the fact that a minority, often extremely small, refuse to sign paving petitions. The street lighting problem is to come before the council this afternoon. Representatives of electrical concerns will come before the council and submit plans for street lighting. It is understood that a majority of the aldermen favor street lighting throughout the night instead of until midnight as suggested by some. Systems now in use in Oklahoma City, Fort Worth, Dallas, Houston, El Paso and other large southwestern cities are being studied in an attempt to install the best possible system here.

Those present were Councilmen Bundy, McFall, Bonner, Curlee and McDowell, with Mayor Oline presiding.

Fourteen cases, 12 of them alleged traffic violations, composed Thursday's session of corporation court. Fines were assessed in all cases. Two persons arraigned on a charge of being intoxicated, claimed they secured "moonshine" from a bootlegger who distilled the liquor in Wichita Falls. Officers are investigating the case. The men cursed the officers when the policemen made the arrest, it is alleged.

**NEAL-HAMILTON CO. INCREASES CAPITAL TO DRILL TEST DEEPER**

By A. C. McCONNELL, VERNON, TEX. May 12.—At a recent meeting of the Neal-Hamilton Oil company, the stockholders voted to raise the capital stock of the company from \$40,000 to \$80,000. This action was deemed necessary in order to secure additional funds to carry the well beyond the 2,500-foot depth, called for in the contract. The additional stock is being offered to the stockholders, and is not to be placed on the market. The new issue will be used to drill the well to a depth of 3,000 feet and renew the lease on 1,500 acres which expires in July. A fund of \$10,000 will be used to drill the well deeper. The well is now drilling around 2,600 feet, under a new contract. Reports from the well indicated that the formations encountered were favorable and justified their belief that in going deeper they would probably strike oil. The stock is now being offered to stockholders at \$2.50 per share.

Reports are that the Webb-Magness well on the Luther Webb farm in the fork of the Red and Pease rivers, has reached a depth of 500 feet and is repairing rig and machinery to drill deeper. The contract depth is 2,500 feet, but the well will be pushed down to a depth of 3,000 feet, according to a statement of one of the promoters. Formations in this well are said to be similar to that found in the Northwest Extension field and they believe they will be justified in going deeper in search of oil. The Siger field is still holding the attention of oil operators, and with the completion of Siger No. 2, which is only a short way off, this field is expected to play a leading part in the petroleum industry in north Texas. Siger No. 1 has been swabbing 150 barrels in 16 hours, which is gratifying, as it is only swabbing from 1,500 feet. No. 2 is going down fast and will likely be the next completion in the Siger pool, unless the Burr-Wagoner test on the Castlebury farm wins the

The Story of Sugar Cane. Sugar cane requires an abundance of sunshine and water and a deep, fertile soil. In planting, the stalks are laid lengthwise in furrows, and each joint sends up a shoot, which later produces suckers. When ready for harvesting, a field of sugar cane resembles a corn field, but the plants are somewhat larger and there are no tassels and no ears. The stalks at this time have been growing about 12 months and have changed from green to reddish in color, while most of the lower leaves have fallen away. They are cut by hand with a sharp
