General T evino, one of the leading figures in the revolution, has gone to Apizaco, state of Tlaxcala, for the purpose of protecting the life of Carranza in the event he is made prisoner.

PEACE STATUS ESSENTIAL TO U.S. INDUSTRIES

Senator Reliog Says Time Has Come When Something Must Be Done

TO VOTE ON RESOLUTION AT 4 P. M. SATURDAY

Provision for Negotiations for Separate Peace Are Stricken Out

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The provision in the republican peace resolution requesting the president to open negotiations with Germany for a separate treaty was stricken out to-day on motion of Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the republican leader. After the provision had been strick-en out agreement was reached for a final vote on the resolution at 4:00 o'clock Saturday.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—A status of peace must be obtained "in some other way" if it cannot be secured by ratification of the treaty and the League of Nations, Senator Kellogg of Minnesota, one of the original "mild" reservationists in the treaty "mild" reservationists in the treaty fight declared today in the senate, supporting the republican peace res

ervation.
"It is of the utmost importance," he said, "that a status of peace be accomplished. Not only is it necessary to the industries of this country and its trade but it is important that the war powers of the president should coase.

"When resolutions of this character "When resolutions of this character were originally introduced in the senate I was opposed to them. I wished every opportunity given for the ratification of the peace treaty. But the president has made this impossible. "The time has come when something must be done. The nation as soon as possible, must be returned to normal conditions. I shall, therefore, vote for the resoultion declarfore, vote for the resoultion declar-ing the war at an end, which will re-store our diplomatic, consular and commercial relations with the central empires, because it seems to me the only possible way of now accomplish-ing this object. I have no doubt what-ever of the constitutionality of the resolution."

Senator Kellogg discussed precedents for the proposed action, concluding that under the constitution "the power to declare as a natural and necessary implication in the absence of an express prohibition," against such a step by congress.

"I voted for the treaty and the League of Nations," he said, "and I would do so again, but never if American sons and American resources must be called at the behest of any foreign country to sustain the tottering and turbulent nations of Europe; never if we are to sacrifice the century-old Monroe doctrine; never if foreign countries can interfere in er if foreign countries can interfere in domestic policies or bring the American labor to the level of European or Asiatic; never if this country is to be denied an equal voice in the councils of the League of Nations."

1820, with seven thousand messengers enrolled, representing a constituency of three million white Baptists, that we hereby respectfully and earnestly petition each of the two great political parties of the United States to put a plank in their respective platforms to be adopted at their approaching national conventions declaring strongly for the maintenance and of the law enacted for its enforcement.

"Second, that we also petition said parties not to nominate any man for the presidency who is not known to be committed to this policy of law and order.

"Third, that the committee on tem-

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The Story of Sugar Case.

Sugar cane requires an abundance of sunshine and water and a deep, fertile soil. In planting, the stalks are laid lengthwise in furrows, and each joint sends up a shoot, which later produces suckers. When ready for harvesting, a field of sugar cane resembles a corn field, but the plants ar somewhat larger and there are not tassels and no ears. The stalks at this time have been growing about 13 months and have changed from green to reddish in color, while most of the lower leaves have fallen away. They are cut by hand with a long
