A material increase in the rate of interest, perhaps as high as seven per cent, will be necessary for the bonds to be marketed at par in any event, and Mr. McFall recommends that this be done with the issues which will be floated here, giving people at home benefit of the increased interest rather than have it go to outsiders. Recogniz-ing a possibility of a readjustment of the bond market within the next three of four years, however, Mr. McFall suggests making these high interest bonds for short terms only. As an-other feature which will help with the promotion of this plan, he reco that a movement to bring about sub-mission of the question of the repeal of state and county tax laws imposed at present on municipal and other pub

lic bonds at the present session of the legislature be submitted at once. In this connection, he pointed out in discussing the report, that the law has not brought any considerable amount of revenue to the state having simply made it impossible for Texas people to buy bonds, and allowing Texas bonds to go to investors in other states where such securities were exempt from this kind of taxation. They are free from the Federal Income Tax, and the present market conditions requires them to be freed from other taxes if they are to be marketed at an ad-

In order to carry his recommendations into effect he suggests that the mayor within ten days appoint a committee of ten of the leading citizens, including the mayor, to go thoroughly into the matter, and to formulate some plan by which it might be carried into effect.

Before the submission of the plan, Mr. McFall discussed the matter with a number of leading citizens taken at random, and reports that he found them unanimous not only in the feasi bility and value of such a step, but convinced that no alternative was possible for Wichita Falls under constitutions such as exist at present, where sible for Wichita Falls under constitu-tions such as exist at present, where the city was compelled to make im-portant public improvements, and the present condition of the bond market made the sacrifice incidental to the marketing of the bonds in the usual way practically prohibitive.

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

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
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

The editing and assembling of a photo-drama consumes several weeks, When it is done the finished picture is shown first at the Studio Theater, a miniature theater in which the studio executives gather to watch a picture and to comment upon its worthiness.

When the photodrama has been seen and pronounced good it is sent to the executive offices. Here it is reviewed. by the administrative cabinet.

From the executive offices the original inal film goes to the laboratories, where approximately 100 additional films are made from the one. These replicas of the original, made much as a kodak print is made from a negative, are sent to the exchanges throughout the country.
