OPERATORS HOLD INDIGNATION MEETING AND ACTS AND RULINGS OF FEDERAL RECEIVER CRITICIZED

FOUR WARS FRANCE TO BE IN READINESS FOR ANOTHER WAR

PARIS, May 19.—Warning that France must, in the midst of peace, make preparations for future wars was uttered by Marshal Foch, who presided at the annual meeting of the Polytechnic school for army engineers today. Discussing lessons of the great war, he said the present economical struggle is the first part of the peace program, but preparation for war is the second part. "Which of us," he asked, "dares believe that Germany is renouncing war on the morrow of her ruin? Germany, which inspired by sheer ambition to take up arms in 1864, 1870 and 1914 on the basis of a historical necessity? Germany's neighbors, whether they wish or not, will be forced to keep up arms and maintain strong frontiers, because, quite apart from the generous intentions of civilized humanity, there are historic realities and racial appetites, just as there are geographical necessities." "How can we help mistrusting a nation," he continued, "which, reduced to impotence by the great Napoleon, has established itself and brings about complete overthrow of the colossal Napoleon empire, and by superlative military and methodic development extended its authority from the East Prussian marches to beyond the Rhine? Making war is its national industry and in its right."

RAILWAY BOARD REFUSES TO HEAR OUTLAW STRIKERS

CHICAGO, May 19.—The United States railway labor board today refused to hear petitions for injunctions presented by John Grunau, president of the Chicago Yardmen's Association, and officers of other organizations which went on strike recently in defiance of orders from national railroad brotherhoods. The board in arguing handed down by Judge R. M. Barton, chairman, announced that: "It must be thoroughly understood that the board cannot and will not undertake to hear any disputes or controversies except those which it is authorized to hear and will not hear the application of cases that are outside of the jurisdiction of the law and who are not complying with the law and the rules of the board."

PUBLIC GOES ON STRIKE AGAINST HIGH PRICES AND REDUCTIONS ARE REPORTED FROM MANY CITIES

General reductions of prices on merchandise, especially clothing, was reported today throughout the country. Merchants in many large cities have cut prices from 10 to 15 per cent. Newspapers in New York were filled with advertisements of the "sales." Reasons given for the reduction were: A "slow" spring season with the public doing little purchasing and leaving merchants with stocked up shelves. The "tight" condition of the money market. Banks were reported calling in loans, forcing merchants who had borrowed money to purchase goods, to unload in order to meet their notes. Congestion of freight shipments due to the lack of cars, the "rump" railroad strike and preventing proper distribution of merchandise. The food market, according to today's reports, had not been generally influenced by the downward movement. However, grocers in some sections predicted a slight decline might be expected soon, due to the general economic conditions. The congested freight situation was given as the reason for food prices remaining up. The price cutting movement has hit the middle west, all large cities except Detroit and Cleveland reporting slashing of prices. The people are acting together, government economic experts believe. People have delayed purchasing their summer outfits and in consequence merchants have been left with large stocks on hand.

SECRETARY HOUSTON OPPOSED TO ANY SOLDIER BONUS ACT

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Secretary Houston of the treasury in a letter today to Chairman Fordney of the house ways and means committee declared his opposition to an "soldiers' bonus legislation," "however financed." The secretary said it would be "highly unfortunate" to place any new financial obligations on the treasury and suggested that it would be wise for congress to seek out additional sources of revenue to meet current government expenses.

UNIFIED OPERATION RECOMMENDED BY RECEIVER DELANO

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Unified operation by the receiver of the oil properties in the contested Red River field with new wells limited to three for a month in order to maintain the present output was recommended in a report filed with the supreme court today by Frederick A. Delano, oil receiver in the Oklahoma-Kansas oil land controversy.

MEMBERS OF LEGISLATURE ARRIVING AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, TEX., May 19.—Members of the legislature are arriving today for the special session which convenes tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock for the primary purpose of passing a law which will provide for the establishment of non-otzon zones and compensate the farmers whose lands are placed in the non-producing areas. A quorum is expected to be present when the roll is called in the house and senate, according to those already here. Headquarters have been opened by the opposition to the establishment of non-otzon zones, and they assert that they will vigorously oppose the measure for the control of oil production for the establishment of non-otzon zones.

MERCHANTS HERE SEE LITTLE RELIEF FROM HIGH PRICES

Cuts in merchandise have been made in Wichita Falls as in other parts of the country, practically all of the merchants advertising reductions on their spring and early summer apparel, but so far as can be learned there is no indication of generally lower prices in the wholesale market which must be necessary before the price of clothing can be actually reduced. This cut is explained by local merchants as a necessary circumstance, chiefly as outlined by the dispatches from the national capital. "Wild buying" or overstocking may be largely responsible for cuts, price reductions of merchandise, whether for various reasons local merchants overbought this spring. Extravagant buying has been prevalent in the case of many of the stores in this city, and the merchandise, in trying to anticipate the demand, were prone to buy heavily. Several of the merchants stated, however, that the only place where they had been mistaken in buying heavily was in buying too much of the cheaper grade of merchandise. When wholesale prices began to rise, they had little to reduce but their cheaper grade of merchandise, and this, the public does not want. There is not, however, merchants state, sufficient overstocking in the city to make necessary a radical reduction in the price.

BANKS URGED TO STOPS ISSUE OF LIQUID FROZEN LOANS BY BOARD

WASHINGTON, May 12.—Adoption by American Bankers of the recommendation of Governor Harding of the federal reserve board to liquid frozen loans was expected by bank officials to alleviate the financial situation and to go far toward bringing down prices. Governor Harding applied the term "frozen loans" to credit extension permitting large stocks of merchandise to be held in storage for speculative purposes. Representative King of Illinois, recently charged in the House that present methods of financing were permitting commodities to be kept off the market with resultant increases in prices. Although legislation designed to drive foodstuffs from storage is now pending in congress, it was said today that careful withdrawal of credit from speculators in food products might accomplish more than statutory regulation. It was emphasized, however, that discrimination should be exercised by bankers in as much as in many lines the summer months pile up an accumulation of commodities for the following winter.

SEVEN COUNTIES GRANTED AID FOR ROAD BUILDING

AUSTIN, TEX., May 19.—Half a million dollars of state and federal aid was granted to seven counties for the construction of good roads on portions of state designated highways. The aid was apportioned as follows: Brazos, \$40,000; San Angelo, \$50,000; Cass, \$25,000; Hill, \$50,000; Stephens, \$100,000; Limestone, \$34,000; Orange, \$100,000.

DR. YOUHANS ONLY PERSON REMAINING MARQUONED

TEXARKANA, ARK., May 19.—Dr. William Youmans, brother of Federal Judge Frank D. Youmans, Fort Smith, Arkansas, was the last known person remaining marooned by the flood waters from Red River in Lafayette county and he was rescued safely last Tuesday afternoon by a searching party in a fleet of hastily constructed boats. So far as is known now, all parties marooned have been taken care of and there has been no loss of human life.

WEST TEXAS CHAMBER COMMERCE TO MAINTAIN LEGISLATIVE BUREAU

A legislative bureau to be in service throughout the coming special session of the legislature which will look out for the oil, cattle traffic and various other interests of West Texas was established by the West Texas chamber of commerce at Austin, according to a message received by W. Wheeler, organization secretary of this body, from J. C. Wheeler, president of the chamber of commerce at Austin. "This bureau can be made of immense value to the legislature," said Mr. Wheeler in this connection. "Should the legislature be considering a measure, whether beneficial or inimical to the interests of this part of the state, this bureau can make a very impressive influence through its 5,000 members in West Texas and the 1,500 members of commerce affiliated with it." Through its Washington office, the West Texas chamber of commerce will co-operate in every possible way with the efforts of Texas owners of lands involved in the Red River boundary dispute to protect their interests. Mr. Wheeler's message stated. Directions to this effect have been dispatched to the permanent representatives of the organization in Washington. Representatives of the organization will also be present at the meeting of the independent operators involved in the receivership to be held tomorrow in the district court house, Mr. Wheeler announced.

LEASE NOT VOID BECAUSE UNILATERAL SUPREME COURT SAYS

AUSTIN, May 19.—The supreme court held today that a mineral lease was not breached nor vitiated by the failure of the lessee to complete an oil well on the premises within the period of one year from the date of the lease nor was such an instrument void because unilateral. This decision was in the case of the Corsicana Petroleum Company against Mrs. M. J. Owens et al. from Wichita county, the higher court reversing the finding of the court of civil appeals and affirming that of the district court. The court of civil appeals had held that such a lease was void because unilateral.

STRIKES COST 2 BILLIONS IN 1919, SISON SAYS

NEW YORK, May 19.—An incomplete list of direct losses due to strikes in 1919 places the cost to labor in wages at nearly \$23,000,000 and to industry more than one and one quarter billion dollars, Francis H. Sison, vice-president of the Guaranty Trust Company of New York, told the members of the national association of manufacturers here today. The chief danger in the present situation, Mr. Sison said, is the desirability of low prices as an end in itself may be as exaggerated as to lead to the attempt to force prices down through harmful measures like strikes for high living cost and increased rents.

BLACKIE LEWIS GRANTED SIXTY DAY REPRIEVE

AUSTIN, May 19.—A reprieve of 60 days from May 26 was granted today by the governor to T. Middleton, alias Blackie Lewis, who was given a life sentence for the murder of a woman, whose body was subsequently found in a barrel.

TEE PEE WILL BE BAILED THIS WEEK

VERNON, TEX., May 19.—The Tee-Pee well in section 34, block 13, will be bailed this week. Since oil and gas gushed over the top a month ago, the well has been a "standing pat" on high prices which have prevailed since shortly after the war began. Price reductions, although expected, were not forthcoming.

NO INDICATIONS IMMEDIATE SLUMP CLOTHING PRICES

GALVESTON, TEX., May 19.—Charles E. Wray, secretary of the National Clothiers' association, discussing the question of clothing prices before the Texas Retail Clothiers' convention today, declared there was no indication of an immediate slump in prices. There may be slight recessions in some lines and slight gains in others, he told the delegates, but he expressed his opinion that there would be no radical changes in prevailing levels.

WHEAT GROWERS ADOPT \$3.13 BUSHEL PRICE

HUTCHINSON, KANS., May 19.—The 1920 wheat crop will be disposed of at a basic price of \$3.13 per bushel. After an exciting session the newly organized Wheat Growers Association of the United States late yesterday adopted the price commission's recommendation for that price. The association, which includes Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Nebraska and South Dakota, effected its permanent organization outlining the purpose of the organization as being solely to "establish and maintain a fair price for wheat."

NUMBER CASES REVERSED BY CRIMINAL APPEALS COURT

AUSTIN, TEX., May 19.—In the court of criminal appeals today the case of Nathan Briscoe, from Comanche, given a 50-year sentence in the penitentiary on conviction of killing of Jesse Burke, was reversed and remanded. The higher court held that the burden of proof showing that threats made by Briscoe were directed at Burke was upon the state and not the appellant.

RADIO MESSAGE SAYS CARRANZA HAS BEEN TAKEN

The radio was declared to have come from "an unusually reliable source." It did not state, however, what port of departure Carranza was supposed to be headed.

DRILL ENCOUNTERS PETRIFIED BONES AND OTHER THINGS

MORAN, TEX., May 19.—While drilling at a depth of 34 feet in the Garritt well of the Apex Drilling Company one and one-half miles east of town last week a peculiar formation of petrified bones, weeds, sticks and silver and other ore was struck. A showing of gas was also encountered at this depth. Some of the ore and other peculiar articles were brought to the city and placed on exhibition. At a depth of 123 feet another oil sand was found and 128 feet a heavy flow of gas. The well is now drilling at 140 feet.

ARMY AND NAVY PAY BILL SIGNED BY WILSON

WASHINGTON, May 19.—President Wilson today signed the army and navy pay bill providing for a temporary adjustment of scales or officers and enlisted men pending permanent legislation on the subject at a later date.

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MOVEMENT TO HEAD OFF M'ADDO MAY DEVELOP

In Indiana And Michigan Attempts Expected to Beat Damper on Boom.

NEW YORK, May 15.—While republicans were still trying to determine just what happened in yesterday's Pennsylvania primary, democrats were holding three important state conventions today.

The most interesting was by Michigan. Democrats of that state gave Herbert Hoover a plurality in a presidential primary early last month. Hoover has since repudiated the democratic party but the 56 delegates have been credited to him nevertheless, giving him second place among democratic candidates on the basis of instructed delegates.

Today's convention was expected to undo the work of the primary, so far as Hoover is concerned. William G. McAdoo was second in the preferential vote and the growing boom of Governor Cox of Ohio has its home in an adjacent state and was believed to have an important bearing on the action of the convention.

Politicians also were watching the convention in Indiana, as they foresee launching there of a definite drive against the candidacy of William G. McAdoo.

Virginia, believed to be a strong McAdoo state, was choosing 24 delegates at a convention today.

The sole republican activity today was a state convention in Alabama where 16 delegates were to be selected.

The selection in Pennsylvania, following yesterday's republican primary was as obscure as anticipated. Lack of a real preferential vote made it appear certain the state's second choice candidates would not be known positively until the balloting started at Chicago. Governor Spruell is expected to be first choice of the 76 delegates.

As a result of the democratic primary, Pennsylvania's 76 delegates are expected to support Attorney General Palmer, "Doro's son."

Wood apparently won the Vermont primary yesterday with ease, adding eight delegates to his lead.

TWO SETS OF DELEGATES CHOSEN BY GEORGIA DEMOCRATS


ATLANTA, GA., May 15.—Georgia democrats will send two sets of delegates to the San Francisco convention. After supporters of Senator Hicks Smith and Thomas E. Watson had united their forces and thus gained control of the state convention, delegates pledged to A. Mitchell Palmer last night elected a Palmer delegation and announced they would contest for seats in the national convention. Palmer obtained a plurality of county votes in the recent state wide primary over Watson and Smith, who finished in the order named.

Not only did the Smith-Watson forces succeed in keeping the state delegation from going instructed for Palmer, so-called administration candidate, but they put the convention on record by resolutions as opposed to the league of nations' covenant and as refusing to endorse the administration of President Wilson. They also adopted resolutions advocating free press, free speech and ending repeal of all espionage, sedition and conscription laws passed during the war.

Earlier in the session the majority faction had refused to re-elect Clark Howell of Atlanta, a Palmer supporter, as national committeeman, naming instead W. C. Veena of Moultrie. Later efforts by the minority to have the convention go on record as approving the Wilson administration and the league of nations with reservations "that may not be destructive" were defeated and the majority adopted resolutions flatly declining to do either.

When the election of delegates was reached, Smith supporters proposed that the delegates to the convention be equally divided among three factions, but this the Palmer men refused.

WOOD GETS MAJORITY IN VERMONT PRIMARY

MONTPELIER, VT., May 15.—In complete return today from Vermont's presidential preference primary yesterday gave Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood approximately 70 per cent of the republican vote, the total of which was about one-twentieth of normal. The democratic vote was negligible.

Senator Hiram W. Johnson, California, and Herbert C. Hoover were in

a close race for second place on the republican ballot. Governor Coolidge of Massachusetts and William Grant Webster, an attorney of New York, were contesting the next position.

General Wood ran better in the country towns than in the cities. His name and Webster's were the only ones printed on the republican ballot, and there were none printed on the democratic ticket. The light vote cast in the primary is attributed to the fact that the result of the balloting is not binding on the delegates to the party national convention, who will be elected at state conventions to be held soon.

PROHIBITION AN ISSUE IN VIRGINIA CONVENTION

ROANOKE, VA., May 15.—Indications were that prohibition would be an important issue before the state democratic convention, which met here today to choose delegates to the national convention at San Francisco. Col. R. F. Leedy of Leesville, candidate for congress from the Seventh district and a delegate from Page county, announced he would champion the cause of light wines, beer and cider. Prohibition advocates led by State Senator G. W. Hays of Accomac, were lining up strong against the adoption of a wet plank and a stiff fight was predicted.

Judge R. W. Duke of Charlottesville, said to be a Wilsonian democrat, was selected by the executive committee as temporary chairman and to deliver the keynote speech. The convention will elect eight delegates at large to the national convention, choose electors at large and select a member of the national committee.

COUNCIL SELECTS GENEVA SEAT OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS

By CAMILLO CIANFARRA (United Press Staff Correspondent)
 GENEVA, May 18.—The council of the league of nations in session here has decided upon Geneva as the seat for the league's headquarters. It was learned tonight.
 The decision follows Switzerland's vote to become a member of the league.
 The council also decided that states desiring to join the league must first conform to the regulations to be formed by a league commission.
 A message was sent to President Wilson asking him to call a meeting of the league's general assembly.
 The council replied to the wireless message from the Russian soviet government, which virtually refused to allow the proposed investigating commission to enter Russia, declaring if the Moscow commission persist in this attitude, the league will throw upon Russia "full responsibility" for her isolation.
 The council approved the report of Leon Bourgeois on disarmament. Bourgeois' report of a financial conference to be held at Brussels to discuss exchange and the general international financial situation, also was approved. A committee of six was appointed to prepare for the conference.
 Representatives of each league member will be invited. Questions to be discussed will include reparations, war debts, the internal financial situation of each league member here, circulation of foreign debts, and limitation of imports.
 Special invitation will be sent to the United States.

YOUNG AMERICAN GIRL TELLS OF KILLING OF TWO AMERICANS BY MEXICAN BANDITS NEAR PALIZIDO

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., May 18.—Meager details of the killing of Eben Greenlaw and his son, Ralph, May 1 by Mexican bandits near Palizido, Mexico, were told Wednesday morning by Miss Minnie Barton, an intimate friend of the family, who passed through San Antonio en route to her home in Los Angeles.
 Reports of the death of Mr. Greenlaw and his son were filed with the state department the day after the murder by the American embassy in Mexico City and in announcing the killing of the two Americans the state department added that it had asked the Mexican government to take "effective measures immediately for the apprehension and punishment of the assassins."
 Five effective measures might be, Miss Barton was a little doubtful.
 "For nobody seemed to know exactly how many men attacked Mr. Greenlaw and Ralph," she explained. "The Mexicans with them were so frightened that they were unable to tell us definitely. The number varied from three to 12." The only fact of which the family can be certain is that Eben Greenlaw and his son, Ralph, 30 years old, were taking the payroll from Palizido, the principal saw mill, to a logging camp and while en route their logging train was stopped, the two men murdered and the money stolen. This was Saturday morning, May 1.
 Miss Barton, a young girl living with the family as a teacher for the three small Greenlaw children, one a motherless child of Ralph Greenlaw's, is still very much unnerved as the result of her experience. With her mother, Mrs. H. H. Barton and friends from California who had been in Mexico, she arrived in San Antonio Wednesday morning from Laredo.

It was horrible," she added that in investigating they had found two shots had been fired in Ralph's gun and one in Mr. Greenlaw's. "But that meant nothing," she explained, "for it was quite likely they had been fired before the trip."
 "But they were not tortured. We had that much to be thankful for," she said. "I had loved Mexico," Miss Barton said after a pause. "It's a wonderful, beautiful country, with unbelievable opportunities. Perhaps under the new regime the life of foreigners be a little more secure." It was suggested.
 "Perhaps," hastily. "Yes," rousing herself a little, "Obregon seems friendly. We were in Mexico City last week when he entered," she added. "There wasn't a shot fired; we were told that he would occupy the city at 11:30 o'clock so we all went out to meet him. That was all there was to it. A bearded man wearing a white shirt, he just rode in."
MAN FOUND BRUISED AND BOUND NEAR DENTON TELLS LURID STORY
 DENTON, TEX., May 18.—A man giving his name as W. L. Touchstone was found bruised and bound four miles from Denton last night by F. W. Fry.
 Touchstone said that he was a street car conductor in Dallas and that late in the night of May 7 he was knocked in the head at the end of his run and robbed of \$238. He regained consciousness in an automobile, but failed again to recover after he had been placed in a cellar, which he thinks was in Dallas. He was kept in this cellar where he received bloody sausage and water for food until last night when his captors bound him, placed him in an automobile later to throw him out on the road near Denton. After rolling about 100 yards he attracted the attention of Mr. Fry.
 Touchstone said he knows of no motive which could have prompted his kidnapping. He is weak and bruised,

TOUCHSTONE DISAPPEARED MYSTERIOUSLY MAY 7

DALLAS, TEX., May 18.—William L. Touchstone, a Dallas street car conductor, disappeared mysteriously on the night of May 7 at the end of his night's work. He is said to have had at least \$100 in his possession. A constant search by detectives had failed to locate the missing man until word came today that he had been found near Denton.
 Touchstone's disappearance was a complete puzzle to police officials. His clothes were found on the night of his disappearance in a grove near his home.

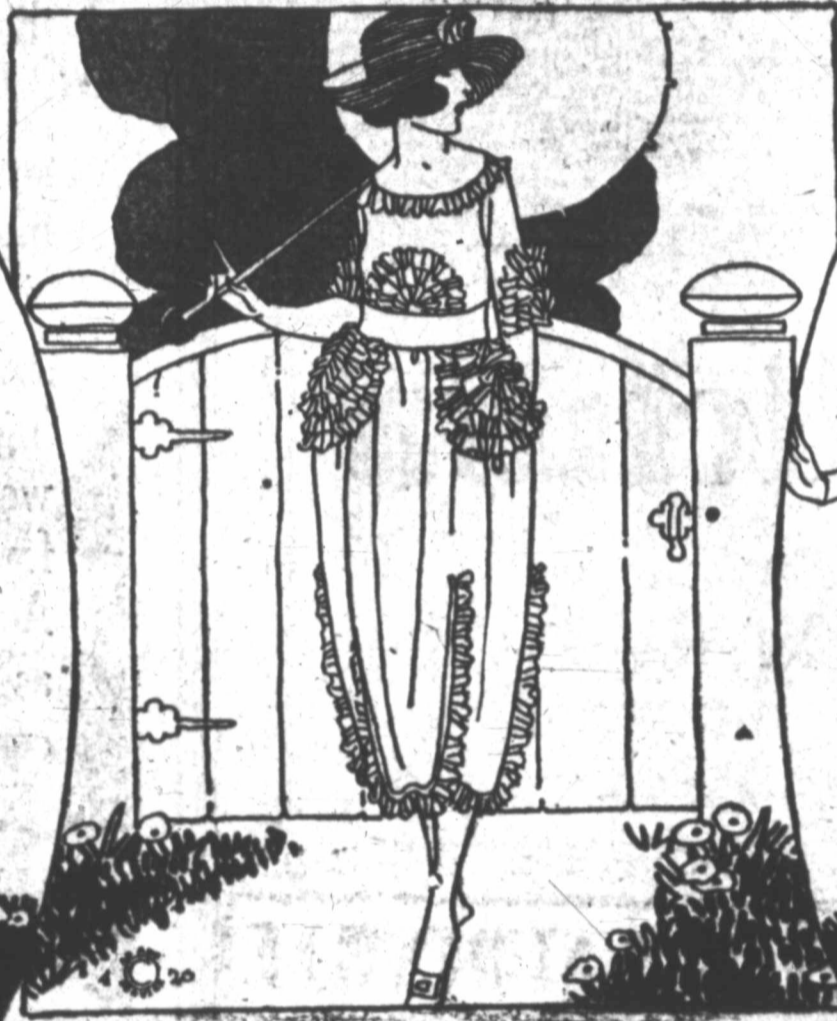

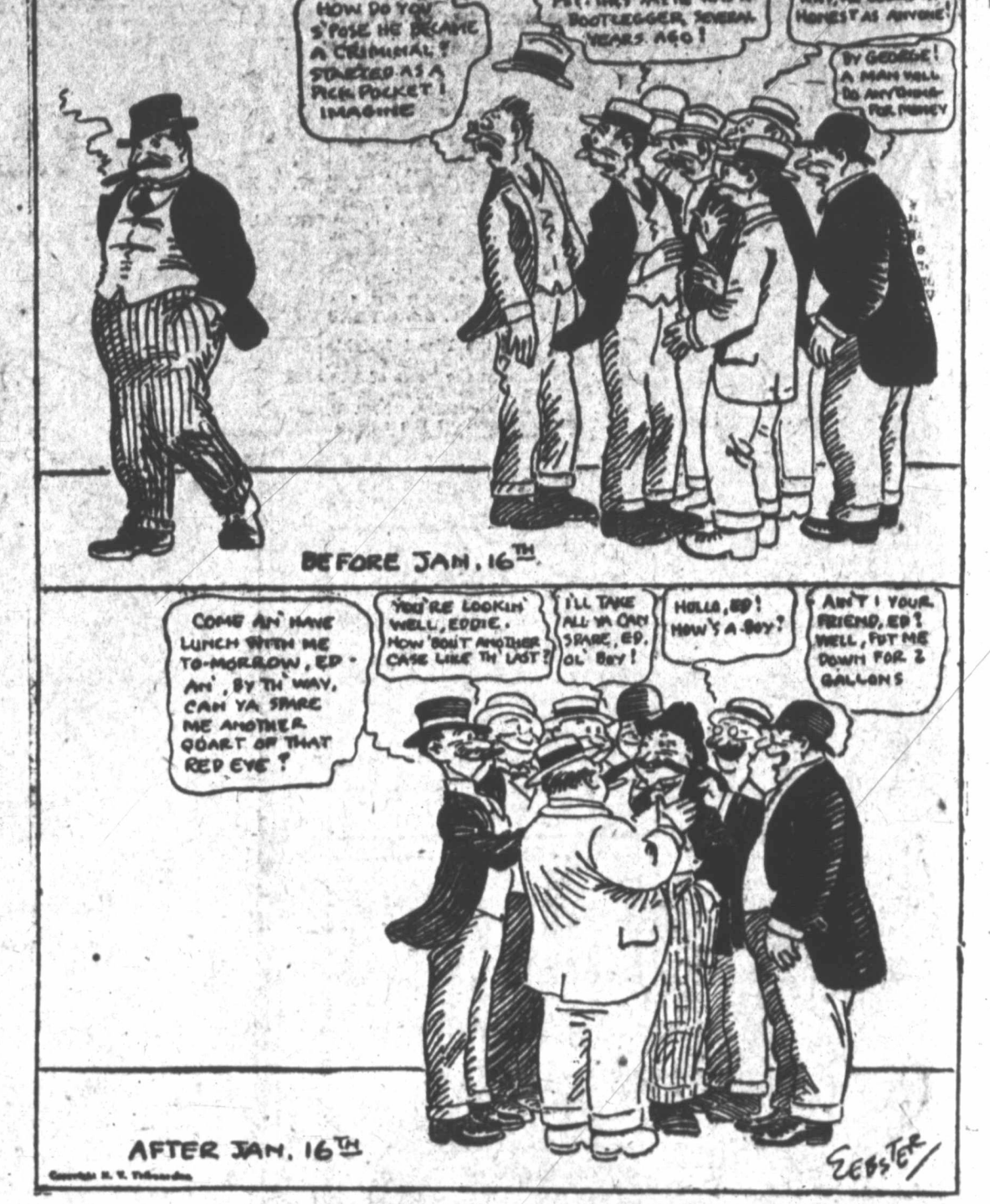

KEMP PORTRAITS ARE PRESENTED TO THE KEMP LIBRARY.

Beautiful tributes to Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Kemp, as citizens, friends and neighbors, as well as in the role of benefactors, were paid Tuesday evening by every speaker taking part in the program, when the handsome oil portraits of Mr. and Mrs. Kemp were formally presented to the people of Wichita Falls and hung on the library walls. The program was presided by an open air concert by the Shrine band in front of the library, which was much enjoyed. The program was announced, and the speakers introduced by H. L. 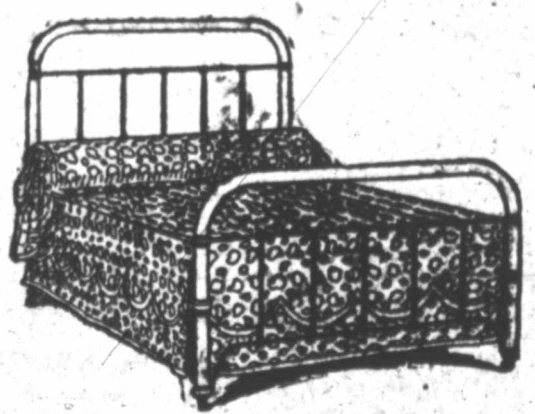

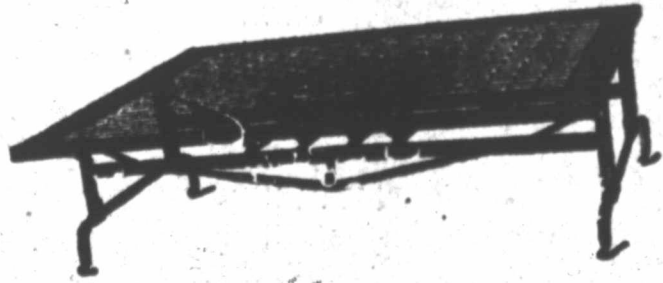

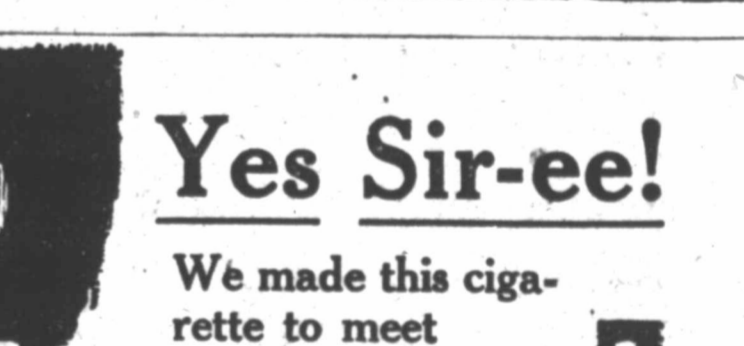

ELECTRA POOL AFTER 9 YEARS PRODUCTION MAKING 10,000 BBL.

By H. A. STROUD

ELECTRA, TEX., May 19.—There is something phenomenal in the way that the Electra pool has held up through the nine years that have elapsed since it was first discovered. Its history, as the discovery pool of north Texas, is one that is filled with interesting data and its record is one that is to be envied by many oil fields that have come and gone since Electra has been on the oil producing map of the nation.

One remarkable feature of this field is that it has had the ability to "come back," and with its ups and downs has never remained "out" for the count. After nine years of active drilling and production the field still maintains a production exceeding 10,000 barrels, and drilling rigs are as numerous, or almost as numerous as in the early discovery days.

There are several reasons why the Electra field has had a long and prolific life. Truly the paramount reason is because of the long life of the production in the field. Another is the variety of sands found in all parts of the field.

Discovered in 1911, there was wildcatting for oil in the vicinity of Electra as early as the latter part of 1909 and the early part of 1910. This activity was confined principally to the Waggoner ranch lying all around the townsite. But the discovery well was not drilled on the Waggoner holdings and did not become known until the first day of April, 1911. It was drilled on Woodruff and Putman lease by the Clayco Oil company. This well came in good for around 400 barrels a day and was the first real gusher in north Texas.

Following the discovery well the field was rapidly extended in every direction. Wells were drilled right to the edge of the townsite, which is only two miles from the discovery well. The major companies carried out the biggest part of the development in those days, as there were only a few big independent operators and the small traders that we now have in the country had not yet decided that there was money for the small man in the oil business.

The field spread for miles as the wildcatting traced the extent of the pool. Everything was running true so far, when the crude oil market went to pieces over the big discovery pools in Oklahoma around the town of Cushing. For a period development stopped and Electra bore the appearance of a "blow-up" boom town. This "blow-up" was a blessing in disguise. Until the bottom went out of the oil market, Electra was a city of rags and shacks. The migratory element departed for the Cushing fields and left the permanent citizens and the real developers and operators.

As things gradually assumed normal conditions the houses were soon filled again and business started up in a steady way. That was the end of the "boom" in Electra. Since that time the growth has been rapid, substantial and along conservative lines. That is the reason that the wonderful opportunities of the Electra field are not known to the world. Electra is not an "oil town." It is an industrial center and operating headquarters for oil men.

Electra Becomes Supply Center. Being the first oil field in north Texas, the big supply concerns of the nation established branch stores, and as the surrounding fields were opened up increased their stocks and branched out. Drilling contractors looked with favor on Electra as an operating headquarters and it is this class of citizenship that has built up the community.

As referred to before the large number of sands has been one of the things responsible for the Electra field always being able to come back. There are sands as shallow as 400 feet and as deep as 2,100 feet in the field. The discovery well, after producing for three or four years played out and the company drilled in 1900 feet deeper and the well is still on the pump.

On the Stringer lease many wells have been drilled on to the next sand with the result that the production was even greater than in the first sand. There is an instance north of the city where there are four wells in a line the greatest distance between any two not exceeding 200 feet. These wells are all pumping and producing oil from four separate and distinct sands.

In the Sunshine Hill district there are three very prolific sands, ranging from 500 to 1,000 feet. The same is true of the Piper district west of the city and in fact the variety of sands seems to be evident in nearly every section of the field.

At one time the Electra field produced 30,000 barrels of oil a day. This was in the early days when the field was at its zenith, and when the production was flush. It is considered remarkable by oil men that it still retains one third its flush production after the nine years of production.

New Wells Coming In. There is an opinion that seems current among outside oil circles that the play in the Electra field is over and that the oil operators are setting quietly by watching with sad eyes the waning glory of a once bright star. But such is far from the case. Dauntless wildcatting are going out in new directions and opening extensions. Territory that was once condemned is being reopened. A remarkable thing in the past few weeks is the opening of territory that was condemned several years ago. Outside oil men are inclined to call this propaganda and doubt. But there is a logical explanation.

Why good paying wells can be drilled in condemned territory.

When the Electra field was being wildcatting crude oil was only bringing a market quotation of around 40 cents a barrel. With a scarcity of pipe lines, wells good for as high as 30 and 40 barrels a day were passed up in the hopes of getting bigger pay. But today when a five-barrel well is a paying proposition these old sands and old, so-called dry holes, are being remembered and the wise ones are going back after the shallow stuff, which has of late become so attractive. This shallow drilling has caused the production to hold up to the 10,000 mark and the last week noted an increase of nearly 500 barrels.

The oil fraternity is beginning to look to Electra again as the play in other fields diminishes and the streets are thronged with busy hustling people—the real developers and not the lease hounds and grafters; and it might be added that those who left when Electra was a rag town with mud holes for streets marvel at the shining new pavement, the sewers, the new schools and churches and the beautiful residence sections that are being rapidly built. Electra is not yet ready for mourners.

All criminal complaints against delinquent juveniles of Wichita county will hereafter be filed in this book. An interesting feature of the record is that space is allowed not merely for the juvenile's first offense, but for his second and third offense as well, the county probation officer pointing to the fact that juveniles are usually given several "releases" in the hope that they will reform without being sent to a training school.

BURKBURNETT MAYOR TO NAME COMMITTEE TO DRAFT NEW CHARTER

BURKBURNETT, May 19.—At the regular meeting of the city council Monday night the following matters were discussed and acted upon: The appeal of the Order of Owls to hold a street carnival in the city using parts of Main street and adjacent streets was carried over for a week's consideration. An electric light was ordered placed on the corner of Fourth and E avenue. The request for a permit to erect a 20-foot frame hotel building in the lot joining the postoffice block was discussed at length, owing to the position of the petitioners that the wooden material for this enterprise was purchased and on the ground before the fire restrictions were made to the building of frame structures. It was decided that this building should come under the demands of the fire marshal controlling fire limit districts for such buildings. A large increase of fines was shown on the city court records. An ordinance of the service car drivers was read with penalty for violation of such regulations fixed and was eventually tabled for further consideration of the matter. T. J. Bentley, city sanitary officer, gave a good report of his investigations in Abilene and Dallas, where he had been sent by the city in the interest of a better system for Burk Burnett. He was instructed to proceed with his sanitation plans in conjunction with the proper authorities. An injunction by Dr. Glat restraining the city from erection of a plant a year ago, was found to be still in force. Mayor Lansky was authorized to appoint a committee to draft a charter for a commission form of government to be presented to the citizens for their approval. The fire yesterday morning at 9:30 on the Charles F. Noble lease, southwest of Burk Burnett, called out the city fire department, but the company's fighting force had the flames under control before the former arrived. Cause was attributed to a leaking fuel pipe. No great amount of damage was done. The city fire engine ran into a group of people who made an imprudent crossing on its way and one man was knocked down, but sustained no serious injury. The chief feature of an entertainment at the Y. M. C. A. building to-night will be an address by J. E. Barrow, representative of the West Texas chamber of commerce, who will speak in behalf of the organization with special stress on the commission form of government. Music by the local orchestra will be rendered before and following the address. A drive for Y. M. C. A. memberships will be held here Saturday, under the direction of the local secretary, J. A.
