80,000 NEW MEMBERS FOR AMERICAN LEGION

INDIANAPOLIS, May 20.—Incomplete returns into national headquarters here indicated that approximately 80,000 new members were obtained in the first two days of the American Legion nation wide campaign for increased membership.

Majority of Delegates Will Go Uninstructed and Many Will Vote Complimentary

CHICAGO, May 20.—With the republican national convention only 18 days away and 899 of the 984 delegates already elected, the situation facing the republican candidates is that no candidate will enter the convention with enough votes pledged to him to give any decided advantage over his opponents.

Forty-seven of the 53 states and territories have chosen their delega-

Forty-seven of the 53 states and-territories have chosen their delega-tions and are sending to Chicago 537 uninstructed delegates, 44 more than a majority of all those who will sit in the convention. Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, on the face of returns to date, will show the most strength on the first ballot, for of those delegates which have been instructed or who have expressed a preference, 146 are have expressed a preference, 14% are pledged to him. In addition he carried the preferential primary in Vermont, but that state's eight delegates have not yet been chosen by the state convention.

Wood's nearest competitor in the delegations already pledged, is Sena-tor Hiram Johnson of California, who tor Hiram Johnson of California, who commands an even 100 votes. Gov. Frank O. Lowden of Illinois with 78 votes pledged to him is third, while Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio has 39 votes from his home state.

There are, however, contests pending in 12 states and the District of Columbia, involving 104 delegates. Thirty-five of the contests are on Thirty-five of the contests are on Wood delegates; six on Lowden men and 63 among uninstructed delega-tions. contests.

GURTAHMENT OF LOANS BY BANKS OF SOUTHWEST

DALLAS, May 20.—Strength of Texas banks were today thrown into the fight to reduce living costs.

Banks are responding promptly to the plea sent out in this fedoral reserve district ten days ago by R. L. Van Zandt, governor, urging curtailment of loans for speculative purposes in an effort to stabalize credit and end infiation, Van Zandt declared today.

Many big financial institutions of the southwest, in commenting on the Many big financial institutions of the southwest, in commenting on the statement approved the idea. Scores of bankers were reported lending money only in "sound" cases—for productive and operative purposes.

Tightening in the southwest money market has already been noticeable Government securities and bonds were being cashed for "operating expenses" in lieu of loans.

Van Zandt declared the break in the price of merchandise was not surprising, but refused to comment.

The governor did net cite any amount he desired appropriated, but the recommendations of the legislative committee, of the educational committee of which \$5,000,000 is urged by the state superintendent of schools to be apportioned on the basis.

AUSTIN, TEX., May 20.—With a quorum present in both branches, the special session of the thirty-sixth legislature of Texas convened this morning at 10 o'clock for the purpose of passing pink boll worm legislation, emergency school legislation and deficiency appropriation bill. These are the only three subjects submitted by the governor in his proclamation assembling the law makers. Speaker R. E. Thomas presided in the house and Lieut, Gov. W. A. Johnson in the senate. The new members elected to fill vacancies which have occurred since the regumembers elected to fill vacancies which have occurred since the regular session were sworn in and took their seats. Divine blessing was invoked by the respective chaptains of the law branches and several minor vacancies in the house and senate were filled.

As soon as the legislature is ready for business, bills are to be introduced covering the various subjects em-braced in the governor's call for the special session. Representative Leon special session. Representative Leon Tillitaon of Austin county, is expected to present his concurrent resolution providing for an investigation of the pink boll worm situation before any consideration is given to the pink boll worm bill Submits Boll Worm Matter

Supports Peace Treaty But Says No Man Can Read Him Out of Party

INDIANAPOLIS, May 20 .- "Equal and exact justice to all men," as a remedy for unrest was prescribed by Vice President Marshall in his syncte address today before the state democratic convention. He also urged jail sentence for profiteers and increased production to relieve the high cost of living.

"I hold that the democratic doctrine of equal and exact justice to all

trine of equal and exact justice to all men and of special privileges to none will meet all the angry and irrecon-ciled views of today," said Mr. Mar-

shall.

The vice president also expressed the hope that President Wilson and the senate would reconcile their differences over the peace treaty and that it would be read out of the democratic party because of his opinion on the League of Nations.

"This was, as I understood it," the vice president said, "an American war, The peace should be an American peace. The war could not have been fought successfully as either as a democrat or republican war. The peace can not bring that real peace

a democrat or republican war. The peace can not bring that real peace which the American people want if it be made either as a democratic or

It be made either as a democratic or republican peace.

"I still hope that the president and the senate will reach an accord upon such terms as will enable the treaty to be ratified and a de jure peace to be made with the government of Germany, but as I grant to no man the right to read me out of the democratic party nor to say to me that I can not stand upon its platform, advocate the election of its candidates or vote for them, I, myself, will not say to any man that his views upon the League of Nations inevitably place him without the democratic fold."

But, al-though the stomach appears to be the seat of this craving, it really originates in other parts of the originates in other parts of the body which send in their calls for nourishment.






