

THIS INVISIBLE McADOO BOOM INQUIRED INTO

North Carolina Man Tells Senate Committee of Conversation With McAdoo

NOT A CANDIDATE BUT WOULD ACCEPT NOMINATION

Senator Reed Apologizes to Witness at Conclusion of His Testimony

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The senate campaign investigating committee made further efforts today to get light on what Chairman Kenyon described as "this invisible McAdoo boom."

Angus W. McLean of North Carolina, a director of the war finance corporation, was examined by the committee today. He denied that he was "a sort of southern manager" for Mr. McAdoo's campaign and attempted to read a prepared statement.

"I know there is a McAdoo campaign," interjected Senator Reed. "I move we go ahead with this witness with some questions and let the statement go until we find out why this secrecy."

Replying to a rapid fire of questions Mr. McLean declared that he did not know there was a McAdoo headquarters in Washington or at the Pennsylvania Hotel, New York, and that he was not informed as to the source of McAdoo literature sent to democrat delegates.

He finally recounted a conversation with Mr. McAdoo as to the North Carolina delegation.

"I told Mr. McAdoo there was an overwhelming sentiment in my state for him," he recalled. "I was we were having a primary down there and that his name would go in whether he liked it or not, but that we would not vote for him unless we were voting for a man who would not take the nomination."

"He said he was not a candidate and would not accept the nomination and didn't want his friends to take any action about it. He did, however, say that if the nomination was tendered him a man could not decline."

"Some of his friends thought they ought to take the bull by the horns and get the nomination and I was not to be a part of it. There was some sort of a dinner party up in New York about it and some fool went and told him about it."

"We all thought something should be done to show Mr. McAdoo's availability," the witness said, "but I don't consider I've done any work for him."

"Do you know anything about plans to use the Liberty Loan publicity campaign for Senator McAdoo?" asked Chairman Kenyon.

"I do not," he replied. "I want to apologize for being rough on you," Senator Reed said. "I regarded some man is letting the presidency seek him and not chasing it."

"If there ever was a rabbit Mr. McAdoo is it a rabbit?" asked Chairman Kenyon.

Harding's Campaign. Harry M. Daugherty, campaign manager for Senator Harding, republican, of Idaho, was recalled. He testified that he had supported General Wood, Senator Reed sought an explanation.

"I would be willing to go this far," Mr. Daugherty said. "There was a very active campaign made around Columbus for General Wood."

"I was under the impression," Senator Reed said, "that you were the controlling factor of both papers and that he changed his policy to oppose Senator Harding and that later everything indicated the expenditure of large sums of money during the campaign."

"Mr. Odell pretended at first to support Senator Harding," Mr. Daugherty replied, "and afterwards went to the vigorous support of General Wood. I don't know if he was sincere in his first attitude toward Senator Harding."

"Is it true that very large expenditures were made on advertising in that Ohio campaign?" Senator Reed continued.

"There were expenditures of that kind, too expensive for us, and I didn't go into it," Mr. Daugherty replied. "Throughout the state of Ohio there was a very expensive campaign of advertising for General Wood, but we were not completely in the republican papers were used, I understand, and some of the democratic."

Johnson's Campaign. Frank A. Harrison, a Nebraska newspaper publisher, who managed the primary campaign in that state of Senator Johnson, republican, of California, said a total of \$1,913 had been spent in Nebraska. Of this amount, he testified, \$1,800 was sent him from California and the remainder came in small donations and postage stamps.

"What would you have done with \$500,000 if it had been handed you?" asked Senator Reed.

"What most other political managers do, divide it up among friends, Mr. Harrison replied.

"We are you to advise the people of Europe of our protestations and our decision to struggle until death."

The protests bear the signatures of hundreds of heads of religious orders, doctors, lawyers and merchants.

ORDERS TROOPS OUT IN STRIKE AT BRISTOL, R. I.

BULLETIN. BRISTOL, R. I., May 28.—Three troops of military were ordered out by Governor Beckman today after a riot in which strike sympathizers attacked young women clerks and other working employees of the National India Rubber company. The governor's proclamation declares the town in a state of insurrection. The plant has been closed except for the office force and repair men since the strike began three weeks ago.

Women in the crowd of strike sympathizers pulled the stenographers hair and several of the latter were roughly handled.

SOUTHERN PRESBYTERIANS CONCLUDE SESSIONS

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Thirty-eight railroads in the Southwest today filed a petition with the Interstate Commerce Commission asking an advance in rates of 32.82 per cent instead of the 20 per cent increase requested by the Western classification group of which they are a part. The group signing the petition represent a mileage of 28,517 and a total property investment of \$1,597,101,909. It was claimed.

Columbus, Kansas, vice-president of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad, who presented the petition, said the separate application was made so that total revenue derived from advances in freight rates in the western classification territory as a whole might be so distributed as to most nearly approximate the need of the carriers in the various sections.

Objection to the application being entertained by the commission was made by R. C. Fullbright and S. H. Cowan, representing Texas cattle shippers. Chairman Clark, however, ruled that the evidence was admissible and that arguments on the rates asked would be heard later.

Evidence for the Western classification territory was completed today by L. E. Wetling of Chicago, statistician for the group, who explained the estimates submitted and Edward Chambers, vice-president of the Atchafalaya, Topoka & Santa Fe railway.

WILSON VIEW EXPRESSED IN VA. PLATFORM

The platform adopted by Virginia democrats last week was endorsed today by President Wilson "as in full accord with my own views, especially the statement which sets forth the attitude of the party on the League of Nations and the pressing problems of peace, finance and reconstruction."

The Virginia platform, drafted by Senator Glass of that state, praised the president for "steadfastly standing by the covenant agreed to at Versailles and condemned the republican reservations as destructive of the purposes of the league."

EXPECT DECLARATION FROM WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, May 28.—President Wilson's veto of the peace resolution is expected by democratic senators to be followed soon by a more definite declaration from the White House regarding the president's views on the peace treaty as a campaign issue.

In the discussion of this subject by high officials here the treaty plank recently written into the Virginia democratic platform has been brought into prominence. Senator Glass of that state is understood to have prepared the plank and because of his close association with the administration there has been general belief here that the draft reported in substance the position advocated by the president.

LETTER FROM PRESIDENT IS MADE PUBLIC

Christians, however, are not permitted to leave their homes in that region. Just before the conclusion of the recent Turkish congress in Adrianople the president of the congress declared an agreement to defend Thrace had been reached between the Turks and Bulgarians.

Wright of Fort Worth, who presided at the convention of the bolters in San Antonio is chairman of the delegation leaving here tonight.

STANDING OF CONTRACTS WITH AMERICAN FIRMS QUESTIONED

BERLIN, May 27.—Action to establish through diplomatic channels whether American firms can take advantage of the technical state of war against Turkey in the United States and Germany and cancel contracts with German firms may be taken by the German Chamber of Commerce.

The issue has arisen in connection with a deal between a Brooklyn firm and Berlin manufacturing concern involving the purchase of German products valued at \$1,000,000.

The Berlin manufacturer told the Associated Press today he was ready to make initial deliveries when he received notice of the cancellation of the contract. It is proposed to ask the Chamber of Commerce to establish precedents to move future transactions between the two countries until a formal peace is declared.

EFFORT TO OVERRIDE VETO FAILS

Republican Peace Resolution Lacks 25 of Two-Thirds Majority

WASHINGTON, May 28.—An effort to override President Wilson's veto of the republican peace resolution failed today in the House.

The vote was 219 in favor of overriding the veto to 152 against, or 29 less than the required two-thirds majority.

Two republicans, Representatives Kelley of Michigan and Fuller of Massachusetts, voted to sustain the president's veto, while 17 democrats joined to republican majority in an effort to override it.

CHICAGO POLICE AGAIN LOOKING FOR GEARY

CHICAGO, May 28.—Eugene Geary, alleged gunman and slayer of a "back of the yards," recently acquitted of a charge of murder, was being sought today in connection with what police termed one of the most cold blooded murders of recent years.

Harry J. Reckas, saloonkeeper, was shot and killed in a south side saloon late last night as he waited with his lawyers to discuss with James O'Brien, another saloon keeper, the arrest of two men who are alleged to have victimized them of thousands of dollars through sales of colored water represented as whiskey.

DISORDERS CONTINUE IN PARTS OF IRELAND

LONDON, May 28.—Burning of private and public buildings and shooting of citizens continued in various parts of Ireland last night.

The coast guard station on Ryhill Island and the barracks at Carrickmacross were destroyed by fire.

In County Clare a farmer was attacked and seriously wounded. A constable and Constabulary Sergeant Johnson was ambushed and wounded near Ballyvaughan.

The second Cameron, who were dispatched under heavy arms, were expected to reach their destination today or tomorrow. It was reported today that three other battalions of Cameron have been ordered to proceed to Ireland on Monday under sealed orders.

E. Reading, organizer and leader of the recent outlaw strike.

The "outlawed" organization, which has not been given a title, has a membership of 250,000 railroad employees, Reading said. He said all are on strike. The amalgamation was made, he said, at a secret meeting here of outlaw leaders last week.

AMERICAN DEAD FIELDS FRANCE TO BE HONORED

President Wilson Orders Wreath Laid on Statue of American Doughboy

ADDRESS TO BE MADE IN FRENCH CEMETERIES

Colonel Parker Will "Talk to Those Who Are Lying Up There" Tells Correspondent

PARIS, May 28.—President Wilson has ordered a Memorial day wreath of flowers to be laid upon the statue of "The American Doughboy" in Suresnes cemetery and Ambassador Wallace will deposit it there Sunday.

The ceremony at Picpus cemetery where lies the body of Lafayette will appeal especially to the French people.

The foreign message from Maj. Gen. James G. Harbord, who commanded the second division in the battles at Belleau Wood, will be read on that field.

"Your comrades, the American Legion at home, confide to you the duty of honoring our dead who sleep in the soil of France. Dead on the field of honor, they yet live in the hearts of those for whom they died and millions of their countrymen inspire their memory."

A memorial ode to American volunteers fallen for France written by Allan Seeger, a member of the French Foreign Legion, who was killed in September, 1916, will be read in all American cemeteries where members of the American Legion participate.

George Courtine and Louis Carre, widely known French poets, told the Associated Press this afternoon that a special wreath of flowers inscribed "From the poets of France" would be placed upon Seeger's grave on Memorial day.

Lieut. Col. Frank Parker, who is scheduled to make an address at the Folgy cemetery, was asked today for an outline of his address.

"Speech," he replied, "I am not going to make a speech on Memorial day. I am going to talk to those who were lying up there. I talked to them when they were lying up there."

Maj. Gen. John F. O'Rourke, who is now in London, will speak at Bony, where many of the soldiers of the 27th division fell.

Rear Admiral Harry McPherson will be the principal speaker at Belleau Wood.

Millerand's instructions. Premier Millerand has sent instructions to the 26th army corps of France saying:

"The French army will participate in ceremonies in American cemeteries where lie American soldiers, especially Belleau wood, St. Mihiel and Chaumont."

FRENCH WOMEN SEND MEMORIAL MESSAGE

PARIS, May 28.—Sisterly affection and deepest sympathy for the women of America whose husbands, sons, brothers or sweethearts fell during the war is expressed in a message received by the Paris delegation to the committee from the Society of French Women, the members of which are French women who know the horrors of war and have seen its plagues.

The message, which was inspired by the imminence of memorial day and the arrival of many sorrowing American women here, follows:

"Dear Sisters of America: At the sad hour when those dearest to you relieved your last embrace as they parted from you and left to offer their lives in the name of Liberty and triumph, the hearts of French wives, mothers and sisters, were with you, because they had passed through that anguish which later was to become yours."

"At the hour of victory, dear beloved friends, our thoughts again went out to you in a hymn of joy and gratitude. We smiled through our tears at those who were spared, and prayed the divine word 'peace' might forever reign in our hearts."

"And now, dear sisters, you begin to come to us on your sacred pilgrimage. You come to kneel before the graves of your beloved, the heroic defenders of our cause, whose mortal remains rest under the soil of France—our France—which is still proud to cradle their sacred bodies. How well we understand the emotions and those that sleep in your hearts as you dwell on numberless recollections of those dear ones who are no more."

"Our Society of French Women longs to aid you in every way across the tedious stages of the hard journey which leads back to the place of your dear, May you feel that which we French women wish you so much to feel—that our lost ones are invisible, but not wholly beyond our ken. United in this immortal hope, we offer you our faithful affection."

AMICABLE RELATIONS WITH U. S. OBREGON'S DESIRE

MEXICO CITY, May 27.—Replying today to a message of felicitation to himself and those associated with him in the new regime in Mexico, sent by a number of the members of the municipality of Los Angeles, General Obregon expressed his thanks to the senders and declared that if he should be elected to the presidency he would seek to bring about amicable relations between Mexico and all other countries, especially those next to us on the American continent.

"One of my greatest desires," added General Obregon, "would be that the soldiers which our statesmen to send all frontiers leading to our country are withdrawn."

### CITY GOVERNMENT WILL BE NEUTRAL AS TO OPEN SHOP

Wichita Falls city officials are determined that the laws will be enforced with regard to both sides concerned in the present labor difficulties, according to a letter from Mayor Cline addressed to Walter Curlee, mayor pro tem, prior to his leaving on a business trip to Louisiana, copies of which were mailed to the chief officials of both factions and to the local papers.

In connection with this decision, Mayor Cline stated that the members of the city government are taking no active part in the differences on either side, not regarding the issue as a municipal issue, and believing their only concern to lie in the preservation of the peace.

The letter follows:

Text of Letter.  
Wichita Falls, Tex., May 23, 1920.  
Mayor Pro Tem Walter Curlee,  
City.

"Dear Sir: As previously stated to you, I am leaving the city tonight for an absence of several days, and inasmuch as we have at this time a rather serious phase in our local affairs, brought about by a difference in the opinion of our citizenship on the question of the open shop, I wish to make to you and the council and the public this recommendation:

"I believe that it is the desire of the leaders of both the open shop and closed shop elements without our city to strictly comply with all laws and ordinances concerning their good conduct and citizenship, and I feel equally sure that they will use their best efforts to have all the men associated with them obey our several laws.

"In view of the fact, however, that it has been the experience of other communities in times like these, that the over zealous members of one side or the other may through ignorance of the law or with malicious intent violate our laws, I respectfully suggest to you and the council that you will at this time assure the police commissioner, Mr. Hralley, that it is not only the intention of the city government, but the policy of our city government, to insist that all persons without our jurisdiction shall obey the laws.

"I do not anticipate any trouble, but should any arise, I would further suggest that you use your authority as acting mayor to see to it that Mr. Hralley be provided with such additional police force as the occasion may warrant and co-operate with him to the fullest extent.

"I, with the permission of the council, shall mail a copy of this letter to Mr. Kelley, manager of the Open Shop association, and Mr. Prather, secretary of the Central Trades and Labor Council, so that the leaders may know the policy of our city government. I will also, with their permission, give a copy of this letter to our local press.

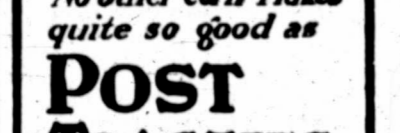
### BIT SHAKEN UP AFTER FALL OF 1500 FEET

MEXICO CITY, MEX., May 23.—Collapse of the Carranza regime has disposed of one troublesome incident in Mexican-American relations—the Jenkins case.

The case was in the hands of the supreme court, which was to decide what court had jurisdiction to try Jenkins on the charge of complicity in his kidnaping.

Revolutionary officials, it was reliably learned today, will dismiss the charges.

### MEXICO BEGINS SUIT TO RECOVER FUNDS

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., May 23.—Legal action to recover from \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000, alleged to have been taken out of Mexico by fleeing Carrancista officials was started today in practically all principal border cities by the new Mexican government.

A suit was filed here asking recovery of \$500,000 gold declared deposited with the Texas State Bank and Trust Co. by Pablo De La Garza, former military governor of Yucatan. The petition is in the name of Provisional President De La Huerta.

Similar suits were filed at Eagle Pass and other border cities recently.

### LEE BUNCH SENT TO PEN ON ANOTHER CHARGE

SALINA, KANS., May 23.—Lee Bunch, acquitted at Lincoln, Kansas, of a charge of murder in connection with the death of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Bunch, was immediately re-arrested on a statutory charge based on his relations with Stella Hyman, his aunt.

Stella Hyman, his aunt, pleaded guilty to the charge at the preliminary hearing, which was held immediately, and was then sentenced to serve a one to seven year term in the state prison. Stella Hyman was given a life sentence. She was found guilty of first degree murder last week. Both will be taken to the state prison without delay.

### BULGARIA FINANCIAL PROBLEM SERIOUS ONE

SOFIA, May 28.—Like most other European countries, Bulgaria's financial problem is a serious one. Facing an indemnity to the allies of \$10,000,000 and a national debt of several billions, she has a gold reserve of only \$7,234,000 and a silver reserve of \$5,345,000. Her war debt amounted to \$2,000,000,000. Her revenue last year was \$35,000,000.

Alexander Stambolisky, the prime minister, has expressed the hope that the United States government might extend a loan to Bulgaria to tide her over her present financial crisis. An advance of \$10,000,000, he said, would improve the value of Bulgarian money, affected by the low rate of exchange and facilitate the purchase by the government of goods in the United States.

In addition to her surplus of wheat and maize and a large number of cattle, Bulgaria's most valuable staple asset is her tobacco, of which she has about 100,000,000 pounds valued at \$100,000,000. She has opium for medicinal purposes and a quantity of other crops.

A number of American commercial firms have established offices in Sofia and limited quantities of American-made goods are finding their way on the market.

**FURTHER APPROPRIATIONS TO COMPLETE ASYLUM HERE WILL BE ASKED**

Provision for completing according to original plans equipping and early opening the West Texas Insane Asylum at Lake Wichita will probably be made at the present called session of the State legislature, according to information brought from Austin by J. W. Chatham, Jr., of the Chamber of Commerce.

The delay in completing and opening the institution was occasioned by the feeling of the state committee, consisting of Governor Hobby, Attorney General Cureton and Lieutenant Governor Johnson, that it would be better to wait until labor conditions improved. Mr. Johnson, it is understood, still holds to this view, although other members of the committee are reported willing and anxious to proceed with the work necessary to open the institution.

The plan which Mr. Chatham found in favor at Austin is to turn the matter entirely over to the Board of Control, and to ask the legislature to supplement the existing appropriation of \$500,000 with another of \$242,000 which \$60,000 would be for equipment \$100,000 for maintenance and \$82,000 for additional buildings. This plan would provide ample funds both to complete and operate the institution; it is being advocated by both Attorney General Cureton and L. C. Page, one of the architects and is understood to have the approval of Governor Hobby.

The \$250,000 which is still available for the work was not spent because the lowest bid was \$32,000. Instead of eliminating some of the proposed new buildings so as to bring the total cost down, the committee decided to wait indefinitely, hoping that labor conditions here would improve. However, it is now estimated that it will require about 40 per cent more than would have been needed at that time, so that the delay has been an expensive one.

Mr. Chatham had the co-operation of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in getting action on the matter at Austin. It is probable that the new plan will be brought before the legislature at an early date.

B. Smock, president of the Civic League, and other officials of this organization.

It is expected that this meeting will mark the more active entry of the women in the city into this movement, a move which was inaugurated Thursday when several Civic League members volunteered to man the kitchen of one of the local restaurants affected by the cooks and waiters strike, following the proprietors' refusal of a demand that he withdraw from the Open Shop Association.

**RECOMMEND AMENDMENT FIRE INSURANCE LAW**

AUSTIN, TEX., May 28.—An amendment to the law creating the state fire insurance commission was recommended to the legislature by the governor today. The amendment proposes to remove limitation now in the law which restricts the expenditures of the commission to \$130,000 a year. Under the present law a tax of 1.4 per cent on the gross business of the insurance companies is levied on the companies to produce this \$130,000 and this tax now yields approximately \$200,000, but with the present limitation only \$130,000 may be expended.

The governor also submitted to the legislature today a batch of other measures, including bill to increase the salary of county treasurers from \$2,000 to \$3,500, the additional \$1,500 to be used to pay an assistant; creat-

# CAMPAIGN OF ADVERTISING ON BY CANDIDATES

All Kinds of Stunts Prepared to Impress Delegates at G. O. P. Convention

ELABORATE PLANS FOR JOHNSON AND WOOD

Hoover Organization Too is Pulling a Few New Ones in Political Advertising

By HAROLD D. JACOBS United Press Staff Correspondent

CHICAGO, May 28.—The greatest political advertising campaign in the history of the country is in full swing here.

Organizations representing all the principal candidates for the republican presidential nomination are employing every established legitimate—and a few brand new ones—to "sell" their man to the public and to the national delegates.

Michigan avenue, long world famous for its "automobile row," has now blossomed out with a "presidential row." This starts at the Backstone Hotel, where Governor Lowden has personal quarters, and runs northward, taking in the Congress and Auditorium hotels. Whole floors of the two latter hosteries have been taken over by the various headquarters.

High Cost of Campaigns. Of course, this all costs money—and the senatorial investigation of campaign expenditures at Washington forms one of the principal topics of conversation here, but as one veteran politician put it today:

"The cost of campaigning has gone up, the same as everything else."

The candidates' campaign headquarters continue to grow, one and two rooms at a time, as the date for the convention approaches, and today have elbowed the infinitesimal quarters of the republican national committee in the Congress Hotel to such an extent that the party officials must find a new headquarters.

Probably the most spectacular headquarters is that of Senator Johnson's organization. New dazzling white partitions have been built in on the second floor of the auditorium and that whole partition of the hotel hung with elaborate colored pictures of the senator in striking postures.

Senator Warren Harding had the smallest space. The suite has been furnished more with an eye to the comfort of visitors than anything else, and is the only one resembling a real, old fashioned political hang-out.

Lowden, Major General Wood and Herbert Hoover are about on a par as regards floor space. The Hoover workmen, however, have gone in strongest for posters. A person can hardly turn about anywhere in Chicago without staring into the beaming

countenance of the former food administrator.

Striking a jarring note in all this republican atmosphere, are two democrat's headquarters. Those of Attorney General Palmer, and Governor Edwards.

Wood Advertising Stunts. The real thing in advertising will be trotted out when the convention gets under way. In this phase the Wood people count on having all their rivals badly handicapped. Among those who will lead the demonstrations for the general will be former Rough Riders in uniform, cowboys in picturesque costumes and graduates of the Plattsburg training camp. Then there will be several groups rah-rah boys, captured in the wilds of various campuses, who will give vent to their native cries, led by their own cheer leaders. Oh, yes, and "steep bands, count 'em.

Johnson and Harding are the only candidates who have decided definitely upon who will make their nomination speeches. It is believed, however, that official announcement will be made before the end of the week that Governor Henry Allen of Kansas will toss General Wood's chapeau into the ring. Several men are said to be under consideration by Lowden, among them being Congressmen Roderberg and Dennison, and E. N. Chipperfield, all of Illinois. Johnson's and Harding's choices are Henry S. Wheeler of San Francisco and Frank B. Willis, former governor of Ohio, respectively.

Senator Moses will be floor manager for Johnson and L. L. Emmerson of Illinois probably will act in that capacity for Lowden. Johnson and Harding had not decided upon their men for the job today.

It became generally known for the first time today that Harding is as deeply interested in the contesting states as Wood and Lowden. According to Harding headquarters, the senator will be affected by the following contests:

Arkansas, 7; Georgia, 17; Louisiana, 12; North Carolina, 22; Oklahoma, 8; South Carolina, 11; Texas, 23.

Johnson will fight for two delegates in Minnesota and an undetermined number in Texas.

Lowden will make the following contests:

Arkansas, 7; Florida, 8; Georgia, 17; Louisiana, 12; Mississippi, 12; Missouri, 4; North Carolina, 22; Oklahoma, 6; South Carolina, 11; Texas, 23; and Virginia, 15.

Wood will make the same contests, with the exceptions of the Carolina and will also contest two from Minnesota. The sets of delegates from the District of Columbia are all claimed by Wood.

## NEW DISORDERS IN INDIAN RAILWAY STRIKE

LONDON, May 28.—New disorders in connection with the strike of employees of the Great Peninsular railway of India are reported in a Bombay dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company, which says the number of strikers is more than 20,000.

At Matunga station several thousand men gathered yesterday, destroyed the railway telegraph line, stopped trains, forced passengers to alight and did considerable other damage. Refreshment cars were raided and food and drink taken.

# GARY EXPRESSES FEAR MINORITY WILL CONTROL

NEW YORK, May 28.—A small minority of the population, "concealing their designs under the word 'labor' are threatening to undermine the constitution," E. H. Gary, president of the Iron and Steel Institute, declared in addressing the annual meeting here today.

The present so-called labor strikes, involving riot and injury to property and person, are instigated as a part of the campaign to disturb and demoralize the economic conditions of the country," Gary said. "In other lands very serious results have been accomplished by the same means which have been employed here."

Gary said the "small minority" hopes to attract a majority of the people and thus enable them to obtain, "one legislative act after another until the constitution shall be undermined and the whole structure killed."

"These men," he continued, "have already secured some legislation which is wrongly discriminating."

Speaking of the duties of the employers, Gary said they must be "unselfish, reasonable, fair, sincere and honest."

"Employees must realize that their advancement and contentment depend on progress and prosperity of their employers; that except for the willing and free investment of capital up to the requirements of business demand, together with the full co-operative assistance on the part of the best talent, enterprise and initiative would languish and disappear and that 'indifference' and idleness would be substituted."

Agitators who are trying to create trouble between employees and employers, are as a rule insincere and selfish.

The declaration of the "illy white" republicans in favor of light wine and beer is so obviously a bid for the support of those who make the return of some intoxicants the paramount or sole issue that it is doubtful if it will work as it was intended.

The Texas republicans heretofore have made similar declarations in the hope of appealing to democrats dissatisfied with the bone dryness for which Texas democracy has come to stand; but this year the republican resolutions-makers evidently believe that there is a political fluidity in Texas, from which possible secretions and advantages to Texas republicans are possible.

The Dallas democratic convention went on record not only as demanding the rigid enforcement of the prohibition amendment and the Volstead law, but as instructing its delegates to San Francisco that they shall not support any candidate or any plank that looks to any liberalization of the prohibition law enforcement.

With the American party and the Texas republicans at one on the light wine and beer idea, it is not difficult to believe that next November is likely to see Texas citizens determining between the democratic nominee on a dry platform and a coalition nominee on a wet platform.

The winner in the July democratic primaries will be committed to prohibition and against any modification of existing dry statutes.

Mr. McGregor, who already is the American party candidate on a platform devoted to the restoration of light wines and beer, probably will be tendered the republican nomination or republican support, and if the thirty-sixth state has not ratified suffrage by that time, we are going to have a real campaign in Texas next fall with all anti-democratic influences coalescing in the effort to encompass democratic defeat.

Some of those who have been fighting the democracy from the inside are apt to show their real purposes then by getting on the outside with their attacks, and they are hoping for better results from that direction than from the other.

Postmaster General Burleson will go to San Francisco as a one-half delegate to the San Francisco convention from the Travis county district, which he represented for years in congress.

Mr. Burleson got on the delegation by "the skin of his teeth," and the reason of the opposition to him was that very many of the delegates from that district were not convinced that Mr. Burleson stands for the things for which his old district now stands.

Women of Travis county led the fight on his selection, resisting the appeals that were mainly based on his connection with the Wilson administration; and with the vote standing a tie between him and Sam Sparks on several ballots, the compromise finally was reached after hours of discussion to split the delegateship between them, a half to Burleson and a half to Sparks.

Oklahoma has a campaign on that is purposed to stamp out typhoid fever. The State Health department got very good results last summer from its anti-typhoid drive, with the administration of typhoid serum the remedy urged; and this year the campaign is begun even earlier with free immunization furnished by the state to all who will accept it.

Economically speaking, typhoid is one of the most disastrous of diseases. Every adult case is estimated conservatively to cost a minimum of \$1,000—figuring time lost, medical care and expense, nursing and loss of production—and the anti-typhoid serum is as nearly a specific in prevention as vaccination is against smallpox.

Our own Texas Health department might profitably emulate the Oklahoma example to the real advantage of the state at large.

Reductions of lumber prices of from \$5 to as much as \$25 per thousand feet are reported from several Texas towns. The reductions are not so much in themselves as they are indications upon which to base hopes for further reductions in the building line, which has been tremendously hindered

by high prices of everything entering into construction. There is a shortage of 3,340,000 houses in the United States, according to a speaker before the American Society of Mechanical Engineers; reduction of the cost of things entering into the construction of those needed houses will help remedy the deficiency quickly.

Still talking politics; Wichita Falls will send two of its best known citizens to San Francisco. Mr. Kemp will go as a delegate at large and Mr. Huff will go as one of the two district delegates.

Mr. Huff went also from this district in 1916. Both these gentlemen were sources of real strength in the Wichita campaign which ended in the conventions of May 1 and 8, and Wichitans generally will applaud the state convention's recognition of their excellence as representatives of the state at large and of the Thirtieth Congressional district.

The withdrawal of Mr. Lewelling from the gubernatorial race will not make any material change, for while Mr. Lewelling contributed no little to the gaiety of nations while he was campaigning and helped achieve the desirable end, he really didn't make much headway in his own race.

The former senator is still running, his headquarters announces anew, so we have now but the four in the race—the others being Speaker Thomason, Mr. Neff and Mr. Looney.

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### RESOLUTION FOR REPEAL ALL WAR TIME LEGISLATION

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Repeal of all war-time legislation was proposed today in a joint resolution introduced by Representative Connally, democrat, Texas. The repeal would be effective on final passage of the resolution.

### DEFACTO TROOPS CLASH WITH VILLA'S TROOPS

JUAREZ, MEX., May 28.—Mexican de facto troops clashed with a rear guard protecting the escape of Francisco Villa at Valle de Allende, Chihuahua, according to a message received today from General J. Gonzalez Escobar, commander of the troops pursuing Villa. The bandit leader escaped into the hills, Escobar said. Villa was said to be attempting to make his way into Durango where he has promise of additional forces and the government troops are attempting to intercept him before he reaches the state line.

### J. H. DAVIS ACQUITTED OF SWINDLING CHARGE

J. H. Davis, youthful El Pasoan, was acquitted early Friday by a jury in the 30th district court of a charge alleging swindling by check. The case was called late Thursday and argument commenced Friday morning. The defendant is a youth of about 20 years.

A recent government report showed there are now 49,195 trucks in use on farms and that the number is steadily increasing.

### BILL INTRODUCED FOR APPROPRIATION OF \$2,500,000 FOR SCHOOLS

AUSTIN, May 28.—A bill was introduced in the house today by Representative Tillotson of Austin county, carrying an appropriation of \$2,500,000 to supplement the available school fund for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1920, and ending August 31, 1921.

Representative Thomason of Nacogdoches, introduced a bill which would permit teachers of other states to teach in Texas without standing an examination.

By a vote of 75 to 17, the house adopted a resolution requesting the governor to submit an amendment to the tick eradication law. The amendment would provide that an inspection shall be made of dairy stock and if found infected with ticks, then such cattle shall be dipped.

Two bills were introduced by Representative Nordhaus, of Bexar, authorizing commissioners' courts to employ all clerical assistants that may be necessary, and fixing the penalty for the theft of an automobile at six to 10 years in the penitentiary.

### Other Appropriations.

AUSTIN, TEX., May 28.—The bill appropriating \$185,000 to reimburse the board of regents of the University of Texas for expenditures made at Camp Mabry, remaining unpaid at the close of the war, was passed in the senate today.

Numerous petitions urging the passage of the emergency school appropriations were presented by senators and referred to the educational committee.

Seven bills were introduced in the senate, mostly of a local nature. Amendments to the law governing the issuance of certificates to school teachers, offering choice for subjects for examination and providing for reciprocity in the recognition of the certificates with other states are incorporated in a bill introduced by Aldridge.

A bill by Caldwell proposes to confer the powers of condemnation upon county officials in order to enable them to secure road building mate-

rial, and another would give counties authority to issue bonds for the construction of concrete bridges, dikes and spillways.

Bills creating independent school districts were introduced: Tarkana, Throckmorton and Lorraine in Nolan and Mitchell counties.

Confirmation of the sale by the university of Penn Landing field in Austin, used for an air service school during the war is proposed in another bill.

### EXTEND FELICITATIONS TO PRESIDENT WILSON

AUSTIN, May 28.—In the lower house of the legislature a concurrent resolution, offered by Representative Scott of Jefferson and others, was adopted, "that we most heartily and earnestly extend our felicitations and greetings to our noble president as expressed in the democratic state platform" and that "he may soon regain his full strength and vigor."

### NATIONAL LABOR PARTY LEADERS IN CONFERENCE

CLEVELAND, May 28.—National officers of the National Labor party and of the committee of Forty-eight met here today in joint conference. Combination of the two parties or cooperation during the political campaign to formulate a platform and nominate candidates for president and vice president was considered.

DALLAS, May 27.—Reductions in lumber prices at various Texas towns reported in the past few days, averaging \$10 to \$15 per thousand feet, is due to the car shortage, according to M. M. Mayfield, president of the Dallas Lumber Dealers' Association. Shortage of nails and cement with resultant increased prices, has offset the lower lumber prices, he said.

Lumber from Louisiana and Mississippi being thrown on the Texas market at present, Mr. Mayfield declared, ordinarily would have been shipped at Kansas City and St. Louis were the car situation normal in those cities. The supply of nails in Texas is practically exhausted, he said, as a result of the steel strike last winter. Nails sold in Dallas today at 10 cents a pound.

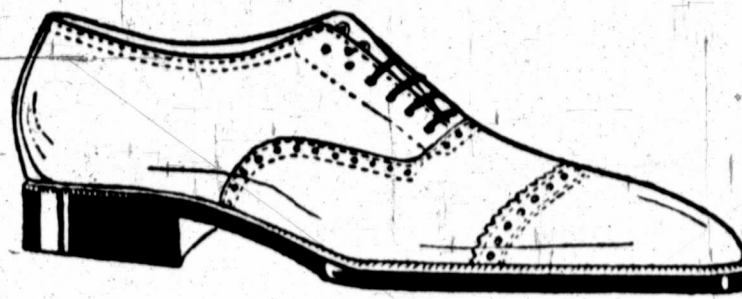

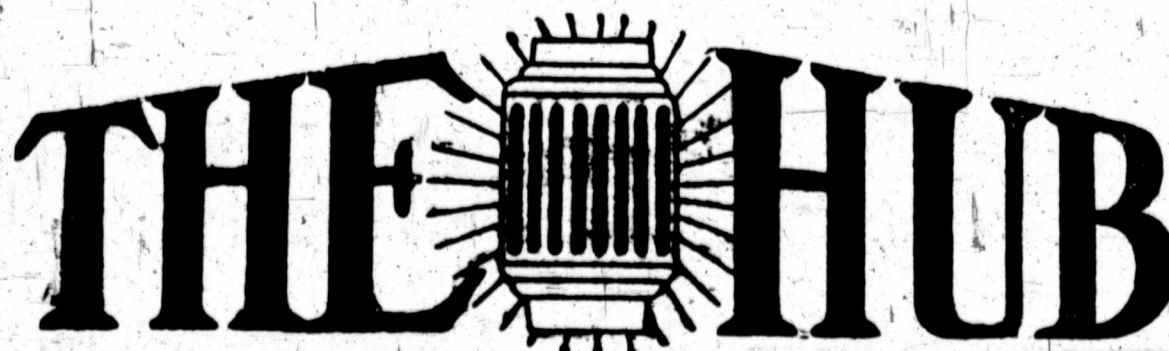

It is reported the people of Alexandropol acclaimed with a claim the Armenian troops entered Khachadorian, an Armenian commander who recently revolted and who was in charge of an armored train which made bolshevik control of Adrinopol possible, was killed during the fighting before that city and his associates fled when loyal troops captured the train.

Sheep or Goat? on Which Side? Here Is the Open Shop Free-American Platform:

"1. Absolute fairness to employe and employer alike is one of the foundation principles on which Americanism rests. 2. We will work for the improvement of industrial relations, the elimination of class prejudice, which generally results from misunderstandings, and the establishment of equitable and uniform working conditions fair alike to employe and employer. 3. It will always use its united influence in opposition to injustice, whether practiced by employers or employes. 4. It stands for the American plan which means absolute fairness to all classes of workers whether union or non-union. It unalterably opposes the "closed shop" which shuts the doors of industry against the American workman who is not a member of a labor organization. 5. It is un-American to interfere with the personal rights and constitutional liberties of the individual. Therefore, we shall oppose the use of force or intimidation by anyone endeavoring to persuade workmen either to join or to resign from a labor organization. 6. We hold that both the employe and the employ-

er are privileged to terminate their relations whenever either choose to do so, unless, of course, there are contracts between them. 7. We do not countenance limitation of the amount of work which may be accomplished in a given time, or the manner in which payment shall be made for such work, whether by hourly rate, piece work, contract or otherwise. We believe that every workman should have an opportunity to earn a wage proportionate to his ability and productive capacity. 8. By encouraging fair dealings and broadminded policies, we, the undersigned, with the cooperation of Wichita Falls' thinking public, hope to bring about working conditions and wages which will make Wichita Falls known as a good city in which to work, to live and to raise children. Forced by organized labor's record of strikes, broken contracts, and that form of sabotage known as "Diminished production" 1500 citizens have joined in an Open Shop American movement and promulgated the foregoing platform. Organized labor has met this same American movement with strike, boycott, threat and intimidation.

The time has come when we must know how men stand on this issue which strikes at the very door of our government.
